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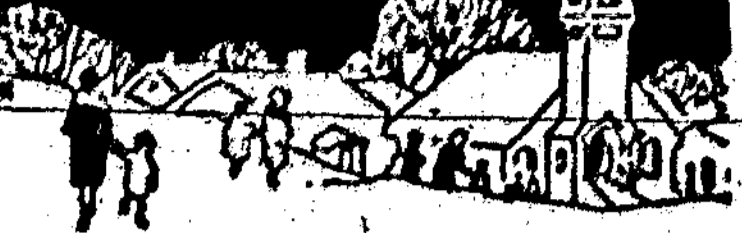

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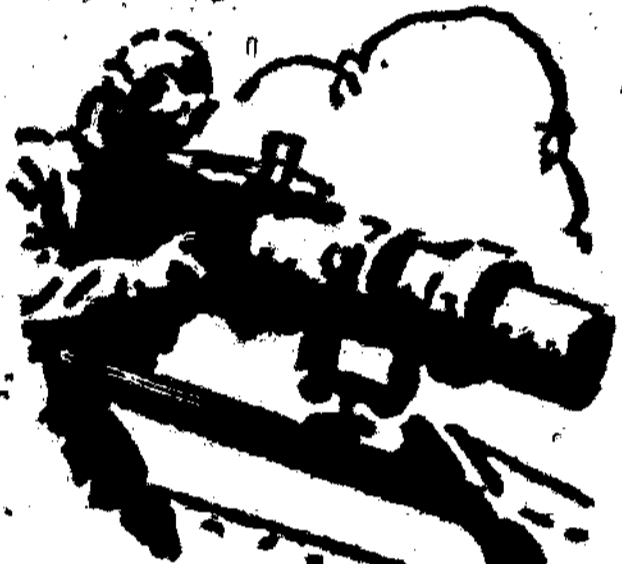
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City of Joazeux d'Arc

ORDINANCE NO. 45
AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE DATE OF ISSUE, MATURITY DATE, INTEREST PAYMENT DATE, REDEMPTION DATE AND THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF REDEMPTION OF AN ISSUE OF ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER REVENUE BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZO AND AMENDING SECTION 3 AND SECTION 4 OF ORDINANCE No. 40 OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZO

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, heretofore adopted its Ordinance No. 40 declaring the necessity of and providing for the issuance of electric light and power revenue bonds for the purpose of acquiring by purchase an electric light and power plant by said Village, and it is now deemed advisable and necessary that the date of issue, maturity date, interest payment date, redemption date and the terms and conditions of redemption as set forth in said Ordinance No. 40 should be modified.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Ordinance No. 40 heretofore adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

Section 3. That said bonds shall be dated June 15, 1942, and shall be numbered 1 to 94, inclusive, and shall be in denominations of \$1,000 each, and shall mature on June 15, as follows: \$3,000 in each of the years 1943 to 1951, inclusive; \$4,000 in each of the years 1952 to 1957, inclusive; \$3,000 in each of the years 1958 to 1963, inclusive; and \$4,000 in each of the years 1963 to 1969, inclusive; on the 15th day of June, A. D. 1970, or on any interest payment date thereafter, the Village may redeem any of said bonds by paying principal and accrued interest thirty (30) days' notice of any redemption prior to maturity shall be given in the First National Bank of Santa Fe, and shall be published once in a newspaper of general circulation in Santa Fe, New Mexico, and all redemptions prior to maturity shall be made in inverse numerical order.

Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of 4 1/2% per annum, payable semi-annually on the 15th days of June and December of each year. Said bonds shall be payable, principal and interest, in lawful money of the United States of America, at the First National Bank of Santa Fe, in Santa Fe, New Mexico, and shall be negotiable coupon bonds payable to bearer, and each of said bonds shall contain a recital that it is issued pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of New Mexico, and particularly under the terms and provisions of Chapter 57 of the Session Laws of the State of New Mexico, 1932, as amended by Chapter 4 of the Special Session Laws of New Mexico, 1934, and Chapter 61 of the Session Laws of New Mexico, 1937, and Chapter 15 of the Session Laws of New Mexico, 1941; Chapter 6 of the Special Session Laws of New Mexico, 1934, as amended, and all other acts thereunto enabling.

It is hereby certified that all the conditions, acts and things required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of New Mexico, to exist, to have happened, and to have been performed, precedent to and in the issuance of this bond, exist, have happened, and have been performed, and that the issue of bonds of which this is one, together with all other indebtedness of said Village of Carrizozo, is within every debt and other limit prescribed by the Constitution and Laws of the State of New Mexico.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, The Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, has caused this bond to be signed by its Mayor, sealed with its corporate seal, attested by the Clerk, and the coupons hereto annexed to be signed with the facsimile signature of the Village Treasurer, this 18th day of June, A. D. 1942.
