New Deal Has Destroyed Democratic Party, Gov. John Bricker Declares

Governor John W. Bricker, Republican vice-presidential nominee, delivered a vigorous indictment of the New Deal Administration as he carried his speech-a-day campaign tour west of the Mississippi.

Speaking in St. Louis, on October 4th, over a nationwide network, Governor Bricker accused the New Deal of dividing the people of the nation in order to hold its power.

"It has set class against class," he said, "it has played minority groups for their political support. It has attacked not only the actions, but the motives of all who dared to oppose it. Never before have we had the bitterness, engendered by selfish political interests, that we have experienced in this administration."

Governor Bricker condemned the New Deal for "its vicious and persistent attacks upon business," and for using its extraordinary wartime power "to suppress the rights of the American people and to subordinate them to constant bureaucratic domination."

"I do not condemn the Administration for its legitimate efforts on behalf of the workers of this country," Governor Bricker continued. "But I do condemn the New Deal for its favoritism among labor groups, for playing one against another for political purposes, for bad administration of labor laws and for political adjudication of disputes between labor and management. Such tactics have resulted in strife and strikes, they have actually lessened war production."

Charging that the New Deal "is lending this nation away from American principles of government," Governor Bricker said that the Roosevelt Administration had destroyed the traditional Democratic party.

"Instead the reins of power have been turned over to such White House agents as Hopkins, Frankfurter, Rosenman, Pepper, Ickes, Kelly, Hague and the temporarily inactive Pendergast," he said. "They know little of the real life of America and they care less. They want power and jobs. Patronage is their meat and drink. Power is their passion. The American people are their victims."

"But there is now a more dangerous influence than these. As the New Deal took over the Democratic party—so now the Communists and the radicals have taken over the New Deal. The New Deal Convention in Chicago raised to the pedestal of power a man whose ideas of government are alien to the Constitution and free representative government. His name is Sidney Hillman."

"The millions of dollars collected by Hillman and his PAC, often from unwilling and intimidated hard working people of America, were too much for the New Deal leaders to pass by. They saw the opportunity to evade the Hatch Act—to defy the corrupt practices act—indeed to buy this election. A supine and political-minded attorney general helped pave the way by a purely political opinion."

Governor Bricker added that the Communists under Earl Browder had joined forces with Hillman in control of the New Deal Party. "They are seeking to tie the noose of Communism not only around the New Deal but around the whole American people," he concluded.

Governor Bricker also scored the New Deal in speeches at Bowling Green, Kentucky; Nashville, Tenn.; Minneapolis, Minn.; Centuria, Ill.; Ottumwa, Iowa; a Tri-City Meeting (Rock Island, Ill. and Davenport, Iowa); and Milwaukee.

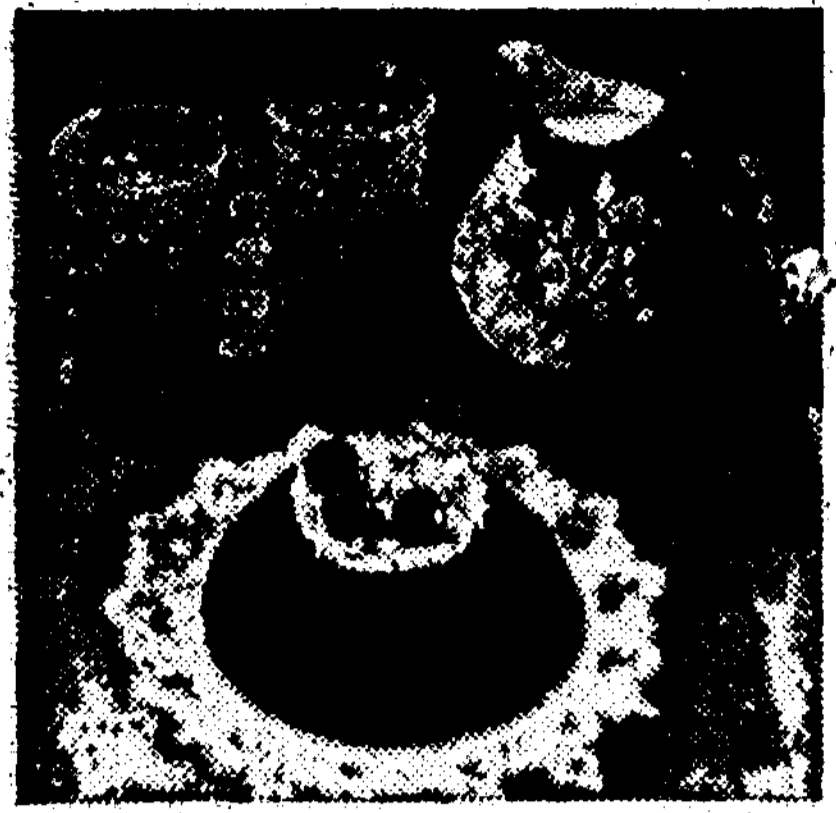

HOUSEHOLD MEMOS

Dress Up Vegetables, Serve Warm Dessert For Cool Weather



Vitamin-rich carrots are hidden in this lovely pudding along with nutritious cereal. It's inexpensive, point-wise and penny-wise when you're cooking on a limited food budget.

Hot Delicacies

As the weather becomes cool and wintry, we must shelve many of our warmer weather food favorites, but there are a host of other good cold weather recipes to take their place.

Nothing is quite so important to a person's well being as a good, substantial hot food served piping hot, and during the cooler months, everything at a meal may be served hot—soup, entree, vegetables and dessert.

First of all, let's look into the matter of substantial vegetable dishes you can make with home-canned produce. You probably have green beans, corn and tomatoes on hand. Here are ways to dress them up:

Scalloped Green Beans. (Serves 5)

2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup milk
1/2 cup liquid drained from beans
1/4 cup finely cut cheese
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
2 cups drained, canned green beans
1/4 cup buttered crumbs

Melt butter, add flour and blend well. Add milk slowly and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Add liquid from beans, mustard and cheese. Stir until cheese is melted. Add salt and pepper. Place alternate layers of beans and sauce in a buttered casserole, and top with crumbs. Bake in a pre-heated moderate (350-degree) oven for 30 minutes.

Fried Corn. (Serves 5-6)

2 cups corn
1 tablespoon chopped onion
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons drippings
2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons water

Simmer onions and green pepper in melted drippings for 3 minutes. Add corn, water and seasonings. Mix well, cover and cook slowly about 10 minutes.

Savory Tomatoes. (Serves 6)

1/2 cup diced bacon or salt pork
1 cup sliced onions
4 cups canned tomatoes
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
4 tablespoons flour

Fry bacon or salt pork until nearly crisp. Add onions and cook until lightly browned.

Add tomatoes, salt and pepper and simmer for about 10 minutes. Mix the flour with a small amount of cold water and stir into the tomatoes. Cook until thickened. This may be served as a sauce over meat, fish, cooked rice or spaghetti.

LYNN SAYS

Food Flashes: If a recipe calls for canned fruit, use stewed dried fruit if you don't have the home-canned product.

If you need whipped cream to dress up your favorite dessert, take top of the bottle milk, chill it well, combine with one of the whipped cream mixes and set in a bowl of cracked ice. Beat well. Dip scissors in flour before cutting raisins or other dried fruit. Make bread pudding of leftover cake, cookies, and bread. Serve with meringue, lightly browned to dress up the pudding, or orange marmalade, jam or jelly.

Use simple icings for cake or dust lightly with powdered sugar put through a lacy paper doily. This saves sugar!

Another hearty vegetable dish is this one made with potatoes and onions:

Scalloped Potatoes and Onions. (Serves 6)

6 medium-sized potatoes
4 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
8-12 pearl onions
2 cups milk

Pare and slice potatoes thin, with fancy cutter or paring knife. Butter casserole well. Place layer of potatoes at bottom of casserole, sprinkle with 1 tablespoon flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt and dot with some butter. Cover with a layer of onions and repeat until all potatoes, onion and seasonings are used. Pour scalded milk over top and dot with remaining butter. Bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven until potatoes and onions are tender.

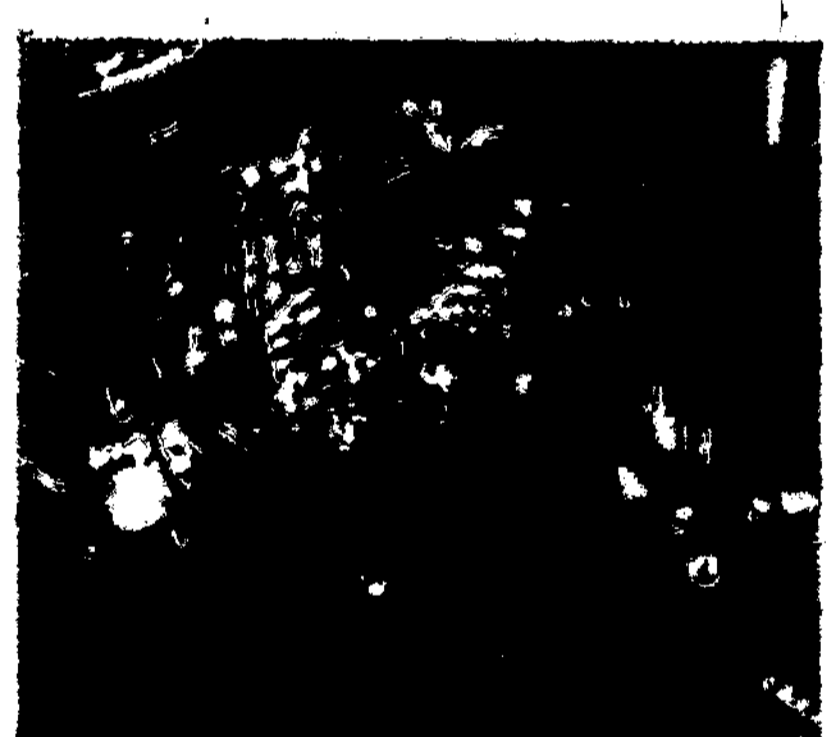
Hot desserts made with whole grain cereals add substantial vitamins and minerals to the diet:

Carrot Pudding. (Serves 9)

1/2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 1/2 cups grated carrot
1/2 cup whole bran
1 1/2 cups flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup milk
1 teaspoon lemon extract

Blend together sugar and shortening until light and fluffy. Add unbeaten egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each addition.

Stir in carrots and whole bran. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Stir into first mixture alternately with milk. Add flavoring and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 55-60 minutes. Serve warm with desired sauce and top with maraschino cherries.



Tired of serving potatoes the usual way? Try them scalloped with pearl onions, golden brown and piping hot and you have the answer to starchy vegetable problem of a meal.

Apple Crisp Pudding. (Serves 6)

4 cups sliced apples
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup honey
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 1/2 cups toasted bread cubes
1 1/2 cups corn flakes

Mix apples with combined sugar, spices and honey. Turn into shallow baking pan. Blend shortening and sugar thoroughly; add eggs and flavoring and beat well. Mix with bread cubes and corn flakes and spread over apples. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) 40-45 minutes or until apples are tender and top is browned and crisp.

Peach Rice Pudding. (Serves 4)

5 or 6 canned cling peach halves
2 cups cooked rice
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon or nutmeg
1 teaspoon butter

Cut canned cling peach halves into cubelets with scissors to make 1 1/2 cups chopped peaches. Alternate layers of chopped peaches and rice in an oiled casserole, starting with rice. Stir spice into brown sugar, and sprinkle some of mixture over each layer of rice. Make top layer rice and dot with bits of butter; cover casserole. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for 25 minutes. Serve warm with cream, if desired, but no sauce or cream is actually necessary.

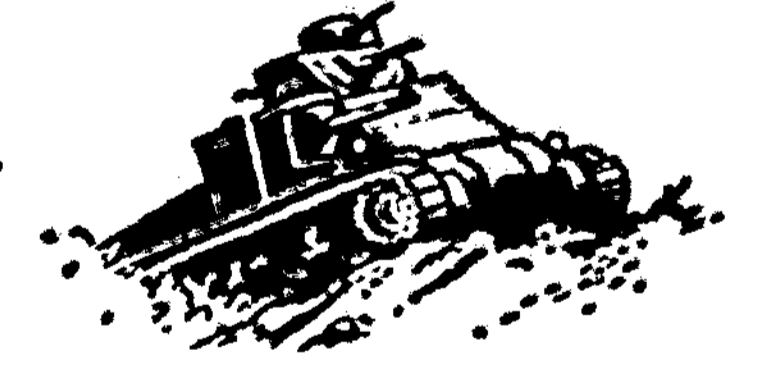

1 cup milk
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons shortening
