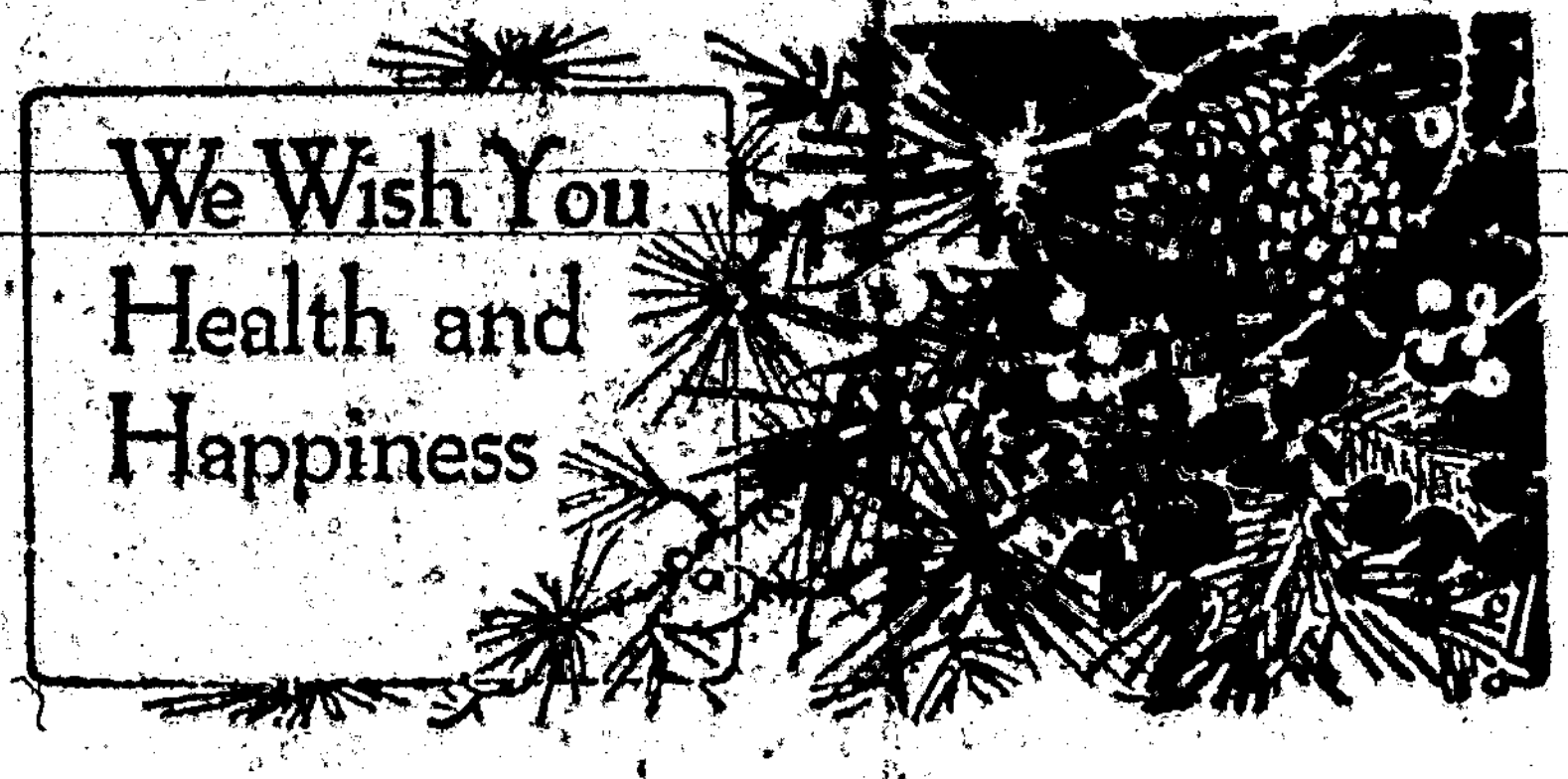

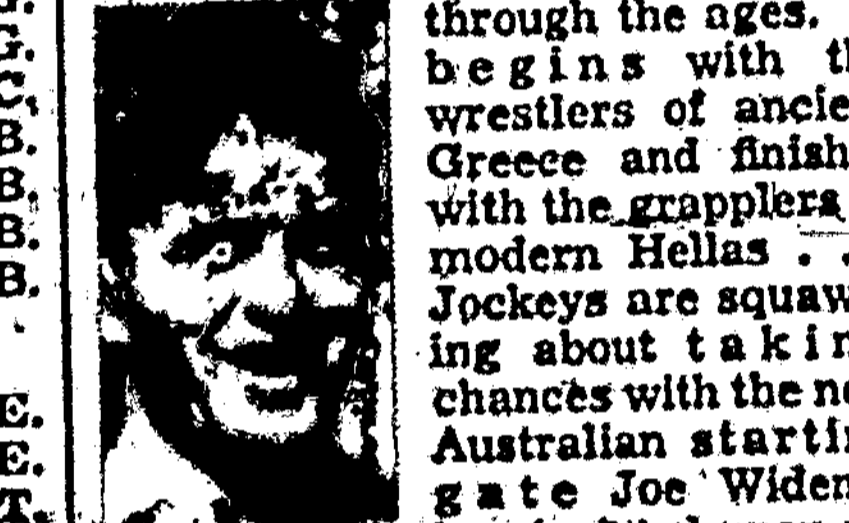

Easier to Care for Small Herd

Fewer Cows Can Be Managed According to Individual Requirements.

By E. J. Perry, Extension Dairyman, New Jersey College of Agriculture, Wall Services.

One reason why small herds average higher in production than larger herds is that each cow in a small herd can be more easily fed and managed according to her special requirements.

In a recent survey of the New Jersey Herd Improvement associations it was found that cows in a herd of nine averaged 8,445 pounds of milk a year and the average cost of food per pound of butterfat produced was 36.2 cents.

In view of the prevailing high prices of grain and hay, it would pay every dairyman this winter to regard each of his cows as a distinct machine and treat her accordingly.

Feeding all cows the same amount of grain mixture results in seriously underfeeding the high producers, while the low-producing cows reduce the net returns from the herd by being overfed.

Because of the different fat tests of their milk, separate breeds of cows require different amounts of grain, and feeding grain to the animals according to the following scale is recommended:

Holsteins: Feed 4 pound of concentrates for each pound of milk above a yield of 16 pounds daily.

Ayrshires and Brown Swisses: Feed .45 pound of concentrates for each pound of milk above a yield of 14 pounds daily.

Guernseys: Feed .55 pound of concentrates for each pound of milk above a yield of 12 pounds daily.

Jerseys: Feed .6 pound of concentrates for each pound of milk above a yield of 10 pounds.

Memory's Lane

Few there are of people living at ordinary ages in our country who can recall anything except the writing of 'Bill Nye' by which name he was known, but as a matter of fact, his real name was Edgar-William Nye.

Much like Eugene Field, Bill's greatness as a humorist did not develop until rather late in his lifetime. During his career as a printer, he operated many small country newspapers and job shops, the last being the Montana City Boomerang, where he first gained fame as a humorist.

The paper was printed in rooms above a livery stable. There was a crude stairway leading from the street to the editorial room, and over the door hung the following inscription—'Twist the tail of the gray mule and take the elevator.'

In politics, Bill was a Republican, but he had a kindly feeling for President Cleveland, to whom he wrote at one time expressing his esteem for that honorable personage. Bill finished his letter like this: 'I would very much like to visit Washington and it would give me a great deal of pleasure to call on you, but I could not have the heart to partake of a man's hospitality, eat-up his winter apples and use up his smoking tobacco, when I didn't even vote for him; politically speaking, I never have made it a practice to enter the camp of the enemy for favors of preference.' It is said that the letter so pleased the President that he sent Bill a check attached to a complimentary letter.

In after years, he wrote 'The Comic History of the United States,' which was one of the most comical books ever printed. In that book, he humorously pictured the history of this country from its discovery down to the date when the book went to press.

Bill's cartoonist was F. Oppen, the well-known artist, who was also in a class to himself. To read that book would dispel all the gloom and was enough to create a 'jolly good fellow' out of a chronic pessimist. In speaking of Hudson discovering the Hudson river, Bill said he also discovered a tribe of Indians of whom Hudson found were total abstainers, and threatened to scalp him for offering whiskey to them. Bill said that prohibitionists said Hudson's story was something wonderful—but Bill was ready to swear that Hudson falsified.

Afraid of the future.

That's why they are willing to turn to forms of government which offer to relieve them of that responsibility. That's why they are eager to scarp their own identities for unsupported promises of security offered by Fascism or Communism or the various other leas which new fear Europe.

To the average American worker, proud of a national heritage of courage and self-reliance, this surrender to transient fears may seem a strange and remote thing. But the prophets of defeatism, both at home and abroad, are not convinced of the American attitude. Hopefully they continue to seek converts here.

Their way should be a hard one. The American tradition remains one of freedom and achievement.

The American people are not afraid of liberty, or they could never have written a Declaration of Independence and a Bill of Rights. They are not distrustful of their capacities, or they could never have conquered a continent, or they could never have produced a Fulton or an Edison. They do not dread the future, or they couldn't continue the bold and ambitious plans for national progress so typical of the American spirit today.

Europe and its allies may continue to chant their swan songs of despair. But of America we still say with the poet:

"I do not know beneath what sky Nor on what seas shall be thy fate; I only know it shall be high. I only know it shall be great."

In such an outlook there is no room for fear.

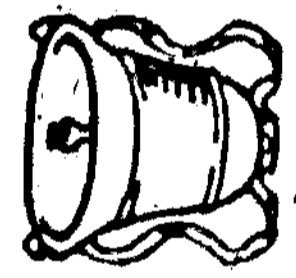
