Although the world was quiet 20 years ago, hundreds of millions continued to make a living from the battlefields of France. In the Vosges, near Alton, workers find huge amounts of copper, lead and iron. All the remaining shells and bombs are sent to an special factory, where they are cleaned. Every other generation in France (except in the Vosges and Normandy) has a museum of war material. In 1927 more than 6,000,000 pounds of war material was removed from the Vosges area alone. French Toast Adds Touch of Glamour

Delicious Big Favorite in Many Countries

The French call it "toastade". Perhaps because when French toast is made properly, it has that golden-brown shimmer. The Germans and the Spaniards also claim this delicacy. The recipe is all the same, as far as the principles go. Bread sliced about one-half inch thick, from which the crust may be trimmed or cut off you like is dipped into a mixture of eggs and milk with a little salt, to which sometimes sugar is added. It is then soaked in the oil or fat the bread delicacy usually fried in what might be called half-deep fat.

The frying pan may be used, and enough oil, lard, or rendered vegetable fat, put into it to provide a inch of melted fat. The toast should be turned only very fast as the bread, being wet and while after dipping, will cook it quickly. Some arrangements for the toast are suggested. After frying the toast, it is of course, drained on a paper.

It may be served as a dessert, with fruit and cream, honey or maple syrup, or it may be used as a foundation for omelette, eggs, fish, meat or vegetables to which its crispness gives a good contrast.

French Toast:
1 egg, slightly beaten
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup bread, 1/2 inch thick
Mix egg and milk. Add salt. Dip bread in milk and dip into egg mixture. Fry in deep, hot fat, 2-3 drops Fahrenheit, or in half-deep fat, until light brown. Drain on salt paper.

Cheese Toast:
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup cheese
1/2 cup bread, 1/2 inch thick
Combine egg, milk and salt. Place bread, cheese between two pieces of bread, dip into egg mixture and bake in hot fat until golden brown on both sides.

EVER TRY THESE?

Kick Milk.
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
1 cup milk
Cream the butter, add the sugar and egg, well-beaten; add the baking powder and salt with the flour and add to the first mixture, alternating with milk. Bake in greased pan, 25 minutes in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees Fahrenheit).

Orange and Onion Salad.
3 oranges
2 Spanish or Bermuda onions
French dressing
Cut the oranges after peeling and arrange with slices of onion on a bed of lettuce or spinach. Dress with French dressing and let stand at least one hour before serving.

Snow Pudding.
1/2 tablespoon gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 cup boiling water
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup lemon juice
2 egg whites
Soak the gelatin in cold water, dissolve with the boiling water, add the sugar and lemon juice, stir until the sugar is dissolved, and cool quickly. When thick, beat until frothy. Beat the whites of the eggs, add to the gelatin mixture, and continue beating until it is stiff enough to hold its shape. Cool and serve with soft custard.

Texas Fried Chicken.
2 young chickens
Flour
Salt and pepper
Wash, clean and cut chickens into pieces for serving. Dredge well with flour, seasoned with salt and pepper. Heat butter or bacon fat in a heavy frying pan. There should be about an inch of fat, after melting. Add chickens to hot fat and cook until light brown, turning often. Serve with cream gravy.

Spinach Fudge.
2 cups cooked spinach
2 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon flour
1/2 cup cream
Rub spinach through sieve. Add butter, flour and cream. Reheat, stirring constantly and cook until mixture boils.

Fruit Whip.
1 package strawberry gelatin
1 cup boiling water
1 cup canned cherry juice
1 cup canned white cherries, stoned and cut in pieces
6 marshmallows, cut into pieces
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add cherry juice. Cool. When gelatin is almost set, beat to very stiff froth. Fold in fruit and marshmallows. Pile in glasses. Chill.

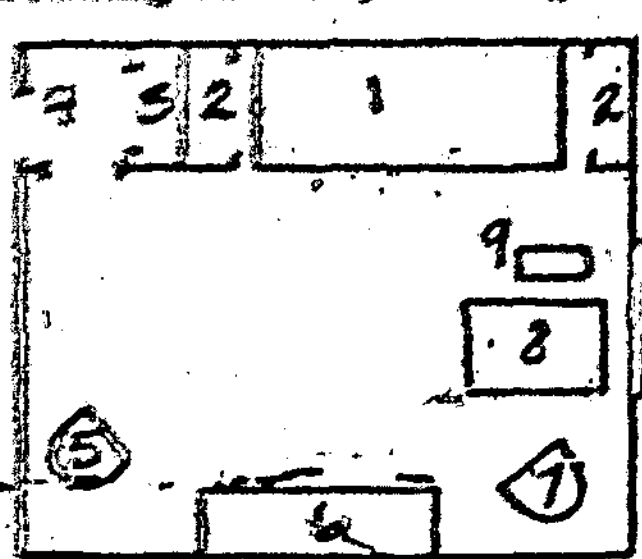
Fewer Blue and Rose.

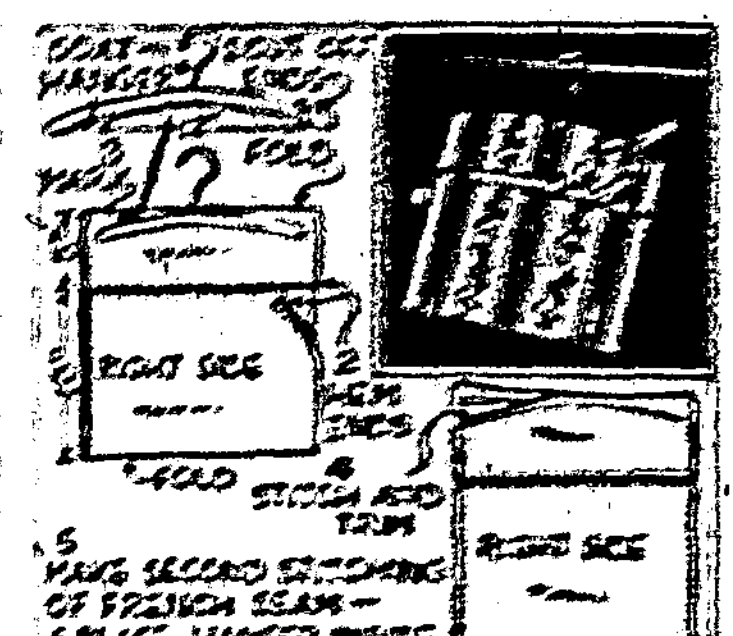
as right as rain for her to be married at twenty and all of a-flutter over the new home.

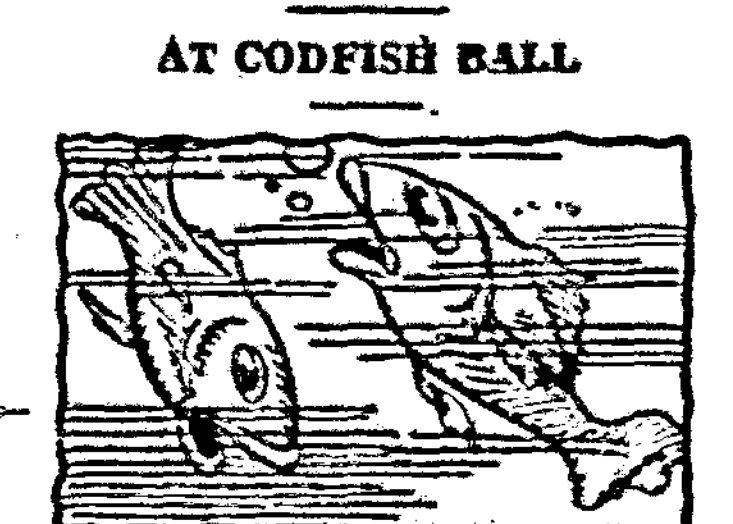

World in Miniature to Greet Youngsters This Christmas

"When I was a kid . . ."
Father speaking. When he was a kid, Santa Claus brought tin trains and crockery dolls, tinker-toys and wooden wagons that somehow fell apart the day after Christmas.

So when Father walks through a 1938 toy store his eyes may well pop out at the baby doll that can be fed, bathed, powdered, dressed and rocked to sleep, or the streamlined automobile with exhaust pipe, electric lights and a horn to make youthful pedestrians get off the road. He may frown over "real" pianos and motion picture projectors, but these seemingly extravagant toys are really much more sensible than the tiddy-winks set Aunt Emma gave him for Christmas many years ago.

Old World Imitates Us.
The toy industrial revolution has made the United States a world headquarters for Christmas shoppers, who migrate annually from every European nation—just to see what's new in the American toy industry. Where a scant few years ago our own toys came from abroad, Japanese and German manufacturers now copy our products. Often they attempt to sell cheap imitations in the United States.

The revolution wasn't spontaneous; a dozen years ago struggling American toy makers protested when psychologists and educators told them that jack-in-the-box may be amusing, but certainly not very instructive. Armed with fancy figures about child behavior and the need for toys that would develop young minds, these self-appointed uplift societies forced their wares on toy manufacturers. For several years American youth was showered with Christmas gifts it was supposed to like, but didn't. Sorely puzzled, the psychologists were slow to find a remedy: why not ask children themselves what kind of toys they wanted?

So they tried it, and discovered that American boys and girls like nothing better than imitating Mother and Dad. That's why 1938 Christmas toys stress miniatures—authentic reproductions of trains, automobiles, baby buggies, bassinets and airplanes. At Chicago's Merchandise Mart, where the toy-minded visitor can get a comprehensive picture of this new trend, it's quite possible that you'll see a preview of your 1940 automobile, ready for delivery to a 10-year-old driver long before the real thing rolls off an assembly line!

Age Is Important Factor.
Briefly, toy manufacturers have realized that children need new toys and games to develop new abilities

as they grow older, just as they need new clothes to fit their increasing stature. They've decided to give children sensible toys, playthings built to stand abuse, to develop strong bodies and agile minds. Having made peace with the educators and psychologists, they've enlisted designers, chemists, professional inventors and engineers to help meet the new demand.

When buying toys this Christmas, you'll be wise to follow the six objectives prescribed by experts, who say a child should have at least one type of toy from each classification:

- 1—Physical exercisers.
- 2—Sense developers (color, texture, shape and sound).
- 3—Building toys, for self-realization and consciousness of ability to do things.
- 4—Make believe toys, devices for imitative play.

5—Handwork materials leading to arts and crafts.

6—Games that develop skill and encourage play with other children. But your selection should also be guided by the table of values established by the same experts. The correct toys for your youngster should meet these requirements:

- 1—Durability.
- 2—Stimulation of self-activity.
- 3—Correct toy for the given age.
- 4—Principles of aesthetics.
- 5—Sanitation and hygiene.

Zippered Teddy Bear!
The latter factor is stressed by modern toy makers. For the very young child only vegetable dyes are used. Sharp corners have been eliminated and dangling appendages (too easily detached and swallowed) are taboo. There is emphasis on forms and materials that can be kept scrupulously clean. Even teddy bears are now made with a zippered skin that can be removed and laundered, while many wood toys can also be washed.

While adhering to these scientific principles, toy makers have not forgotten that their young customers are primarily interested in being entertained. For example, it's much better for a child to develop muscle and co-ordination through a foot-propelled vehicle (like a toy automobile or tricycle) than by calisthenics.

Similarly, in the most pleasant way possible, toys reveal talents and aptitudes, often overcoming deficiencies. This is particularly true of the sense developers, elementary handcraft materials, musical and rhythmic toys, and all materials for simple graphic arts like crayons, water colors and printing sets.

Tested 'Under Fire.'
Every toy that finds its way to the Christmas tree this year might well bear the label, "Child Tested and Approved." After the inventor and child psychologists have perfected them, the playthings find their way to nursery and sand pile for thorough trial before being manufactured in quantity lots. First, the experimenters want to discover whether their toy can stand up under hard wear. Second, it must hold interest long after the novelty stage has passed, which was one serious fault with the toys yesterday's children received each Christmas. By New Year's day they had usually been consigned to the closet.

By additional experimentation they discover what age group most enjoys the toy, and it is manufactured accordingly. Many large stores are segregating their toy displays by ages this year, a boon to the uninitiated uncle or aunt who doesn't know whether a three-year-old girl should have a dress-up doll or just a plain rag baby.

As for the toy makers, they're happy about the whole thing. Says James L. Fri, managing director of the Toy Manufacturers of the United States: "By increasing the purposefulness of playthings, their imaginative appeal and educational value have been greatly enhanced, and consequently the market for toys has steadily broadened."

Fire, Shock Hazards Threaten To Mar Christmas Festivities



All because of faulty electrical appliances, fires and accidents will spoil hundreds of Christmas gatherings this year.

Though home should be the safest place during the holidays, engineers of Underwriters' Laboratories, Chicago, point out that if you should have an accident during the next few weeks, chances are good that it will happen in your own home.

An estimated 125,000,000 electrical cords now being used throughout the nation offer the greatest potential danger at Christmas time, it is pointed out. Cords receive exceptionally harsh treatment, being chewed by children and dogs, twisted and pulled, run under rugs and walked on. Faulty plug and socket connections often result, creating serious hazards.

Engineers explain that shock or fire is less often, due to electrical wiring than to damaged cords. Safe cord is manufactured under rigid requirements, with ample copper wire for carrying the current without overheating. There is also suf-

cient insulation over the wire to prevent shock. To prove that rubber cord is sufficiently tough to stand abuse, two inches of insulation must stretch nine inches without breaking. "Bombs" are used to determine the condition of cord after several months' use. Bombs are heavy steel containers in which rubber insulation is "bombed" with pure oxygen at high pressure to cause rapid aging.

Since damaged or poorly constructed cords are often responsible for home fires and accidents, special care is needed during the Christmas season. Danger is especially great between now and March, the records show, since during that time a fire breaks out every two minutes.

WHAT to EAT and WHY

C. Houston Goudiss Asks How Do You Get Your Vitamin D? Relates Need for and Sources Of This Necessary Vitamin

THERE is scarcely a mother of a young baby today who has not at one time or another been told to give her child cod-liver oil. Perhaps she does not know this substance must be given to the baby for the vitamin D that it contains. But she has heard that there is something in cod-liver oil which makes it valuable to the baby's health.

A generation ago, cod-liver oil was given to children in the winter time, "to build them up" after colds or various other respiratory illnesses. It was not until 1921, however, that a long series of painstaking investigations, terminating in the discovery of vitamin D, made it clear that cod-liver oil is valuable as a source of vitamin D, and also why this vitamin is essential in the diet of growing children, as well as adults.

Discovery of Vitamin D
After years of patient work and many thrilling and dramatic experiments, seven forms of vitamin D have been revealed by science. And scientists have also solved the mystery of how such widely separated factors as cod-liver oil; sunlight; a diet that is rich in, and carefully balanced with calcium and phosphorus; and ultra-violet light, all can perform the same service for the body.



Readers of this column may have observed that the discovery of a number of the vitamins came about chiefly through the efforts of investigators to discover a method of treating or curing obscure nutritional diseases. In most instances, however, carefully controlled laboratory experiments played their part in reaching the ultimate goal after some clue had been found as to what the mysterious substance might be that helped to control a baffling nutritional disease. The discovery of vitamin D was no exception!

Vitamin D and Rickets
Vitamin D is associated intimately with the prevention and cure of rickets, the most devastating nutritional disease of children in temperate climates. Indeed, it is the moderate, and in some cases the small amount of sunshine in the temperate zone that accounts partially for the presence of rickets.

Historians have given us reason to believe that this disease may have existed in England even before the Roman conquest. Certainly it appeared in a serious form, both in England and in other North European countries, in the Seventeenth century. In fact, early literature refers to it as the English disease, and the early attempts to fathom its causes were written in Latin by English and Dutch doctors during the 1600's.

In rickets, the child's head grows large and out of proportion to the body, while the leg and arm bones, and in severe cases even the ribs, are bent and twisted out of their normal shape.

Need for Calcium and Phosphorus
The two principal minerals required for constructing the bones and teeth are calcium, obtained chiefly from milk, cheese and green leafy vegetables, and phosphorus, found in generous amounts in eggs, whole grain cereals and dried legumes. But one of the things that made it so difficult for scientists to determine the cause of rickets was the fact that apparently well fed children, who had plenty of calcium and phosphorus, frequently developed the disease.

Mystery of Cod-Liver Oil
Cod-liver oil had been used for many years because of its supposedly "tonic" or "building" properties, when it was observed that regular doses of cod-liver oil not only cured rickets in children, but also cured the corresponding disease in adults, called osteomalacia, in which the bones become soft as the calcium and phosphorus already deposited in them are withdrawn and excreted.

Fat and Vitamin D
One of the strangest paradoxes to the scientists in their early investigations was the fact that while cod-liver oil appeared to cure

rickets, another substance high in fat—butter fat, did not. More research work was necessary before it was discovered that while butter was rich in vitamin A, cod-liver oil contained two vitamins, one of which was later named vitamin D.

Effect of Sunlight
More work was necessary and it took years of patient effort before science unraveled the mystery of how sunlight could have the same apparent effect in preventing rickets as cod-liver oil. Once nutritionists understood how sunlight acting on a fatty substance in the skin could produce vitamin D, however, it was not difficult to carry the process a step further and learn how to fortify foods with a satisfactory content of vitamin D.

Today we have at our disposal irradiated milk, or milk to which a vitamin D concentrate has been added. Margarine, too, has been enriched not only with vitamin D, but with vitamin A so that this moderate-priced spread for bread has been made an effective vitamin carrier.

Natural Food Sources of Vitamin D
The richest natural sources of vitamin D are the fish-liver oils, including the liver-oil of the tuna, swordfish, rock fish, salmon, halibut, mackerel, cod and haddock. The body oils of many fish also furnish substantial amounts that accounts for the fact that canned salmon has been regarded as such a splendid food in the diet of children and adults. It is not only a good source of protein and of energy values, but it contains substantial amounts of the minerals, calcium, phosphorus and iodine, and has been found to be an unusually good food source of vitamin D.

Egg yolk contains small amounts of vitamin D, and when eaten regularly, the quantity is enough to have a significant effect in the diet of children.

Vitamin D Requirements
So important is vitamin D considered, that the United States Children's Bureau advises that cod-liver oil or some other form of this vitamin be supplied to all

babies, beginning at the age of two or three weeks. Mothers should be guided by the advice of their physician in determining when to start the use of a vitamin D preparation and what quantities to give. But if they want to give their babies the blessing bestowed on them by the scientists who discovered vitamin D, they must not overlook this important substance.

As guardians of the health of both children and adults, mothers should see to it that vitamin D is supplied regularly through the use of eggs and salmon; irradiated foods and those fortified with vitamin D; and if necessary, fish-liver oils or concentrates.

Questions Answered

Miss G. M. L.—Yes, it is true that sweet potatoes contain a small amount of protein. In fact, their protein is composed of four amino acids known to be essential to nutrition. Some of the protein may be lost if the potato is boiled, but it is entirely preserved when the potato is cooked by dry heat.

Mrs. M. B.—Both cooked lentils and baked kidney beans contain over 20 per cent of carbohydrate. Low carbohydrate vegetables include cabbage, celery, cauliflower, kale, lettuce and spinach.
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HOUSEHOLD QUESTIONS



Keep Baking Oven Clean.—Many a cake is spoiled by burning fragments left in the oven. Rub the inside of the oven frequently with coarse emery paper. This will remove rust and keep the oven in good condition.

When Fruit Cake Becomes Dry.—Fruit cake that has become dry may be moistened by saturating a clean cloth with spiced fruit juice, wrapping the cake in the cloth and returning it to its airtight container for a day or two.

Removing Indelible Ink Marks.—Equal parts of turpentine and ammonia will remove indelible ink marks from white fabrics when everything else fails.

Lintless Tea Towels.—Tea towels will not leave lint on china and glassware if they are passed through a weak starch solution when laundered.

For Creaking Shoes.—Rub the sole of a creaking shoe with a flannel dipped in boiled linseed oil.

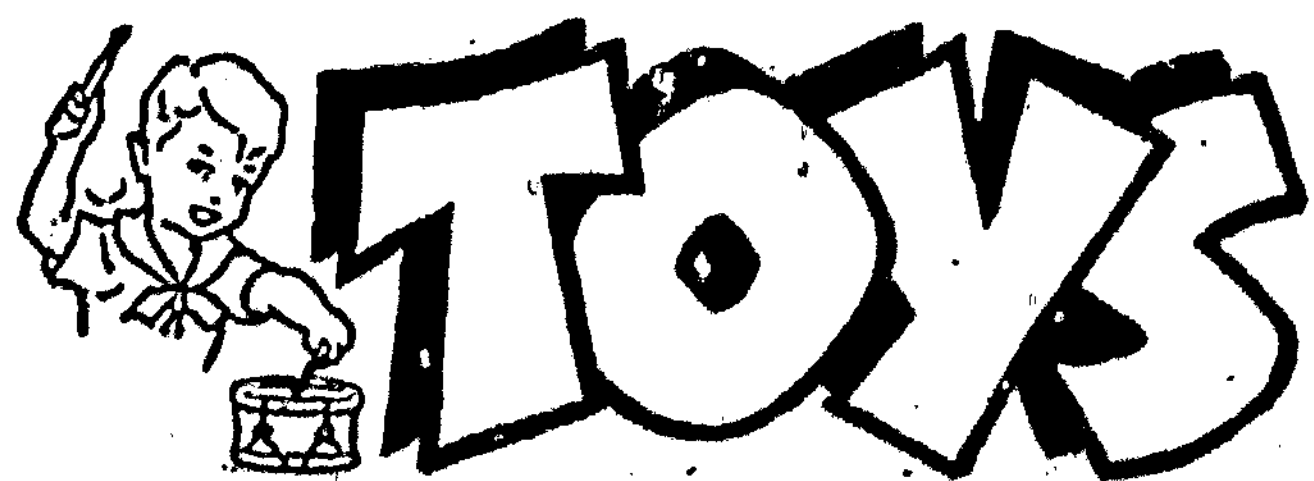

Before seeing that ad, my idea was that there was no market for haunted houses and that instead of being wanted, they were avoided, especially at night. But then, as has been said before, anything can happen in New York.

Two New Guns Perfected For National Defense

WASHINGTON.—The war department announced perfection of two new guns—a powerful anti-aircraft gun and an armor-piercing antitank cannon—which will be major items in the program to strengthen national defenses.

Both guns have been standardized. Large scale production is expected to begin as soon as the next congress appropriates the necessary money.

In announcing completion of tests of the guns, the war department said that both emphasize speed and mobility and can be towed by trucks over highways or rough ground. Field tests proved them "highly effective."

The new anti-aircraft gun is of 37 mm. caliber, automatic type, mounted on an all-around fire, four-wheel trailer. The unit has a 120-inch wheelbase, a 58-inch tread and weighs about 5,000 pounds. The tank cannon, also of 37 mm. caliber, is mounted on a carriage that can be towed by high-speed trucks or hauled short distances by manpower. The two-man crew is protected by armor. The unit is about 12 feet long, 5 feet wide, 3 feet high and weighs about 650 pounds.

To Keep Neck Beautiful

It comes in the form of a jar full of featherweight masques saturated in a solution that relieves eye tension and tiredness and leaves the eyes clear and radiantly alive.

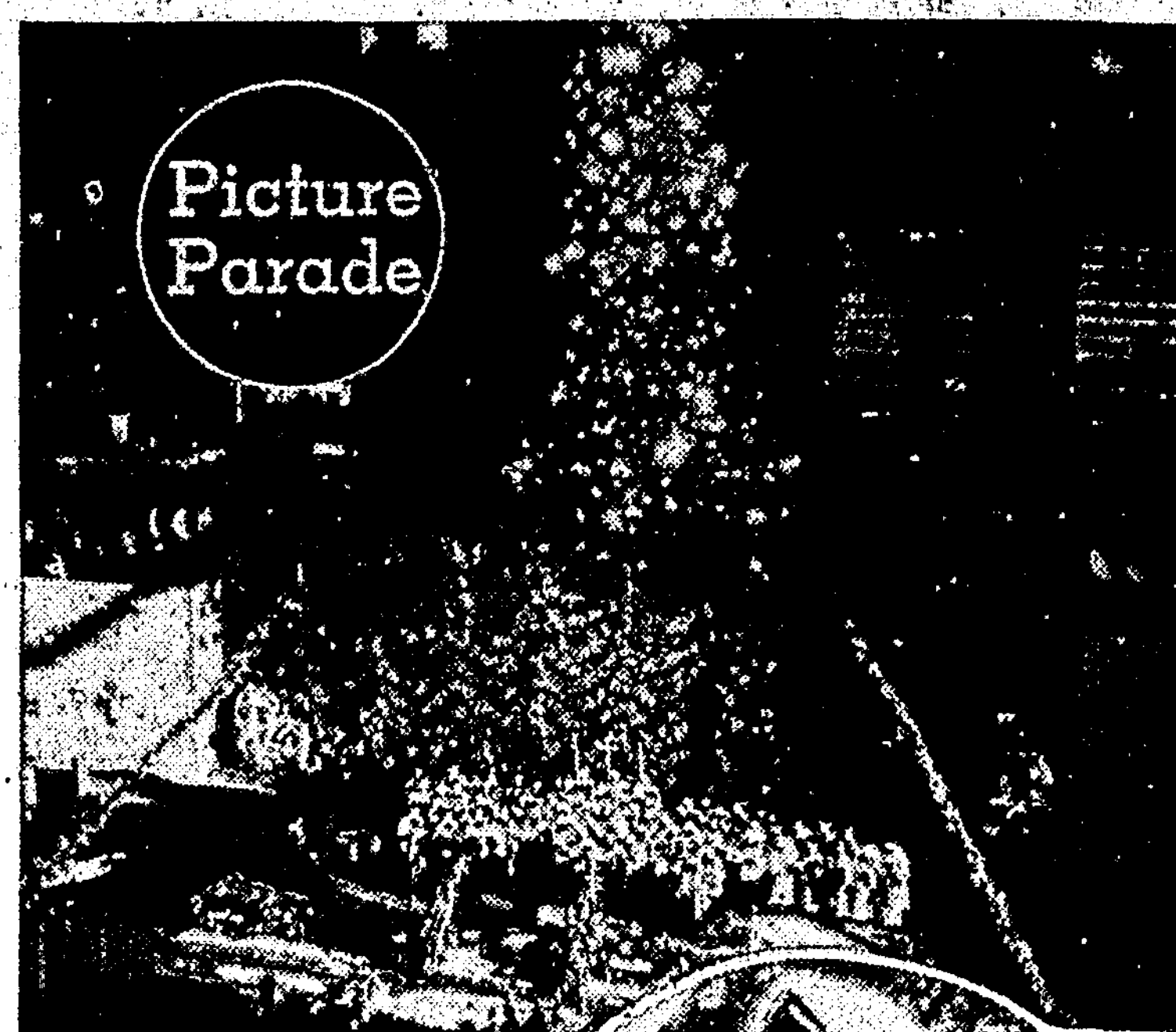
