Miss Martin Reappointed To Important GOP Post

In recognition of the increasingly important role of women voters in the Republican Party, and the 1944 Republican convention action formally authorizing an Assistant Chairman in charge of the women's division, Miss Marion E. Martin was reappointed recently by Chairman Herbert Brownell, Jr., as Assistant Chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Miss Martin's reappointment, which continues her official National Committee associations begun in 1937 but broadens the significance of her activity, is regarded as a promise "of the full partnership of women with men in the campaign ahead."

An Assistant Chairman, Miss Martin carries a specific responsibility for direction of all women's activities of the National Committee organization. In this capacity, she also has the additional title of director of the women's division.

Actually, Miss Martin began her National Committee associations in 1930, when she was elected National Committeewoman for the State of Maine. She still retains that place.

In the seven years as directing head of national women's work, Miss Martin has developed a closely knit women's organization. She is a recognized qualified speaker and has addressed hundreds of groups in 42 states. She has not spoken in Louisiana, Mississippi, Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama, and Arkansas. A particularly outstanding achievement in Miss Martin's political record is her initiation and development of the National Federation of Women's Republican Clubs. It is an organization of political study clubs which has had a phenomenal growth. Today it has 3000 clubs in 40 states, with a membership of 400,000.

Miss Martin's interest in politics began in her initial college days at Wellesley. She continued her political studies at the University of Maine and also at Yale University, where she was studying law in 1937 when she assumed directorship of the women's division.

Notice and Instructions to Bidders

(1) Sealed proposals for the furnish-
ing and installation of the necessary
equipment and material, including the
furnishing of all necessary labor, for a
gold storage locker, food processing
and ice plant; which is to be an addi-
tion to the present facilities of the
Carrizozo Municipal Light & Power
(hereinafter called the "addition")
will be received by the Village of Car-
rizozo (hereinafter called the "own-
er"), on or before 7:30 o'clock P. M.
Mt. War Time, Sept. 11, 1944, at Vil-
lage Clerks Office, Carrizozo, New
Mexico. At which time and place,
said proposals will be publicly opened
and read.

(2) The addition will consist of:
work, locker, sharp freeze, fruit stor-
age, chill, aging, and ice storage
rooms. Equipment more fully describ-
ed in specifications, will consist of five
(5) ton ice maker and necessary re-
frigeration equipment for the above
mentioned.

(3) The plans and specifications,
together with other necessary data,
may be secured from the owner, upon
payment of five dollars (\$5.00), or may
be examined at the office of the owner
without charge.

(4) Proposals must be submitted in
sealed envelope, addressed to the
owner, and on forms furnished.

(5) Prior to submission of proposal,
bidder shall check closely plans and
specifications, form of contract agree-
ment, together with other matters and
conditions which may affect the cost
and completion of the addition. Bid-
ders will be required to meet all appli-
cable regulations, statutes, etc., in-
cluding those pertaining to the licens-
ing of contractors.

(6) Since the owner is a tax free
municipality, bidders are instructed to
include no sales tax, or other taxes in
cost of machinery, equipment or
material incorporated in the addition.

(7) Bidders will be required to show
satisfactory qualifications, financially
and by experience. Experience and
success of manufacturer whose prod-
ucts are proposed will have its in-
fluence in determining successful
bidder.

(8) Each proposal must be accom-
panied by a bidder's bond or certified
check, payable to the owner in an
amount equal to five percent (5%) of
the total bid price. Such bond or
check will be returned to unsuccess-
ful bidders within fifteen (15) days.
In the case of the successful bidder,
his bid bond or check will be returned
upon execution of satisfactory con-
tractor's bond.

the owner, covering the installation to
be made and to furnish contractor's
bond with sureties satisfactory to the

AROUND THE HOUSE

Fill coffee pot half full of cold water, add 1 teaspoon of soda and bring to a boil for a few minutes. Then the pot should be washed in clear water.

When flour bin or other kitchen container leaks dry ingredients, I pour melted paraffin or beeswax into the cracks and let it harden.

Garden tools free from rust are easier to work with and, if a small can of tractor oil and an old shaving brush are kept handy, it takes little time to clean and oil the tools after using.

When clothes must be ironed soon after dampening, always use hot water as it penetrates the material more quickly.

To clean rust from any kind of farm implements, dissolve one can of lye in five gallons of water and apply with an old broom or brush. Scrub well. The rust will come off quickly.

When the metal tip comes off a shoe lace, it is not necessary to discard the lace. A satisfactory tip can be put on quickly and easily by dipping the end of the lace in melted paraffin or beeswax and shaved to a point before the wax hardens.

Before the end of the year, the U. S. should be producing enough man-made rubber to fill all military and essential civilian needs, in the opinion of John L. Collyer, President of B. F. Goodrich, who forecasts the output of 800,000 tons of synthetic rubber in 1944.

Neglect of the rubber plantations now under Japanese control may be a benefit in disguise, according to authorities, since postponing the tapping of rubber trees tends to improve their subsequent yields.

Normally only one per cent of the rubber consumed in the U. S. went into the manufacture of medical, surgical, dental and drug supplies, while more than 72 per cent was used by the tire industry.

Wise Cooks Use Their Ingenuity When Points Are Low



Leftover lamb makes a pretty salad when diced and crowned prettily by a celery wreath, then green pepper and red skinned apple slices.

Menus don't have to go begging just because ration points have been restored to a great many cuts of meat. In fact, this is the time when all good cooks will put forth all the ingenuity and inspiration they can stir up.

Less expensive cuts will give every bit the same nutrition as the most expensive ones, and with long, moist heat cooking they can be made just as palatable.

If you do decide to splurge on a roast or a ham occasionally, use the leftovers up so cleverly that the family will get a real palate thrill from them. It can be done!

And with that in mind, we're going right into our recipe round-up for today. First, the less expensive cuts come in for their share of attention with this Beef En Casserole:

Beef En Casserole.
(Serves 6)
1 1/2 pounds beef (neck, flank or shank), cut into inch cubes
3 strips of bacon
1 clove garlic, peeled
1 cup boiling water
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
2 whole cloves
1 1/2 cups diced carrots
6 peeled small onions

Flour beef cubes. Cook bacon in heavy skillet until brown but not crisp. Remove. Add garlic to bacon fat and brown beef cubes on all sides. Remove garlic. Add water and seasonings. Heat to boiling. Turn into baking dish, adding vegetables and bacon (cut into inch pieces). Cover and bake in a slow (300-degree) oven for 2 to 2 1/2 hours.

Veal-Ham Loaf.
(Serves 5)
1 1/2 pounds ground veal
1 cup ground ham
2 eggs
1 cup fine bread crumbs
Grated rind 1/4 lemon
Juice of 1 lemon
1 cup milk
1 tablespoon butter, melted
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper

Mix all ingredients with a fork and shape into loaf. Place in loaf pan and pour 1/2 cup tomato juice over top. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 1/2 hours.

Veal Schnitzel.
(Serves 6)
2 pounds veal steak (1/2-inch thick)
Seasoning
1 cup fine crumbs
1 egg
1 tablespoon water
4 tablespoons lard or bacon drippings
1 lemon
1 tablespoon flour

Pound veal to flatten out into thin

pieces. Season. Cut into servings. Roll in beaten egg mixed with water, then in fine crumbs. Brown in hot fat until well browned. Add 1/4 cup water. Cover and cook slowly 30 to 35 minutes. Fold over in half when ready to serve with sliced lemon, hard-cooked eggs or pimiento olives as a garnish. Sour cream may be added to the fat in the pan to make a sauce for the schnitzel.

Only a little meat is needed in the next two recipes for that meaty flavor:

Chicken-Corn Pudding.
(Serves 4 to 6)
8 slices bread
1 can whole kernel corn
1/2 cup chopped chicken
3 eggs
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon paprika
2 1/2 cups milk

Arrange alternate layers of bread slices, corn and chicken in a greased casserole. Beat eggs, add salt, pepper, paprika and milk. Pour into casserole, adding more milk if necessary to cover mixture. Bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven 1 hour.

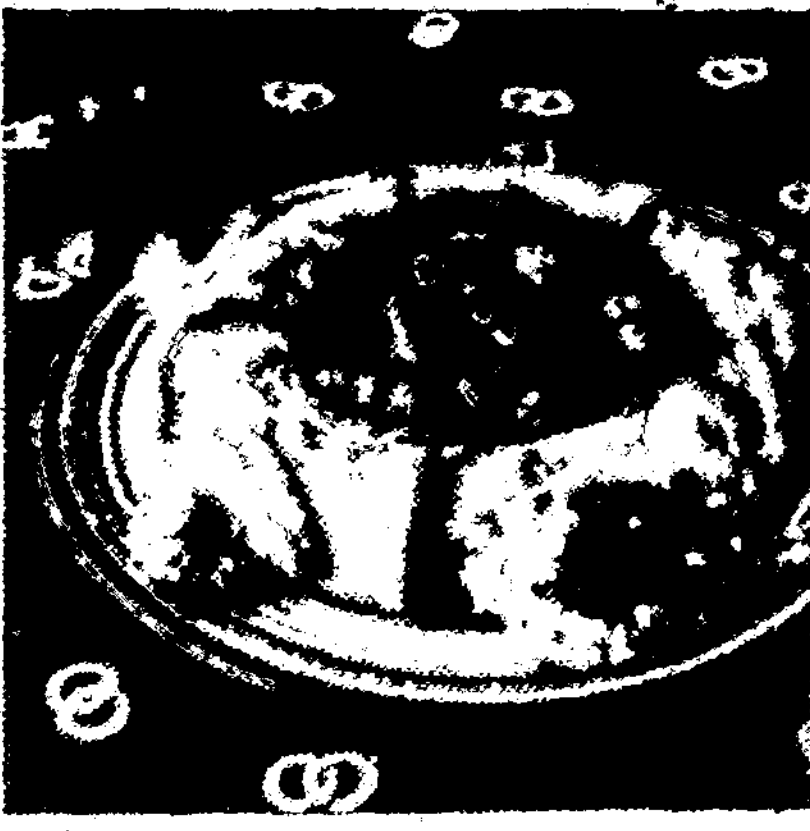
Tomato-Bacon Scallop.
(Serves 5)
2 1/2 cups cooked or canned tomatoes
1 cup peas, cooked or canned
8 slices bacon
2 tablespoons onion, chopped
1 cup diced celery
2 cups soft bread crumbs
Salt and pepper

Combine tomatoes with drained peas. Fry bacon slowly until crisp. Drain on absorbent paper; crumble. Cook onion and celery in 1 tablespoon bacon fat until lightly browned. Place 1/2 of tomatoes and peas into a greased casserole; top with one half of the bacon. Add onion and celery mixture and crumbs. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Repeat layers. Bake in a hot (400-degree) oven 20 minutes.

A leg of lamb is good eating as a roast and economical if it is served as leftovers in the form of creamed lamb or salad:

Lamb Salad Bowl.
(Serves 6)
2 1/2 cups diced cold lamb
2 cups diced celery
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
6 slices red apple
1 cup mayonnaise
1 tablespoon fresh, chopped mint

Pile diced lamb in center of salad bowl. Arrange diced celery in a circle around lamb; repeat, using chopped pepper. Cut apple in half; core and slice cross-wise. Place slices around edge of bowl, peel side up, and extending about 1/4 of



an inch above edge of bowl. Serve with mayonnaise to which has been added chopped, fresh mint.

Creamed Lamb and Peas.
(Serves 6)
3 cups diced, cooked lamb
1 medium onion, sliced
3 tablespoons butter
2 cups leftover gravy
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Salt and pepper
3 green pepper rings, cut in half
1/2 cup cooked peas
Slices of pineapple, if desired

Saute onion in butter until tender, add gravy and seasonings. Add meat and peas and heat through. Serve in noodle ring and garnish with pineapple and green pepper rings.

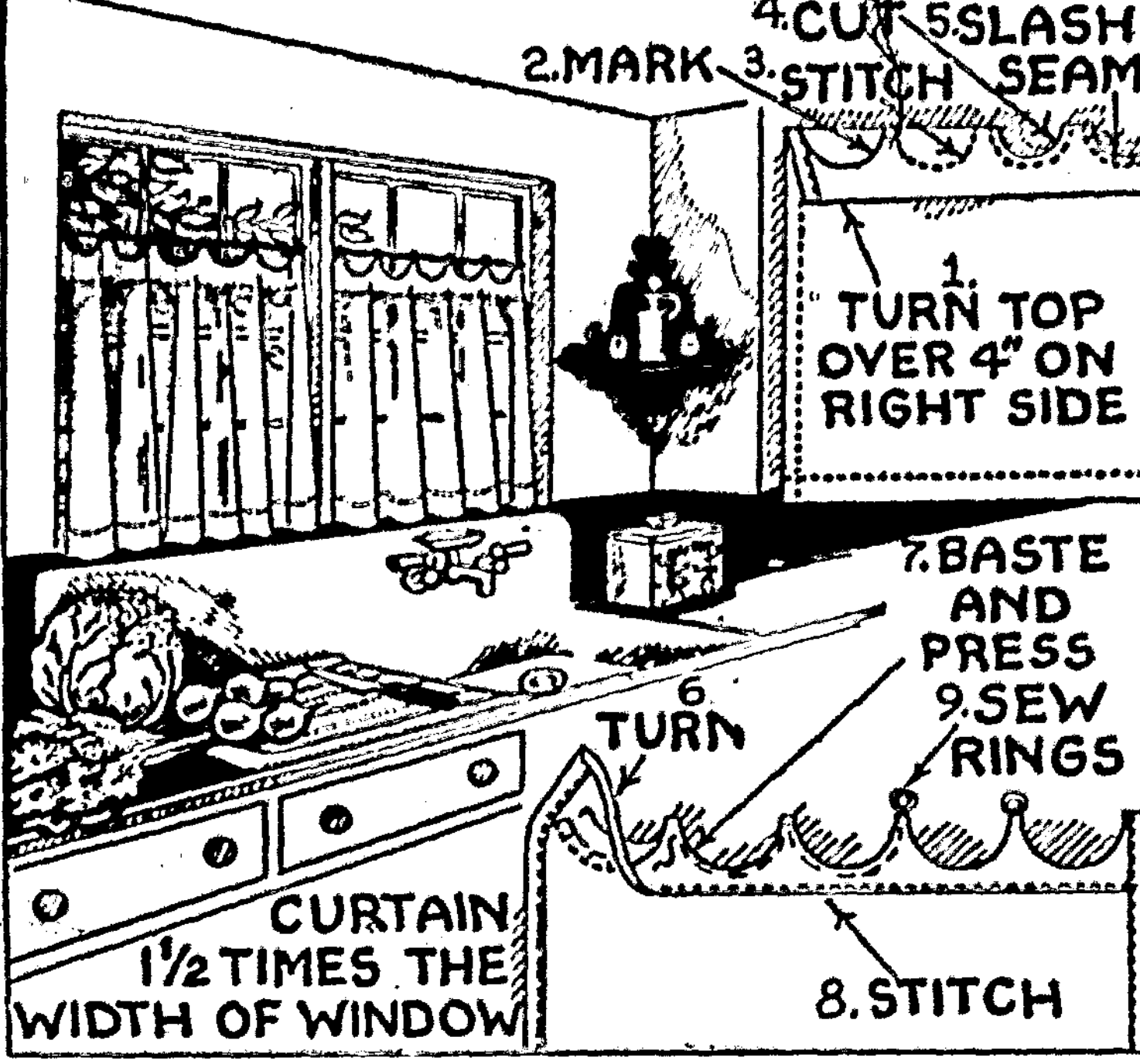

Scalloped Tops for Kitchen Curtains Or Sash Curtains in Any Other Room

By Ruth Wyeth Spears



HERE is a new idea for your kitchen curtains—or for sash curtains for any room. Crisp, sheer material such as lawn or organdy may be used and white or a plain light color will be most effective. The curtains are hung above eye level on a single rod fastened to the window sash. The four-inch-deep scalloped hem at the top shows through the sheer material giving a very decorative effect and the rings sewn to the points of the scallops make it possible to slide the curtains back and forth on the rods.

The trick in making the scalloped hem is in being sure that the curved edges follow a sharp, clean-cut line. All the steps are shown here in the diagrams. Use a small saucer or a large cup for marking the scallops, and when you turn them right side out, pull the material out smoothly at the points with a pin.

NOTE—The graceful corner bracket that you see beside the window in the sketch, also the stenciled wooden cookie box on the counter are made with pattern No. 226. The shelf is fourteen inches wide and the box is about seven inches high. The pattern for the shelf and the quaint peasant figures and lettering on the box are actual size. 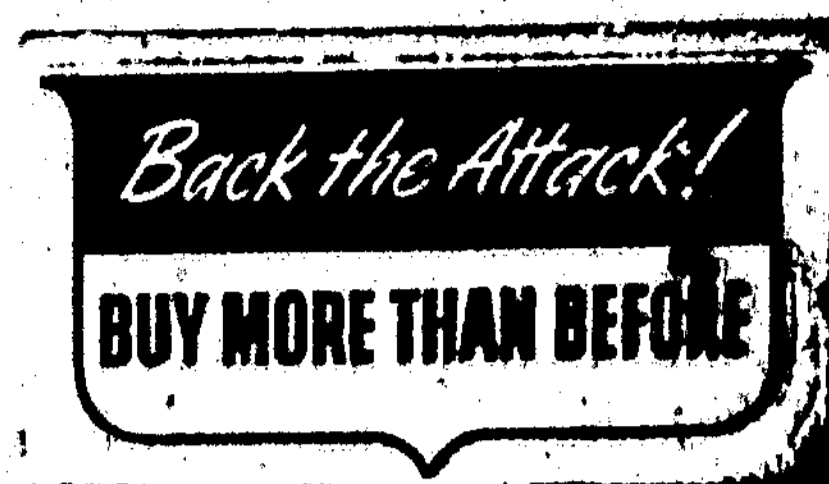
