

Minimum Wage Bill Amended to Death

TT IS obvious, at least to your Home Town Reporter, that the Russell amendment to the new minimum wage act was wangled into the bill in a parliamentary move spearheaded by 21 southern sens. tors as a deliberate intent to kill the minimum wage bill.

It was another of those coalition actions in which 20 northern Republicans along with two northern Deme. ocrats joined with the southern Democratic bloc. Only three southern senators opposed the action. . . . Hill of Alabama, Pepper of Clorida and Barkley of Kentucky. It might be pointed out, too, that the prost influential senators on the Republican side refused to join in the coalltion . . . senators such as Taft of Ohio, Vandenberg and Ferguson of Michigan, Morse of Oregon, and Alken of Vermont.

There was much oratory in the debate from these southern senators about the "poor downtrodden farmer." but that this oratory was i so much political sop is evident from the fact that these same senstors twice before have had the opportunity to pass the Puce bill, which includes the cost of farm labor in establishing a parity price, and have i twice before even refused to consider it To tack the Pace bill onto the minimum wage bill at this late date as an amendment or rider when even the four national farm organizations didn't want it there, makes it an obvious move, to our way of thinking, to defeat the bill.

Against Higher Wages

The southern senators, although they will not say so for publication, just do not want a higher wage scale in southern industry. This fact has been evident in the consideration of other wage and labor legislation.

And these farm organizations have been embarrassed, to say the least, throughout the senate fight on minimum wage bill, which would raise the legal minimum wage from 40 cents to 60 cents an hour for some three million workers, but not farm workers. They were lukewarm on the bill in the first place for the reason that a highor minimum wage would indirectly Mean higher farm wates.

At the same time they favor the principle of the Pace bill to include farm labor cost in the price of farm products, and so they could not openly and wholeheartedly oppose the amendment although it did not contain certain safeguards which are set out in the original Pace bill, such as "area of production" and "primary processing" exemptions. The farm organizations also asked for flexible minimum wages based on cost-of-living index and the transfer of "area of production" findings to the secretary of agriculture from the labor department. They got none of these safeguards, however. And so the National Grange, the Farm ! Hurcau, Uje Farmers Union and the National Co-operatives are not very happy about the result of the coalition.

- What would this inclusion of cost of farm labor in the parity formula do? According to the debate on the floor as stated by Sen. Scott Lucas | of Illinois, it will increase the nation's food bill by something like \$4,800,-000,000 annually to consumers. It would send the parity price of wheat from \$1.56 to \$2.07 per bushel, corn from \$1.14 to \$1.51 and so on down the line of parity prices. But it makes no provision for passing this price increase along to farm workers.


Senator Lucas declared that amder the Steagall act the government could not finance the support pregram at these prices.

Bill Faces Vete

Although the minimum wage bill as originally introduced providing for 40 cents on a sliding scale up to 78 cents, was a part of the President's program, so inflationary does he regard the bill with the Russell-Pace amendment attached, he has i inferred the senale he will veto the measure it passed in that form. The coalition sensions, in the face of the President's statement, refused to compromise on a lower wage minimum in exchange for their amendment. It went through the senate with the minimum at 60 cente, and \$14 million low-paid workers were excluded.

NO PLAN FOR ARMY

-WASHINGTON. - After the last war, we let our best officers leave the army, were content to make the army a refuge for hundreds of misfits who couldn't adjust themselves in other walks of life, and settled down to complete complacency regarding the armed forces.

Usually history repeats itself. After this war, however, there is a little less complacency regarding the future - thanks to Russia. But there is almost as much donothingness regarding the internal organization of the army.

President Truman has now demanded that we have a big peacetime conscript army. But aside from Secretary of War Patterson's healthy board for probing caste, no steps have been taken to reorganize the army's long out-dated system of promotions, its methods of selecting officers, and, perhaps most important of all, its system of eliminating missits.

A thorough re-organization of the army might make it more enticing to good men and thereby eliminate conscription. Even Sen. Chan Gurney of South Dakota, most ardent conscription enthusiast, will admit that a volunteer army is more efficlent than one composed of men who are forced to serve.

COULD USE HORSE MEAT

An important debate has been taking place among food experts inside the administration regarding the use of horse meat for feeding Europe.

. . .

Horse meat is a type of food which Americans know little about. Within Europe it is standard diet and certain countries, especially France and Belgium, have repeatedly informed the United States that they would like to buy more horse meat here. If two and a half billion politida of horse meat could be sold to Europe — which is the amount available in the U.S. A.—it would take care of most of Europe's feeding problems and eliminate any need for U.S. A. rationing.

Such a program has been arged by UNRRA officials and also by some experts in the army and navy. However, the plan has run up against several snags, chiefly that of U. S. meat packers.

The big packers don't want the American public to get the idea that horse meat is processed in their plants. They fear that the suspicion would linger in the consumer's mind. However, Harry Reed, who does most of the meat procurement for UNRRA in the department of agriculture, leans toward the big meat packers and they never have wanted small state packers to get into the inter-state business.

HORSE MEAT FEEDS 2009

Another source of opposition is expected to come from the many horse lovers throughout the country who probably would claim that the United States was being denuded of horses.

Telkarmonium First to Produce Tune Electrically

The first musical instrument whose sounds were electrically produced was the telharmonium. inwinted by Thaddeus Cahill and first demonstrated in 1902 in Holyoke, Mass., says Collier's. The instrument was played on a twomanual keyboard in a special studio from which the music was transmitted over telephone wires to any subscriber who wished to

listen. But when this instrument, which weighed 200 tons and cost \$200,000, was tried out in New York City. it proved a commercial failure because it interfered with the telephone service.

Woman's World Men's Shirts Convert Nicely

By Ertta Haley.

MEN'S shirts are scarce these days, and you may wonder at the wisdom of "making something out of them" in this case. But, when a shirt is so worn that it can no longer be used by the man of the family, it is welcome material for aprons, which are so useful and essential. Shirts become worn around the

collar and sleeves, also under the

armholes and cuffs. After these have been turned and worn again, there's nothing much that can be done with them. In this case, you'll feel well justified and economical If you sew up an apron from them. Before getting into the actual cutting and sewing, let me point out that not all shirts will make good aprons. The materials which you can and should use for aprons are percale, broadcloth and poplin. Those shirts of rayon are much better if converted into blouses forsmall fry.

The above-mentioned materials which are suitable for aprons possess these qualities—they are easy to handle, they tear, crease, hem, gather, stitch and press easily. You will also want a fabric that launders easily and one that starches nicely. Do both washing and starching be-

If there is a goodly amount of material in the salvaged shirt, an apron with a bib may be made. This type of apron in especially practical if you want one for working around the kitchen or laundry.

Cut Apron on Correct Grain of Material

Cutting the apron on the correct grain of the material is very important in the appearance of the finished article. If necessary make

very narrow bem. If you are making a one-piece apron for dress-up, you will want hip tucks on each side, or cluster tucks on each side of the apron. These tucks help to take up fuliness and fit the apron to the body. Three cluster tucks will do very nicely for the average apron, and the thread of the fabric should be used to guide you in stitching straight.

Year Sewing Machine

Well-finished clothes depend on proper use of the sewing machine. Here are some minor difficulties which can be corrected easily.

If your machine skips stitches, one of the following may be responsible: needle improperly set in bar: needle too short or too long; needle bent or blunt; needle too fine for the thread you are using.

Puckers in the material may be caused by tight tension, a blunt needle, too long a stitch on | > fine material, or a fabric which is too light to carry over the feed. In the latter case, use a newspaper or fissue under the fabric. If your bobbin or shuttle thread tends to break, look to one of the following for the reason: incorrect threading of the bobbin; tight lower tension; bobbin wound too tightly or unevenly:
