### The New War Time

Everything here went on the national war time schedule last Monday Feb. 9th at 2:00 a. m. On that date all clocks in the county were advanced an hour under provisions of the National War Time Act which President Roosevelt signed into a law recently. This new fast time schedule is designed to conserve electric power, and to increase the efficiency of the war effort and will remain in effect for the duration of the war and for not more than six months thereafter, provided congress doesn't repeal it at an earlier date. The law provides that clocks governing interstate transportation and all federal activities must be moved one hour ahead.

### Loss of Leg Is Ruled As Total Disability

Santa Fe, Feb. 9.—Loss of a leg entitles a workman to total disability compensation, the Supreme Court found Monday in affirming a Lincoln County District Court judgment in favor of the estate of the late A. J. Matthews against the New Mexico Light and Power Co. and the Pioneer Mutual Compensation Co. Matthews had sought maximum compensation of \$18 a week for 551 weeks.—Albuquerque Journal.

### FOOD FOR VICTORY PRODUCTION PROGRAM

Part-time farmers, farm laborers and every rural family with in food raising and land resources can enlist in the Food for Victory production program.

Financial assistance is immediately available to all eligible families through this agency, according to John Paul Jones, rural rehabilitation supervisor for the Farm Security Administration, who urges those wishing complete details to contact him at his office in the Paden building at Carrizozo.

Every acre and every man is needed to produce the food America must have to win the war. Rural families with land and farming experience, regardless of whether they are regular farm owners or operators, can start all-out food production now by using the services and loan assistance of the Farm Security Administration.

Even the family which can't increase production of foods for market can raise a garden and foods for home use and that means there will be more food for defense workers, armed forces and export to the other United Nations.

### Religious Census

During the week of February 15-21 the ministers of Carrizozo plan to take a religious survey of the community. Working together they plan to call at every home. The purpose of the census is to get a thorough understanding of the spiritual need of the community, and to find the children and others who are not attending Sunday School or Church. They will appreciate your support in this work. Under the strain of war you need all the strength you can find and nothing will give you the quiet assurance and inner strength for facing life as Christian fellowship. Plan to go to the church of your choice at least once every Sunday.

### Americanization Week

The week of February 22nd, to 28th, inclusive has been designated by the President as Americanization Week. The Churches, all civic organizations, and Fraternal societies will be allotted an evening each to properly celebrate this event. The Schools will have appropriate ceremonies during the School sessions. The program of these events will be circulated about the town and county as well as printed in next week's Outlook and News.

### Residents of Bombing Range Must Move Feb. 15

Residents of the Alamogordo Bombing Range and Gunnery covering 55 townships northwest of here, have been notified to leave the area by Feb. 15.

Chas. L. John, project manager here, was ordered by the War Department to issue the notice to all residents of the area.

Last week condemnation proceedings were filed by the Government land acquisition agents against all private holdings in the area. The government's title to the land begins with the filing of the suit, and owners of land under the condemnation have no recourse under the federal proceedings.

Residents of the area have anticipated the order and have disposed of most of their livestock, or have made arrangements for their removal.

Appraisals of all property in the area have been completed, according to the project office, but no financial settlement with the owners has yet been made.

In the condemnation proceedings, it is significant that the area is called the "Alamogordo Bombing Range and Gunnery." Heretofore local authorities, including personnel of the project manager's office have been uninformed as to the official title to be attached to the area.

In the condemnation, the government seeks the use of the land for five years which, also is regarded as significant, since it was deemed locally that the range would be established for continuous and permanent use by the army air corps.

As to the state land included in the area, reports are that negotiations are under way to exchange government land outside the area for the state land within the area.—Alamogordo News,

# Household Heart

Hearts are king for a day and with these magic little symbols you can do up some magic tricks that will make small entertaining a triumph. You can have a party if you like in the Valentine theme, or you can work in the decorations of hearts, Cupids, red-and-white or pink-and-white color schemes in just serving refreshments.

The idea is to be festive and just gay enough to put you and your family in a good mood. So plan to be on speaking terms with Valentine's day with the star selections I'm including in today's recipes.

If you're really planning a party, any number of ideas offer themselves as a gracious part of the entertainment. For instance, if you're far enough north to have ice, an ice carnival is fun. A masquerade in which the guests come dressed as some of Cupid's famous victims goes over well. A card party featuring games such as "Hearts" or "Old Maid" might answer your needs, or perhaps a dance with heart and cupid decorations in crepe paper.

### Valentine Day Supper Party

- \*Chicken Loaf With Mushroom Sauce or Assorted Cold Meat and Cheese Bread or Rolls Relishes
  - \*Valentine's Day Salad
  - \*Meringues With Strawberry Ice Cream or Ice Cream Molds Coffee
- Children's Valentine Party
- \*Heart-Shaped Sandwiches Hot Chocolate Ice Cream or Sherbet
  - \*St. Valentine's Day Cake

- 1 1/2 cups cottage cheese
- 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
- Salt and pepper
- Dash of cayenne pepper
- Lettuce and other greens

Place a border of thin strips of pimiento around the bottom of heart-shaped molds. Place small hearts cut from pimiento in center. Dissolve gelatin in cold water and finish dissolving over hot water. Add cottage cheese, mix well, then celery and seasonings. Fill molds, chill, and when firm un-mold on lettuce.

Extra special describes some dishes perfectly, and such is my verdict for this chicken loaf:

- \*Chicken Loaf With Mushroom Sauce. (Serves 10 to 12)
- 1 4-pound chicken, stewed, meat diced
- 1 1/2 cups chicken broth
- 1 cup milk
- 3 eggs
- Salt and pepper
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- Pimiento
- 1 cup rice

Cook rice in boiling salted water until done. Do not rinse. Beat egg yolks slightly, add to rice. Then add chicken, bread crumbs, chicken broth, milk, stiffly beaten egg whites and seasonings. Butter a loaf pan and dredge with extra bread crumbs. Lay strips of pimiento all along bottom of pan diagonally. Add chicken mixture. Bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven 1 1/2 hours in a pan of hot water. Allow to stand 1/2 hour in pan after taking from oven before attempting to un-mold.

For mushroom sauce, canned mushroom soup may be used. Flavor with the juice of a half lemon and a dash of nutmeg. If you desire to make a mushroom sauce, make 2 cups of medium white sauce, add 1 cup sauteed, chopped, canned or fresh cooked mushrooms. Season this with lemon juice and nutmeg. Meringues, crisp and chewy, are unexcelled for desserts when main courses are on the heavy side. They lend themselves to all types of decorations and in this instance, you can serve them filled with strawberry ice cream or one of the red jels.

- \*Meringues. (Makes 10 shells)
- 6 egg whites
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Add salt and vinegar to egg whites, then beat until foamy. Add vanilla, then add sugar, two tablespoonfuls at a time, beating steadily all the while until whites are very stiff. Spoon onto ungreased sheet and hollow out centers. Bake in a slow oven (250-degree) on an ungreased cookie sheet for 1 hour. Cool.

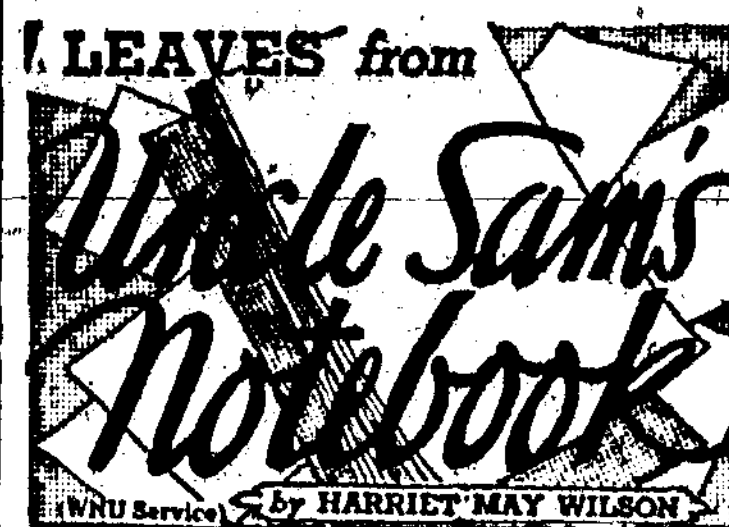

**Honey and Some of Its Uses**

In these days of rising prices of foods, and especially now when mothers are becoming increasingly conscious of the importance of balanced rations, one of the first questions to be answered in regard to any article of food is, "What is its actual food value?" "Like all sweets," says a recent government bulletin, "honey is an energy-producing food. Its chemical composition varies considerably, but on an average about three-fourths of honey is sugar. Measure for measure, however, honey yields more energy than sugar, for it is heavier. For example, 1 1/2 tablespoons of honey weighs a trifle over an ounce and will furnish the body 100 calories. The same amount of energy would be supplied by two tablespoons of sugar, by 1 1/4 ounces or 1 1/2 tablespoons of molasses."

It is interesting to reflect that, until a comparatively short time ago, honey was the chief sweet food available in the temperate zone. It still holds an important place, partly because of its distinctive flavor and—perhaps chiefly—because of the romantic associations woven around it in history and literature.

**GRADES OF HONEY**

Commercially, the grades of honey have nothing whatever to do with its color, being based upon freedom from foreign matter (in extracted honey) and upon the finish and whiteness of cappings in combination honey. Nevertheless, consumers continue to buy honey on the basis of color, since the light honeys are usually mild in flavor and the darker ones of stronger flavor.

**COOKING WITH HONEY**

Housewives whose memories go back to 1917 will recall that during the rationing period of the last war, honey was frequently substituted for cane sugar in the preparation of foods. Experience is required however in the use of honey in place of sugar, if best results are to be secured. Since honey differs from sugar—containing three sugars instead of just one as cane sugar does—the product of a given recipe is different when honey is used instead of sugar. The fact that honey is one-fifth water would seem to indicate that the user would include one-fifth less other liquid in any recipe where honey is used in place of sugar. Experience, however, indicates that such is not the case and that the usual amount of liquid must be reduced more than the difference between the water content of the honey and the dry sugar. In the bulletin to which reference is made at the end of this article, a table will be found giving the proper adjustments in liquid contents.

Although some experience and careful measurements are required for success in using honey for sweetening in cakes and quick-breads, it may be used readily and with delightful results in the preparation of cinnamon toast, candied vegetables, salad dressings, baked ham, baked apples, custards, puddings, and pies. It affords a pleasing change in flavor when it is used in such foods.

**SOME USES FOR UNCOOKED HONEY**

In addition to its well-known affinity for hot biscuits, hot cakes and waffles, it may be warmed a little, to make it pour easily, and used to sweeten beverages and cereals. It is also very acceptable in making a variety of sandwich fillings, as, for example:

- Beaten with butter and mixed with chopped nuts or grated orange peel;
- Mixed with chopped dried fruits, with or without nuts;
- Mixed with thick cream, or with cottage cheese;
- Mixed with peanut or almond butter.

It is fine, too, in hard sauce, if one-half the sugar is omitted and the equivalent in honey used. It may be served as a sauce for ice cream, using the following recipe: 1 cup of honey, 1 1/2 cups of finely chopped or grated fresh orange peel; 1/2 cup or orange juice and 1/2 tsp. of salt. Combine, and let the mixture stand over hot water, without cooking, for about 20 minutes, to blend the flavors.

**FOR MERINGUES**

If it is desired to use the honey flavor for a gingerbread topping, make a meringue by stirring 1/4 to 1/2 cup of honey (depending upon strength of flavor desired) with 1/2 tsp. of salt in a bowl with one egg white, and beat until stiff; add 2 tbsps. of melted butter to 1 cup of the meringue.

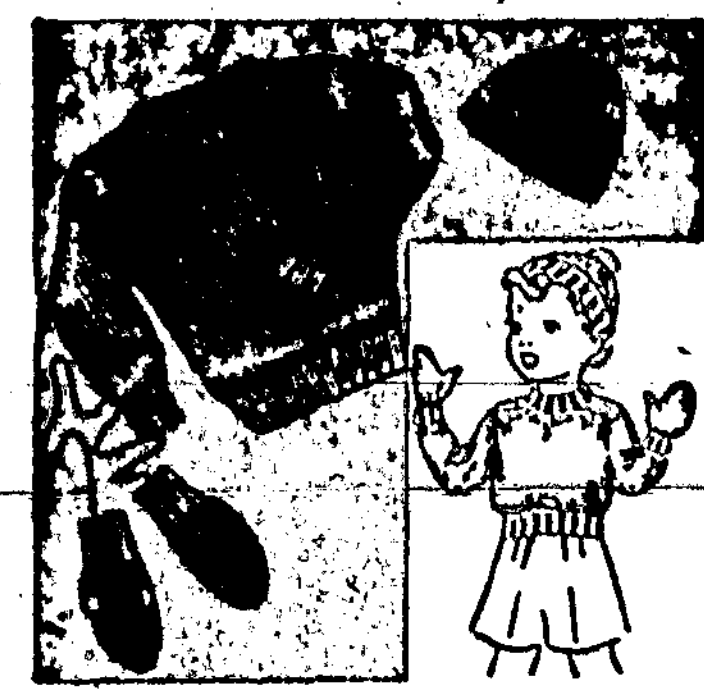

Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas

To all Banks in the Eleventh Federal Reserve District:

Recurring rumors that the Federal Government intends to confiscate all savings are being circulated in many parts of the country. The continued circulation of such rumors might lead to the withdrawal of saving deposits. In connection with these rumors, Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau recently made the following statement:

"I wish to state most emphatically that there are no foundations whatever for such rumors. The Federal Government does not have under consideration any proposal involving the confiscation of the savings deposits of this country for any purpose. Furthermore, anyone circulating rumors of this character is acting against the welfare of the nation."

The importance of financing the war effort to the greatest possible extent from current income rather than from accumulated savings has been repeatedly emphasized by the Treasury Department. In furtherance of that policy, efforts are being made to encourage all employers to adopt a payroll allotment plan for the sale of Defense Bonds to their employees, because that is regarded as one of the essential steps in combating the development of inflammatory tendencies.

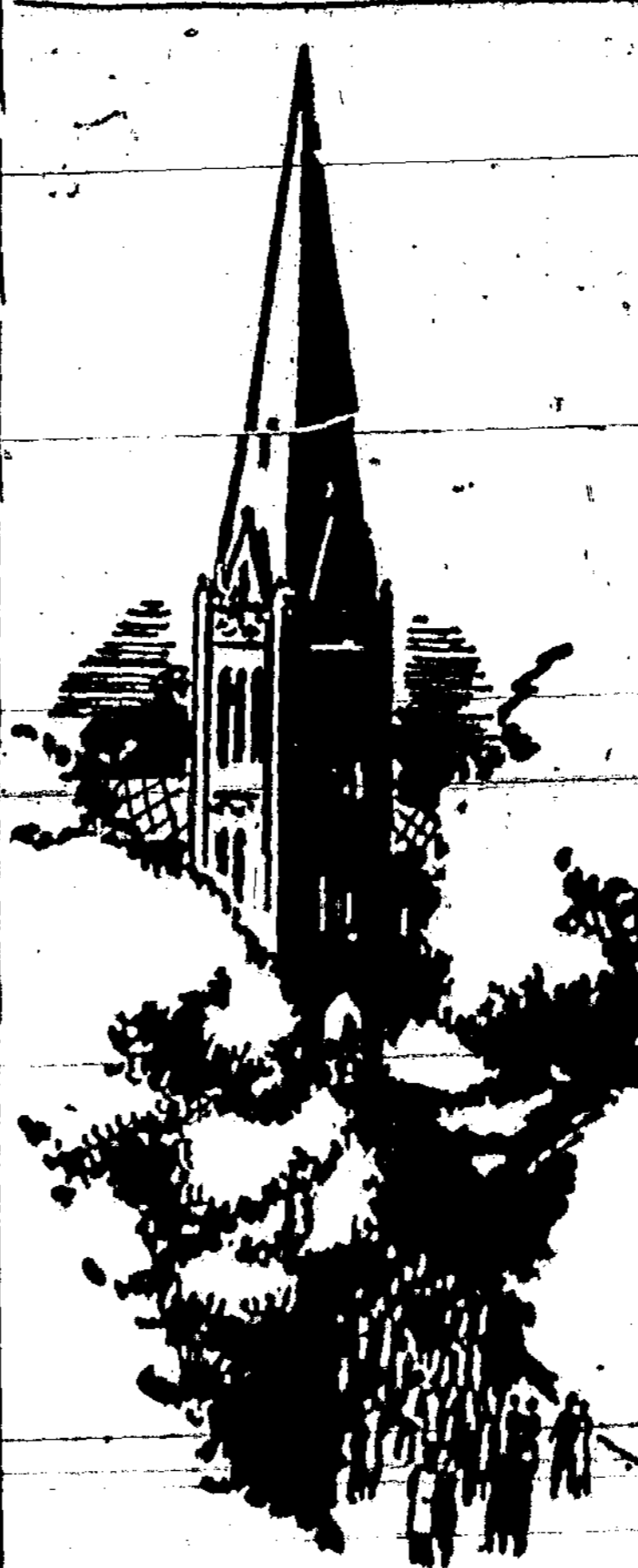

### New Engines, Cars for S. P. Now Arriving

Southern Pacific will begin taking delivery this month on approximately \$23,000,000 worth of new locomotives and freight cars, it was announced today by A. T. Marcier, president.

The equipment, for which orders were placed last year, includes 40 heavy duty steam freight locomotives, 10 streamlined steam passenger locomotives of the "Daylight" type, 23 Diesel electric switchers and 4,885 freight cars, 385 of which are being built in the railroad's own shops.

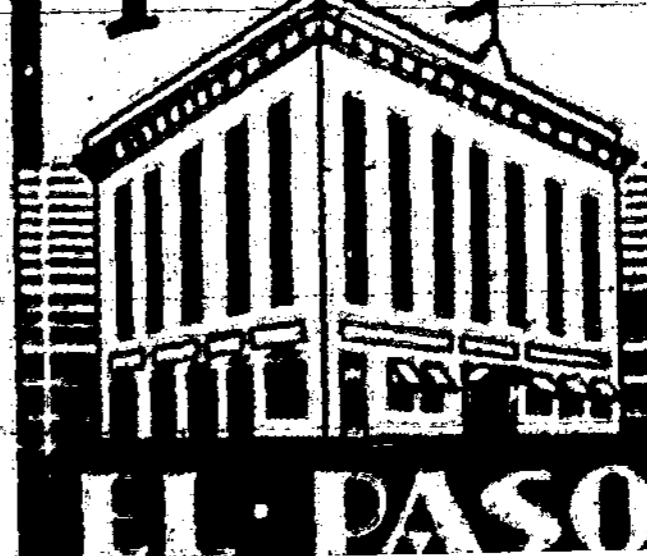

navy and his American pilot, guarding the Burma road and dropping the Japanese as fast as they come. Their score is more than 60 Japanese planes downed, including 24 bombers, with a possible score of around 100, taking into account the enemy planes hit but not downed on the spot. They're doing all this with antiquated planes, and so far they've lost only 10 of them.

Six years ago, Colonel Chen-nault headed the army team of precision acrobats which spread heart-failure among the crowds attending the Seventh Annual Army Air races at Miami. He and his mates, Lieut. J. H. Williams and Lieut. William McDonald, put on probably the dullest air show ever seen and at the same time a demonstration of the amazing maneuverability of airplanes under highly expert control.

The colonel, a lean, dark, quiet, wiry man, was 45 years old when the above air show came off. He retired from the army and holed up in a neat little house at Waterproof, La. He had his books and his dog and he was going to enjoy life with his friends. However, he kept up his studies of air tactics and strategy, having written two authoritative text books on these subjects.

In 1937, he was approached by a representative of the Chinese government who proposed that he become air adviser to the Chinese government. This led to his four years' service in China in which he organized and commanded the present A.V.G., or American Volunteer group, which is now outfitting the Japanese along the Burma road.

When he was here in January, 1940, he said that the Chinese planes were liquid-cooled and at a great disadvantage against any up-to-date machine. A quiet, reserved officer, with no dash of the aviator in his make-up, he says that he and his boys can hold the road if they can just get a few more fairly fashionable planes.

THE United States marine corps did not need the saga of Guam and Wake island as a reminder that it is an old established arm. The corps is two years older than the U. S. Marine Corps present United States government, and on November 10 of this year will celebrate its 167th anniversary.

Its anchor, globe and eagle emblem and its "Semper Paratus" have been pretty nearly everywhere, and, historically speaking, it will be old stuff to the marines, wherever they land.

Just now it has its highest ranking commandant in history, with the President's elevation of Commandant Thomas Holcomb from the rank of major general to lieutenant general. General Holcomb, 43 years with the corps, is a quiet-spoken, heavy-set, business-like officer who, like his "Leathernecks," has been around a lot and has a way of making himself at home under inhospitable conditions.

His World war honors, won in France, include a citation by General Pershing, the Navy Cross, the Silver Star, the Purple Heart and the Legion of Honor ribbon.

He entered the marine corps as a civilian. His rough-and-ready military education later was supplemented by a course in the command and general staff school in 1925. He saw service in China and the Philippines, back in the days of "manifest destiny," and in the World war he commanded the Second battalion of the Sixth Marines in the St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives. He was assigned to Cuba in the post-war years and, by 1935, had attained the rank of brigadier general. In 1936 he was made a major general and commandant of the marine corps.

The Continental congress set up the marines, the oldest branch of the American armed forces. Away back in 1792 they took Derna, in Libya, recently taken by the British. They were fighting pirates in the Dutch East Indies in 1835; in Tripoli in 1840 and Formosa in 1867. Their range has been north and south from the Arctic to the far South Seas, and east and west around the globe. Without disparagement to other forces they have come to symbolize tough fighting.

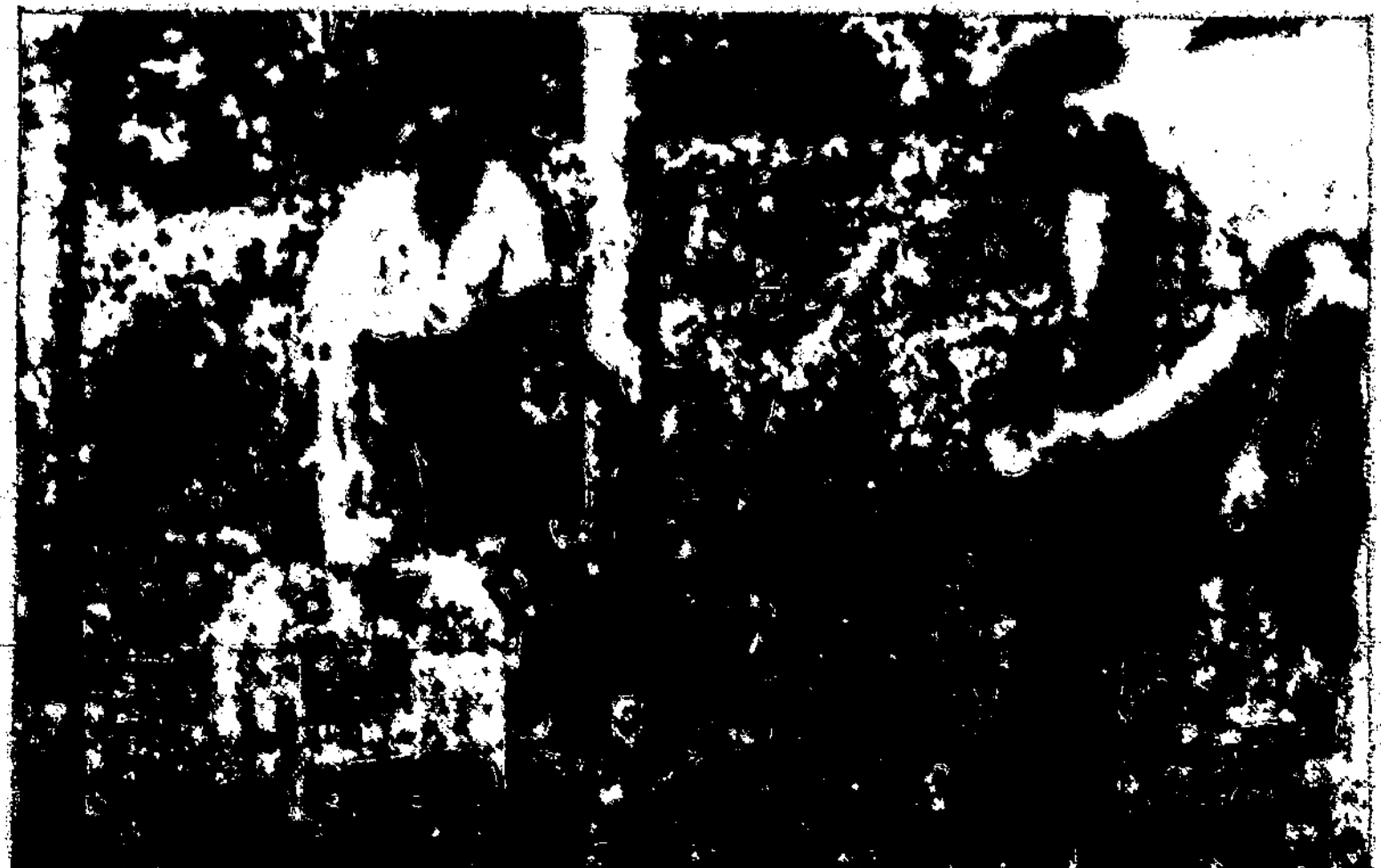

FIRST-AID to the AILING HOUSE

Repair of Concrete WHEN a concrete sidewalk along the side of a house does not make a tight joint with the walls, water leaking in is likely to soak through weak places in the foundation walls and make the cellar damp. The joint can be closed with cement mortar, but roofing cement is better because it is not so brittle. It can be easily put in by pouring from a container with a spout, after liquefying by melting or by mixing with turpentine. Cracks in concrete steps and walks can be closed with a mixture of 1 part portland cement and 3 parts of building sand, with only enough water to make a stiff paste. A crack should be widened so that the patch can be forced into it, and at the time of patching, the old concrete should be soaked with water. In widening the crack, the sides should be left rough, so that the patch in hardening will anchor itself into place. For greatest strength and density, the patch should be kept wet for two or three days.

Waterglass Cement Question: Last fall we laid a felt-back rug in our dining-room. In a few months it buckled. This we expected, and trimmed off the edges. Two months later, as it had not stretched any more, we stuck one edge down with waterglass. During the past hot weather it buckled again and we would like to trim off the stuck edge. I tried to soften the waterglass with hot water, but it does not loosen. How can I take it up? Answer: The only solvent for waterglass is muriatic or similar acid, which would be too corrosive for safe use in a house. Unfortunately, there is no practical way to do the job. Your best move is to cut through the rug at the edge of the cementing and to tear off the strip that was cemented down.

Bleaching Mahogany Question: I want to modernize a solid mahogany dining-table. After sanding and scraping, will the mahogany be light in color? If I bleach it, will it stay light, or must bleaching be repeated? Answer: The natural color of mahogany can be light, but is never white. After removing all the present finish to the bare wood, color that remains in it may be natural, or may be effect of staining. All color can be taken out with a wood bleach, which can be had at large paint stores. Bleaching in this way is permanent, and need not be repeated.

Painting Flowerpots Question: How should I go about the painting of flowerpots? I want to take it up as a hobby. Answer: The first thing to do is to give the inside of the pots a lining of something that is waterproof, for water cooking through will take off paint on the outside. One or two coats of aluminum paint should do the trick. If you cannot get it, use two coats of quick drying spar varnish. For the outside decorations, you can use almost any kind of paint or enamel, but cement paint would have the best chance of being permanent. This comes in colors as well as in white.

Garbage Disposal Question: Have you any suggestions on a garbage pit for use in the country? Could the garbage be disposed of with some chemical? Answer: The only sanitary and positive method of disposing of garbage is by burning. To be effective, an incinerator should be so made that wet garbage will be dried out by a continuous current of air. The necessary metal parts can be had for enclosure in brick or stone. The names of manufacturers can be had on request of the Architects Samples Exhibit, 101 Park avenue, New York city.

Developer Stain Question: How can stains of photographic developer be removed from the outside of my refrigerator, which is not finished in porcelain? Answer: Anything that will take out those stains will probably injure the finish. The stains may be only on the surface, in which case they can be taken off with sandpaper or fine steel wool. If they have gone in deeper, you may have to scrape the finish, which of course, must be followed by refinishing.

Cracked Enamel Question: I finished oak woodwork in my kitchen with a first coat of flat paint and then with enamel. Later, the enamel cracked, so I put on another coat. This also cracked. What can I do about it? Answer: Your best move will be to take off all the paint to the bare wood, and to do the job over after possible cracks in the woodwork have been filled with putty. The

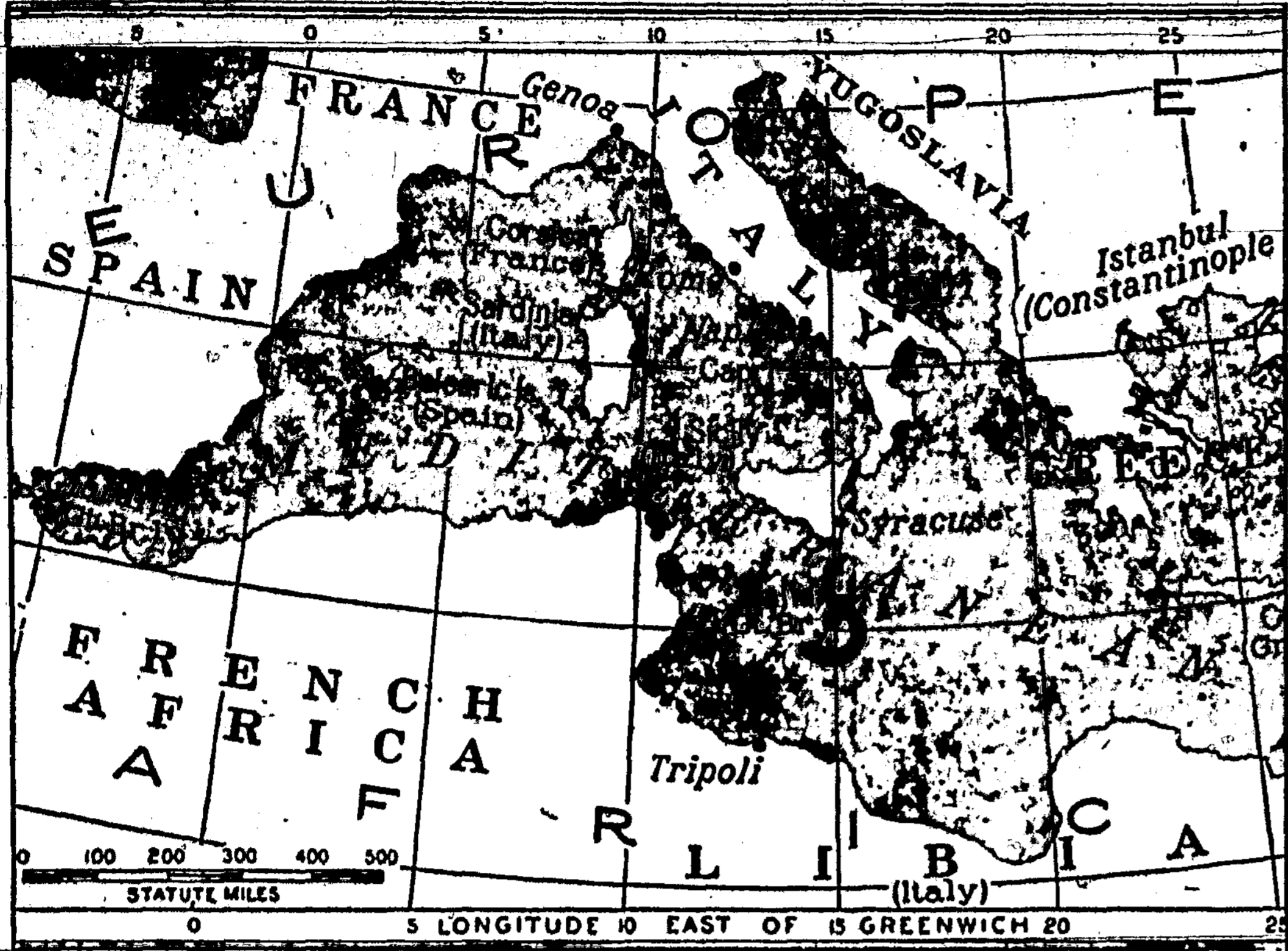

# Malta, at Mediterranean 'Crossroad,' Still Remains Target for Nazi Bombs



Even though the United States army and navy fighting forces have been battling far to the other side of the world, and thereby shadowing the importance which Malta (see arrow above) has in its pivotal point in the Mediterranean, this regularly bombed spot is, like Singapore and Gibraltar (other very important British "life line links"), constantly on "alert" orders. This map also shows how almost all important sea-borne north and south and east and west sea traffic is within striking distance from this island. On the left edge of the map is shown Gibraltar. South of Malta, in North Africa Libya, is the territory where the Nazi and British have been thrusting and counter-thrusting.

## Forming One of the World's Smallest Island Groups, About 150 Miles Southwest of Italy's 'Toe' And Attacked Over 200 Times.

Despite the continual pounding by the Nazi air force during the past six months, Malta still remains to fight back as one of Britain's important naval bases.

This "hot spot" of the Mediterranean ocean, lying athwart the cross-crossing sea lanes between Gibraltar and Suez, Europe and Africa, has been called the most bombed spot on earth.

News of United States' army and navy forces fighting on the other side of the world from Malta have dwarfed in significance the daily reports of bombing raids at this Mediterranean base. Military authorities, though, seem to think that Hitler will marshal all his military might for a "knock-out" blow here.

The Malta islands form one of the world's smallest island groups. Made up of three islands, an islet, and a rock, it covers a total area of only about 122 square miles. The "little" island of Malta itself, whose "Grand Harbor" of Valletta is big enough to accommodate the entire British fleet, is less than 100 square miles in extent.

### Geography Makes History.

Yet these Mediterranean stepping stones have figured in history and legend since before the Apostle Paul was shipwrecked on their shores. The Maltese say that Ulysses came this way. Ancient sea-going Phoenicians founded on Malta's deeply indented coasts—useful-ports—from which to base their trade and exploration activities in the western Mediterranean. The Carthaginians moved in six centuries before Christ, followed by the conquering Romans, Greeks, Saracens, Normans, and Spaniards all had a hand in the rule of the strategic Mediterranean islands and left a share in its mixed heritage of blood and culture.

It was under the Maltese Cross of the reigning Knights of St. John, however, that Malta saw its most colorful and romantic period. For nearly 200 years this Crusading Order upheld its rich and feudal aristocracy of castle, church, and fortress. In the famous battle against the Turks in 1565, the beleaguered Knights, with 10,000 followers, turned back some 50,000 would-be invaders.

### On Napoleon's Path.

Napoleon was one of the conquerors of Malta. On his way to Egypt in 1793, he took the islands from the declining Knights as an easy prize. Soon afterward, following an uprising against the French which was assisted by the British fleet, they were annexed by Great Britain, and finally were awarded that country in 1814 by the congress of Vienna.

During World War I, Malta again became an important place name in international annals. It was not only a leading base of Allied military operations but also a hospital and recuperation center.

The entry of Italy into the present war saw the island among the first enemy objectives. In six months the Maltese capital of Valletta suffered more than 200 air raids. It is only 55 miles south of Sicily, according to the National Geographic society.

### Gibraltarlike Defenses.

While the intricacies of the modern fortifications of Malta are closely guarded secrets, its general defensive strength long has been rec-

ognized. The old castles and fortresses were reported reinforced; and secret anchorages and submarine bases set up in outlying inlets. Like Gibraltar, Malta has innumerable coast and anti-aircraft batteries, bomb-proof shelters and rock-tunnelled galleries where men, munitions, food, and water supplies may be stored. Beneath the island's surface, a network of ancient underground passages and catacombs also is reported now put into service as part of the defense and fortifications system.

Although its status as a vital British base carries the wartime penalty of enemy attack, Malta, in peace, enjoys the economic advantages of heavy payrolls there for workers and members of the armed forces.

The islands (which must support a population of nearly 270,000 people) are themselves far from self-sufficient—even in normal times. Intensive cultivation of the thin but fertile soil provides crops of grain, vegetables, and fruits, but the supply is inadequate to meet domestic

needs. In one recent prewar year, Malta imported nearly \$20,000,000 worth of goods, compared with exports which amounted to less than a million and a quarter dollars.

"As a result of the war, a number of women and children were evacuated from Malta. Many of its young men are serving with the British forces."

## THE ARMY TRIES SUBSTITUTION

In its campaign to conserve materials classified as "critical" and "strategic," the army quartermaster corps has introduced substitutes for 800 articles in the past six months.

Critical materials are defined as those available in this country but in insufficient quantities to meet our emergency needs, while strategic materials are those which must be imported.

In many instances where galvanizing has been the standard finish, zinc is being conserved by using paint, porcelain enamel, synthetic enamel, and black japan as the finish. As a base material in a few quartermaster procurements, zinc is being replaced by galvanized iron or steel.

As a substitute for nickel plating, paint or synthetic enamel is being widely used and bronze or porcelain finishes are being used in place of metal metal, which contains much nickel.

## Enough Vitamins For All in U. S.

Just Eat the Right Food And You Have Them.

MINNEAPOLIS. — The United States, unlike Europe and Japan, is richly supplied with all the vitamins necessary for health, vigor and morale; Americans need only eat the right foods in order to get them.

Japan, after an 18-year campaign for self-sufficiency in food production, is still a desperately undernourished nation. German research has been driven to the limit to improve "ersatz" foods and to find new sources of necessary vitamins. Britain is importing vitamin concentrates and vitamin-rich foods from the United States. Reports filtering out of the occupied countries indicate that deficiency diseases there are already widespread.

But in the United States, vitamin-bearing foods are abundant and many are still cheap, a study by the Northwestern National Life Insurance company says. Americans can practically eliminate danger of vitamin deficiencies merely by eating enough of the simpler foods, and by getting enough sunshine.

Milk, and whole-wheat or other whole-grain breads and cereals, contain between them practically the entire list of needed vitamins and minerals, and in ample quantities except in the cases of vitamins A, C, G, and D. Inexpensive green and yellow vegetables furnish the extra A, C, and G. Sunshine will furnish the D, except in the case of growing children, who need a little extra in the form of fish liver oils or other D concentrates.

**Prevent Eye Trouble Epidemics.** The expansion of our already vast dairy production is being pushed so as to take care of our armed forces, build reserve stocks for army and navy bases, and meet lease-lend requirements, without too great a reduction in the domestic supply. We have an enormous reserve of wheat in storage. Now available to the many who prefer white flour is the new "enriched" kind, which approximates many of the values of whole wheat or graham flour.

There has been some worry over the growing scarcity of vitamin A concentrates. Chief source is cod liver oil, and trade with Norway, our major source of supply, was cut off early in the present war. Butter is another important source of vitamin A; Denmark exported practically all her dairy products during the last World War and suffered epidemics of eye troubles and blindness as a result. Germany's "buns-before-butter" policy resulted in similar epidemics there during the years of preparation for the present conflict.

However, two carrots will deliver a whole day's supply of vitamin A for one person. So will half a cup of cooked kale, turnip tops, spinach or other greens. A small serving of liver (beef, pork, lamb, or poultry liver) deposits enough A to last two or three days. Apricots and peaches, canned or fresh, are rich sources. So are cantaloupes.

### Potato and Citrus Crops.

The German potato crop is the backbone of that nation's food supply; the Nazis have also caused the planting of great stretches of wild rose bushes along their railroad rights-of-way, not for spiritual beauty, but because the wild rose hips—the seed part of the plant—have been found to be a rich source of C concentrate.

In this country we have enormous citrus crops and vast production of other fruits and vegetables. The daily grapefruit, orange or tomato juice is the most enjoyable source.

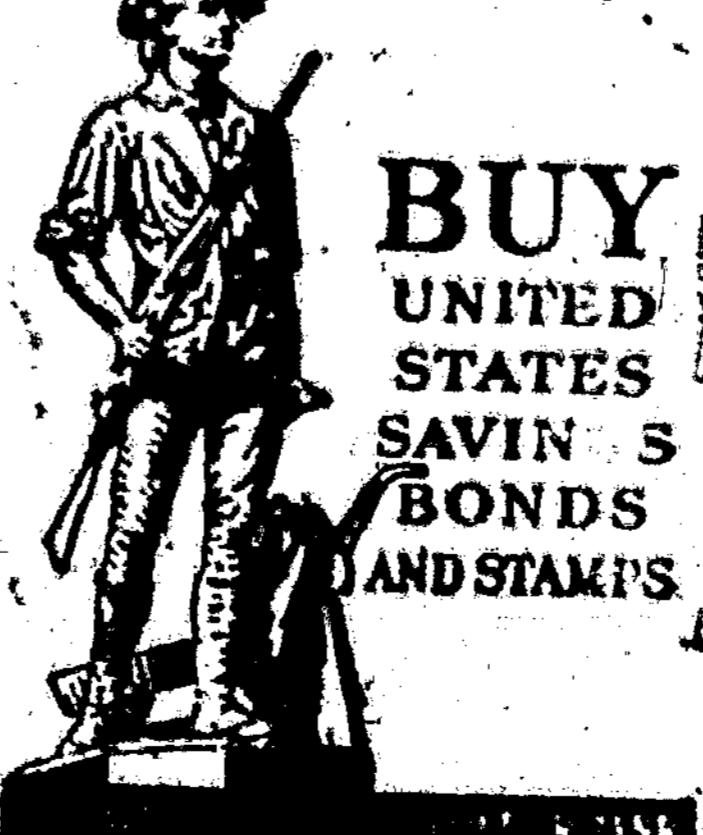
