Frog Farming Not Paying "Industry"

Bureau of Fisheries Skeptical About Success.

Washington.—One of the earliest harbingers of spring is the clack and rattle of tiny frog voices from wayside brooks and marshes. Students in nature-study classes go forth to skim jellylike frog eggs from woodland ponds and bring them back for the school aquarium. Then someone always suggests: "Frog legs bring good prices at restaurants, and the skins are used in making book covers and fine glue. Why not start a frog farm?"

"Frog farming has been tried in both Louisiana and Wisconsin, but it is not yet a paying industry," says the National Geographic society. "Recently the New York state department of conservation warned investors to be on their guard following the publication of commercial circulars urging people to go into the business of raising frogs for the market. The United States Bureau of Fisheries likewise is skeptical, declaring 'success in artificial propagation on a commercial scale still awaits realization.' It should be kept in mind also that it requires from four to five years for a frog, whose legs are edible, to reach adult size.

Frogs' Eggs Absorb Water.

"A female frog may lay as many as 240 eggs," says a communication to the

National Geographic society from Doris M. Cochran. "The eggs are deposited in small masses on water plants or on sticks or leaves lying in shallow water. An egg consists of the yolk—the round black center—and the vitelline envelope—the surrounding transparent membrane—which begins to absorb water as soon as the egg is laid, and thus immediately swells to several times its original size.

"Under favorable conditions, the tadpole hatches on the fourth day. At first it is a minute, flattened, yellowish object, with conspicuous branching filaments, its gills, at one end and a course, rudderlike appendage, the tail at the other.

"The little creature at this stage can barely wriggle away from its cast-off envelope, to squirm upward to the surface of the water, where it instinctively seeks the shelter of foliage and of the shallow water; for at this age it easily becomes the prey of small fish and other ever-hungry enemies.

"In a few days, when its mouth parts have begun to develop, it nibbles the 'scum' of green algae which forms a dense mat over every submerged stone or pebble in the stagnant pond.

Sprouts Legs.

"Before the tadpole is many weeks old a pair of budlike growths sprouts near the base of the tail, and shortly these elongate into a pair of hind legs equipped with five toes, which closely resemble those of the adult.

"Some days after the legs appear, the right arm comes out. Now the little tadpole stays near the top of the water nearly all the time and seems very uncomfortable, and no wonder. His left arm is developing just where the breathing pore is located. As soon as it bursts through, his troubles are lessened, for now he can hop out on the bank in true frog fashion and breathe the air freely; for, as we have seen, his nostrils have been functioning for some time as air-breathing organs.

"At the approach of the sharp autumn weather he is about half an inch in length and half-grown. While he has no voice as yet, the mating call of his elders may occasionally be heard in the pool as late as September, for frogs are active over a long period of the year and the breeding season may be said to last from April to September, reaching a peak at several different times, as warm weather and heavy rainfall favor it.

"At the onset of winter everything is silent, but with sleep, not death. Near the borders of the pond, buried under logs and stones in the mud, the little frogs have begun hibernation for the winter. A wise provision of Nature slows down their life processes to suit them to this complete inactivity and apparent inanition.

"In their summer activity, more than a few moments' enforced submergence in water would have drowned them. Now, in hibernation, they can pass a whole winter beneath the mud because they are not breathing."

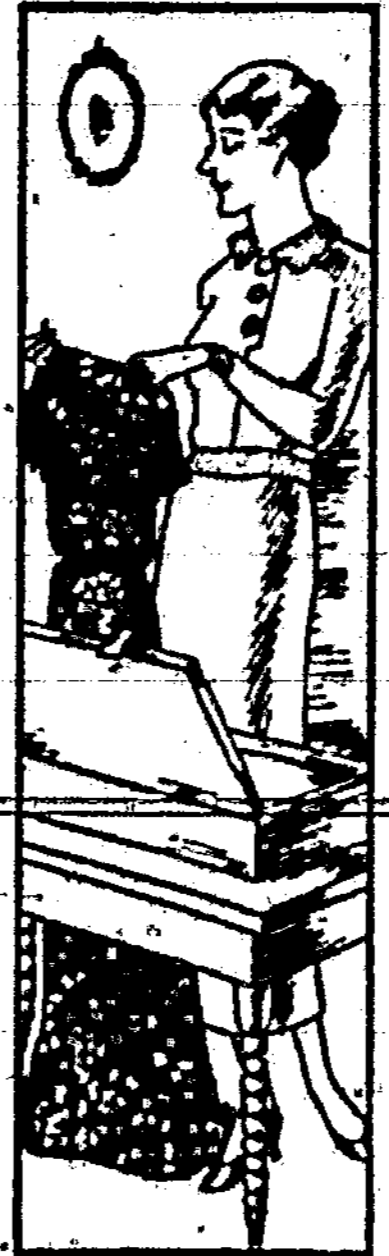

The Household

WHEN you are planning the wardrobe for a journey there are some things which you can see to that will relieve you of work in the care of the articles, and some others that will make it possible to have fresh looking frocks without extra work. One can imagine such things quite feasible if extra money were expended, but fortunately the things about which I shall tell you mean practically no added outlay, nothing but careful selections of materials and accessories, plus the price of two equipments which will last many a trip.



Silk crepe, not the fat crepe but that resembling seersucker should be selected for night gowns or pyjamas. These are satisfactory in silky appearance, in soft texture, and in being crushable without detriment. The material washes beautifully, and requires no ironing. Moreover it dries in a minimum time, and this is a trait every traveler likes. Be sure to hang top garments up by shoulders and trousers by waist band. If possible put them in a draught. Garments so hung will keep their correct lines.

Slips. It is a good idea to have a slip of this same textile in with others of soft silk or satin. You will find it a great convenience when there has been no chance to get laundry done. Silk lingerie is scarcely more expensive than a good grade of cotton, and silk folds into very small space. Consequently it is a wise choice and will minimize laundry work as it washes well and may even be worn without ironing if the garments are hung up by the shoulder straps or from under arm seams.

Be sure to take a small electric flat-iron, but be sure also to ascertain the system in the place in which you wish to use the iron as electric fittings must suit systems. Tourist's small clothes-line sets cost but a trifle. They consist of line and web-clothespins. Such a set is a great convenience. Have laundry soap too. With such equipments cost of laundry is minimized without incurring too much work for the traveler.

A Lace Dress. A lace dress will be ready to don without the bother of pressing, and will grace any occasion especially if the bodice is cut low and is sleeveless. Have a jacket to match with long sleeves and high back for afternoon wear.

A frock of crinkly crepe made in good style will prove just the thing for many traveling days. Choose one that is dark enough not to show dust and dirt.

Smart New Fashion. A smart new fashion is to have accessories match shoes. Identical matching can be had as for example, shoes and bag of the same leather, kid, fabric or silk. Or it may be a matching of color in such small details as handkerchief and shoes, or hat and shoes, or scarf and shoes. The style is an advance one for summer.

Ex-governor W. C. McDonald had just passed away and there was a front page display concerning the demise of the governor, showing the flag at half mast. Mr. McDonald was the state's first governor.

The Songbird of New Mexico, Miss Elizabeth Garrett, occupies prominent mention in this issue. Elizabeth Garrett is the composer of the celebrated song "O, Fair New Mexico," that she uses wherever she travels; in fact it is the state song.

On looking this issue over, we see the ads of W. W. Stadtman, former town clerk, the Lincoln State Bank, the Stockmen's State Bank of Corona, Gillet & Daniel, Western Garage, Barnett's Feed Store, the Dr. J. R. Neal Ranch Sanitarium in Old Lincoln Town, the Carrizozo Theatre, R. C. Pitts, Manager, etc.

O. T. Nye was County Clerk and A. H. Harvey was Deputy 'way back in 1918. Spence & Merchant were among the Attorneys at that time; Mrs. Albert Ziegler was in Seattle, Rev. Lewelling was pastor of the Methodist Church and Rev. Gardner of the Baptist Church. 'Buy Liberty Bonds' were among the articles in this issue, it being war time. Dr. R. T. Lucas left for Camp Pike, Ark., to take up his duties as Captain in Uncle Sam's Army. Groom Bros. had an ad; also the American Title & Trust Co., W. H. Osborn, Sec'y.

'Bevo' was advertised by the Carrizozo Trading Company. It was Near Bear, mind you. This country was as dry that a camel - what's the use of discussing our Amigo the camel, anyway? Things are Wet once more - the Amber Effervescent Conversation Water that ebbs and flows from cylindrical receptacles is very much the style now. Ziegler Bros. and the Titsworth Co. of Capitan are represented. H. B. Hamilton was the leading Attorney of this place.

Who can remember all the men and women of prominence at that time? We'll wager that A. H. Harvey, Dr. Paden, Paul and C. D. Mayer, Henry Lutz, Frank Sager and Pete Johnson, Sr., can relate a few things about the happenings 'way back in 1918.

Now to get down to current events - we note that Al Smith's name is mentioned as a possible candidate for the presidency in 1936. Attaboy, Al! It'll be your funeral, not ours. Senator Smith was the victim of the famous Meade Double X in the last national Democratic convention. We don't think that our old friend Al will forget it - put

## TRENDS FAVORABLE IN STATE BANKING

Recent Figures Indicate Large Increases in Deposits and Invested Funds

Improvement in the condition of state banks in almost every respect during 1934 is shown by statistics recently assembled, Robert M. Hanes, President Wachovia Bank and Trust Company, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, points out in an article in "Banking" published by the American Bankers Association. The figures on which this statement is based were gathered by the Committee on State Bank Research of the association from reports furnished by state bank supervisors throughout the country.

"Ever since 1921 the number of state banks has been declining," Mr. Hanes says. "Between 1931 and 1934 the decline was rapid. Figures for December 31, 1934, showed that the downward trend has not yet ended, but the decline last year was the smallest in twelve years."

There are now, he says, about ten thousand state banks, which term includes all state chartered institutions with the exception of mutual savings banks. The article continues:

"Even more significant was the ending of the decline of deposits in state banks which had been going on since the collapse of the stock market boom in 1929. In recent years for which figures are available the drop has been particularly abrupt. Total deposits in state banks declined from \$20,395,762,000 on December 31, 1931, to \$16,424,823,000 on December 31, 1933. The record for 1934 shows a recovery to \$17,505,760,000 at the year-end.

### Significance of Increased Deposits

"It is particularly gratifying to note the expansion of deposits, since it was their decline which made necessary the liquidation of investments, the calling of loans, and all the other phenomena which go under the name of 'deflation' and have brought banks so much criticism in recent years. It is now plain that this was due to efforts of the banks to place themselves in the possession of enough liquid assets to meet the growing demands of depositors for the return of a part of the money which had been placed on deposit.

"That this is true is borne out by the movement of invested funds of state banks, which has paralleled that of deposits. These invested funds (loans and discounts plus investments) for state banks, dropped from \$20,291,320,000, at the end of 1931, to \$14,918,773,000 at the end of 1933. By December 31, 1934, however, they had recovered to \$15,769,510,000. All of this gain is accounted for by the increase in investments during 1934; the expansion amounting to approximately \$1,300,000,000.

"As for loans and discounts, they registered a slight drop again in 1934, but the rate of decline was much smaller than in previous years, which in itself is progress. Whereas the drop in loans and discounts amounted to approximately \$3,300,000,000 in 1933, and to approximately \$1,300,000,000 in 1934, it was less than \$500,000,000 in 1934.

"In another respect the balance sheet figures for December 31, 1934, were especially impressive. Bills payable and rediscounts of the state banks, which at the end of 1933 had reached a depression high of \$669,709,000, had dropped by the close of last year to the low figure of \$52,101,000. One must search the records as far back as 1917 to find bills payable and rediscounts of state banks at a lower figure. Moreover, it is reasonable to expect a further reduction of such borrowings during the current year."
