## Martin Pleads Not Guilty

### Bound Over Without Bond to Await Action of Grand Jury

Judge Numa C. Frenger was here last Saturday to preside at the preliminary hearing which was conducted by District Attorney M. A. Threut for Hollis Martin, age 17, of Altus, Oklahoma, who was allegedly responsible for the death, on Saturday, November 9th, of his uncle, Willard Shafer; his aunt, Mrs. Carrie Martin Shafer, and his little eight year old cousin, Tommie Shafer, of Tinnie.

The youthful Martin entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of murder. The following witnesses testified at the morning session: Mr. Stover and little son, Mrs. Robinson and daughter, Kate Robinson; the youth's uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Alex. Martin; Celestino Vigil, constable; Mr. A. S. McCamaut, Sheriff of this county. The afternoon session was occupied with testimony from the following: Mr. Trujillo, Roscoe Bloodworth, Clyde Woods, Tommy Tompkins, Walter Gurn, Sheriff Frank Young of Chavez county, State Policemen Jackson and McHugh, and Miss Gibbony. Some testified as to the gun, and the blood-stained hatchet which was discovered at the Shafer home Sunday morning, Nov. 10th. All testified to a bright green "66" cap, which the defendant had been wearing on the occasions they had seen him.

Attorney John E. Hall was appointed by the court to represent the defendant. The defense did not call any witnesses.

The defendant was remanded to jail without bond, to await the action of the District Court. He was transferred to the penitentiary at Santa Fe last Saturday for safe keeping.

## Regulations Governing Grazing Appeals

(Continued from last week)

8. The local representative of the Division of Grazing will duly submit to the register an estimate of the probable expense required on behalf of the Government. He will represent the Director of Grazing in the proceedings and also cause subpoenas to be served upon such witnesses as he may desire to call and take such other steps as are necessary to prepare the case for hearing.

9. In appropriate cases, testimony may, by order of the register, and after such notice as he may direct, be taken before a United States commissioner, or other officer authorized to administer oaths at a time and place to be designated in a notice of the taking of such testimony, in accordance with the rules of practice in cases before the Land Department.

10. Upon the date set for the hearing or the day to which it may continue the testimony of the witnesses for either party may be submitted. The representative of the Division of Grazing and the representatives of the appellant or other parties may examine and cross-examine witnesses. The proceedings will be governed by the rules of practice in cases before the Land Department and when the testimony of all the witnesses has been submitted and the hearing completed, the entire record will be transmitted by the register through the Commissioner of the General Land Office to the Director of the Division of Grazing without recommendation.

11. Each party must pay the cost of taking the testimony on direct examination of his witnesses and the cross-examination on his behalf of other witnesses; the cost of noting motions, objections, and exceptions must be paid by the party on whose behalf the same are made. The register, or other hearing officer, may require a party to give security for costs including expense of taking and transcribing testimony.

12. The appellant and other parties in interest may file briefs and arguments in connection with the record of the hearing at such time as may be agreed upon by the local representative of the Division of Grazing and the claimants or their representatives, not exceeding 30 days after completion of the hearing.

13. After the record has been transmitted to the Secretary of the Interior the proceedings will be governed by the rules of practice as in other cases on appeal in the Land Department, see 51 L. D. 547.

14. Costs incurred on behalf of the Government will be paid from the appropriation for the purposes of administration of the grazing act.

### THE BLIND POSTMAN

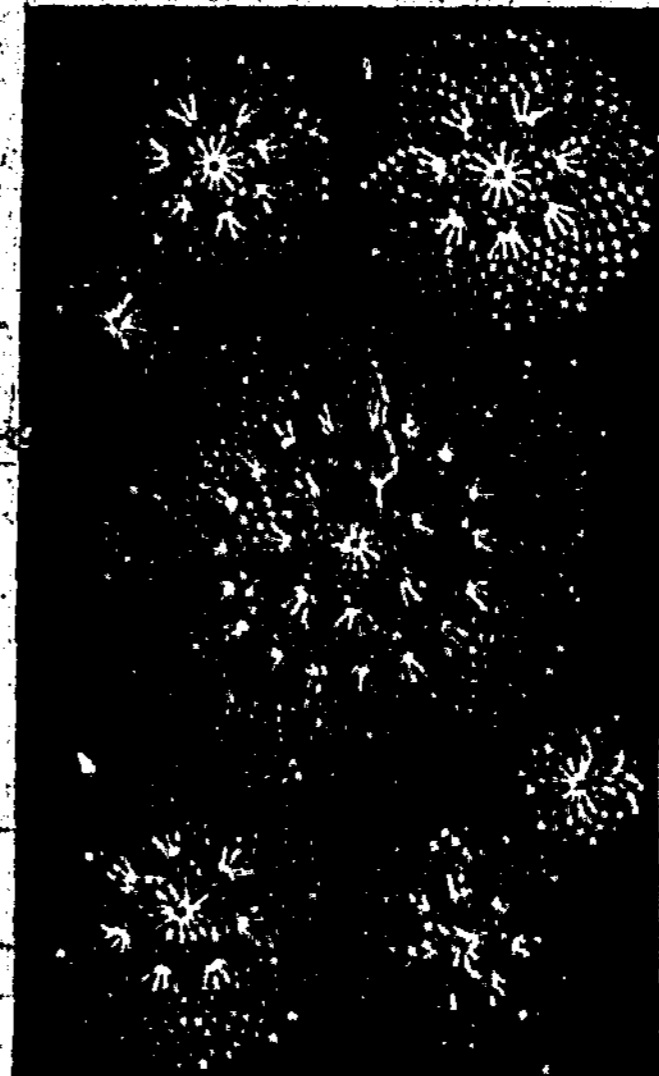

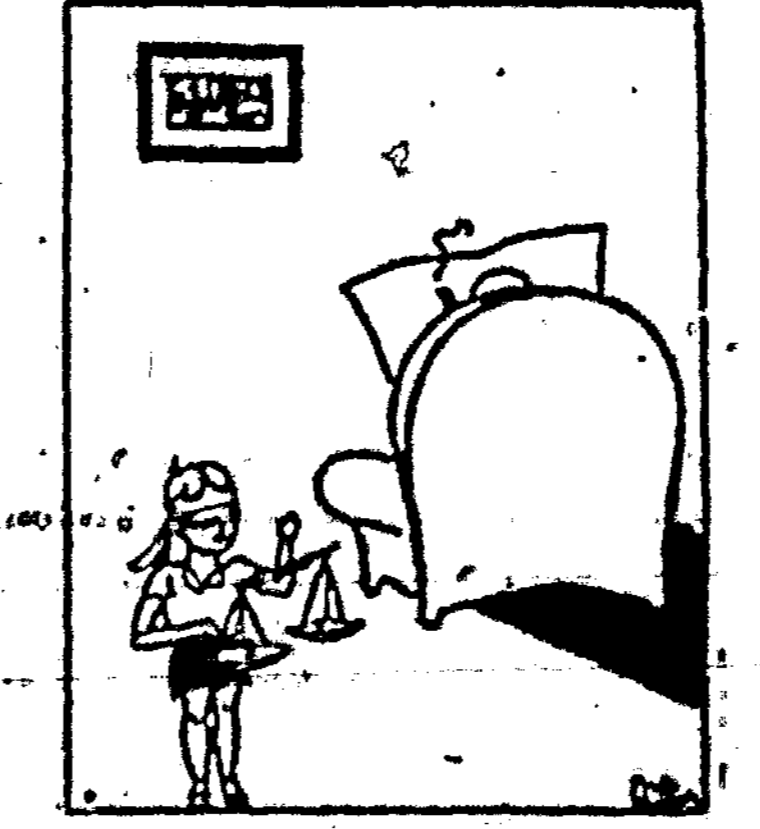
Answer: The best way for a woman to keep her "youth" is not to introduce "him" to any other women.

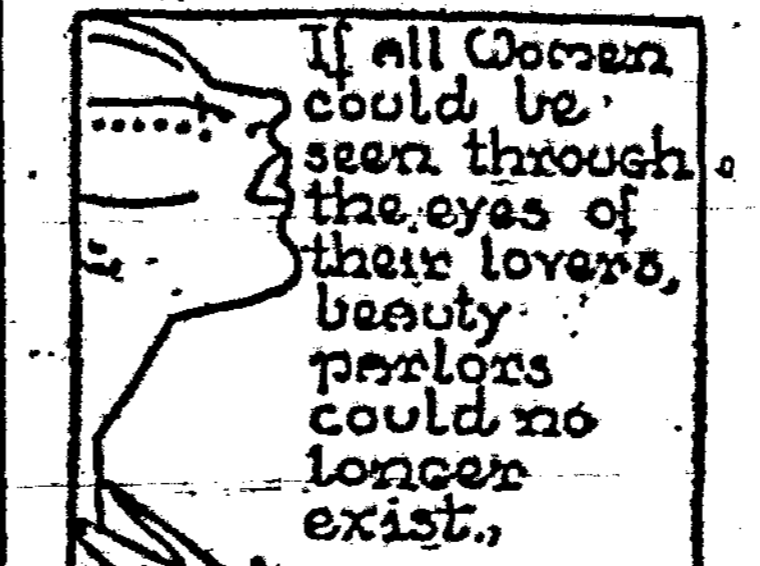

## MOTHER'S COOK BOOK

#### FOOD SUGGESTIONS

A FRUIT cocktail is liked by such a large majority of people that it is usually served as a beginning for a luncheon or dinner. Fresh fruit is always the favorite, but now that canned grapefruit is available in almost any market, it, with other canned fruits, makes a most tasty cocktail. A canned pear, peach, a bit of pineapple with some of the fruit juice will make a most delectable cocktail. Sometimes the addition of a fresh orange will add to the flavor, with a cherry or two for color.  
When something different is wanted for a vegetable try:

**Celery au Gratin.**  
Cut the celery into small bits and cook in boiling salted water until tender but not too soft. Drain and place in a baking dish with a rich white sauce, a layer of each and top with the celery, covered with a half-inch top of buttered crumbs. Bake in a hot oven until the crumbs are brown. Add grated cheese for a more nourishing dish, which, if a cupful of cheese is used, will do for a main dish at luncheon.

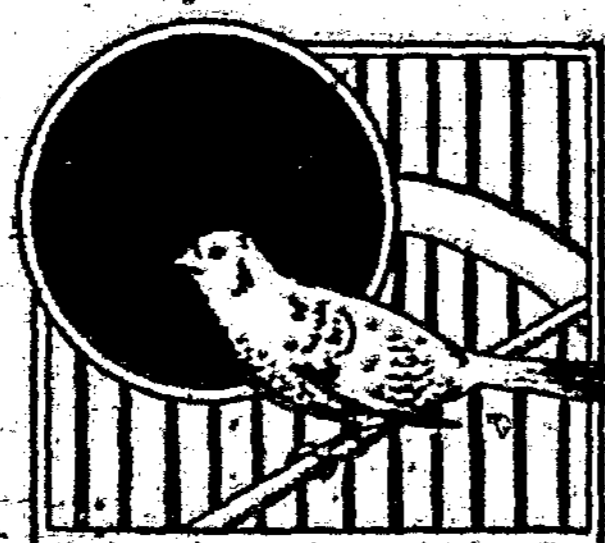
One of these chilly days serve fried salt pork with cream gravy, baked potatoes and onions and apples cooked together in a small amount of sweet fat. If the apples are very tart add a little sugar which will also add to the flavor and color. Cook the onions until about half done before adding the apples sliced. Serves as a vegetable.

vegetables such as cabbage, endive or cooked spinach or chard is most important for the health of the family.

Dress the lettuce simply with hot bacon fat and a dash of vinegar or lemon juice, or melted butter, hot, if bacon is not liked. Then the old-fashioned way of serving lettuce with just sugar and vinegar is one of which few ever tire.
