Mellon's Aluminum Company Attacked by Uncle Sam A NDREW MELLON, frequently the target of administration at-

tacks, is again called on to defend his business. Attorney General Cum-

mings announced that the Department of Justice had filed in the Federal District court in New York a suit to compel dissolution of the Aluminum Company of America—which Mellon controls-for the purpose of breaking "its monopolistic control" of the aluminum industry. By this ac-

tion the government revives the Sherman anti-trust act as a legal weapon in regulating business.

tors, and stockholders of the company, including Mellon. Twenty-five subsidiary and affiliated companies were named co-defendants. Other members of the Mellon Lamily named with the former Treasury head are Paul Mellon, Richard K. in-law of Mellon, and Ailsa Mellon Bruce, his daughter.

Action of the company on March 1, 1037, in advancing the car-lot price of virgin ingot was cited as the most recent act of "oppressive and unreasonable price fixing" in the petition signed by Cummings and Robert H. Jackson, head of the department's apti-trust division. It is alleged that this advance was made in the face of an increase in earnings from \$9,571,208 in 1935, to \$20,860,036 in 1936, which amounted to an increase in common stock earnings from 55 cents to \$8.65 per share. .

The suit charges that the company is a monopoly in violation of the anti-trust laws and that it has power to fix arbitrary and discriminative prices. It charges the defendants with conspiracies to restrain and monopolize, attempts to monopolize, and monopoly in violation of the Sherman anti-trust act.

Government Employees May Not Speculate in Stocks

N A letter addressed to H. B. Mitchell, president of the civil pervice commission, President Roosevelt placed a ban on speculation in securities by government officials and employees. There was no official explanation of this act, but for some time there have been rumors that some persons high up in the New Deal have been making a lot of money by speculating in the stock markets after getting tips on probable White House moves.

305,000 Unemployed Got Jobs During March

NO ONE knows how many unemployed persons there ard in the country, the estimates ranging from about 9,000,000, by Secretary Perkins, to less than 3,000,000. However, according to Madame Perkins, the number was reduced by 205,000 during March. Weekly pay rolls for the period, she said, were \$15,100,000 larger than during February in the manufacturing industries. She said the employment increase Continued "the practically unbroken succession of increases which have been shown each month

since February, 1938," Of the \$03,000 workers who obtained employment the majority found jobs in manufacturing and in retail trade. The secretary said the government had no way of knowing how many of the total had been on relief rolls.

President Intervenes to

Avert New York Strike INTERVENTION by President Roosevell averted, for the time being at least, a strike of 25,000 freight handlers on eight railroads that threatened the food supply of New York city. The President appointed an emergency board of three members to ditempt a settlement. In his proclamation he said the dispute threatened "substantially to interrupt interstate commerce within the state of New York and other states in the eastern part of the country to a degree such as to deprive that section of the country of essential transportation service."

A dispute between rival workers' unions balked efforts of the national mediation board to effect a settlement. Under the rallway labor act. the President forced a postpone ment for at least 30 days while mediators work.

Byrd Would Consolidate **Federal Housing Units** CENATOR HARRY F. BYRD of O Virginia, Democrat, prepared for introduction in the senate a bill providing for the consolidation of the Home Owners' Loan corporation and the Kederal Housing administration. This merger, said Mr. Byrd, world result in a saving of more than \$24,000,000 a year without impairing the work of the units. | years. Others put it higher.

Senator Byrd is chairman of the senate committee on government reorganization and is not at all satissled with the plan offered by President Roosevelt, believing it will not save tax money. Discussing his own scheme for merging the housing units, he said that there are 20 or more other agencies which, established and publicly justified as emergency establishments, can be consolldated, merged, or liquidated just as profitably. If the appropriate committee will allow this bill to come to the floor for full and open discussion by senators, he predicted, other bills of this nature. providing for substantial savings, are sure to follow.

He had been a consistent supporter of the Roosevelt administration policies and was especially interested in the Tennessee valley program. He is survived by his widow and a daughter, Mrs. Thomas A. McCoy of Asheville, N. C.

Belgium Freed From Its. Locarno Obligations

BELGIUM has attained the position sought in a recent move toward complete neutrality. Great Britain and France have released the little buffer state from its Locarno treaty obligations, practically abandoning that pact, and have promised full protection of Belgium against aggressors. .In return Belgium promises to rearm and defend its frontiers effectively, and to observe its obligations as a member of the League of Nations.

The agreement was signed in Brussels by Paul Spaak, Belgian foreign minister; Sir Robert Clive, British ambassador, and Jules Laroche, French ambassador.

England and France also were reported as getting closer together in a co-operative plan for a united_ front against Mussolini's designs in the Mediterranean and for the development of an understanding with Germany. It also may result in the loosening of France's friendship with Soviet Russia, which has been irksome to Britain.

Mussolini's conference with Chancellor Schuschnigg of Austria in Venice was believed to have been mainly about Austria's relations with Germany and the Duce was reported to have told Schuschnigg that Nazi expansion toward the south was inevitable, to which the chancellor replied that Austria would resist to the limit any attempt by Germany to annex Czechoslovakia.

manded rigid deconomy to combat. an anticipated drop in federal revenues amounting to \$600,000,000. Mr. Roosevelt also said there must be a careful survey of the nation's tax structure, and intimated that a new tax bill would be introduced at the next session of congress.

In correcting the over-estimation of revenue and the under-estimation of expenditures, the President indicated that the national debt will rise over the 30 billion dollar mark.

Though he made no specific recommendations as to economy, the President spoke sharply about "special groups" who are exerting pressure to bring about increases in government expenditures. It was understood he referred especially to the form tenancy program, proposing an annual expenditure of \$135,-000,000: the Wagner housing bill, calling for an expenditure of \$50,-000,000 a year, and the Harrison-Black education bill, calling for allocations among the states beginning at \$100,000,000 for the first year and reaching a maximum of \$300,-000.000 a year.

Mr. Roosevelt had rejected these measures at a White House conference and his attitude provoked various prominent senators and representatives so much that they doclared they would favor cutting down the relief appropriation he asked to one billion dollars.

> Maine Governor Quick to Check Strike Violence


COV. LEWIS O. BARROWS of Malne has lined up with other state executives who will not stand for riotous and illegal tactics by strikers. When an unruly mob of 1,000 men tried to storm two of nineteen factories in Auburn involved in a general shoe strike and the local authorities were unable to handle the situation, Governor Barrows ordered out eight companies of the National Guard.

"I'll order out the entire military forces of Maine, if necessary to preserve constitutional authority," the executive said.

The trouble followed a state Supreme court injunction, issued by Judge Harry Manser, outlawing the shoe strike which affects about 6,500 workers. The mob had been aroused by speeches by Powers Hapgood, New England secretary for the C.

Government Employees May Not Speculate in Stocks ,

IN A letter addressed to II. B. Mitchell, president of the civil pervice commission, President Roosevelt placed a ban on speculation in accurities by government officials and employees. There was no official explanation of this act. but for some time there have been rumors that some percons high up in the New Deal have been making a lot of money by speculating in the stock markets after getting tipo on probable White House moves.

305,000 Unemployed Got Jobs During March

O ONE knows how many unemployed persons there are in the country, the estimates ranging from about 9,000,000, by Secretary Perkins, to less than 3,000,000. However, according to Madame Perkins, the number was reduced by 205,000 during March. Weekly pay rolls for the period, she said, were \$15,100,000 larger than during Februory in the manufacturing industries. She said the employment increase continued "the practically unbroken succession of increases which have been shown each menth since February, 1923."

Belgium Freed From Its Locarno Obligations

BELGIUM has attained the position sought in a recent move toward complete neutrality. Great Britain and France have released the little buffer state from its Locarno treaty obligations, practically abandoning that pact, and have prumised full protection of Belgium against àggressors. In return Belgium promises to rearm and defend its frontiers effectively, and to observe its obligations as a member of the League of Nations.


The agreement was signed in Brussels by Paul Spaak, Belgian foreign minister; Sir Robert Clive, British ambassador, and Jules Laroche, French ambassador.

England and France also were reported as getting closer together in a co-operative plan for a united front against Mussolini's designs in the Mediterranean and for the development of an understanding with Germany. It also may result in the loosening of France's friendship with Soviet Russia, which has been irksome to Britain.

Mussolini's conference with Chancellor Schuschnigg of Austria in Venice was believed to have been mainly about Austria's relations with Germany and the Duce was reported to have told Schuschnigg that Nazi expansion toward the south was inevitable, to which the chancellor replied that Austria would resist to the limit any attempt'by Germany to annex Czech--ustovakia.

President Asks Economy but \$1,500,000,000 for Relief

R EVISING his budget estimates for the fiscal year 1938, President Roosevelt told congress in a special message

tirement payments of \$400,000,000, instead of the "layman's" balanced budget he predicted in January. He recommended the appropriation of \$1,-500,000,000 for relief and he de-

manded rigid economy to combat an enticipated drop in federal revenues amounting to \$600,000,000. Mr. Roosevelt also said there must be a careful survey of the nation's tax structure, and intimated that a new tax bill would be introduced at the next session of congress.

In correcting the over-estimation of revenue and the under-estimation of expenditures, the President indicated that the national debt will rise over the 26 billion dollar mark.

Though he made no specific recommendations as to economy, the President spoke charply about "special groups" who are exerting pressure to bring about increases in government expenditures. It was understood he referred especially to the farm tenancy program, proposing anapanual expenditure of \$135,-000,000; the Wagner housing bill, calling for an expenditure of \$50,-009,000 a year, and the Harrison-Black education bill, calling for allocations among the states beginning at \$100,000,000 for the first year and reaching a maximum of \$300,-1 000,000 a year.

Mr. Roosevelt had rejected these measures at a White House conference and his attitude provoked various prominent cenators and reprecentatives so much that they declared they would favor cutting down the relief appropriation he asked to one billion dollars.

In the house the economy program lost a point when Representative Vincon of Kentucky succeeded in getting through his \$1,000,000 stream pollution bill.

Next the \$327,000,000 Agriculture department bill came up in the house and was passed despite the efforts of Republicans to have it sent back to the committee with instructions for a blanket cut of 10 per cent. It is reported that the Democrats of both house and senate plan to put through a joint resolution at the close of the session reducing all departmental appropriations by 10 per cent.

Maine Governor Quick to Check Strike Violence


OV. LEWIS O. BARROWS of Maine has lined up with other state executives who will not stand for riotous and illegal tactics by strikers. When an unruly mob of 1,000 men tried to storm two of nineteen factories in Auburn involved in a general shoe strike and the local authorities were unable to handle the situation, Governor Barrows ordered out eight companies of the National Guard.

"I'll order out the entire military forces of Maine, if necessary to breserve constitutional authority," the executivo said.

The trouble followed a state Supreme court injunction, issued by Judge Harry Manser, outlawing the shoe strike which affects about 6,500 workers. The mob had been aroused by speeches by Powers Hapgood. New England secretary for the C. I. O., and other organizers.

Keeping "foreign agitators" out of the picture, the representatives of General Motors of Canada and of the workers at Oshawa, Ontario, reached a settlement of the strike in that plant. Dust:Proofing Pictures—Has the dust got into your picture frame? It should be examined periodically and new brown paper backings should be stuck on to make it dust-proof.

Colorful Apples - If apples are put in water containing a little lemon juice a few minutes before cooking, they will keep their color.

Angel Cake - One cupful of white of eggs, one and one-quarter cupfuls of granulated sugar. One cupful of flour. One-half teaspoon cream of tartar. A pinch of salt added to whites before whipping; flavor to taste. Cook in a very slow oven. Yolks of the eggs may be used for mayonnaise.

When Washing Paint-Add a little turpentine to the hot soapy water. It greatly simplifies the job and makes much less "elbow grease" necessary, especially when the paint has that rather greasy film-caused by the-fumes from fires or gas stoves.

Oiling Household Machinery-A little oil applied when needed will keep household machinery working longer and always ready for work. You can use cooking or salad oil to lubricate small cooking equipment.

Bechamel Sauce-Melt a quarter cup butter in saucepan, add one-quarter cup flour, stir until smooth. Add gradually one and a half cups of highly seasoned chicken stock while stirring constantly. Add one-half cup of hot cream and beat until smooth and glossy.

Garbage as a Compost-Gar- | Season with salt, pepper and fine one-quarter cup warm cream. Do not allow sauce to boil after adding egg yolks.

> Cleaning Reed Furniture - A stiff brush dipped in furniture polish is good for cleaning reed and rattan furniture.

Stuffed Celery-Prepare inner stalks of celery. Fill them with equal parts of creamed Rocquefort and cream cheese, masked till smooth with paprika, and serve side by side on a boatshaped dish, or diced, in place of celery and cheese. 





Coking of Coal Is Greatly Improved by New Method

Better and Cheaper **Product Promised**

Pittsburgh, Pa. - Cheaper, better and more versatile coking of coal is in prospect as the result of five years of fundamental research at the Coal Research Laboratory of the Carnegie Institute of Technology here.

By breaking with traditional Humason. methods of turning bituminous coal into coke, gas, tar and chemicals, William B. Warren explained here recently to some leading industrialusts, it should be possible for coke oven operators to decrease cost cut operating time by a third, while improving quality and yield of coke.

Mr. Warren recommended that coul be preconditioned before coking by warming it to 200-400 degrees Centigrade (400-750 degrees Fahrenheit): This precarbonization treatment could be carried out in low temperature apparatus that much less expensive than the coke ovens themselves.

Mr. Watren's Theory.

Delving into just what happens when coal is heated and carbonized. Mr. Warren evolved a theory. This theory, applied to practical operation of coke ovens, promises the large economics.

First, when coal is heated the large molecules break apart into much smaller units. At slightly higher temperatures, surface changes take place within the coal that cause the little units to recombine into larger ones once more. This takes place slowly and this temperature must be held for a time. Then as the temperature is raised real thermal decomposition takes place. The surfaces of the molecules are attacked and portions torn off, appearing as tar and gas.

By manipulating the process so that the molecules have large surforces, which means the molecules are small in size, more tar is produced at the expense of coke. Or if tar is not desired, the high temperatures can be used when the molecules are large.

There is hope that the new knowle edge of coking will allow the making of coke from coals which are not at present considered "coking conts."

One-sixth of all the coal produced in the United States is coked and the new methods promised by the Cornegio Institute's researches are for that reason of great economic importance. From coal, in addition to coke and gas, come ammonla and a vast array of drugs, perfumes, chemicals and dyes made from the coal tar.

All Elements Are Found in Every Part of Earth

The Noddacks are masters of some of the most sensitive methods of analysis ever devised. so that they are entitled to speak with authority.

Mixed in Fluid Form.

Using Telescope in Search for New Light on History

Fascinating Studies by Mt. Wilson Scientists

By WATSON DAVIS

↑ WIDESPREAD search that A extends to the limits of the visible universe is being pursued in the hope that new light will be shed upon history, scientifically speaking.

Astronomy is not usually considered a branch of history but telescopes can look out in space's depths and see what happened there a hundred million years ago-that is, light from a stellar outburst that ancient takes that time to reach the earth.

Dr. Fritz Swicky, young and brilliant California Institute of Technology physicist, is investigating history in this sense with the help of Mt. Wilson Observatory's Drs. W. Baade, Edwin Hubble and M. L.Hum Baade, Edwin Hubble and M. L.

Scientific Meaning of History.

Scientifically speaking, he says, 'history means the change in time of dimensionless ratios of significant physical quantities." As for instance, the famous red shift in the rainbows or spectra of distant star aggregations as compared with nebulae relatively neighbors to the earth. Interpreted under the theory of relativity, this is a historical effect on a large scale.

The assumption that history must be operative suggests clearly to Dr. Zwicky the necessity of an investigation of all those dimensionless ration between significant physical quantities. Only after this investigation has been completed does he believe a final understanding of the red shift and other cosmic phenomena will be possible.

Suggestive Discrepancies.

Other effects are being investigated by Dr. Zwicky. There does not seem to be any algnificant difference in the speed of light from distant parts of the universe compared with light from nearby stars. But there are suggestions that great exploding sters, distant supernovae, spraying light and particles out into space, are seen or "received" imperfectly here on earth because come kinds of their radiations travel more slowly than others. Suggestive discrepancies have turned up in astronomical studies but not so positively that conclusions can be drawn.

This is the stuff that philosophy is made of. As yet the researches stay within the bounds of relativity theory's principles, but this investigation on fundamental reference systems for physical measurements on a cosmological scale may well go beyond the classical theory of general relativity. It promines to out-Einstein relativity:

Dr. Ernst Walther Koch of Leiprig, measuring large numbers of school children, declares that fourteen-year-olds, both boys and girls, average nearly four inches tailer and more than eight pounds heavier than they used to, as shown by older records. He has also found evidences of earlier sexual maturity. His general conclusion is that young people grow up faster, but that their final size is not greater than their ancestors'.

A colleague in the military med-Ical service, Dr. Hans Muller, takes issue with Dr. Koch on the latter point. His measurements on army recruits have convinced him that young men keep on growing until they are twenty years old or more. and that their final height is appreclably greater than that of their

Man With Branded Hand

IN EVERGREEN cemetery in Muskegon, Mich., stands a monument which bears the inscription "Capt. Walker's Branded Hand" and below it a bas-relief of an open hand with the letters "S. S." on the heel of the thumb. This monument recalls one of the stirring incidents of pre-Civil war days and marks the grave of a man who played a part in bringing on that conflict.

Capt. Jonathan Walker was a Massachusetta sea cartain and in 1844 was *engaged in coastwise trade. Hating negro slavery, Walker tried to help seven blacks, who had fled from a Florida plantation, escape to the Bahamas. He was arrested, brought to Pensacola, tried as a thief in federal court and found guilty. He was sentenced to be branded on the right hand with the letters 'S. S." (slave stealer), to stand in the pillory one hour, be imprisoned fifteen days and pay a fine of \$150.

After the first part of the sentence had been carried out, he was led again into the courthouse. Ordered to put his hand on the post of the railing in front of the judge's bench, Walker protested when the marshal bound it fast to the post. He declared that he could hold it firm during the ordeal, but his protest was ignored and the branding took place.

After his release from prison, Walker went back to his home in Massachusetts to find himself a hero and a martyr. John Greenleaf Whittier wrote a poem in which he besought Walker to hold his branded right hand aloft for all the world to see. Abolitionist leaders recognized in the incident a potent argument for their cause Accompanled by a fugitive slave he traveled through the North and lectured on the evils of slavery.

"The Man with the Branded Hand" became a famous figure and he did much to arouse the North and put it in a receptive frame of mind for Harriet Beecher Stowe's "Uncle Tom's Cabin" as a faithful picture of the horrors of slavery. In the '50's Walker and his family moved to Wicconsin and a few years later bought a small fruit farm in Michigan. 



COOKY JAR HAS PLACE IN HOME

Great Family Problem Is to Keep It Well Filled.

By EDITH M. BARBER

NATE ALL love the cooky jar when we are children, especially, but even when we grow up cookies out of the cooky jar seem to taste better than they do out of a pasteboard box or a tin container.

If there are many healthy appetites in the family, the problem is to keep the cooky jar filled. There are many recipes which are not expensive and which will produce cookies with good keeping qualities (as far as the cookies themselves are concerned). These may be made in large quantities because they do not get stale.

Spicy cookies are especially good because they ripen as they are kept and their flavor grows even better. They may be either rolled or dropped. In the latter case, they are sometimes called rocks, perhaps because such a thick batter is used that they do not spread. Cookies of this sort usually have raisins or dates in them and often nuts are added.

Molasses cookies may be thin or thick and either rolled or dropped. If they are thin they are-known as ginger snaps. Sometimes this mixture is packed in a bread pan and chilled and cut into slices for bak-

Molasses Nut Bars.

1/2 cup shortening 14 cup boiling water 1 cup brown sugar 12 cup molasses

1 teaspoon ginger 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 16 teaspoon salt

3 cups flour

I cup chopped nuts Put shortening in bowl, add boiling water and when melted add sugar and molasses. Sift dry ingredients together and stir into first mixture. Chill, roll thinly, cut in strips or in fancy shapes, sprinkle with chopped nuts and bake about ten minutes in a moderately slow oven, 325 degrees F.

Brush with water, sprinkle with granulated sugar, and bake about ten minutes in moderate oven (350 degrees F.). They may be garnished with raisins or with halved almonds before baking. Sour milk or buttermilk instead of cream may be used if fat is increased to I cup.






