**EDITORIAL COLUMN**

**Mistake Number Ten Thousand & Seventy**

Together with the many other mistakes the present administration has made, comes the cunningly-planned railway merger, which would have thrown numberless men out of employment, but after putting on the strong-glass of politics on the arrangement, the Braintrust decided to abandon the idea. Why? Because of the fact that it would be a loss of votes for the present administration, judging from the howl that was set up more especially by the Trainmen of the different railroads.

Mergers, no matter where or how they are schemed out, always work disaster to someone. In that case, the merger would have meant the discharge of workers in all branches.

The combine as described by the tender-hearted promoters, would have, as they said, compensated those thrown out of employment, but the compensation would have been the crumbs that fell from the masters' tables—in other words, a mere pittance, and thereby adding to the already long list of the unemployed.

Mergers in all lines, principally in life insurance companies, have proven that policyholders have suffered severely by that act. It is plain thievery and nothing short of it.

After every merger, the policyholders are notified that the face value of their policies must suffer a reduction; and if the holder is beyond where he can no longer get insurance, he must either suffer the loss or lose his policy.

So, after a glance over the proposed project, and seeing what it might cost them politically, it was decided to give up the scheme until after the fall election. They added "Allow the railroads to work out their own salvation." In abandoning the project, the Brain Trust claimed that railroad competition is so keen that there must be some way of reducing operating expenses—and of course, the merger, with making one man do the work of two, the railroads would arise to a paying basis.

The staying of the scheme has one bad feature—there won't be any job for Co-Ordinator Eastman after June 18—and he must take his nose out of the feed bag.

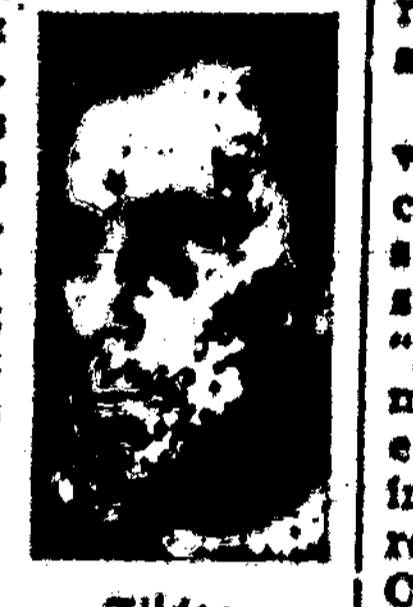

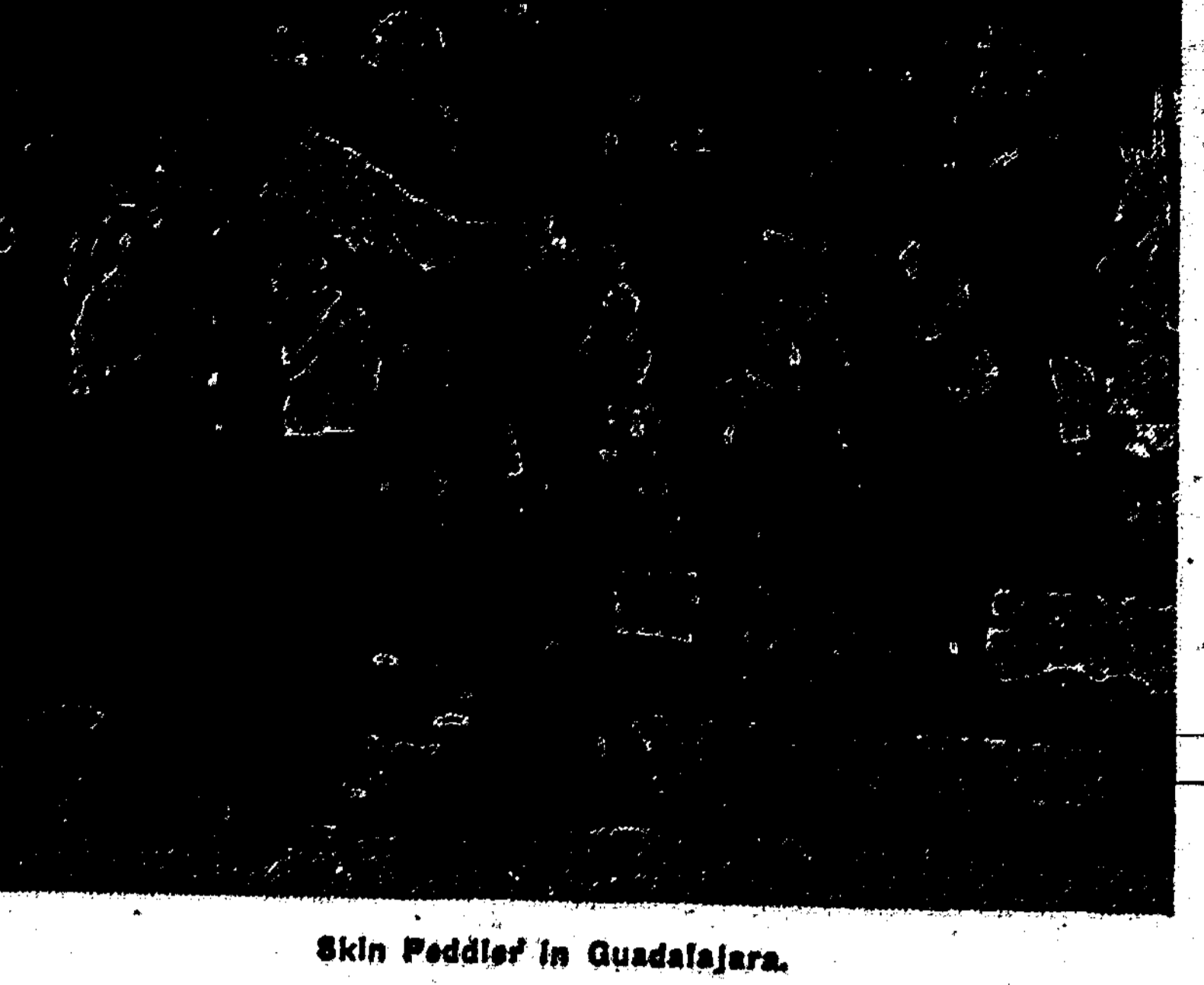

IN GUADALAJARA

Prepared by the National Geographic Society, Washington, D. C.—WNU Service. GUADALAJARA, venerable city of Mexico's west is one of Mexico's tourist mecca. Sleepers run from Los Angeles through Guadalajara. Rails also link the city with the sea at Manzanillo...

DR. JAMES W. BARTON Talks About

Lunch for Office Workers A YOUNG man whom I had examined regularly during his student days at the university met me in a restaurant one day and I noticed that he was extremely overweight. He said he couldn't explain his overweight. I told him that he had likely stopped all exercise, and simply ate all he desired...

I asked him what he was doing in the restaurant at the noon-hour, and he hunched his shoulders and said that he just ate a couple of chocolate eclairs and drank a couple of glasses of milk each day at lunch time; really no lunch. Just think what two chocolate eclairs and two glasses of milk amount to in heat units or calories as they are called. The milk would be about 150 calories, per glass, or 300 in all. A chocolate éclair would have a couple of tablespoonfuls of whipped cream and each tablespoonful equals 100 calories. Thus with the chocolate on the outside, the dough or cake part, and the whipped cream inside there would be about 500 calories in the two eclairs. That is 800 calories which was not even a lunch for this overweight man. The total number of calories needed by this man was about 2,400 a day.

Now what should the average office worker—man or woman—eat for lunch of the food available at the various restaurants or cafeterias? It is taken for granted that these office workers have to use their brains during the afternoon, and too much food would make them sleepy for an hour or more after lunch's "big" meal should therefore not be eaten.

Weakness at 4 P. M. However, as office workers they have likely taken a light breakfast and are hungry by the time the usual lunch hour—12:30 to 1:30—arrives. If they don't eat a fair lunch, then at four o'clock in the afternoon they feel weak. Some take a cup of tea, a banana, an orange, or a chocolate bar to carry them along till the evening meal, but the majority get along without any food between lunch and the evening meal.

This means that many are weak and tired when they eat the evening meal and digestion is poor or slow. Others eat such a big meal that they are "sunk" for the evening and sit around and go to bed. Now if a fair-sized breakfast is eaten a light lunch is quite in order, but if only a roll or slice of bread and tea or coffee is taken, a good lunch is necessary to maintain strength, prevent the "all gone" feeling about 4 p. m., and have the proper appetite for, and active digestion of, the evening meal.

It would be wise therefore if a sandwich containing meat or egg were eaten at noon, as this protein form of food is readily digested, burns itself and other foods up rapidly to give heat and energy, and is nature's greatest builder or repairer of worn tissues. In addition to the meat or egg sandwich, raw fruit were eaten one day and raw vegetable together with milk, water, tea or coffee, the next day. It would be the ideal lunch for the average office worker who is neither too fat nor too thin.

Diet for Underweight What about lunch for the underweight office worker? In addition to the meat or egg sandwich, the underweight office worker should have a vegetable salad daily with mayonnaise dressing, a slice of bread and butter, and a glass of milk, cocoa, tea or coffee. In fact these underweights might do well to take a glass of milk or a banana or piece of candy at 4 p. m. also.

As the overweight office worker always has a good appetite, a "filling" lunch, poor in calories or heat units, should be taken. In addition to the meat or egg sandwich (the meat or egg might be taken in another form of course) there should be some "clear" soup and a large helping of green vegetables such as lettuce, cabbage, asparagus, radishes, celery, using vinegar instead of an oil or rich dressing. A little fruit might finish the repast. The large helping of green vegetables gives a "satisfied" feeling and is of course very low in heat units.

Removing Thyroid Gland When the thyroid gland in the neck manufactures so much juice that it makes the heart beat too rapidly all the time, surgeons now remove this gland entirely so as to slow down the heart rate and save the patient's life. While not considered as dangerous an operation as it was a few years ago, it nevertheless has the dangers which attend any operation: injury to important nerves in the throat, infection, bleeding, and suffocation.

**PHOSPHORUS AND CALCIUM NEEDED**

**Both Elements Frequently Found in Same Foods.**

By EDITH M. BARBER  
**T**ODAY the question of phosphorus is before us. Fortunately calcium and phosphorus are often found in the same foods. For the formation of bone and teeth one is as necessary as the other. Every cell in the body contains phosphorus, and even after growth is completed we must keep on supplying enough to replace what is used daily. Nerve tissue also demands phosphorus, and, with calcium, it has an important role to play in regulating the acid-alkaline content of the blood. Milk and milk products, eggs, whole cereals, such vegetables as lentils and dried beans, are the most important sources of this mineral, which is so necessary to the maintenance of life. A number of other vegetables and fruits, however, supply us with worthwhile amounts, but should not be depended upon entirely for this supply. It has been found that many American families in which milk is not used liberally are not getting an adequate amount of this mineral, which is needed in an infinitesimal amount by weight. In order, however, to get an adequate supply, milk and eggs, whole cereals, vegetables and fruits are necessary.

You see that it is practically possible to check your diet for calcium and phosphorus at the same time.

**Baked Mashed Carrots.**  
 3 cups mashed, cooked carrots  
 2 beaten eggs  
 1 tablespoon butter  
 1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
 Salt and pepper to taste.  
 Mix the ingredients well together, turn into individual buttered molds and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit) for 15 to 20 minutes.

**Milk Toast.**  
 6 slices bread, toasted  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 2 cups milk  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 Pepper  
 Butter toast and arrange in soup plates. Heat milk, season, and pour over buttered toast. Serve at once.

**Crab Salad.**  
 2 cups shredded crabmeat (cooked or canned)  
 1 cup diced celery or cucumber  
 1/2 cup mayonnaise  
 Lettuce  
 2 tomatoes  
 Mix the crabmeat and celery or cucumber with the mayonnaise. Line a salad bowl with lettuce and in this put the salad. Skin the tomatoes, cut in eighths, and use as garnish. Preparation time, ten minutes.

**Baked Eggs.**  
 Break eggs into buttered or gratin dishes. Cover with white sauce, to each cup of which has been added one-fourth cup grated cheese, paprika,

 Boil the sweet potatoes. When tender drain, peel and press through a ricer. Beat the yolks and whites of the eggs separately. To the sweet potato add the yolks, butter, milk and salt. Beat well. Then fold in the well-beaten whites. Pile the mixture lightly into a greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 35 minutes, or until light and fluffy and brown on the top.

**Unusual Colors.**

**Household Questions**

When serving a steak smothered in onions, squeeze the juice of a lemon over it before serving and you will find the flavor greatly improved.

If the bottoms of legs of furniture are waxed they will not scratch polished floors when moved around on them.

If liquid in which olives are bottled is thrown away when bottle is opened, olives may be kept indefinitely if olive oil is poured over them after they are put back into bottle.

A paste made of scouring powder moistened with ammonia will remove unightly stains on brass trays. Apply paste, remove when dry, then polish tray.

To remove a fresh grease spot on a rug, cover the spot with blotting paper, then press with a hot iron. Cover the spot with magnesia, let it remain for 24 hours, then brush off.

If you rinse a plate with cold water before breaking eggs on it, add to them a pinch of salt and then stand where there is a current of air, you will have no difficulty in beating them to a froth.

Salt should never be added to stews, soups and boiled meats until after they are cooked. If put in at first it toughens the fibers of the meat and takes out the juices.

Keep a small pair of scissors in the drawer with your knives. Scissors will trim the edges of pie crust much more quickly and more neatly than a knife. Also they are very convenient for preparing bread sandwiches.

Never serve food in a dish that is too large for amount of food served. It detracts from the appearance of your table.

**T**HE words footstool and foot rest, are comprehensive, and now when these articles are being featured in comfortable furnishings, it is interesting to note some of the various types. They range from the smallest sizes, which may be merely floor cushions to those so large and high that they can serve as low seats without backs, as instances in ottomans.

Ottomans assume pompous proportions when they have a center circular post, upholstered, around which a circular seat extends which is also upholstered. Such ottomans are chiefly found in hotels and such public places as they afford the maximum seating capacity for the minimum space. It is adaptable for foot rest or seat, and deserves to be popular, as it does double duty and is an aristocrat in furnishings.

**Cricket.**  
 There is a wide difference between the choice styles of ottomans to the humble cricket, which is the most insignificant of footstools. But this does not interfere with its comfort-giving

quality. By the way this word cricket is not affiliated in its derivation with the cricket which sings on the hearth or adds its melodious chirping to autumn evenings. The cricket which is a home furnishing may be a low four-legged footstool, or it may be shaped like a miniature bench. The two names cricket and footstool would seem to be synonymous but the footstool is more comprehensive than the cricket.

A hassock is another sort of footstool deriving its name from a grass which grows in large tufts. Its original footstool form was as a grass mat or kneeling cushion, and the name hassock still remains as the right one for kneeling-benches or cushions, furnishing pads. In homes the hassock is a carpet or textile covered cushion filled with hair, excelsior, or other soft materials so closely packed that the shape of the hassock remains unimpaird by use.

**New Notion.**  
 Recently a varnish product has been placed on the market which is applied to furniture by the simple expedient of wiping it on with a cloth. It dries rapidly with a very high gloss and is much more durable and permanent than any type of furniture polish. It can be used over any finish where varnish proves satisfactory.

**The End of the Philly-Loo.**  
**I**T IS a well-known fact that the philly-loo bird is extinct but accounts of the death of the last survivor vary. Larry Flint, a Pennsylvania newspaper man says he saw the tragedy while visiting in Wyoming.

"The philly-loo was ferociously fond of the holes in doughnuts. His method of eating them was unique; he backed up to them, slipped his tail through them, then flicked the appendage around in front and fed himself."

"An old-timer out there, knowing of this peculiarity, sought out the last surviving philly-loo and laid several doughnut holes down in front of the bird. In order to eat the hole, the philly-loo had to move his tail around into the proper juxtaposition. This brought about his end."

But F. F. Fuller of the Rhame (N. D.) Review has another version of the story. He says that he and another editor had the job of hunting down the last survivors of the race to serve at a banquet for some visiting newspaper men. Near a mountain in the Bad Lands they flushed a covey of the birds and started chasing them.

"The philly-loos began circling the mountains," relates Mr. Fuller. "As they did so each bird grabbed the tail of the bird ahead and as they mounted upward and the circle narrowed, they swallowed to take up the slack. They kept circling and swallowing until each bird had completely swallowed the bird ahead, and they entirely disappeared from before our eyes. All that is left are a few tracks circling the mountain that look just like those made by an automobile driven by a one-armed driver. I've never seen a philly-loo bird since that time."

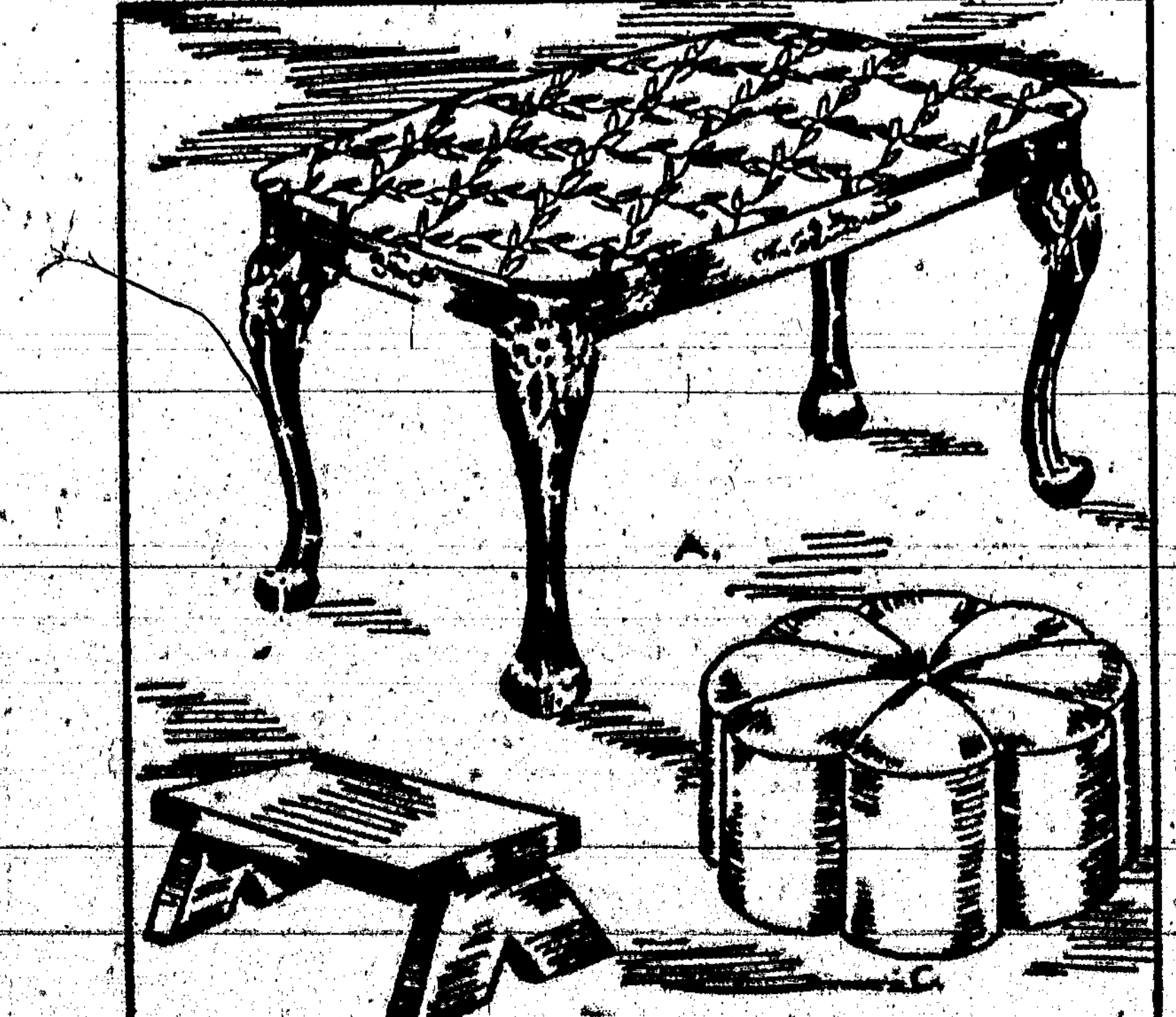

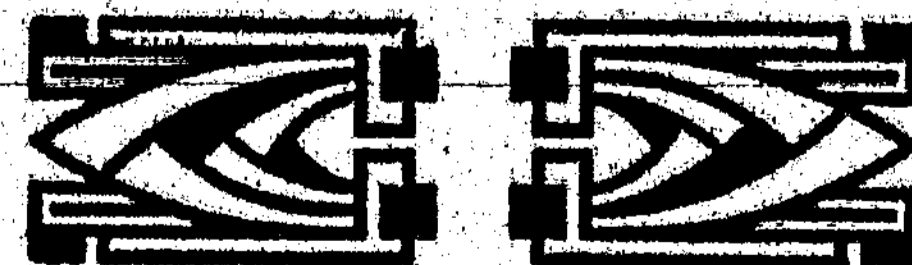
