

GENERAL MOTORS CORPORA-TION flatly refused to consider collective bargaining in its 69 plants

Edward F. McGrady, assistant secretary of labor, who has spent three months in futile effort to stop the maritime walkout on the Pacific coast, hurried back to Washington to take a hand in the General Motorn strike. After reporting to Secretary Perkins, this chief mediator held a conference with John L. Lewis. Miss Perkins already had discussed the situation with Lewis, seeking data on which conciliation could be recommended, though she said this would not be undertaken at once.

The auto workers in their Flint meeting, besides creating the board of strategy with power to call a strike, approved of eight demands on the corporation ranging from recognition of their union to higher wages and shorter hours. They also appointed a committee to negotiate with the corporation.

William S. Knudsen, executive vice president of General Motors, declared the company never would agree to collective bargaining on a national basis and, despite strikes, would continue to produce automobiles on long of possible.

The prime object of the C. I. O. is organization of the steel industry. and the crisis in the automotive industry was not expected by Lewis and his associates or wanted at this time. However, they are giving the auto workers their full support, morally and financially

Though no figures were given for soviet Russia, it is known the Reds are planing to launch a sea program which will bring their naval strength up to that of their land forces, now the largest in the world,

Information in Washington says the United States has and will have under construction 95 warships. It expects to increase its personnel by almost 10 per cent and build up a strong naval reserve. The ships will include light and heavy cruisers, destroyers, and submarines.

President on Child Labor

and Starvation Wages

FLIMINATION of child labor, long working hours and starvation wages is a necessity, and must be carried out by the federal government since it cannot be done by state action. So declared President Roosevelt in his press conference. He warned the correspondents not to say he was planning to revive the NRA and insisted all he could say at present was that something should be done to fix maximum hours and minimum wages:

Since the day of the NRA, said Mr. Roosevelt, there has been a steady decline in child labor, grueling hours and starvation wages by 90 per cent of American business. As for the other 10 per cent, he said, they were still failing to live up to the best standards since the death of the NRA.

Attorneys for the American Federation of Labor were reported to be about ready to submit to the President a bill designed to restore labor protective features lost in the death of NRA. It provides that congress catalogue unfair "conduct" which would be forbidden to employers and assure workers adequate protection. Violations would be punishable by a fine. The federation is expected also to back federal licensing of interstate corporations as provided by the O'Mahoney bill.

Mellon Offers Great Art Collection to Nation

NDREW W. MELLON, Pittsburgh multimillionaire and former secretary of the treasury, has offered to present to the nation his



magnificent art collection, valued at \$23,000,000, together with a \$9,000,000 building for its housing in Washington and a fund for its maintenance and increase. The offer is made through President Roosevelt, with whom Mr. Mellon has been in correspondence and conference on the mat-

Mellon ter. It will be submitted to congress with the President's favorable recommendation.

The Mellon collection, part of William H. Moran retired as chief which is stored in the Corcoran art of the secret service with the close gallery in Washington, includes many pointings of highest importance and some fine works of sculpture. Lord Duveen of Milbank, head of a celebrated art firm, says that its actual value is more than \$50,-000,000 and that it is the "greatest collection ever assembled by any individual collector."

Chang Gets Ten Years

itary and civil posts. There was much speculation in Shanghai on probable political readjustments. Sun Yatsen, widow of the "Father of the communist regime and alliance with Moscow.

Robinson Wants Federal Law on Basic Pay

I INLESS Joe Robinson is wrong in his predictions, congress will at this session adopt a constitutional amendment to provide for the regulation of wages and hours of work either by the states or by the federal government. The Democratic majority leader of the senate promised that this would be done, and at the same time he bitterly attacked Supreme court decisions which, he sàid, now make such regulation impossible. The senator was especially severe in his comments on the decision in the New York state wage

case, declaring: "It is simply incomprehensible—it is ridiculous—that there should exist no legal means for protecting a woman or a child from working as long as anybody can extort money from them. I don't hesitate to say that the Supreme court opinion in the New York case ought to be reversed and the American bar by a great majority supports that viewpoint. That opinion was bad law."

Bru Plans Settlement

President

of Cuban Obligations FEDERICO LAREDO BRU, the

new president of Cuba, proposes to settle all Cuban obligations in the United States and is expected soon to invite the bankers and bondholders concerned to enter negotiations to that end. Credit for inducing Bru to do who appears to be largely in control of

Laredo Bru affairs in the island. The obligations include about \$75,-000,000 owed to many Americans who invested in public work gold bonds which were issued during the administration of President Gerardo Machado.

The new constitution which the Cuban congress recently voted originally prohibited any such negotiations as those contemplated before 1940, but when it appeared in the official gazette that article had been radically altered. It now orders the government to find a satisfactory way to settle all debts to the United States before 1940 and authorizes the president to open negotiations immediately.

This "error" in the gazette's composing room is supposed to have been ordered by Colonel Batista, and though congress has the power to correct it, a majority of congressmen, after reading the article in the gazette, gave it their approval.

Spain Plans to Resist

German Aggression

CERMAN warships continued to holt Spanish steamers, in reprisal for the seizure of the Nazi freighter Palos by the Basques; and the Spanish government made ready to resist such action to the best of its ability. Foreign Minister Julio Alvarez del Vayo said: "We are firmly resolved; come what may, not to permit another single aggresgion from the German fleet and to reply as soon as they occur with all the means at our command."

The Valencia government announced through its Paris embassy a flat refusal of a German offer to cease molesting Spanish shipping if the cargo of the Palos and a Spanish passenger were returned.

Fascist planes rained incendiary bombs on Malaga, setting fire to many buildings and killing or injuring hundreds of men, women and children. The loyalist forces were reported to have recaptured Almadrones on the Guadalajara front after three days of heavy fighting.

Britain and Italy Sign Mediterranean Pact

REATBRITAIN and Italy signed a treaty concerning the Mediterranean that is of the highest importance. Italy first pledging itself to keep hands off Spanish territory. In the public declaration are these three leading statements:

The interests of Britain and Italy in the Mediterranean do not conflict but on the contrary are "parallel."

The two powers announce they recognize their respective maritime rights in the Mediterranean, meaning that Italy will have a free access to the oceans by way of Gibraltar and the Suez canal and that Britain's imperial trade route to India will remain free and inviolate.

Britain and Italy announce to all the world that they favor preserving the status quo everywhere in the Mediterranean.

States Get \$200,000,000 for Road Improvement

CECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE WALLACE has just apportioned \$200,000,000 to the states for road improvement. Of this sum \$125,4 800,000 will go toward improvement of the federal-aid highway system. \$25,000,000 for improving secondary or farm-to-market roads, and \$50,-

The fund is for use during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1937, and funds for improvement of roads need not be matched. Highway projects selected, contracts and specifications are subject to federal commissions.

Keeping Up With Science By Science Service

6 Science Stryice.-WNU Service. Study Silversword to Solve Hawaii's **Botanical Puzzle**

Rare, Beautiful Plant Interests Scientists

WASHINGTON. - Silverswords, among the rarest and most beautiful of Hawaiian plants, constitute one of the world's prize puzzles in botany. Scientists of the Bernice Bishop Museum in Honolulu and of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, under the leadership of Dr. David D. Keck, have lately been making a new effort to get more definite facts about this spectacular plant's kinships and origin for it is believed that through such data new light may be shed on the still greater scientific riddle of this is given to Col. Hawaii's unique forms of plant Fulgencio Batista, life, unlike anything else in the world.

The silversword forms a ball-like cluster of narrow, sword-shaped leaves, white with a silvery coating of hairs. From this basal rosette there shoots up a three to six-foot flower stalk, thickly beset with blooms. The plant is a member of the huge botanical family known as the Compositae, which includes such femiliar things as sunflowers, dandelions, artichokes, thistles, goldenrod, and lettuce.

Not American Ancestry.

It has hitherto been considered more nearly related to the tarweeds, found on the Pacific coasts on both Americas, but Dr. Keck's researches now indicate that it is not, and that the silversword is more nearly related to the tree-like composites of Hawaii, a very remarkable group of plants whose nearest kindred are found far southwestwards across the Pacific, in Polynesia and the Australia-New Zealand region. The elimination of an American ancestry of the sliverpwords, and their assignment to an origin in a diametrically opposite direction, is considered an important step in plant geography.

Modern Baking Is Freed From Trial and Error Method

LONDON.—How to tell what kind of bread a variety of flour will make before starting to bake it is told in recent researches by two British physical chemists, Drs. P. Halton, of the Research Association of British Flour Millers, and G. W. Scott Blair, of the physics department of Rothamstead experimental station.

The "shortness" of a dough determines many characteristics of a finished bread of cake. By determining this easo of tearing of the dough in a mechanical way it is hoped to bake even better products than those that "mother used to make." without depending on the highly trained judgment of an experienced baker.

Scientists have attacked the problem by learning something about the fundamentals of baking. They have found that a short dough-one that tears easily—has long, heavy fibers.

Novel Test Dovised

To determine shortness accurately, they use an instrument that tells how easily dough will flow through a nozzle when the pressure that pushes it is increased. Using this tester, they find that they can make the dough shorter by adding lard, iron chloride, or a phosphate, and less short by adding amino acids. Most peculiar of these acids is cystine, which makes the dough fibers hang together by hooking the long, thin molecules in strands like a series of rope ladders.

The tests are more sensitive than are those of the baker, and more accurate. Furthermore, they are resulting in changed flour characteristics so that the finished product can be rigorously controlled.

Breakfast the Event for Which People Are Most Often on Time

Studies in Punctuality Made in a College

D REAKFAST is an attraction to which the average person is most often on time. To band and choir rehearsals he is late about half the time. Business appointments are met punctually about three-fourths of the time.

These are not guesses or estimates. They are based on stopwatch measures made secretly of the students at Ripon college by Dr. George J. Dudycha and the few members of the faculty, sworn to secrecy, whom he took into his confidence. The stop was kept hidden. Notes were made in code. In general, the peculiar behavior of a man who insisted on making notes at breakfast, at football games or entertainments as well as at class was dismissed without comment and with little notice by the students.

. Not only do the different situations call for a more or less strict adherence to punctuality, but they also call for a greater or less amount of promptness or lateness, Dr. Dudycha found.

Earliest of Entertainments

The crowd gets together earliest at entertainments (where the best seats are at a premium?). They come moderately early to breakfast and vespers. They manage to get there just on time for an eight o'clock class or a business appointment. They are generally slightly late to extra-curricular activities.

Nevertheless, despite all this variation in punctuality for specific situations, a significant association was found between an individual's promptness, or lack of it, on the different occasions. There really is a general trait of punctuality or of tardiness, Dr. Dudycha concludes in his report to the Archives of Psychology. The laggard may not be late on all oceasions, he may show up early for breakfast quite often. but still in general it may be said that he is chronically tardy.

The punctual student is likely to be more intelligent than the ten o'clock scholar. The less neurotic students and those who are more self-sufficient tend to be more punc-

How Nerve Messages Are Transmitted by Electricity

NEW YORK.—New light on how you think—the electrical means by which messages are transmitted through the nerves of the body—was presented to a meeting of the American Physical society here.

Drs. Kenneth S. Cole and Howard J. Curtis of the department of physiology of Columbia university's College of Physicians and Surgeons described the new experiments on this most-baffling of scientific problems. They said:

"The exact mechanism by which a nerve transmits its message is not understood at the present time, but it has long been known that a nerve impulse is in part at least electrical in nature.

Measuring Electrical Properties. "In order more fully to understand the process of excitation it is necessary to measure the electrical properties of the nerve in the same way as it is necessary to measure the electrical properties of a wire before its current carrying ability can be predicted. This paper reports such measurements on resting nerves. It was found that the membrane surrounding the individual nerve fiber offers a high resistance to the passage of an electrical current, which means that the ionic carriers of electricity find difficulty in getting through this membrane.

"On the other hand, its electric capacity, that is, its ability to store up electrical energy, is high. Thus an electrical current can pass into (or out from) a nerve fiber without causing it to lose any of its dissolved salts which are essential to the life of the cell. Work is now in progress to determine the change, if any, in these properties when the nerve is in a state of excitation."





NEW YORK, (Special).—The New York World's Fair, in which every state in the nation must inevitably take small or prominent part, is out of its infancy Preparatory construction goes on night and day at the Flushing Meadew Site

of 12161/2 acres at the geographical cen-tre of New York City A steady flow of activities and announcements emanates from the Fair Corporation neadquarters on four floors of the Empire State building. Judging from all of these, the Fair is a lusty growing institution that will reach full maturity—no question about it—by the scheduled opening day. April







UNCOMMON AMERICANS

First Woman Painter

VOU'LL look in vain for her name in the average encyclopedia or dictionary of American biography. Common as is the name of "Johnson" in our national annals, Henrietta Johnson is the least known of all of them.

In this era of the "emancipated woman" all fields of human endeavor are open to feminine invaders. But it was very different 200 years ago. In those days woman's place was very much "in the home" and she might not leave it, even for excursions into the arts. But it was in that field that Henrietta Johnson distinguished herself and by doing so she placed posterity everlastingly in her debt. For she was America's first woman painter.

We know her name but little else. The date of her death is recorded in the St. Philip's church register ir Charleston, S. C., and that is the only established date in her history. By the social code under which she lived, "a lady's name should never appear in public print but twice: first to announce her marriage and again to announce her death." Since she never married that leaves us only the date of her death-March 9,1720. When and where she was born and whose daughter she was is an unsolved mystery.

We know that she was a pastel painter and in this medium she did work that rivalled that of some of the famous French masters. We know that she was painting these pictures between 1707 and 1720, since the few surviving examples of her art were made during that period. And that is a fact which gives her work importance. For in her day the scheme of an hereditary American aristocracy was being tried out in Carolina and the people whose portraits she made were colonial officers and reprecentatives of the landed gentry whose great plantations ourounded Charleston..

One of the notables she painted was Col. William Rhett, colonel of the provincial militia, receiver-general of the Lorda Proprietora and the man who, in 1710, captured the famous pirate. Steve Bonnet—a feat which would make the name of Rhett forever famous, even if some of his descendants hadn't done so in the more recent history of South Carolina.

Just how many portraits Henrietta Johnson painted is not certain, but the known examples of her work that have survived for two censtudies are so few that they command prices which compare favorably with those paid for the works of the "old masters" of Europe. Quite aside from their artistic and historic value, they possess a high "rarity value"-because they came from the brush of America's first woman painter.

Back in 1904 there occurred mysterious outbreaks of typhoid fever in certain sections of Westchester, Long Island and other districts around New York city. Examination of food and water failed to give any clues to the origin of the Bacilli which were causing it.

But Dr. George Soper, a sanitary engineer in the municipal health service, remembered a German bacteriologist had proved that some people, while immune themselves to typhoid, carried the germ and gave the fever to others. Tracing the outbreaks he found that an Irish cook named Mary Mallon had, in every instance, been employed in the stricken household. He learned also that Mary, at the first hint of each illness, fled from her job.

Finally the health authorities caught up with her and in 1907 shewas detained and, against her will, given an examination. She was found to be infected with millions of typhoid bacilli. She went to court to gain her freedom but lost her suit. Finally in 1910, she was freed.



Deep Bed of Fire Burns Less Fuel Than "Skimpy" One; Saves Time and Labor.

GREAT many home-owners are under the impression that they save coal by putting only a little coal on a furnace fire. As a matter of fact, that's one of the surest ways to actually waste fuel that I know of. A "flimsy" fire burns coal quickly, has a tendency to go out easily, won't deliver suf-



ficient heat, and makes repeated refueling necessary.

The truly economical way is to keep a deep fire bed at all times. It should always be up to a level with the bottom of the firedoor. In mild weather, of course, you can leave a little heavier layer of ash on the grates. This will keep the fire burning very slowly, yet keep enough coal burning to provide sufficient heat should the outside temperature drop sudden-

Let me repeat this warning: After putting fresh coal on the fire, be sure to leave an exposed spot of live coals directly in front of the fire-door. This "hot-spot" will act as a pilot light and ignite the gases that come up from the fresh fuel. Allow these gases to become totally burned before checking the fire.


