Cattlemen Postpone

Quarterly Meeting

Albuquerque, N. M., Dec. 28 1942, Tom Clayton, President of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association, today declared that the Executive Committee of the Association has voted to postpone the Third Quarterly Executive Board meeting, scheduled to be held at Santa Fe sometime in January.

In view of transportation difficulties and the need to conserve tires, and because of an acute ranch labor shortage throughout the state, Clayton stated, the Executive Committee meeting will be held the evening before the Annual Convention at Albuquerque in March, 1943. Date of the Annual Meeting will be announced early in January.

Cattle growers throughout the state are today being called upon to maintain and increase production of beef with less manpower than ever before, Clayton said, and this together with additional war time problems confronting all ranchers is making the cattle business a twenty-four-hour-a-day job.

The Legislative Committee of the Cattle Association, consisting of twelve members and headed by Burton Roach, State Senator from Hillsboro will probably be called together at Santa Fe the latter part of January, Clayton said.

## 1943 Farm Machinery Quotas

Following is a complete list of the 1943 farm machinery quotas allotted Lincoln County by the USDA State War Board:

R. & planters (tractor drawn), 1; Planters, 1; Moldboard Plows, (tractor drawn) 2; Spiked tooth harrows, 1; Disk Harrows, 2; Cultivators, (tractor drawn) 2; Tractors (wheel type), 1; Farm Wagons, 2; Separators, 2; Bean Harvesters, 2; Mowers (horse), 1.

In addition to the machinery listed under the quota basis, windmills, irrigation equipment, and certain type of other equipment and machinery which is now in the hands of dealers, may be obtained through the County Farm Machinery Rationing Committee.

The committee is withholding action on machinery issued under the quota basis until those interested have an opportunity to file their applications. The machinery then will be issued on a production and necessity basis. Those needing machinery of any type should file their application with L. D. Merchant, Bryan Hightower, or W. F. Coe, members of the committee; or make application at the office of the County Extension Agent, in Carrizozo,

### DIRECTIVE 49

An order issued to the petroleum industry by the Office of Petroleum Coordination virtually socializes the oil industry. The order is known as Directive 59. Under it, the competition which stimulated development of the oil industry to undreamed of heights of public service has been abandoned. Progress has been frozen and henceforth the resources of the oil industry will be pooled under government control.

As a representative from one company pointed out, the industry gladly contributes its facilities to be used in the common effort, adding that no one would count the cost—in money or constitutional liberties.

### Selective Service

Chief Specialists W. Carlos Powell and Ned Cooper Gold of the Navy recruiting station at Santa Fe were in Carrizozo Tuesday conferring with county selective service officials.

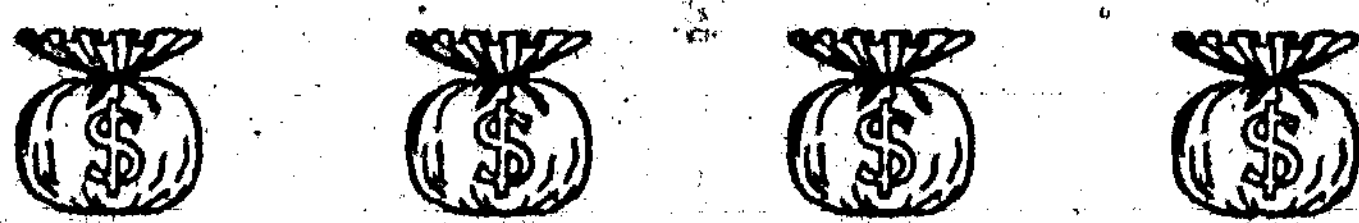

**Over-38 Soldiers Must Ask for Discharges Themselves**

Employers and soldiers themselves must initiate action to obtain honorable discharges from the Army of over-38 soldiers to return to essential jobs in war industries and agriculture. J. R. McCusker, regional director of the War Manpower Commission, announces. In order to obtain discharge of such men the soldier must voluntarily request discharge in writing to his immediate commanding officer, and must present satisfactory evidence that he will be employed in an essential war industry, including agriculture, if he is discharged.

**Commercial Tire Inspection Before Jan. 15**

Trucks and other commercial vehicles must be presented for tire inspection before Jan. 15, the Office of Defense Transportation warns. A commercial motor vehicle may not lawfully be operated after that date without an endorsement by an approved inspector on the vehicle's certificate of war necessity.
