The contract will include remodeling of the present structure, and by watching the cat hole, the \$50,000 will do the trick, without a single dollar of indebtedness

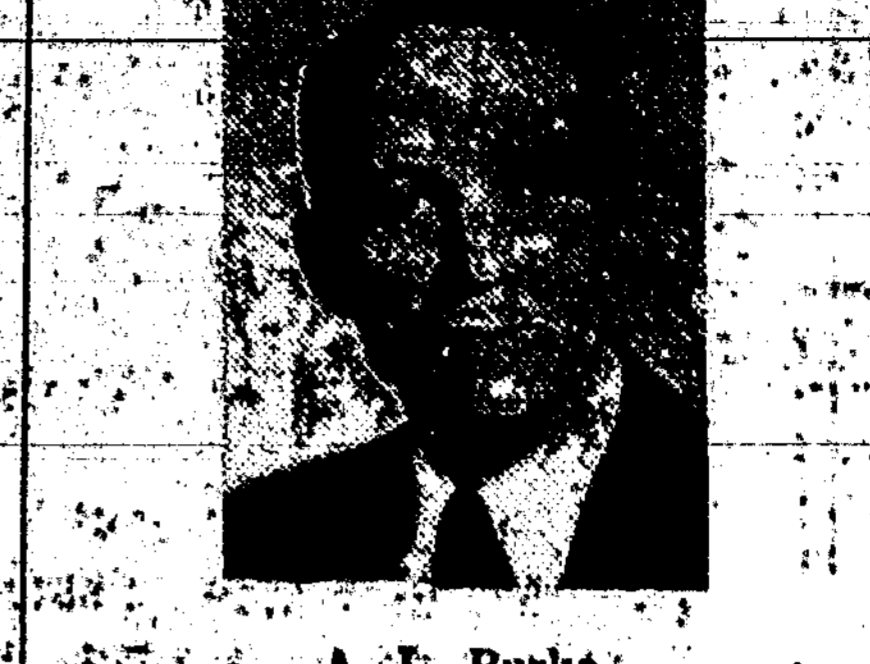

Francis Bailey and Henry Lee Were Authors of Historic Phrases About Washington Known to All Americans

COMES the 22nd of February and we'll be hearing a great deal about the "Father of His Country" and "First in War, first in peace and first in the hearts of his countrymen."

For those words are almost as familiar to Americans as are the words "George Washington."

How did it happen that George Washington came to be known as the "Father of His Country"?

The obvious answer to that question is, of course, that a new nation, grateful to the man who had led it safely through the dangers of a revolution against its former rulers, naturally looked upon him as its parent and, naturally also, elected him as its first President.

But who first gave him that title? Historians are virtually unanimous in giving the honor to a certain Francis Bailey, publisher of a Pennsylvania German almanac in Lancaster, Pa. in 1779.

They Called Him "Father." When Washington finished his conference with Rochambeau and prepared to return to his headquarters near West Point, the French general appointed Count Dumas to escort the American leader from Newport to Providence.

We arrived there one night on March 13. The whole of the population had assembled from the suburbs, we were surrounded by a crowd of children carrying torches, uttering the acclamations of the citizens...

Thus Washington during his lifetime probably heard himself referred to as the "Father of His Country" many times. But it is probable that he never heard that immortal phrase, "First in war, first in peace and first in the hearts of his countrymen," for it was not uttered until after his death, which occurred on December 14, 1799.

Lee's Eulogy. On December 26, 1799, Lee delivered the oration in congress which, in part, follows:

First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen, he was second to none in the humble and endearing scenes of private life.

As head of the legion, Lee more than justified Washington's faith in him. One of his most daring enterprises was a successful attempt to surprise the British garrison at Paulus Hook, where with the loss of only five men, he captured more than 100 prisoners.

He was promoted to lieutenant-colonel and in the autumn of 1798 sent to South Carolina with his legion to join the army there which was being reorganized by Gen. Nathaniel Greene after the

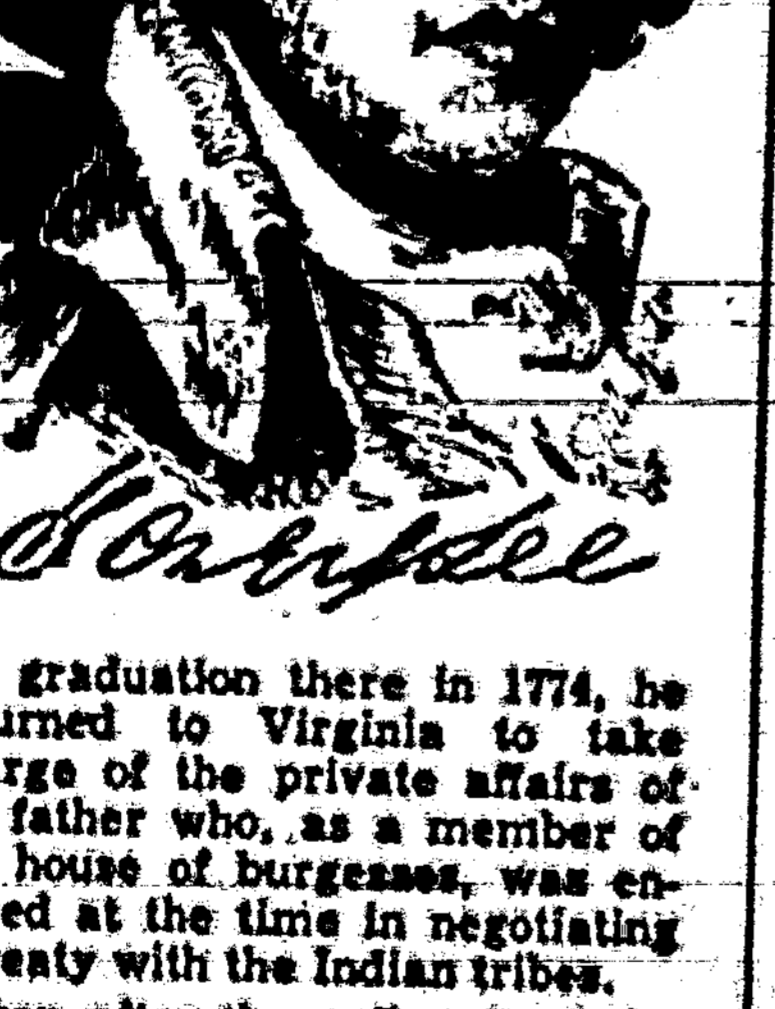
you preserve undisturbed to the latest posterity the felicity of a people to me most dear, and thus will you supply (if my happiness is now aught to you) the only vacancy in the round of pure bliss high heaven bestows."

Two Claims to Distinction. Even if Henry Lee had not been the first to utter those historic words, "First in war, first in peace and first in the hearts of his countrymen," his name would be deserving of remembrance for two other reasons.

Born in Westmoreland county, Virginia, January 29, 1756, "Lighthouse Harry" was the son of another Henry Lee who had married Miss Lucy Grymes, the "Lowland Beauty" for whom young George Washington had "entertained an unrequited passion."

At the close of the campaign "Lighthouse Harry" returned to Virginia where he married a cousin, Matilda Lee, who owned Stratford House where he lived thereafter. In 1766 he was appointed a delegate to congress from Virginia and he remained in that body until the Constitution was adopted.

his graduation there in 1774, he returned to Virginia to take charge of the private affairs of his father who, as a member of the house of burgesses, was engaged at the time in negotiating a treaty with the Indian tribes.

Soon after the outbreak of the Revolution young Henry Lee received an appointment as captain of Virginia cavalry under Col. Theodorick Bland but it was not until September, 1777, that he joined the main Continental army.

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disastrous battle of Camden. During Greene's famous retreat through North Carolina in February, 1781, it was Lee's legion which covered the rear of the American army and engaged in some lively skirmishing with the dragoons of the hated and feared Col. Banastre Tarleton.

When Greene crossed the Dan into Virginia, he left Lee south of the river to harass the enemy. Although he failed in his attempt to surprise Tarleton, he did defeat a body of 400 Loyalists under Colonel Pyle and at the desperate battle of Guilford Court House he routed Tarleton. Next he accompanied Greene to South Carolina to drive out the British commander, Lord Rawdon, and during this campaign "Lighthouse Harry" proved his skill as a besieger of cities as well as a dashing cavalryman in the field.

Whisky rebellion in western Pennsylvania and when President Washington sent Federal troops to suppress the uprising they were under the command of "Lighthouse Harry," who did such a good job of it that the rebels were dispersed without bloodshed.

Meanwhile, his first wife, by whom he had a son and a daughter, had died and he had married Anne Carter. She bore him two daughters and three sons, one of whom was destined for future fame as the beloved "Marine Robert" of the men in Gray.

In 1814 he happened to be in Baltimore when a mob attacked the office of the Federalist Republican, which had been opposing the second war with England.

One October day in 1776, His Excellency, Gen. George Washington, commander-in-chief of the Continental army, encamped at Cambridge, Mass., received a letter, written at Providence, R. I., which said:

I have taken the freedom to address your excellency in the enclosed poem and am not insensible to its inaccuracies. Your being appointed by the Grand Continental Congress, together with the fame of your virtue, excite sensations not easy to suppress. Your generosity, therefore, I presume will pardon the attempt.

The poem which was enclosed contained these lines: Shall I to Washington their praise recite? Enough thou know'st them in the field of fight, They first in place and honor—we demand The grace and glory of thy martial hand.

Presumably the general was too busy with his task of driving the British out of Boston, for her letter remained unanswered for four months.

Then on February 28, 1776, he wrote her as follows:

Thank you most sincerely for your polite notice of me in the elegant lines you enclosed, and however undeserving I may be of such panegyric, the style and manner exhibit striking proof of your poetical talents, in honor of which and as a tribute justly due you I would have published the poem had I not been apprehensive that, while I only meant to give the world this new instance of your genius, I might have incurred the imputation of vanity.

Who was Phyllis Wheatley? She was one of the most remarkable characters in the early history of the United States. The date or place of her birth is unknown, but when she was seven or eight years old she was dragged more dead than alive from a slave ship in Boston one day in 1761.

One day Mary saw the little African girl trying to form letters on the wall with a piece of chalk. So she began teaching her the alphabet and how to form words.

Her health failed when she was 20 years old, due to the long hours which she had spent in study. So when Nathaniel Wheatley went to England on business in 1773 he took Phyllis with him.

GOOD CITIZENS AND GOOD NEIGHBORS

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 22:15-22, 34-40. GOLDEN TEXT—Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.—Matthew 22:39.

Character is determined by what a man is in his heart, not by the profession of his lips. This is eminently true in spiritual matters, for we know that it is not by much testifying, hymn-singing, or even by church attendance that a man proves himself to be a Christian.

No man will make any real progress in the direction of being either a good citizen or a good neighbor until he has a right attitude toward God.

The questions which were asked of our Lord, and which brought forth such precious teaching from Him, were not asked in good-will nor with a desire to glorify God, but rather to entrap or snare the Lord and thus give occasion for denouncing Him.

It is not the crying need of our world today, gone mad as it has with misdirected and perverted patriotic fervor and forgetting all responsibilities of good neighborliness, that it should heed and heed the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ?

The subtle hypocrisy of the question in verse 17 lay in the fact that these leaders were not interested in knowing the truth, but only wanted to make Jesus out either to be disloyal to His own people because He advocated paying tribute, or a traitor to Caesar because He advised rebellion against taxation.

Why does not some nation realize that the answer to destructive political and social theories is—win the destructive agitator to a living faith in Christ and he will become your strongest force for God and country.

The real answer to communism (and every other anti-Americanism) is Christ.

We have talked a good deal of late about being good neighbors, and certainly everyone should do everything possible to encourage the good neighbor policy in his own community and throughout the earth.

Present Ball Players Lack Stamina, According to Ty Cobb, Who Insists That the Old-Timers Played Better Baseball.

SAN FRANCISCO.—You can't run into Ty Cobb without thinking of baseball. When I run into Ty, the Georgia Ghost, I turn the pages back 36 years to 1904 around Atlanta and Royston, Ga., where I first ran across the phenomenal stripling who later on was to set his game on fire.

The thought then was, "If winter comes, can Cobb be far behind?" For Cobb was the bluebird harbinger of spring. It was at that time that Cobb kept writing me letters, signing Smith, Jones, Brown and Robinson—all telling me what a great player young Tyrus Raymond Cobb was.

The Ty Cobb of 1940 lives just outside San Francisco, and his two favorite sports are hunting and golf. At the age of 54 his hair is thinner.

and part of the old-streamlined body has packed on some weight—but not too much.

An Amazing Record

In my opinion, Ty Cobb ran up one of the great records of sport—something close to an all-time record—maybe the all-time top. For a period of 13 consecutive years he led the American league in batting exactly 12 times.

And all the hitters he had to beat out were Napoleon Lajolo, Shoeless Joe Jackson, Tris Speaker, Eddie Collins, Nig Clarke, Sam Crawford, Bobby Veach and a flock of others who were shooting from 350 to 400. One year Joe Jackson hit .410 and Cobb still beat him out, with a far deader ball than they have had for the last 12 or 15 years.

Here is a record—12 batting championships out of 13 consecutive major-league play. That will never be approached again.

Who was Cobb battling against? Only Walter Johnson, Big Ed Walsh, Nick Altrock, Addie Joss, Chief Bender, Colby Jack Coombs, Smoky Joe Wood, Doc White, Cy Young, Eddie Plank, Rube Waddell—most of the great pitchers of all time.

The Soft Spot

I asked Ty what he thought the difference was between the old-timers and the present crop.

"Stamina," Ty said. "I mean legs and arms. I've lived on my legs most of my life. As you may remember in 24 big-league years I never spared my legs. I've played many a game with almost no skin on either thigh.

"I believed then and I believe now in toughening up your system—not sparing it. Between seasons I hunted all winter, eight or ten hours a day. That's what Bill Dickey has done—and you know where Bill Dickey stands in baseball.

"In my opinion, a real pitcher should be good for at least 45 ball games—maybe 50, if he is really needed. I mean men like Walsh, Cy Young, Alexander, Maitly, Chesbro, Joe Wood—the top guys. They could take it—and they loved it. Not this modern crowd. At least, most of them. They haven't the stamina needed to go on when there is no one to take Alexander's place.

"I thought Dizzy Dean was going to be a throwback to the old days—until Diz hurt his arm. He always wanted to pitch. To be in there. But there are not many left like that. They'd rather be resting up.

Not Enough Leg Work

"The kids today rarely use their legs. They ride in place of walking. I always had to walk. Maybe five miles—maybe 20 miles. The old-time pitchers had to work in 50 or 60 games. Maybe more. I've seen them come out long before the ball game was scheduled to start in order to get the kinks out of tired arms, working out slowly for over 30 minutes. But not today. Most of these kids today can't take it. They have come up the easy way. They have to be pampered.

Speaking of Sports

Big Ten Sets Good Example In Athletic Aid

JUST how far can colleges and universities go in extending financial assistance to individual athletes?

That is unquestionably the most widely discussed problem in intercollegiate athletics today. The demand for winning teams—a demand emanating from alumni groups, student bodies and synthetic alumni—has resulted in many schools going far afield in their search for athletic talent—particularly gridiron luminaries. It is obvious that many schools have not relied solely upon the fame of their professors or the glory of their traditions to induce athletes to die for dear old Claptrap College. To these factors, in many cases, must be added a more tangible persuader—financial aid.

The length to which a school may go in subsidizing athletes usually depends, or should depend, on conference rulings. It is generally conceded that a majority of schools live up to the letter of their various conference laws, a very few obey the spirit of the laws, and that too many of them wittily evade restrictions.

Regulations Defined

The Big Ten conference, one of the nation's greatest, operates under the basic principle that the athlete is entitled to every consideration which might be accorded a non-athlete by the university, but nothing further. Maj. John L. Griffith,

commissioner of Big Ten athletics, in defining conference regulations, states:

"Big Ten regulations on the matter of financial aid to athletes are clear and definite. They state that athletics within the conference are to be conducted on a non-paid-player basis. All unearned financial aid, except from relatives or others in a similar position, is deemed not permissible unless it be in the form of scholarships, loans or tuition remissions administered by properly constituted university authorities."

Members of the conference submit to Griffith's office a complete record of all benefits accorded athletes out of university or athletic funds.

Few people can find fault with those restrictions. They are a logical solution to an onerous problem. Big-Ten schools do not attempt to fill all available positions with football players. Nor do they refuse to offer a job to a prospective student because he is an athlete.

Unequal Restrictions

Many advocates of simon-pure athletics would swing the pendulum too far. They shout "subsidization" too quickly. No thinking person would ban an athlete from a school job merely because he is an athlete. His chances for financial assistance should be just as good—no better—than any other student.

Athletes are listed in the Big Ten reports include all varsity squad members and winners of freshmen numeral awards. The 5,100 men who are so listed represent 7.6 per cent of the total undergraduate male enrollment in the conference, which totals 67,323.

Scholarships are made available to 4,475 students in the Big Ten, and of that number 315 are held by athletes. The percentage of athletes holding scholarships corresponds almost identically to the proportion of the number of scholarships available to the total male enrollment.

What could be fairer? It is difficult to find any grievous fault with an arrangement which would allow a more or less wealthy alumnus to pay the way for a boy's education. Many athletes would never have had the benefits and advantages of a college education were it not for the financial backing of a sports-minded sponsor. It would be unfair discrimination to single out the sponsored athlete and deny him the right of athletic participation. By the same token no one would deny the athlete his rightful and earned share of scholarships, campus jobs and student loans.
