30,000 Bowlers To Match Skill In A. B. C. Meet

YOUNG bowlers, old bowlers, fat bowlers, skinny bowlers, tall bowlers, runty bowlers, small town bowlers, big city bowlers—30,000 strong from continental United States, Canada and Hawaii—will roll balls down the alleys and pray for strikes and spares when the American Bowling Congress world's championship tournament opens at the Coliseum in Chicago on March 3rd.

From meriting till night for 47 consecutive days the legions of temple topplers will match skill on 40 specially constructed alleys in competition for the \$200,000 cash prize money. A bowler with a statistical mind has figured that the contestants will travel about six million miles getting from their homes to Chicago and back.

Braddock Retires

Jim Braddock's recent announcement of his retirement brings to a close a ring career that for ups and downs has few parallels in pugilistic history. The "Cinderella man" of boxing who had fought since 1926 explained that "in fair-

Braddock won the heavyweight championship from Max Baer in 1935, climaxing a comeback campaign that led from a job as a dock laborer in Jersey City after he had been definitely counted out of the prize-fight picture. He lost the championship to Joe Louis in June, 1937.

Linguistic Catcher

Moe Berg, veteran catcher of the Boston Red Sox, is probably the most highly educated player in the big leagues. He is an erudite student of languages and a successful practicing attorney. An undergraduate he made the Princeton university baseball team as a shortstop. When he left Princeton he had made up his mind to be a lawyer and decided on a baseball career to provide the money.

So he joined the Brooklyn club as an infielder in 1923. He went to Paris that winter and attended the University of Paris, extending his baby of studying Romance languages. That one year at the Sorbonne added to his Princeton studies enabled him to read Latin, Greek, French, Prussian, Spanish, Italian, and Portuguese, in addition to Hebrew and English.

Sharks Practice

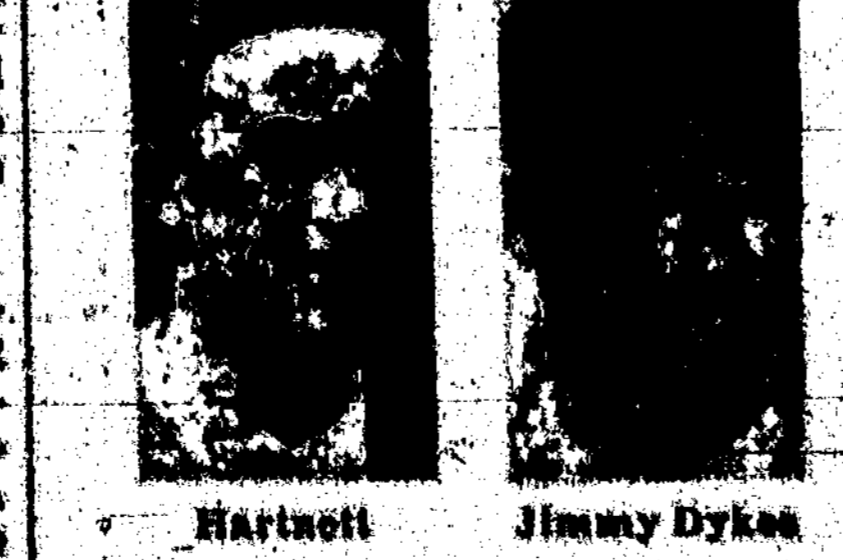
On thousands of home town alleys all over the United States local bowling sharks have been practicing for months in anticipation of the tournament. Doctors, lawyers, farmers, movie actors, big league baseball players, clerks, mechanics, school teachers, merchants, salesmen, and representatives of hundreds of other professions will be among the contestants.

Tournament officials estimate that 5,500 five-men teams will be entered this year. Last year when the tournament was held in New York 4,017 quintets bowled. Wherever you look on the map you will find big and small communities sending in teams. The little town of Land O' Lakes, Wis., with a population of only 112, but housing eight bowling alleys will send at least two five-men teams. Every big city will be represented.

One of the intriguing things about the ABC tournament is that everybody has a chance. Today's champions are yesterday's unknowns. Last year a young bowler nobody had ever heard of, Edward Gagliardi, of Mt. Vernon, N. Y., crashed through to a singles championship with a score of 749.

Jimmy Dykes will blast away at the pins on closing night. In between, Gabby Hartnett, Jimmy Archer, Everett Scott and others who won fame on the diamond will appear with some of the crack teams.

An American Point of View

Washington, in response to popular insistence, seems recently to be lending a more attentive ear to the problems of the smaller employers and other average producers.

It has heard many protests, varied in nature. But prominent among them has been the demand for freedom to continue their labor without undue harassment and impractical interference from officialdom—however paternal in theory.

This demand may have amused many politicians, but it didn't surprise the nation as a whole.

It was a typical American point of view, which office-holders who admire the European pattern seem to find difficult to understand. It was the point of view of our pioneer ancestors who carved America out of a wilderness, asking only the right to build their homes and their churches, to raise their families, and to perform their labor, without the intrusion of appointed bureaucrats and destructive tax burdens.

In America, the spirit of self-reliance expressed in that point of view still persists. It is our great national heritage. It should be preserved.

But it cannot be preserved by constant attacks on initiative and enterprise; by proud posturing to the doubtful economic experiments of a frightened Europe; by treachery that the politicians, rather than the people themselves, know best how to conduct the people's business.

It was the people, and not the politicians, who built America.

It is the people, and not the politicians, who know the work to be done, and are eager to continue it.

That is the principle on which our nation was founded, and on which it grew to greatness. It is the principle that Jefferson preached. It is the principle that the average man is trying to impress on Washington.

And when Washington listens to him, and returns pleasure to that fundamental principle, the gates which bar the pathway to recovery will be opened, and America can continue the progress which the strength, the energy and the intelligence of her people assure.

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

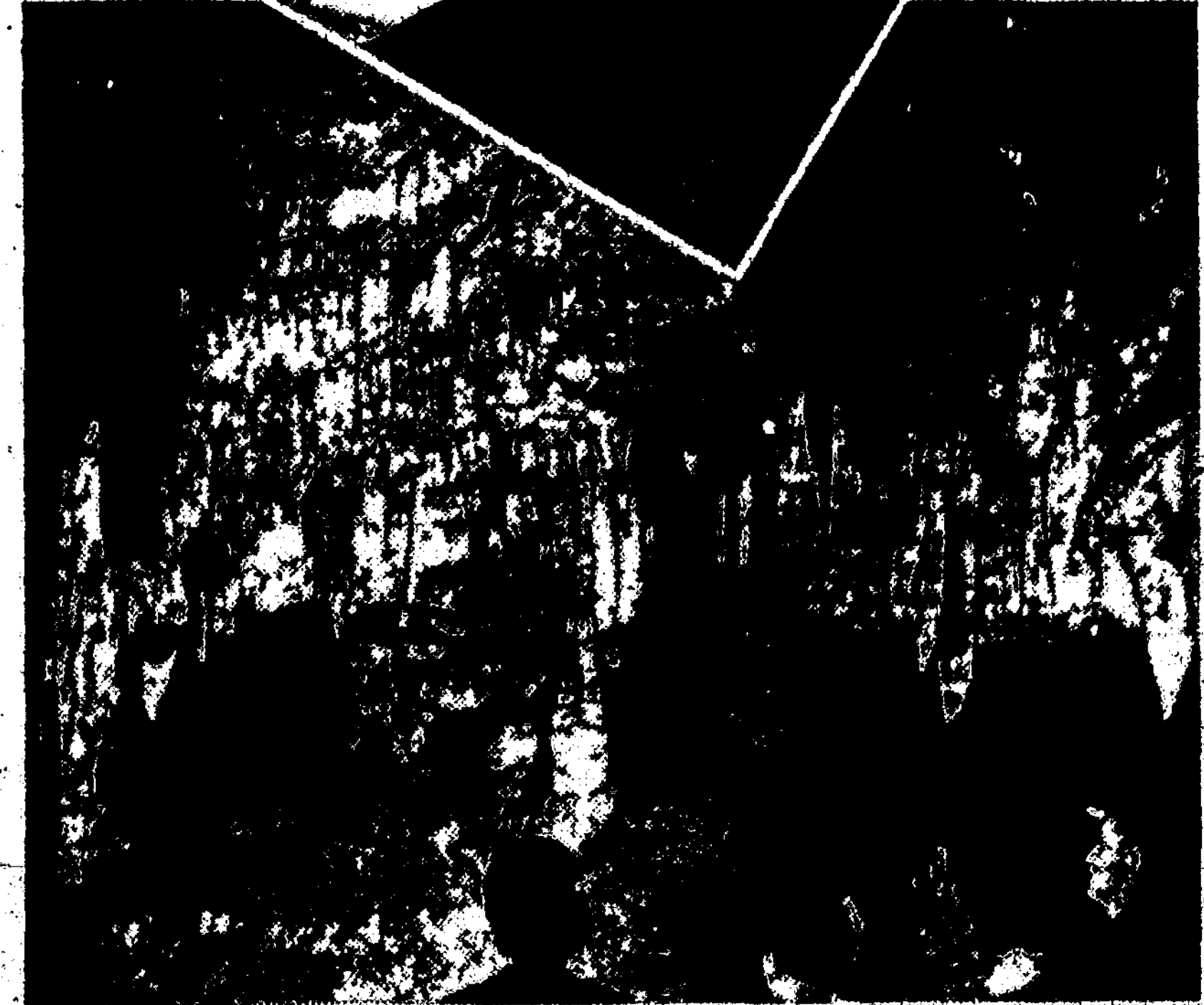


MAMMOTH cave at Cave City, Ky., first discovered in 1799, is not only one of the oldest but also one of the most fascinating tourist and vacation spots in the nation. Last year 67,000 people from every state and 30 foreign countries visited its 175 miles and underground trails that

have been explored and opened to the public. This year even more visitors are expected, for under the direction of planning experts many of the cave's features, which earned it a place among the seven wonders of the world, have been improved without injury to their natural beauty. A new route has been opened, offering more thrills to the sightseer, not the least of which is squeezing through narrow places such as the Needle's Eye in Corkscrew Stairway (above). Caves are mysterious places offering many surprises to first-time visitors.

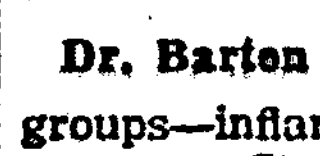


Pain in the Stomach

WHEN pain occurs in the stomach—stomach-ache—it is only natural to think that there is something wrong with the stomach itself—inflammation of the lining of the stomach, ulcer of the stomach, and cancer of the stomach. All three do cause pain in the stomach and this should never be forgotten, but the liver and gall bladder are more often to blame.

However, there are a number of causes for pain in the stomach, and the time the pain occurs after eating often tells just what is likely to be the cause of the trouble. Dr. F. W. Sherman, Owensboro, in the Kentucky Medical Journal, says: "The painful diseases in the upper part of the abdomen—the region of the stomach—belong to three main groups—inflammations, ulcers, and cancer. Stomach pain is nearly always in the pit of the stomach, but occasionally it may be to the left or right.

"In inflamed conditions of the stomach, the pain is likely to appear soon after eating. Ulcer of the stomach gives pain within one or two hours after eating, while duodenal ulcer (ulcer of the duodenum or first part of the small intestine) is somewhat later (three or four hours).

May Be Gall Bladder. "One of the commonest causes of pain in the stomach is gall bladder disease. It is responsible for more stomach disturbance, so-called indigestion and flatulence (gas) than anything else. "Disease of the pancreas may resemble gall bladder disease in its persistence but the pain is more often at the back than at the front. "Disease of the spleen may cause pain in the stomach region but the pain is usually to the left side and lower down.

Thus there are many disorders causing pain in the stomach, besides those above mentioned, that are not due to stomach disease. Disease of the oesophagus (tube carrying food from the throat to the stomach) is noticed when food is swallowed, whereas stomach disease—ulcer—is about two hours after eating, ulcer of duodenum three or four hours after eating, and gall bladder, liver and pancreas disease, from four to five hours after eating.

Cancer of the stomach usually causes a constant pain or uneasiness and is often thought to be just chronic indigestion. These points about pain in the stomach and when they occur, should bring relief to many who have pains in the stomach.

Take Big Meal at Noon. A factory superintendent consulted his physician regarding his weight, which was from 15 to 20 pounds above the usual ideal weight for height, age and body build. His physician, knowing that the patient disliked the idea of dieting, the counting of the calories, the daily exercise when he believed he was getting enough exercise at his work, made this suggestion: "You are on your feet most of the day with three floors of employees under your supervision; you are thus getting plenty of exercise. However, you eat a fair-sized breakfast, a light lunch, and a big dinner at night. As far as the day's need of food is concerned you are getting the right amount and the right kinds of food. Now, instead of eating a light lunch at noon, go out at noon and eat the big meal—exactly the same foods and amounts as you eat in the evening. If you were doing hard mental work this big meal at noon would not perhaps be wise, but by eating the big meal at noon, your work of covering three floors—walking about the floors and climbing the stairs—will not only use up the big meal eaten at noon, but this work will also use up some of the fat now present on your body. Then eating the small meal at night—enough to supply the body's needs during a quiet evening and a restful night's sleep—no more weight can go on the body. When you eat a big meal at night, sit around and read the paper, or go out for an evening of bridge with a lunch following the game, there is no possible chance for this large amount of food to be used by the body; and in your particular case fat gets stored in and on your body."

The patient followed this advice faithfully. He lost five pounds the first month; three pounds the second, two the third, and one more each month for three months; eleven pounds in all. This was done with no change in amount or kind of food eaten or no change in amount of exercise; in fact no change in his daily habits whatever except that the big meal was taken at noon instead of in the evening.

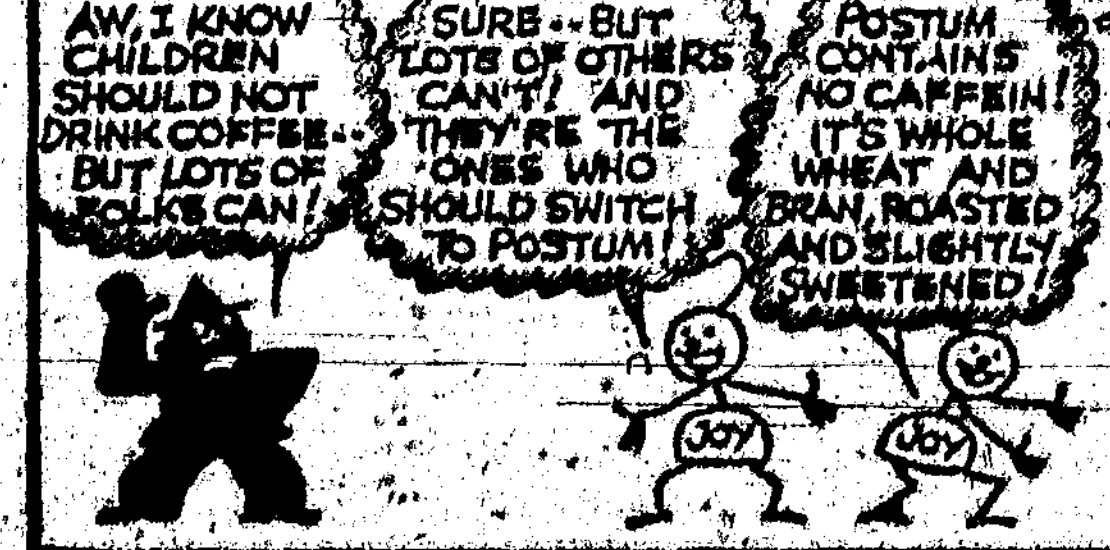
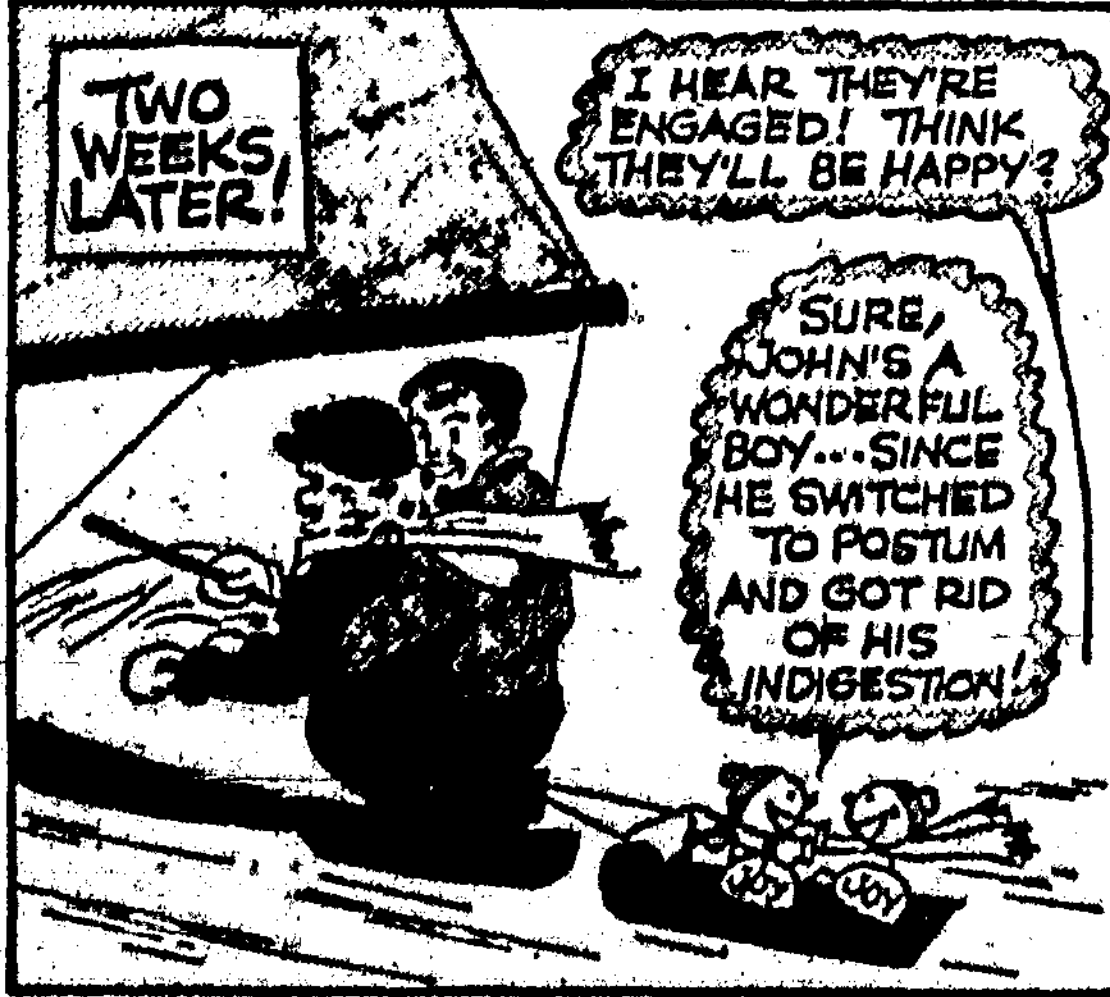
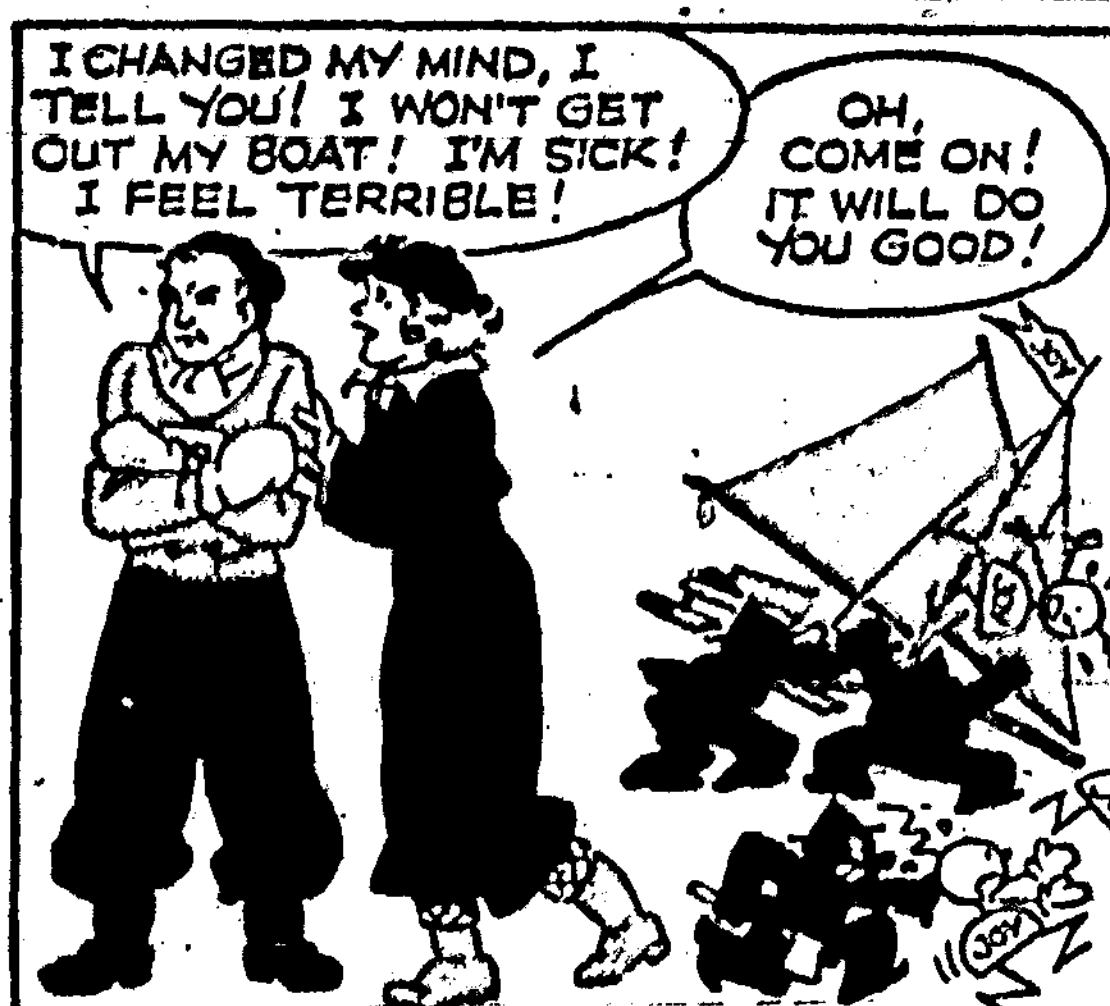
