**ORDINANCE NO. 53**  
BEING AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING BUILDING AND ZONING DISTRICTS WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO, REGULATING THE NUMBER AND SIZE OF BUILDINGS, THE PERCENTAGE OF LOT THAT MAY BE OCCUPIED, THE LOCATION AND USE OF BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES AND LANDS FOR TRADE, INDUSTRY, RESIDENCE OR OTHER PURPOSES, PRESCRIBING MEANS FOR OBTAINING BUILDING PERMITS, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO ERECT BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES WITHIN THE LIMITS OF CARRIZOZO WITHOUT OBTAINING PERMITS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED BY the trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, as follows:

**PURPOSE OF ORDINANCE.**—It is hereby declared to be the public policy of the Village of Carrizozo that such regulations and restrictions made in this Ordinance are in accordance with a comprehensive plan and designed to lessen congestion in the streets; to secure safety from fire, panic and other dangers; to promote health and the general welfare; to provide adequate light and air; to prevent the over-crowding of land; to avoid undue concentration of population; to facilitate the adequate provision for transportation, water, sewerage, schools, parks, and other public requirements.

**SECTION II**  
That there is hereby created and established within the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, the following zones or districts, limited, bounded and described as follows:

**ZONE A:** Commencing at a point on the North boundary line of the right-of-way of the Southern Pacific Railway Company at the intersection of the alley in Block 1 of McDonald Addition to the Village of Carrizozo; thence northerly along the center of said alley to the Northwest corner of Lot 17, Block 3, McDonald Addition; thence easterly to the Northwest corner of Lot 4, Block 10 of the original townsite of Carrizozo; thence northeasterly to the Northwest corner of Lot 17, Block 8, original townsite; thence to the Northwest corner of Lot 16, same block; thence to the Northeast corner of Lot 1, same block; thence to the Southeast corner of Lot 32, same block; thence northeasterly to the Southeast corner of Lot 30, Block 7; thence southeasterly along the westerly boundary line of 2nd street to the North boundary line of the Southern Pacific right-of-way of the Southern Pacific Company; thence southwesterly along said northerly boundary line of said right-of-way of the Southern Pacific Company to the point or place of beginning.

**ZONE B:** All of blocks 5, 6, 7, 15, 16, 17, and 28 of the original townsite of the Village of Carrizozo, and blocks 10, 11, 12, 13, 50, 51, 52, and 53, McDonald's Addition to the Village of Carrizozo.

**ZONE C:** All of the McDonald Addition to the Village of Carrizozo and all of the original townsite of the Village of Carrizozo lying northerly and westerly of the right-of-way of the Southern Pacific Railway Co., excepting such portions of said townsite as are included in Zone A and Zone B hereinabove described.

**ZONE D:** All of the original townsite of the Village of Carrizozo lying and being situated South and East of the right-of-way of the Southern Pacific Railway Co.

**SECTION III**  
That hereafter in any or all buildings or structures erected in Zone A the exterior walls shall be of brick, concrete, adobe, cinder block, metal or other equally fire resistant materials, and that no building or structure shall be erected in Zone A having an initial construction of less than \$2,500.00; and that no outer walls of buildings or structures shall be altered, remodeled or enlarged unless the materials used shall be fire proof resistant as hereinabove specified and unless the costs of the proposed change or improvement together with the present reasonable value of the old building or structure shall bring the total value up to \$2,500.00.

**SECTION IV**  
That no dwelling or other building shall be constructed within the limits of Zone B having an initial construction cost of less than \$1,500.00, and that no dwelling or other building shall be constructed within the limits of Zone C for an initial construction cost of less than \$2,500.00. That no dwelling or other building shall be constructed within the limits of Zone D for an initial construction cost of less than \$700.00; and that the outer walls to any dwelling or other building located within the limits of Zones B, C, or D shall be altered, remodeled, or enlarged unless the costs of such proposed change or improvement together with the present reasonable value of the building shall bring the total value up to the standard set hereinbefore for initial construction of buildings located in the zone where said work is contemplated. That in figuring in said construction costs, the Builder shall be entitled to figure in his work and labor at the prevailing rate paid for such labor in the community. That said construction costs shall not apply to a private garage.

**SECTION V**  
That no more than one residential unit shall be hereafter constructed on any one lot within Zones A, B, and C; that no building constructed for use as a dwelling in any zone shall be less than 12 feet from the front property line and no less than 3 feet from either side line of the lot upon which it is built; that this restriction as to distance from the front and side lines of the lot shall not apply to business buildings constructed in Zone A; provided further that the restriction that no more than one residential unit shall be built on one lot shall not apply to apartment houses, hotels or tourist courts constructed as a unit.

**SECTION VI**  
That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to commence the construction of any dwelling or building or to remodel or alter the exterior walls of any existing building within the limits of the Village of Carrizozo without first having obtained a building permit there-

for. All applications for building permits shall be filed with the Clerk of the Village of Carrizozo in such form as may be prescribed by the trustees. Said applications shall set forth detailed drawings and specifications of the proposed building and of the materials to be used therein, or of the proposed alteration or remodeling, together with an estimate on the cost of such construction, and shall be accompanied with a fee equal to one-half of one percent of the estimated cost of construction; that said application shall be considered and passed on at the next ensuing regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, and the action of the Board of Trustees on said application shall be noted in the minutes of the meeting; and that no building permit shall be issued unless the same is passed on and approved in the manner herein set forth; that upon the approval and issuance by the Board of Trustees of a permit, the same shall be posted upon the prescribed area, no change shall be made by the permittee in any of the specifications, plans or materials; that any application not in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be refused and the fee accompanying the application shall be returned to the applicant.

**SECTION VII**  
Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not less than \$50.00 or more than \$100.00, and any building or structure erected in violation of this Ordinance may be razed by the Village of Carrizozo and at the expense of the owner of the lot on which said building is erected, the same to be and become a lien on said lot and subject to foreclosure in the same manner provided for the foreclosure of municipal liens.

**SECTION VIII**  
That all ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION IX**  
This ordinance may be amended, supplemented or changed by the action of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, three-fifths of the members voting for such change.

**SECTION X**  
This ordinance may be found and examined at any time in the Office of the City Hall, Carrizozo, New Mexico.

**ORDINANCE NO. 54**  
AMUSEMENT HALLS  
BE IT ORDAINED BY the trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, as follows:

**SECTION I**  
IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL for any owner, proprietor, keeper, manager, or employee of any tennis alley, bowling alley, pool hall, ball alley, or other similar establishment where tennis alley, bowling alley, pool hall, ball alley, or other similar games are played, carried on or allowed, to permit minors under the age of sixteen years, or any pupil in any school or educational institution to play any of the said games hereinabove named or to loiter in, or to frequent or to remain in said premises belonging to, occupied by, or connected with such tennis alley, bowling alley, pool hall, ball alley or other similar place, or to engage in any games or amusements therein.

**SECTION II**  
THAT IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL for any person, firm or corporation to operate and maintain for pecuniary gain, any bowling alleys, billiard halls, skating rinks or other games or amusements on Sunday.

**SECTION III**  
Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of an offense against the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, and upon conviction thereof before any court of competent jurisdiction shall be fined not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00), nor more than One Hundred Dollars, (\$100.00), nor more than thirty (30) days in the Village or county jail, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

**ORDINANCE NO. 55**  
BE IT ORDAINED BY the trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, as follows:

**SECTION I**  
GAMBLING DECLARED UNLAWFUL.—It shall hereafter be unlawful to play at, run, or operate any game or games of chance such as keno, faro, monte, passmonte, twenty-one, roulette, chuck-a-luck, hazard, fan, poker, stud poker, red and black, high and low, craps, blackjack or any other game or games of chance played with dice, cards, punch boards, slot machines or any other gaming device by whatsoever name known, for money or anything of value, in the Village of Carrizozo.

**SECTION II**  
OPERATING GAME — OWNER-SHIP OR POSSESSION OF GAMBLING MATERIALS OR PREMISES USED FOR GAMBLING.—PENALTY.—Any person who is the owner or possessor of any game mentioned in section I, or any person engaged in operating any such game, or knowingly supplying any such game with cards or dice or other device, or who is in actual possession and control as owner, lessee or otherwise of the premises upon which any such game is run or operated, or who shall knowingly lease premises so to be used, or who having leased such premises knowingly permits the same so to be used, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, and shall be imprisoned in the village or county jail for not less than ten (10) days, nor more than thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

**SECTION III**  
WHO DEEMED OPERATOR OF

**GAME.**—Any person, or the members of any organization or club who manages, controls, banks any such game, or who takes or receives any money, chips, or thing of value of (or) anything representing value for himself, themselves or such organization or club, or for any other person from such game to buy drinks, cards or for expenses of the game, or for running such game, or for any other like or similar purpose shall be deemed an operator of such game.

**SECTION IV**  
PLAYING AT GAME — PENALTY.—Any person who shall play at any of the games of chance mentioned in section I of this act shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, and shall be imprisoned in the village or county jail for not less than ten (10) days nor more than thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

**AMENDMENTS AND REPEALS**

**ORDINANCE NO. 9, SECTION NO. 27,** requiring the owners of motor vehicles to register with the Village Clerk, etc., is hereby repealed.

**ORDINANCE NO. 42, SECTION NO. 31,** is hereby amended as follows: The occupational tax on billiard and pool tables is hereby increased to \$10.00 for the first table and \$5.00 for each additional table.

**ORDINANCE NO. 41, SECTION NO. 1** relative to mechanical music boxes or musical devices is hereby amended to read as follows: The fee for each mechanical music box or musical device shall be \$25.00 for each and every machine and or device.

Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined and or imprisoned as therein provided and in addition thereto, the City Marshall is hereby authorized to take possession of and confiscate any mechanical music boxes or musical devices for the Village of Carrizozo in all cases where the person, firm or corporation owning such machine or operator of the same has not procured a license from and paid the license fee to the Village of Carrizozo.

**ORDINANCE NO. 56**  
DANCE HALLS  
BE IT ORDAINED BY the trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, as follows:

**SECTION I**  
ANY PERSON, FIRM OR CORPORATION, desiring to operate a public dance hall continuously in the Village of Carrizozo, shall first make application to the Village Council of the said Village for such a license and file the same with the Village Clerk of said Village.

Should the applicant or applicants making application desire to operate or conduct a public dance for one night only, they may make application as hereinabove specified and if the Village Council shall have no meeting before the date set for such license, the Village Clerk shall have the authority to issue such license.

**SECTION II**  
THAT THE SAID VILLAGE COUNCIL shall have the right to refuse to issue any such license if a good cause exists why the same shall not be issued.

**SECTION III**  
THAT IF THE SAID VILLAGE COUNCIL shall vote to issue said license they shall instruct the Village Clerk, who shall issue said license to the applicant or applicants upon the payment in advance of the following license fees:

A. For operating a public dance, per night, the fee shall be Ten Dollars (\$10.00). If the dance is a fraternal or private dance or a dance for charitable purposes, the fee shall be Five Dollars (\$5.00).

B. For operating a public dance hall or any room where the occupants may dance in connection with any other business, the fee shall be One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per year, and the time for closing such dance shall conform to the closing hours of the connecting business.

C. No charge shall be made for school dances.

**SECTION IV**  
THE VILLAGE COUNCIL of the Village of Carrizozo may, when any person, firm or corporation holding a license under the provisions of this Ordinance has been adjudged guilty of violating any Village Ordinance of competent jurisdiction, revoke said license and may, in the judgment of said Council, whenever the public welfare requires, revoke any license issued under the provisions of this Ordinance.

**SECTION V**  
ANY PERSON, FIRM OR CORPORATION violating any provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined in a sum not more than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) nor more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or imprisoned for a period of not less than three (3) days nor more than thirty (30) days.

Any ordinance heretofore enacted contrary to the terms of this ordinance is hereby repealed.



**Residential Mortgage Debt For '47 to Reach 41 Billions**

**COST** of construction, purchase and credit in the housing program field by the end of 1947 will result in a net increase in the residential mortgage debt in the nation of 41.2 billion dollars, according to estimates of the Veterans' Emergency Housing administration.

Of this stratospheric figure, Expediter Wilson Wyatt says that new homes and apartments planned under the VEHA will need credit of 15.4 billion dollars and that existing homes not under the program are expected to require an additional 14.5 billions; or a total of 22.9 billion dollars for the period.

Add to this figure costs for purchase and repairs of existing homes of 8.3 billions this year and 5.5 billions in long-term new homes begun in 1945 and subtract the repayments, and you get the estimate of 41.2 billion.

While these figures seem astronomical for the two-year period, it is pointed out that in 1930 the net residential mortgage debt totaled 30 billion dollars and for 10 years during the thirties there was little home construction and some reduction in the total debt.

**Far Behind Schedule**  
At the end of the first six months of 1946 out of the goal of 1,200,000 housing units for the year, only 428,000 units had been started with 225,000 homes completed. With shortages still continuing in some construction items and deliveries still slow and fitful, it can readily be seen that to complete the task set out for themselves, VEHA has a herculean job to do.

In a recent report the housing expediter says:  
Purchase and repairs of existing houses, as well as other non-program home financing needs, will take approximately 8.3 billion dollars of lending in 1946. In addition there are 730 million dollars in long-term mortgages on new homes begun in 1945. For 1947, non-program lending requirements are estimated at 5.5 billions, one-third less than in 1946.

"Almost half of the total need of 29.9 billions will be filled by repayments on outstanding debt, allowing for advance as well as scheduled amortization. Trends for the first four months of this year indicate that a large volume of refinancing, together with sustained high income, will result in a volume of repayments in 1946 approximately 40 per cent above the 1945 volume. In 1947, however, repayments probably will return to a level near 1945.

"Subtracting those needs which will be met by repayments, the net in the home financing debt would be 15.2 billion dollars by the end of 1947, or a total net increase in residential mortgage debt of 41.2 billion dollars. Since the total net public and private debt in 1930 was 190 billion dollars and the residential mortgage debt amounted to 30 billion dollars, the estimate of 41.2 billion dollars 1 1/2 years hence is not excessive when compared with the present total net public and private debt estimate of 400 billions."

**Plenty of Money Ready**  
Wyatt points out that the needs in the home financing field, insofar as VEHA is concerned, can be met from three major sources: net increased savings of individuals in lending institutions; liquid assets held by lending institutions; and potential direct investments by individuals and the secondary credit facilities of the Federal Home Loan.

With this huge jackpot of billions of dollars in the construction industry, one would think that the "take" in the usual way would be sufficient, but government already has filed several hundred suits against lumber and material companies alleging illegal practices. These include diversion of lumber to the shipper himself at a fictitious address to be held for resale; resawing without upgrading; refusing to produce standard size and turning out oversize lumber commanding a higher selling price and requiring remilling for construction use; charging for more lumber than delivered; cutting and delivering short lengths; illegal, wholesale selling at retail prices and plain over-ricing sales, accomplished through on-the-side cash payments or similar devices.

**High Costs Feared**  
A "strong likelihood" that the current residential building boom will collapse within 12 to 18 months is seen by Ramsey Wood of the division of research and statistics, board of governors, Federal Reserve bank.

"It prices turn down before costs have overcome them, building may be curtailed, but it, as seems more likely, costs are as high as prices when the decline comes, building will be curtailed," Wood says.

**The Washington Merry-Go-Round**

**NIMITZ WILL RESIGN**  
WASHINGTON.—Adm. Chester Nimitz, hero of the Pacific and one of the most efficient leaders of the navy, has indicated to friends that he will retire as chief of naval operations after about one year, of his four-year appointment.

Backstage reason is that Nimitz finds his job chiefly requires lobbying naval appropriations, through congress, and he would much rather be at sea than playing politics. Furthermore, Washington society is running him ragged.

Mrs. Nimitz doesn't feel the same way at all about Washington society—which perhaps is one reason why the admiral wants to get out of the capital. He hates dinners, loathes cocktail parties and feels at ease at receptions. But Mrs. Nimitz loves them and insists on dragging her husband along when she makes the rounds.

Risors of war in the Pacific now have begun to look like heaven in contrast with social Washington and when the right time comes next year, the admiral plans quietly to pull out.

Note.—Grandson of a Texas hotel-keeper, Admiral Nimitz hopes to retire to Texas or the California coast.

**PRESIDENTIAL SEASICKNESS**  
Those who suffer from stomach maladjustments when they travel by sea or air will be glad to know that President Truman not only sympathizes with them but also has found a fairly good remedy for seasickness. The cure is not 100 per cent effective, however, and that is one reason the President's yacht turned south.

Mr. Truman had a bottle of seasickness pills with him on his recent cruise—a remedy concocted by the Canadian army for use by its troops when they crossed the Atlantic or went ashore in tank landing barges. It is supposed to be the best thing so far developed to cure seasickness.

The President always carries a bottle with him when afloat and eats the pellets almost as if they were candy. On his first important sea trip aboard the cruiser Augusta in Potsdam one year ago, he took this medicine along and apparently avoided seasickness.

However, Mr. Truman, born and raised on the Midwest prairies, doesn't get the same kick out of the sea as did F.D.R.

**HUSHED-UP INCIDENT**  
Tenseness of the Russo-American situation in southeast Europe is illustrated by an incident in Austria so far hushed up by the censors.

For some time, the Soviet government has been pressing Gen. Mark Clark to permit cross-examination of Yugoslav, Baltic and other displaced persons in Austria. Many of them rebelled against going back to their homelands for fear of Soviet reprisals, but some were willing to go. Finally General Clark agreed that the Soviet could send in 12 men to ask them questions.

While the Soviet team was at work with the displaced persons, General Clark was getting secret information from one of the D.P.s as to what was going on. Eventually this informant reported to Clark that he was under Soviet scrutiny.

So Clark secretly placed an American machine gun in a room above the informant's and another machine gun on the roof of the building opposite.

A night or two later a squad of Russians drove up to the informant's home, knocked down his door and carried him out in the street. Immediately the U. S. troops turned on their searchlights and arrested the Russians.

Here was the pay-off. Our allies, the Russians, were dressed in the uniforms of American military police.

**TRIGGER-HAPPY TITO**  
The question of using "horse-and-buggy" tactics to calm Dictator Tito of Yugoslavia, especially the navy's dispatch of cruisers to Trieste, has been criticized privately inside the U. S. armed forces.

U. S. warships at the head of the Adriatic, according to army men, could be caught in a trap and might be sunk with one bomb. Furthermore, the cost of operating one cruiser in contrast to an airplane is tremendous.

Therefore, U. S. army commanders in Europe have proposed that we send one or two B-29s over Yugoslavia to see what Tito's trigger-happy warriors do about it.

**ELDER STATESMAN BARUCH**  
Kindly elder statesman Bernie Baruch has made a private proposition to the state department that he be allowed to read its secret cables from diplomatic posts throughout the world. These are a gold mine of information for which any business man or banker would give his eye-teeth. Baruch promised, a little naively, that if he was given the daily secret intelligence summary of world affairs, he would show them only to his two investment-banker assistants.

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THE somewhat dusty story that a Boston club has never lost a world series contest, six victories out of six starts, five for the Red Sox and one for the Braves. This world series mop up began 43 years ago. It began when the Boston A. L. entry of 1903 came from behind to whip the able Pirates, with such stars aboard as Hans Wagner, Tommy Leach, Fred Clarke, Sam Leever, Deacon Phillippe, Jimmy Sebring and a few others. Apparently beaten, the Bostonian delegation rallied to ride home on the stout right arm and the stouter heart of Big Bill Dineen. That was victory No. 1, although the world series of 1903 was on the unofficial side.

Nine years later the Red Sox found John McGraw and his Giants in the road. This series went to eight games, where in the final spasm Giant support blew wide open as Christy Mathewson lost a contest he should have won in a common canter.

Earlier in this meeting, around the fifth inning, Harry Hooper saved the day for Boston with the most spectacular of all world series catches when he pulled down Larry Doyle's almost sure home run over the right field fence. The ball already had passed over the fence when Hooper made the miracle catch, crashing into the crowd. He must have used a net.

**Speaker Clinches Flag**  
After that Fred Snodgrass dropped Clyde Engle's easy fly to center, that popped into his glove, and then popped out again, Engle reaching second. That was a bit discouraging. But a moment later on, Matty fed Tris Speaker a slow floater and Tris lifted the ball on a high foul pop-up near first base that Fred Merkle lost. Chief Myers made a futile chase as Merkle was vainly looking in various directions for the ball. The high pop-up dropped between these two only 10 feet from first base. Then Speaker broke it up with a single, scoring Engle.

Two years later the Braves crashed into the big show by beating the Athletics four straight. Rudolph, Tyler and James did it. The famous Athletics curled up like a feather attached to a burning match. In these three world series Boston was three-up.

In 1915 the Red Sox broke back into the great white spotlight again. They lost to Alexander, one of the great pitchers of all time, and then won the next four games.

In 1916 they won the pennant again and took on the Dodgers. The main feature here was Babe Ruth's extra inning victory over Eberhard Smith. The Babe was then a great left-hander in the box.

**Ruth's Last Hurling**  
In 1918, the Red Sox returned to the post-season carnival for the fifth time. That year they whipped the Cubs where Babe Ruth, dating back to 1916, turned in 29 scoreless innings. Babe was the master of that party, his final as a pitcher before he turned to home-run hitting at Ed Barrows' suggestion. Babe usually carried the world series along with him, using his pitching or batting eye for this worthy purpose. It has now been a matter of 23 years since Boston saw its last world series.

In the last 10 years, Tom Yawkey has spent enough money to win three championships, but this happened in the era or epoch where the Yankees had too much stuff.

If it is only natural that Boston supporters are looking for another world series mop-up, making it seven in a row. This time they have the best team the home of the bean and the cod ever has sent into action. It is an even better team than the 1912 outfit that knew Speaker, Lewis and Hooper for the finest defensive outfield in baseball history. Plus Smokey Joe Wood in the box. Plus Bill Carrigan back of the bat.

The 1946 Red Sox carry baseball's two essentials — hitting and pitching. But the Red Sox road record proves that Joe Cronin's young men are far from being invincible. They are the best team in baseball, anyway, although their man-against-man selection doesn't leave any wide margin over the Dodgers or Cardinals, who also can play their share of baseball.

## Woman's World

### Smart Woman Plans Blouses To Wear with Her Fall Suits

YOU CAN feel it in the air already, can't you? Feel what? Why, that sharpness and briskness that indicate fall and winter are not too far distant in the future. Personally I like to call it "suit weather" and suits mean many blouses.

Every smart woman has at least one suit these days that she can wear for shopping, for business, or just for going out. A suit can be dressy or tailored, and just what impression it's going to give depends largely on the blouse.

Before starting wardrobe plans, check over the blouses you now have and consider wearability. Some of the castoffs might be made usable with new and perky cuffs or a smart neckline. Then you can fill in those spots that blouses you now have do not fill. Be sure to have a tailored blouse, a dressy one, and one sort of "in-between."


You'll find a wealth of new materials in the shops, provided you go early. Then, too, there's another source which possibly hasn't even occurred to you—the attic or storage closet.

#### Make Blouse Collar Fit Material, Suit

Much has been said of the importance of selecting material to fit your pattern, but this no longer offers much of a problem. Your pattern is a good guide to the material to be used. If you do a lot of sewing your fingers and eyes can quickly decide the suitability of the fabric to the pattern.

An important consideration, however, is the selection of the collar. If the suit has its own collar, then you should have a blouse with a high neckline with no collar. Or, you may have a collar that is smaller but of the same type so as to match the suit.

A collarless suit is just as much of a problem . . . for whatever



If you have an out-dated graduation dress . . .

the blouse collar, it must not clash with the suit's lack of a collar. You might choose a high-draped neckline blouse. Another idea is to have a very high neckline with a dainty ruffle, or the classic pointed collar made in two parts such as is seen on many of the tailored women's blouses.

The small double collar, usually round, is made by cutting the pattern out twice. Sew around the outer edges of the material, attaching the two pieces together, then clip so the collar can be turned easily. Be sure the seam thus created is pressed flat before turning the collar so there will be no bulging. This is attached to the blouse by means of a very narrow neckband.

**Small Stitches Make Neat-Looking Blouse**  
Collars shaped like the neckline usually lie fairly flat. Use the pattern for shaping and attaching them.


Ruffled collars should be gathered very carefully. Use a small stitch so they will gather daintily and apply them with a band, using small stitches so the collar is as neat as possible.

Collars may be joined to the blouse with a bias strip of the same material as the blouse; or, they



Make a dressy blouse from it. may be joined with a neckband. In some cases, the collar needs neither of these, the part of the collar which is joined directly to the necklines being made somewhat longer. This is then folded under and finished in place with neat, small stitches.

#### Hip Shirring



This intriguing version of a fall suit by Brownie has a double-breasted jacket softly shirred at the hips. The sleeves widen at the turned-back cuff. The material is red wool, trimmed with gold buttons.

Most people learn the ins and outs of sewing very easily, but sleeve and armhole fitting may remain a mystery to them. I've compiled some tips I consider essential for making sleeves fit properly. There's real help in them for your particular problem:

1. Lay the sleeve on the fabric, carefully. If the sleeve shifts off the grain even a little, the finished sleeve will always twist and be uncomfortable.
2. Pre-fit the sleeve pattern before cutting to make sure it is the correct size for your arms. Cut carefully after you have made the necessary adjustment.
3. Never skimp on cutting the armhole, and make sure fabric is pinned securely to the pattern so there will be no slipping.
4. Fit the sleeve at the shoulder first and make sure the sleeve hangs straight down.
5. Check sleeve darts before sewing to make sure they are in the place where your elbow goes through its scowls. Basta darts in first, fit them to your arm, and then make the final permanent stitches.
6. Make the sleeves fit the curved shape of the armhole. Never snip off a piece or try to cut off a piece if the sleeve looks crooked.
7. If you use padding, place the pads in the shoulders before fitting the sleeves.
8. Never have a blouse fit too tight under the arms as this will limit arm activity. Baste first, wave the arms around and make sure that the sleeves and armhole are just right for you before the permanent stitches are made.

#### Working with Fur

Many of us have bits of fur around the house that we like to use for trimming. This is easy to do if you follow directions.

Lay the fur on the pattern, if it is for collar, cuffs, etc., and cut as directed. If the pieces of fur are not large enough, piece them together so as not to show before attempting to cut.

Fur collars and cuffs need a lining which may be made of wool or felt, but some lamb's wool or other soft substance is placed next to the fur and covered with the lining to make the fur stand up more softly.

The edge of the felt may also be taped so that it does not tear when it is used for trimming. Sew carefully with small stitches.

#### Fashion Forecast

The accent for fall will be simplicity. You'll be seeing simply handled furs, unadorned bonnets, with plain but very elegant jewelry.

Jerseys and felts will be very popular in the hats, but they are different from other years. The difference is that they are draped so very carefully by clever designers they are really molded to the head.

Some more colors to add to your fall collection of clothes have pretty descriptive terms such as mauve pink, forest green, pearl gray, but also brilliant red and blue, and the old standbys, black, brown and white.

Many of the berets and brimmed hats you'll see are made to be worn perched quite a way back on the head.


