Hondo Soil Conservation
Range utilization checks have almost been completed in the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation District. Ranchers' estimates of normal forage varied from 50 per cent to 100 per cent of normal growth with a majority estimating 75 per cent normal feed production. Results of efforts made by ranches to reduce stocking to balance with forage produced during the past year became very obvious. Some elected to further reduce at this time to let the grass recover. Many requested that additional checks be made in the Spring to evaluate results of estimates on actual feed available at this time. Considerable interest was "brought to the surface" of ranchers attempting to stock only to the feed produced and available.

Dogdom To Have Its Own "Fidos"

NOT to be outdone by Hollywood and its "Oscar", America's dogdom is to have its own "Elo" awards for individuals of outstanding accomplishment in the dog field. Ritchotte, wood sculptor of New Haven, Conn., who executed the trophy, inspecting the first finished model of "Fido." Shown in the inset is a close-up of Mr. Ritchotte's original wood model. The first two "Fidos" will go to Laurence A. Horwell, Elmberg, N. Y., and Mrs. Milton Branger, Elberton, N. J., voted respectively, "Dogdom's Man and Woman of 1945" by America's dog editors and writers in a poll conducted by the Gaines Dog Research Center. Mr. Horwell, secretary of the Dachshund Club of America, was selected because of his extraordinary contribution in establishing and maintaining the popularity of the Dachshund breed in recent years, and particularly during the war. Mrs. Branger, consultant to the Army's Quartermaster Corps, was picked because of her work with the nation's war dogs not only in 1945, but during the entire period of World War II.

Boy Scout News

The Boy Scouts of America held their annual finance drive in Carrizozo, Oct. 30, 1946. This is the first time since 1941 that the Scouts have put on their own drive. Formerly they were connected with the War Fund Drive.

Mr. T. E. Kelley headed the drive with Alfred Lopez, P. W. Blakely, Jess Petty, Glenneth Stokes, Joe Morgan, Carl Freeman; Sam Welsh and Mrs. Mae Jordan as helpers. The drive was kicked off with a breakfast at the Steak House. By 5 o'clock p. m. the total raised was about \$280. Several people have not yet been contacted and the total is expected to run well over \$300.

The money raised is to be used by the Eastern New Mexico Area Council to promote field service training, camping and other Scout services to the 88 troops and 3500 Scouts throughout the council.

Carrizozo's own troop and cub pack are progressing nicely, according to Joe Ben Hunsaker, field Scout executive for this district. The Scouts attended a weeks camp this summer in one of the councils camps and the Cubs are growing rapidly under the able direction of Carl A. Freeman, Cubmaster.

Scouting in the Area is also on the upgrade. This year there are 3500 boys in the scouting program compared with 400 boys ten years ago. The council has a budget of \$36,616 this year. Drives in Tucumcari, Portales, Hobbs, Artesia, Roswell, Ruidoso, Capitan and Corona are already completed.

Mr. Kelley wishes to take this opportunity to thank the people of Carrizozo for their fine cooperation and especially the men and women who gave their time to work on the drive.—Contributed.

Sportlight

AFTER watching the scramble for world series seats and hearing of the record demand for every game that teams like Army, Michigan and Notre Dame play, one begins to wonder how many over-eager fans are turned away in the course of a year.

The waste, in the matter of spectators runs far into the millions. In fact, it will surpass many hundreds of millions, since on certain big occasions far more people are turned away than the number of those admitted.

The Red Sox office in Boston told me that, with room enough, the Boston seat sale for the World Series would have passed the 500,000 mark. This means that about 80 per cent of the ticket applicants were turned away.

Army feels confident that it could have played before more than 250,000 at Ann Arbor, if Michigan had a 250,000 stadium, and just as certain it could play before close to a million in the Notre Dame game.

Unfortunately, when earlier stands were built no one saw the possibilities of any such public demand. Certainly New York didn't, where there is no such bowl as so many other cities have.

Los Angeles can handle 103,000 at her Municipal stadium, with Pasadena only a few miles away, able to put away 90,000. With Santa Anita and Hollywood set for racing, Los Angeles is well in front so far as accommodations for the human frame are concerned.

Philadelphia and Chicago have 100,000 plants at the Sesqui-centennial stadium and Soldier field.

New York's Big Parks

But their ball parks are too meager, along with so many other cities.

The Yankees have the only ball park that can seat 70,000 fans. Polo grounds and Briggs stadium are about on a par at 58,000. Outside of these places, few ball parks can seat more than 35,000 with any comfort. Public interest in sport, almost every variety of sport, has grown far beyond seating or even standing space. They can handle far bigger crowds in England and Scotland because hillside stands are used. In the matter of football or baseball, it is difficult to build stadiums that could handle more than 110,000 or possibly 125,000 spectators.

When crowds reach or pass these marks, too many spectators are too far away from the scene of conflict or contest. But there is vast room for improving conditions, where space is often so much too limited. The Michigan stadium at Ann Arbor leads all strictly college facilities with room for slightly over 80,000 spectators. With over 100,000 applications for the Army-Michigan game, you can see how inadequate this is.

Just what will be done about the situation is a story for the future, with lack of space and also lack of building material. But many an owner or promoter has wanted many a sign in thinking of all the lost gold from so many millions crowded out.

Too Much Baseball

There was a good deal of talk, during the recent series, about how baseball is extending its playing season deep into football's brief weeks. Then too, there's the matter of traveling.

We were wondering what would happen in the future when Los Angeles or San Francisco had to face Boston or Brooklyn.

A world series that rolls back and forth from ocean to ocean could be much worse than this shift from St. Louis to Boston and back.

The Mississippi isn't nearly as far away from the Atlantic ocean as the Pacific ocean is.

The main fact is that baseball is crowding much too far into the football season.

Naturally, baseball magnates can't see it that way. They have failed to realize that football is now as much of a major sport as baseball ever was, or ever will be.

If a series happens to run into a day or two of rain, those who follow both baseball and football see their first football game around mid-season. This doesn't happen to make any sense. Baseball gets its start back in February. It has at least a six months' span. Football only asks for two and a half months.

Football Rankings

The majority of football fans agree that Texas universally belongs on top, or close to the top of the heap, as far as this season goes.

Army and Notre Dame are ranked close alongside, with Michigan in fourth place.

It remains to be seen what Michigan will do in its remaining games. Also more than a title of Army's future depends on Doc Blanchard's condition.

This friend of mine had found one basic dress that she liked and she bought a similar one every year, even though in a slightly different color. Although the basic design was becoming to her, it finally became so monotonous that she felt she was not having any variety in her wardrobe, as were her friends.

Every woman should realize that every season requires something entirely different in the way of color and design if she is to be completely happy about her clothes. I certainly don't suggest that you go in for bizarre experiments in clothing, hats or accessories, but there are many attractive colors and styles from which to choose.

Before you choose your afternoon or semi-formal dress or your going-out, dress-up dress, whatever name you give it, make a list of the kind of interests and dates you're planning to have. Then select a dress that will fit all these purposes as well as possible.

Even though black is smart, don't repeat it every time you buy a dress. See what navy blue can do for you or royal blue or a deep bright red or perhaps the new gray-beige tone with jeweled touches about the throat or belt. You'll have a nice surprise!

Select Dress to Fit Your Type

If you are sewing the dress at home, you can't do justice to either material or pattern unless you realize your limitations with the needle. Unless you are experienced in working with material, don't choose draped styles that may be hard to handle. The soft, simple dress is designed just for you, and it need never lack variety.

aware of what the woman used with the dress to make it an extremely attractive costume. Such accessories as hats, gloves, jewelry or lingerie touches can either make or break a dress.

Choose Accessories To Enhance Dress

If you've received some particularly attractive jewelry recently and have nothing which really goes with it, there's nothing better than an attractive afternoon dress to set it off properly. If the jewelry is large and glittery, select something simple and classic to show it off.

Or, if you have a very attractive lacy dickey, make a dress that will truly show it off well. On dresses such as these, use a very good quality material, simply but well made. Small tucks or pleats in the bodice or skirt may be used effectively, but they should be well tailored.

Laundering Shirts

Washing and ironing a shirt is not the contrary job it's reputed to be, even though there are many older homemakers who hate the thought of doing the shirts. There's a trick, or perhaps several of them, to doing the job properly.

First of all, make sure the shirt is clean. Put it through two washings to make sure it is immaculate. Use a soft but firm brush for scrubbing collars and cuffs, as they soil most easily. Never rub the two together as this simply paves the way for fraying.

Turn the pockets out and make sure there is no dirt, grime or tobacco resting at the bottom of the pocket. If you don't do this, there's bound to be trouble during ironing.

If it is a cotton shirt you are washing, make the first rinse water warm, the second cool. Rinse twice. Starch while wet but consult the man as to how he likes his shirt starched.

When you hang the shirt to dry, try to get most of the wrinkles out of it by shaking them out. This makes the ironing easier. When dry, dampen slightly and roll in a towel, but do not wad the shirt too tightly as this will create wrinkles that just need to be ironed.

Start ironing with the wrong side of the collar, then go to the right side. Yoke and sleeves are next. Then iron down the front of the shirt so as to shape the shirt properly.

If you make an addition to the ironing board about the size of a bread board, but quite a bit lighter and pad this, it can be slipped over the regular board and used for shirts.



Study your type . . .

Then, too, you have your choice of a soft trimmed dress that is easy to cut and put together. The trimming on this type of dress may be something added to the dress which is easy to put on, or it may show up in such easy-to-make details as softness in the shoulders or gathers and tucks in the skirt.

Only if you are experienced with sewing should you choose the sophisticated, subtle dresses, and then only if you are the type to wear them. These dresses usually have many different pieces and they must be pieced together, when cut, so they don't get mixed. They also require painstaking work in sewing as seams must be very carefully finished. Outside stitching is taboo, and every corner and curve must be perfectly molded to the figure. Select your pattern first and then the material, as patterns will guide you to correct materials for the particular style which you have chosen. Always have matching thread to make the sewing neat.

If you select a suit for sportswear, select one of the nice tweeds now available. If it is pleated, make sure the pleats are deep enough to allow for easy movement.

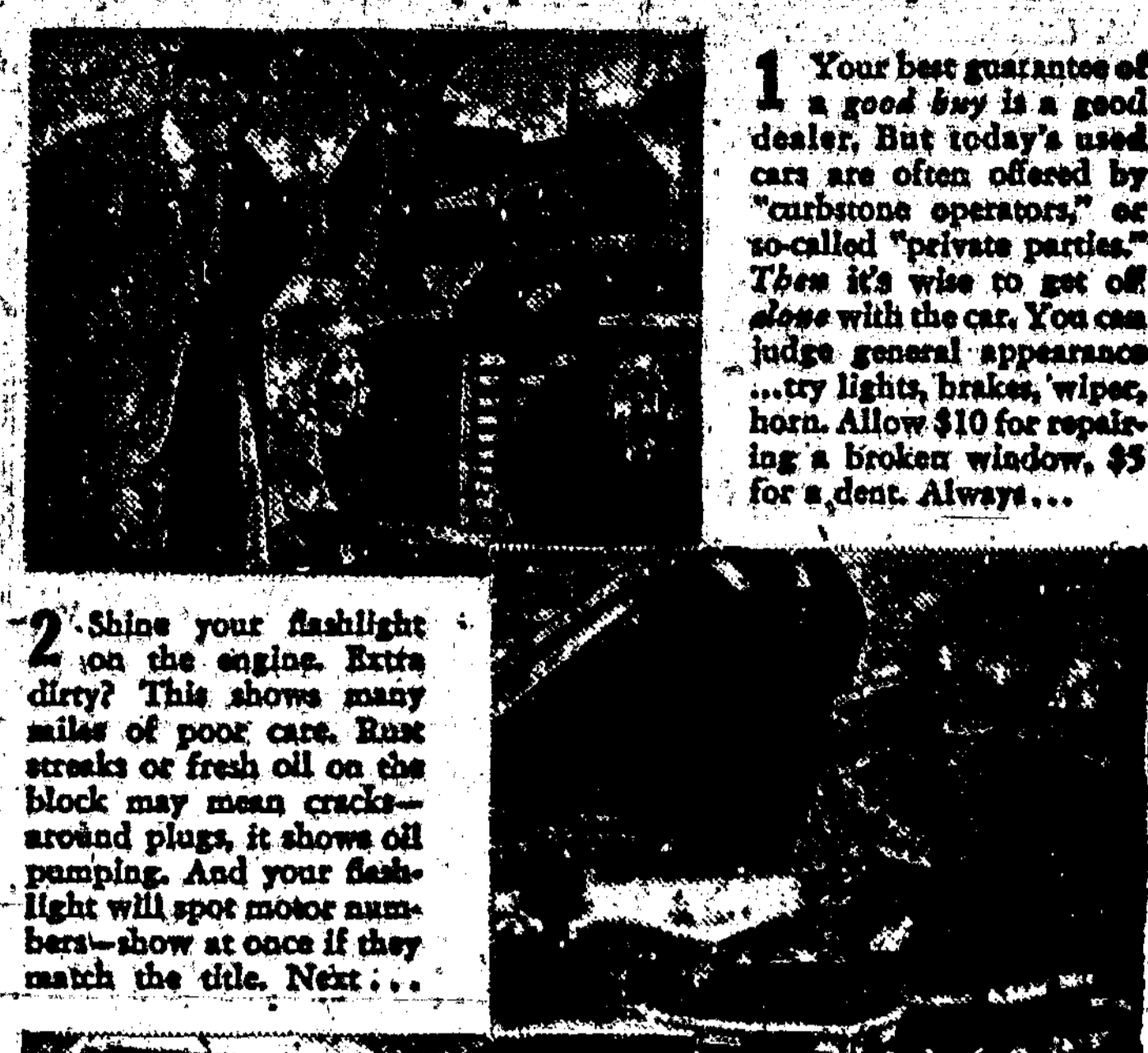
Peplums and drapery accent both suits and dresses this season and give lovely, graceful lines to clothing. Select whichever one looks best on you and give your wardrobe a lift.

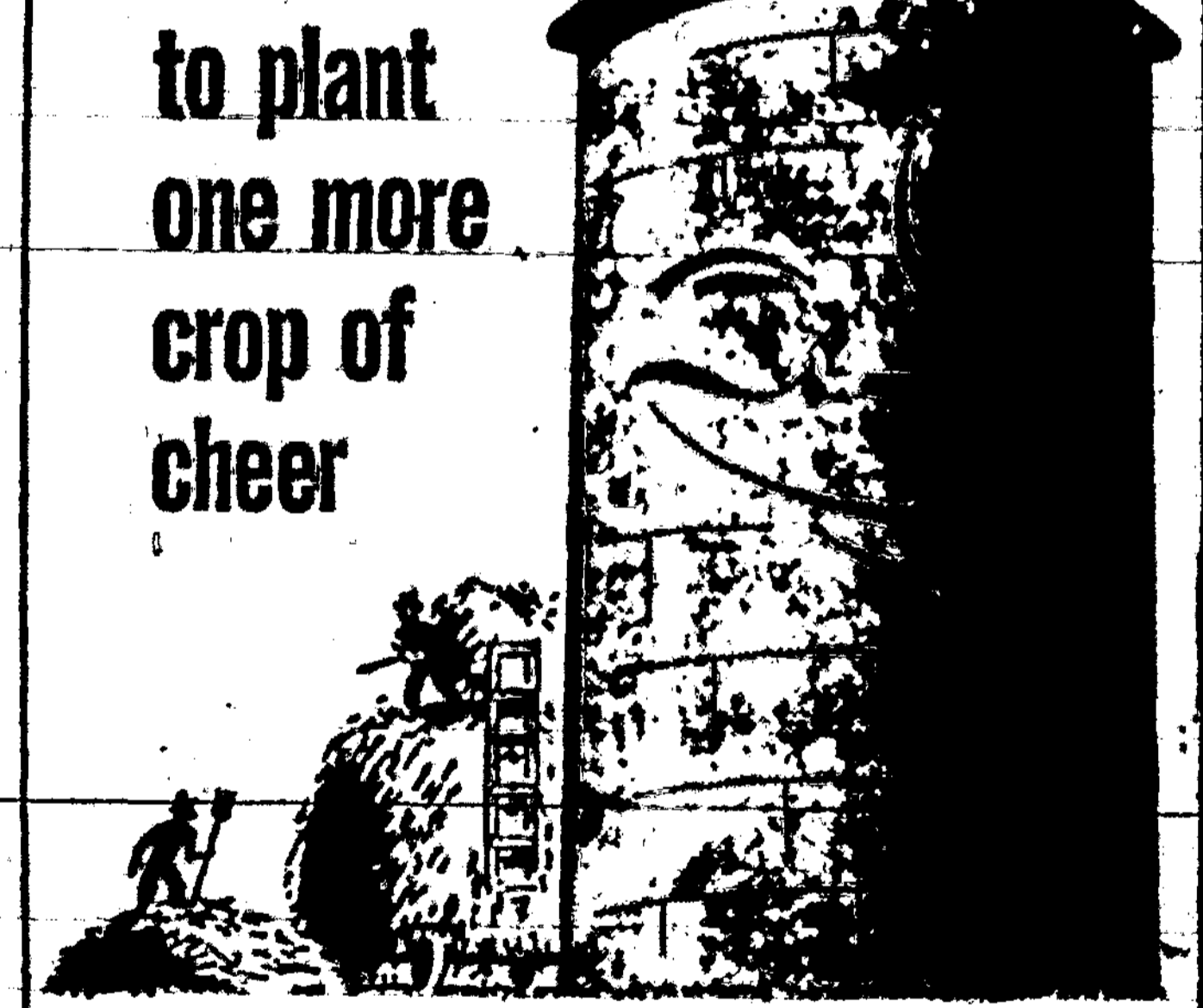

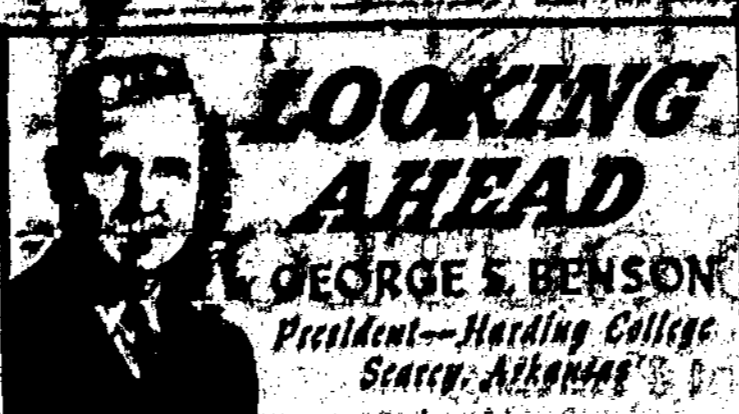

Public Good

Freedom of the press has been talked about more in the last few months than in the previous few years. Comment began when the Supreme Court ruled in favor of an editor who had been hauled into court by a notable who felt (perhaps justifiably) injured by something the editor had published. Not everybody thought the case would turn out as it did. Many were surprised.

I would not wish to review the case here, even if there were room for it, but I am glad the Supreme Court surprised a lot of good people and set them studying and talking about this purely American liberty, freedom of the press. Let me say this: You don't publish stories in the old country that hurt the feelings of potentates and get away with it. America is Different.

In this country, it is assumed that a man is not fit for public office unless he can take all the razzing and criticism that goes with it and still hold his temper and do a good job. Think how long a crooked official might stay in office if he could protect himself from criticism all the time, and yet encourage newspapers to magnify the faults of other men who ran for his office.

Editors better not get careless and publish uncomplimentary statements about their neighbors, or about things their neighbors have to do; courts make them pay for the damage, if any. Editors dare not get mean and print malicious lies about people because courts send writers to jail for that. Publishers can't do whatever they please. That's apart from freedom of the press.

For the Public Good

It is recognized by law in the United States that the people are entitled to know what goes on. Public information is for the public good. In line with this very principle, the Post Office Department will move 60 times more news tonnage for the money than letters which are private, not public. Our government considers spreading news an important public service.

If a publisher makes known things that are true and in the people's interest, it is for the public good and he has the protection of law. When the keen lash of publicity strikes the corrupt deeds of public payrollers, let the hit dog yelp. The press is a vocation of "checks and balances." Publishers have power they don't have to use, but if they use it they must use it for the public good.

A Parallel Case

Some day, I believe, these same checks and balances will control the enormous powers of labor unions which have done more to improve the living standards of the American people than any other organized movement. They have enhanced American freedom. The right of collective bargaining is as sacred as the right to vote, but some labor leaders have been known to abuse their power.

In a republic, power is abused when it is used destructively, in a manner that injures, rather than benefits, the public. The famous Case Bill is dead with all its miscellaneous regulations for labor unions. Many conservative thinkers will concede that it will be better if the unions regulate themselves for the public good, rather than having it done by law. Industrial peace must be achieved. Reform is inevitable. The workers can do it better than some bureaus.

Jungle Fever

When a man loses the right use of his mind, his friends put him in a state institution, but when a whole people start turning imbecile they commit themselves to the tender mercies of government. In one sentence, that's what I think about the so-called Full Employment Bill, already passed by the Senate and scheduled for early consideration by the House.

If our congressmen fasten upon the Federal government an obligation to provide jobs for everybody, they will be saying, "We represent a commonwealth of incompetents, unable to take care of themselves." America's vast resources, her enormous productive capacity, trained minds, skilled hands and huge markets will amount to nothing if our people lose their initiative, self-reliance and self-starters.

Men Have Spines
God in His wisdom metes out privileges and duties in proportion. No man and no nation can revel long in liberty and shirk the responsibilities that go with it, for human freedom is a gift from above. Much responsibility for the future of mankind hangs on the American people; we may well be thankful that our liberties are many. This is no time to retine in a political armchair among the old world's decadent tribes.

What supports the idea that government ought to (or even can) guarantee jobs for everybody? Answer: warped notions brought to America by immigrants from the backward lands of Europe and Asia. Many such "cases" can't quit thinking that citizens must serve the state instead of the state serving the citizens. They actually seem to imagine that rulers think better than other people.

Poisonous Insects

Foreign philosophies, spread quietly through schools, playgrounds and market places, have poisoned the minds of American boys and girls under their parents' very eyes. It is a quiet enemy that long has demanded attention. . . . When our soldiers landed on Guadalcanal they met Japanese attack from land, water and sky, and they overcame it. But the tropical bugs did more damage, quietly.

Insects with bills like hypodermic needles, hardly big enough to see without a glass, seemed like irritants of small consequence. But they turned out to be more dangerous than the man-size enemies. Their noise was small, their wounds were negligible, but they planted a venomous pestilence in the blood stream, extravagant of life and ruinous to the morale of those who survived.

There is a Cure

How parallel to Guadalcanal has been the defense of representative, constitutional government on the home front. Deafening weapons of the Axis powers failed to destroy this republic. American ingenuity, sharpened by hope of achievement; American skill, whetted by ambition to advance; America's power to produce, fused in the furnace of open competition: These won the noisy battles.

But the same things will not cure the plague of poisoned minds. That's another problem. Helplessness, dependence on the state and false philosophies are like tropical fever—in the blood. If it has penetrated all the way to Capitol Hill, if we enact Federal law encouraging the malady, then the case is serious indeed. The fate of the Full Employment Bill will determine whether the United States is becoming imbecile.

Farm Organizations Split On See's Anderson's Plan

REPRESENTATIVES of the big farm organizations have returned from Buffalo where they held a four-day love feast and announced themselves in perfect agreement in the development of plans for co-operating in formulation of agricultural policies and programs and in major agricultural objectives.

In the first meeting they held with Sec. Clinton Anderson of the department of agriculture, they split wide open over reorganization of the Production and Marketing Administration of the department.

Secretary Anderson explained that his reorganization plans announced as effective October 1 have for their objective the elimination of "road blocks" and the formulation of a straight line of communication for the farmer and the farmer county committees direct to the department in Washington, giving the county and state committees more responsibility in the administration of their policies and decentralizing authority in Washington.

The Farm Bureau federation and the Farmers Union declare they are disturbed and fearful that just the reverse will be true under the reorganization plans, and that more power will be centralized in Washington and that the Triple A will be liquidated.

The National Grange and the National Council of Farm Co-operatives declare that the objectives of the secretary are their objectives, and how he brings about these objectives is the secretary's business; that if the reorganization plan as he outlined will do the job, they are for it. If it does not do it, they will tell him about it.

Farm Bureau's Angle

As a matter of fact, this reporter sees in the attitude of the Farm Bureau in opposing the reorganization, signs that the plan may step on the toes of some Farm Bureau friends in the department of agriculture. For the Farm Bureau has spent much time and effort in placing its friends in high places in the old Triple A organization from the top here in Washington on down the line to the state and county committees, with the Agricultural Extension service playing a major role.

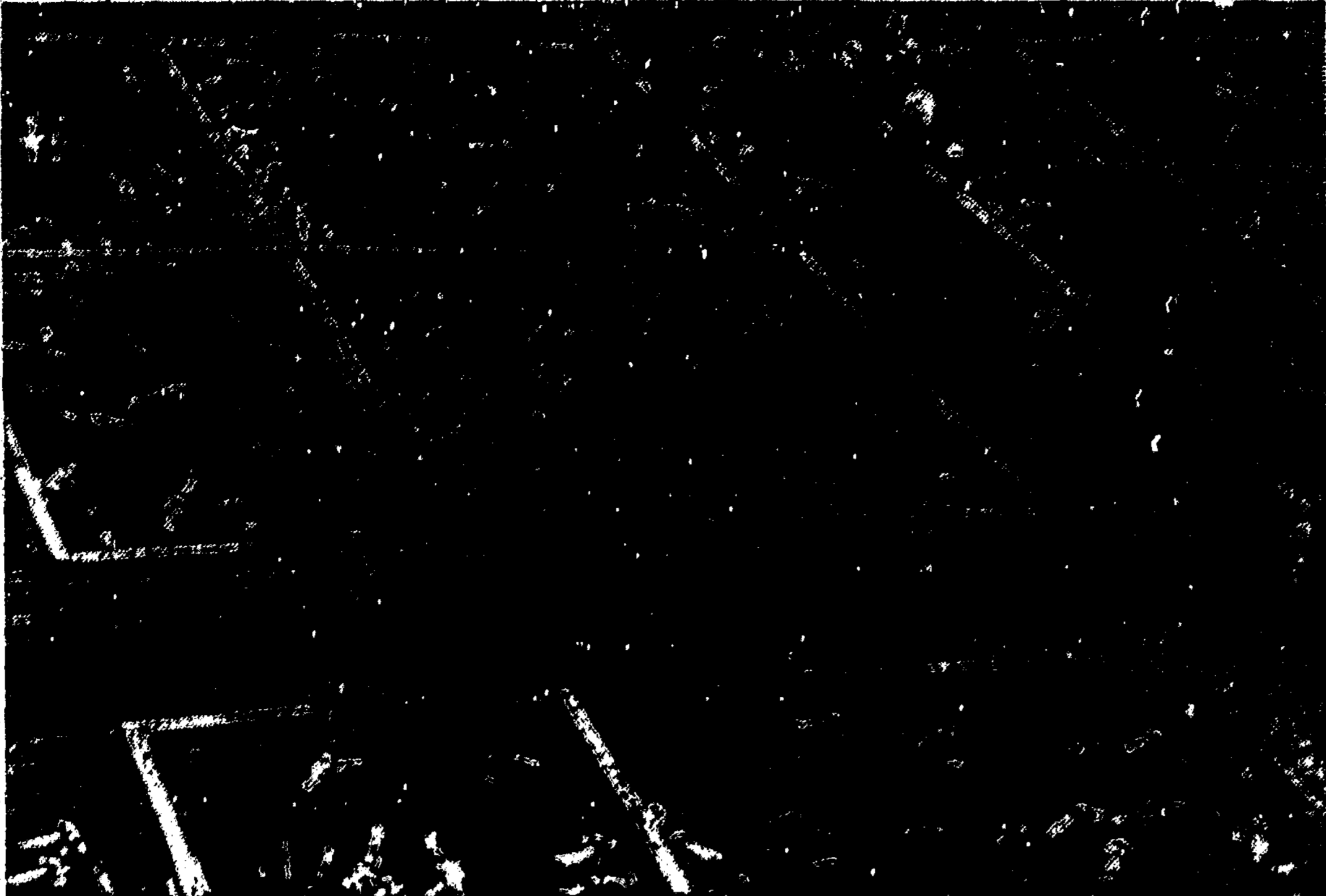
As it looks to this reporter, the secretary's reorganization plans, which follow identically the report of the Eisenhower committee, do not touch the county and state farm or committees, which are the sum and substance of the Triple A program.

In transferring certain duties from Washington to newly-created commodity branches in specific areas of operation, direct lines of responsibility are fixed to which the farmer can go with all his problems, eliminating the "middle-man" or intermediary which has proven administratively unsound in the past. What the reorganization is intended to do is to develop the policy and planning organization in Washington after consultation with farmers, with sole responsibility for function and administration in the field.

The Farm Bureau announced that it had lodged a protest with the President over the proposed reorganization, and is seeking to hold off final adoption of the plan until it can consult with agricultural leaders in congress. As a matter of fact, however, the secretary already has consulted with these leaders. The Farm Bureau also contends that taking away some of the functions of the field offices separates the responsibility for formulating overall policies and the program of administration, which it seems is one of the objectives of the secretary, and the bureau doesn't like that on the theory that it will act to concentrate rather than decentralize power in Washington.

Have Less 'Voice'? The Farm Bureau declares that under the plan the farmers will have less voice in determining their programs and that while somebody else formulates the program, the only service left for the old Triple A is administration in the field.

On the contrary, the department contends, and the grange and the co-operatives agree, the average farmer in the county committees will be in closer and in more direct touch both with policy and administration than under the previous or present system of administration. At any rate, the secretary has promised the farm organizations that the minute they prove to him that the plan of reorganization is not working out toward the objective agreed upon, he will change the operation until it does. This seems a fair proposition. In the meantime, the reorganization will release several hundred employees by the elimination of duplication of effort in the various commodity branches and when the program is completed, and no one objects to the elimination of expense in any governmental program.

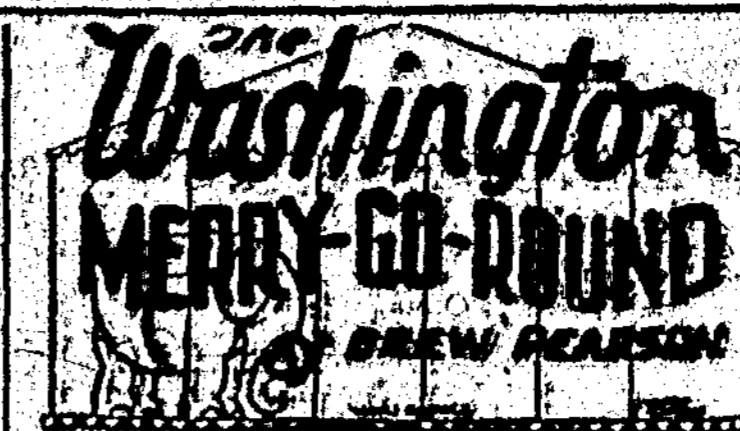

NERVOUS OVER CONVICTIONS WASHINGTON—The war department isn't saying anything about it, but General Eisenhower and Field Marshal Montgomery, both now in Europe, got nervous over the results of the Nuernberg trials.

What they didn't like was the conviction of their opposite numbers in the German army, especially Field Marshals Jodl and Keitel, and Nazi Admiral Doenitz.

Eisenhower sent some rather strong, though confidential representations back to the war department from Europe.

High-up military friends of the chief of staff point out that the Nuernberg precedent of convicting army-navy commanders for war guilt might easily become a precedent against these in command of the American army and navy.

For instance, U. S. and Canadian armies have been conducting important maneuvers in the Arctic, "Operation Muskox," calculated to defend Canada and the U. S. from an Arctic circle invasion.

What worries Eisenhower and top military men is the idea that if we should get into war with Russia and lose, they could be tried and might be convicted on the grounds of instigating aggressive warfare.

Of course, the Muskox operation is defensive, and a long way from aggression, but a war-crimes court might twist it around.

NEW WAR PROGRAM Although Hollywood strikes should keep movie mogul Donald Nelson busy, the former WPB chief is flying between Washington and Hollywood three or four times a month to work on a plan for quick remobilization of American industry in the event of another war.

Only announcement thus far is that Nelson has been asked by the President to consult him regarding which munitions plants should be kept in readiness for quick reconversion. Inside fact is that Nelson's activities have been far more extensive.

Administration leaders believe, however, that because of public impatience over continued war restrictions, it is best to censor public announcement of the remobilization preparedness program until after the elections.

The President probably will ask the next congress for what might be termed a peacetime WPB, and will offer the top job to Nelson.

WANTS GOOD ADVISERS Harry Truman has received a lot of criticism for not surrounding himself with higher type men in the White House. One reason of course is that Truman is genuinely fond of the poker-playing, joke-telling Missourians and Mississippians who are around him.

On the other hand, few except those on the inside know how hard Truman has tried to get others to join his staff. He begged Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. to become assistant secretary of the navy. He urged Bob Nathan, former brain trust for the War Production board, to become an economic adviser.

One of his most significant talks was with Isador Lubin, a White House secretary under Roosevelt. The talk indicates that Truman at times feels a sense of genuine loneliness.

In the course of the conversation, Lubin blurted: "Well, Mr. President, there's something I sort of miss around here."

"You mean," suggested the President, "that you miss Roosevelt?"

"Yes," replied Lubin. "Well, I miss him too," said Truman. From the tone of his voice you could tell that he very much meant it.

ARMYBANS BYRNES DISCUSSION The White House order against public debate of Byrnes' foreign policy has now been extended to G.I.s. This is one aftermath of the Wallace-Byrnes feud, and is a reversal of the "free discussion" policy usually followed during the war.

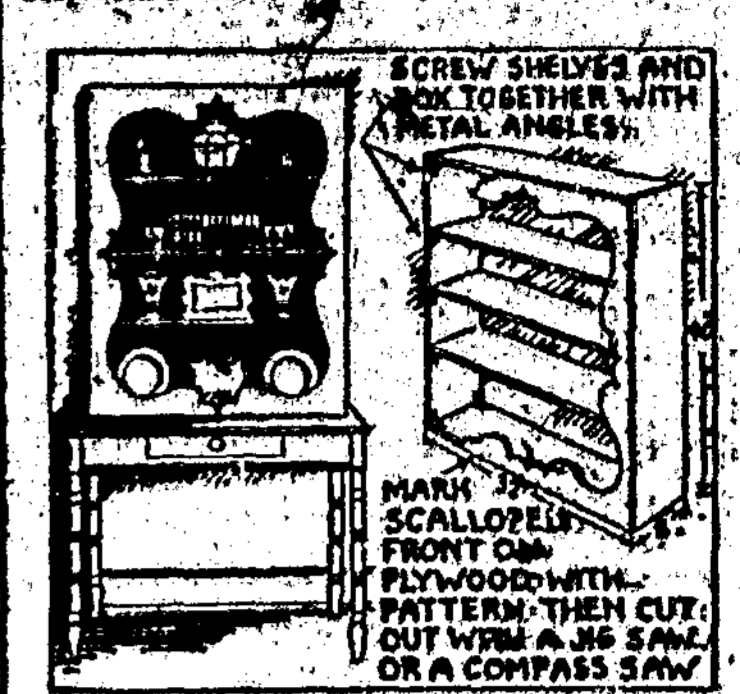
"Since Secretary Byrnes' address is an expression of government policy," the army has just ruled, "discussion leaders will take an affirmative attitude toward the policy as presented and maintain discussion within the bounds outlined for this army talk, rather than lead a debate on the wisdom of our foreign policy."

Last summer the army's manual to "the information-education officer" advised just the opposite, namely, that "the soldier may discuss matters pertaining to governmental and military policies."

CAPITAL CHAFF The state and war departments are having a private pitched battle over army plans to send a large flight of B-29's on a round-the-world tour. It looks too much like sabre-rattling. Assistant Secretary of State Will Clayton's Texas business partner, Lamar Fleming, has made a \$3,000 contribution to the Republican campaign. The state department had trouble getting reservations at New York hotels for Lt. N. Selegator, partly because of race, color and creed.

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AMINO ACID NEEDS OF DOGS STUDIES

Lack of Even One of 10 Substances May Spell

Studies of the amino acid requirements of dogs are proceeding parallel with the work being carried forward on the importance of amino acids in human nutrition, the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City reports.

Amino acids found in common foods, are just as essential as vitamins; their absence or presence determines whether a given protein food has little or great nutritional value, states Dr. W. L. Roberts, the Center's technical consultant. It has been established that 10 of the 20-odd known amino acids are dietary essentials for animals, and that the lack of any one of them causes growth failure, physical deterioration and disease. Vitamins and amino acids work hand-in-glove. Lack of A-B-C-D-E vitamins may make it impossible for the body to utilize the amino acids, while the lack of amino acids may make it impossible for the vitamins to perform their essential functions in the nutrition of the body.

While research in amino acids goes on, according to Dr. Roberts, the following suggestions by the U. S. Department of Agriculture continue to constitute a practical guide for the feeding of dogs:

"An adequate ration will keep most mature dogs at a uniform body weight and in a lean, thrifty condition. This is a very useful guide in determining the correct amount to feed.

"A good coat, bright clear eyes, and an abundance of pep are reliable indications that the ration is adequate.

"Dogs should be fed at regular intervals, and the best results generally may be expected when regular feeding is accompanied by regular exercise.

"Mature dogs are usually fed twice daily, a light meal in the morning
