

'Sniff Sets' for Air Raid Precautions



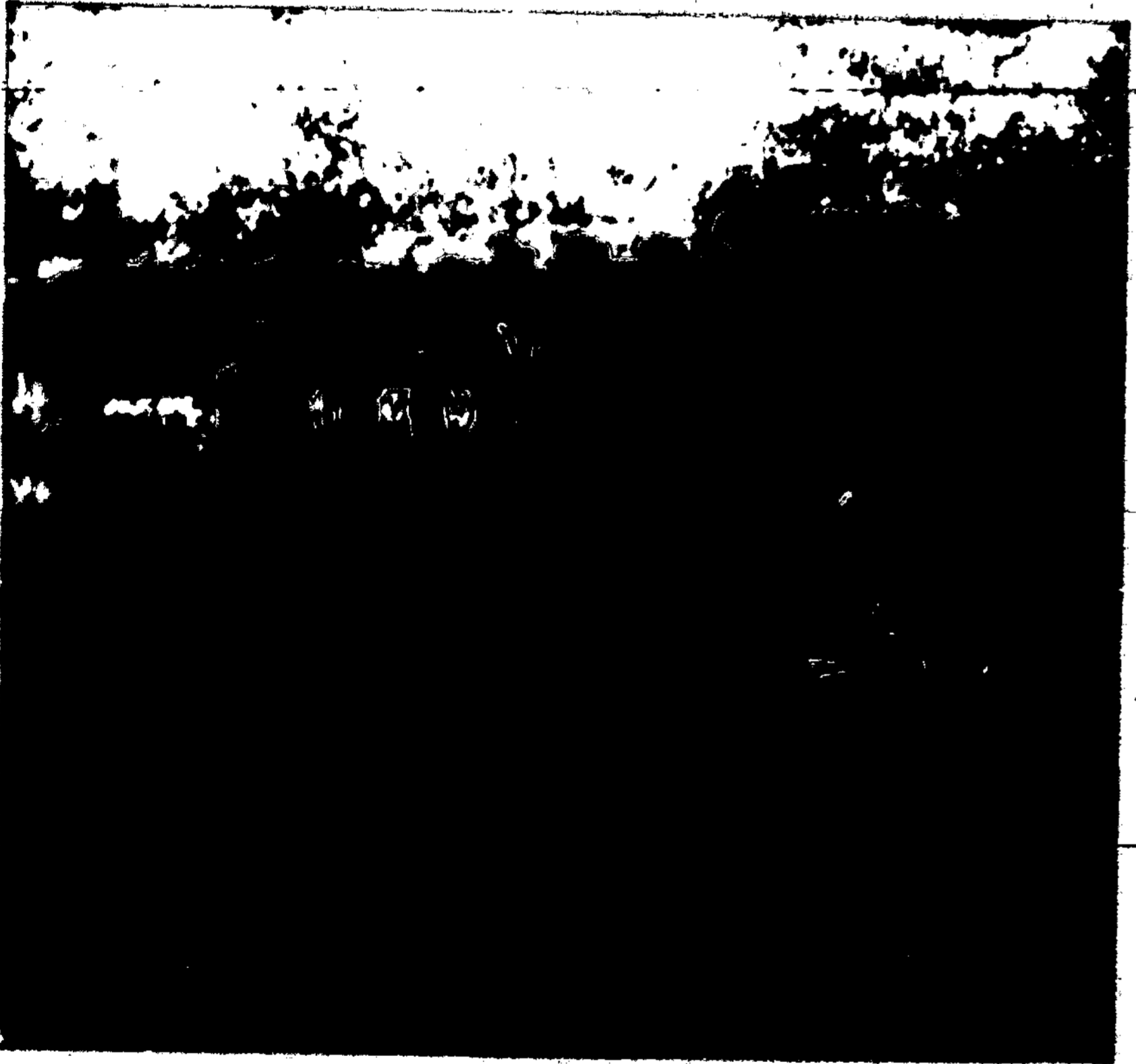

Lights of New York

Underground: It is possible to ride in New York's subways 40 miles or more for an expenditure of only five cents. But this transportation bargain has a drawback—there isn't any scenery. Stations are pretty much alike and while the train bangs along, all there is to be seen is a dingy wall unwinding like a roll of dirty ribbon, signal lights of various kinds, emergency exits and now and then a lantern-equipped trackwalker with his body pressed tightly into some niche only a foot or so from destruction. Nevertheless, war which does so many strange things, has driven New York sightseers into the subways. Instead of riding from one point of interest to another in big busses as they did in the past, they now travel in the subway with the barker acting as the bell wether. He doesn't wear a bell, however. Instead he informs his flock of his whereabouts by constantly jingling a pocket full of nickels.

Frequently arguments occur over the meaning of happenings in various parts of the world and so hot do they become and such throngs collect to listen to the disputants, as well as to take sides, that the police have to go into action. The disputants melted away with grins.

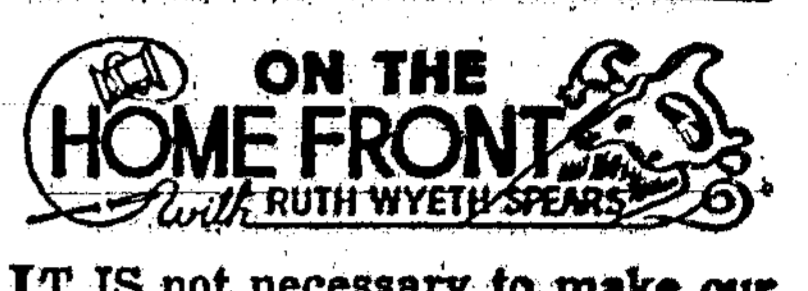

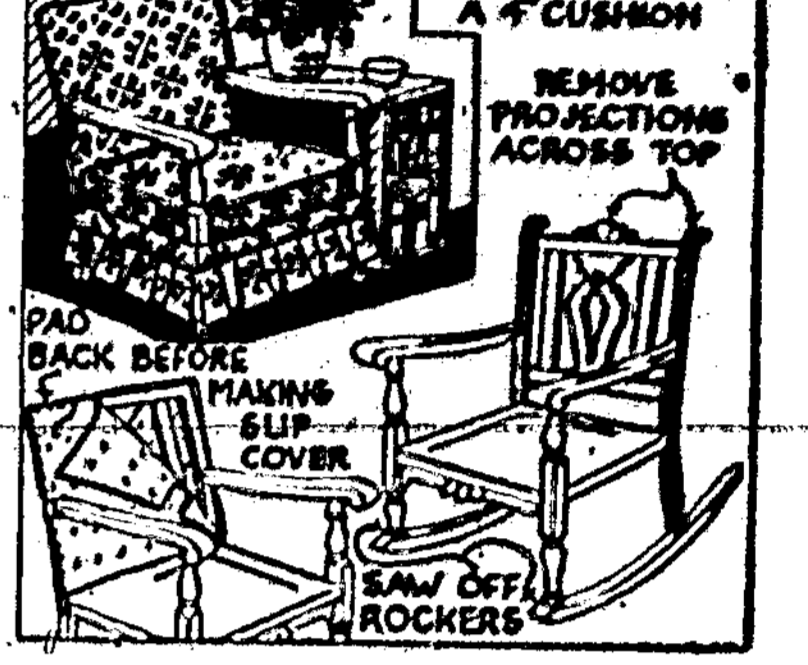

We hope as many as possible will make the opportunity to visit our model School Kitchen and Lunch Room. It shows what a community can do when the people pull together.

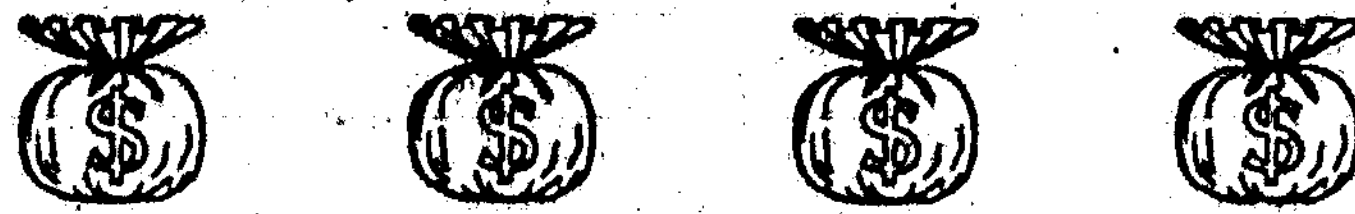

D. 1942, of a General Election to be held throughout Lincoln County, New Mexico, Tuesday, November 3, A. D. 1942, the purpose is to elect persons to the various Offices hereinafter named.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11
Approved April 18, 1941
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION THREE (3) ARTICLE FOUR (4) OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR THE NUMBER, QUALIFICATION AND APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.
Section 1. That it is hereby proposed to amend Section 3, of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, to read as follows:
"Section 3. The Senate shall consist of one Senator from each county of the State, and in the event the number of counties is hereafter increased or decreased, the number of Senators shall be increased or decreased accordingly at the next ensuing election of Senators after such change.
"Until changed by law as hereinafter provided the House of Representatives shall consist of one Representative for each eleven thousand, or major fraction thereof, of the inhabitants within each county as shown by the census of the United States next preceding the election of such Representatives; provided, however, that each county of the State shall, regardless of population, be entitled to at least one Representative. Immediately after the adoption of this Amendment, and immediately after the publication of each census of the United States, hereafter taken, the Secretary of State shall certify to the governing authority of each County the number of inhabitants within such county as shown by said census, and the officials proclaiming the election shall designate the number of representatives to be elected from such county. Provided, however, no county shall at any time be allotted more than five members of the House of Representatives.
At its first session after the publication of any United States census, hereafter taken, the Legislature may change the number of inhabitants required in a county for each Representative from eleven thousand, as hereinafter provided, to such greater number as the Legislature shall deem proper, provided, that each county shall have at least one Representative as hereinafter provided.
The members of the Legislature shall be qualified electors of their respective counties and residents of New Mexico for at least three years next preceding their election. Senators shall be not less than twenty-five years and Representatives not less than twenty-one years of age at the time of their election. No person shall be eligible to the Legislature who, at the time of qualifying holds any office of trust or profit under the state, county or national government, except notaries public, officers or employees of municipalities, and officers of the militia who receive no salary."
Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the general election in November 1943 or at any special election held prior thereto.
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2
Approved April 16, 1941
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTIONS 28 AND 10, ARTICLE 4 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, WHICH SHALL EXTEND THE PRESENT PROVISION OF SAID SECTION, SO AS TO ALSO PROHIBIT THE APPOINTMENT OR EMPLOYMENT OF ANY MEMBER OF THE LEGISLATURE TO OR IN ANY PUBLIC OFFICE OR EMPLOYMENT, THE COMPENSATION OF WHICH IS PAID FROM ANY PUBLIC FUNDS; AND TO INCREASE THE COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. That it is hereby proposed by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico, that Sections 28 and 10, Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, be amended by the people of said State so as to read as follows, to-wit:
Section 28. No member of the Legislature shall, during the term for which he was elected, be appointed to or employed in any civil or public office, public capacity or employment within the State, in which the compensation or remuneration is to be paid, in whole or in part, from any public funds of the State or of any of its institutions, agencies, municipalities or other political subdivisions; nor shall he, within one year thereafter, be appointed to any civil or public office created, or the emoluments of which were increased during such term; nor shall any member of the Legislature during the term for which he was elected nor within one year thereafter, be interested directly or indirectly in any contract with the State or any municipality or any other political subdivision thereof, which was authorized by any law passed during such term.
"Section 10. Each member of the Legislature shall receive as compensation for his services the sum of one thousand dollars annually and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the usual traveled route, once each session, and he shall receive no other compensation, perquisites or allowance."
Section 11. In the event of the passage and approval of this resolution proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be substituted to the electors of the State at the next general election.

1 package lemon-flavored gelatin
1 cup boiling water
2 1/2 cups grated American cheese or 1/2 lb. sliced, packaged variety
1/4 cup Pet Milk

1/2 cup bottled mayonnaise or salad dressing
2 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup cooked, dried prunes

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Let stand while preparing the following: Mix together cheese and milk. Stir and cook over boiling water until cheese melts and mixture is smooth. Remove from heat and stir in gelatin mixture gradually. Let stand. Mix together mayonnaise, vinegar and salt. Stir into gelatin mixture. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Meanwhile, rub with vegetable oil a mold holding about 6 cups. Drain prunes and remove pits. Cut half of prunes into quarters and arrange in bottom of mold. Cut remaining prunes into small pieces and fold into chilled gelatin mixture. Put into prepared mold. Chill until firm. Turn out on lettuce or other salad greens if desired. Serves 6.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8
Approved April 4, 1941
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
That the following Amendment to the Constitution of the State of New Mexico is hereby proposed to be added at the end of ARTICLE XXIV thereof and known as PARAGRAPH (A) thereof and entitled:

CONTRACTS RELATING TO GRAZING AND AGRICULTURAL LEASES UPON STATE LANDS.
to be submitted to the electors of the State at the next general election when and after the Congress of the United States shall consent thereto
PARAGRAPH (A), ARTICLE XXIV
Leases for grazing and agricultural purposes on lands granted or confirmed to the State of New Mexico by the Act of Congress of June 20, 1910, entitled "An Act enabling the people of New Mexico to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the union on an equal footing with the rest of the states," may be made under such provisions relating to the necessity or requirements for or the mode and manner of the appraisal, advertisement and competitive bidding, and containing such terms and provisions as may be provided by Act of the Legislature, the rentals and other proceeds therefrom to be applied and conserved in accordance with the provisions of said Act of Congress for the support or in aid of the common schools or for the attainment of the respective purposes for which these several grants of land were made.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10
Approved April 15, 1941
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE STAGGERED TERMS FOR BOARDS OF REGENTS FOR THE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. That Section 12 of Article XII of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended to read as follows:
"The legislature shall provide for the control and management of each of said institutions by a board of regents for each institution, consisting of five members, who shall be qualified electors of the State of New Mexico, no more than three of whom at the time of their appointment shall be members of the same political party. The Governor shall nominate and by and with the consent of the senate shall appoint the members of each board of regents for each of said institutions. The terms of said members shall be for six years, provided that of the five first appointed the terms of two shall

be for two years, the terms of two shall be for four years and the term of one shall be for six years. The Governor, after hearing had on specific charges, may remove any member of any board of regents of any of said institutions, for incompetency, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. Any member so removed, within ten days after the order of removal has been served upon him, may appeal to the Supreme Court of New Mexico, which shall hear, and determine the charges de novo and its decision shall be final. An order of removal made by the Governor shall operate as a suspension of such member during the period allowed for appeal, and if an appeal be taken, during the pendency of such appeal.
Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the general election in November, 1942.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 5
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11
Approved April 14, 1941
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION FIVE (5), ARTICLE FOUR (4) OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, TO DIVIDE THE REGULAR SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE INTO A FIRST AND SECOND TERM, IN ORDER TO EXPEDITE THE BUSINESS OF THE LEGISLATURE.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. That it is hereby proposed to amend Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, so as to read, as follows:
"Section 5. Each regular session of the Legislature shall begin at 12:00 noon on the second Tuesday of January next after each general election and shall remain in session not to exceed sixty days. Such session shall be divided into a first term of twenty days and a second term of forty days, with a recess of thirty days between such terms. During the first term, all bills to be considered at the session shall be introduced, read not more than twice by title or in full, printed, and referred to the appropriate committee. No bill shall be placed upon its third reading or finally passed during its first term, except appropriations for expenses of the legislature and such measures as shall be submitted for immediate legislative action by the Governor accompanied by a special message setting forth the facts making such action necessary for the general welfare.
During the second term of such session, all bills introduced at the first term shall stand for final action at the second term. Notwithstanding any provision of any section of this constitution to the contrary, no bill shall be introduced at the second term except appropriations for expenses of the legislature, the general appropriations bills, bills to provide for the current expenses of the Government, committee substitutes for bills introduced at the first term, and such measures as may be submitted by the Governor, accompanied by a special message showing necessity for legislative

action. The members of the legislature shall be allowed their mileage for attending both the first and second terms of the legislature. No special session of the legislature shall exceed thirty days.
Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this Resolution, proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the general election to be held in November, 1942.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 6
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12
Approved April 12, 1941
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO BY ADDING THERETO A NEW SECTION TO BE NUMBERED SECTION 14, CREATING THE NEW MEXICO EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS BOARD.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. That Article XII of the State Constitution be amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered Section 14, and to read as follows:
"Section 14. There is hereby established the New Mexico Educational Institutions Board, consisting of five (5) members, whose qualifications may be prescribed by law. The Board shall consist of five (5) members appointed by the Governor, confirmed by the Senate, and who shall be removable only for cause, as provided by law for the removal of officers not subject to impeachment. Upon the taking effect of this section, the Governor shall appoint the said members for terms of office as follows: two for a term of two years, two for a term of four years, and one for a term of six years. Any appointment to fill a vacancy shall be for the balance of the term only. Except as above designated, the term of office of said members shall be six years or until their successors are appointed and qualified.
"The members shall constitute a coordinating board of control for all State educational institutions described in Section 11 of Article XII of the State Constitution,

with the following specific powers: (1) It shall prescribe standards of higher education applicable to each institution; (2) it shall determine the functions and courses of study in each of the institutions to conform to the standards prescribed; (3) it shall grant degrees and other forms of academic recognition for completion of the prescribed courses in all of such institutions; (4) it shall recommend to the State Legislature the budget allocations to each institution.
"The appropriations made by the Legislature for all such institutions shall be made in consolidated form without reference to any particular institution and the New Mexico Educational Institutions Board herein created shall allocate said funds to each institution according to its needs and functions."
