As every voter knows, something new and foreign to the American tradition has made its way into campaign oratory during recent years.

It is the promise of large and regular grants of money, not necessarily to the unemployed or in need, but to members of various groups and factions whose votes can help win victory.

In an earlier day, candidates pledged themselves to work for improved conditions for all the constituents: for governmental processes which would offer every citizen greater opportunity to advance and to prosper.

And under that method America rose in achievement and in the general well-being of its people to heights approached by no other nation in history.

But today many candidates seem to favor a different technique. This method is to promise to put money directly into the pockets of special groups of voters, regardless of its effect on the nation as a whole. And in making these promises such candidates bank in a self-created glow of personal generosity.

But who is being generous? That depends on whom the money comes from. And, as everybody knows, it must come from the people. Today, as always, their earnings and their savings are the source of all government income.

In other words, what such candidates are promising is to give to the people money which they, the people, must supply, either through direct taxes or in the form of higher costs for all the necessities of life—now or in the future.

Every citizen recognizes the responsibility, through government or other source, to be taken in need. But when a candidate asks for election on his promise that he will give the voters money which they must supply, he is asking them not to help the nation or themselves, but to help him.

"Turpentine and a Brick"

HELLO EVERYBODY:

Everybody has his own recipe for Adventure. Here's the favorite one of Mary Doner of 247 Park Ave., New York City: Take one brick and a cupful of turpentine. Cook the brick over a hot fire for twenty minutes. Pour the turpentine over it and serve.

Does that sound appetizing? Well stick around a few minutes while old Francois Gibbons, the Franco-Fenian maestro of the skillet and the soup ladle, juggles the pans around a bit and dishes you out a plateful hot from the kitchen of Old Lady Adventure's hash house. And before we go any farther I want to tell you that the very aroma of this delectable dish is enough to make a horse go crazy.

I don't know what it will do to you—but here's the tale of how it affected Mary Doner.

About 10 years ago, Mary and her husband lived in Maplewood, N. J., and horseback riding is a popular sport out in that neck of the woods. They kept a bunch of saddle horses for their own amusement, and since experienced grooms were impossible to get at the salary they could afford to pay, they were forced to employ green hands in the stable.

Rex Was a High-Strung Thoroughbred.

That worked out pretty well, though, for what the green stable hands lacked in knowledge and experience, Mary made up with her own. Mary was born on a ranch in California and had grown up with horses.

Horses were her favorite brand of animal, and she spent a great deal of her time in the stable seeing that they were well taken care of and not neglected in any way.

Among the other horses was one, Rex, who was the apple of Mary's eye. He was a high-strung thoroughbred, but as gentle as a kitten.

"I always says me a thrill," says Mary, "to hear Rex's greeting every time he saw me. I gave him twice the care and attention that I gave any of the other horses. He was clever—almost human in his intelligence."

And Rex's cleverness is to take an important part in our story. He was kept in a large box stall, and before long he learned to put his head over the top of the door and push back the bolt with his nose. Mary had to have the bolt put down at the bottom of the door to keep him from getting out, wandering into the feed-room, and probably feasting himself. Remember that bolt. Remember that it's way down at the bottom of the door, out of reach of anyone inside. That low-set bolt caused a lot of trouble.

Stableman Bolted the Door.

But of course that hot brick with the turpentine sauce was the principal cause of it all.

This is the place where the brick and the turpentine come into the story. Rex had a cold and, try as she would, Mary couldn't seem to check it. She called in a veterinary and he gave her some medicine for Rex. "And another thing you might try," he said, "is this. Heat a brick, pour some turpentine over it, and let the vapor get up his nostrils."

Mary told the stableman to heat a brick. He did a good job of it. He brought the brick out to her red hot. And Mary put that brick on a shovel and went into Rex's stall.

As she went in she closed the door and the stableman bolted it. The stableman had a bucket of turpentine and, from the outside of the stall he poured it on the brick. He poured it on with a lavish hand. It was a case of too much of everything. The brick had been heated too hot in the first place. There was too much turpentine in the second. The result was startling. The turpentine sizzled and filled the stall with the choking vapor. Rex began to get restive. Then, suddenly, the turpentine burst into flames, and Rex went crazy.

The flames shot up in the stall—and so did Rex. He reared up on his hind legs and began pawing at the air.

"And I," says Mary, "was in that stall. Up to that time it had seemed like a large stall to me. With this fear-maddened horse, 15 hands high, rearing and plunging about me, it seemed no bigger than a telephone booth.

"The vapor started to rise in a thick cloud and I couldn't see the horse. I would catch glimpses of his pawing hoofs raised high in the air and would dodge away to keep out of his reach. But I couldn't move far, and the minute I got in one corner, the plunging, frantic horse would be coming my way again."

Afraid to Drop Red-Hot Brick.

All that time, Mary was holding the shovel. She didn't dare set it down, for the brick was red hot and the floor of the stall was covered with dry straw. Once the shovel with its blazing contents touched that straw the whole stable would go up in flames.

And why didn't Mary just duck out the stall door? Well, there you have the bolt again. As soon as the flames started shooting up, the stableman had run away in panic. Well compensated heart is favorable to long life despite actual damage to organ.

YOU may be rejected for insurance because of heart disease, yet the examining physician states that there is no reason why you should not live for a number of years because your heart is well "compensated."

What is meant by "compensation," where actual heart disease is present, or has at some time in the past done permanent damage to the heart?

A heart with good compensation is when the heart is able to pump blood out of its chambers as fast as blood flows into them. Just as long as it doesn't get behind in pumping blood out as fast as it comes in it is considered a well compensated heart and there is no immediate danger.

We see individuals rejected for insurance who have enlarged hearts, hearts with leaking valves and some with a certain degree of irregularity, and yet there are no symptoms of heart disease present—shortness of breath, early fatigue, swelling of the feet.

What will happen to these individuals should they lose some of this "compensation" and begin to have breathlessness on slight exertion, and tire very easily? Does this mean that they may collapse and pass away within a short time?

No. These symptoms—breathlessness and early fatigue—are prompt warnings that the heart is unable to do the amount of work it has been doing and requires one of two methods of help. It may be stimulated to drive the blood out of its chambers by means of digitals or other heart stimulant, or the individual by doing less work, resting more, does not ask the heart to do as much work and the heart is able to do this smaller amount of work without difficulty.

Compensation May Be Regained.
In the clinic of Drs. Burton E. Hamilton and Carl A. Schuck, Boston Lying In Hospital, as recorded in Medical Clinics of North America, the "double" method of regaining compensation for a heart that is beginning to fail is used. This means that the patient is put at complete rest in bed (which is often all that is needed) and the use of heart stimulants. Excess water in the tissues and circulation is removed during the treatment. The clinic's advice, if followed, may mean many more years of life.

The removal of undesirable burdens, keeping free from mouth infections—teeth, tonsils, sinuses—a measured amount of work or exercise daily, reporting for regular examinations, should prevent sudden or dangerous loss of compensation. These patients are getting the most out of life.

Cause of Migraine Difficult to Discover

Migraine is one of the ailments for which no special cause has been found. The pain, in the great majority of cases, is on just one side of the head. Together with this pain there is often nausea and vomiting. Another fact is that it appears to occur at regular intervals.

Research physicians in Great Britain and the United States now state that migraine may affect one or both sides of the head and that it is not a single disease but a group of symptoms due to various causes.

The clinic of Dr. Theodore J. C. von Storch, Boston City Hospital, make some clear statements regarding migraine in "Medical Clinics of North America." The clinic finds, after examination of many cases, that there are usually four outstanding symptoms in a typical case of migraine.

1. Headache, usually but not always on one side, occurring at more or less frequent intervals.
2. Eye disturbances such as cloudy patches in front of the eyes, pain, tears and fear of light.
3. Stomach and intestinal disturbances, usually nausea and vomiting.

4. The family history usually reveals the presence of migraine, epilepsy, or allergy (sensitiveness to foods or other substances) in the patient's immediate family.

Many Causes Possible.
When all four of the above symptoms are present it may safely be called migraine.

"Competent observers have considered the migraine syndrome (group of symptoms) to be due to disturbances of the eye, large intestine, liver, stomach, intestine, to poor mental adjustment to life, and other conditions."

The clinic, after observation of a large series of selected cases, believes that some cases are due to eye conditions, others to disturbances of liver or other organ, and others to allergy.

Speed of Baseball

Kan says: According to Dr. Coleman R. Griffith of the University of Illinois, some pitchers are able to throw a baseball at an initial speed of 120 feet a second.
