EDITORIAL COLUMN

Picks Out Scarecrow to Aid Dictatorship

The latest crazy stunt to favor the dictatorship of the President of the United States has made its appearance. It comes in the shape of a political scare-crow in the form of one Wm. E. Dodd who claims that a certain billionaire is preparing to assume the dictatorship of this nation — and nothing short of the approval of the President's packing the Supreme Court plan will prevent that condition.

During the reign of the New Deal administration, we have witnessed many nutty political projects pulled by the New Dealers, but this one is the "cutest" of them all.

In making his attack on the Supreme Court, and proposing forcing those over 70 to resign so that he might pack the Court with rubber stamps who would be "yes yes men" to everything he does — he, like Belshazzar of old, sees the handwriting on the wall, which reads that the people are against him. 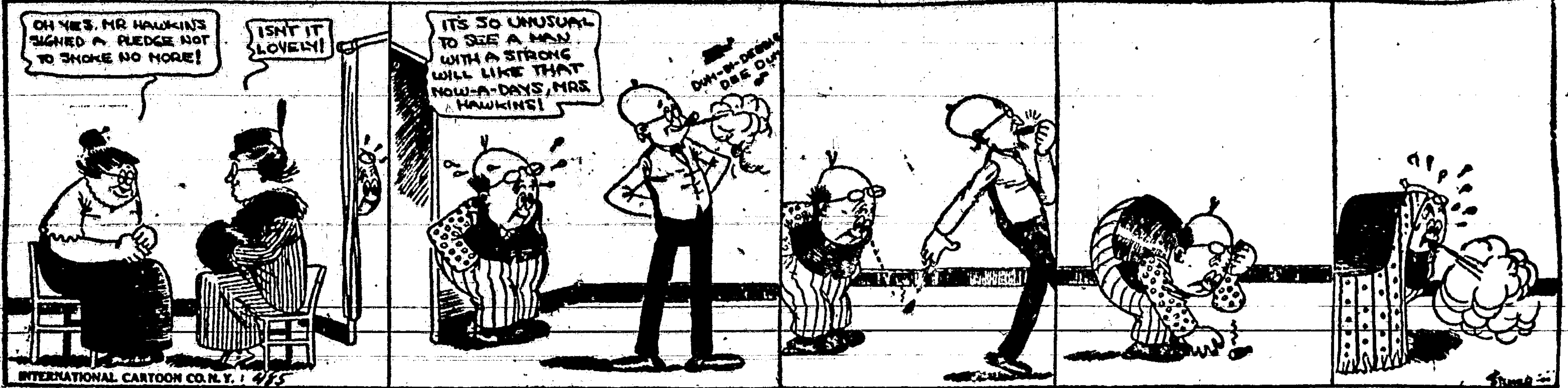

As to the Amendments

Petitions of all kinds are continually being circulated, first one thing and then for another. People have become so accustomed to being confronted by petitions that many sign them without questioning the importance of the contents. Ofttimes, they sign petitions to get rid of those circulating them, therefore, it has become an easy task to get such matter signed—but in the case of the Amendments it will not be as easy, if they are read.

As the condition now exists, we have no law for the absentee voter and one of the amendments is for the expressed purpose of providing a law that will insure the absentee voter with the right to cast his vote in a legitimate manner no matter where he might be at the time of the election.

Another is for the bond issue of \$1,250,000 with which to erect and maintain needed educational and other state institutions of importance. That vast sum of money will provide the state's share of what will be required for those valuable projects.

It will mean spending of millions in the state for those new constructions and the employment of hundreds of workmen.

The opponents of the amendments say that the people should have over a year to study out the contents, when if the more intelligent will withhold their signatures from the petitions issued by the opposition to the amendments, they can plainly see that to allow the September election to proceed, it will be to the best interests of the people in general.

The people should have the right to decide on whether the amendments should pass or not pass—and all the people should have that right, not just 25 per cent. The use of the referendum permits a minority of 25 per cent to speak for all of us. That's hardly the purpose of the referendums.

The Constitutional way and the right way is to permit everybody to vote, and to vote at the time set—September 21.

To make certain of your right to vote on the amendments at the time set and thus make available the absentee ballot, funds for matching Federal funds, and to exercise your privilege of voting on the term of office-amendments, do this:—
Read them carefully before you sign.

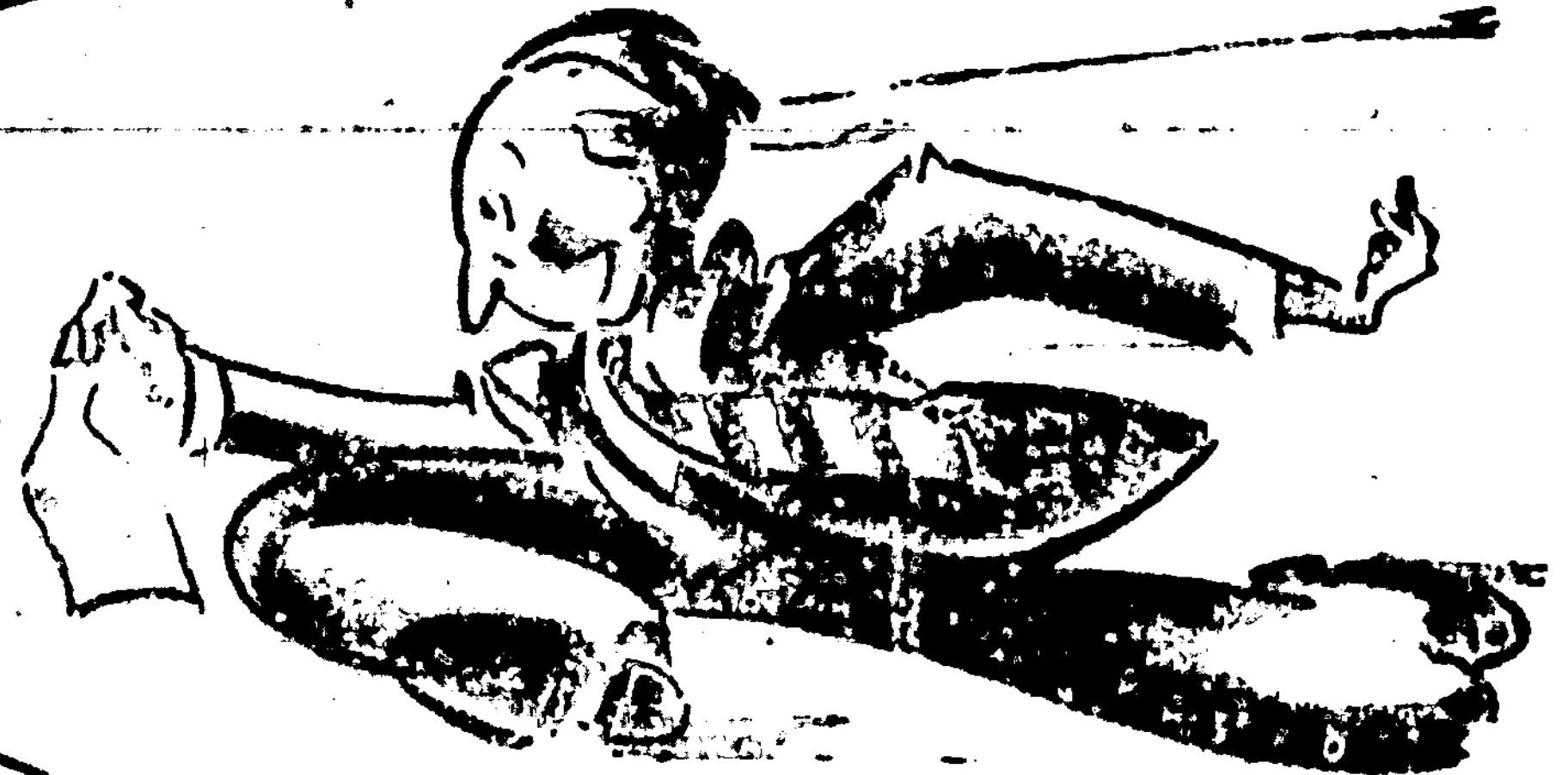

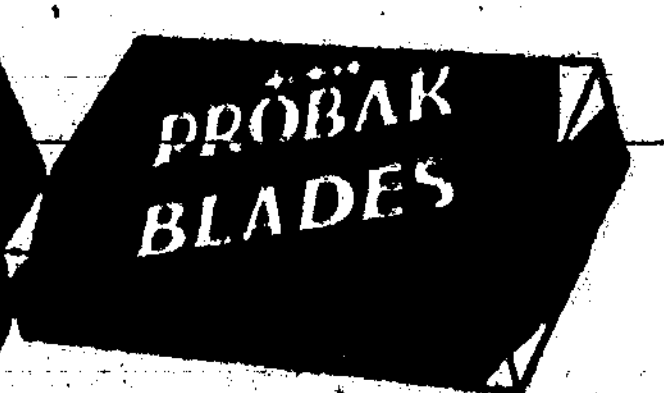

IN ROUMANIA

IN ROUMANIA, East and West are so interwoven it is difficult to see where one leaves off and the other begins.

Perhaps the countless invasions which have swept her land may partly account for this strange blending of Orient and Occident.

Each invader, whether he be Roman, Hun, Pole, or Turk, has left his strong imprint on the nature of the people.

Though Paris may be France, Bucharest is hardly Roumania. This capital has almost nothing in common with the country.

Its streets are crowded with smartly dressed women, officers resplendent in their colorful uniforms and gold braid, and men and women of the foreign colonies...

The opening, in the autumn, of parliament by the king is a brilliant event. For several blocks and for hours, the palace guards in their bright blue uniforms, high patent leather jack boots, shining helmets with white horsehair plumes, stand smartly at attention...

The great moments are the arrival and departure of the king, in an open landau. Footmen in satin breeches, long coats of brocade, and three-cornered hats, and a ferocious coachman cracking his whip at six milk-white or coal-black stallions, on whose backs ride postillions in bright red hunting costumes, add to the striking medieval picture.

You find it fun in winter to hire an open sleigh drawn by horses bedecked with bells and red ribbons, and driven by a coachman in a high fur caucula (caschoula), a tall astrakhan cap, long velvet coat, and wide girdle of metal.

The wide avenue leading up to the Arc de Triomphe, past a pretty little race course and the golf links of the Country club is a miniature suggestion of the Champs Elysees in the French capital.

The National theater is well patronized and plays by Roumanian and foreign authors are given. Once ornate, the building is now shabby, although an air of faded elegance still pervades the place.

The Roumanian Orthodox church stand on the summit of the only hill in Bucharest.

Bucharest is a city of churches. From everywhere can be seen rising the rounded domes of the Roumanian Orthodox church.

There is much music other than in the cafes. Bucharest boasts of rather good opera during the winter and a really fine symphony frequently plays modern music.

The delta country covers a tremendous area spreading between the three-branches-of-the-Danube. Most important of Danube channels is the Sulina, which carries most of the river traffic coming down from far-off Germany, Austria, Hungary, Yugoslavia, and Czechoslovakia.

The European Commission of the Danube, which assures free navigation of the river, struggles constantly to keep the silt, washed down from half of Europe, from clogging up this artery to the Black sea.

On the Danube's banks are two important ports, Galati and Braila, which receive vessels of ocean draft. Principal exports are wheat, barley, corn, lumber, and some oil.

The bird life of the delta is wonderful beyond description. Many rare and beautiful birds are here for the looking. Hire at fifty cents for the day, a black, flat-bottom row-boat, and slip silently through the reeds and narrow channels of the delta.

Suddenly you surprise perhaps 200 pelicans, which, webfooted and gossamer, make their get-away quickly. You may happen on a flock of wild swans sailing about in quiet dignity.

Among the rarer varieties of duck is a snow-white bird with an emerald-green head and bill. Egrets, flamingos, cormorants, wild geese, many kinds of ducks, herons, and cranes are listed among the commoner varieties of bird life.

Constants, Roumania's most important port, still bears traces of the Turkish occupation of Dobruja province, which is reflected in its shabby mosque and the red ferruz of many of its boatmen.

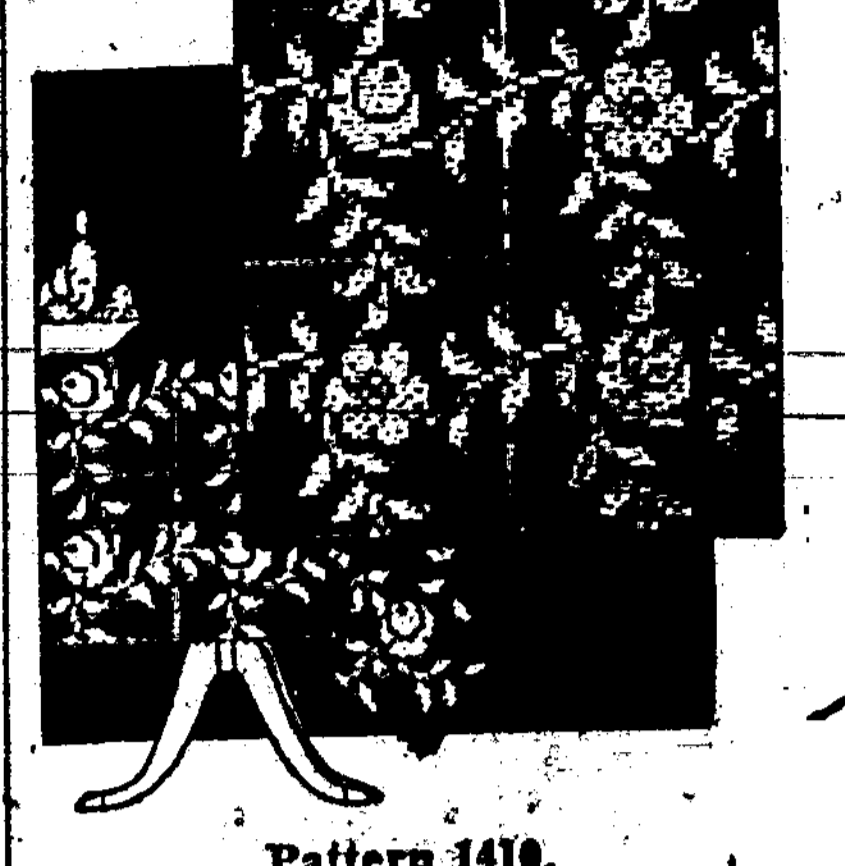

Keeping Up With Science By Science Service

War of Antibodies and Antigens Told by Immunologist

Defensive Mechanism of the Body is Complex

Chicago.—A glimpse into the ultra-world of molecules where the antigens of invading disease germs are fought by antibodies...

The defensive mechanism of the body is a complex of invisible physical and chemical forces and Dr. Hooker, reviewing current researches in a difficult field, gave his fellow medical scientists a picture of the important antibody or germ fighter.

This protein molecule, called antibody globulin, is different from other globulin molecules. It has, probably at the surface of each molecule, specific combining groups.

Patterns of Binding Points. Antigen molecules have many combining groups, not necessarily of the same kind.

One kind of combining-group, it is assumed, must contain at least three properly adapted points which differ from those of another kind of combining group in atomic nature, spacing and sign and strength of electric charge.

Master-Key Antibody Molecules. A single kind of antigen combining group, if sufficiently complex, may call forth somewhat different kinds of antibody.

"The same antiserum," Dr. Hooker said, "may contain grades of more imperfect and dissociable antibodies extending to the poorest kind whose pattern is so incomplete as to have the least affinity permissive of any recognizable association with antigen."

The more of these high-grade antibodies in an antiserum, the more effective will be the serum in protecting against disease.

"The same antiserum," Dr. Hooker said, "may contain grades of more imperfect and dissociable antibodies extending to the poorest kind whose pattern is so incomplete as to have the least affinity permissive of any recognizable association with antigen."

Combating Disease and Decay With Rays of the Sun

Toronto.—The day when man will fight and conquer micro-organisms of disease and decay with the sun's rays or their laboratory-made equivalent seems to be drawing near.

Such rays harnessed in a lamp which has an extremely thin in-drawn window or glass bubble are already being used, Mr. Dennington said, by physicians to destroy the germs of skin infections.

At the opposite extreme of medical use are the eight sterilizing lamps installed over the operating table at Duke university hospital to sterilize air during surgical operations and thus prevent wound infections.

Agriculture May Have Had Beginning in Old Stone Age

Theory Set Forth by Menghin of Vienna

By DR. FRANK THONE DID agriculture have its earliest beginnings in the Old Stone Age?

Prof. Oswald Menghin of the University of Vienna thinks it possible. If he is correct in his conjecture, farming becomes a vastly older way of life than has usually been supposed.

There is no doubt, of course, that agriculture was widespread and well developed in the New Stone Age, whose beginnings were something like 20,000 years ago.

The common-assumption has gone beyond this, and credited the Neolithic peoples with the actual invention of agriculture. To the Paleolithic, or Old Stone Age, peoples is assigned merely the role of hunter, fisher, and grubber-up of wild-growing roots.

Prof. Menghin points out that in the Old Stone Age, which almost certainly runs back 200,000 years and possibly much more, the distribution of one particular type of stone blade, well adapted for turning the soil, coincides with the general distribution-zone of plants with thick, edible roots and tubers.

This kind of blade is usually called a "hand-ax," but it was adapted to other uses than chopping wood. It could also be held in both hands as kind of a crude hoe or trowel, and so serve well as a grubbing tool.

Conjectures on the Neolithic origin of agriculture usually picture men of the New Stone Age as gathering wild grains and other food plants, and then discovering accidentally that they could be sown. Professor Menghin carries the same mode of reasoning back to his Old Stone Age root-grubbers.

Heating Quality of Coal Determined by Refraction Index

New York.—A new experimental method by which scientists can look at a piece of coal and tell how much heat it will generate was announced at the meeting of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers here.

But don't rush down to your own coal pile and hope to tell whether the present delivery is better than the last one. The new method is relatively simple; but not that simple.

Two midwestern geologists, L. C. McCabe of the Illinois geological survey, and Prof. T. T. Quirk of the University of Illinois, described the secrets of coal analysis in their technical paper, "Angle of Polarization as an Index of Coal Rank."

Shown By Refraction. Tiny cubes of coal are polished and brightly illuminated with a small lamp. The light reflected from the polished surface becomes polarized and is studied with Nicol prisms to determine the angle of polarization.

By a fundamental rule of optics known as Brewster's law, the angle of polarization of the reflected light can be related to what scientists call the index of refraction. This last is the degree of bending which a material will cause as light passes through it.

Final and significant step in the research was the discovery that the amount of heat in B. T. U. (British Thermal Units) which a unit amount of coal can produce is related by a simple straight-line relationship with its index of refraction as measured in the apparatus.

Using the wide range of different kinds of coal found in Illinois from woody lignite to soft bituminous and so on to harder bituminous, it was found that as the heating qualities of the coals increased, so, too, did their index of refraction.

Iceland Floods Caused by Underground Fires

London.—Floods in most places are caused by water from the skies. Floods in Iceland—very destructive ones, too—have been caused by fires under the earth.

Investigations by Dr. Niels Nielsen, Copenhagen geologist, show that two recent destructive floods in Iceland were caused by the eruptions of volcanic vents opening under thick glaciers. The heat melted the ice rapidly and in such vast quantity that the total water volume of the larger of the two floods is estimated by the geologist at over a billion cubic yards.

COME to think of it, there is only about one fabric that men can't take away from us—taffeta! They can put our satin into dressing gowns, our silks into shirts, but we defy them to find any masculine use for taffeta.

Taffeta is a smooth fabric with a firm weave and quite a bit of body. The lustre of the material is often increased by dipping the goods in an acid bath and then pressing it. Often it is considerably "loaded." When taffeta is too heavily loaded

SAVING TIME IN KITCHEN CHORES

Efficient Cooking Equipment Important Factor.

By EDITH M. BARBER

THE efficient housekeeper is always on the lookout for kitchen equipment which will help her cut down the time of preparation of meals. If she can afford an electric mixer, she will find in it a first aid for many purposes. Suitable types of cooking utensils are not only time saving but also an insurance that results will be good.

Another new utensil is a stain-proof aluminum mixing bowl which has a small handle at the side which may be grasped while mixtures are stirred or beaten. Other conveniences which are not so new but which are novel are the racks for pans and plates which fit in covered shelves, the cover racks which can be fastened to the wall or closet door and the transparent flat-topped covers for piles of your best plates and for your mixer.

Slice pineapple in one-eighth inch slices. Sprinkle with sugar and chill in refrigerator until ready to serve. Pour one tablespoon of sherry over each serving and garnish with sprigs of mint.

Fried Liver. Pour boiling water over one-half inch slices of calves' liver. Drain at once and remove skin and veins. Dip in seasoned flour and saute slowly on both sides in bacon fat or butter. The whole time of cooking should not be more than five minutes, as over-cooking will toughen the fibers.

Savory Canape. 1/4 cup butter, 2 tablespoons capers, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 teaspoon onion juice, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 12 strips toast, 12 hard-cooked egg slices, 2 ounces caviar.

Chutney Canape. 1 package cream cheese, 1 teaspoon onion juice, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 12 rounds Boston brown bread, 6 ripe olives, 3 tablespoons chutney.

Corn Pudding. 2 cupfuls chopped canned corn, 3 eggs, slightly beaten, 2 tablespoonfuls melted butter, 3 cupfuls of scalded milk, 1 teaspoonful salt, pepper.

Milk-Vegetable Soup. 2 cups diced cooked vegetables, 2 tablespoonfuls butter, 1 small onion, 1 quart milk, Salt, Pepper.

Golden Tapioca Cream. 3 tablespoons granulated tapioca, 3 cups milk, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 3 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Molba Toast. Cut bread in thin slices and arrange on a baking sheet. Bake in a slow oven, 300 degrees Fahrenheit, until light brown. The slices will curl slightly during the baking. Serve unbuttered for lunch or dinner.
