### Southwest News Items

Airplane passenger and express service between Douglas, and Las Vegas, Nev., through Phoenix is proposed.

A refining plant to reclaim oils that have been used in the crankcase of motor cars and tractors, was opened in Clayton, N. M.

The John (Cactus Jack) Garner presidential boom has opened in Miami, Ariz., with the organization of a Garner-for-president club.

Storage in the Salt River reservoir near Phoenix at last reading, was 1,009,538 acre feet, more than twice as much as the total for one year ago.

Work on the 19 beacons on the Transcontinental and Western Air route between Kingman and Winslow, Arizona, will be started within the next ten or fifteen days.

Plans are complete for the Easter Sunrise Service at Miami, Ariz., which will be held on March 27 on High School Hill. At sunrise, 6:45 o'clock, trumpets will herald the dawn.

Announcement was made that Maricopa county, Ariz., will be entitled to 23 seats in the House of Representatives of the Eleventh Legislature, if the board of supervisors creates another district.

Below-freezing weather at Las Cruces, N. M., is believed to have killed all the apples and most of the peach crop, Mesilla valley farmers reported. The temperature dropped to 11 degrees above zero.

Copies of a resolution favoring a copper tariff, adopted by the directors and members of the Yavapai county, Arizona, chamber of commerce, are being prepared for sending to all chambers of commerce in the United States.

The Dona Ana County, N. M. Farm Bureau is now conducting its annual membership drive and those members in charge of the drive report unusual success considering the financial situation confronting the farmers of the valley.

Kingman, Ariz., will be host to the second annual meeting of the U. S. 66 Grand Canyon-Bighorn Dam Highway Association March 21 when delegates from three states will meet and make plans for the 1932 exploitation of the route.

The Arizona Corporation commission was hearing final arguments at Phoenix, on the petition of the Century Pacific Airlines for permission to operate inter-city service in the state. The application is being contested by the American Airways.

Final plans and extravagant preparations have been made for entertainment of the annual convention of the New Mexico Lions Clubs, District 40, which is to be held in Roswell on May 15th and 16th, when more than 200 delegates and guests will take part.

The number of ewes in strictly lambing bands in Arizona was about 25 per cent smaller than last year. The lamb crop saved was good and the lambs have made good growth and the quality of the market lambs will be fairly high. Desert range feed is excellent.

Fire loss in two Arizona towns was estimated at \$175,000. At Mesa, seventy miles east of Phoenix on the Apache trail, was the scene of a blaze which virtually wiped out an entire business block. City officials in the foothills mining town estimated losses at more than \$100,000.

Dr. Edward L. Siam, state veterinarian, and Dan C. McKinney, Elgin, president of the Arizona Cattle Growers' Association were appointed to represent the state at the 46th annual convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association in El Paso, March 15 to 17.

A financial statement of Arizona's condition shows \$3,394,645 of the 1931-32 tax levy amounting to \$6,409,928 had been collected. The remainder—\$3,015,282—is due by the end of the fiscal year. The treasurer said more than \$2,000,000 of that amount would be collected by that time.

Scientists of the Northern Arizona Museum of Science and Art reported at Flagstaff, that they have been able, through tree rings to determine the approximate date prehistoric inhabitants of the Arizona plateaus were driven out of their crude underground huts by eruptions of Sunset Crater.

Travel to the Petrified Forest Monument in New Mexico continues to show a distinct falling off from last year. Part of this condition can be accredited to the disagreeable weather which kept the Rio Puerco ford closed the entire month and part to the general business depression all over the country.

Mining interests and activities have revived business immeasurably at Hot Springs during the last thirty days, as numerous mining engineers, prospectors and other interested parties flow in. Among the mines and group that have started actual operations are the El Ojo, Bonanza, Gold Dust, Gold Dollar and Rhyolite.

An order has been issued by Charles F. Francis, secretary of the state livestock sanitary board, directing all Arizona cattle inspectors to file information against violators of the state law governing sale of fresh meat.

Mining men are pushing developments that are expected to yield gold and other metals in no mean quantities. "You don't need to mention it. Why don't you call up the police here and ask them what they mean?"


"What they mean what?"

Rules for Pharmacist Under "Bluff King Hal"

A prominent pharmacist and physician of Henry VIII's reign named Bullen, who is said to have been a cousin of Anne Bolleyn, one of the king's numerous wives, laid down these rules for the practice of pharmacy, wrote Charles H. He is neither to decrease nor diminish the physician's prescriptions. He is neither to buy nor sell rotten drugs. He must be able to open well a vein, for to help pleurisy. He is to meddle only in his own vocation, and to remember that his office is only to be the physician's cook."

**Melvin Traylor Asks Curb on Mounting Cost of Government**

Chicago Banker Shows Need of Caution in Spending Tax-payers' Money

Would Reform Tax Methods

Speaking before the International Chamber of Commerce at Washington, Melvin A. Traylor, President of the First National Bank of Chicago, said in part:

Another field in which those responsible for leadership must do some hard, sound thinking if we are to avoid disaster is that of public expenditures.

In this country, government is supposed to abide with the people, and yet we know that in no other field does leadership exert so great an influence upon the thought and action of the people as in the political sphere. In the fifteen-year period, from 1913 to 1928, our national income was estimated to have increased from about \$11 billion dollars to \$1 billion dollars annually, or 135 per cent; in the same period the expenditures of our governmental divisions in the United States have increased from a little less than three billion dollars to more than 12 1/2 billion dollars, or approximately 300 per cent.

It is perfectly true, of course, that, insofar as the Federal Government is concerned, the major part of the increase in that direction is accounted for by our participation in the World War; but it is interesting to observe that for the fiscal year ending in 1928, federal expenditures were only 31 1/2 per cent of the combined outlay for all political administration in the United States.

**Local Expenditures Digt Item**  
Figures are not available for the years following 1928, except for the Federal Government, whose expenditures increased 10.7 per cent for the fiscal year ending in 1929, and 6 per cent in 1930. It may be assumed that like increases have occurred in other political subdivisions of the country. For the year ending in 1928, the cost of administration of State Governments, amounted to 14 1/2 per cent of the total; of the remainder, over 64 per cent went to sustain local governments.

**Tragedy in Insect World**

There was a sort of uneasy restlessness hovering over the hundreds of victims in the death chamber. Whitmire, the death man, was peering at them through the glass walls of the chamber.

Presently his hand was gripping the huge lever of the giant atomizer. A thin spray of death was coming from the large nozzle. Death had come to the hapless victims.

Twenty-four hours later this executioner counted the ones that had actually been killed by this poisonous spray. Then he calculated with precision the percentage that had met death with that solution—85 percent that time, a trifle more than the day before.

This drama of death takes place every day in that air-tight room in the research laboratories of Purina Mills known as the fly death chamber. Here solutions are tested under all sorts of conditions to determine which one is best for fly spray manufacture.

This daily death house procedure goes on under the direction of H. E. Whitmire.

Whitmire explains that flies used in the experimental work are all the same age—litter mates many of them, he says. They first are fed a solution of bran, middlings, and alfalfa meal treated with a suspension of yeast and dehydrated beef extract which form a mixture Whitmire calls artificial horse manure.

The manure is placed in large screened-in breeder cages into which adult flies are introduced.

Here they lay eggs that soon develop into larvae. From the larva stage they are placed in screened-in brooder jars, where they develop into pupae. In a few days they are grown flies.

After five days they are ready for execution, the really important part they play in developing the latest information for making fly sprays.

"That, in short," Whitmire

Naturally, those responsible for government desire to give their constituency the finest educational facilities; the best roads, streets, public parks, playgrounds, and other facilities obtainable, but, after all, there is no denying the fact that expenditures for such purposes bear a very close relation to the individual, because they mortgage his future earnings for consumable and rapidly deteriorating goods.

Every bond issue for the public welfare is an installment debt on the earning capacity of every individual and enterprise in the community affected. "Not only does it involve installment amortization of the debt itself, but a constantly increasing charge for maintenance and upkeep if the improvement is to be preserved against early deterioration and quick ruin.

Most of the taxing machinery of the country was created at a time when the present volume of public debt was not thought possible; and it is, therefore, inadequately and inequitably adjusted to meet the emergencies of the present burden.

The consequences is that in almost every major political subdivision of the country certain classes of wealth escape taxation, or pay little, while other types of property are charged with an unbearable obligation.

The duty of leadership, therefore, in this field is two-fold. First, and most important of all, a greater degree of caution must be exercised in the creation of government obligations; and, second, an immediate reform in taxing machinery must be undertaken.

**Effects of "Federal Aid"**

In connection with the creation of indebtedness, it is high time that those responsible for State administration consider the pernicious and seductive influence of so-called Federal aid for public improvements.

In many instances, this policy of public expenditure approaches closely to political bribery and in almost every case, lends itself to political log-rolling, the surrender of state sovereignty, and a gradual impoverishment of fiscal units. Moreover, we have said nothing of the proposal and promulgation of undertakings which in many instances are not justified by the necessity of the situation or by the utilization of the facilities contemplated. Let there be no mistake in this respect.

Let us face the facts. Unless there is a return to sanity in the matter of public expenditures, default and repudiation of public obligations cannot be much longer avoided.





Cross-word Puzzle on Health



Of course, your health and diet habits may also need correction.

# VANDALS NOT SOLE WRECKERS OF ROME

An unanticipated by-product of the wholesale excavations undertaken in Rome by order of Mussolini has been to clear the barbarian invaders of much of the stigma formerly attached to their name. As a result of the discoveries in the vicinity of Trajan's forum, Corrado Vivanti, director of excavations, has formulated the conclusion that earthquakes, internal strife, sheer carelessness and indifference wrought far more destruction in ancient Rome than did the barbarians.

One of the latest discoveries is a long colonnade of heavy pillars all toppled, leaning against each other like trees bent by a strong wind. Their destruction was not due to human vandals, but was traced to an earthquake in 801, when the city was under the papal rule of Poppo Leo III. As the excavations have revealed increasing evidence that the barbarians were maligned, the director's work has intensified their study of the old historical records and they have been able to demonstrate that many buildings and temples supposedly destroyed in the "sack" of the city, were standing long after the last barbarian departed.

Much of the bad name of the barbarians may be due to the prejudiced reporting by the early Christians, who, as was amply demonstrated in the reports of persecutions under the

empire, never let accuracy stand in the way of giving their enemies a bad name. Even without support from the most unprejudiced records to be found the archeologists in charge of the present work have become convinced by the massive size of the structures uncovered that the destruction of buildings by the invading armies was out of the question.—Washington Star.
