Funeral services were held at the home Sunday afternoon with Rev. J. L. Lawson conducting the same. Mrs. Spratt, sister of Dr. Turner, sang two selections, "Lead Kindly Light" and "In the Garden." Saturnino Chavez, Jr., gave a violin solo, "The End of a Perfect Day." Rev. Lawson reviewed the life of the deceased, setting forth her many acts of charity and the excellent service which she gave to our community at large. The floral emblems were many, bewitchingly beautiful and were silent tributes of the love and esteem in which the deceased was held. The pallbearers were, Messrs. Albert Ziegler, R. E. Lemon, L. A. Whitaker, Saturnino Chavez, Sr., John Littleton, Sabino Vidaurri, F. A. English and Lloyd Taylor. 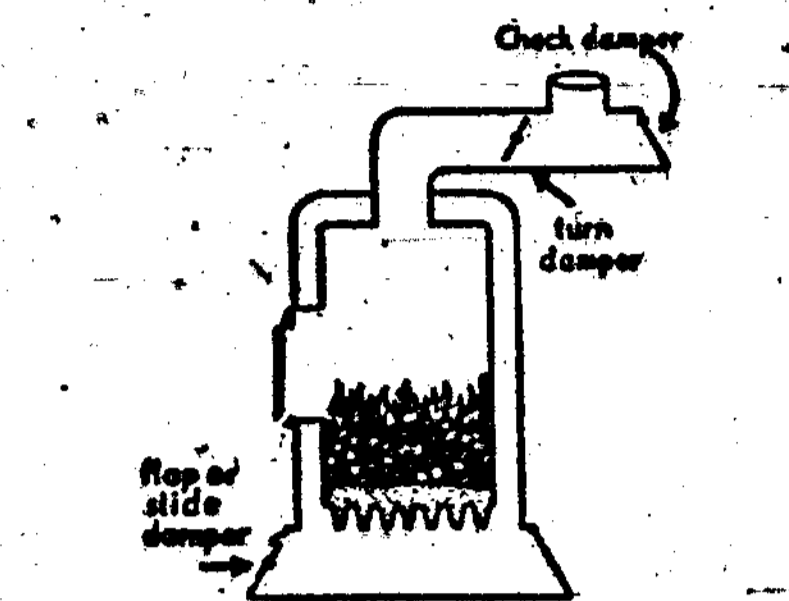

Keeping Up With Science

Wood Products Are Assigned New Jobs in the Industries

By WATSON DAVIS. New York.—Wood is just plain lumber, a building material, to most people.

Utilization of wood has many ramifications in modern industry today. But the editors of Chemical and Metallurgical Engineering in a survey discover that wood and its products will have many more uses in industry's tomorrow.

Gas From Wood Waste. In Europe wood-working plants make gas from wood waste for power purposes and automobiles are fueled by wood-producer gas.

Germany makes sugar—actual, sweet stuff—and alcohol from wood by two different processes.

Then it is possible to squeeze ground sawdust and mill waste into hard dense products that are stronger than the wood that nature made.

Brain Wave Studies of Sleep Process

New York.—Different parts of the brain apparently go to sleep separately and to different degrees.

Of practical importance, they point out, is the fact that the patterns of early sleep in normal persons are strikingly like those seen in some mentally sick or otherwise abnormal persons.

This similarity suggests that many abnormal mental conditions may depend on general modifications of brain function which are fundamentally like those of normal sleep.

Big Trees Survived Because No High Winds Prevailed

Carmel, Calif.—Survival of "General Sherman," largest of the West Coast Big Trees in Sequoia National park and believed to be the oldest living thing, appears partially at least to be a result of long peace.

People in Love Not Nearly So Happy as They Should Be

New York.—In love, marriage, business and other close human relations, the social machinery functions with only 25 per cent efficiency.

Even men and women in love do not get along together as they should. The joys from human contacts are only about a third as great as they might be.

"Business tries to be 100 per cent perfect in its impersonal activities, but accepts a 25 per cent standard in its methods of handling human beings."

The backwardness of business in this respect is due largely to lack of understanding of the emotional satisfactions men get from their jobs.

The eternal triangle is seen in a new light as a nervous disease affecting not one individual but three in their relationships to each other through the new science of "Sociometry."

Infant Death Rate by Accident High

New York.—Two thousand infants less than a year-old are killed each year in accidents, a survey reported in the statistical bulletin of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company reveals.

Mechanical suffocation—suffocation in too-heavy bedclothes or in a too-soft pillow—is responsible for the deaths of nearly two-fifths of the babies who are killed accidentally, the report declares.

The high accidental death rate for infants has been overlooked in the past because of the higher mortality from disease, the report points out.

"Accidents to infants should be a matter of national concern," it is argued, "for every year more than 2,000 babies are killed in accidents of one kind or another—more than die in an average year from measles, scarlet fever and diphtheria combined."

FARM TOPICS

HORSES VALUABLE; GOOD CARE NEEDED

Life of Animals Should Be Much Longer

By Philip Henderson of the New York State College of Agriculture.—WNU Service. A horse is more valuable today, in terms of other commodities, than at any time in the past 20 years.

Each year farmers lose horses that proper care and management would save—horses with many useful years of work ahead.

Other reasons why farm horses die are: paralysis, heavy, lockjaw, heat, food poisoning, azararia, lightning, and pneumonia.

Seven Types of Heads Found Among the Hens

The seven types of heads of layers, according to a poultry specialist at the Missouri state college, are: First, rugged refined—capable of producing 250 to 300 eggs per year.

Second, refined head—capable of producing 200 to 250 eggs. This head is similar to the rugged refined type but is lacking in strength.

Paving Feedlots

Feedlots can be paved by the regular farm-help, E. T. Robbins, live stock extension specialist, College of Agriculture, University of Illinois, points out.

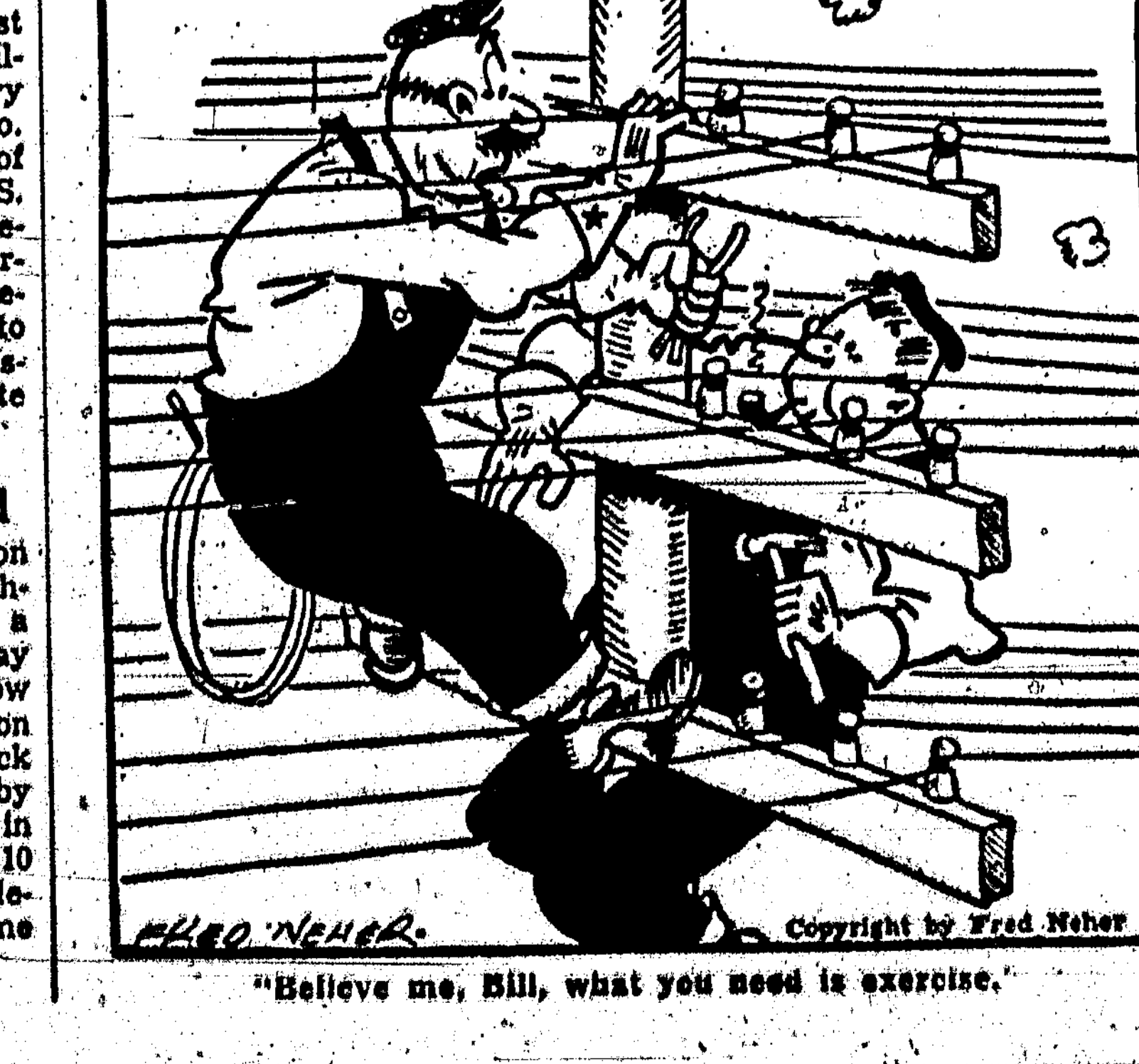
VEGETABLE fondue is a delicate entree and one which can be easily made and is bound to please the family.

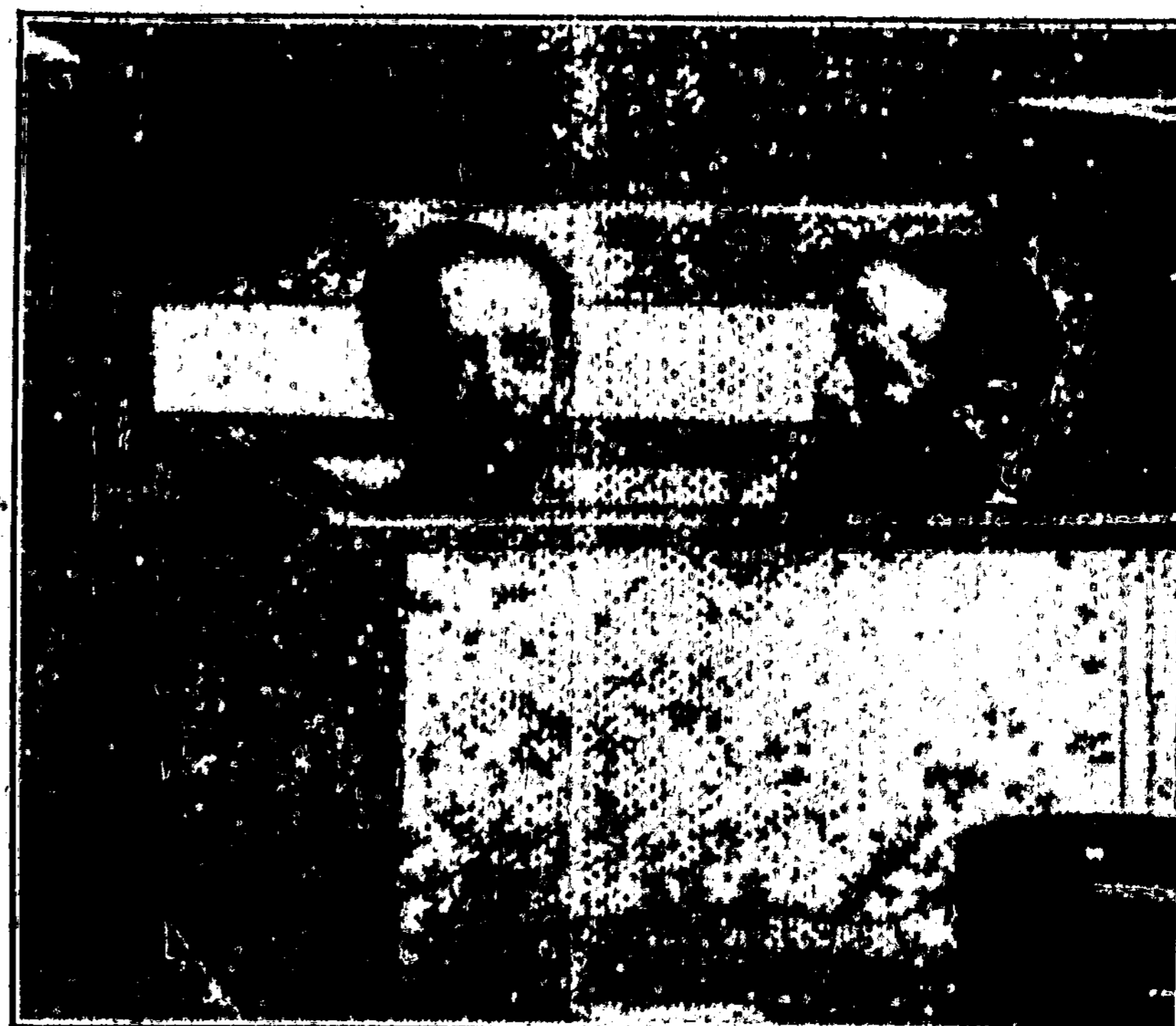

IF THE alumni chapter of ex-heavyweight champions of the world were assembled under one top, ten members would answer "Here" to the roll call.

Never before in history, probably, have there been so many living ex-heavyweight champions.

Can you name these fighters? Well, never mind, here they are: James J. Jeffries, Jack Johnson, Jess Willard, Jack Dempsey, Gene Tunney, Max Schmeling, Jack Sharkey, Primo Carnera, Max Baer and Jim Braddock.

Jeff Lives in Comfort

Jeffries, who won the championship by beating the great Bob Fitzsimmons at Coney Island in 1899, lives in modest circumstances out on the Pacific coast.

Jack Johnson, regarded by many as one of the greatest fighters of the lot, is just about getting by financially.

Jack Dempsey, who inaugurated the golden days of million-dollar purses, abetted by the late Tex Rickard and his manager, Jack Kearns, is keeping himself active and prosperous as the proprietor of a New York restaurant constantly patronized by sports celebrities and tourists.

When Tunney retired a crowd of second raters scrambled for the crown. One of them, Jack Sharkey, was unpredictable. At times he looked great. At other times he looked awful.

Primo Carnera, the clodhopper who was imported from Italy and given a first-class exploitation by experts, is the most pathetic case among all the ex-heavyweight champions.

Max Baer, who has been described as "the ex-champion who could fight but wouldn't," has been active in the ring within the last year.

The last member to join the ex-heavyweight champions society was Jim Braddock, who came back from the ranks of deck-walkers to grab the championship. He was almost forgotten when he met Baer.

Connie Mack Is 75

CONNIE MACK seems to go on forever in baseball. He celebrated his seventy-fifth birthday recently and announced that he is going to continue managing the Philadelphia Athletics until he has passed his eightieth birthday.

"Mr. Mack," as his players have always called him, is known outside of baseball as Cornellius McGillicuddy. He is the oldest big league manager in point of years—old enough to be the father of practically all the other managers in the American and National leagues.

Looking ahead and not backward as men do at seventy-five, Mack is anticipating a better year for his Athletics. And when he climbs aboard the train next spring for the training camp in Louisiana, he'll be starting his fifty-fifth year in baseball.

His contribution to baseball is represented by something far more significant than years of service. Like "Old Man" Stagg when he coached championship teams at Chicago's Midway, Mack has left his mark on the men who have worked under him.

The recent death of Jake Kilrain at the age of seventy-eight stirred almost forgotten memories among those who are ancient enough to have followed boxing in the bare-knuckled days.

During sixteen years in the ring Kilrain—his real name was Joseph Killien—faced 159 battles, but his bout with John L. Sullivan under a blazing July sun at Richburg, Miss., forty-nine years ago was easily the peak moment of his life.

The old boxer in an interview a year ago said: "I have outlived all the others and feel as frisky now as I ever did. I eat and smoke what I please and I sleep like a baby."

Medwick's Records

Joseph Michael "Ducky" Medwick of the St. Louis Cardinals who was recently installed as the most valuable player in the National league for the 1937 season, is revealed as the holder of seven other distinguished records.

Joe led the National league in hitting with an average of .374, the highest in either major league. He led the National league outfielders with defensive average of .983, the highest major league outfielding mark of the year.

He led the league in scoring runs with 111; in total hits with 237; in total bases with 406; in two-base hits with 56, and shared the lead in home runs with 31. Master Melvin Ott of the New York Giants tied King Joe with 31 homers for the season, but it must be noted that on June 6 at Philadelphia Medwick hit a home run that was tossed out of the records when the Phillies' conduct caused the game to be forfeited to the Cardinals.

By way of ornamenting his collection of crowns with smaller knock-knocks, the new emperor added these minor domains to his holdings: He played in the most games, 154; went to bat the most times, 632; hit four two-base hits in one game to tie a league record that 11 other men share, and he hit five home runs in three consecutive games in August to tie still another league mark.

That doesn't leave much for the rest of the league to divide as batting honors for 1937.

Arky Vaughan of Pittsburgh led the circuit with 17 three-base hits (Medwick hit only 10). Paul Waner with 178 made the most singles (Medwick hit just 140). Aogie Galan of the Cubs stole 23 bases for first place in thievery, seven more than his teammate, Stan Hack, who finished second.

National Topics Interpreted by William Bruckart

Washington.—His name will mean little to anyone except the rather wide circle of "Swarty's" friends and business associates who admire his courage and thrift.

Thus, I believe it is fair to conclude that these two cases illustrate beyond possible refutation how government has become topheavy, how its machinery has grown to a point almost beyond comprehension.

We are into a new session of congress this week, the regular session. The extra session that met November 15 amid a great deal of ballyhoo as to what it would accomplish has gone into history.

There was a reaction to the President's statement. Mr. Roosevelt very promptly said, in effect, "Well, boys, if we cut down spending we have to start somewhere. How about cutting off a couple of hundred millions from the federal contribution for road building?"

I made no mention in the above paragraph that he, like you and I, pays several hundred taxes that are not called taxes. He smokes cigarettes, for example, and the federal tax is six cents a pack.

I suppose there could be a slowing down in road building, but members of the house tell me there are hundreds of other places where spending could be reduced without harming a permanent national policy.

To get back to the hot potato, however, the President has told congress in effect to sort out the things it would kill and pass the legislation that would eliminate the spending and bring a balanced budget.

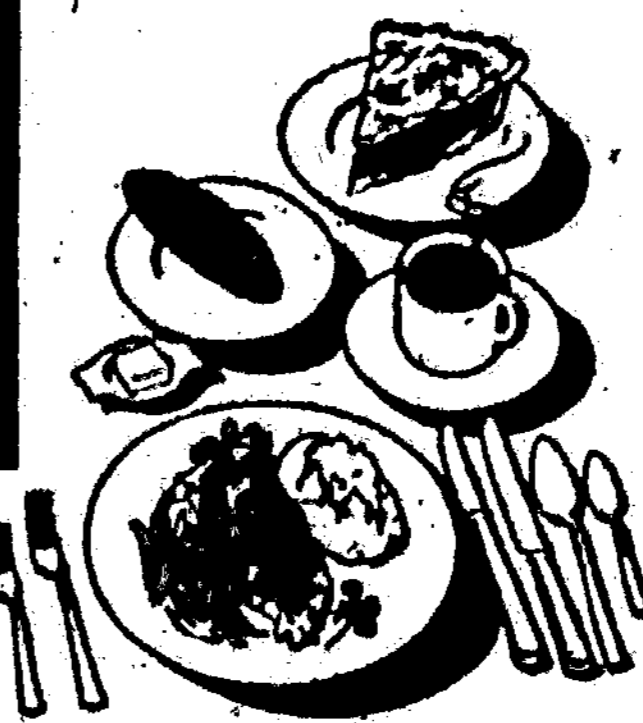
