EDITORIAL COLUMN

"It Might Have Been"**

Happy indeed is the man or woman who can look back over their past lives with no pang of regret over what has happened, feeling no sense of reproach at what has past. But how many are able to do that, and would it not be the next best step to perfection if such there should be?

Long before the proverbial Maude Muller, who, on a summer's day, raked the meadows sweet with hay, men and women were haunted with the sad thought, as the venerable Judge in the same poem—and the lovely Maude, the saddest of all, was that something in their past lives that could have been easily remedied, had they known what sorrow and suffering certain acts brought to them.

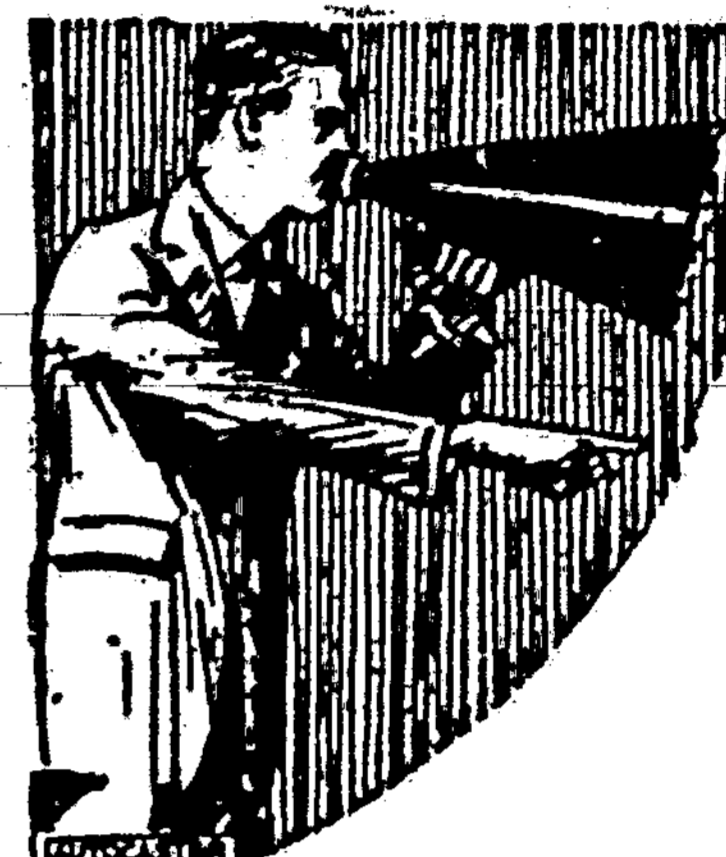

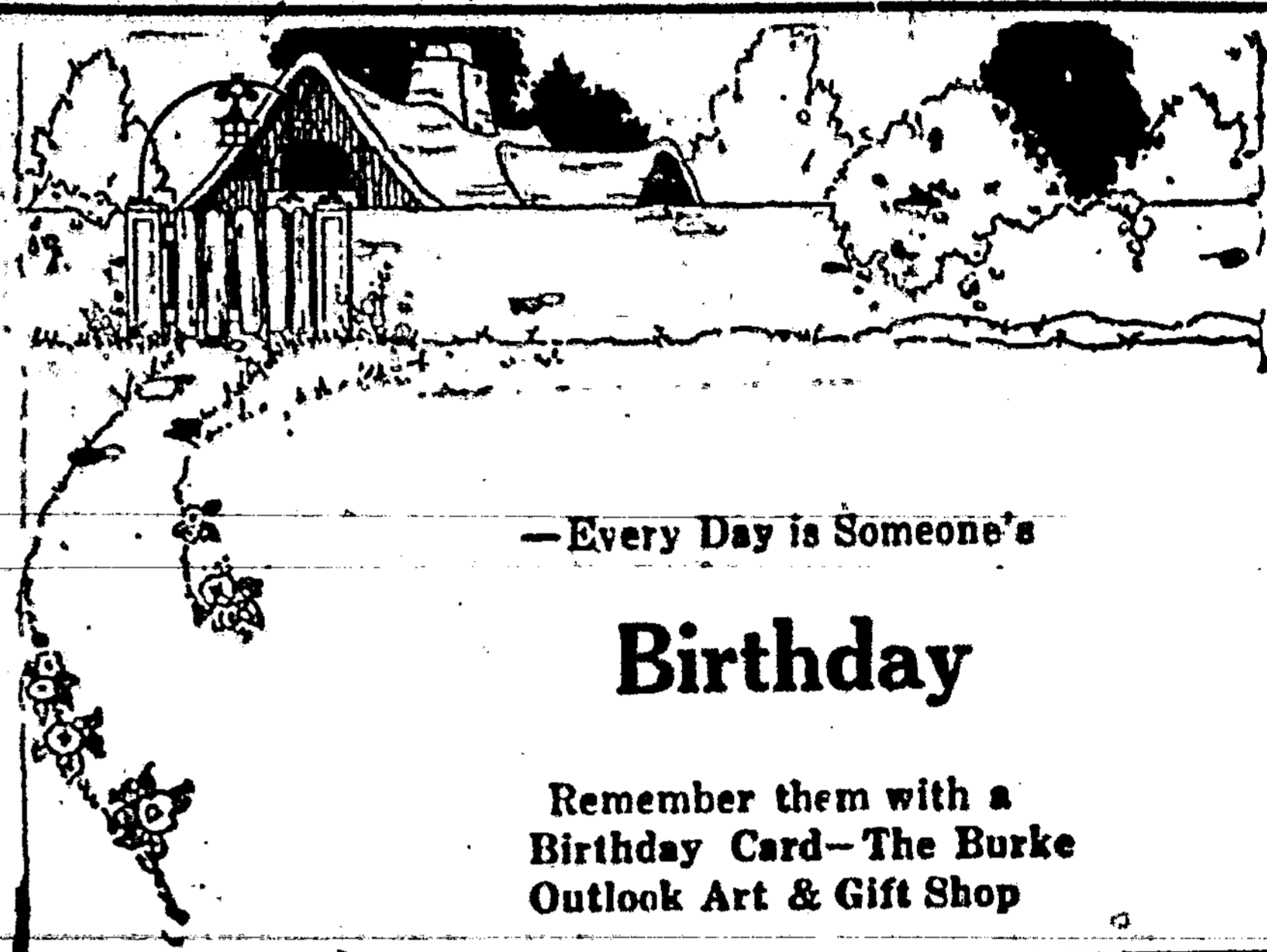

Adios—from the Land of Romance, Sunshine and Turquoise Sky.

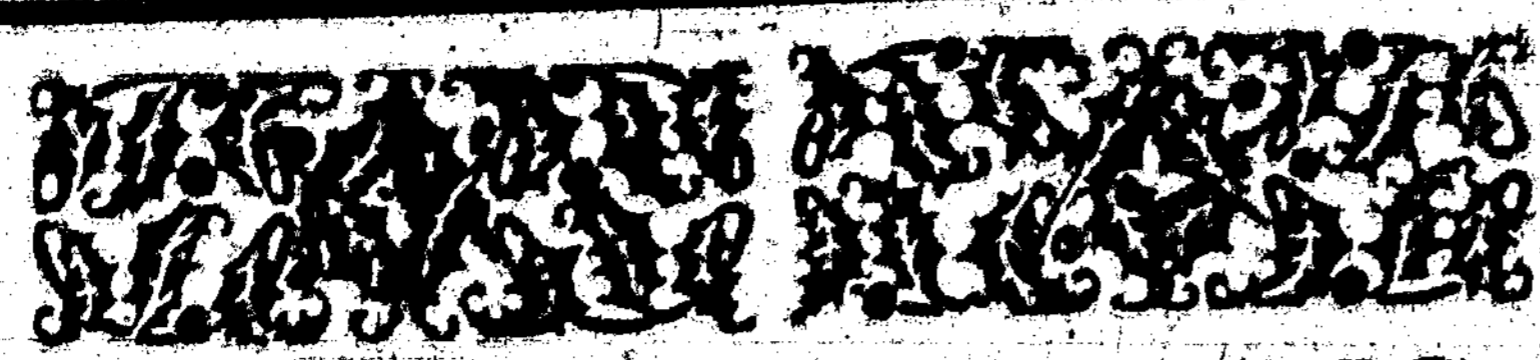
