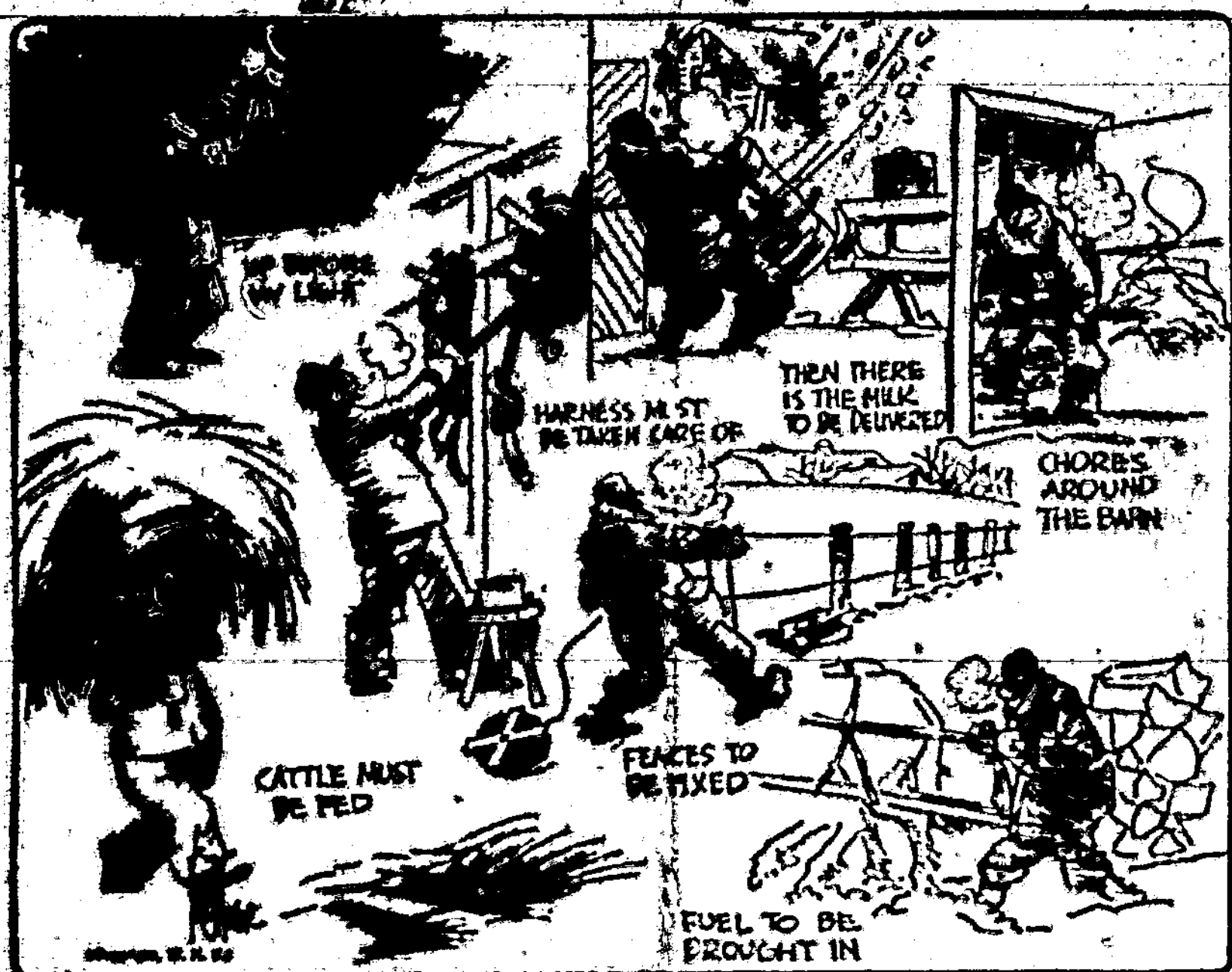

EDITORIAL COLUMN

Don't Trust the Powers to Anyone but 'Me' says Roosevelt

In one of his recent radio speeches, President Roosevelt warned an over-generous Congress against entrusting the power which had been conferred upon him into any other hands. Could there be any more convincing indication of the unusual tragedy of these acts?

When Legislative power in wholesale quantities is constitutionally delegated or transferred to the executive head of the administration in making the rules and regulations affecting the welfare of the people as a whole, when he has the power to juggle millions on top of billions, single-handed. Flirting with the high taxation and misery which will affect not only this, but future generations—is it not cause for alarm? Is not Democracy faced with a supreme test?

We are flinging these questions to the people; they are deserving of sober thought and careful study. Before we are aware of it, the creeping serpents of Communism and Fascism will be upon us. Admitting that Congress was working in violation of the Constitution, the President's voice is heard from the innermost chamber, warning the nation that it is standing on the verge of a dark abyss, into which, unless something is done, such a combination of patronage of the proverbial pork-barrel variety will inevitably spell disaster to this country. Let the people of the United States meet the challenge of the twin evils above mentioned in the 1936 election.

Business Finds New Deal foe

Competition With Private Enterprise Holds Up Employment.

Numerous statements made by business and financial leaders of the country have called attention recently to the fact that the government is competing with private enterprises on a large scale. It is the opinion of some of these commentators that this competition is responsible in large measure for continued widespread unemployment.

Orrin G. Wood, president of the Investment Bankers Association of America, speaking of progress made toward recovery in 1935, said:

"Yet certain governmental policies, ended, would prove a great stimulus to business and employment. One is the cessation of government competition in the field of business enterprise. Such competition can never be on a fair basis and must necessarily impair business confidence if increased and continued."

The Amazing FSCC.

One of the most amazing of the organizations created by the New Deal is the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation. It is one of five corporations formed in Delaware, financed by government money but operated privately. The corporation was intended to handle surplus agricultural products. What will become of it in view of the Supreme court's annihilation of the AAA is questionable.

The corporation is empowered to engage in extensive banking operations. It is authorized to purchase and sell all sorts of agricultural commodities, and to engage in any activities in connection with production, shipping, storing, exporting, warehousing, handling, preparing, manufacturing, processing and marketing of both agricultural and other commodities and products thereof. This Socialistic-federal concern need make no reports to Congress.

The Home Owners Loan Corporation has indicated that its lending activities will be ended by April 1. It will then have loaned \$3,000,000,000 on which it has acquired an interest in 1,000,000 homes. The corporation is now engaged in collecting interest and principal payments from citizen debtors. Payments are running about 90 per cent, indicating that Uncle Sam will soon find himself, deep in the occupation of managing real estate.

FCA Threatens Bank Loans.

The Farm Credit Administration is speeding up, threatening to leave little for the private bankers in the field of loans to farmers. The Reconstruction Finance Corporation is turning to railroad loans. PWA loans to municipalities have slowed up under court attacks.

The Work-Relief program, now at its peak, has aroused the ire of business in various areas because of its interference with hours, wages and other conditions of private enterprise.

President's Philosopher on Centralized Power

President Roosevelt in his speech to congress on January 3 quoted from "the words of a wise philosopher at whose feet I sat many, many years ago." The President did not name the philosopher but the latter's identity was later revealed. He was the late Josiah Royce of Harvard university. The words quoted by Mr. Roosevelt were from Professor Royce's book entitled "The Philosophy of Loyalty."

In a passage not quoted by the President the author said: "The present tendency to the centralization of power in our national government seems to me, then, a distinct danger. It is a substitution of power for loyalty."

Deficit Gets New Name; It's a "Farley Surplus"

Washington correspondents have coined a new phrase out of the effort of Postmaster General Farley to make his latest annual budget show a surplus, whereas a strict analysis shows a deficit. The same criticism of Mr. Farley's bookkeeping was made in 1934 when he claimed a surplus of \$12,161,415. It was pointed out at that time that his department actually had a deficit of \$32,003,235.62 in that year. With these two incidents in mind newspaper writers have adopted the method of calling any sort of a red ink condition a "Farley surplus."

225,000 Employees Are on "Emergency" Rolls

Both President Roosevelt and Postmaster General Farley in recent speeches have indicated their belief that the depression has passed the emergency stage. In view of that position advocates of economy are asking that more than 225,000 so-called "emergency" employees of the executive branch of the government be dismissed.

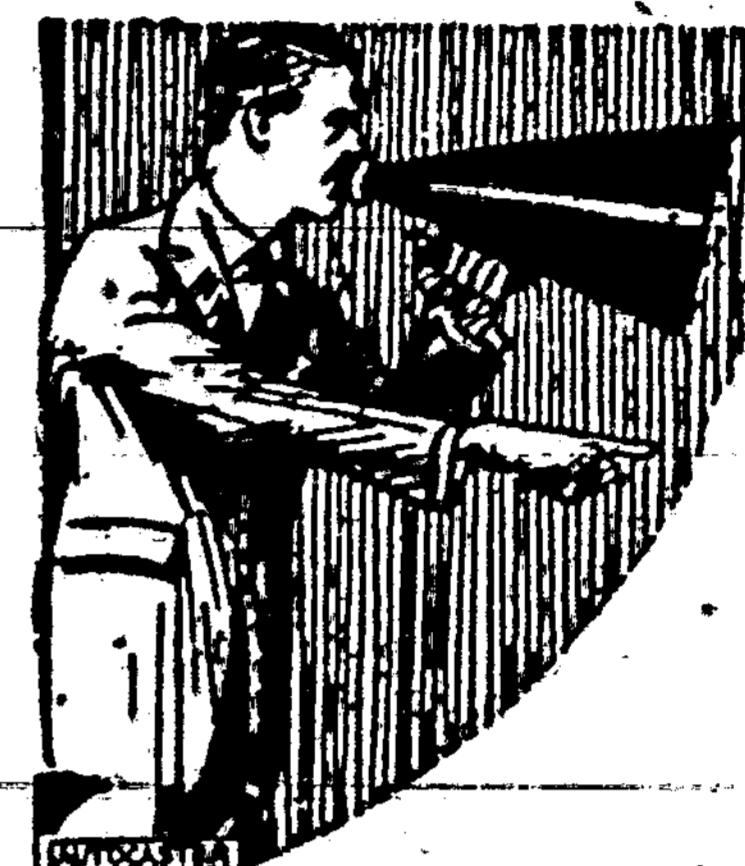

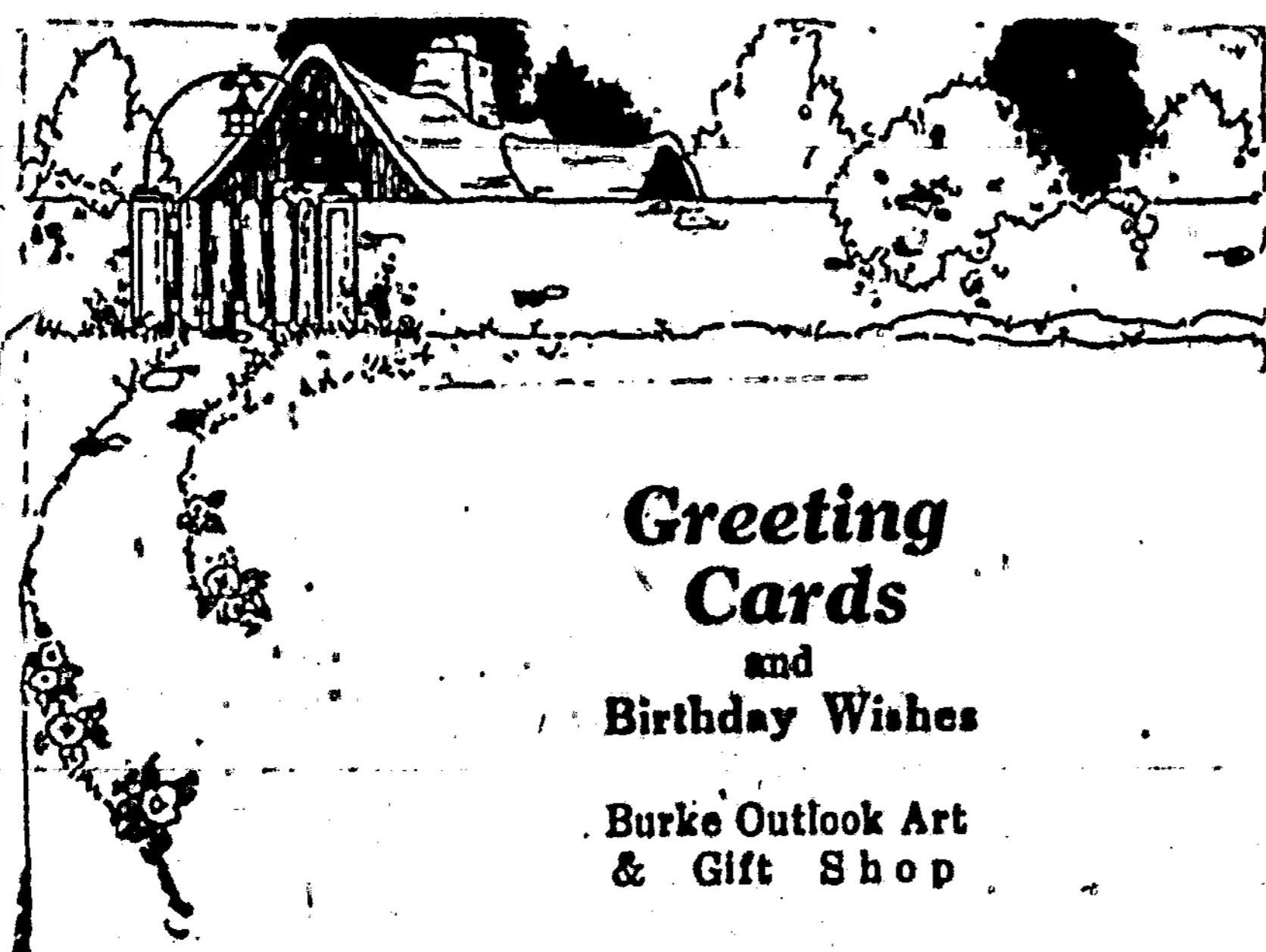

**Where the Taxes
Come From**

"Taxes are paid in the sweat of every man who labors."
Congress, as this is written, is beginning to remember that profound truth—and to realize that the public remembers it, too.

Therein lies a headache—not only for Congress but for all other officers of government, whether national, state or local, who have spent the people's money at such amazing speed during recent years.

The trouble is that in proportion to public expenditures, there are fewer earnings for the tax-collectors to levy on than there were, let's say, a decade ago.

Recently published figures have brought this fact dramatically to the taxpayer's attention. They show, for example, that whereas in 1929, taxes took one-eighth of the national income (which means the earnings of all the people), by 1933, they took one-sixth, and by 1934 more than one-fifth.

Or put it another way: In 1929, the average American labored one day out of every eight to pay the costs of national, state and local government; in 1933 he labored one day out of every six for the same purpose, and in 1934, one day (and a few hours over) out of every five.

Yet even that didn't meet the whole need. If government last year had paid all its bills in cash, nearly one-third of all the money earned by the American people would have been required to balance the account. Instead, government borrowed, which means that the bill must be paid out of future earnings of the workers or their children—will in the sweat of the man who labors.
