Fred Pflingsten

Last Saturday evening about 8 o'clock, Fred Pflingsten, aged 64, one of Lincoln County's pioneers and honored citizens, met his death in an unusual and lamentable manner.

Mr. Pflingsten was a member of the Capitan Union Hi School Board and a few days before the evening meal, he made preparations to attend a meeting of that body to be held at the gymnasium in Capitan. After passing through the outer gate of the Pflingsten homestead, his car refused to run as he had misjudged the gas supply and the tank was dry. Mr. Pflingsten's strength enabled him to turn the car in an easterly direction, knowing that on account of the down grade, he could coast far enough to obtain gas. Just at that time, a car approached from the west and the occupants, a man and his wife, from California, offered to remain behind him and push him to the next gas station. After giving him a start they noticed the car swerved to first one side, then to the other, showing that there was no guiding hand at the wheel.

They stopped their car and going forward to ascertain the cause, they found Mr. Pflingsten breathing his last. The body was taken to the home and Sunday morning an inquest was held and a verdict rendered to the effect that deceased's death was due to heart failure.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon, first with a short sermon at the home and afterwards at the Angus church, both conducted by Rev. Jordan of the Carrizozo Baptist Church, after which Carrizozo Lodge No. 30, I. O. O. F., took charge of the remains and performed the last sad rites for the dead at the grave. Officers performing the rites were: A. L. Burke, Noble Grand; Herman Kelt, Chaplain; A. S. McCamant, Marshal; Rod-bearers, L. H. Dow and John W. Harkey, assisted by attendant members to the number of fifteen.

Fred Pflingsten was of that type of men on whom rests the honor of making the great southwest a pleasant and desirable place in which to live. Honesty and square-dealing with his fellowman, being the every day practices of that honorable gentleman. His charity which knew no bounds was not known to the outer world, but he kept it treasured up in his heart and many there are in old Lincoln County who will miss the kindly open hand of human kindness which was always held out to the unfortunate. Not only will he be missed by those to whom he was a benefactor, but by his many friends over the county, for whom, no matter how much he might have been engrossed with business, he always found time for a kind word and friendly chat.

Fred Pflingsten was born Feb. 22, 1871, in Omaha, Nebr., came to New Mexico at the age of 11 years and lived for a number of years at White Oaks. Married Maggie M. May on Nov. 1, 1894. Leaves his wife, three children, Mrs. Ed'ma Percell, Bert and Wells; four grandchildren, Donnie Percell, Betty Pflingsten, Margaret and Mary Helen Kallisen; one brother, Albert and one sister, Mrs. Agnes Hightower, to all of whom the sympathy of this community is extended.

Class A—Contestants 18 years or over. Class B—Under 18.
No entrance fee. Three prizes. 1st, \$1.00; 2nd, 75c; 3rd, 50c

Friday and Saturday Afternoons

Rodeo Proper, Starting at 1 p. m.

1. Cigarette Race—From standing start; ride to attendant (distance 100 yds.) step off of horse; cigarette and match will be handed contestant by attendant; contestant to light cigarette before remounting horse; remount and return to place of start.
2. Stake Race—Against time—to be run between stakes set 24 feet apart, in two rows, and rows also being 24 feet apart. Five stakes in each row, two seconds deducted for bending or knocking over a stake.
3. Ring Sparring—Five rings 50 feet apart will be hung on cross arms so that rings will be slightly above riders' heads on horseback. Start 50 feet from first ring, and return to starting point. Rider disqualified if over 15 seconds. Each ring to count 1 point. The time of each rider will be kept and if two or more riders get the same number of rings, they will be placed according to their speed in riding. Spear will be furnished by committee.
4. Children's Pony Race—No entrance fee. Purse \$5.00, divided. 60 and 40%—1st & 2nd. 12 years age limit. 800 yards. Walk-up start.
5. Quarter Mile Race—Open to horses which have qualified in any above events. Walk up start. Committee reserves the right to disqualify any rider.
6. Goat Roping—Customary contest rules to apply.
7. Exhibition Bronc—No entrance fee. Purse \$5.00, divided. 60 & 40% to two riders putting up best ride.
8. Calf Roping—Customary rules to apply.
9. Cow roping break away—Customary rules to apply.
10. Wild Cow Milking—Customary contest rules to apply.

Entrance fees in all above events (except Bronc Riding and Children's Race) will be \$2.00 each event. Entrance fee to be paid and entry made before 12 noon each day at Carrizozo to Mr. T. A. Spencer. Entrance fees and \$5.00 added money each event will be split 50 30 20. Program will begin at 1 p. m. promptly each day. All contestants must be on hand and ready to go when called or be disqualified. Contestants and their mounts must stay at a place designated by the committee, and will not be permitted to obstruct the view of the audience.

Lesson for September 29

JOHN (THE MINISTER AND HIS PEOPLE)

LESSON TEXT—Third Epistle of John GOLDEN TEXT—Beloved, imitate not that which is evil, but that which is good.

Personal History

1. He was the son of Zebedee and brother of the apostle James (Matt. 4:21). The implication is that his father was in easy circumstances, for he had boats and hired servants (Mark 1:19, 20).

His Character

1. He was reserved. That is, he was decidedly reticent about himself. He speaks of himself as "the disciple whom Jesus loved" and "that other disciple."

Some Instances of Behavior

1. Intolerance of irregular service (Luke 9:40, 50). There was a certain disciple who seems to have been intelligently witnessing and God had honored his testimony with power to cast out devils.

His Third Epistle

This is one of the three private Epistles of the New Testament and gives us a look into the early church life and also a picture of the aged apostle. This Epistle consists of the following parts:

1. The salutation (vv. 1-4)

This letter was addressed to Gaius, with the fervent wish that his temporal prosperity and physical health would be measured by the measure of the increase of his spirituality. His supreme joy was to hear that his children were walking in the truth.

2. His praise for Gaius (vv. 5-8)

This praise was for the hospitality which Gaius showed toward some traveling evangelists. In spite of the opposition of a certain prominent member of the church, Gaius received these preachers into his home.

3. His condemnation of Diotrophes (vv. 9, 10)

The sin of this man was his over-weening self-confidence and arrogance. He loved to have the place of pre-eminence; therefore, for that reason he refused to receive these traveling evangelists and expelled them into their homes.

4. His commendation of Demetrius (v. 12)

Demetrius was perhaps the bearer of this letter. John gives the assurance that Demetrius was of good report among all men. His life of good deeds proved that he was in fellowship with God.

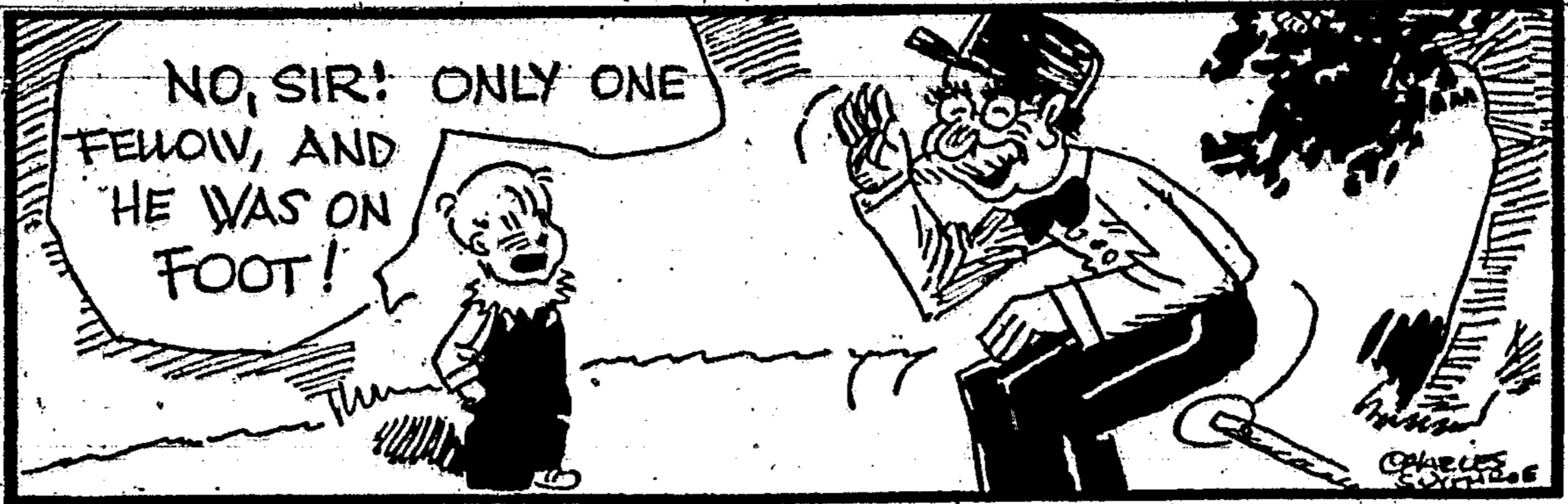

Plan for Adequate National Defense

Rebuilding of the Army and Navy Is Under Way.

Washington.—New steps, fostered by the administration, for more adequate national defense are being made on three fronts—land, sea and air.

Congress has given the government sufficient funds to develop a mechanized army and a scientific navy of smashing gun power.

High-Speed Tanks.

The army plans to equip more infantry units with the high-powered semi-automatic rifle, which has three times the firing power of the standard Springfield rifle.

New armor protection has been developed for seven and 15-ton trucks, to be obtained. Armored scout cars

equipped with radio and carrying 50 caliber machine guns are on the schedule.

With the Wilcox air base bill enacted the administration is looking forward to the gradual adoption of a new policy of national defense.

The Wilcox bill, recently enacted, authorizes the establishment of a series of air bases along the Atlantic and Pacific coastlines, on the Gulf of Mexico and in Alaska.

Wall of Defense.

Proponents of military aviation claim these air bases will establish a veritable "Chinese wall" around this country and that it will be adequate in defending it from attack.

The new air bases will be linked up with naval stations wherever possible to provide the maximum of efficiency.

The United States is also drafting plans for new naval vessels that can be thrown into production at once—in the event of a world naval race.

Naval leaders here hope the British-Japanese program of announcing in advance, what the naval program of each country will be for some years to come, will achieve results of mutual confidence that are predicted for it.

But they are skeptical, and frankly believe there is little hope of any effective results from a "gentleman's agreement" that isn't even over a signature.

In any event, this country will be forced to build seven new battleships, weighing about 35,000 tons and costing about \$50,000,000 each, before 1942.

Approximately half a dozen cruisers also must be replaced on the same basis, and by the end of the period the aircraft carriers Lexington and Saratoga will be nearing the obsolete stage.

ANOTHER NEW EXPERIMENT

Wonders never cease! In their laboratories today scientists are discovering new cures for disease, more efficient treatment for physical and psychic disorders and new applications of nature's laws to the development of the race.

Now comes another strange and rather gruesome experiment which, if successful, may contribute great benefit to victims of infectious diseases.

We have read of daring and risky experiments in the past, but nothing comparable to the recent investigations in the field of revivification. In this experiment animals, preferable monkeys, are frozen to an icy lump and later thawed out and brought back to normal life.

It is argued that in the process of freezing, no degeneration takes place, consequently there is no decay of tissue. But even granting these facts the

question arises—what possible benefit can accrue from such experiments? The answer is, there are two very definite results possible. The first, and perhaps most interesting, is the question which arose in the mind of a young man, the son of a member of the faculty of one of our large universities, who volunteered his own body to be frozen to death.

It has been suspected for some time that at certain degrees below zero, some germs can be killed. Heat can produce that effect, why not cold—so the argument runs.

We were skeptical of the anti-toxins for diphtheria and other diseases, but time has proven their value. The "freezing process," however, to say the least, is an exceedingly dangerous experiment. Men have "dared" much in the interest of scientific investigation. Risks were taken which resulted in many deaths. But, will there be sufficient number of volunteers to "be frozen to death"? If so, will they be able to tell us if there is a heaven, and what it is like? Will they be able to demonstrate that deadly germs can be frozen out of the human system? Maybe so—several questions still remain:

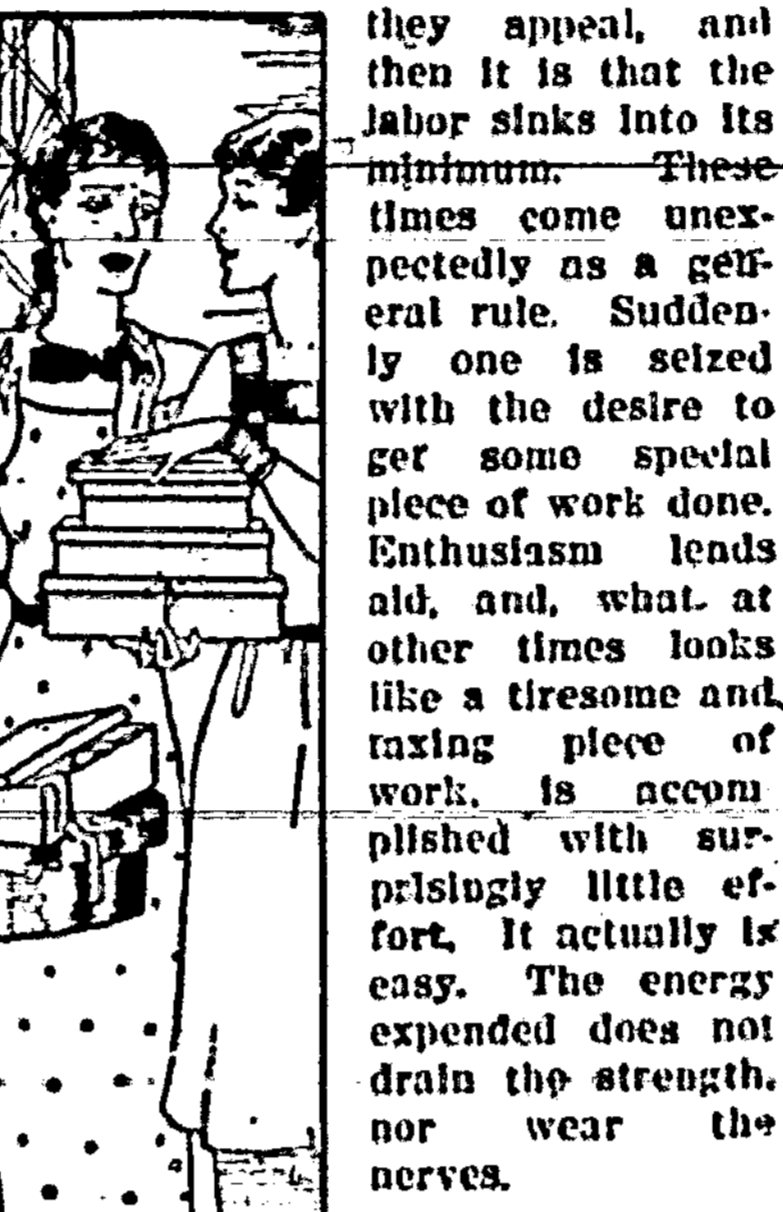
Do we need such evidence of another life to come? Would it strengthen our faith in immortality? There still remains the matter of germs. Who will volunteer to be "frozen to death" in the interest of science?

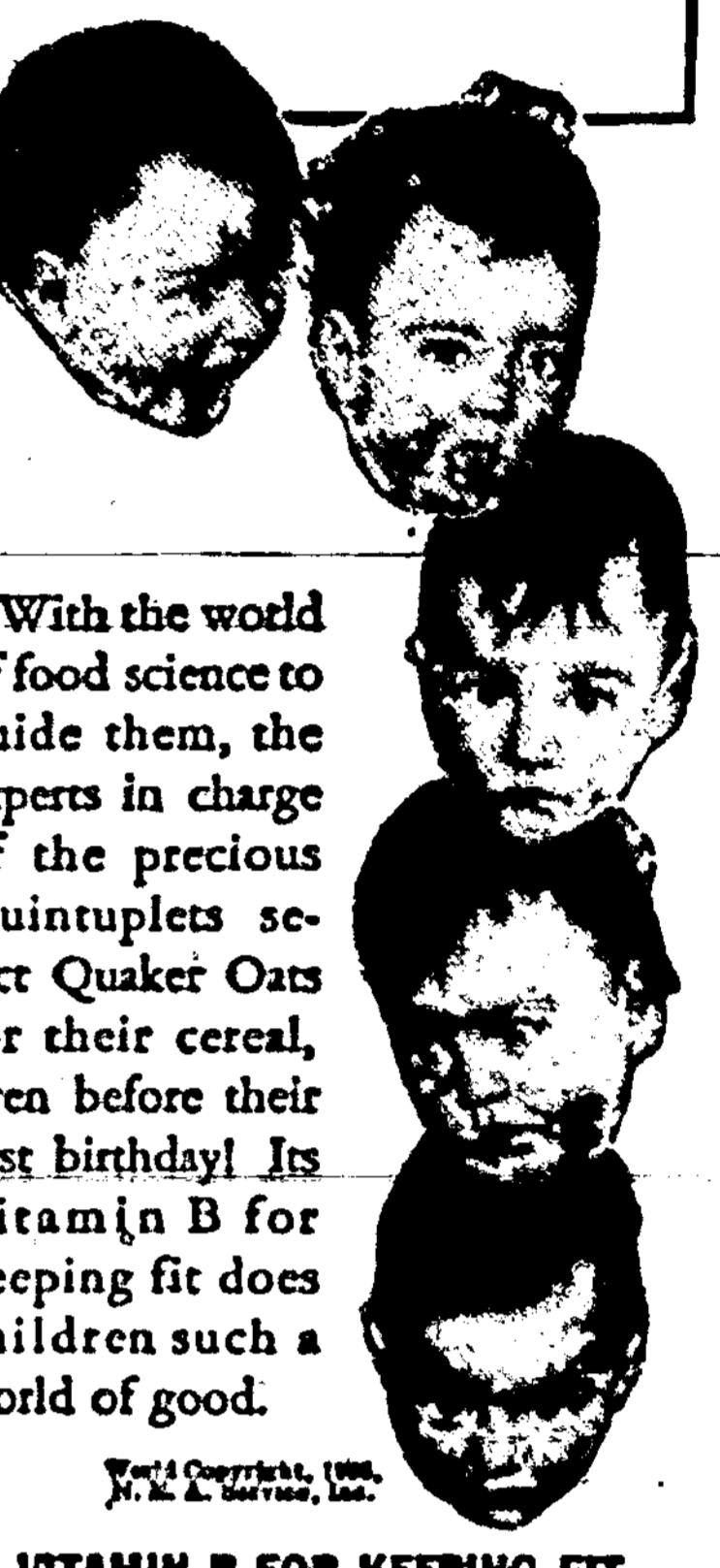
