MEMORY'S LANE

In these days of the telephone, radio, automobile and even television, which has lately been proven to be a reality, the present generation might well ponder on the conditions of the early days before any, you might say, of these developments had come to pass.

In the first place, let us take the telephone, the use of which has become so common that it is classed among the everyday part of our lives.

There were but two; one of which was stationed in the north part of the town, the other in the southern part. As soon as they were set up and the wires arranged, the news spread rapidly. People rushed to the stations and gladly paid the sum of 50 cents for the privilege of saying 'hello' and receiving the answer in the same word from the other end of the line.

The next wonder came in the form of what was called the velocipede. This was a slow-going, crude apparatus, propelled much after the fashion of the bicycle, which soon took the place of the velocipede, which had four wheels, the driver having a seat and using the pedals, right and left from underneath.

Now, for the bicycle. The first to make its appearance was an apparatus having a large wheel in front about twice the size of the ordinary buggy wheel, while the one behind was much smaller than the bicycle wheel of today.

The bicycle followed in the wake of that crude monstrosity and aside from a few improvements, is about the same today as it was when first invented. Like other new inventions, they were very costly at first, but the use became so common and competition so great, that the prices were soon reduced.

Whereas, petition for the calling of an election to vote on issuance of bonds for school purposes in school district No. 3, County of Lincoln, New Mexico, has been duly presented, and found to be in accordance with law;

Now therefore, it is resolved that an election for said purposes shall be held in said district on the 2nd day of June, 1939.

Nays: None.

Thereupon the chairman announces the resolution adopted. It is further ordered that a copy of the foregoing resolution be published in the Carrizozo Outlook, a newspaper of general circulation in Lincoln County, at least 15 days before the date set for the said election, and that thereafter, in case there is no attack upon the validity of said petition, or the above resolution, that further notice be published and posted in conformity with Section 120 705 Codification of 1929.

It is also further ordered that John Porr, Lewis Smith and Delcie Palmer, be appointed as Judges, that Mrs. R. H. Hedgecock and Bertha E Kirk be appointed as alternate Judges; and that Mrs. H. G. Heavenhill and Ike N. Wingfield be appointed as Clerks and Mrs. Jane Clark and Mrs. Stella Campbell be appointed as alternate Clerks, and the same hereby are appointed as election judges and clerks to serve at said election without pay, after having taken the oath prescribed by Section 120.706, Codification of 1929.

It is further ordered that the form of the ballots to be used at said election shall conform to Section 120 - 706, Codification of 1929.

### "Who Goes There?"

HELLO EVERYBODY:  
Here's a yarn from Hawaii—but it isn't any tale of soft moonlight and hula girls dancing on the beach of Waikiki. You can forget all about the South Sea's glamor, for this is a grim tale of soldiering in a tropic land. A tale of madness and murder on a dank, mosquito-infested island under a blazing, searing tropic sun and a sullen tropic moon.

Charles Suval of Brooklyn, N. Y., brings us this tale, and it happened back in 1920, when Charley was in the army and attached to the 13th Field Artillery, stationed at the Schofield barracks near Honolulu. Hawaii has a pretty swell reputation here in the United States. It's supposed to be the next thing to paradise. In 1920, those barracks weren't either modern or comfortable. Just a bunch of wooden buildings with darned few conveniences. The place was hot, and it swarmed with mosquitoes.

"It was bad enough for us old-timers," says Charley, "but for the rookies it was plenty tough." Most of the old-timers like Charley had been stationed in the tropics before. They were used to it. The rookies had to get used to it, too—and most of them did. But a few of them were sent back to the States with their papers marked "undesirable." And nine times out of ten that meant that the poor rookie had cracked under the strain of sweltering in the sun all day and lying in a hot bed slapping at mosquitoes all night.

### Strange, Moody-Youngster-Surprises-Barrack-Mates.

There was a young lad in Charley Suval's outfit whom everybody spoke of as "The Kid." No one thought—least of all Charley—that that kid was close to the breaking point. Nor did anyone even dream that before long he would be the cause of a grim and heartless tragedy. 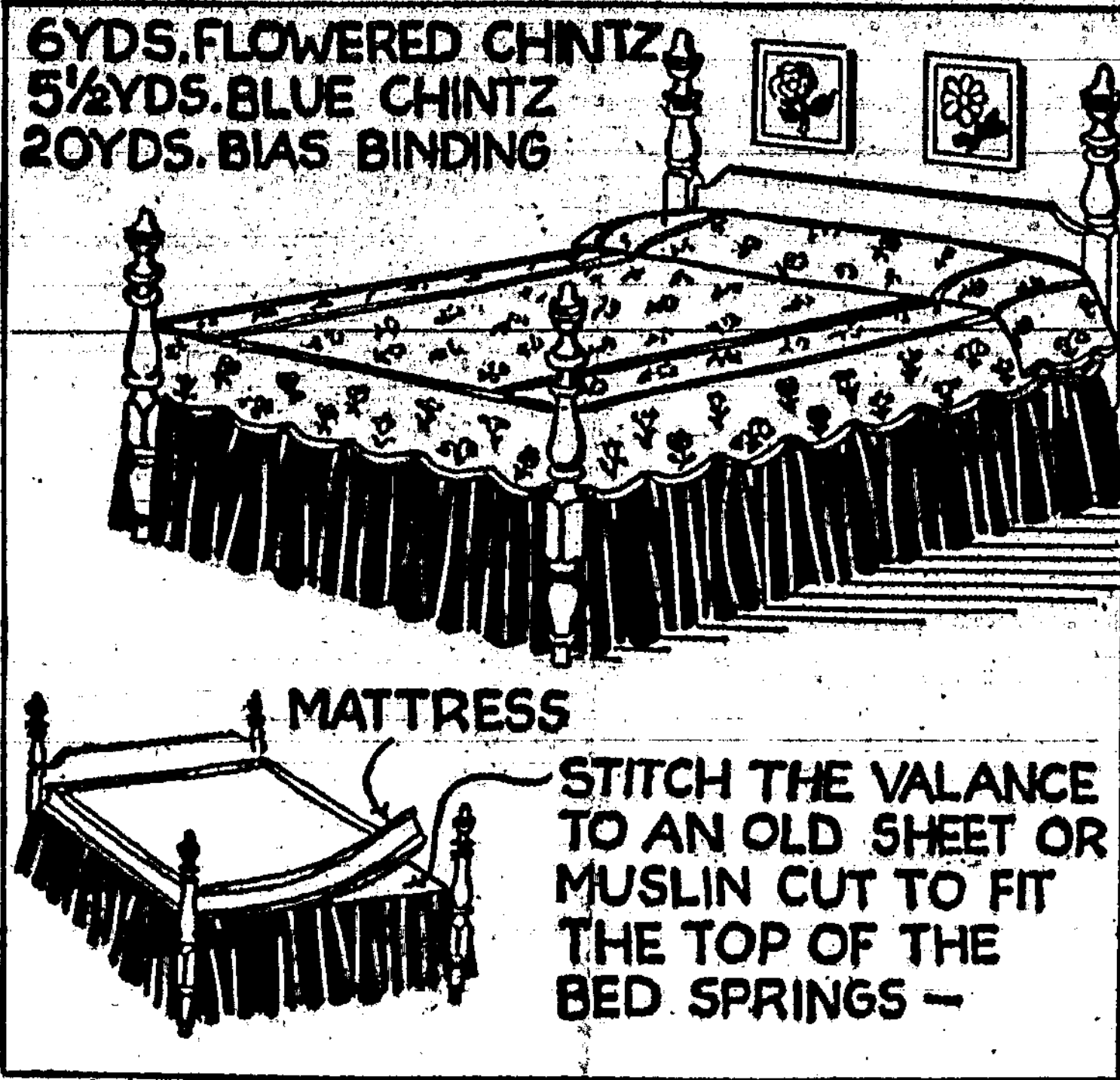
The stone found its mark. The Kid went down and lay like a log—and the tragic battle was over.

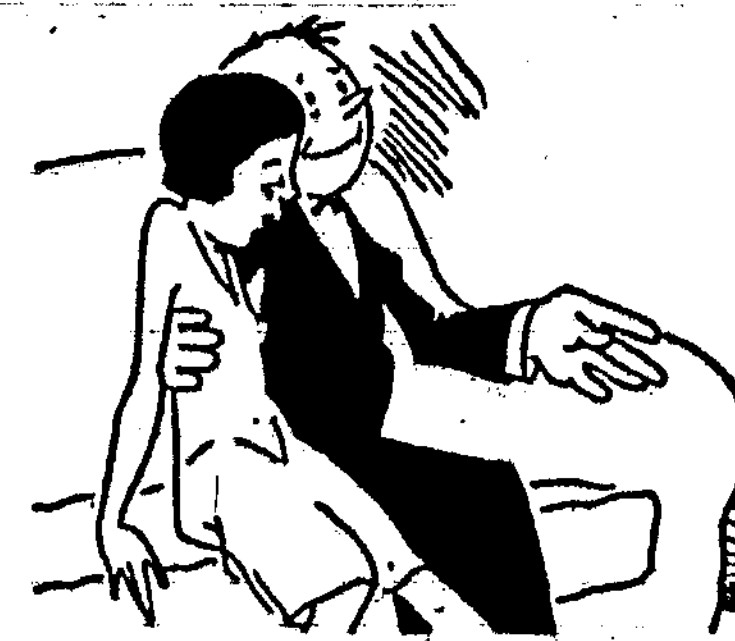

## PRINCE ALBERT THE NATIONAL JOY SMOKE

### Noah Webster's First Dictionary Published in 1828

The first edition of "Noah Webster's American Dictionary of the English Language" was published in New York in 1828. As early as 1783 he had published his "American Spelling Book," which sold by the millions down through the third quarter of the Nineteenth century. Profits from this book enabled him to devote some 20 years to the preparation of a dictionary. In 1824, when the book was nearly finished, he visited Europe to procure such information as he had been unable to obtain in America. After a short stay in Paris he went to England, where he finished his dictionary during an eight months' residence in Cambridge. In June, 1825, he returned to America. An edition of 2,500 copies of his dictionary was published in 1828, followed by an edition of 3,000 for Great Britain. The work contained 12,000 words and 40,000 definitions not to be found in any similar publications. Webster issued an enlarged edition in 1840.

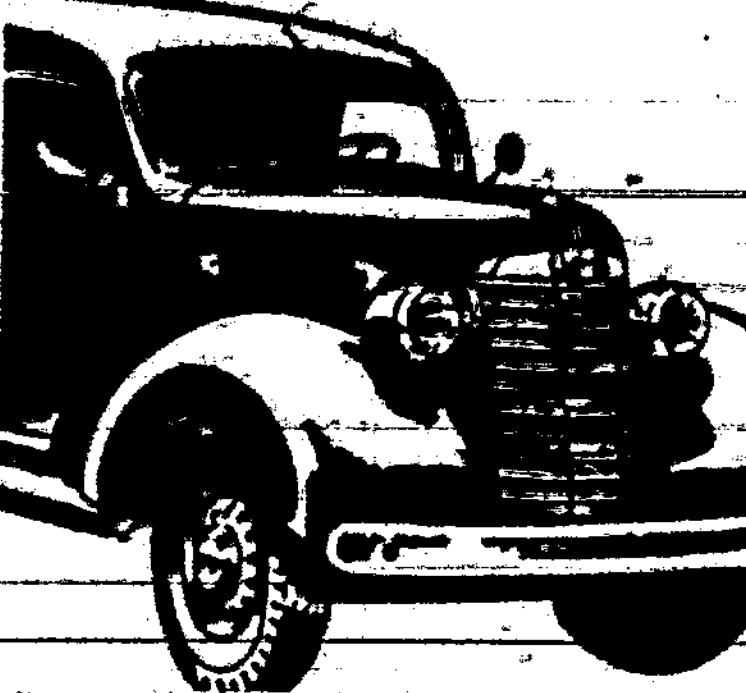

The Attorney General has ruled that taxes may be accepted without interest for the first half of 1938, provided the second half is also paid at the same time. This also applies to 1937 and prior delinquent taxes. He has ruled, however, that this rule does not apply to second half 1938 taxes as to payment without interest. Therefore, should the taxpayer pay the last half 1938 taxes at the same time he pays delinquent taxes we are allowed to cancel interest up to the date of October 1, 1938. The second half 1938 taxes which became delinquent May 1, 1939, will draw interest at rate of 1% per month after delinquency.

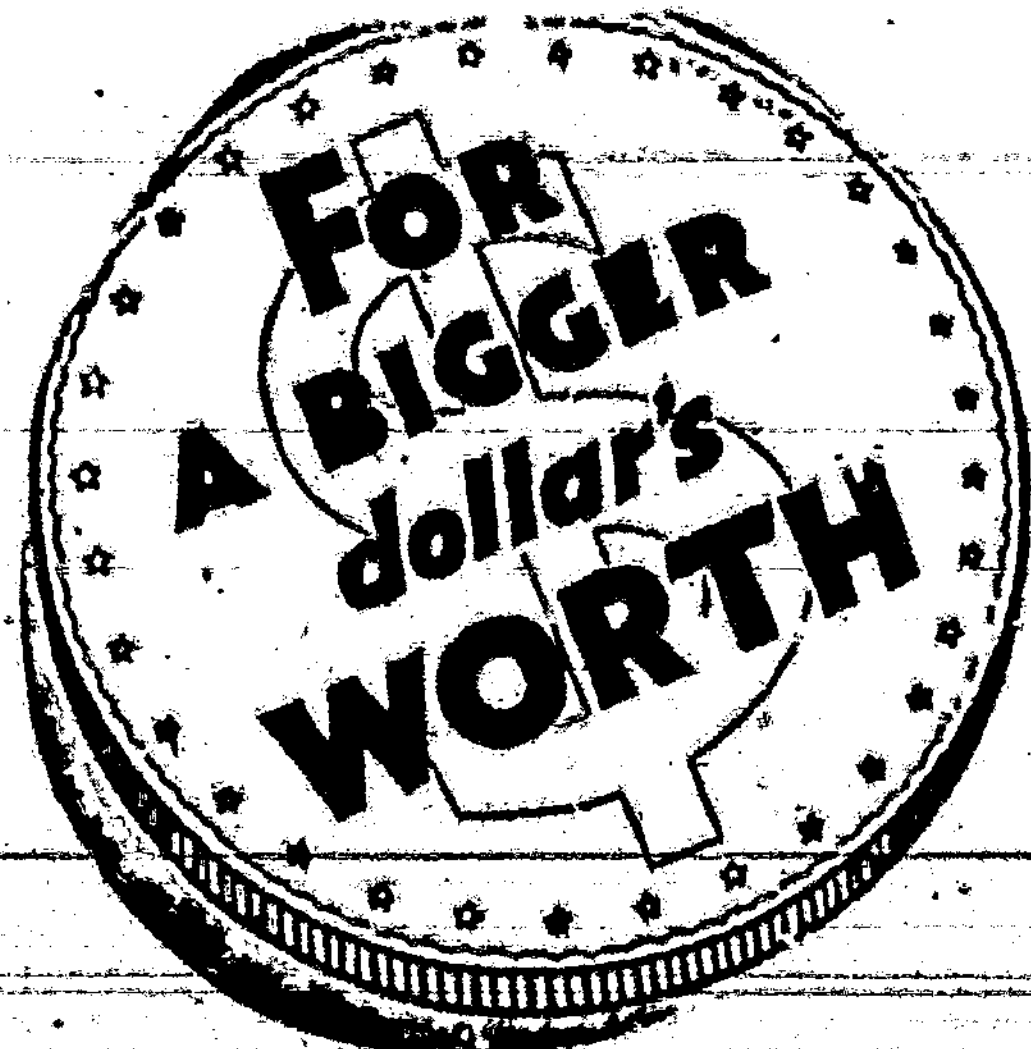
