## Extension Service Extends Thanks

Army officials were grateful for the splendid cooperation received from farmers and ranchers in conducting the recent scrap drive.

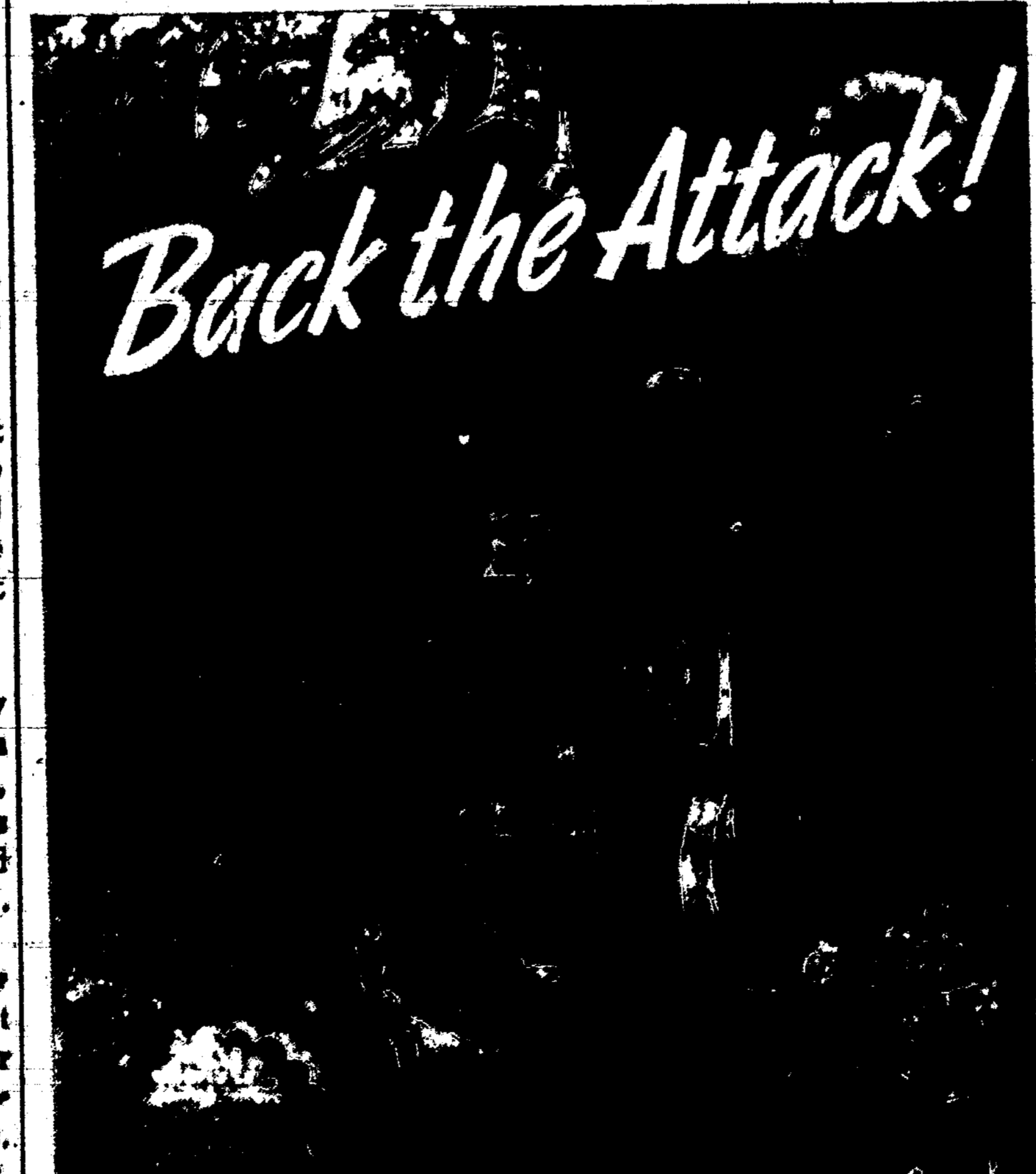

He hurried to the place and while making arrangements to bring them in, the officer, who was examining a rifle, which contained a shell unnoticed, exploded, the cartridge piercing Mr. Campbell's heart, killing him instantly.

This made the third passing of members of Carrizozo Lodge No. 41 in the short period of one week. ## Wayne Van Schoyck

On Thursday, Sept. 2, Wayne Van Schoyck, 54, Master Mason, stockman and business man, died at his home in White Oaks, after a brief illness.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Loudin. John R. Curry and Mrs. Margie Clouse sang two duets, "Free-Hearted," "Whole-Hearted" and "The Old Rugged Cross." The floral offerings were many and beautiful. Pallbearers were Wm. Gallacher, James Cooper, Pat Murphy, Frank English, J. H. Fulmer and Jack Cleghorn. The flower bearers were Mesdames Albert Scharf, J. H. Fulmer, Roy Shafer, Wm. Gallacher, Margie Clouse and Lillian Richard.

After the church services, the remains were conveyed to the White Oaks cemetery, where Masonic Rites were conferred, with Past Master L. Z. Manire conducting the same.

Wayne Van Schoyck was born at Columbus, Ohio, on June 14, 1869 and died at his home in White Oaks New Mexico on Sept. 2, 1934, at the age of 74 years 2 months and 18 days.

He leaves his widow Edith Schale Van Schoyck, two sons Wayne, Jr., of Walsenburg, Colorado, brothers and sisters as follows: Aubry address unknown; Harvey, Bigsville, Wisconsin; Clay of El Paso, Tex.; Myrtle Dyer, Shrieve, Ohio; Mona Van Schoyck, of Columbus, Ohio and Minnie Frishtiger of Columbus, Ohio, and three grandchildren.

Wayne Van Schoyck came to White Oaks in the early days when the mining boom was on since which time he had made it his home. During those years, he followed mining, stockraising and was also engaged in the general merchandise business for a large portion of the time. He was an ideal community man and aside from business, led in most of community events, especially baseball, in which he was a principal promoter. To the surviving members of his family, the sympathy of the surrounding country is tendered.

## WHAT NEXT

The OPA has launched a scheme which grants free postage under the franking law to anyone wishing to report price violations. In effect, the government now subsidizes snipers.

News reports state that "uniform complaint" forms have been sent to OPA regional offices and by them distributed to various organizations such as labor unions, veterans' posts, women's organizations and consumer groups. These forms are official. They need no postage. If you don't like your neighborhood grocer, all you have to do is look around his shelves and some inadvertent infraction of the inexplicable OPA rules and turn him in—it doesn't cost a cent. As the OPA points out: "We extended the franking privilege so that we would be sure of getting replies. People won't go to the trouble of stamping an envelope. We find that it's not the two cents that holds them back, but the fact that they may have to walk across the street to buy a stamp . . . It makes all the difference between getting a volume of complaints, and not getting them." How wonderful!

Apparently the OPA is doing its level best to frighten retail distributors out of business, even while paying lip service to the "honest merchant." It is a tribute to the entire distribution industry that it has managed to continue serving the public efficiently in the face of such tactics. How much more stimulating to hard-pressed merchants if the same effort that has been expended to catch a few willful price violators, were put forth to ease the burden on legitimate distributors. — Industrial News Review.

**ISRAEL MARCHES TOWARD CANAAN**

LESSON TEXT—Numbers 10:11, 12, 29-36. GOLDEN TEXT—Come thou with us, and we will do thee good.—Numbers 10:29.

There is a time to wait before God, to be instructed and prepared for holy living. There is also a time for action. When God says, "Move forward," His people are to arise and be on their way.

Israel, who had now been more than a year on the way from Egypt to Canaan, had been resting for a time at Mt. Sinai, there receiving instruction and being organized into a nation. They had set up a place of worship in their midst, and now they were ready to go on. That is God's will for His people. They are to

**I. Move Toward the Goal (vv. 11, 12).**

God had a schedule. He wanted them to move forward on a certain day (v. 11). Since the Jewish religious year, referred to here, began with the spring equinox, this was about the middle of May. The dry season was ahead—a good time to travel.

Those who think the purposes of God for men are nebulous and uncertain, and that He has no real plan for us, are obviously mistaken. His plan is good and acceptable and perfect; let us find and follow it.

We do not have a pillar of cloud and fire to move before us. We do not need it, for we, unlike the Israelites, have God's Word for our guide, and His Holy Spirit as the One who will tell every responsive soul when and where to go.

The important thing is to obey, promptly and willingly, and we shall have the blessing of God.

**II. Bring Others With You (vv. 29-32).**

Those who go up to the promised land should not go alone, they should bring others with them.

Moses, who had been in touch with the family of his father-in-law (known both as Jethro and Raguel or Reuel), now sees the value of having with him his brother-in-law, who was so acquainted with the great and terrible wilderness through which they were to pass that he could be invaluable as a guide and helper.

In giving him the invitation, however, Moses stressed the opposite thought—that it would be good for Hobab if he came with them. That was doubtless true, but it was not the right approach.

Men do not respond to the opportunity for advantage in spiritual things as readily as to the challenge to usefulness. The motive of acquisition is strong, but the best folk are not as interested in what they can get as what they can give.

The church may stress too much its value as a place of refuge and not enough the unparalleled opportunity it affords for sacrificial service.

When Moses changed his plea and revealed his need of Hobab, the response was immediate. He had thus won a friend and a helper.

**III. Follow God's Guidance (vv. 33-36).**

God gave special guidance on this occasion. The ark which commonly was found in the midst of the people, now moved out before them.

It was the symbol of God's presence. As they went out into the wilderness (which Deut. 1:19 calls "great and terrible") it was as though God Himself went before them.

Is not this always true? The "Captain of Our Salvation," Jesus Christ, is not One who carries in safety at the rear and sends up orders for us to attack life's problems. He goes before us!

The pillar of cloud hovered over the people as though to give them shelter from the beating sun of the desert. God is mindful of the road His people must travel, and in His loving-kindness provides for their protection and care.

In our day there are many who are tempted to question whether God knows of their trials and afflictions. He does, and He will not permit them to be tried beyond their ability to bear it.

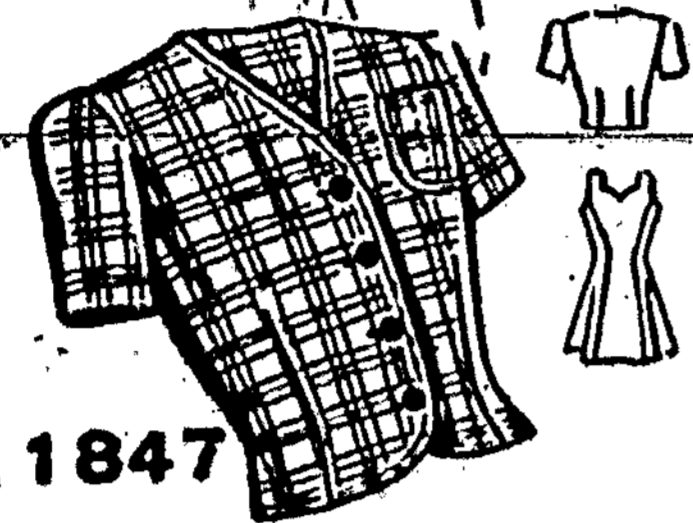
When the ark went forward, their leader, Moses, addressed God in the stirring words of verse 35. The people whose God is the Lord may count on Him to scatter their enemies.

All of human life is either a journey or a battle, and often it is both. We must arise and make valiant war against the forces of evil if we are to move forward for God. But we must recall that our foes, as Christians, are also God's foes.

The battle is not ours, but God's, and we do well to call on Him to rise up and smite the enemy.

Note that after the forward march came a time of rest. God always gives His people an opportunity for

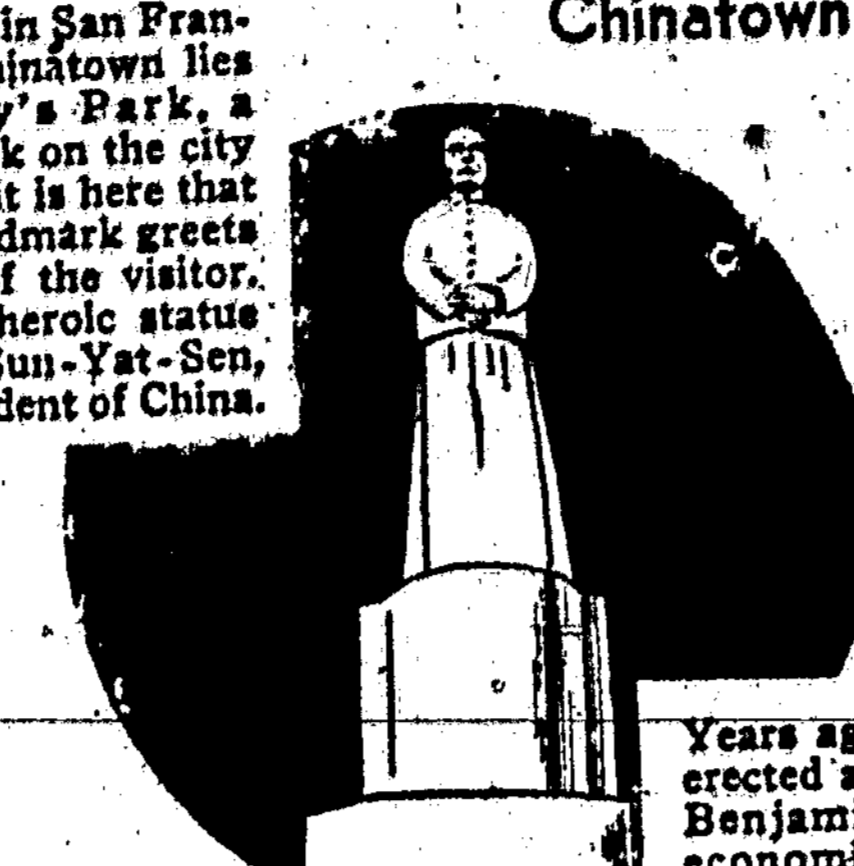
