They were musicians among the men and as far as we were able to ascertain, they had a band.

It took three loads of the three busses to make the transfer, the last leaving at about 6 o'clock in the afternoon. They will be located at Fort Stanton for the duration of the war.

The frame building next door to the Outlook is being remodelled. New flooring will be laid, new roofing put on, and it will be plastered both in the inside and outside.

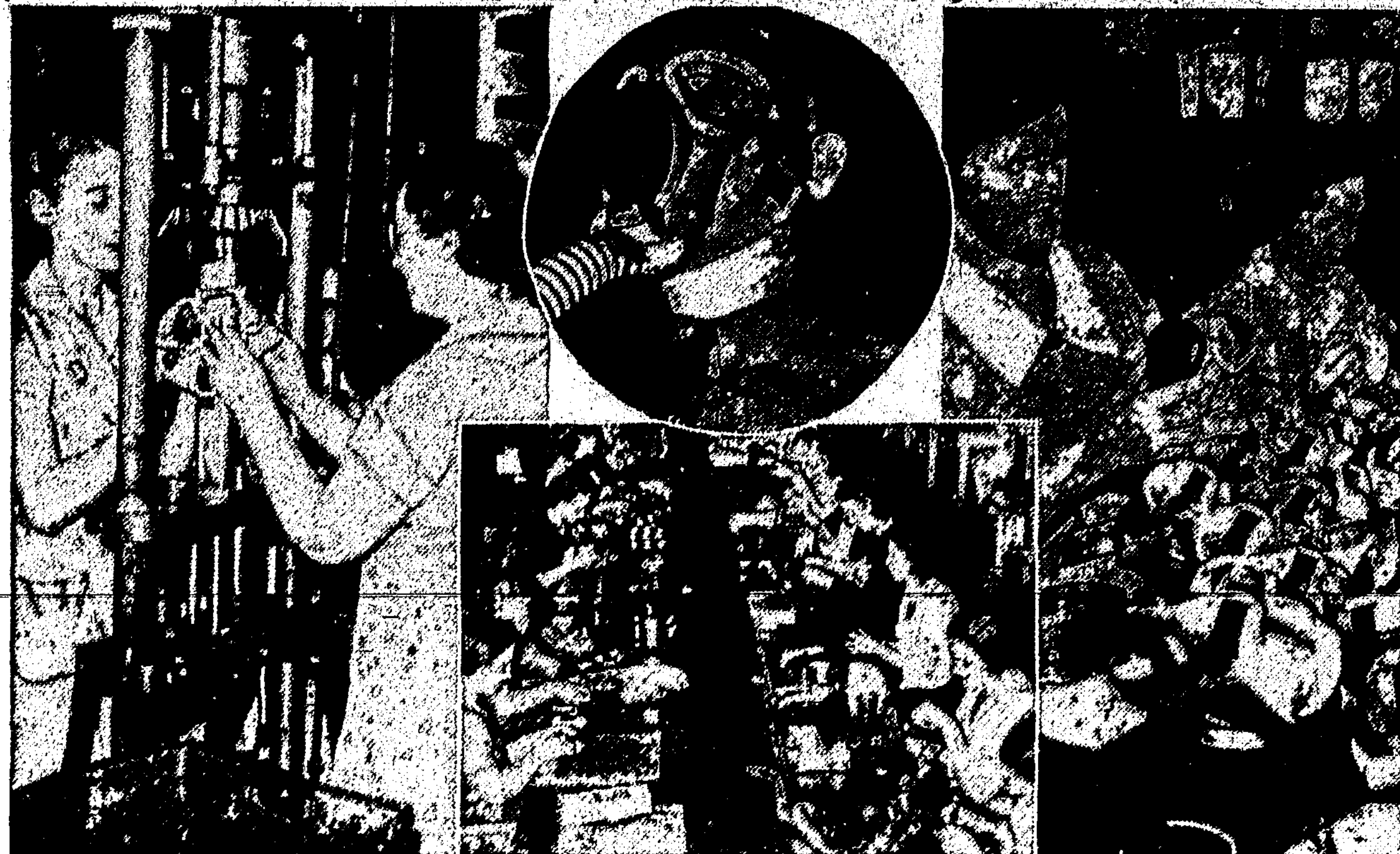

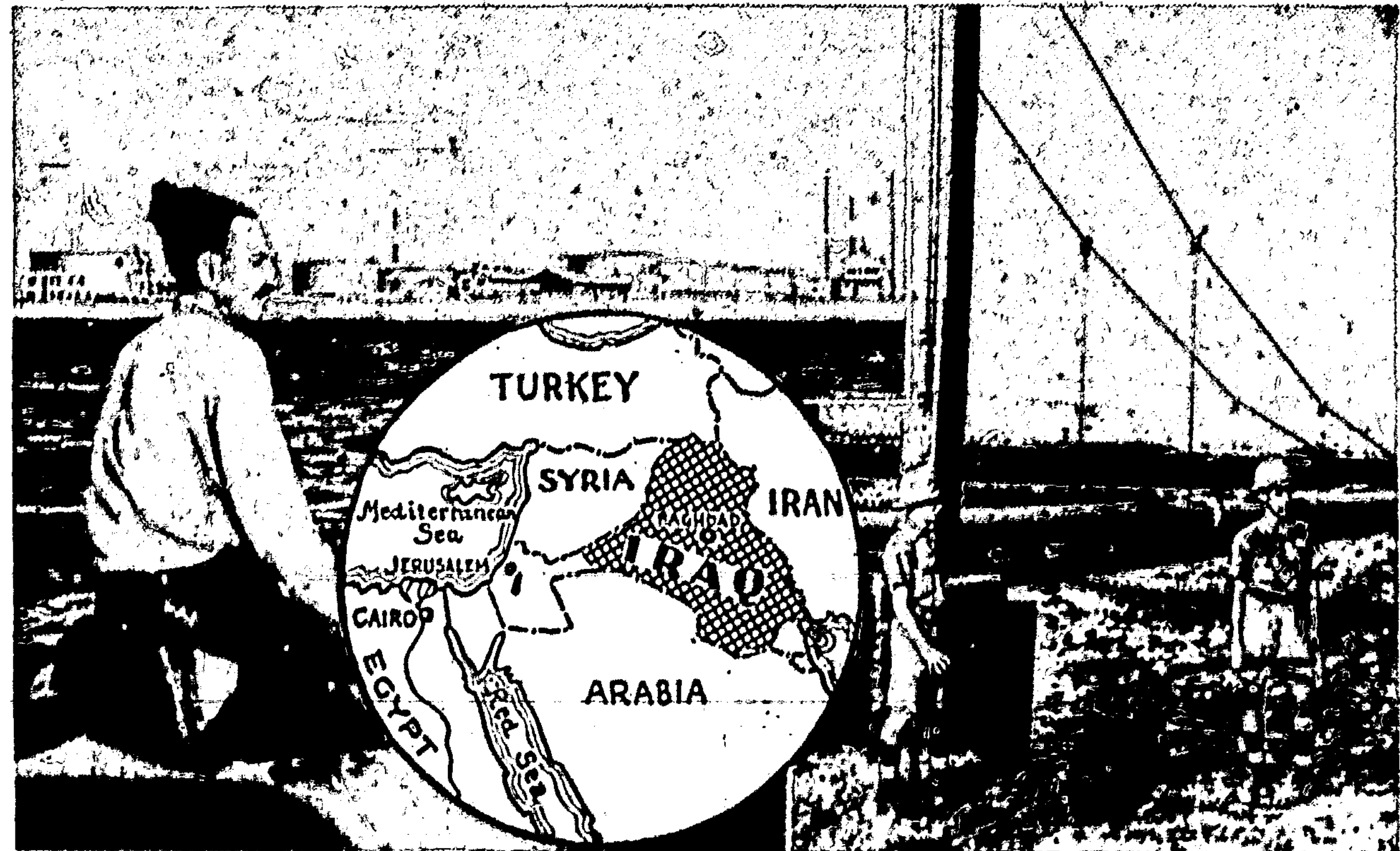

I got reprimmandid for smoking cigarettas while marching. The cap- tin was very sore and sed it was against the rules and he sed it was bad for my lungs also. What made him sore was when I asked him not to worry about my lungs but start worrying about my feet.

Well, mom, now I know why they went over my teeth so carefully in the draft test. I could not under- stand why the doctors made so much fuss about my teeth but it is all clere now since I got some of the beef the army uses in beef stew. The cows they get it from must be half ele- phant, ma. I wish Mr. Nuddson of the defense bored wud do something about getting sharper knives for sol- diers.

If this army life dont do nothing else for me, mom, it will make me appreciate good coffee. I gess they use tobacco leaves for coffee in the army. The boys say the cook dont know how to make coffee which I gess has ben true all through the history of armies and navies and I dont see why the U. S. dont have a secretary of coffee just like a secre- tary of war so a cup of java will taste like a cup of java and not like a hot brake smells.

I still got that chance to join a tank corps like I wrote you but dont worry as they are still using ice wagons for tanks and I wud look pretty going to war in an ice wagon, wudn't I, ma?  
Well this is all for now so I close with love.

## Historical Highlights

**Victims of the Code Duello**  
ON THE morning of March 20, 1820, two American naval officers stood facing each other in a grassy field near the town of Bladensburg, Md., not far from Wash- ington, D. C. They had been ship- mates and friends once but now there was something akin to hatred in their eyes as they looked at each other across the space of eight yards that separated them.

Both men were well above six feet in height. One was about 40 years old, slender and graceful. He was Commodore Stephen Decatur, one of the nation's greatest heroes because of his brilliant exploit in burning the captured frigate Phila- delphia as she lay at anchor in the harbor of Tripoli during the war with the Barbary pirates. The other was about 50 years old, broad- shouldered, his hair a little gray at the temples. He was Commodore

James Barron, who had been court- martialled and suspended from the service for five years because he had surrendered the frigate Chesapeake to the British man-of-war Leopard just before the outbreak of the War of 1812.

A trifling incident had caused the first rift in their friendship. Later Decatur was caustic in his criticism of Barron's conduct in the Chesapeake-Leopard affair and in an exchange of letters which fol- lowed made so many insulting state- ments that Barron eventually chal- lenged him to a duel.

So here they were on this March morning meeting "on the field of

honor." Their friend, Commodore Richard Bainbridge, was to give the words of command—"Fire—one—two—three." Neither man was to fire before the word "one" or after "three."

"Gentlemen, to your places."  
"Take aim!" Decatur leveled his pistol at Barron's waistline and his adversary pointed his weapon at Decatur's hip.

"Fire—one . . ."  
The reports of the two pistols sounded as one and both men dropped to the ground.

They brought a carriage to bear Decatur back to Washington: There was no such vehicle ready for Barron and Decatur insisted that his opponent be taken with him. But there wasn't room for both. As they lifted the young officer into the carriage, Barron called to him, "God bless you, Decatur."

"Farewell, farewell, Barron!" he replied as the carriage rolled away. That was the last time he ever heard Decatur's voice for the gallant young officer, after suffering intense agony all day, died that night. Barron recovered from his wound and lived to be 83 years old, the last of his generation in the navy.

**A Cloud on His Name**  
"James Barron, who had for years been 'Barron of the Chesapeake' now bore the odium of having killed the nation's most popular hero," writes William Oliver Stevens in the chapter, "The Two Commodores" in his book "Pistols at Ten Paces" (pub- lished recently by the Houghton Mif- flin company) upon which this ac- count of the famous duel is based. "To this day the cloud still hangs over his name. He is still 'The Man Who Killed Decatur.'"

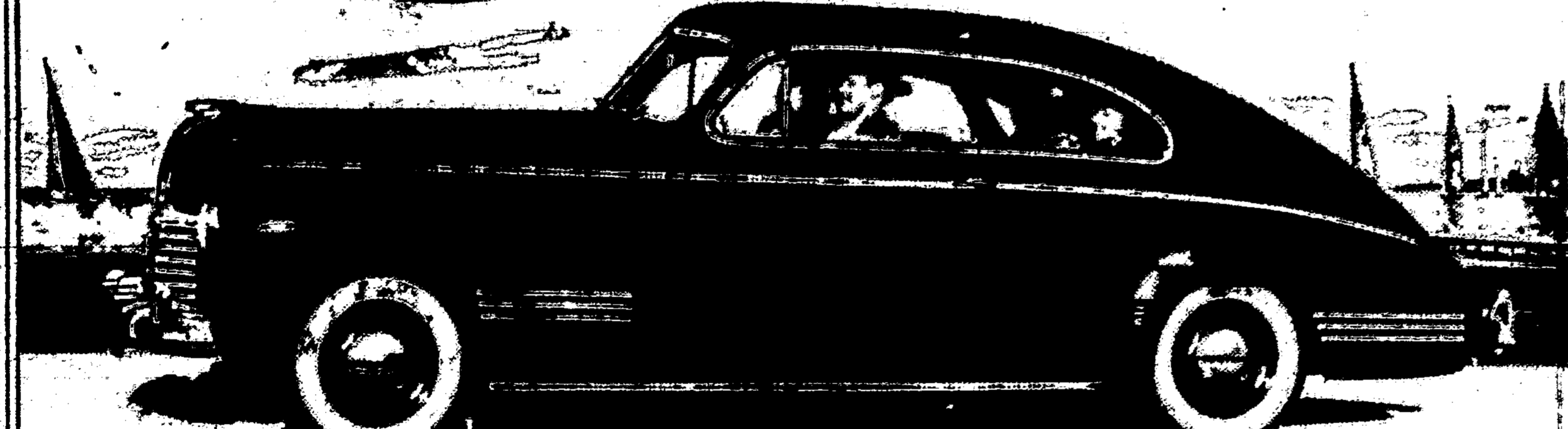
