 The Honorable Frank Knox, Secretary of the Navy in support of the Annual Roll Call of the American Red Cross

Civilian Defense

By The President of The United States of America
 A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS on May 20, 1941, with a view to ensuring the most effective correlation and use of the instruments of civilian defense, I established by Executive order the Office of Civilian Defense; and

WHEREAS by my proclamation of May 27, 1941, I declared that an unlimited national emergency confronts this country, which requires that its military, naval, air, and civilian defenses be put on a basis of readiness to repel any and all acts or threats of aggression directed toward any part of the Western Hemisphere; and

WHEREAS it is the manifest duty and desire of every person in the United States to participate in measures essential to civilian defense;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate the period commencing on Armistice Day, Tuesday, November 11, 1941, and continuing throughout the Nation to give thought to their duties and responsibilities in the defense of this country, and to become better informed of the many vital phases of the civilian defense program and of the opportunities which it offers for the participation of every individual American in the defense of our priceless heritage, and I request the Governors of the several States, Territories, and possessions of the United States to issue similar proclamations.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed. Done at the City of Washington this twenty-second day of October in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-one and of the United States of America the one hundred and sixty-sixth.

Notice is hereby given that on the 14th day of October, 1941 in accordance with Section 26, Chapter 49, Irrigation Laws of 1907 The Village of Capitán, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, made formal application to the State Engineer of New Mexico for a permit to appropriate the Public Waters of the State of New Mexico.

Such appropriation is to be made from Padilla Springs by means of two 4 inch steel pipe lines and concrete collection gallery at a point which bears South 74° 45' West, 2.8 miles to the North 1-16 corner of NE 1/4 of Section 34, T. 8 S., Range 15 East, being in the NE 1/4 NW 1/4 of Sec. 30, T. 8 S., R. 16 East, N. M. P. M. and 0.72 cu. ft. per sec. to be conveyed to The Village of Capitán by means of two 4 inch pipe lines and there used for Municipal uses between the dates of January 1st and December 31st of each year.

Any person, firm, association or corporation deeming that the granting of the above application would be truly detrimental to their rights in the water of said stream system shall file a complete statement of their objections substantiated by affidavits with the State Engineer and serve a copy on applicant on or before the 18th day of December, 1941, the date set for the Engineer to take the application up for final consideration unless protested. In case of protested applications all parties will be given a reasonable length of time in which to submit their evidence in detail or arrange a date convenient for a hearing or appoint a referee satisfactory to all to take testimony. Chippewa Indian Won Navy Wings

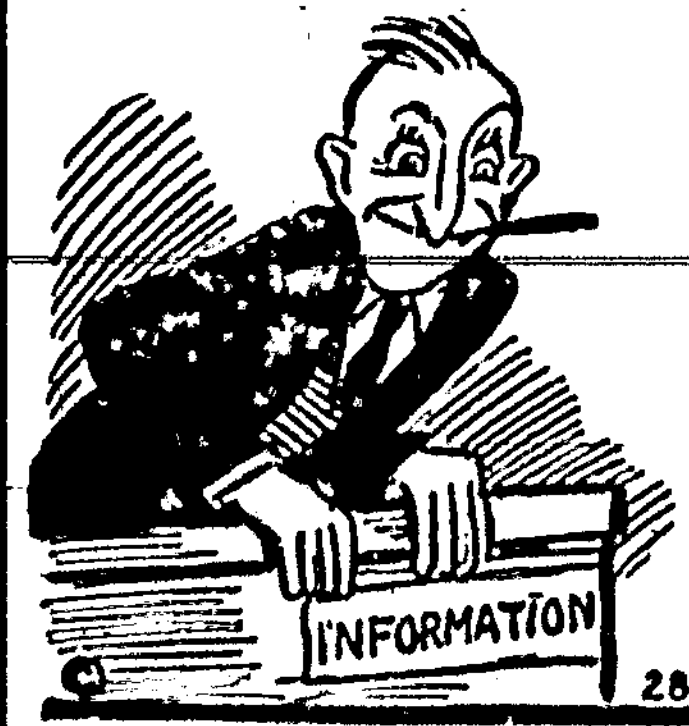

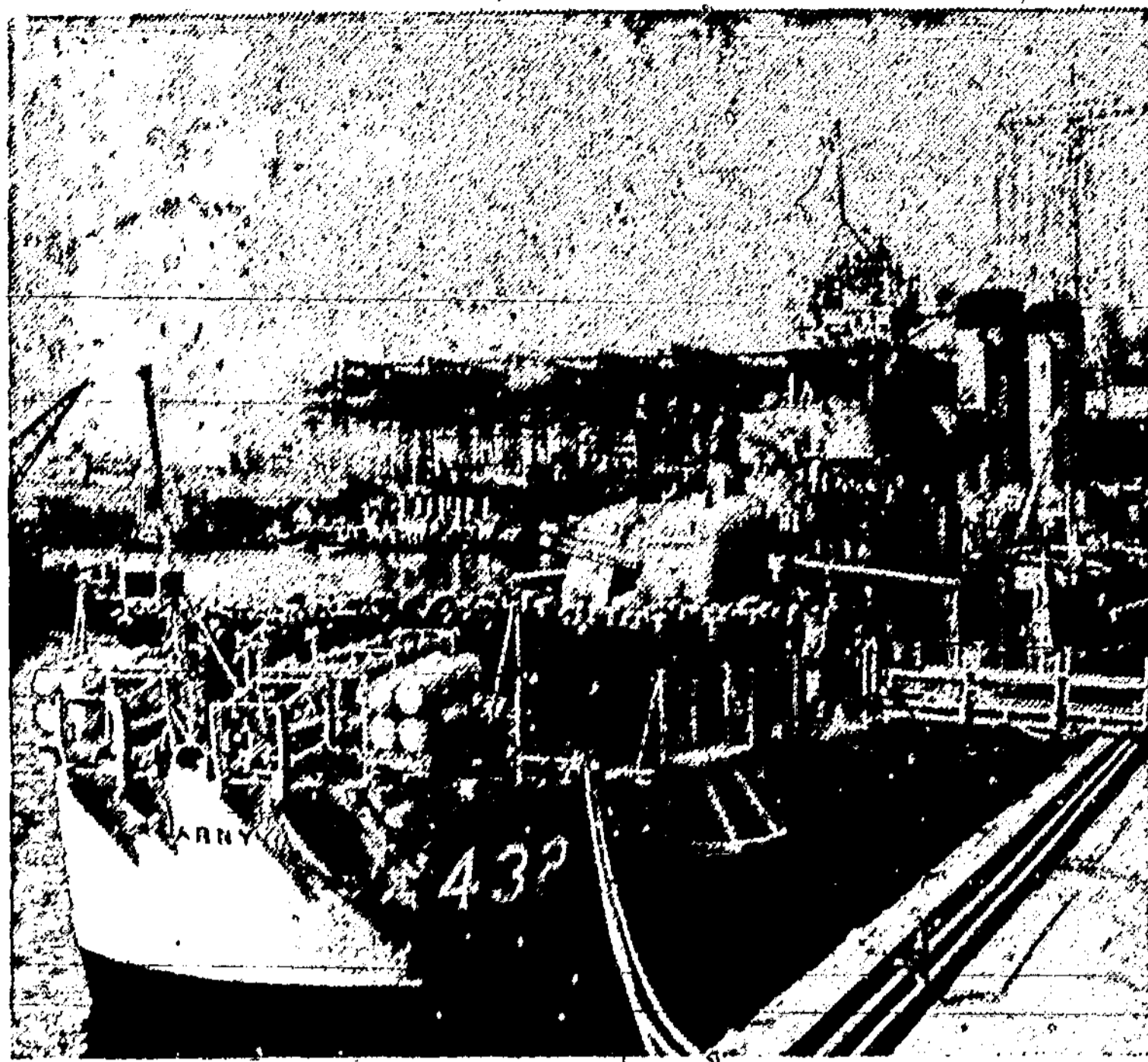

J., and had a complement of 13 officers and 177 men.

Air Corps Tests New Food Ration On Desert Hike

DAYTON, OHIO.—A 100-mile hike across desert sands of New Mexico has just been completed by a 14-man experimental expedition from Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, army air corps test and research center, for the purpose of testing the efficacy of a new type emergency field ration produced by the Quartermasters subsistence laboratory at Chicago.

Trial of the ration resulted because air corps pilots are frequently confronted with the possibility of being forced down in areas away from civilization. More particularly is this the case in aerial patrol duties over the jungles of Panama, the frozen wildernesses of Alaska, and the desert country of our Southwest.

This new type ration which provides the user with 3,500 calories a day in three packages with an average weight of 12.5 ounces a meal, is designed for emergency use by air corps personnel who are unfortunate enough to be forced down at points where they must walk 100 miles or more to reach a settlement where aid may be obtained.

Biscuit Is Mainstay. Mainstay of the experimental ration is a "pemmican" biscuit containing virtually all the essentials for a balanced diet, and said by scientists to be far superior to the original Indian "pemmican" made of buffalo meat and corn meal and to later "pemmicans" in flavor and dietetic value.

Each meal package also contains two graham crackers and—typical American touch—a stick of chewing gum.

Variety of diet is afforded by powdered soluble coffee with sugar, a supply of malted milk tablets, and

a small tin of veal loaf, all on the breakfast menu.

In addition to the ever-present pemmican biscuit the luncheon package contains a ham loaf tin, bouillon paste in a tube, and a supply of dextrose tablets, and the supper package provides a pork-beef sausage, some pieces of chocolate fudge candy and tablets for making lemonade.

Possible Variety. "In actual practice," explains Maj. D. B. Dill, chief of the experimental expedition, "the pilot could vary his diet a little by eating his breakfast package at lunch, or his supper for breakfast, but our experimental group followed the diet religiously, without variation."

Flying out to Albuquerque, N. M., in an army transport plane, the party landed at the army base one evening and early the next morning began a hike across the desert.

Accompanying the "hoofers" on their field test was an army truck carrying laboratory equipment and an extra water supply. Each hiker carried a 25-pound pack, including two blankets, mess kit, and three days of emergency rations.

Walking steadily, over rough country, at altitudes ranging from 5,000 to 9,400 feet above sea level, the party recorded mileage ranging from 13 to 21 miles a day. Since the average pilot wears an ordinary oxford shoe, instead of a heavy marching shoe, the hikers wore oxfords and uniforms or pilots' and mechanics' coveralls.

Testing Methods Used. For test purposes the party was divided into two groups, one of which subsisted on the regulation army type C field ration, which includes meat stew which must be heated in order to be palatable, biscuit and coffee. Another group began the hike on a diet of another type of "pemmican" with three eight-ounce cans providing a day's rations. This all-purpose food, alone, however, proved so unpalatable that it was abandoned.

In summing up results of the field trip, Major Dill pointed out that the subjects used were men of only average physical condition, many of them laboratory workers, rather than persons engaged in physically arduous daily occupations. While camp fires were used and water was heated for coffee and bouillon, as a matter of choice, both coffee and bouillon were palatable when made with cold water, so that the ration could be eaten without heating any of it. In this respect the ration has an advantage over the Type C ration which must be heated.

Squeeze Play With India as Prize

Farmer's Problems in National Defense Studied by Land Use Planning Committees

WASHINGTON.—The department of agriculture has issued a summary of the recommendations made to the department by land use planning committees of the 48 states which have been studying agricultural problems in national defense.

The recommendations of the state committees reflect the thought both of the thousands of farmer members of county planning committees and of field representatives of every department operating agency. The committee were requested by Secretary Claude R. Wickard to make the studies in order to assist him in shaping the course of the farm program during the defense and post-defense periods.

The state committee reports stress recommendations for the current defense effort, but also give thorough consideration to the problems of the post-war period and to long-range planning for agriculture.

To meet the special defense situations in agriculture, the state committees recommended: Integration of the agricultural economy with the total defense effort through such means as decentralization of defense industries, careful planning of military food requirements, increased federal aid for public services in areas of expanding defense population, and long-range planning of defense housing; development of priorities and price control policies in keeping with agricultural needs; and greater co-ordination of marketing and distribution of farm products.

Unified Program Recommended. The state committees were virtually unanimous in recommending the development of a unified national educational program for health and nutrition. A hot-lunch program for all school children, expansion and extension of AAA payments for home food practices, and improved health and medical services in rural areas were some of the measures suggested.

Likewise stressed by nearly all state committees was the need for substantial enlargement of existing guidance and training programs for rural youth. Specific training for non-agricultural pursuits was widely recommended.

Other defense recommendations emphasized effective use of forest, soil, water, and range resources so as to minimize waste and assure sustained yield. Many of the state committees indicated that needed additional production should be obtained so far as possible by increasing production per animal or per acre of land cultivated rather than by developing new crop land. Expansion of old transportation facilities and development of new ones were urged to forestall the possibility of shipping bottlenecks. "Some form of price guarantee or support" with the guarantees or supports moving upward as the prices paid by farmers move upward, was recommended for both basic and non-basic crops. Expanded trade within the Western hemisphere was suggested by many committees as a means of fostering better Pan-American trade relations.

View Post-War Period. Looking ahead to the post-war period, the state committees set forth three lines of activity which they believe will make easier the return to a peace-time economy: (1) a rural works program adequate to care

for rural unemployment and under-employment; (2) curbs on possible uneconomic expansion of cropland and undue speculation in land values; and (3) shaping of present defense efforts in such a way as to promote desirable future changes or additions to the agricultural program. Recommended under item (3) were further emphasis on the family-sized farm and the absorption of excess farm population through expanded urban employment.

Woman's 'Place' In a Democracy Is Forum Topic

COLUMBIA, MO.—Three of the most important factors in determining the integrity of any American home—finances, health, and character—will be examined from the standpoint of charting a more practical way in which our educational system can contribute to their improvement, in a three-day forum opening on the Stephens College campus here November 6.

The forum on "the American woman and her responsibilities as a citizen in a democracy" will include afternoon sessions of open panel discussions and evening sessions addressed by authorities in the various fields. Attending the afternoon session as participants will be parents of the students, undergraduates, alumnae, housewives and representatives of numerous national organizations.

James Madison Wood, president of the college, who for nearly 20 years has pioneered in the field of "practical" education for women, explained that most of the elements entering into the success or failure of a family are covered by these three factors. It is his contention that a "refocusing" of the educational program for women, to equip them more adequately for solving the real-life problems.

Purpose Outlined. Each of the three main topics embraces a number of subheadings which will receive attention in both the "roundtable" and the more formal discussions. He explained that problems under the head of finances, for example, include such things as budgeting, intelligent buying, care of property, investments, insurance and savings. Under health come all factors contributing to or detracting from personal efficiency. Character involves many factors, such as training in spiritual values, loyalty, patriotism, simple honesty, sportsmanship and willingness to shoulder responsibilities. Home atmosphere is the dominant influence here, Mr. Wood said, with parental example and proper guidance in choice of books, movies and radio being increasingly important.

"These things, to be sure, are not completely neglected in our present educational system," Mr. Wood said, "but so far as women are concerned formal education of today does not give the breadth or depth of training that each of the 65,000,000 women in America should have in terms of equipping her for her true responsibilities as a citizen."

Woman's Heritage. "The 'general education' here discussed is the heritage of every woman. It should amount to a careful mastery of those facts and social experiences necessary to intelligent living—just as is now demanded by colleges and universities in the fields of scholarly and professional achievement. The latter deals with the specialist, the former deals with the layman. Our present interest is the layman, primarily the mother in the home, the 'daily real teacher of children.'"

YOUR DEFENSE: HEALTH

Keep yourself to your share of health by giving your meals plenty of health-giving foods and ward off the lack of resistance to disease that comes from not getting enough of these health-giving foods.

Economy and health will be the key words this season and throughout the country your housewives will have to take care of the back-bone of the country by feeding your families food that builds strong bodies, steady nerves and high morale.

You've been hearing lots about vitamins, so check yourself on them: Vitamin A is responsible for healthy eyes, good vision and night blindness. It is found in milk, butter, vegetable oil and yellow fruits and eggs.

Vitamin B, sometimes called thiamine, is responsible for good digestion, appetite and good digestion. It is found in milk, liver, eggs, cheese, lean meats and leafy vegetables.

Gums bleeding? Teeth decay easily? Perhaps you're missing out on vitamin C, for this is the vitamin that goes right into your system and helps you have good teeth and bones.

Vitamin D isn't easy to find in food, but eggs, salmon, cod liver oil and milk contain some of it. Milk can be fortified with this vitamin and then it is called "irradiated." Most common way of getting the vitamin is either through milk of this type, or by taking cod liver oil in winter, sunbaths in the summer, for it is formed in the skin

LEMUEL SAYS: Here's your guide for meal planning for health: Milk: 1/2 to 1 quart a day for each child and nursing mothers. 1 pint a day for everyone else. Vegetables: 1 or more servings a day of the leafy green, or yellow vegetables; 1 serving of potatoes or sweet potatoes. Fruits: 1 serving of tomatoes, grapes, or oranges a day; 1 serving of another fruit. Eggs: 1 a day or 4 to 5 a week. Lean meat, fish, poultry: 1 or more servings a day. About 1/4 of a pound of meat or fish is the equivalent. Cereals: A serving daily of enriched cereal. Bread and Butter: At every meal. Sweets: some sweets occasionally to satisfy the appetite. This is the best dessert in the dessert or candy.

You've probably heard that you need calcium to build good bones and teeth, but did you know that you need it to help your blood to clot when you have a wound and that you need it also to regulate your muscle contraction?

Phosphorus works together with calcium in building bones and nerves. Milk, cereals, meat, cheese, eggs, nuts—all these have a good phosphorus content. Iron goes to work and makes red, red blood cells that are just about the hardest working cells you'll ever find.

Iodine spells power. It is released to your system by the thyroid gland which is near the Adam's apple. Sluggishness, mental and physical, are the result of lack of iodine or thyroid deficiency. Seafood contains iodine as well as garden vegetables. Salt has been iodized to help out general deficiency, and cranberries if raised in low-lying lands near the sea are a popular source of iodine.

Magnesium balances calcium, and as you're getting your milk you'll be getting magnesium, too. Other sources are green leafy vegetables. That's the line-up. You'll notice that many foods contain both or several kinds of essential minerals and vitamins. Of course that should make the job you have to do easier.

*Liver and Vegetable Pie. (Serves 6 to 8)
1/2 pound salt pork
1 1/2 cups cooked pork liver, cut in pieces
1 1/2 cups sliced onions
1 cup diced carrots
2 1/2 cups boiling water
1 1/2 teaspoons quick-cooking tapioca
Black pepper and salt
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Fry salt pork, add liver and brown slightly. Cook onions and carrots until tender in boiling salted water. Drain, measure liquid and add water to make 2 cups. Add vegetables and meat to liquid, then remaining ingredients and bring to a brisk boil, stirring constantly. Turn into greased casserole.

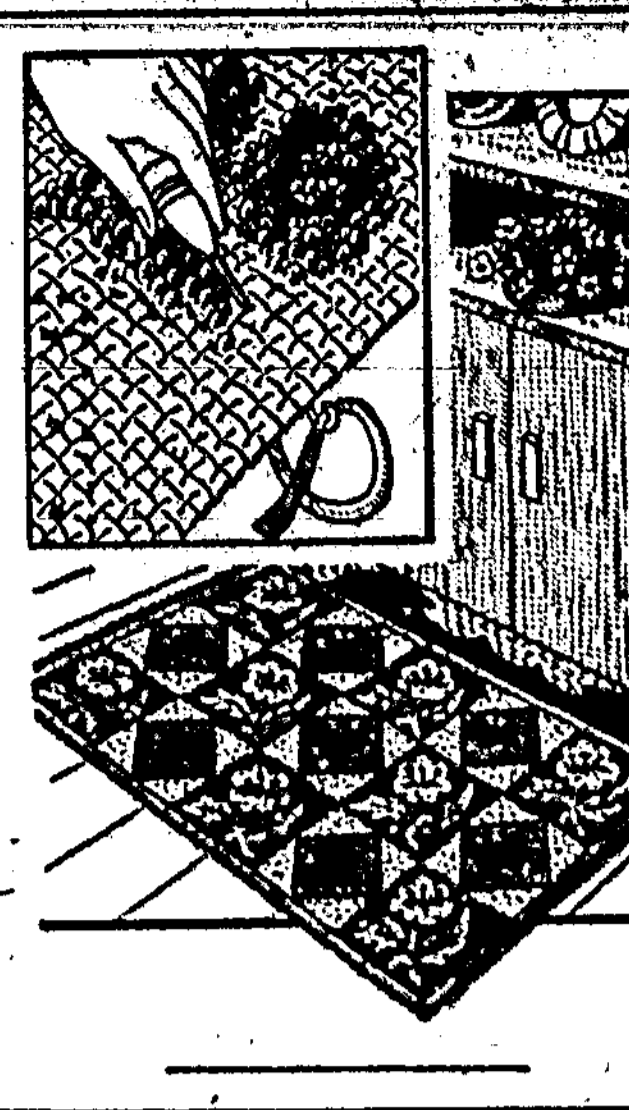
Cover casserole with the following: Mix 1 cup sifted flour with 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cut in 3 tablespoons shortening, add milk (about 6 tablespoons) and mix until soft dough is formed. Pat to 1/4-inch thickness, cut several slits on top. Fit over casserole. Bake in a hot (450 degrees) oven, 20 minutes. (Released by Western Newspaper Union.)

Complete solidarity of purpose was evidenced at the State Democratic Central Committee meeting held in Santa Fe, Monday with the election of Guy Shepard as state chairman to complete the unexpired portion of Benj. D. Luchini's term.

Shepard was the only candidate nominated and the vote for him was unanimous.

Attendance at the meeting held in the City Hall, was better than had been really expected, in view of the fact that political interest is usually at low ebb at this season of the year. However, 107 of the 150 committee members were present in person or by proxy, indicating a high state of morale in the organization, and only three of the 81 counties, those more distant from Santa Fe, failed to send any representation.

"I make no promise except to work hard and do my best," said Shepard accepting the election.

Aside from the fact that his election reflects satisfaction with his conduct of the office for the past four months, since Luchini resigned to become chairman of the employment service commission, another and probably more important angle is seen. His election is equivalent to a mandate from the committee giving him a free hand to go ahead with plans for election year, plus the assurance of the committee's confidence. His present term, or part of term, of course, expires before the next election. However, there are many things a political headquarters has to do in this state before then, preparing the way for the pre-election campaign, and Shepard, with this vote of confidence, can now go ahead with them.
