

for squabs is on the increase, especially in large cities. Frobable income from a few pairs of pigeons may be estimated by using local market prices, assuming an annual production of at least 12 squabs for each mated pair, and allowing for a food consumption by each pair of about 100 pounds.

CHOOSING THE BREED

The most popular breeds of pict geons for squab production are those which produce good-sized squabs with light-colored skin. A recent publication from the U.S. department of agriculture, commenting upon this demand, says: "The King, Carneau, Mondaine, and giant Homer are good producers of squabs of this type, and carefully selected stock of these breeds should produce at least 12 squabs per pair per year, which should weigh from 14 to 24 ounces each, live weight, at 26 days of age."

It is advisable to begin the squabgrowing enterprise with young mated pairs, bought from a reliable breeder who has kept accurate records of his stock and who will guarantee both the age and sex.

The period of incubation for pigeon eggs is 17 days. The hen lays an egg one day, skips one day, then lays another egg. Both the male and the female take turns brooding the eggs and feeding the young. Since the female frequently lays another setting of eggs when the first squabs are but two or three weeks old, leaving their care to the male, it is necessary to provide double nests for each pair. If she is permitted to lay in the old nest, the developing squabs will inevitably disturb the incubation of the new eggs. FEEDING

It must not be assumed that any good poultry feed will do for pl geons. The feeding of pigeons is radically different from the feeding of any other type of poultry. For instance, no much or green feed is included in a pigeon ration; instead, it consists entirely of whole grains. A suitable pigeon feed is as follows:

Parts by weight Whole yellow corn35 Kafir or mile maize20 Cowpean20 Hard red wheat15 Oat groats 5

It is absolutely necessary, also, to supply the pigeons with a suitable mineral mixture as a source of calcium and phosphorus, to supply salt, and to provide both grinding and egg-shell materials. Such a mineral mixture may properly be as Per cent

Medium-sized, crushed oyster Limestone or granite grit35

Medium-sized, hardwood charcoal10 Ground bone 5 Ground limestone 5 Salt 4 Venetian red (supplying neces-

This mineral mixture, kept slightly moist, should Le kept in a hopper where the pigcons have constant access to it. In addition, a supply of fresh, clean water must be constantly provided.

WHEN TO MARKET

As a rule, squabs are ready to market at the age of 20 days, although squabs from very large breeds may requires a day or two longer. They are ready for market when the under side of the wing is fully feathered. They must then be sold at once, as, after that point of development, they begin to lose their tender baby fat and to become hard of flesh.

SANITATION

It is of the utmost importance to keep pens and yards clean. Houses should be dry, clean, well-ventilated, and free from drafts. The floors should be covered with sand or gravel-about one inch deep-and the droppings must be raked off frequently. The pens should be cleaned once a week. Twice a year the entire house should be thoroughly cleaned, including scraping floors and nests and washing them with hot lye water. The whole interiorshould be aprayed with a disinfec-

Stakting Up the Heater. A NY kind of a heater should be thoroughly cleaned inside before starting it up in the fall. The inside flue passages should be scraped and gone over with a steel brush, of a kind made for the job. The smokepipe should be cleaned out, for it is only too likely to catch ashes and soot. All of this work can best be done with a vacuum cleaner, of a kind intended for the purpose; coal dealers can do the job, or can supply the names of concerns specializing in it. The chimney flue should also be cleaned as often as is necessary.

Doors of the heater should fit tightly; if rust has collected on them, this should be scraped off. Doors that are too greatly warped to make a tight fit should be replaced, for leakage of air around them will interfere with the draft. The smokepipe should make a tight fit in its hole in the chimney, which usually calls for a packing with asbestos or other fireproof cement. The same kind of cement can be used to close an open joint between the bottom of the heater and the

If the water gauge of a steam boiler shows that the water is dirty, the boiler should be emptied and refilled to the proper level. If the water is clean, there is no need to replace it. This applies also to boilers of hot water heating systems. Cold Extension

Question: A two-story brick extension is exposed and very cold in winter. The upper part is a kitchen. The dish closet is as cold as the refrigerator. We have hot air heat, but heated air does not come into the kitchen until the kitchen air is heated by the stove. What can you advise?

Answer: In the first place, you should have an outlet by which the cold air can escape from the room and get back to the heater. This would set up a circulation that would bring the hot air into the kitchen. For insulation, the kitchen walls can be lined with stiff insulating boards, which are one-half inch thick and would occupy but little space; the boards could be nailed directly to the plaster. Cork-board might also be used.

Construction in Winter Question: I am interested in a

corner house, one of a row of houses to be built during the winter and completed about May. I am told that houses built in winter are not as strong and do not stand up as well as those built in warm weather. Is this true?

Answer: The durability and quality of construction are entirely dependent on the reliability of the contractor and the care he uses in his building operations during freezing weather. Of course, construction during warm weather climinates some of the hazards.

Kitchen Table Top Question: I wish to finish a new

wooden top on a kitchen table in a color, with a serviceable surface. If this cannot be done in color, what other method should I use? Answer: A linseed oil treatment will be more satisfactory. Give the table a coaking coat of raw lin--seed oil. Wipe off the excess oil on the surface after an hour or so, After three applications the table top will be resistant to stains and will not be liable to warp.

Covering Insulation

Question: I have an unfinished attic which is about four feet high in the middle. There is no flooring in it, but I have four inches of insulation between the beams. Would it be advisable to cover this insulation with some sort of material such as a rigid insulating board, making a floor of same?

Answer: Insulating board is not hard enough for flooring; use ply-





Air Corps Tests New Food Ration On Desert Hike

DAYTON, OHIO.—A 100-mile hike across desert sands of New Mexico has just been completed by a 14man experimental expedition from Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, army air corps test and research center, for the purpose of testing the efficacy of a new type emergency field ration produced by the Quartermasters subsistence laboratory at Chi-

Trial of the ration resulted because air corps pilote are frequently confronted with the possibility of being forced down in areas away from civilization. More particularly is this the case in aerial patrol duties over the jungles of Panama, the frozen wildernesses of Alaska, and the desert country of our Southwest.

This new type ration which provides the user with 3,500 calories a day in three packages with an average weight of 12.5 ounces a meal, is designed for emergency use by air corps personnel who are unfortunate enough to be forced down at points where they must walk 100 miles or more to reach a settlement where aid may be obtained.

Biscuit Is Mainstay. Mainstay of the experimental ration is a "pemmican" biscuit containing virtually all the essentials for a balanced diet, and said by scientists to be far superior to the original Indian "pemmican" made of buffalo meat and corn meal and to later "pemmicans" in flavor and dictetic value.

Each meal package also contains two graham crackers and-typical American touch—a stick of chewing

Variety of diet is afforded by powdered soluble coffee with sugar, a supply of malted milk tablets, and

In addition to the ever-present pemmican biscuit the luncheon package contains a ham loaf tin, bouillon paste in a tube, and a supply of dextrose tablets, and the supper package provides a porkbeef sausage, some pieces of chocolate fudge candy and tablets for making lemonade.

Possible Variety. "In actual practice," explains Maj. D. B. Dill, chief of the experivary his diet a little by eating his

brookfact package at lungh, or his supper for breakfast, but our experimental group followed the diet religiously, without variation." Flying out to Albuquerque, N. M., in an army transport plane, the party landed at the army base one eve-

ning and early the next morning began a hike across the desert. Accompanying the "hoofers" on their field test was an army truck an extra water supply. Each hiker

carried a 25-pound pack, including

two blankets, mess kit, and three

days of emergency rations. Walking steadily, over rough country, at altitudes ranging from 5,000 to 9,400 feet above sea level, the party recorded mileage ranging from 13 to 21 miles a day. Since the average pilot wears an ordinary oxford shoe, instead of a heavy marching shoe, the hikers wore oxfords and uniforms or pilots' and

mechanics' coveralls.

Testing Methods Used. For test purposes the party was divided into two groups, one of which subsisted on the regulation army type C field ration, which includes meat stew which must be heated in order to be palatable, biscuit and coffee. Another group began the hike on a diet of another type of "pemmican" with three eight-ounce cans providing a day's rations. This all-purpose food, alone, however, proved so unpalatable that it was abandoned.

In summing up results of the field trip, Major Dill pointed out that the subjects used were men of only average physical condition, many of them laboratory workers, rather than persons engaged in physically arduous daily occupations. While camp fires were used and water was heated for coffee and bouillon, as a matter of choice, both coffee and boullon were palatable when

Farmer's Problems in National Defense Studied by Land Use Planning Committees

of agriculture has issued a summary of the recommendations made to the department by land use planning committees of the 48 states which have been studying agricultural problems in national defense.

The recommendations of the state committees reflect the thought both of the thousands of farmer members of county planning committees and of -field representatives of every department operating agency. The committees were requested by Secretary Claude R. Wickard to make the studies in order to assist him in shaping the course of the farm program during the defenbe and postdefense periods.

The state committee reports stress recommendations for the current defense effort, but also give thorough consideration to the problems of the post-war period and to long-range planning for agriculture.

To meet the special defense situations in agriculture, the state committees recommended: Integration of the agricultural economy with the total defense effort through such means as decentralization of defense industries, careful planning of military food requirements, increased federal aid for public services in areas of expanding defense population, and long-range planning of defence housing; development of priorities and price control policies in keeping with agricultural needs; and greater co-ordination of marketing and distribution of farm products.

Unified Program Recommended.

The state committees were virtually unanimous in recommending the development of a unified national educational program for health and nutrition. A hot-lunch program for -oll-ochool-children,-expansion-and extension of AAA payments for home food practices, and improved health mental expedition, "the pilot could and medical services in rural areas were some of the measures suggest-

> Likewise stressed by nearly all state committees was the need for substantial enlargement of existing guidance and training programs for rural youth. Specific training for non-agricultural pursuits was widely recommended.

Other defense recommendations emphasized effective use of forest, soil, water, and range resources so carrying laboratory equipment and as to minimize waste and assure sustained yield. Many of the state committees indicated that needed additional production should be obtained so far as possible by increasing production per animal or per acre of land cultivated rather than by developing new crop land. Expansion of old transportation facilities and development of new ones were urged to forestall the possibility of shipping bottlenecks. "Some form of price guarantee or support," with the guarantees or supports moving upward as the prices paid by farmers move upward, was recommended for both basic and nonbasic crops. Expanded trade within the Western hemisphere was suggested by many committees as a means of fostering better Pan-American trade relations.

View Post-War Period.

Looking ahead to the post-war period, the state committees set forth three lines of activity which they believe will make easier the return to a peace-time economy: (1) a rural works program adequate to care

Woman's 'Place' In a Democracy Is Forum Topic

COLUMBIA, MO.—Three of the most important factors in determining the integrity of any American home-finances, health, and character-will be examined from the s standpoint of charting a more practical way in which our educational system can contribute to their improvement, in a three-day forum opening on the Stephens College campus here November 6.

The forum on "the American woman and her responsibilities as a 🕞 citizen in a democracy" will include afternoon sessions of open panel discussions and evening sessions addressed by authorities in the various fields. Attending the afternoon session as participants will be parents of the students, undergraduates, alumnae, housewives and representntives of numerous national organizations.

James Madison Wood, president of the college, who for heafly 30 years has pioneered in the field of "practical" education for women, explained that most of the elements entering into the success or failure of a family are covered by these three factors. It is his contention that a "refocusing" of the educational program for women, to equip them more adequately for solving the real-life problems.

Purpose Outlined.

Each of the three main topics embraces a number of subheadings which will receive attention in both the "roundtable" and the more formal discussions. He explained that problems under the head of finances. for example, include such things as budgeting, intelligent buying, care of property, investments, insurance and savings. Under health come all factors contributing to or detracting from personal efficiency. Character involves many factors, such as training in spiritual values, loyalty, patriotism, simple honesty, sportsmanship and willingness to shoulder responsibilities. Home atmosphere is the dominant influence here. Mr. Wood said, with parental example and proper guidance in choice of books, movies and radio being increasingly important.

"These things, to be sure, are not completely neglected in our present educational system," Mr. Wood said, "but so far as women are concerned formal education of today does not give the breadth or depth of training that each of the 65,000,000 women in America should have in terms of equipping her for her true responsibilities as a citizen.

Woman's Heritage.

"The 'general education' here discussed is the heritage of every woman.
