Philadelphia, Jan. 19.—Republicans held two additional seats in the house of representatives today after scoring victories in Pennsylvania's 2nd and 17th congressional districts.

Joseph M. Pratt (R), who led his opponent William A. Barrett (D) by 6,581 votes in last night's late returns from 163 of 164 divisions in the 2nd district will fill the vacancy created by the resignation of James P. McGranary (D) now assistant to Attorney General Biddle. The 2nd district gave:

4th War Loan Drive

Opens Jan. 1, 1944. Lincoln county has been assigned a quota of \$115,600, of this amount \$67,100 has been earmarked for 'E' bonds.

The September quota was \$108,000. The same committee that solicited for the 3rd drive is again being asked to handle the 4th war loan. Felix Ramey, Co. war finance chairman said, Lincoln county was the 2nd county in the state on the sale of E bonds, figured at a percentage basis on quota during the Sept. drive.

Fulmer, Jr., Dr. J. Turner, B. H. Roberts, orons, and J. B. Bonnell, Glencoe, members. The chamber of commerce adjourned, and the planning met in executive session. The following post-war projects were adopted:

- Canning factory to be erected in the Ruidoso.
- Completion of U. S. Highway 64 and 380. Also feeder roads from agricultural districts, mines and ranches to paved roads or markets.
- Development of reservoirs, by constructing dams for the storage of surface water, where feasible.
- Completion of the sewerage system in Carrizozo.
- Construction of a Community hospital in Carrizozo.
- Black topping the main streets in Carrizozo that are not black topped now.

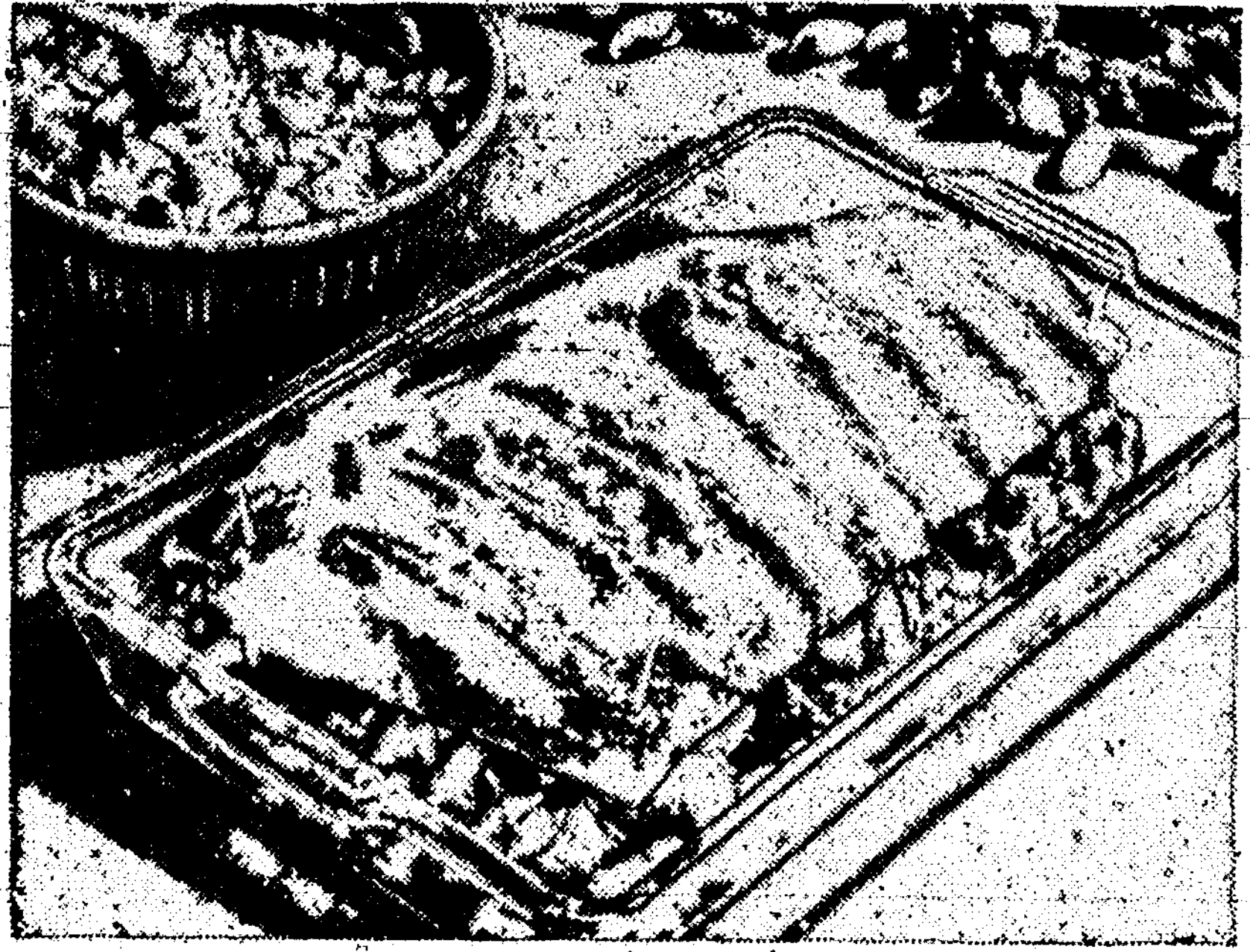

HOUSEHOLD MEMOS

There's a Surprise With These Spareribs!
(See Recipes Below)

Good Taste

"There are a lot of meat cuts with lower point values which we are sure we'd like if we just knew how to prepare them tastefully. Won't you tell us how?" This is a request I'm hearing more often lately, and so today's column will give suggestions for these cuts of meat.

Fortunately a great many of these lower-point meat cuts belong to the variety class, add "variety" to meals and are a wonderful source of vitamins and minerals. You'll like them this way:

Corn Biscuit Pies.

(Serves 4 to 6)

1 veal kidney
Melted butter or substitute
1 cup cooked, chopped meat
1 cup cooked peas
1 cup cooked carrots
2 cups well-seasoned medium white sauce
Corn biscuit

Wash kidney; remove outer membrane. Split through center; remove fat and tubes. Brush with melted butter; place 2 inches below broiler heat. Broil 5 minutes on each side. Slice kidney; combine with meat, peas and carrots. Mix with white sauce. Pour into individual baking dishes or casseroles.

Prepare corn biscuit: Sift together 1½ cups flour, ½ cup cornmeal, 3 teaspoons baking powder, ¾ teaspoon salt, and a few grains of sugar. Cut in ¼ cup shortening; add ¾ cup milk to make a soft dough. Pat or roll out dough, ¼ inch thick on lightly floured board; cut with round cutter 1 inch in diameter. Place biscuits on meat and vegetable mixture. Bake in a very hot oven (450 degrees) 15 minutes.

Liver Loaf.

(Serves 6)

1½ pounds beef liver
1½ cups dry bread crumbs
¼ cup melted shortening
1 egg
1½ teaspoons salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
¼ teaspoon paprika
3 teaspoons minced onion
3 tablespoons parsley
1 cup milk

Four scalding water over liver and let stand 3 minutes. Chop and add all other ingredients except milk. Mix thoroughly. Shape into loaf; brush top with additional melted shortening. Place loaf in baking

Lynn Says

Working With Points: Adventure with low point meats and you'll find them as delicious as the high point ones. They are highest in food value and best in flavor if properly cooked.

Doubling up on proteins during times like these is wasteful. Select carefully from this one group for the meal: meat, poultry, fish, eggs, dried beans or peas or soybeans, cheese or nuts. Remember, just one to a meal!

Balance the use of cereals with plenty of vegetables and fruit. Naturally cereals and breads have to carry more of a load these times, but they can't take the place of meat and vegetables. Use them to make the flavor of meat and fish go further.

Buying in season is your greatest help for vegetables and fruits. Rich-in-vitamin fruits and vegetables can be found in winter, too!

Recipes are as good as what you put into them. Economizing on too many items in the recipe will give you—you know what. If you want precious ingredients in recipes use them sparingly these times—for the recipes with a pound of this and a dozen of that have been put away for the duration.

dish and add ¾ cup water. Bake in a moderate oven (300 degrees) for 1 hour. For sauce add milk 15 minutes before taking from oven.

Variation: Grind half beef heart and use in place of beef liver. Or, grind pork heart and omit fat in recipe. Add ½ teaspoon poultry seasoning.

Heart is not a tender cut of meat and is good only if you cook it properly. That means slow cooking at slow or moderate heat. A stuffing adds loads of good flavor:

Baked Stuffed Beef Heart.

(Serves 6)

3 to 4 pound beef heart
2 slices bacon
1 cup fine bread crumbs
¼ teaspoon herb or poultry seasoning
1 small onion
Salt and pepper
Flour for dredging
Fat or oil for browning

Wash heart and remove enough of center portion to admit addition of dressing or stuffing. Dice bacon and fry until crisp. Combine with bread crumbs. Season with finely minced onion. Season cavity within hearts fill with stuffing and fasten with skewers. Roll in flour and brown quickly in hot fat in heavy kettle. Add small amount of water or beef stock. Cover and cook slowly 2 to 2½ hours in a moderate oven (350 degrees) until done. Thicken liquid for gravy, if desired.

Kidney Stew.

(Serves 5 to 6)

2 beef kidneys
½ cup flour
3 tablespoons drippings
Salt and pepper
4 cups water
1 bay leaf
Pinch rosemary
2 tablespoons dried celery leaves
1 cup carrots, sliced
1 cup onion, sliced
1 cup potato, cubed

Remove skin and fat from kidneys, wash and split lengthwise. Remove core and cut in small pieces. Dredge with flour and brown in hot drippings. Place in kettle, add water, vegetables and seasonings. Simmer 1½ to 2 hours. If desired, broth may be thickened with a little flour and water.

Variation: If desired, use half kidney and half stew beef.

*Stuffed Spareribs.

2½ sheets of spareribs

Stuffing:
½ loaf bread, cubed
1 onion, minced fine
Salt, pepper, sage to taste
½ cup toasted brazil nuts, sliced
½ cup boiling water
4 tablespoons drippings

Toast the cubed bread in a hot oven, turning to prevent burning. Add onion, seasonings and sliced nuts. Mix well. Melt drippings in hot water. Add to bread and toss lightly with fork.

Place dressing in center of one sheet of spareribs. Cover with second sheet. Draw edges together and sew in place. Salt outside of meat. Pepper, dredge with flour. Place in shallow roasting pan. Bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven. Cover bottom of pan with a little water. Roast for 1½ hours. Make gravy from drippings in bottom of pan.

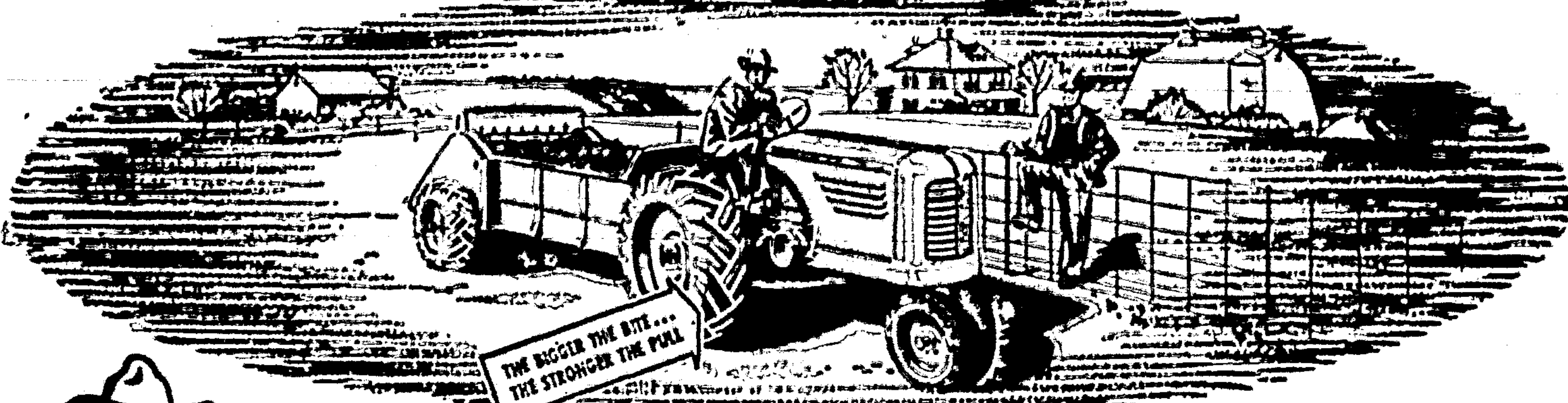

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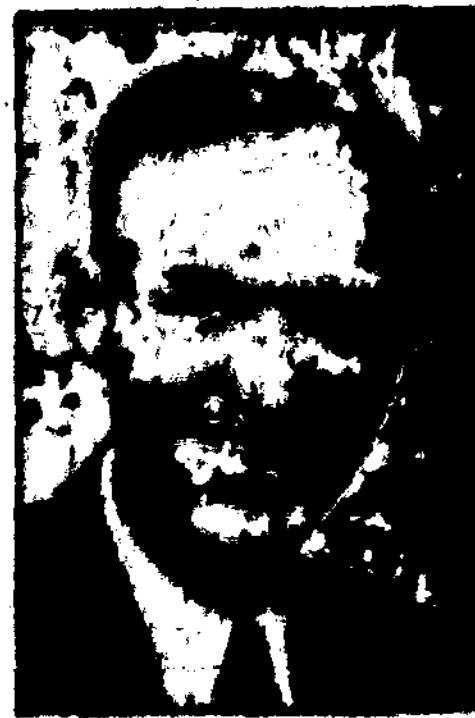

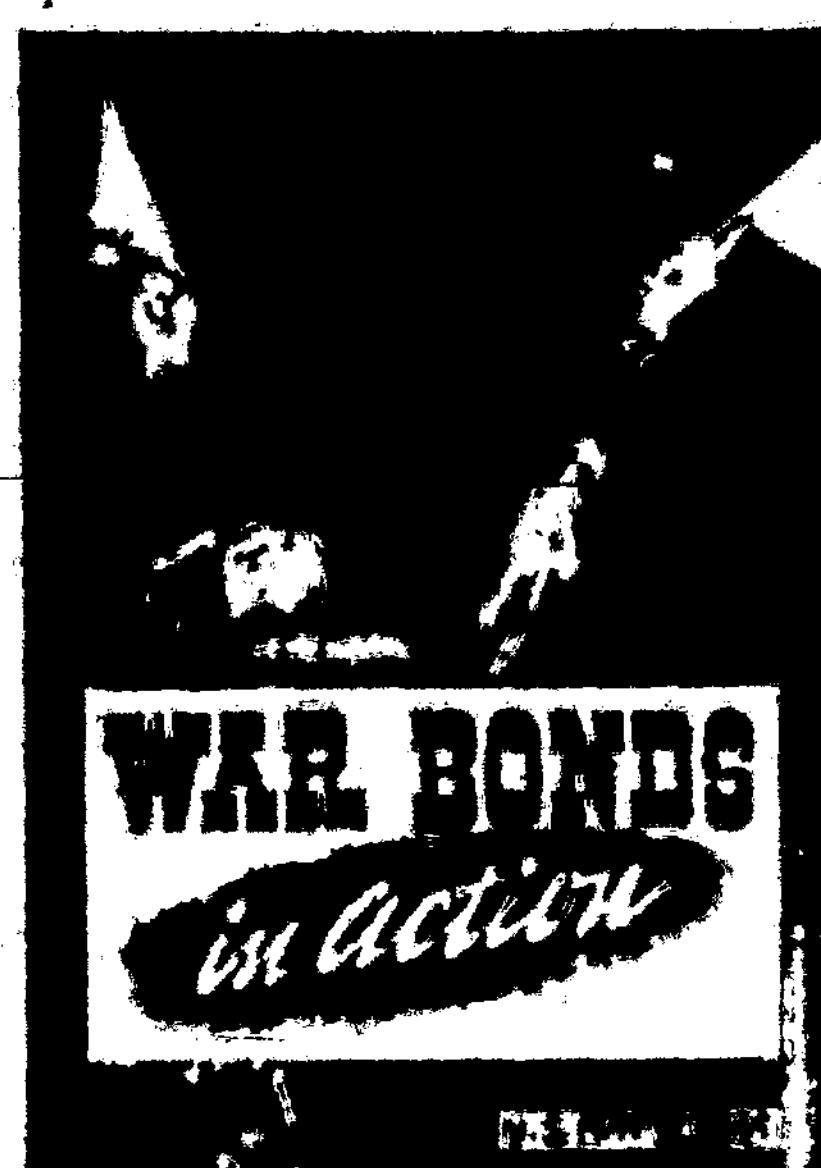
Attention Stockmen

1943 Extension Service Report

The program sponsored by the Extension Service in Lincoln County in 1943 has been of considerable benefit to the people in the rural areas. The success of the year's program is largely due to the cooperation of the various committees and leaders in the different communities, who have cooperated throughout the year in carrying out the program.

The Extension Service, as the educational agency of the Department of Agriculture, formulated its program for 1943 in a manner to provide the greatest amount of educational assistance to the farmers and ranchers in increasing their 1943 production. It has also been necessary for the Service to cooperate with the various committees that have been established under the Department of Agriculture and to furnish the committee members and the people in the rural areas with educational material that would give them a background and a working knowledge of the new war-time program established. In this capacity, direct assistance was given the Lincoln County USDA War Board, the County Farm Machinery Committee, and the County War Meat Committee. Records reveal that 1,320 personal letters were written, and approximately 600 office calls were received in carrying out recommendations of these committees.

Some of the activities of major importance include:

1. The sponsoring of the Labor Program, which was specifically assigned the Extension service by an act of congress. Labor committees were appointed in the county, and assistance given the committees in obtaining as much available labor for the farmers and ranchers as possible. The county agent's office was used as a medium for placing all available labor, and a number of high school students and adults were directed to farmers and ranchers who were needing laborers.
2. The sponsoring of a scrap metal survey in the rural areas, as a result of which 357 tons of scrap iron was reported, and the information relative to its location compiled and given to Army officials.
3. Sponsoring of the Extension Marketing Service whereby truckers and buyers in 13 states were kept informed monthly on the kind and amount of produce

available for sale in Lincoln County.

4. The compilation and submitting of material to State officials to indicate the acute need for supplemental feeds in Lincoln County.

5. The conducting of a survey of available used machinery in order to assist farmers in locating this type of equipment.

6. The plotting of farm and ranch homes in Lincoln County on a map which was submitted to officials of the Rural Electrification Administration for post-war consideration.

7. The conducting of a county survey to determine the estimated amount of food preservation supplies needed in the county for 1944.

8. Continued the 4-H registered swine breeding projects by placing an additional 8 registered gilts with 4-H club members.

9. During the year a total of 98 meetings were sponsored on topics pertaining to livestock, poultry, from labor, from machinery, gardening, orchards, nutrition, home improvement, and clothing. These meetings were attended by a total of 1,688 individuals.

10. A summary of other Extension activities reveal that 321 farm and ranch visits were made; 2,787 people called at the office; 547 telephone calls were received and made; 2,068 agricultural bulletins were distributed, and 9,000 personal and circular letters were mailed.

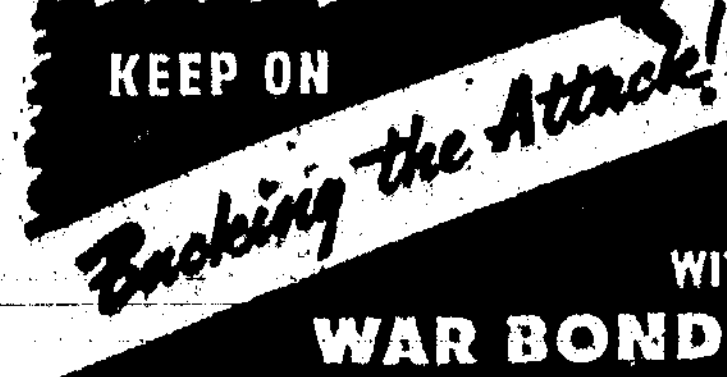
