**Ernest M. Brickley**

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Ruth Brickley Bishop, whose husband is in the United States Navy; one brother, John C. Brickley, of El Paso and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Katherine Brickley, all of whom attended his funeral.

**ORDINANCE NO. 52**

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING THE NECESSITY OF ISSUING JUNIOR SECURITY ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER REVENUE BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO FOR THE PURPOSE OF MAKING EXTENSIONS TO AND IMPROVEMENTS IN THE EXISTING ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER SYSTEM OF SAID VILLAGE COLLECTIBLE ONLY OUT OF THE NET REVENUES DERIVED FROM THE OPERATION OF SAID SYSTEM AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS AND THE INTEREST THEREON.

WHEREAS, heretofore and on the 21st day of April, 1942, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo did adopt Ordinance No. 46, being an Ordinance entitled:

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING THE NECESSITY OF ISSUING BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO, IN A PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT EXCEEDING \$94,000.00, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING BY PURCHASE AN ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER SYSTEM FOR SAID VILLAGE AND ITS INHABITANTS, SUCH BONDS AND THE INTEREST THEREON TO BE PAYABLE SOLELY FROM THE NET INCOME OF SUCH SYSTEM AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND PAYMENT OF SUCH BONDS AND THE INTEREST THEREON.

and

WHEREAS, thereafter on the 15th day of June, 1942, the said Board did adopt Ordinance No. 48, being an Ordinance entitled:

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE DATE OF ISSUE, MATURITY DATE, INTEREST PAYMENT DATES, REDEMPTION DATE AND THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF REDEMPTION OF AN ISSUE OF ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER REVENUE BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO AMENDING SECTION 3 AND SECTION 4 OF ORDINANCE NO. 48 OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO.

and

WHEREAS, the Village of Carrizozo did acquire an electric light and power system for said Village and its inhabitants, and did issue its Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds pursuant to said Ordinance and has in all respects complied with and carried out the terms of said Ordinance, and

WHEREAS, it is now deemed advisable by the Board of Trustees of said Village to extend and improve the said municipal light and power system and to issue Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds of the Village in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$55,000. for the purpose of paying for said extensions and improvements, which said bonds are to be collectible solely out of the net revenues of the said system as thus extended and improved, after all payments have been made from said revenues as required by said Ordinance No. 48 and Ordinance No. 48 of the Village of Carrizozo for the benefit of the Village of Carrizozo Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds, dated June 15, 1942, as in said Ordinances set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby declared necessary by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, being the governing body of said Village, that the Village of Carrizozo issue its revenue bonds in a principal amount not exceeding \$55,000., for the purpose of making extensions to and improvements in the existing electric light and power system, said bonds to be payable solely out of the net income to be derived from the operation of said electric light and power system but junior to and after all payments have been made from the revenues of said system for and on account of the Village of Carrizozo Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds, dated June 15, 1942, issued pursuant to Ordinance No. 48 and Ordinance No. 48 of said Village as such payments severally become due, and that the Village pledge irrevocably all such net income to the payment of all said revenue bonds issued pursuant to the terms of said Ordinances Nos. 46 and 48 and this Ordinance.

Section 2. That to provide funds for said purpose an issue of bonds to be known as Village of Carrizozo Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds be and hereby is authorized to be issued in a principal amount not exceeding \$55,000., pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 14, Article 35, Sections 14-3508 to 14-3513, both numbers inclusive, of the Laws of the State of New Mexico, 1941 Compilation, as Amended, and all acts thereunto enabling.

Section 3. That said bonds shall be dated October 1, 1944 and shall be numbered 1 to 55, both numbers inclusive, shall be in the denomination of \$1,000., each and shall mature and be due and payable on October 1st in each of the years hereinafter mentioned, as follows: \$2,000. in principal amount in each of the years 1947 to 1966, both inclusive; \$5,000. in principal amount in the year 1967; \$10,000. in principal amount in the year 1968; save and except that as

to all bonds maturing and becoming due and payable on and after October 1, 1954, the Village may at its option redeem all or any part of said bonds by paying the principal thereof and accrued interest thereon to date of redemption, upon four (4) weeks prior notice by publication in a newspaper published and of general circulation in Lincoln County, New Mexico, and upon like notice by publication in a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Omaha, State of Nebraska. Said notice shall state the election of the Village to redeem bonds prior to maturity, the number of the bonds so to be redeemed and the date when redemption will occur. A copy of said notice shall also be mailed to the Nebraska City National Bank, Nebraska City, Nebraska, and to the Harris Trust & Savings Bank, Chicago, Illinois. If less than the full amount of bonds of this issue then outstanding be called for redemption prior to maturity, then the bonds of this issue shall be called and redeemed in inverse numerical order. Notice of redemption having been published and mailed as herein required, interest on the bonds called for redemption shall cease from and after the redemption date.

Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of 4% per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st days of April and October in each year; shall be payable, both principal and interest, in lawful money of the United States of America at the banking house of the Nebraska City National Bank, Nebraska City, Nebraska, or at the banking house of the Harris Trust & Savings Bank, Chicago, Illinois, or at the office of the Village Treasurer in the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, at holder's option; shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the Clerk of said Village with the seal of said Village of Carrizozo affixed thereto; and the interest coupons thereto attached, evidencing the interest to become due thereon shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the Village Treasurer.

The revenue bonds authorized hereby shall be payable solely out of the special fund created by Ordinance No. 48 of the Village of Carrizozo, adopted on the 21st day of April, 1942, identified as the "Electric Light and Revenue Bond Fund" and then only after all payments to or on behalf of the holders of Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds of the Village of Carrizozo, dated June 15, 1942, required to be made by the terms of Ordinances Nos. 46 and 48 of said Village have been paid and discharged as the same severally become due. Each of said bonds shall recite on the face thereof that it is payable and collectible solely from the revenues derived from the operation of the electric light and power system of said Village, the income of which is pledged, and that the holders of said bond or bonds may not

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That it is hereby proposed to amend Section 10 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico, so as to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 10: Each member of the Legislature shall receive as compensation for his services the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each day's attendance during each session, and ten cents (10c) for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of Government by the usual traveled route, once each term of the session as defined by Section 5, Article IV of this constitution, and he shall receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this resolution proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the general election to be held in November, 1944, or at any special election called previous to the general election.

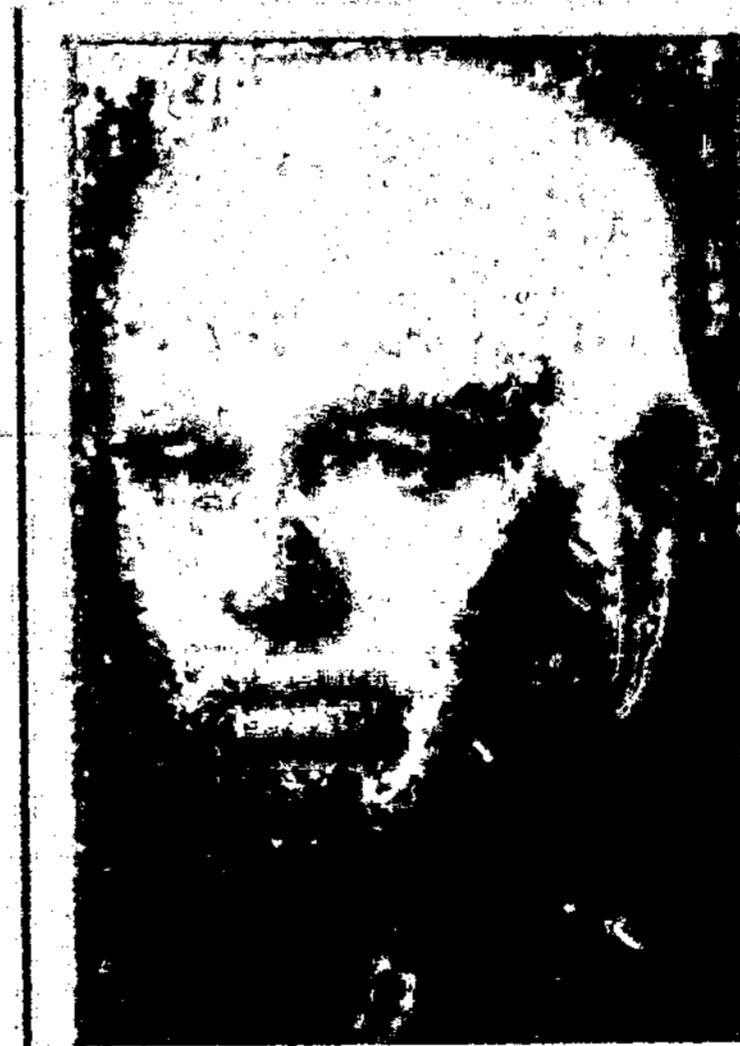
