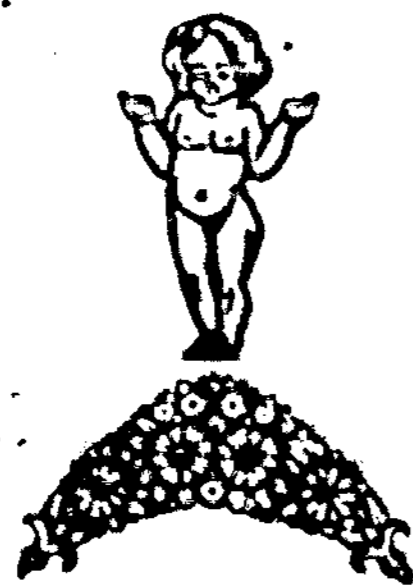

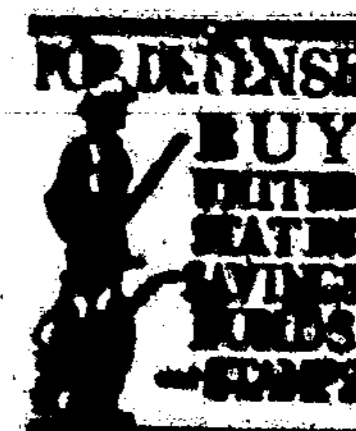

Rebuilding Irrigation Diversion Dams

HONDO, N. M., Dec. 24, CCC men station at the Hondo camp are cutting logs from the Lincoln National Forest to use in rebuilding some 42 irrigation diversion dams that were washed away in the Hondo and Ruidoso Valleys during the floods of late September, according to James G. Lindley, Region 8, Engineering head of the Soil Conservation Service. In addition to CCC Labor, the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation District is seeking immediate approval of an emergency WPA appropriation to provide 75 men for one month's work, Lindley stated.

"It is imperative that these farmers, many of them with little income, get irrigation water before spring if they are to raise crops and fruit," Lindley said.

The Hondo Soil Conservation District is supervising the rehabilitation of approximately 2,000 acres of farm and orchard land severely damaged by the floods. The district, Lindley said, hopes to obtain more substantial WPA assistance later to continue work following the emergency period of 80 days.

SCS estimates the flood did serious damage to 699 acres of cultivated land in the Hondo valley, 96 acres in the Bonito Valley, and 978 acres in the Ruidoso Valley. The 5,000 acres of irrigated orchard and farming land in these valleys are valued at \$500 to \$1,000 an acre, Lindley declared.

The state of New Mexico has agreed to lend a dragline to the Hondo District; and SCS will furnish trucks and technical assistance. Lowell B. Rich of the SCS Regional Office in Albuquerque, Lindley said, has been detailed to work with C. A. Henderson of Capitan, District Conservationist, during the construction period.

SCS will lend assistance only on the Rio Hondo and Rio Ruidoso, since the Southern Pacific Railroad has water rights on the Rio Bonito and will rebuild dams that were destroyed there.

Strong Defense of Far-Flung Outposts Is Important in U. S. Military Strategy

WASHINGTON.—In the first onslaught of the war, our outposts nearest to Japan were the first to be attacked. But the declaration of war on the United States by Germany and Italy automatically increased the possibilities of war in the Atlantic as well as in the Pacific. That war might take the form of attacks on the Panama canal or the West Indies. Or, the war in the Pacific might be extended to Alaska, which lies only a few hundred miles from Asia. Control of Alaska would make it possible for Japan to seriously menace our shipments of supplies to Russia and China. And it would give Japan a stronghold on the continent.

This is a war of strategy, a war in which it is of the utmost importance to keep the enemy from coming within striking distance. It is also a war of surprises. A strong fortification can often be captured, or destroyed if taken sufficiently by surprise. The French built the Maginot line to protect themselves from German attack by land. But the Germans came by air instead.

Position, then, is important. But strength is essential to maintain it. Although not entirely unprotected, our outposts are nevertheless highly vulnerable. Puerto Rico has a well-equipped air base at Borinquen Field, but is short of heavy artillery and long range guns. Puerto Rico's function at the moment is that of a lookout post, and as such it serves as an advance guard for the Panama canal.

Shipping Restricted.

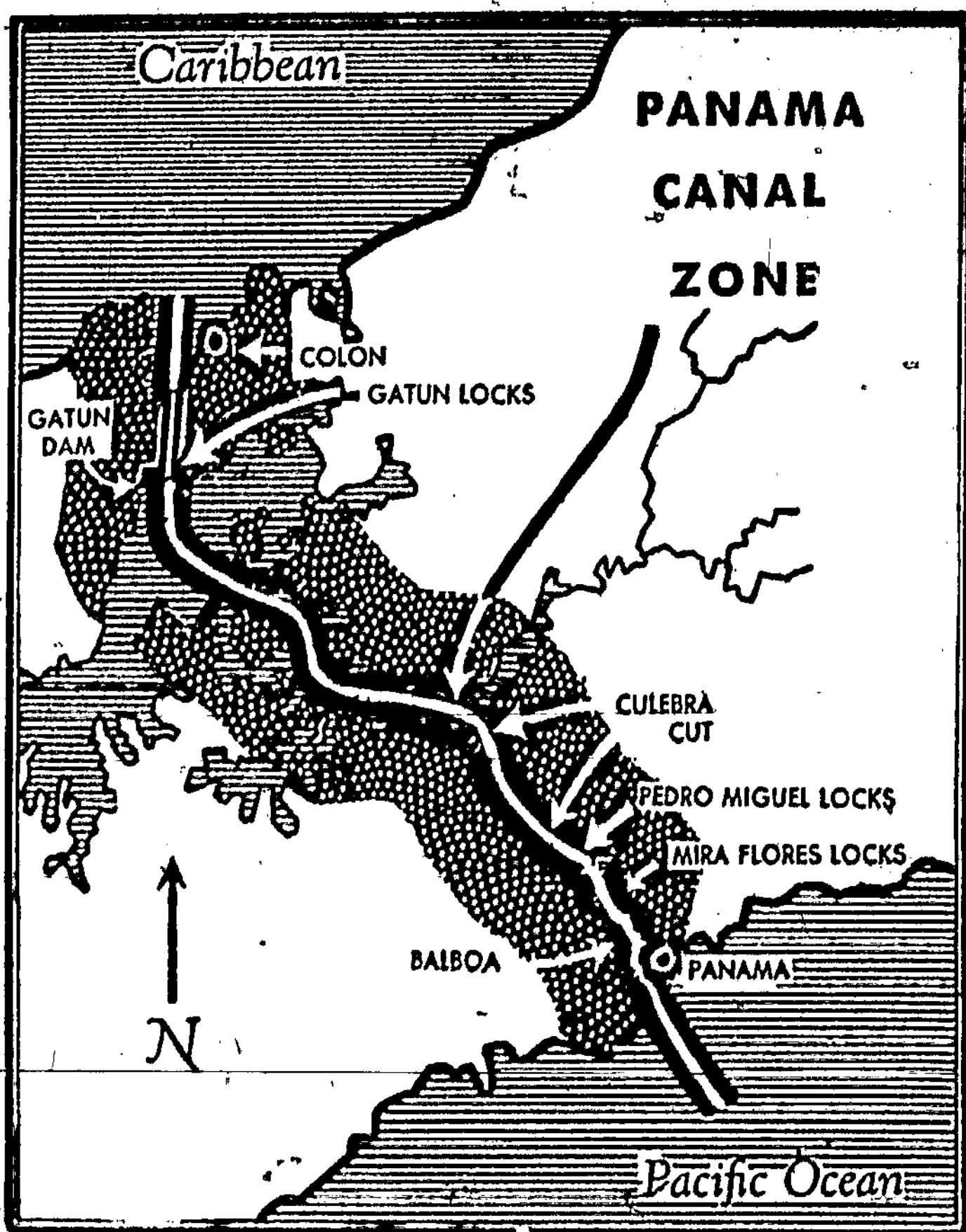
Shipping in the Canal has been limited to the daylight hours, and air service from Balboa to Cristobal has been suspended, as the air route between those two points lies directly over the Canal. Whether the Axis will strike next in the Caribbean remains only a guess on the part of the prophets. It is not impossible. President Camacho of Mexico, while not asking for a declaration of war, has pledged his support and has warned his people that Mexico is in grave peril.

Our bases in South America help to guard the Canal and also to prevent attack from the south and east. Now that Germany and Italy have joined Japan in declaring war on the United States, the threat from Africa should be taken into consideration. The Vichy government has already conceded the Nazi additional land in Africa, and Dakar is only 1,020 miles from Natal, the nearest point in South America, which lies just to the south and east of Paramaribo, the capital and seaport of Dutch Guiana. Africa may seem a long way off, but it is well to remember that only a short time ago a clipper left this country on its first scheduled flight to Africa. If we can fly one way there is nothing but our own vigilance to keep our enemies from flying the other.

Alaska Important.

To many, Alaska also seems so remote as to be hardly worthy of any deep concern. But here again, strategy is involved. Located almost due north of the Hawaiian Islands and scarcely more than a good sleeper jump by plane, about 600 miles from the nearest point in Asia, Alaska can be completely isolated from the United States.

The war might suspend shipping to Alaska, and Alaskans maintain that if that happens, they are "through." It is, then, important for us to keep open the shipping lanes to Alaska. There is, of course, the skyway across Canada from Ed-

monton to White Horse. But the ease with which bombers can be sent to Alaska by that route should make it clear that planes, not our own, can fly from Alaska to the United States equally successfully, thus exposing the central part of the continent to attack.

Alaska's strategic position lends more importance than would normally be given to the recent reports of fires along the coast, particularly at Sitka. What happens along the coast in Alaska is also important to the safety of her population, some 90 per cent of which is concentrated along the coast. It is no secret that the U. S. government has been fortifying the mainland of Alaska, as well as the Aleutian Islands off the coast. But what these fortifications amount to is still a matter of conjecture, as their construction has been kept a reasonably well-guarded secret.

On the Saturday night before the Sunday on which the attacks on Hawaii and the Philippines began, a drill barge burned at Sitka. That, in itself, would not be significant. Fire is a common hazard where construction is under way and especially where dynamite is used. And the significance of the Sitka fires may be exaggerated by rumor. But it is at least interesting to keep in mind that this particular fire was only one of several in recent months. In one case, dynamite sticks were stored in one shed. As a precautionary measure, the detonating caps which set them off were stored in another, and both sheds were carefully watched. Both sheds burned.

Pearl Harbor Bombing.

The Hawaiian islands were believed to be virtually impregnable, but Japan succeeded in bombing Pearl Harbor. In a war of strategy you must be everywhere at once. It is that fact lies the importance of our outposts and military bases. It is important for us to have a foothold

in Bermuda, Dutch Guiana, the Panama canal Zone of Alaska, but it is equally important for us to keep someone else from gaining a foothold there.

In the case of Bermuda, Dutch Guiana and other places where our bases supplement those of the British, we are helping our allies as well as ourselves by being there. And we need our allies to win this war. How well we know that was demonstrated by the fact that, in spite of protest, congress passed the lend-lease act and revised the neutrality act. The capture of Manila, for instance, would endanger Singapore. The capture of Singapore would cripple the British fleet in the Pacific and deprive us of its assistance.

'Incidents' Leading To Japanese War Have Long History

Back of the present war between the United States and Japan lies a series of "incidents" based on the modern technique of "undeclared war." The first of the series was the Mukden incident of 1931, and the others are like it in that they all represent aggression under the guise of self-defense.

July 7, 1937—Beginning of the present Sino-Japanese war with an incident outside Peking.

July 10, 1937—Secretary of State Cordell Hull announced the 13 points which have since been the basis of our negotiations with Japan.

December 12, 1937—Japanese planes sank the U.S.S. Panay in the Yangtze river. Two lives were lost.

December 30, 1939—The United States protest to Japan warned against interference with American rights in China and opened the way for a conference to help settle Asiatic issues.

September 27, 1940—Japan joined the Axis.

July 25, 1941—The United States froze Japanese assets here.

July 20, 1941—Japanese troops began the occupation of French Indo-China.

August 20, 1941—Negotiations were resumed after President Roosevelt received a peace appeal from Premier Kenyo of Japan.

November 15, 1941—Saburo Kurosu arrived from Japan as a special envoy to aid Ambassador Nomura in conference at Washington.

November 25, 1941—The United States received reports of Japanese troop concentrations in Indo-China, with indications that Thailand might be attacked.

December 2, 1941—The state department, at the request of President Roosevelt, made formal inquiries of Japan regarding her intentions and purposes in concentrating troops in Indo-China.

December 7, 1941—Japanese planes bombed the American naval base at Pearl Harbor, Honolulu.

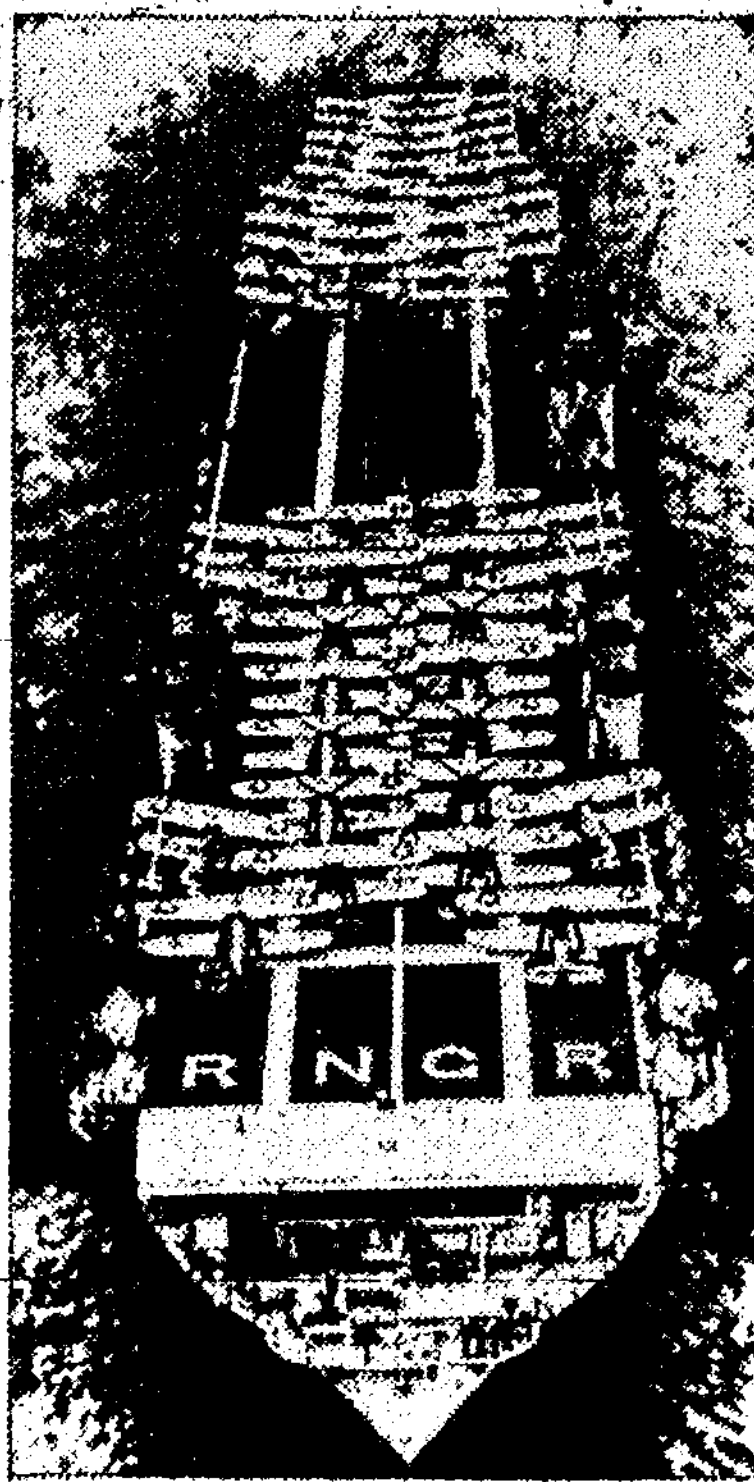
December 8, 1941—Congress passed a joint resolution declaring the United States at war with Japan.

Bomb-Barricade in San Francisco



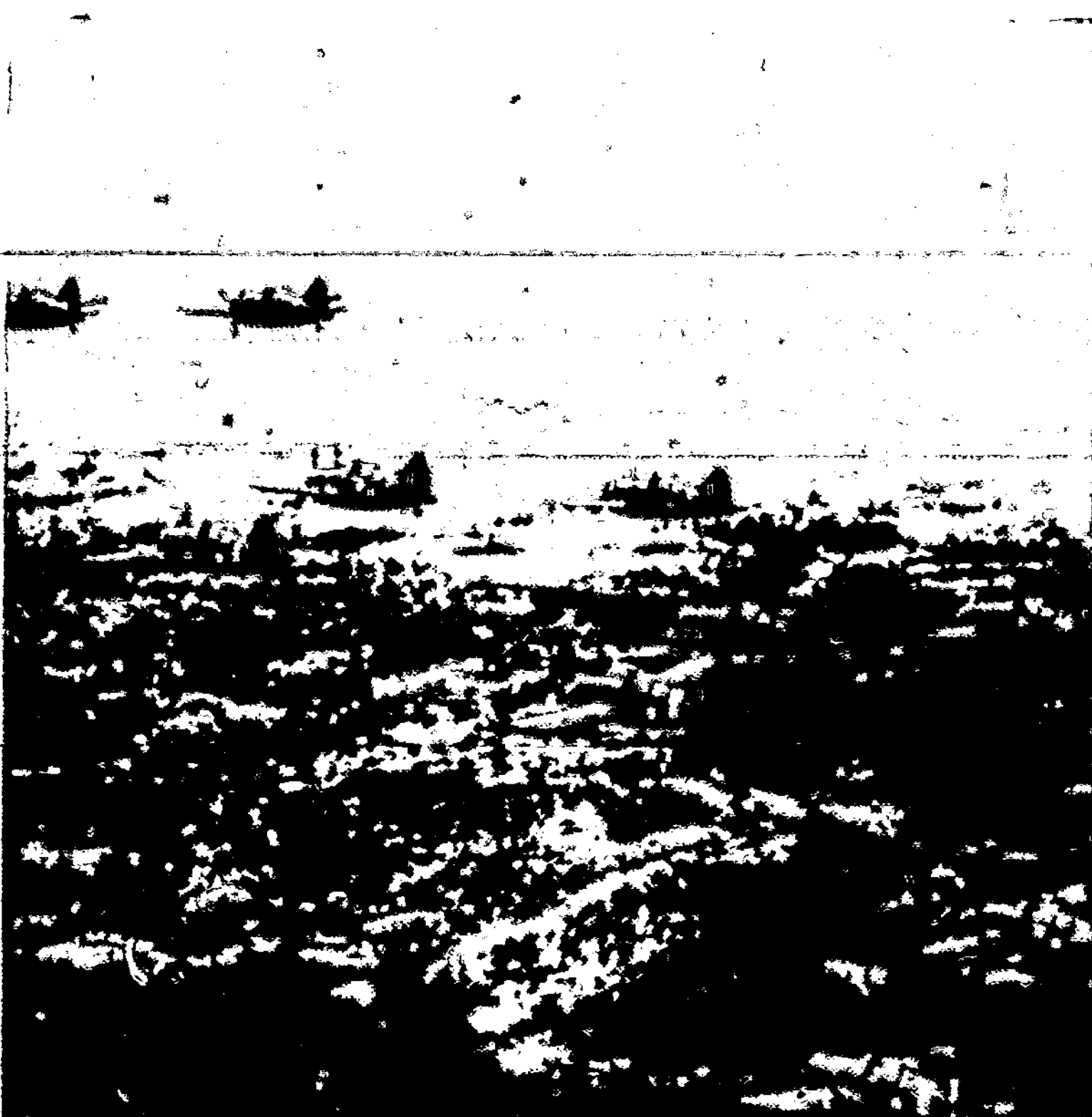

Japan's Oil Supply

Is Vulnerable Item

Among other serious considerations Japan had to deal with in beginning its war with the United States was the fact that conflict meant the definite and continued cutting off of two-thirds of the nation's oil supply. For that is the amount of oil that the United States had been supplying to Japan up until shortly before the start of the war.

Another fourth of Japan's supply of

this highly important commodity came from the Dutch East Indies.

Only a tenth of Japan's normal requirements of oil comes from its own fields and from wells in Manchukuo and Sakhalin.

For many years, of course, Japan busied herself building up large reserves of crude and fuel oil for war use. Though the total amount stored is a military secret, it is known to be large. Especially large is the supply of crude and fuel oil for the navy. Gasoline is not as plentiful.

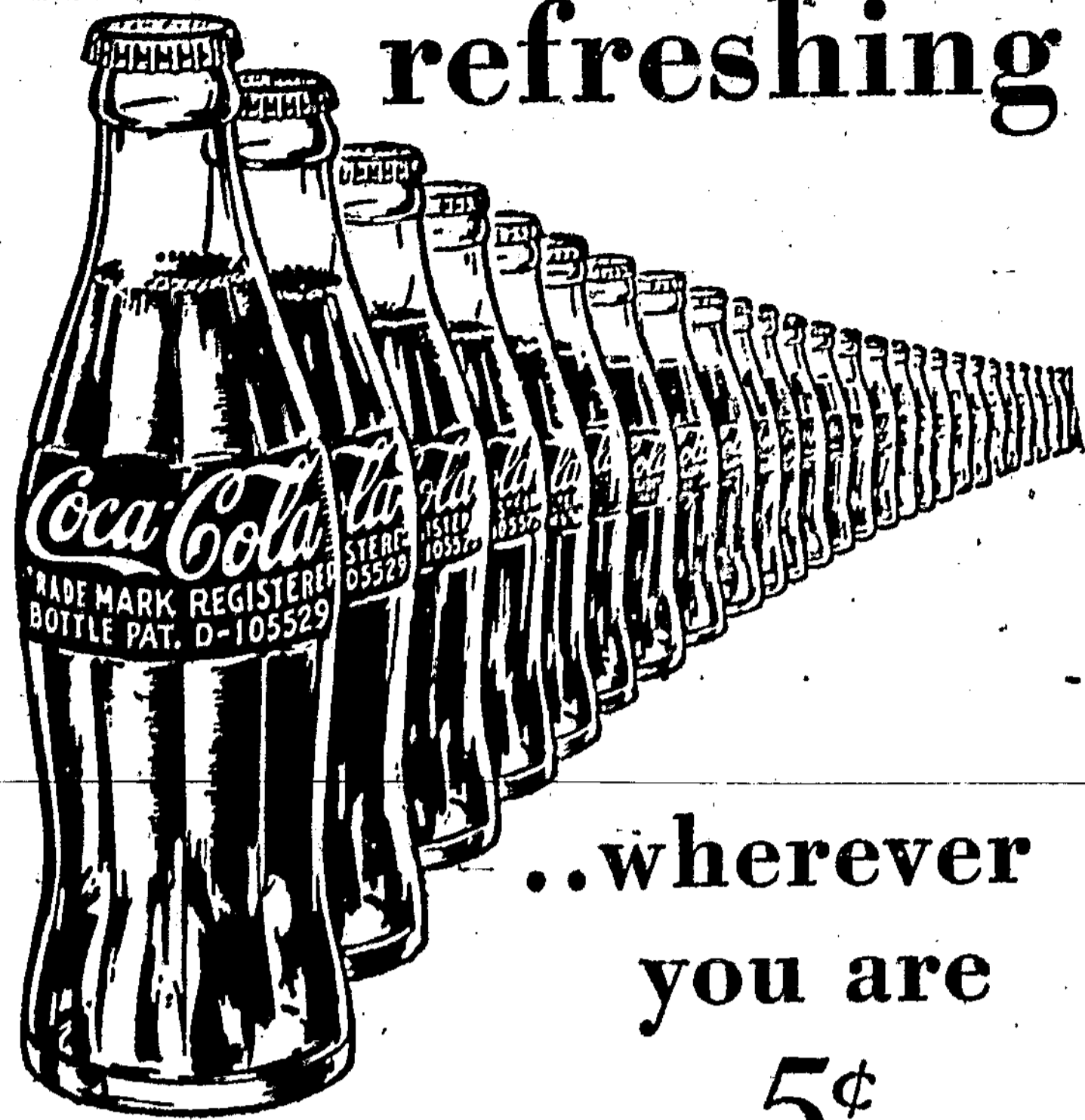
U. S. Acts to Save

Rubber, Tin Supply

A report from the Office for Emergency Management indicates that the United States has taken the necessary steps to build up a reserve supply of tin, rubber, manganese, chromite and tungsten to combat the possible shortages threatened by the cessation of supplies from the Orient. The first of these steps was the suspension of production of automobile tires and other accessories not considered essential.

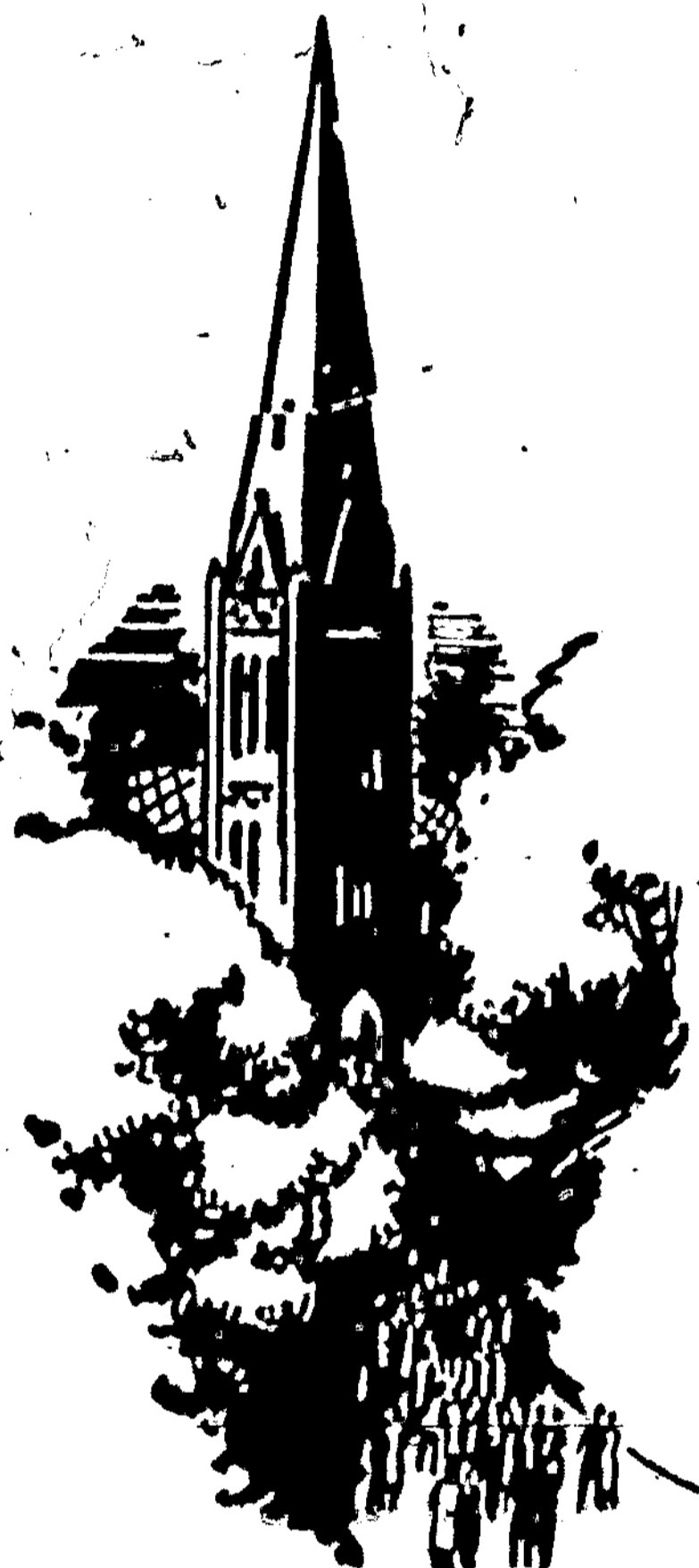
