Local Soldier Awarded Combat Decoration For Fighting In Italy

With the Fifth Army, Italy—Private First Class Picquinto S. Marquez, son of Mrs. Eufrazio S. Gallegos of Carrizozo, N. M., has been cited by the 331st Infantry Regiment of the 1st "Powder River" Division and awarded the Combat Infantrymen's Badge for actual participation in combat against the enemy with the Fifth Army in Italy.

Standards for the badge are high. The decoration is awarded to the infantry soldier who has proved his fighting ability in combat.

The handsome badge consists of a silver rifle set against a background of infantry blue, enclosed in a silver wreath.

New Postal Notes Save Time and Money

The new postal notes replace the long used and complicated money orders in amounts up to and including \$10, and are less expensive to purchase. There is a flat charge of 5 cents on all postal notes, whereas the old money orders cost from 6 cents for \$2.50 to 11 cents for \$10.

The new streamlined postal notes are less complicated. They are to be obtained at the postal window in denominations from \$1 to \$10. Special stamps will be available where the customer desires to send an amount involving odd pennies; for instance where the purchaser desires to send a postal note for \$5.48 he is given a \$5 postal note and 48 cents in special postal note stamps which are affixed to the note.

The postal clerk issues the note and it is not necessary for the customer to fill out an application as in the old type money order.

There is a stub on the postal note which the purchaser retains.

The notes may be cashed at a postoffice or a bank by signature and are time and money savers.

LOCAL SOLDIER SERVES WITH ALLIED UNITS TO ENTER ROME, DEFEATED ELEMENTS OF THE GERMAN'S CRACK 4TH PARATROOP DIVISION IN THE II GIUGO WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY.

Sgt. Opplio T. Hope, son of Mrs. Mary Annette Hope, is fighting in Italy with the 333rd Infantry Regiment which has been credited with killing and wounding many hundreds of Germans and taking nearly 700 prisoners in four weeks of bitter fighting in the Gothic Line.

They are called the "old timers" of the 333rd have won three Distinguished Service Crosses, 23 Silver Stars and more than 200 Bronze Stars.

They are veterans of bloody Solonino Ridge and the Gustav Line, Formia, and Gaeta Peninsula and Rome. They are now standing at the approaches to the Po Valley, a long haul from Minturno where the regiment entered the Lines on last April 21.

"March on"—Let us march! is the regimental motto. Nobody marched through the Gothic Line, but the 333rd got through.

The 1st Battalion led in the capture of Mount Altuzzo, 3,000 feet of "straight up" rock, key to vital II Giugo Pass, major objective of the 53th Division. This same unit staged an amphibious landing to occupy Sperlonga above Gaeta last May.

Earlier, a company in the 2nd Battalion seized a strategic position in the Gustav Line and held it against a desperate German battalion for three days. This feat was almost duplicated by the same company in attacking Mount Zambola above Pignola and holding the peak all day against Jerry counterattacks, including the main effort of the 53th, which included with tanks which fired directly into the Jerry's foxholes.

New Mexico Cattle Growers Association

Special To the Lincoln County News: Albuquerque, N. Mex., Feb. 20. E. G. Hayward, Cimarron, President of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association, denounced the recommendation of the State Committee of the Department of Agricultural Economics that cattle numbers in New Mexico should be reduced by 26 per cent this year. The recommendation was made by means of a confidential report to all agricultural government bureaus within the state, Hayward said.

"Such a drastic reduction in cattle numbers in New Mexico would bring our total cattle population to less than 1,000,000 head. This move would be a serious blow to the economy of the entire state," Mr. Hayward stated.

"New Mexico has shown practically no increase in cattle numbers in the past ten years. We are now being urged to decrease our cattle population by some 26 per cent. The Midwest, Eastern and Southern States which have shown an increase during the past decade of as much as 50 per cent in beef cattle have been asked for no decrease in cattle numbers by the department," Hayward said. "Such an inconsistent policy on part of the Department would appear to be an organized move to discourage beef production in the West and encourage it in the Eastern and Southern States."

Asked if livestock producers were consulted as to the recommended decrease in cattle numbers in the State, Hayward said. "Although P. W. Cockerill of the State Department of Agricultural Economics has informed us that producers were heard, such proposal has never been approved by the representative cattle growers association of New Mexico. If such a drastic cut in cattle numbers in New Mexico was approved by each cattle producer, they were no doubt led to believe that a like reduction was being urged equally throughout the nation."

Ninety three per cent of the entire land area of the state is adaptable only to grazing purposes," Hayward stated. Sheep numbers are at present far below normal. If the cattle numbers are cut 26 per cent, it will mean complete loss of revenue of valuable grazing lands. Eastern and Southeastern states can grow other crops on their lands. New Mexico and Western States must sell their land for grazing purposes only, or let them go to waste. Our state cannot afford to allow millions of dollars of productive income to be pushed aside because of the whims of certain bureaus of the federal government attempting to regulate and pattern the agricultural industry of the nation."



Vidal, Collector of Internal Revenue, today reminded individual income taxpayers that Congress has changed from December 15, 1944, to January 15, 1945, the final date for filing Declarations of Estimated Income Tax, either original (as in the amended Declaration of Estimated Tax by January 15, 1945, files his annual income tax return for 1944 (on Form 1040) and pays all taxes due by January 15, his return will serve as both a return and declaration and he need not file the 1944 declaration.

If a taxpayer who would otherwise be required to file an original or case of farmers), or amended, and paying of installments of estimated tax for the calendar year 1944.

Among the taxpayers affected by this change in dates are: farmers who exercised their right to defer filing declarations last April 15; others who have already filed 1944 declarations but desire to change their estimates by filing amended declarations; all persons who owe the final installment of 1944 estimated tax.

Also, if a taxpayer files his final 1944 return (on Form 1040) and pays the tax due on it by January 15, he need not pay the final installment which otherwise would be due on his estimated tax.

A bill from the Collector for the final installment of 1944 estimated tax may be ignored by a taxpayer who filed his annual return (on Form 1040) and pays the tax due on it by January 15.

The New Mexico Collector stated that these changes will enable a taxpayer, if he desires to do so, to wind up all of his 1944 income tax obligations by January 15, but it does not affect the filing of his 1945 declaration which will be due March 15. Also, taxpayers who do not file their final 1944 returns by January 15 must do so by March 15.

Bring tax form mailed you and Form W-2, supplied by employers, disclosing the Federal Tax withheld from wages. The above forms are absolutely necessary before return can be completed to disclose tax due or refund to be made. Tax returns must be filed even though taxes have been withheld. Taxpayers must have a detailed listing of all income and expenses. These items must be segregated for the deputy's use in the preparation of the return; otherwise, it may become necessary for the taxpayer to return home for further information. The assistance of the deputy collector will be free to those desiring to take advantage of it.

Hopes of civilians for new washers at an early date were given a rude jolt today by Fred Maytag II, president of The Maytag Company, who declared that recent setbacks on the European fronts had wrecked all prospects of a return to peacetime production for many months to come.

His statement was in answer to a query as to how The Maytag Company's acquisition of a new war contract to produce several million dollars worth of aerial bomb fuses for the Ordnance Department would affect possible output of peacetime products.

"So long as Maytag facilities are needed for war production, washing machines will wait," he said. "When our fighting men ask for more ammunition, we don't want to have to tell them there isn't enough because the folks back home are too busy building washers."

Maytag said that last fall when certain of his company's major contracts were completed and schedules on others were being cut back, it appeared that new washing machines might be available early in 1945. "All this has now changed," he said today. "Our machine shops and assembly departments are being geared not for washers, but for the production of aerial bomb fuses and other new war products. Our aluminum foundry, down to one shift last fall, is back on a 24-hour schedule producing Rolls Royce engine crankshafts and other important aircraft parts."

"It is always thus in war," he said. "Changing conditions on the battlefield bring new demands for more and different kinds of products, and we stand ready as always to change our production with the shifting tides of battle."

Last fall when war production schedules were being cut back The Maytag Company obtained a spot authorization from WPB to produce a limited quantity of component parts for Maytag washers, though not to assemble or sell complete washers. Maytag said today that it was doubtful if these parts would be assembled to washers before Germany's surrender, but that the program had served the useful purpose of keeping workers and equipment busy while his company retuned for new war contracts. "These prior operations," he said, "served on when war production was slack, will have served to shorten the time required for retooling when VE Day arrives and our fighting men start coming home to their old jobs."

Recently a woman customer at a bank left her six family ration books on the counter. The bank notified the OPA office. When the woman phoned the OPA seeking new books, she was informed that her old ones were at the bank.

VETERANS' BUREAU LOANS UNDER G. I. BILL

The necessary machinery for processing applications by veterans of World War II for business loans under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 (G. I. Bill of Rights) has been set up in the El Paso Office of the Dallas Loan Agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, A. J. McKinnon, Examiner in charge of the local office, announced today.

Mr. McKinnon's statement followed an announcement from Washington, D. C., that the Veterans Administration had designated the Reconstruction Finance Corporation as an agency to review applications to banks by veterans for the guaranty of business loans. Under the program, RFC will recommend to the appropriate office of the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs whether that office should approve or disapprove such applications.

Loans applied for may be used in purchasing any business, supplies, equipment, machinery or tools to be used by the veteran in pursuing a gainful occupation. The Government may guarantee repayment of such loans to the extent of 50 percent, but not in an amount exceeding \$2,000 as its maximum guaranty. Thus, the veteran who qualifies for a business loan may obtain a guaranty for 50 percent of any loan up to \$4,000. He may, of course, obtain from his banker a loan of greater amount, for instance, \$8,000; but the guaranty is limited to \$2,000. In loans of less than \$4,000, the Government guarantees half; thus, in a \$3,000 loan the guaranty amounts to \$1,500, not more.

Mr. McKinnon outlined the following essential steps for veterans desiring guaranteed loans:

- 1. The veteran should first contact his local banker. 2. If the veteran is unable to obtain a loan from his local banker, he should then apply to his nearest RFC Loan Agency for a loan. The address of the appropriate agency for this region is 711 El Paso National Bank Building, El Paso, Texas.

"Banks desiring to assist veterans in this program may obtain the necessary regulations and loan application blanks from the local regional office of the Veterans Administration," Mr. McKinnon said.

"Since the Act does not provide for loans to run businesses, the lender will want to know whether the veteran has sufficient funds for this purpose, as well as ability, dependability, business experience, and business character, to assume a reasonable likelihood that the veteran's contemplated operations will be successful. The lender will also want to know whether the veteran has been in such business before entering the service and the nature of his service experience and training.

"Veterans are well advised to be on guard against fraudulent or absurd propositions and careful of exploiters. With the aid of the banker, who is schooled in such matters, veterans should investigate very carefully all propositions presented to them. There are many pitfalls, difficulties and hard work in operating one's own business."

"The requirements of the Law are that the veteran must be found qualified by training or experience to engage in the type of business for which he seeks a loan, the property sought to be acquired is reasonable in price and suited to its intended purpose, and that the venture is likely to succeed.

NO SHOE STAMPS ARE BEING CANCELLED.

In response to the question as to whether or not the OPA intended to cancel and outstanding shoe stamps, Price Administrator Chester Bowles has made the following statement: "Not a chance in a million. We are not going to cancel any shoe stamps." William H. Black, District OPA Rationing Official, followed this announcement by urging people to conserve their shoe stamps for use next spring and summer.

RATIONING TIMETABLE

- Red Stamps—Q5 through X5, Book Four, valid for meats, fats. Blue Stamps—X5 through S1, Book Four, valid for processed foods. People are urged to destroy all invalid coupons. Sugar Stamps—No. 34, Book Four, is valid for five pounds. Another sugar stamp will be validated on February 1. Shoe Stamps—Airplane stamps 1, 2 and 3, Book Three, valid for one pair each of rationed shoes. Next shoe stamp, not to be valid until late summer. Gasoline Stamps—A-14 coupons are good for four gallons each, through March 21.

Importance of Food Production

President Franklin D. Roosevelt today emphasized the importance of food production and conservation in a statement released through the New Mexico Extension Service. Declaring that the food battle is far from won, the President of the United States called on American people to continue their "magnificent work."

His statement follows: During the past three years every American who has played a part in the job of growing, conserving, harvesting, distributing and processing our food supply has done a magnificent job.

As we enter a new year, the demands for our food at home and abroad are so great that it is essential for every man and woman to do everything to help in the huge task of getting the food produced and seeing that it is conserved and shared. Many of our favorite foods are scarce.

To this end, I ask the people in cities, towns and villages to assist our farmers in every possible way to reach the food goals which have been set for this year.

I call upon the millions of victory gardeners who have done so much to swell the nation's food supply in these war years to continue their good work.

I ask these people who can spare the time to assist the nation's food processors in the task of preparing the food for our armed services, our civilians and our allies.

I ask the millions of women who have preserved food at home so that our armed services could have the fruits and vegetables they need, to carry on until the war is won.

I ask every American to share our available food by observing the rules of rationing and by cooperating with food merchants in the observance of food price ceilings.

I know I can count on the American people to respond to these calls to action, so that we can all truly continue to say when the war is won that our food has played an important role in the fight for freedom.



U. S. TREATMENT OF GERMAN PRISONERS

Parents of boys who are prisoners of Germany get increasingly burned up at reports showing how badly they are fed by the enemy, while German prisoners in the U. S. are eating better than American civilians.

German prisoners of war, many of them arrogant, insolent, and considered beyond political rehabilitation, get rationed foods denied civilians, and in some cases receive scarce foods requiring four times the food stamps now allowed American civilians.

The provost marshal, of course, is living up to the strict letter of the Geneva convention regarding prisoners, which provides that they be fed the same rations as U. S. soldiers.

Thus at one Florida camp, a one-week menu recently showed that the Nazi prisoners' ration for a single week would have required 45 meat points and 93 processed food points per man. Here is a sample of some of the meals German prisoners of war received at MacDill field, Florida.

Dinner: Turkey a la king, parsoy potatoes, cauliflower, celery and pickles, bread, butter, chocolate cake, coffee.

At breakfast the next day they received grapefruit, dry cereal, fresh milk, boiled eggs, toast, butter, jam and coffee.

For luncheon they had veal steak, lyonnais potatoes, stewed corn, fruit salad, bread, butter, peaches and coffee.

For supper the PW's had veal loaf, gravy, escalloped potatoes, green peas, cabbage and pineapple salad, bread, butter, cinnamon rolls and coffee.

The prisoners are served butter three times a day, seven days a week. During other days of the same week they had fried pork chops, bacon and eggs, beef stew, spororibs, roast veal, veal a la king, roast beef with gravy, baked ham and baked beans with salt pork. They were also given Boston cream pie for dinner, butterscotch pudding, pineapple fritters, marble cake, fruit cobbler, mince pie, peach shortcake, and other fancy dishes.

Meanwhile, American boys held by the Germans complain that were it not for Red Cross packages provided them by relatives they would be hungry constantly.

ARMY DISCHARGES

With all the pressure the army has been bringing for a work-or-fight law, no one in congress has taken time for a real investigation of the army's own wasteful disposition of manpower. Among other things, there has been no probe of army policy regarding medical discharges.

Actually, army medics all over the country are discharging men for minor ailments which, although rendering them unfit for front-line action, don't effect their ability to do clerical, construction, or other types of work.

Last summer General Marshall also ordered discharges for men found to be developing nervous disorders as a result of their army service. But last October, so many men were successfully faking these difficulties that a six-week freeze was called, and a much stiffer discharge examination required.

But "goldbricks" and "geepers" are still the men who most frequently win their discharge papers. If a man dislikes the army, is uncooperative and is determined to get a medical discharge, the attitude of his officers is usually "good riddance." But a good man on other than combat duty, who has a legitimate illness which merits discharge, finds it extremely difficult to get his release because "he's a good man and we need men like him."

CAPITAL CHASE

The office of War Information so far has banned Lester Cowan's new movie hit "Tomorrow the World" from distribution in European liberated countries. The story shows a Nazi youngster transferred to the U. S. A. and being beaten up when he still sticks to Hitler's idea. OWI officials say they may release the ban for France and Belgium, but will not let the film get to Germany.

An inside row is being waged over the reappointment of Al Well, son of AFL labor leader Matthew Well, as U. S. district attorney in Chicago. Matt Well is 100 per cent against Roosevelt and White House advisers don't see why his son should be rewarded by FDR. However, Sen. Scott Lucas, friend of Jake Arvey, is pulling wires for Well's reappointment.

Behind the United Automobile Workers' nation-wide referendum to continue the "no-strike" pledge, was the feeling on the part of some workers that this pledge originally was forced on them by the union bosses. Union leaders therefore wanted to give them all a chance to vote. . . . The Walter Reuther faction of the auto workers previously favored a "no-strike" pledge until the war with Germany was over, but Reuther is now supporting the all-out "no-strike" pledge for the all-out effort against the Japs.

For Peace

Prosperity in America is the first step in the direction of a lasting peace. This prosperity ought to spread, as fast as it can, to other countries. It is in America, however, where men have the key to prosperity and the United States must lead the procession to high living standards through open competition... the only way to obtain a more abundant life, for ourselves or others.

At first thought, some people may not agree that prosperity has anything to do with peace. But they will convince themselves if they will think back. Troubles that built up to this present war were economic troubles. Hitler and Mussolini both climbed to power over ruin; ruined fortunes, ruined hopes, ruined lives. They got a following by promising people relief from misery.

Want Is Serious. People will be patient, and content themselves to wait for solutions to ordinary political problems, but they will do desperate and violent things when hungry; when their families need food. Prosperity helps to maintain peace, and (as I said in the first sentence) prosperity in America is the first step. The reason is plain, Uncle Sam is the world's best customer.

When we think about the importance of the United States in world affairs, these simple figures stand out boldly: We have only 7.5% of the earth's population and yet we buy 40% of all the raw materials in the world from which manufactured goods are produced. When whopls are turning in America, markets get active to the four corners of the earth.

Looking to America. When American smokestacks are warm, and American factories hum, the tin mines of Malaya get busy, the rubber plantations of Ceylon swarm with workers, and the Caribbean countries commence shipping coffee, chocolate and bananas. Our prosperity is the world's peace. But why discuss it unless we can do something about it? I happen to say we can!

Foreign lands prosper when they sell freely to America. They sell to America when jobs are plentiful and good here, when most Americans have money to buy what they want. Jobs are plentiful and good, and workers prosper, when business is expanding. Business expands when investors see possible returns from investments. They could see such opportunities only if they were not afraid of taxes.

Uncertainty kills. Very few business men in the United States have any idea today that they will be able to expand in peacetime pursuits. Most of them know they can't afford to expand if the present-day 85% excise profit tax remains in force. It was passed as a war emergency measure. I do not say it ought to be repealed at this time. But we ought to make certain now that it will not outlive the war.

Revenue measures are the bane of all laws to repeal. Taxes rarely get smaller. But unless taxes on business get smaller after the war, investors would be insane to spend now billions for expansion. Business men want to plan peacetime sales and employment now. When Congress makes a reasonable tax law to become effective with the war, world peace will have its first guarantee of long life. It will have to be done this year!
