Newton Jenkins, Chicago, Out for Presidency

NEWTON JENKINS of Chicago, who as an independent candidate for the mayoralty of that city last April. received 11 per cent of the votes cast, has approvinced that he is a candidate for President of the United States.

"The Third party will nominate a President." he said in a mimeographed statement sent to the newspapers. "I am a candidate for that nomination."

The "Third party" to which be referred is an organization which he had incorporated last year. It has candidates for two municipal offices.

Legal Measures to Stop Seizures of Telegrams

OHIEF JUSTICE ALFRED A WHEAT of the District of Columbla Supreme court checked the telegram-seizing activities of the Black senate committee on lobbying. He granted the Chicago law firm of Slias H. Strawn an injunction restraining the Western Union Telegraph company from glying the committee copies. of the firm's telegrams.

The judge said the subpoena served on the telegraph company by the committee, cailing for copies of telegrams "goes way beyond" the committee's powers.

Next day William Randolph Hearst, newspaper publisher, began a fight in court to keep an original confidential telegram out of the hands of the Black committee; and the American Newspaper Publishers' association denounced the reported seizure of that telegram, which was to one of Mr. Hearst's editors. The association advised any other editor, should he learn of similar action, to consult counsel and "take vigorous steps to protect his constitutional rights."

Lord Beatty had a meteoric caréer as a naval commander and displayed his ability in the battles of Heligoland Bight and Dogger Bank. and especially in the battle of Intland where he commanded the first battle cruiser squadron. His wife, who died in 1832, was Ethel Field, daughter of the Chleago merchant prince, Marshall



Fat for deep frying is at the correct temperature when an inch cube of bread dropped into it becomes a golden brown in 60 seconds. This is for cooked mixtures.



O Bell Bradicate -- TVNU Service

Tree planting in this country is tooking up, according to the United States forest service. In 1035 the forest service's own planting on national forest lands was very close to a quarter million acres, more than that planted by all agencies federal, state, and private—in 1034 when the total was 200,333 acres. Many of the other agencies planted substantially greater acreages in

1935 than the year before, Uncle Sam, although relatively new at it, is becoming the world's leading tree planter. Up to last year his grand total of plantings by all agencies amounted to only 2,534,507 .acres, equal to about half the area of Massachusetts. This year's plantings crease the total by more than 10 per cent. There are more than 162,000, 000 acres-in-our national forests nione, and the estimated total forest acreage in this country is over 500,-000,000 acres.
