### Receives Diploma at N. M. M. I.

William Weber Fulmer, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Fulmer of 201 Alamo, will receive a High School certificate from New Mexico Military Institute on Tuesday morning, June 4, 1946.

Young Fulmer has been enrolled in the High School division for three years, and is completing the First Year Advanced Course in the Senior Cavalry Unit of the ROTC. He is one of thirty-five cadets from New Mexico included in the total of one hundred seventy-four who will receive High School certificates at the graduation ceremonies. Sixty-eight per cent of the cadets receiving High School certificates enroll in the Junior College division, and may become graduates of New Mexico Military Institute after completing the two-year course.

Enrollment at New Mexico Military Institute, Roswell, is limited to 586 cadets. Of this number, one hundred thirty-seven are from New Mexico. Thirty-one states and foreign countries are represented in the geographic distribution of cadets this year.

B. Applicant must have investigative experience, or

C. Applicant must be a criminological or technician.

D. Applicant must be fluent German, Russian, Japanese linguist.

In addition to meeting one of the requirements, the applicant should be between 20 and 38 years old, be a United States citizen, and have a High School education and Army test score of 110 or better.

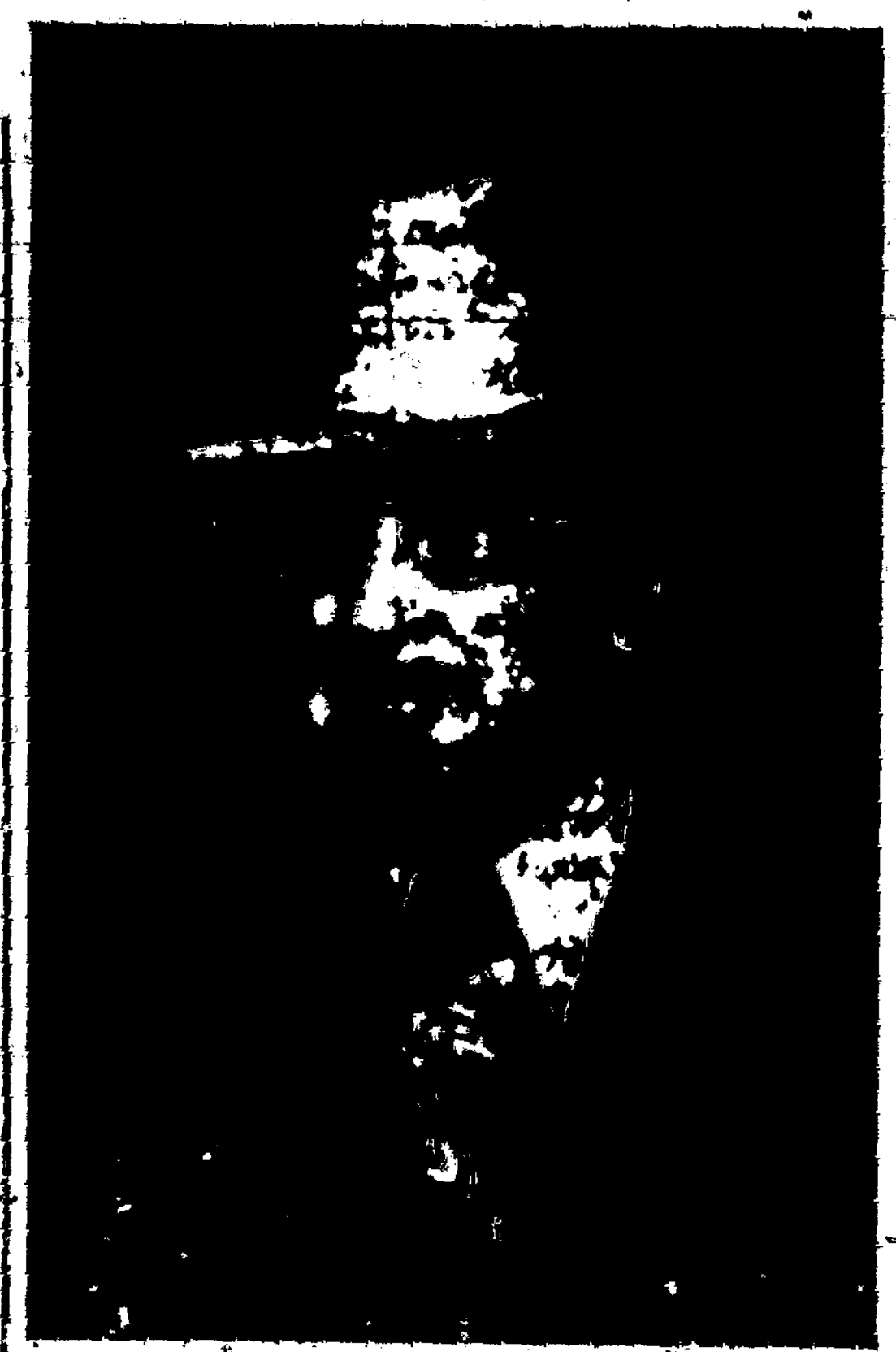

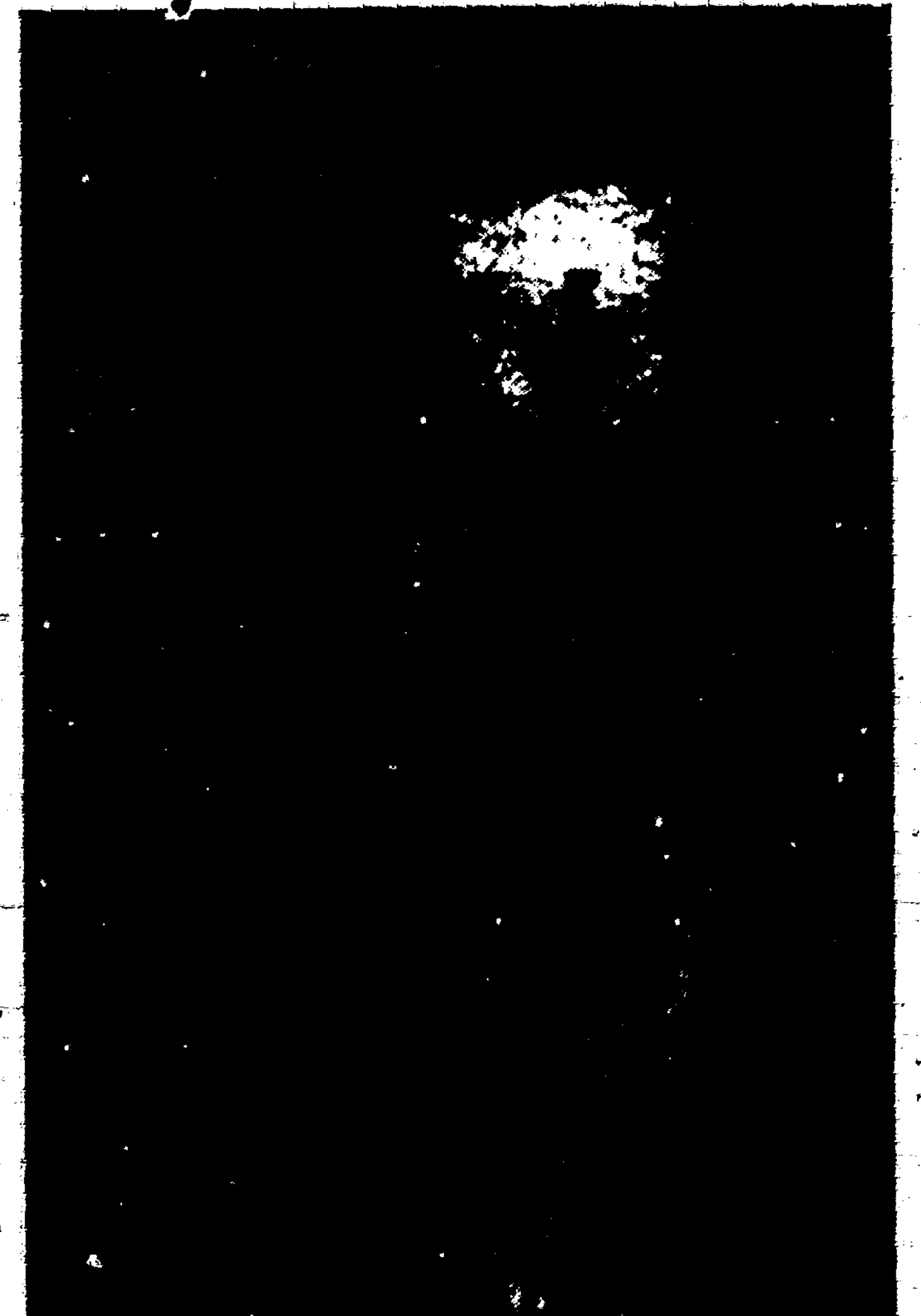

Good Strategy

Congressman Hatton Sumners, in my opinion one of America's greatest living statesmen, has announced his purpose to retire at the end of the 79th congress. This news first appeared as a dark cloud because men like him are sorely needed today, but in Washington last month I was shown the silver lining. Rep. Sumners is "retiring" to a more strategic theatre of war.

The people of America have a danger that is common to them all and a common duty to defend themselves against it. This nation's hope for a bright future depends on a few facts being seen by a great many people at once. Americans can be depended upon for action at any time the truth is not hidden from them or distorted beyond recognition. Mr. Sumners will soon start talking straight to them.

Powerful Truths

"I have watched what my own generation... has been doing to the greatest system of democratic government ever evolved through the processes of the ages," said the veteran lawmaker. "By ignoring principles and the lessons of history, accepting for our guidance the theories of men and political expedience, we have made dependents of our citizens and vassals of our states.

"By concentration of power and drafts on the Federal Treasury we now have a bewildering governmental agglomeration-impossible-of democratic control. Wasteful and inefficient, by nature it is the instrumentality of favoritism, oppression and corruption. It is the destroyer of self-reliance, self-respect and self-governing ability without which no people can remain free."

But There's Hope

A public awakening will save this country from any form of tyranny. Mr. Sumners does not doubt this. He said, "Washington is so sensitive to the changing currents of public opinion as a barometer is to record changes in the weather." If acts of congress fail to reflect public sentiment, it is because such sentiment is itself confused or indistinct to the majority.

Mr. Sumners is taking to the lecture platform. I wish him as wide a hearing as his profound experience deserves. Popular education is the right place to start winning for America a future of freedom. This man has seen Congress sweat under heat applied by political pressure groups. He sees the need to open a door and admit a cooling draft of public sentiment. And he can do it.

Remarkable Record

Born in Tennessee, Hatton Sumners turned 21 in Texas. His congressional district (Dallas) has kept him in Washington 34 years by electing him to the 63rd and all subsequent congresses. He is a sound thinker and an eloquent speaker. He is a nationally recognized authority on Constitutional Law. He is chairman of the House Judiciary Committee and has been for a long time.

In a brief and eloquent word-picture of official Washington, the retiring crusader for decentralization of power said of Congress: "The political backing of a well organized minority is consistent and dependable whereas the backing of an unorganized majority is fickle." That's clear. An enlightened public opinion must supplant loud and selfish minorities as guiding stars of Congress.

# Even Crops Can Tell You When They're Hungry



A farmer with the "know-how" can spot, at a glance, evidence of starvation in his growing crops, and remedy it. You will find it profitable to learn the signs of "hidden hunger" in your crops, whether you are selling them as cash crops or using them as feed for livestock. Once you have learned to understand the "sign language" of plants, you can often tell just by looking at a growing plant whether it is drawing from the soil all the nitrogen, phosphorus, potash and other elements it must have to produce healthy, high-yielding crops.

A deficiency in these essential elements will affect the plant's appearance in some way which will tell you just what is short. Here are some of the "hunger signs" in corn, for example:

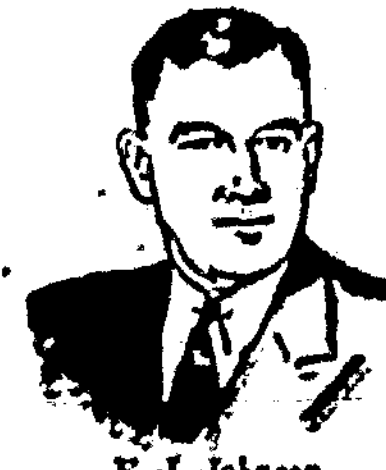
- Yellowish-green leaves and stunted growth indicates nitrogen deficiency.
- Tips of leaves gummed together indicate calcium deficiency.
- Purple color in leaves indicates phosphorus deficiency.
- Bottom leaves dead; yellow striping between

veins of upper leaves (condition known as "white-bud") indicates zinc deficiency.

- Searching along the edges of leaves indicates potash deficiency.
- Regular yellowish-white stripes on leaves indicate magnesium deficiency.

Other crops also show "hunger signs" which can be recognized at a glance if you know their sign language. Your county agent or vocational agricultural teacher can tell you about them or advise you about books or bulletins which give detailed information. Because of their thorough understanding of soil and crop conditions in your district, they are the men to answer your questions. Both are ready and able to help you. They know the signs of crop malnutrition and can give you valuable advice.

**Ringworm in Cattle** causes irritation and loss of weight. Indicators of this parasitic disease are circular patches on the skin, usually on the head and neck, which soon become denuded of hair. Small blisters and scaly yellow crusts appear, with moderate itching. Colorado A. & M. College suggests the removal of crusts with soap and lard, then painting the area with acetic acid, sulphur ointment, or iodine once a day.



### BETTER FARMERS FROM OUR HIGH SCHOOLS

by E. J. Johnson  
Federal Agent, Agricultural Education

By training the farmers of tomorrow in new farming methods, vocational agriculture is doing much to secure America the most productive and progressive agriculture in the world.

Teachers of vocational agriculture have worked for almost thirty years to prepare youth for the practice of better farming. Over 8000 U. S. high schools now have vocational agriculture departments. Broad courses of study are offered to in-school farm boys, and short, intensive courses are open to farmers of all ages. Many schools operate farms or observation plots in which students are able to practice what they are taught. The program is productive as well as instructional.

In the Pacific and Intermountain regions, vocational agriculture is taught to 30,000 high school boys. 64 high schools in these areas operate farms totaling 2,546 acres. The 1945 production record of the school farms and of students on their home farms is a tribute to the skill and the spirit of both the young farmers and their teachers. In 1945, vocational agriculture students in the Pacific and Intermountain regions produced 9,000 beef cattle, 11,400 dairy cattle, 19,500 sheep, 44,800 hogs, 58,000 chickens, 40,000 turkeys, and raised over 25,000 acres of field crops, fruits and vegetables.

### Martha Logan's Recipe for Braised Short Ribs with Vegetables

- 3 pounds short ribs of beef
- 3 teaspoons salt
- 24 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons lard
- 5 medium potatoes
- 5 small onions
- 2 parsnips—2 carrots
- 1 cup water

Seven ribs with salt and pepper and brown in hot lard. Add water, cover and cook slowly or bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour. Prepare vegetables and cut in half. Add seasoned vegetables, cover, and cook until vegetables are tender. Variation: 1/2 cup tomatoes may be used in place of parsnips.

**Worth thinking about:** Consider that common little word *a-n-d*. It usually joins things together, but now and then we use it to separate things which should not be separated.

Strawberry-shortcake is a homely example of our meaning. It's eaten everywhere, it has two parts... but no one ever separates that satisfying combination in word or thought. You'd never think of saying strawberry and shortcake.

So it is with many combinations which cannot exist separately. There's agriculture-industry and the livestock-meat industry, for example. These combinations cannot be split into separate sections, because all parts of each are dependent on the others. The production of livestock and the preparation and distribution of meat are as inseparable as strawberry-shortcake. When producers prosper, meat packers prosper. When one suffers constant loss, the other must suffer also. Those of us in the livestock-meat industry have mutual interests, and we work together toward a common goal.

**Ratty Arilomatic:** One rat eats about 150 pounds of corn per year. It costs you as much to keep 10 rats as to keep 17 laying hens. These 17 layers could produce 200 eggs each, at 36¢ per dozen, which would bring you \$102. For 10¢ you can feed the corn to your hens and collect the difference of \$101.90.

### EDITOR'S COLUMN



You who raise and feed livestock know as well as I do that the problems of the livestock-meat industry are usually mighty complicated. Naturally, I am always interested in what others have to say about our

problems, especially in the press or over the radio. During the recent meat strike, for instance, I was impressed with the effort that was made to place both sides of the question before the public. On the other hand, I was disturbed, on several occasions, by statements made by people who either did not know all the facts, or who ignored them, or who so words consisted of part-truths and their own biased opinions.

To my way of thinking, all of us should consider all the facts that are available, and we are to form a fair opinion on any subject. And so, it seems to me especially important that everyone and farmer have the fullest factual understanding of every part of the livestock-meat industry. Now I don't pretend to know all there is to know, and you probably have many facts that I lack. But from my experience in this business, we have learned many things which might help clear up certain doubts and questions you may have in your mind.

If there are things about our business that you aren't sure about, we would appreciate hearing from you. We will reply with whatever facts we have. I am sure that our correspondence will make for a better mutual understanding of our common problems.

PRIMARY ELECTION PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, it is provided by the Primary Election Code of the State of New Mexico that the Board of County Commissioners shall at least 15 days before the election by proclamation and publication as therein provided, give notice of the election, the objects thereof, the offices to be voted for, the names of the candidates for each of the said offices as the same have been certified to the County Clerk as provided by law, the names of Judges of Election and Counting Judges and Poll Clerks, and the place where said election is to be held in each precinct and election district; and

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that said Act shall apply to all political parties for any of whose candidates there was cast at the last preceding General Election as many as fifteen per centum (15%) of the total number of votes cast for the candidates for Governor by all parties at such election; and

WHEREAS, at the last general election, the Democratic and Republican parties were the only political parties of any, of whose candidates there was cast as many as fifteen per centum (15%) of the total number of votes cast for the candidates for Governor by all parties at such election; and

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that said Act shall apply to the offices of the United States Senator, Representative in Congress of the United States, and to all elective State, District, Legislative, County and precinct officers in the State who are elected at the General Election; and

WHEREAS, all Candidates desiring to participate in the Primary for Precinct, County or Legislative office filled by Lincoln County, have filed their declarations of candidacy together with supporting nominating petitions with the County Clerk of Lincoln County; and in the cases of offices filled by the state at large and districts comprising Lincoln County and more than said County, such declarations and petitions have been filed with the Secretary of State and duly certified by the said Secretary of State to the Clerk of Lincoln County according to Law.

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority and duty in us vested by law, We the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, do hereby publish, proclaim and give notice as follows:

1. That a primary election be and the same is hereby called to be held throughout the County of Lincoln and in each precinct thereof on the 4th day of June, A. D., 1946.

JUDGE MABRY

was born on a farm in Carlisle county, Kentucky, October 17, 1884, was educated at Bardwell, Ky., high school, University of New Mexico, and University of Oklahoma. He came to New Mexico in 1907, locating at Clovis, after having filed, and made proof upon, a 160 acre "claim" nearby. After finishing his study of law he was married to Katherine Burns, a high school teacher of Clovis; and he removed to Albuquerque in 1915 to enter the practice of his profession. The Mabrys have three children and four grandchildren.

He has held many offices of honor and trust during his nearly forty years residence in the state. He was the youngest member of the historic convention which wrote the New Mexico constitution in 1910, a delegate from the then young county of Curry. He was again elected by the people of Curry county to represent them in the first state senate, where he served from 1912 to 1917.

He was elected district attorney (Albuquerque district) for the term of 1933 to 1937. He was elected in 1936 district judge of the same district carrying Bernalillo county by over 5500 majority over a strong and able Republican opponent.

He was nominated in 1938 as the Democratic party's candidate for justice of the Supreme Court (the last nominating convention before the primary came in) by nearly a three to one vote of the convention, was elected over an able Republican opponent by over 26,000 majority, and again carrying Bernalillo county by a little less than 6,000 majority.

The past year he served as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court to which he was elevated in 1938, and recently resigned to make the race for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

Tom Mabry is not claimed by any faction or group of the party. He has always worked for party harmony and has been repeatedly rewarded for his efforts. But he is not afraid to fight for what is right, inside or outside the party.

He is known to be courageous and strong in his views of what is the right and proper conduct of those entrusted with public office.
