THE KEMMLER HORROR.

Kemmler, Co. P. S. convict, sentenced to be electrocuted, or to suffer death by electricity in the Auburn Penitentiary on the 6th inst, by the hands of the Warden of the prison, was murdered by the scientific men present on the occasion in a most outrageous and horrible manner. Dr. McDonald, the chief of the scientific men, when a sufficient number of scientists had gathered, according to his scientific direction, gave the command to "Drop" and the victim was pronounced dead because science, so-called, more properly it should be called "whim-whang" and "concoction." REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

A Convention of the Republican party is hereby called to meet at the city of Albuquerque, on the 15th day of September, 1890, to nominate a Delegate to represent the Territory in the 52nd Congress of the U. S.

The several counties of the Territory are entitled to representation as follows:

Bernamillo	12	San Juan	1
Colfax	7	San Miguel	1
Dona Ana	7	Santa Fe	8
Grant	7	Sierra	1
Lincoln	7	Socorro	9
Mora	6	Taos	7
Rio Arriba	9	Valencia	7

Two of which should come from the proposed county of Baldy, and two from the proposed county of Chavez.

County committees are requested to make all proper arrangements for the holding of county conventions and the selection of delegates. Under existing rules alternatives are not allowed, and proxies can not be recognized unless held by a resident of the same county as the delegate for whom the holder of the proxy acts.

County conventions will be composed of delegates chosen at precinct mass meetings.

Where no county committee exists the members of the territorial committee will perform the duties of the county committee.

County conventions should not be held later than August 30, '90. The chairman and secretary of county conventions will certify a list of delegates to the Territorial Convention, and mail same to the secretary of the executive committee at Santa Fe not later than September 2.

County conventions are charged with the proper organization of the party in the several counties, and especially to see that an efficient county committee is selected and that a chairman is appointed for every precinct.

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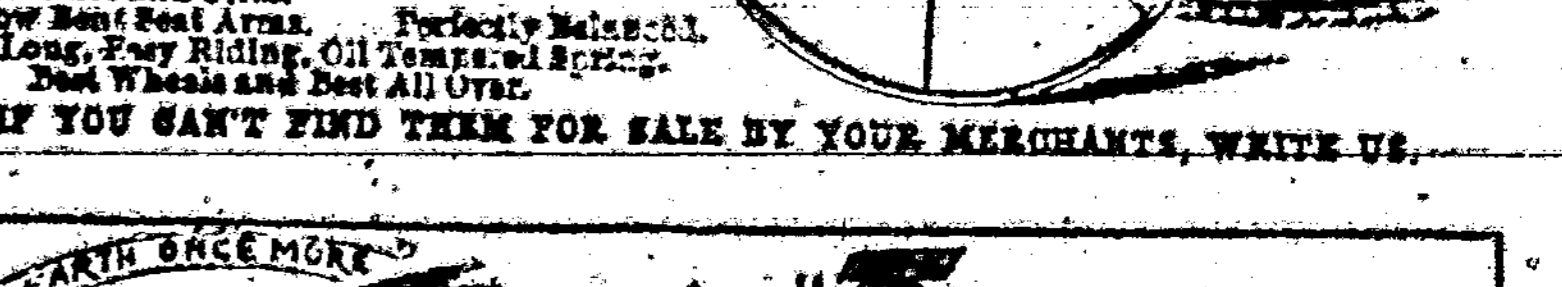
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
