Calf Crop Good in Lincoln National Forest

Capitan, N. M.—The calf crop this year on the Lincoln Division of the Lincoln National Forest will average about eighty per cent. The general run is between seventy and ninety per cent with a few reporting as high as one hundred and a few dropping to sixty per cent.

Cattlemen report that the range cattle in the forest this year are looking better than they have for several springs. The range is in fairly good condition, but needs additional moisture at this time to promote the growth of the late summer, fall and winter feed. The rainfall has been good in comparison to recent years, but July rains have been below normal so far.

Dr. Townsend Attacks 'Haphazard' New Deal

Cleveland, Ohio.—"Either profound ignorance or a deliberate attempt to wreck the American principle of government is evinced by all the haphazard, ill-conceived legislation by this administration," Dr. Francis E. Townsend declared before his organization here.

"Thirty-six billions of national debt is the record of these blundering, bungling mistakes," said Doctor Townsend. "Every act of government has been predicated upon the heedless advice of the President when he said, 'Try something; if it works, try it some more; if it does not work, try something else.'"

"If this is not the advice of a total incompetent or a reckless fatalist who is incapable of thoughtful planning on a national scale, what is it?" Doctor Townsend asked. Doctor Townsend defended the American form of government, particularly with respect to the Supreme Court: "We are all determined that the insidious and poisonous propaganda against our established form of government must end," he said.
