## COMMUNITY LOSS GREAT IN DEATH OF DR. F. H. JOHNSON

### Double Pneumonia Claims Distinguished Citizen and Mayor of Carrizozo

Carrizozo was grievously shocked, Monday to learn that Dr. F. H. Johnson had passed away at his hospital at 5:15 p. m. from pneumonia. Doctors and nurses from El Paso, his wife, his friends, everyone, did all that was humanly possible to save his life, but to no avail.

Dr. Johnson was only seriously ill from Saturday until Monday. His death came as a complete surprise to most of his friends. Not only his devoted wife, but the whole community and county at large suffer from the death of this most progressive and public spirited citizen. He was very brilliant, a skillful surgeon, and people everywhere had confidence in him and recognized him as a man of unusual, outstanding ability.

He had much civic pride and was at the head of every movement to improve the community. He was a hard fighter, a good organizer, a leader in progressive enterprises. He was frank, honest and possessed unflinching courage. The community will miss his fine spirit, his initiative and his influence.

Dr. Johnson was born in Alabama in 1881. Came to Lincoln county to reside in 1913. Many honors had been bestowed upon him throughout his active life. During the World war he was captain; after the war he was commissioned major in the New Mexico reserve corps. He was at the time of his death, director of the Carrizozo Country Club, vice-president of the Business Men's Club, secretary of the state board of medical examiners and surgeon for the Southern Pacific.

Two years ago at the earnest solicitation of friends, he ran for mayor of Carrizozo and was elected by a sweeping majority. Death claimed him just fifteen days before the next biennial city election was to have been held.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday at 3 o'clock from the Methodist church by the Rev. John L. Lawson of Hot Springs, assisted by the Rev. J. A. Bell, local pastor followed by interment in Evergreen cemetery. The church was crowded to overflow by friends from all over the county to show esteem. The cars in the procession extended from the cemetery to the church.

# Current Events in Review

## Situation in Europe Is Still Threatening

SIXTY thousand German troops in the Rhineland that was supposed to be demilitarized. Practically the entire French army in and behind the vast system of fortifications along France's eastern frontier. The French government, backed by the other signers of the violated Locarno treaty and by the little entente, Poland and Russia, demanding that Germany withdraw her troops from the Rhineland or that sanctions, economic and possibly military, be imposed by the League of Nations. Great Britain trying hard to keep the peace, reproving Germany, supporting the French demands in great measure, but urging that Hitler's proposal of new non-aggression pacts be given consideration. Reichsfuhrer Hitler reviewing his forces in the re-occupied territory and receiving the loud plaudits of the inhabitants for restoring their military sovereignty.

That in a nutshell was the perilous situation in Europe as the representatives of the League of Nations and the council of the league assembled in London to consider what to do next. Foreign Minister Pierre Etienne Flandin of France was there with the full support of Premier Laval for his demands that immediate action be taken to bring Hitler to time.

The Franco-Russian treaty came up in the French senate and was ratified by a huge majority. It is this pact that Hitler gave as his excuse for remilitarizing the Rhineland, asserting that it was a violation of the Locarno treaty, being aimed at Germany. It is the final link in the "iron ring" around the Reich.

Great Britain, France, Belgium and Italy, signers of the Locarno treaty, agreed that Germany had violated that pact and the Versailles treaty and referred the matter to the council of the league. But Britain, still striving to find the peaceful way out of the row, was averse to the immediate imposition of sanctions, and naturally Italy, herself suffering from that form of punishment, felt the same way. Foreign Secretary Eden of England continued his efforts to persuade Hitler to withdraw the troops from the Rhineland pending discussions, and urged upon Flandin the advisability of considering the German chancellor's proposals for a 25 year peace pact.

Cooperating with the British for peace, the league council invited Hitler to send a representative to its meeting. His reply was considered "unsatisfactory" by the British and enraged the French. He said, in effect, that he would send a representative to the council's deliberations only on condition that the other powers meet it there on a basis of full equality and promptly consider new treaty negotiations to replace the Locarno pact.

French Premier Sarraute and his cabinet according to officials in Paris, at once instructed Flandin to fight to the bitter end for the punishment of Germany, deciding that it would be better to take such a stand, even if it "wrecks the league," rather than bargain away "the nation's just right" by accepting Hitler's proposals for a new Locarno. Sarraute was reported to be ready even to quit the league, taking France's allies with him. If the council did not accede to his demands, Germany's "army day" celebration was much quieter in the Rhineland than had been planned, owing to the tense situation. Troops at Frankfurt were inspected by War Minister Werner von Blumberg and there was a speech by Hitler; but the military parades and other features were canceled. Elsewhere in the Reich the day was duly observed but the feeling of anxiety was general and unobscured.

The Frankfurter Zeitung, which like all German newspapers is under close government supervision, published a warning that Germany may repudiate her foreign debts if she is penalized for the rearmament of the Rhineland.

## New York's Building Service Strike Ends

COMPLIANCE brought to an end the two weeks' strike of building service workers in New York and thousands of elevator operators and other employees returned to their jobs in some 2,400 apartment houses and business structures. The settlement provided for immediate re-employment of all strikers and arbitration of wages and hours, and it was hailed as a "great victory" by James J. Dunne, head of the local union and leader in the strike.

Arbitration of minimum wages and maximum hours under supervision of Ferdinand A. Sileo, chief of the United States forestry service. Wages and hours are to be fixed at the end of each of the next three years on the basis of prevailing economic conditions.

operators, in their turn, agreed to reinstate all strikers instead of insisting on the retention of 15 per cent of the replacement workers hired during the strike.

## Prince Serge Mdivani Killed by Polo Pony

PRINCE SERGE MDIVANI, one of the more or less famous brothers from the Russian province of Georgia who have married so many American actresses and movie actresses, was killed by the kick of a polo pony at Delray Beach, Fla., during a game with Cecil Smith's Texan team. Only five weeks before the prince became the husband of Louise Astor Van Alen, and she and her mother witnessed the fatal accident. Serge was divorced by Pola Negri and Mary McCormack, and then married Miss Van Alen, who had divorced his brother Alexis. The latter was killed some months ago in a motor accident in Spain shortly after his marriage to Barbara Hutton had ended in divorce. The third of the brothers is Prince David, former husband of Mae Murray.

## Leftist Riots in Spain Arouse the Army

SINCE the recent elections in Spain the riots staged by the leftists have been growing more vicious daily, and after disorders at Logrono in which a number of persons were killed the Spanish army was aroused to vigorous protest. Premier Manuel Azana was told by the officers that unless his new left government adopted measures to stop the widespread violence the army would take the maintenance of order into its own hands. Gen. Carlos Masquelet, minister of war, was said to be in sympathy with the army's demand.

Azana held a heated conference with Francisco Largo Caballero, president of the Socialist party and is said to have told him that he believed revolutionary Socialists were responsible for most of the disorders, demanding that the violence cease immediately. Largo insisted that the Socialists be permitted to demonstrate, but finally gave in to the premier and issued orders to all Socialists to behave themselves.

Despite strict censorship imposed by the governor of Logrono it was learned that incendiaries there set fire to six convents and churches, four rightist centers and a flightless newspaper, and then attacked the army barracks, attempting to seize artillery.

## Destruction by Floods in Eastern States

SPRING thaws and heavy rains created a serious condition throughout the northeastern states and as far southward as Pennsylvania and New Jersey, and in the Maritime provinces of Canada. The number of reported deaths was not great but many cities and towns were threatened by great ice jams that were swept down the swollen rivers, and vast areas of the countryside were under water. Textile mills and other industrial plants were forced to close down and railway traffic was handicapped.

## Britain Names Inskip to Co-Ordinate Defense

PROCEEDING with its great rearmament program, the British government has named Sir Thomas Inskip, attorney general since 1932, to be the co-ordinator of the entire scheme, giving him a newly created cabinet post. This selection by Prime Minister Baldwin was a surprise. It had been thought the post might go to Winston Churchill, Neville Chamberlain, Alfred Duff Cooper or Sir Samuel Hoare.

Sir Thomas is known as an "anti-linguist," is sixty years old and always is calm and unruffled in the house of commons or at the bar. It will be his duty as defense co-ordinating minister to synchronize activities of the army, navy, and air services.

## Cummings Is Winner in Disputes With Ickes

IN UPHOLDING the conviction of Leonard Walter McIntosh, chief clerk of the department of public works of the Virgin Islands, on a minor theft charge the federal circuit court of appeals at Philadelphia ruled that the federal department of justice has complete control over the district court and the government attorney of the islands. This was a victory for Attorney General Cummings over Secretary of the Interior Ickes, for the latter's department, using the suit as a test case to determine control of the civil affairs of the Virgin Islands, had asked that the conviction of McIntosh be set aside as unjustified.

## Newton Jenkins, Chicago, Out for Presidency

NEWTON JENKINS of Chicago, who as an independent candidate for the majority of that city last April, received 11 per cent of the votes cast, has announced that he is a candidate for President of the United States. "The Third party will nominate a President," he said in a mimeographed statement sent to the newspapers. "I am a candidate for that nomination."

The "Third party" to which he referred is an organization which he had incorporated last year. It has candidates for two municipal offices.

## Legal Measures to Stop Seizures of Telegrams

CHIEF JUSTICE ALFRED A. WHREAT of the District of Columbia Supreme court checked the telegram-seizing activities of the Black senate committee on lobbying. He granted the Chicago law firm of Silas H. Strawn an injunction restraining the Western Union Telegraph company from giving the committee copies of the firm's telegrams.

The judge said the subpoena served on the telegraph company by the committee, calling for copies of telegrams "goes way beyond" the committee's powers.

## Franco Makes Paraguay Totalitarian State

COL. RAFAEL FRANCO, who became provisional president of Paraguay after the recent revolution there, has set up a totalitarian government modeled after German Nazism and Italian Fascism. He issued a decree which declared the state and the "liberating revolution" of February 17 as indivisible and banned for one year political, labor, or other unions which "do not emanate explicitly from the state."

Paraguay, the government asserted, will be purged of "endemic, demagogic, industrial, and sectarian evils." The official statement places in the "liberating army" the principal source of authority.

The aims of the new government, the decree said, will be the construction of a new, strong Paraguay and constitutional reorganization for a future republic.

Franco's government was formally recognized at Asuncion by diplomatic representatives of the United States, Chile, Brazil, Argentina, Peru, Uruguay, Great Britain, France, Germany and Spain.

## Death of Earl Beatty, British Navy Figure

EARL BEATTY, commander of the British war fleet in 1916-18 and afterward first lord of the admiralty, died in London after a long illness at the age of sixty-five. Rising from a sick-bed to attend the funeral of Earl Jellicoe last November, he predicted that he would soon follow his colleague. Lord Beatty had a meteoric career as a naval commander and displayed his ability in the battles of Heligoland Blight and Dogger Bank, and especially in the battle of Jutland where he commanded the first battle cruiser squadron. His wife, who died in 1932, was Ethel Field, daughter of the Chicago merchant prince, Marshall Field.

## Davis Sent to Europe to Study Conditions

CHESTER C. DAVIS, head of the Invaliated AAA, is not going to administer the soil conservation program devised as a substitute. President Roosevelt announced that Mr. Davis would leave soon on a trip to Europe to make a special study for the government of economic conditions bearing on the agricultural plans for this country. Critics of the administration immediately assumed that Mr. Davis and Secretary of Agriculture Wallace had disagreed and that the former was being gently edged out of the picture. This Mr. Wallace warmly denied, asserting there had been no friction.

## England's Bachelor King Hints He May Marry

GREAT BRITAIN is interested and pleased to learn that King Edward VIII may abandon his state of bachelorhood and take unto himself a wife. This was revealed when the king authorized these lines in the message submitting the civil list to the house of commons: "His majesty desires that the contingency of his marriage should be taken into account so that, in that event, there should be a provision for her majesty."

Five princesses of Europe are considered most eligible to become Edward's spouse. These are Irene and Catherine of Greece (whose ancestry is Danish), Juliana of the Netherlands, Sogelia of Greece, and Kyre of Russia, daughter of Grand Duke Cyril of Russia who is pretender to the Russian throne.

So I'm repeating the solemn warning. It won't do any good, crown-up vanity and greed and ambition being what they are.

ALIBERTIA, in Canada, produced an economic Messalah, a spouting John the Baptist of the dispensation, who came out of the wilderness with a lovely device called a "social credit system" which, among other pleasant things, guaranteed every adult in the land \$25 a month for life.

So the voters overwhelmingly elected him as premier and from over the dominion stocked in thousands to share in the distribution. Now they're hasted; the budget is a sieve; citizens are faced with ruinous taxes—and nobody yet has collected that twenty-five a month.

Industrial depression always spawns its self-appointed saviors who promise to restore prosperity by giving money they haven't got to people who haven't earned it. After a while, in spite of human folly, good times return.

## Southwestern Briefs

The Las Cruces Music Club sponsored its annual music-meet of Las Cruces grade schools March 17.

John R. Franks, young superintendent, has resigned his appointment as United States commissioner at Prescott.

Dr. L. M. Fultz will join the University of Arizona as assistant professor of botany, according to President Homer L. Shantz.

Carlsbad will be the meeting city of the New Mexico Public Health Association and New Mexico Medical Society, May 6 to 8, inclusive.

Murry South of the Sweet Potato Association at Portales, reported shipments of twenty carloads of sweet potatoes from the Portales region.

The J. A. Casson Company, Phoenix, submitted the low bid to the Arizona State Highway Department for construction of an underpass at Douglas.

James T. Manders, Tucson city auditor, announced that Tucson's receipts the first eight months of the fiscal year exceeded budget estimates by \$20,018.

Luther Hudson of Forrest, New Mex., and Joe Bonom, Tucumanari, New Mex., have been appointed school budget commissioners for Quay county by the county commission.

Arizona state income tax revenue has shown an increase of 53 per cent compared to figures available for March, 1935, according to Director Emmet M. Barry.

W. J. Jamieson, Arizona WPA administrator, has appointed Starling M. Morse of Mesa as WPA engineer for Gila county. He succeeds Herman A. Bell of Miami.

The Arizona Tax Commission has granted the Mohave county board of supervisors permission to issue an emergency levy of \$2,500 to be used for the county hospital.

The Arizona Highway Commission has awarded the contract for three miles of grading and draining of the Holbrook-St. Johns route to Leo Moor Contracting Company of El Paso.

A streak of eight-inch high-grade iron sulphide ore that assays over an ounce in gold, has been located on North Star Mountain, near Brockton, in the Beziroso-Bowick placer.

The Hiking Club at the Arizona State Teachers College has completed plans for a trip to the Rainbow Natural Bridge. Only members who have hiked 100 miles will be eligible to make the long trek.

Governor Tingloy has reported that the New Mexico annual advertising campaign is under way and first ads will appear in March magazines. Fifty thousand dollars has been set aside for advertising in twenty-one magazines.

Advertisements to cost approximately \$1,500 are to be undertaken in the near future by the First Congregational Church of Prescott, Arizona, including the installation of a coal-burning battery of furnaces and interior decorations.

An open competitive examination for surveyor, to fill a vacancy in the position of instrumentman in the United States Indian service at Truxton Canyon agency, Valentine, Ariz., has been announced by the United States civil service commission.

Y. C. White, state banking superintendent, announced that all proffered and trust claims allowed by the court in the Phoenix Farmers State Bank settlement here have been paid in full and general creditors have received 90 per cent in dividends.

H. R. Miller, president of the Carlsbad (New Mexico) Chamber of Commerce, was chosen vice president of the East-West Highway Association, and Victor L. Miller, secretary of the Carlsbad group, was chosen secretary of the highway association.

The L. Romero Howe and Fire Company at Las Vegas will organize a junior fire department, to teach Las Vegas boys the importance of fire prevention. A committee composed of C. W. Carnellich, Frank Howe, Luis Selva and M. Booth will handle the organization.

Albuquerque high school was awarded first place in the fourth class, senior high school publications, by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association in its annual session at New York City. The award came in the group division of schools with an enrollment of between 1,501 and 2,500 pupils.

J. A. Waldron, state director of rural rehabilitation, reported that \$8,794.45 in loans were made to Arizona families during the week of March 1. Approximately 4,000 individuals or families have been referred to the rural rehabilitation division by relief agencies as prospective clients, Waldron said.

Dr. Byrn S. Cummings of the University of Arizona archaeology department has bought forty acres of land containing an Indian ruin dating back to 700 A. D., or further. "We desired to get title to the land so the ruin cannot be destroyed, and so the Arizona Museum and Arizona University students may uncover and restore it as we have the opportunity and the funds," he said.

Dr. Andrew Ellicott Douglass, originator of the dating of tree rings, has given up his astronomical teaching duties at the University of Arizona to devote his entire time to tree ring research for the Carnegie Foundation. Dr. Douglass will retain his title of director of Starward observatory but Dr. Edwin F. Carpenter will succeed him as head of the department of astronomy at the university. The board of regents announced the change along with a number of others. The regents also approved a \$1,250,000 budget for the institution.



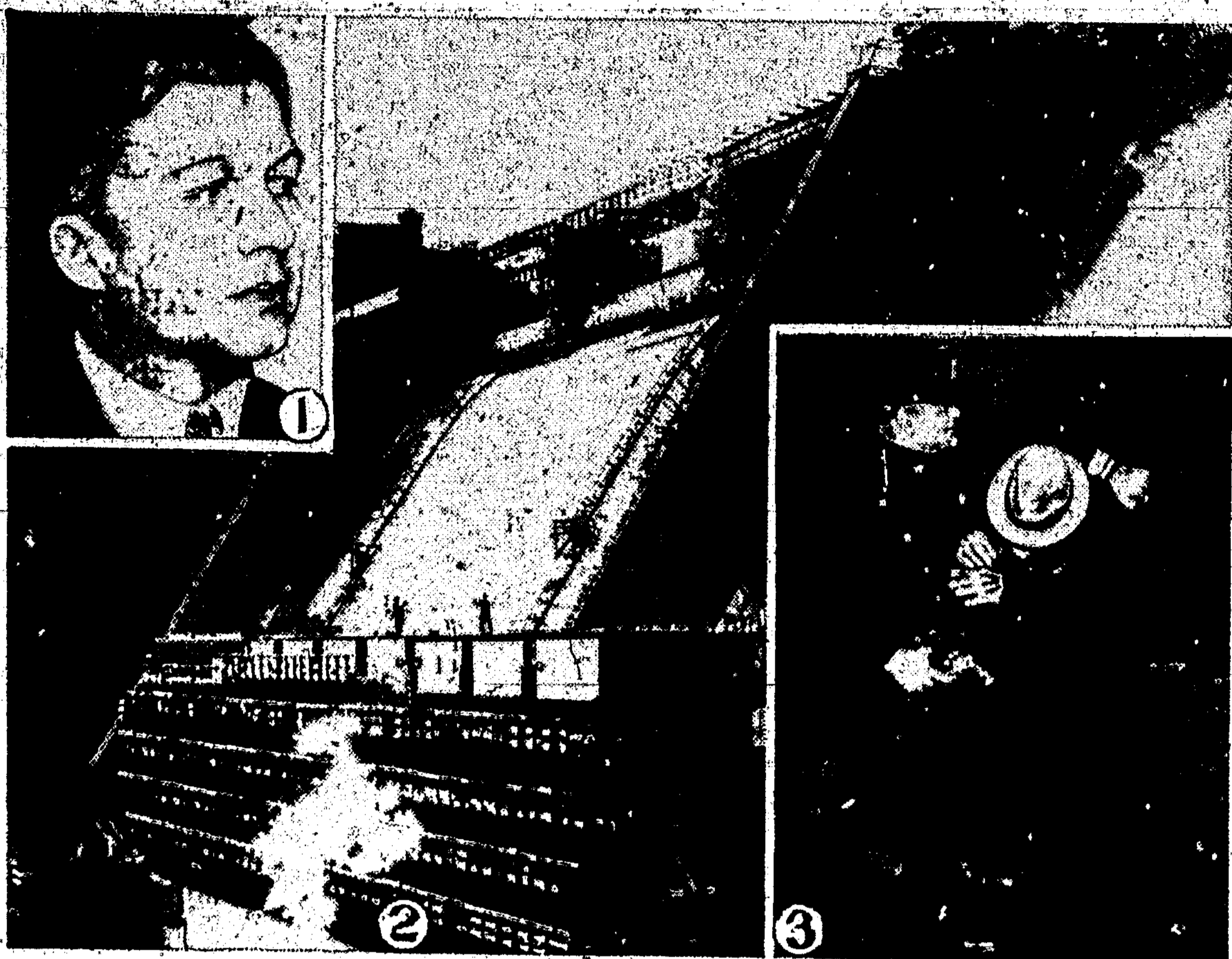

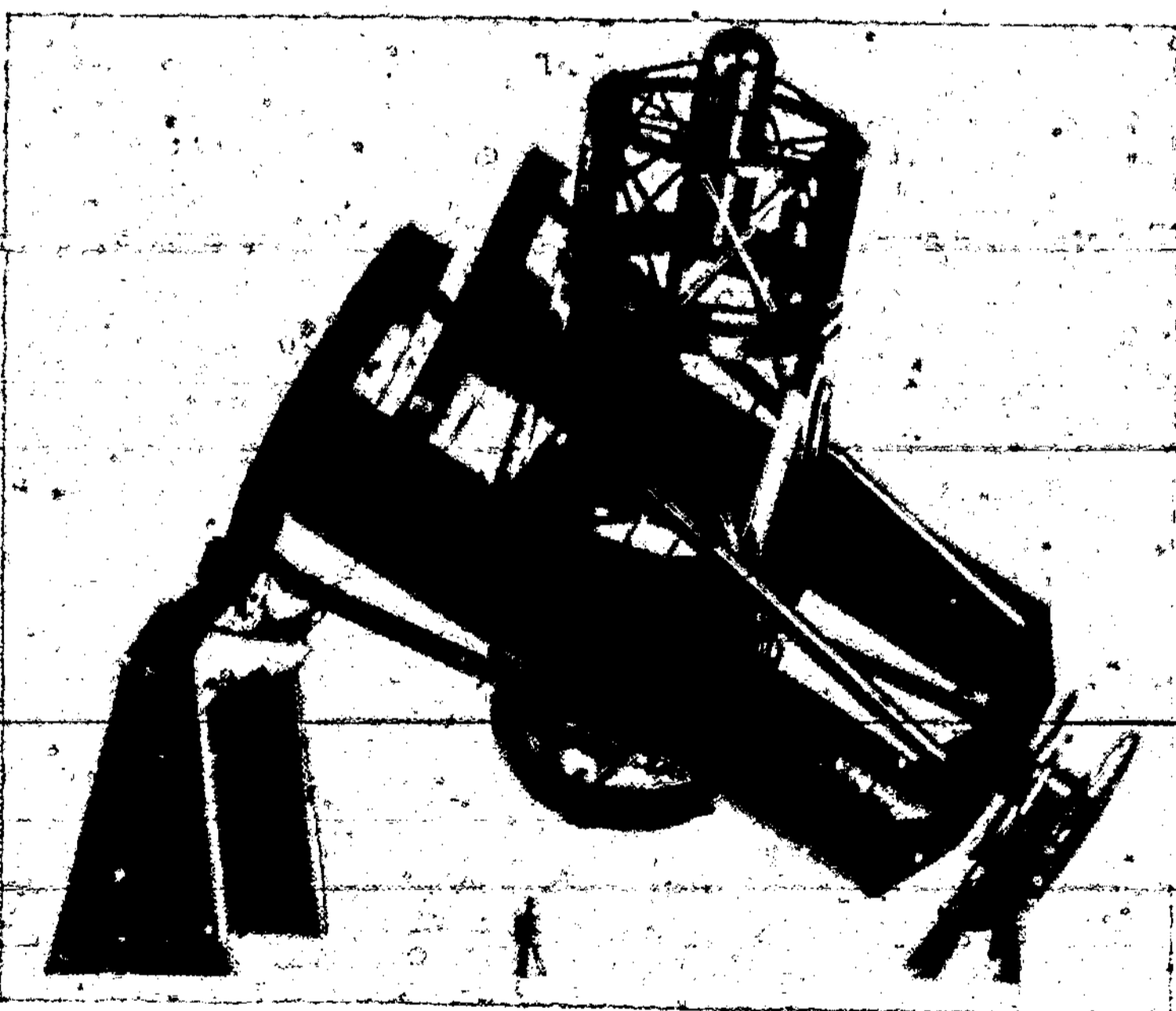
Rhineland Zone Seized by Nazis in Hitler Coup

Model of the 200-Inch Telescope



After a long period of study, the design of the 200-inch telescope and dome of the California Institute of Technology has reached a point where preliminary sketches have been completed. Miners of Mexico March on the Capital

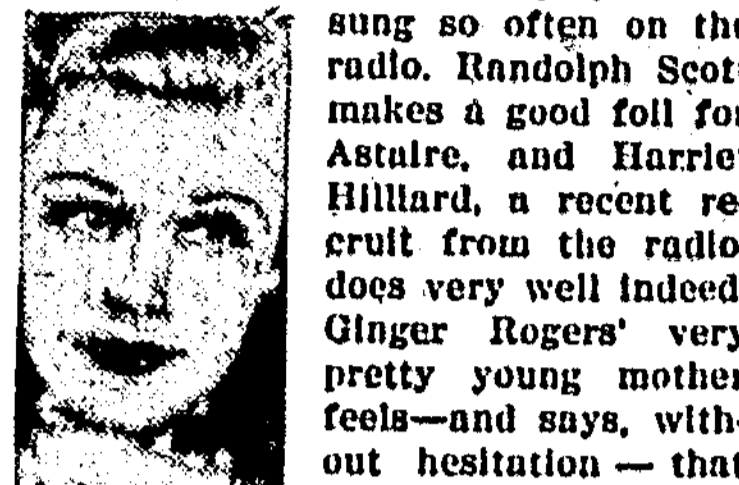

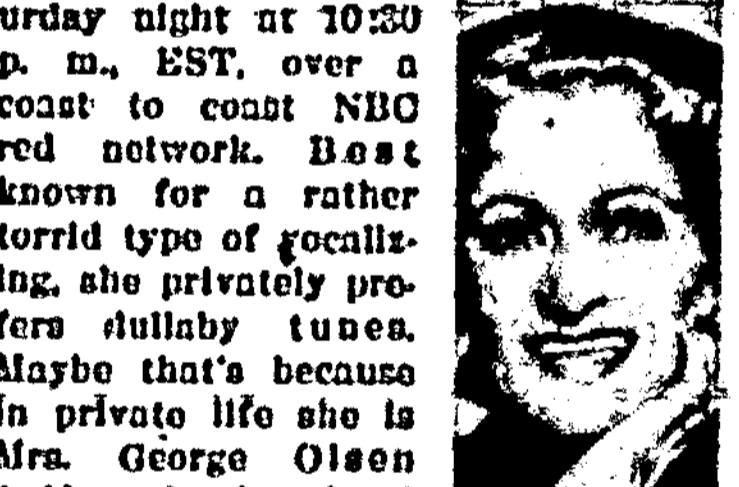

All Around the House

To prevent sliced fruits dropping to the bottom of a gelatin mold, chill fruits and add when gelatin mixture has partly congealed.

If rugs lose their stiffness after cleansing and do not lie flat on the floor, a thin coat of white shellac applied to the back of rugs will stiffen them.

Some stucco walls may be washed with soap and water, but a coat of stucco sprayed over the whole surface is much more satisfactory than washing.

Dough that has been kept in the refrigerator for several hours after it is molded should stand in a warm room for about twenty minutes before putting it into the oven.

A dash of salt improves the flavor of chocolate fudge.

Marinate fresh fruits to be used in salads as soon as they are cut or sprinkle them with lemon juice. This prevents discoloration.

Fat for deep frying is at the correct temperature when an inch cube of bread dropped into it becomes a golden brown in 60 seconds. This is for cooked mixtures.

Orange juice mixed with confectioner's sugar and a little grated orange rind makes a very soft and delicious cake frosting.

Always keep salads on ice until it is time to serve them. They lose their flavor when exposed to heat.

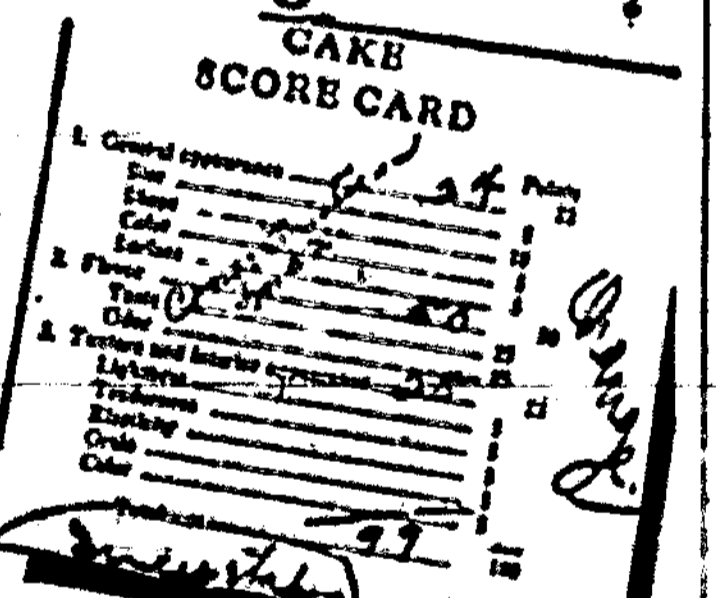
Discolored linoleums may be cleaned with alcohol. After cleaning allow them to dry thoroughly, then apply linoleum.

A rise in copper prices is said to be just in the offing. Prices are looking up in the woolen field.

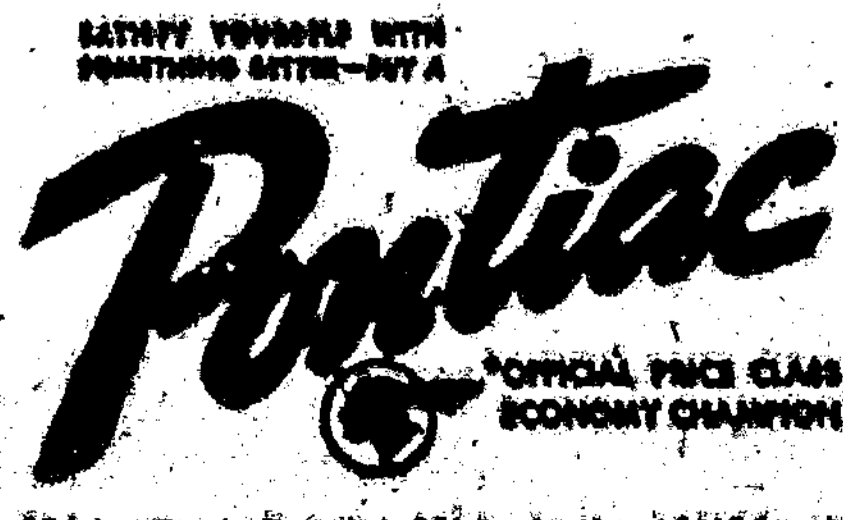
Remarkable recovery has been made and held in the machine tool industry. In January, the industry's index was at almost 111 per cent of the 1926 level.

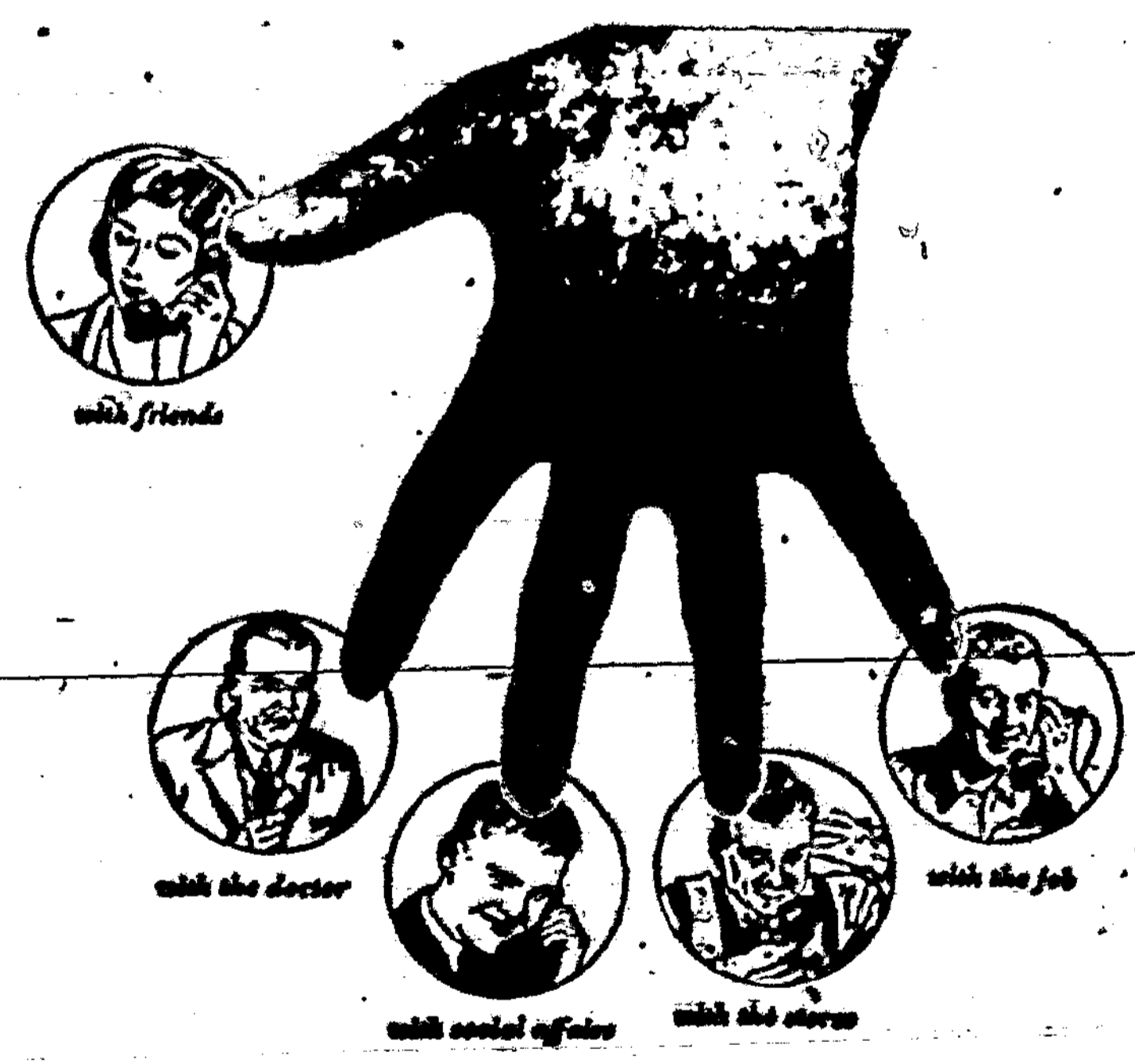
