Current Social Security Board Report Visualizes Coverage of Added Millions

Benefits Outlined For Farm Help, Domestic

Our social security program as a nation-wide undertaking began eight years ago this August. In its seventh annual report the Social Security board points out that while great progress has been made toward security for the American people, there are serious gaps in the program as it stands.

While many millions of people are covered by the insurance features of the social security act, other millions are not. More than half a million are regularly drawing monthly insurance benefits amounting in all to about 1 1/2 million dollars a month.

The name in true of unemployment insurance. Millions of people are covered by the state unemployment insurance laws, operated by the states but with administrative costs paid by the federal government.

But when the war is over, millions of former soldiers, sailors and war workers will be looking for jobs. Many will be entitled to unemployment insurance while they are looking.

Under the public assistance programs of the social security act, three million needy people are receiving monthly cash payments which last year amounted to more than \$770,000,000.

Most serious, however, according to the social security board, are the gaps and shortcomings in the insurance features. The purpose of these programs is to furnish some income for families to live on when the breadwinner cannot earn wages or salary.



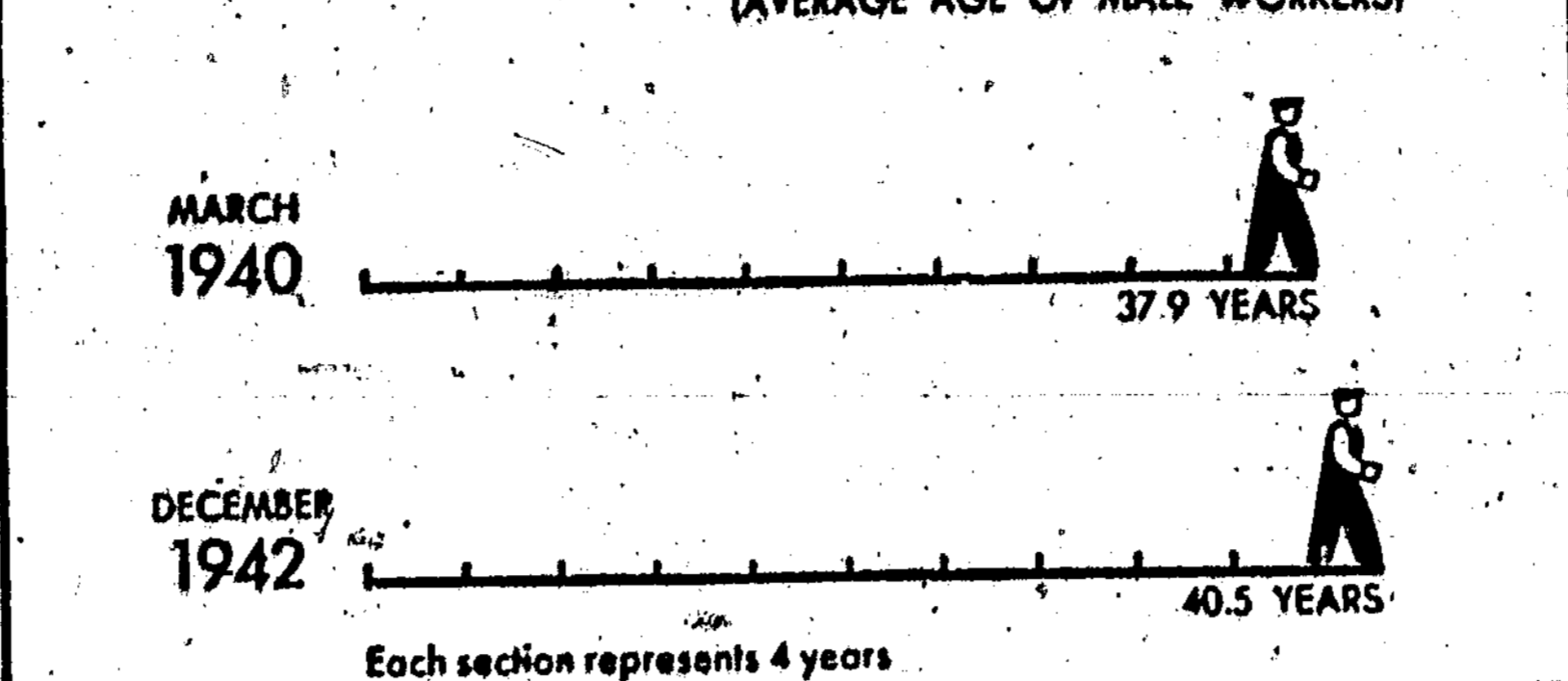
When a worker loses his income through sickness or injury, he generally is unable to support his family for long, after he is unemployed. Frequently he must meet heavy medical costs, so his savings are soon exhausted.

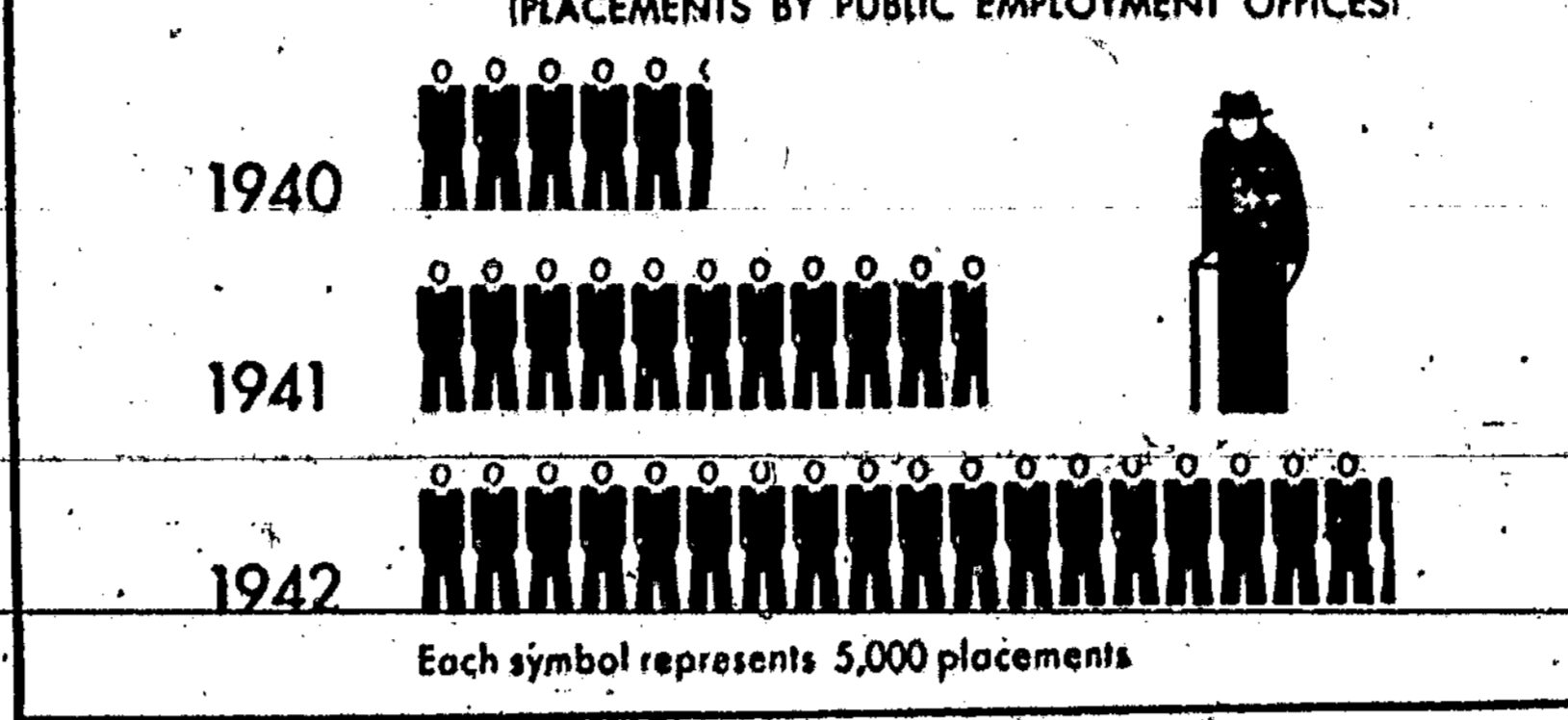
The social security board recommends expansion of the present social security program to provide: 1. Social insurance protection for everybody who depends on wages or salary.

pay check stop but he has the extra expense of his illness. The social security board thinks we should have insurance against disability and the costs of hospital care, along with our present unemployment insurance and old-age and survivors insurance.

About 20 million workers, including some of the lowest income groups in the country, are not covered by the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the social security act.

More than 600,000 persons already are drawing monthly payments under old-age and survivors insurance. Thousands more have earned rights to benefits and will be able to claim them whenever they stop regular work.

As the law stands today, the old-age and survivors insurance system covers wage and salary workers on business and industrial jobs—that is, all kinds of jobs in factories, shops, mines, mills, stores, offices, banks, hotels, restaurants, laundries, telephone and telegraph offices, and other places of business or industry.

When a Worker is Disabled. Every time the clock ticks off a second, five people in this country get hurt or get sick, to such an extent that they are unable to carry on their ordinary activities for one day or longer.

Yet the big majority of workers disabled off the job have no insurance protection—nothing to make up, even in part, for the pay they lose and the extra expense they have to meet.

Disability insurance is one of the missing girders in the social insurance structure we have been building in this country since 1935.

3. Assistance to all-needy people who have no means of support. "This is one case," said President Roosevelt, "in which social and fiscal objectives, war and post-war aims are in full accord."

CRACKED BOILERS

IT IS not uncommon for a home owner to be startled by the cracking of a boiler during the idle season. With the boiler out of commission, there seems no reason for excuse for such a calamity.

Shellac for Floors Question: Shellac is recommended for hardwood floors, with scatter rugs. But from my experience with shellac, I conclude that good spar varnish would be better. What do you think?

Scorched Rug Question: In taking a kerosene stain from an old Persian rug it was covered with brown paper and ironed. But the iron was too hot and the rug was scorched. What will remove the mark? Answer: The scorch mark is actual damage to the tips of the fibers of the rug. One way to take out the mark is to rub gently with medium to coarse emery cloth.

Wood Shingles Question: In laying wood shingles I am told that there should be spaces between the roof boards. Is this so? Answer: No; it is not. Spaces are supposed to be for ventilation, but that seems to be unnecessary.

Paint Thinner Question: I have used clear gasoline in place of turpentine for thinning house paint. It seems to work, but evaporates quickly. Could I use leaded gasoline for the purpose? Answer: Gasoline is not recommended, for it evaporates completely. Turpentine, on the other hand, goes into combination with the paint, and the results are longer lasting.

Outdoor Grill Question: We want to build an outdoor fireplace for cooking. Where can we get plans? Answer: There have been a number of articles on grill design in the magazines Popular Science and Popular Mechanics. You can look them up at a public library.

Coating Wallpaper Question: Is there some kind of clear shellac I could use to protect my kitchen wallpaper, especially above the stove? Answer: You can use good quality white shellac, or a water clear varnish to be had from a dealer in wallpaper.

Painting Fiber Rug If the rug is used indoors you can use dye to be had at a drug store. For outdoor use, get house paint thinned with one-quarter as much turpentine. Rub it into the fiber instead of merely coating the surface.

GOD DELIVERS HIS PEOPLE

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 5:22, 23; 6:1-7; 13:21.
GOLDEN TEXT—Call upon me in the day of trouble; I will deliver thee, and thou shalt glorify me.—Psalm 50:15.

Why doesn't God do something? People are quick to ask such a question in a time of crisis. Today they want to know why God permits the war, to go on. In the day of our lesson Moses wanted to know why God did not deliver His people from Egypt. He and Aaron had been appointed of God to lead them out, but their first efforts only met with failure and increased persecution.

The complaint of Moses, and the response of God make an instructive story for our consideration and guidance. It will answer our questions.

I. Moses Said, "Thou Hast Not Delivered Thy People" (Exod. 5:22, 23).

When the efforts of Moses brought heavier burdens on the people they blamed him and Aaron for making their situation worse. This sorrow and shame made them doubt God's calling and commission. How quickly men are discouraged in their purpose to serve God.

The people were wrong in their attitude. They should have been patient. They ought not to have assumed that the loss of the first skirmish meant the loss of the whole campaign.

Are we not just like them? The new minister or the recently elected Sunday school superintendent makes a mistake and instead of helping him to pick up the pieces and start over, we decide that he just will not do, that we must have a change.

Even though the people were wrong, however, the man of God should not have lost his faith and accused God of failure to keep His promise. He was supposed to have learned the lesson of patience in the long years on the backside of the desert. Had he forgotten the experience of the burning bush?

II. God Said, "I Am Jehovah, Thou Shalt See What I Will Do" (Exod. 6:1-7).

In other words, Moses was to remember that he was dealing with the Eternal One, unchangeable, and always true to His word and able to make His will come to pass.

So often men in dealing with God think of Him in terms of their own weakness and failure. What we need is to have a Godlike conception of God, not a manlike idea of Him. God is the infinite and Eternal One with whom we have no right to quarrel, and whose dealings with us are too high for us to judge (Ps. 139:1-6).

God's covenant with His people was established (v. 4). He had heard their cry (v. 5) and His deliverance was sure (v. 6). The only thing Moses had to do was to wait and see God work.

That word "wait" is a little one. It seems to call for no effort, to be easy of fulfillment; yet it seems to be the hardest thing for a human being to do. Men who carry the burden of active warfare with ease and with honor become discouraged and sick when they must sit in a prisoner's concentration camp and wait for deliverance.

Christians who can speak and work for God when things are active and moving become querulous and despondent when they have to wait for something to happen, or when they are laid aside for a time.

His promise is sure. That is not just a religious sentiment. It is a fact, and it is proved by history. Note that in the case of Moses—

III. History Said, "It Came to Pass the Selfsame Day" (Exod. 12:51).

Moses had to take God's word, for the selfsame day," which we read here came later. It came in God's own time, after He had, through Moses, humiliated and broken the hard will of Pharaoh. Then He gave His people the great memorial feast of the Passover, teaching them the needed lesson that redemption is by the shedding of blood. In that night Jehovah did bring the children of Israel out of the land of Egypt. That deliverance was as certain the day He made the first promise to Abraham (v. 3, and Gen. 12:1-3) hundreds of years before, as it was now that it had been accomplished.

History is really God's story, revealing His outworking of His plan for mankind. The torn and blotted pages are man's handiwork. Sin and unbelief have caused him to hinder the work of God, but God is not defeated, and in the midst of man's self-created chaos, He proceeds quietly to work out His own purpose.

The many prophecies of Scripture which have been fulfilled not only prove its divine inspiration, but demonstrate its dependability. Every promise of God is "yea and amen" in Christ (II Cor. 1:20, 21). We can count on that!

Curious Orchid

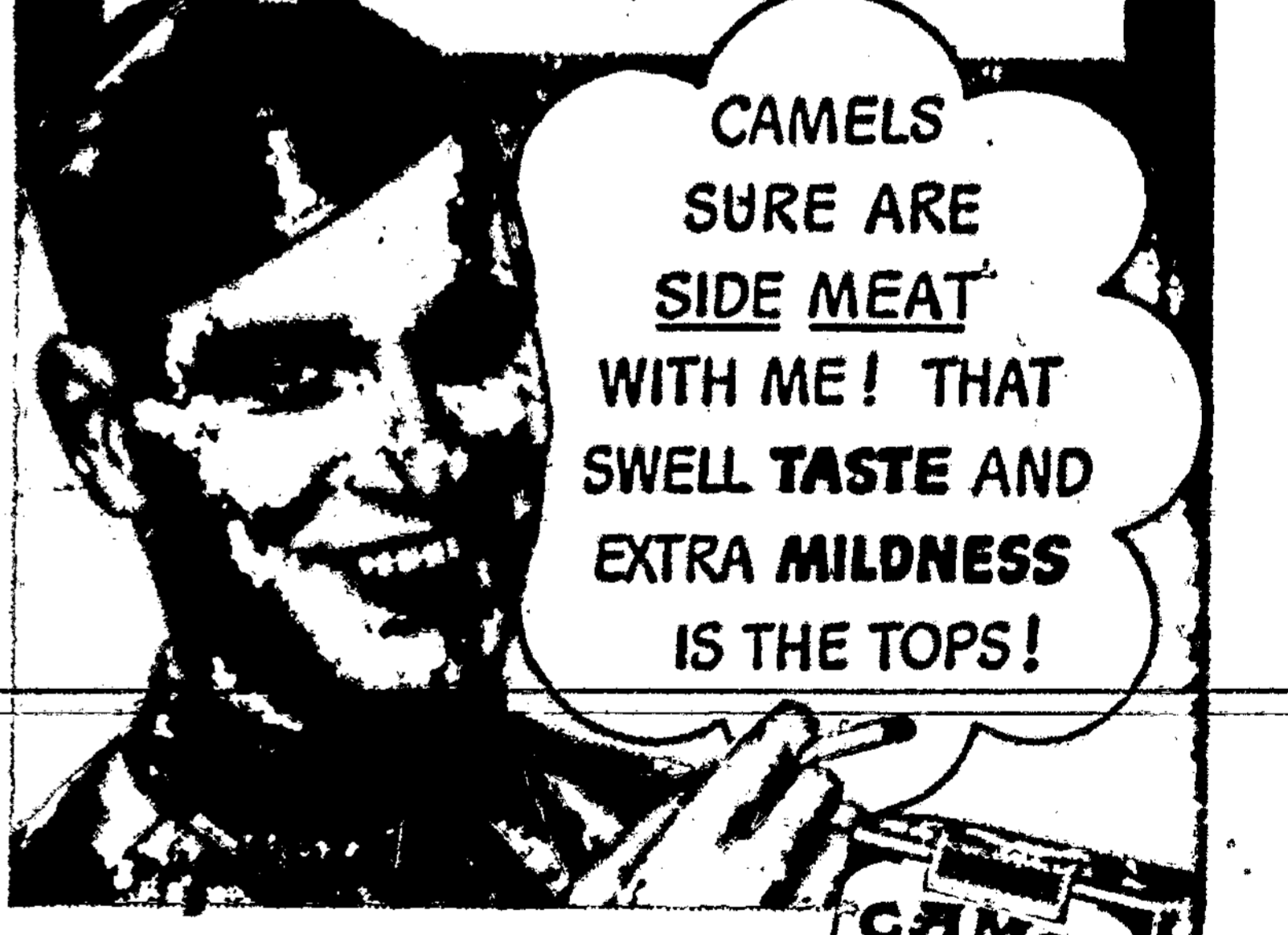

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OUR ERROR

(El Paso Times, Democratic)
 As the time goes on, it becomes more apparent that President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill made an error in announcing, following the Casablanca conference, that the Allies would be satisfied with nothing short of unconditional surrender by the Axis.

That gave Hitler and Hirohito a talking point in convincing their people that they should fight to the bitter end. While there is life, there is hope. While the Axis leaders are able to keep their people behind them, they have reason to hope that all will come out well for them.

An Associated Press dispatch from Bern, Switzerland, quoted Nazi sources as asserting that Germany is retreating from her long touted theory of a "European fortress" to an idea of basic, final defense deep within the continent.

Those Nazi sources were quoted as saying that the Germans will let all Europe become a shambles before ending the battle.

Nazi press dispatches indicate that the ultimate "reduit" (a small inner fortification usually at the core of a larger fortress) would concern only Hungary, Rumania, Rumania, Denmark and Germany, leaving the rest of Europe as a sort of no man's land.

That is added proof that the Nazi plan is to fight to the end. Unconditional surrender means without terms that the conqueror may do as he wishes. That would be a bitter pill for any country to swallow.

Those responsible for the war should be punished and steps taken to prevent a recurrence. That could be done without telling our enemies that they must throw themselves on our mercy in order to end hostilities.

President Roosevelt and Mr. Churchill should be more subtle than to tell the Germans, Japanese and Italians that they must stand helpless and defenseless before us. Enemy propaganda already has built up a fear psychology. The Italians have been told that American soldiers ravish their women and bash in the heads of their children. Japanese believe that they will be tortured and killed if they surrender to our men in battle.

If the German, Japanese and Italian people believe that they would receive fair treatment from us, the war would end much sooner.

We may say that their common sense should tell them that they have nothing to fear from America and Britain. But all they know is what they have been told by their own governments.

Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Churchill should say nothing further about unconditional surrender. After we win the war on the field of battle we can dictate our own peace terms.

IF YOU HAVE NO CANNER, MAKE ONE

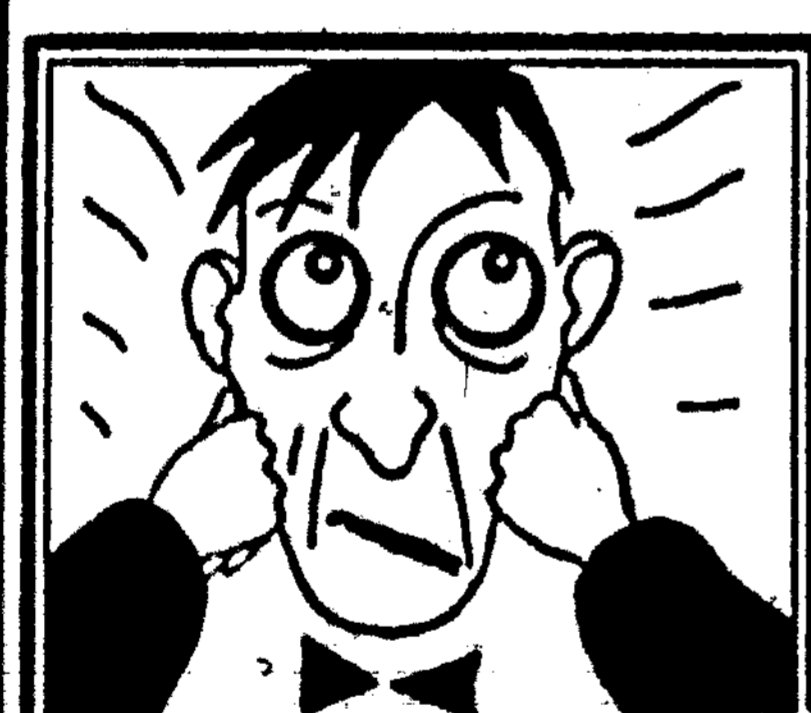

"All authorities on home canning advise that non-acid vegetables be canned by processing (cooking in jars) in a steam pressure cooker because a pressure cooker is the only household utensil that can retain a much hotter than boiling temperature. High temperatures are desirable when canning beans, peas, corn, greens, etc., because they insure more certain destruction of bacteria and because the canning can be done more quickly. But," says Gladys Kimbrough, Home Service Director of Ball Brothers Company, who heartily approves using a pressure cooker whenever possible, "the time is at hand when we must be practical. Don't worry if you can't buy a pressure cooker for surely you can find a wash boiler, lard can, baby bath tub or some deep container in which water can be boiled. Tack a few strips of wood together to make a rack or platform to hold the jars about one-half inch from the bottom of the container. Find something, even if it has to be a board, to use as a lid. Then you will have a water-bath canner for those Victory garden vegetables.

"You are afraid to eat vegetables canned that way? Nonsense! A lot of folks who say a water bath can't be used were raised on vegetables canned by that method. But let's get three things clear before we go any further: first, there have been a few instances of poisoning from eating canned vegetables; second, all such danger can be avoided by boiling the canned vegetables 15 minutes before tasting or serving—they should be re-boiled before serving if left from one meal to the next; third, a pressure cooker is not a guarantee against spoilage. There will be spoilage if the pressure gauge registers too low or if poor judgment is used in the selection, preparation, and packing of food into the jars. And don't let anybody tell you otherwise.

"Now, back to the water bath. The water should be steaming but not boiling when the jars are lowered into it and deep enough to cover the tops of the jars two or more inches. No water won't get into the jars if directions are followed. The water should be brought to boiling as quickly as possible and kept boiling steadily throughout the canning period. "Any jar suitable for use in home canning (and only those with names lettered on them are suitable) may be used for water-bath processing. Mason jars may be sealed with one-piece zinc cap and rubber—if you can find the caps—with glass top seal, or with two-piece vacuum seal caps. Glass top seal closures and vacuum caps seal on the top edge of the jar, therefore it is necessary to make sure the top edges of the jars are even, smooth, and perfect in every respect. The bands are screwed down tight on the vacuum seals as soon as the jars are filled to within from one to one-half inch of the top, and should not be tightened again. Zinc caps are screwed down on the rubber and then loosened slightly. Bands for glass top seals are screwed down and then loosened. This tightening and loosening is called 'partly sealing' and should always be done before jars are placed in a canner. Seals are completed by tightening caps or bands immediately after processing. "Then there is the jar with a glass lid and rubber ring held in place with wires—it is ideal for canning, especially when fitted with high-tension, stretch-proof, steel wire. It is partly sealed before and completely sealed after processing. "Those who select vegetables that are young, tender, and waste no time in washing them clean, cooking them five to ten minutes, and pouring into clean, hot jars and processing immediately, will live to laugh at those who say it can't be done. It is the Cans, not the Cans, who are going to win the war on both home and battle front."

**HOME-CANNED BERRIES
TAKE LITTLE SUGAR**



Home canned berries play leading roles in the pantry because they contribute vitamins and minerals for health, can be used in many ways, and are easy and inexpensive to can.

Blackberries, blueberries, boysenberries, raspberries, elderberries—can them all and others, too, with little or no sugar. Sugar gives them better flavor and more calories, but has nothing to do with keeping qualities.

Berries are too precious to waste and none will be wasted if you will see to it that every step taken is the right one. First of all, wash, rinse and examine your jars. Be sure to inspect the top edges of those to be sealed with glass top seal or two-piece vacuum seal closures because top seals refuse to work unless tops of the jars are perfect. Cover jars, glass lids, and zinc caps, with luke-warm water, heat to boiling and keep hot until needed. Wash and rinse rubbers and vacuum seal lids and drop them in boiling water—they don't need boiling unless you plan to do old-fashioned open kettle canning—then they must be boiled a few minutes to sterilize.

Every berry must be fresh, sound, ripe, and firm. Wash them carefully and then take your choice of canning methods.

Gladys Kimbrough, Home Service Director of Ball Brothers Company, prefers to hot-pack berries. This is how it is done. Place berries in a wide, shallow pan; add one-half cup sugar or less for each quart of berries; set the pan over low heat and simmer until the berries heat through and the sugar dissolves (remember you don't have to use any sugar); pour the hot berries into clean, hot jars and process five minutes in hot water-bath canner.

If you prefer cold packing, fill a jar about half full with raw berries, then tap it gently on a folded cloth to shake the berries down. When the jar is filled to within a half-inch of the top, add enough hot syrup to cover the berries. Process 20 minutes in a water-bath canner. Syrup for four quarts of berries may be made by boiling two cups sugar and three cups water or berry juice together until the sugar dissolves. If you are a little short on sugar—and who isn't these days?—try making the syrup of one measure sugar, one measure corn syrup, and one-half measure water or berry juice. This syrup seems rather thick and sweet, but it will become thinner and less sweet after it has been with the berries a few weeks. And if you have no sugar at all, cover the berries with hot berry juice or boiling water; seal or partly seal the jars (follow the manufacturer's instructions) and process 20 minutes in a water-bath canner.

If you want your berries to really star, can them without sugar. Then they can be used as if they were fresh from the patch. The juice can be drained off and used for making jelly. The berries can go into a pie or into jam—a jam turnover tucked in a lunch box will make the noon hour much more pleasant for somebody and surely you need nobody to tell you that jelly and jam are far more delicious when freshly made than at any other time.
