## Americans Should Support Constitution

Republicans of southern and eastern New Mexico have taken a new lease on political ambitions as a possible profit from the growing discord among Democrats, not only in the nation but in this state. A sort of coalition group got together in Roswell and talked over possibilities of upsetting Democratic dominance in New Mexico. Remembering the repugnance of Democrats for the opposition party's label, the group decided to name their organization the "Club on Constitutional Government." They offer recalcitrant Democrats "an instrument through which persons interested in good government through constitutionally means and opposed to the New Deal can unite to return government of the people and by the people to the United States." x x x There is an unrest everywhere among Democrats that will culminate in a larger insurgency than has ever occurred in that party if the opportunity can be afforded to effect a change. x x x In New Mexico the Democratic party organization has been definitely weakened by wholesale desertions from the present leadership. The expected political acumen of Gov. Dempsey has not materialized. x x x

The Republicans a considerable dent in the Democratic armor in the last general election. They know that a lot more has to be done before they can expect more than local or district success. What they lacked in the last several elections was organization. Now they are making an effort to set up a working machine which will get the votes both from the faithful Republicans and from the insurgent Democrats. Such coalition as that proposed by the "Club on Constitutional Government" will contribute a lot to the Republican chances for success in November. —Las Vegas Optic.

even a peep-hole into the doings of that body. If you think this is just the Outlook saying that, let us quote the official information as given out in Tuesday's message concerning the meeting: "The delegates found seclusion under an armed guard of 200 soldiers which has been assigned to keep newsmen out of the conference and such newswriters were given the impression that the order came direct from the President of the United States."

Therefore, the conference has a two-fold meaning. First to load the classmate with financial gain from the killing and second to choke the press from knowing what goes on so that "we the people" will be kept in ignorance as to the results. Judge Marvin, chairman of our delegation said he had no power to change that order.

Will the reader pause long enough to visualize the situation? What has become of our proud boasts about freedom of the press? The reporters, the message said, would be allowed rables on the lawn, but would not be allowed to converse with any delegates. Not slowly, but hastily, we are drifting into dictatorship. This order binding and gagging of the press, which is the voice and advice of the people of this country, will be followed by more drastic measures against liberties, which we have for many years enjoyed. There is yet time for the people to awaken from their Rip Van Winkle sleep.

## U. S. to Help Girls Entertain 'Dates'

Washington, May 16th: — The Government is going to provide places for girls to entertain their "dates"—if they can get dates in this city of many women and few single men.

Plans for the newest of residence halls, for women who work in Government jobs, call for construction of "dating booths."

The booths, to be arranged about a dance-floor, will resemble those found in drug stores, said the National Housing Administration which prepared the plans.

## The Farmer's Wife

Southwest farmers, hiring laborers imported from Mexico, have even been told by the Farm Security Administration what to feed them.

According to the FSA instructions, butter is to be served at each meal. Bacon squares or meat in some form for breakfast six times per week and ham one time per week. Eggs should be served every morning and no limit placed on the number consumed. . . . Always give sweet potatoes at dinner and supper when they are reasonable since the Mexicans like them. Serve cooked cereals only, not corn flakes. Usually try to have only corn bread at dinner; biscuits and white bread at supper. Sometimes white bread is required at dinner and supper as well. In the summer, iced tea or root beer should be served."

This is the first time, to our knowledge, the United States Government has told the farmer's wife what to cook.

## John Fargaros Found Dead

Word was received Tuesday morning from Ancho that a man by the name of John Fargaros, 80, had been found dead on one of the ranches belonging to Bryan Hightower. Sheriff Stover being out of town, Deputy Sheriff Nick Vega, Elferdo Chavez, Justice of the Peace, who acted as coroner, and A. L. Burke, Associated Press reporter, went to Ancho, where a coroner's jury was empanelled and proceeded to the ranch about 8 miles west of Ancho, where they found the body of John Fargaros, who had according to the Jury's verdict, died from natural causes. The body was found by Mr. Hightower, who had been on a tour of his ranch interests and found the body Tuesday morning.

John Fargaros was a native of Denmark and came to this country about 40 years ago and took up a homestead adjoining the ranch on which he died, afterwards selling his land to Mr. Hightower, since which time, he was employed by the owner. The funeral was held at Ancho Wednesday and the remains interred in the Ancho cemetery.

Rev. N. T. James, pastor of the Carrizozo Baptist Church, had charge of the funeral services.

John Fargaros was a quiet, unassuming sort of a man and had many friends among the ranchmen of the Ancho country. Of late years, on account of his advanced age, he was not able to do much ranch work and Mr. Hightower is to be commended on his many acts of kindness extended to the old ranchman.

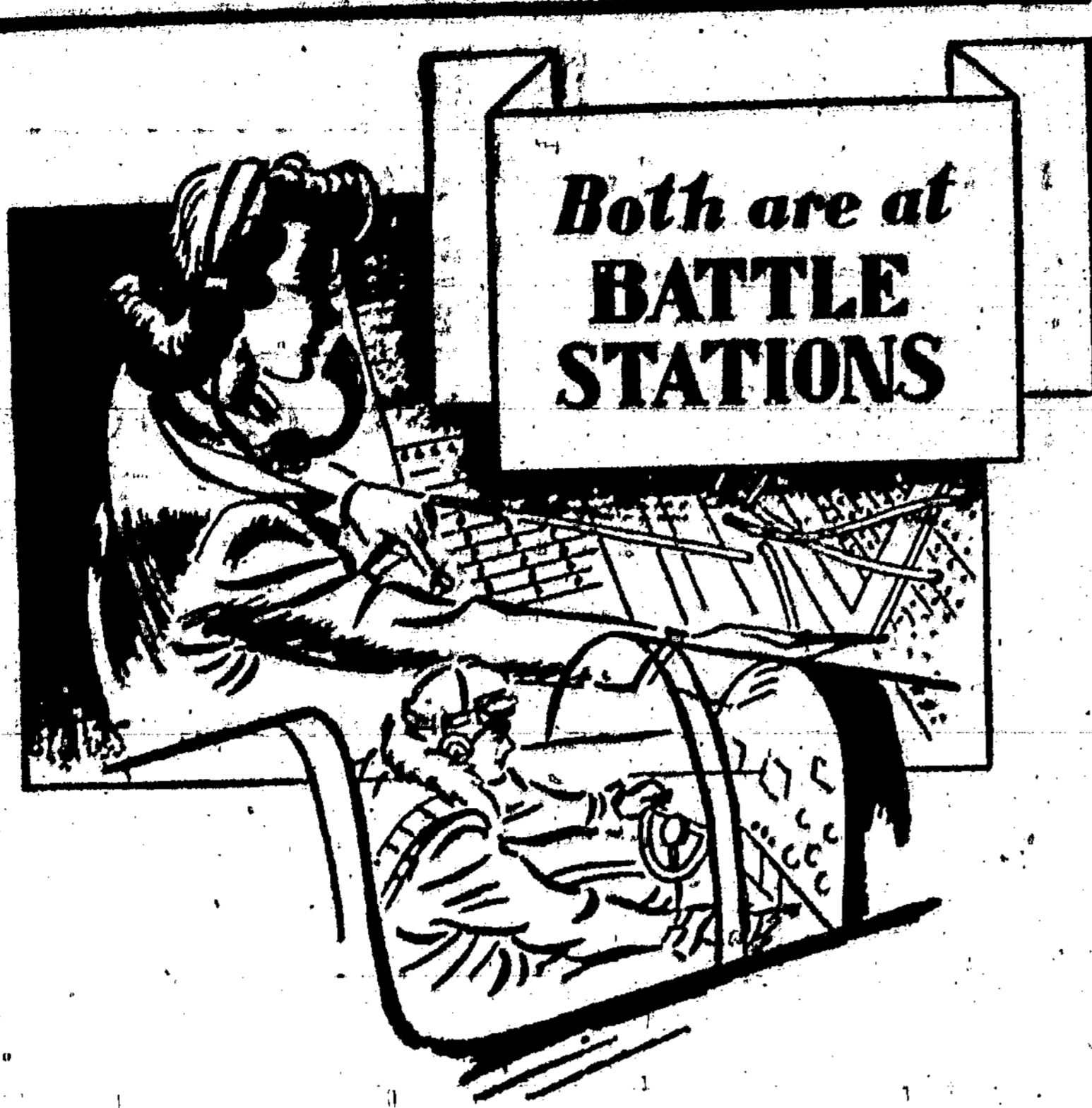

Therefore, in accordance with this latest ruling, messages may not be sent to men in the armed forces missing in action Unless Official Notification has been received That They Are Prisoners of War.

However, this change in Red Cross procedure will not interfere with communications between officially listed as prisoners of war or as civilian internees and their relatives.

In The Matter of Establishing a License Rate For Dispensers, Retailers, and Club Vendors of Alcoholic Liquors.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, that all persons proposing to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors outside of the corporate districts in the County of Lincoln and who have qualified under the provisions of the Liquor Control Act, Chapter 61, Laws of New Mexico, 1941 Statutes Annotated, and all acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and who have as a condition precedent hereto secured proper license from the Bureau of Revenue, Division of Liquor Control of the State of New Mexico, may apply to this body of County Commissioners through the office of the County Clerk in Carrizozo, New Mexico, for license to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors in the following designations:

Dispensers License for the sale of all alcoholic liquors, Retailers License for the sale of all alcoholic liquors in package form, and Club Licenses for the sale of all alcoholic liquors, IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the said Board of County Commissioners hereby designates and prescribes license fees to be paid to the County of Lincoln as follows:

Dispenser's License \$250.00.  
Retailer's License \$200.00.  
Club License \$250.00.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the license tax period shall begin July first of each year and end June Thirtieth of the following year and that the full amount of said yearly license tax fee is due and payable on the date of issuance of the license for the license year, or balance of year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any violation of the terms of this resolution shall be sufficient for the suspension or revocation of said license by this body.

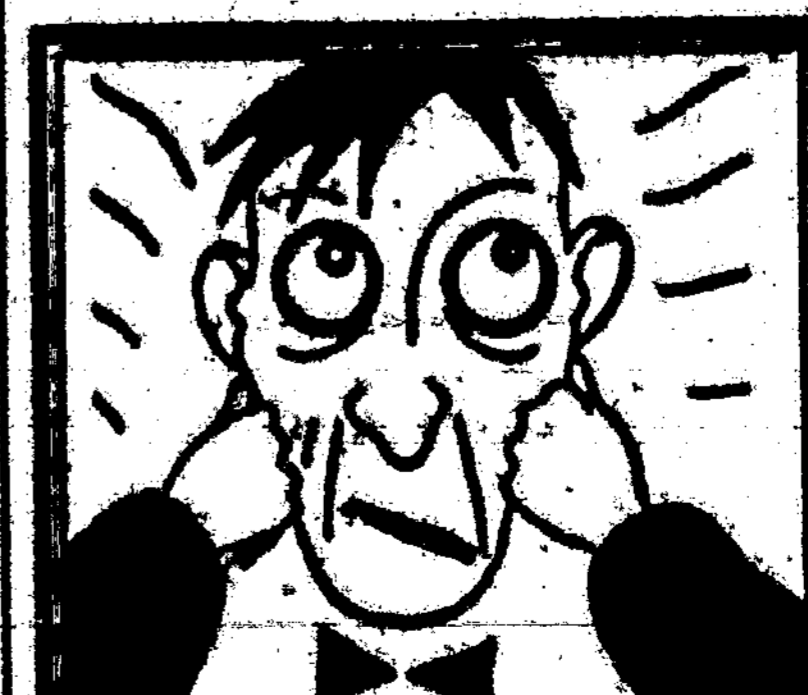

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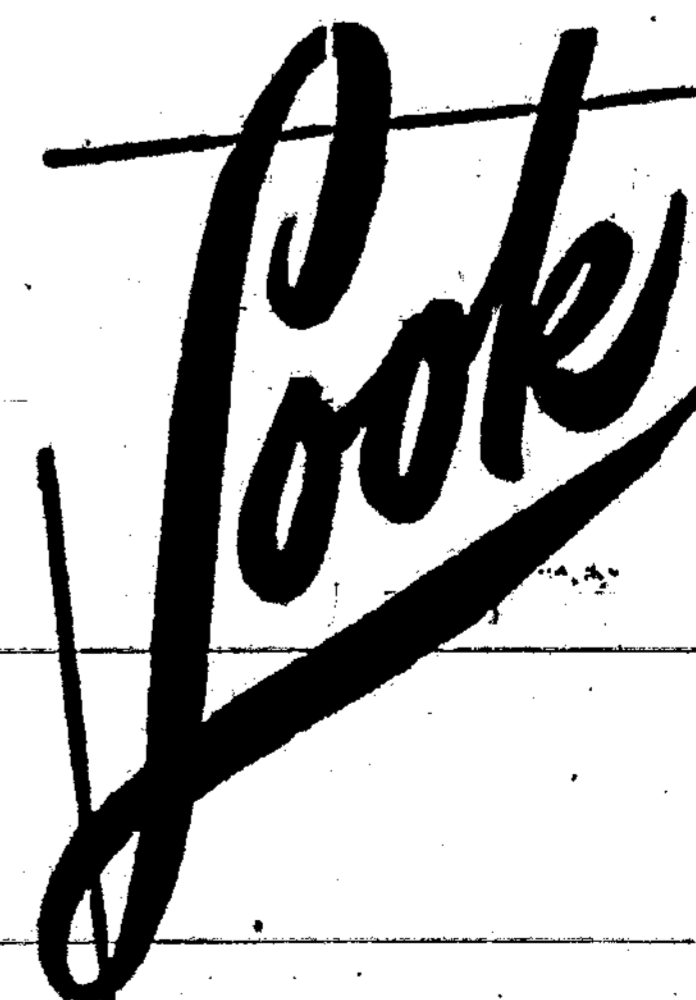

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### THAT MEETING HERE

"Discontent of many Democrats toward New Deal policies which has been apparent throughout the nation has come to the surface in New Mexico through a 'Club on Constitutional Government', pledged to oppose the New Deal and 'to return government to the people and by the people'.

"The club is the outgrowth of a recently formed Southern New Mexico Republican club which at its second meeting in Roswell on Sunday, changed its name to welcome into its ranks dissatisfied Democrats. It had as one speaker State Senator Mullins, long prominent in Chavez county Democratic circles, who called on the meeting 'to destroy bureaucracy and to return the government to the people'.

"The Republicans of the state have kept up their political activity since the last election and have formed clubs in various parts of the state to further the interests of their party. This post-election activity will be enhanced by the turn taken at the Roswell meeting if it is followed up in other parts of the state and Democrats in any number join up in an anti-New Deal fight.

"The Democratic organization hasn't recovered from its factional fight. Gov. Dempsey in his first months in office hasn't

affected party solidarity. In fact, discontent in state circles is quite apparent. This, combined with the dissatisfaction on national policies, gives the Republicans an opportunity to regain ground lost in the state following the first Roosevelt landslide. The election, of course is many months distant, but the political currents are ominous and bode trouble for the Democratic party. It might be suggested that business-like and good state government would do more to offset the rising Republican tide in the state than pandering to political cliques and loading of state payrolls with deadhead politicians, of which voters have grown sick. Efficiency and economy would be a remedy to apply in the state to overcome some of the discontent over national Democratic policies."—Roswell Record.
