Achievement Test Given

A series of tests have been given from the fifth grade through the high school to determine the standing of the different grades. The results in some cases are not what we would like to see, while others proved to be above the grade level where they were now classified. The test on reading in the eighth grade shows that the lowest pupil equal to the fifth month of school in grade three, or more than four years below where they should rate. The class average in grade eight was sixth month of grade six or more than one and one-half years below where they should be. There were four students in the class that were above the level of this grade at the time the check was made. Since in the first four grades we are learning to read, and after that reading to learn, we should not be too much surprised that the grades on the report cards are not satisfactory. It is not expected that this work may be brought up to the standard when there is such a wide difference, in one year, but every effort is being made to correct this as far as possible. Poor readers that get beyond the primary grades will have difficulty in every grade, therefore special effort is being made not to have such as this occur in the future. One factor that would help in a large measure to correct just what we have found in the above grades, would be more regular attendance in the lower grades, they are getting their foundation, no building is any better than the foundation, therefore we need better foundations.

Sportlight

FOR some odd reason, proving they are new members of the magnate tribe, neither Bing Crosby nor Bob Hope has claimed any pennant for the Pirates or the Indians. As you may know both are now closely involved in the standings of these two clubs and both will need some slight improvement before they reach the gonfalon heights.

At the moment, magnate Hope already has a golf ball with magnate Crosby that the Indians finish higher up in the American league race than the Pirates finish in the National. Hope wanted to make this a box of golf balls, but Crosby demurred, recalling the spots both occupied last fall. No one can blame Crosby for this careful attitude, although he already has strengthened the Pitt roster with a player by the name of Greenberg. But after all, the Indians have Bob Feller. They also have a shortstop-second base combination in Lou Boudreau and Joe Gordon that will be worth watching.

"Joe Gordon is too fine a ball player, too strong a competitor to have another off year," Hope tells you. "Joe was just another war-athlete victim. Before that he was one of the greatest defensive second basemen in baseball history and a dangerous hitter. Like many other baseball and football players he had something of a slumping spell after leaving the army, but it will be a different story this next season. Joe is still young and in good physical shape. Boudreau is also young. He is one of the star shortstops of baseball. This pair will put on plenty of fireworks together."

Gordon's Future

We look for the same result. Gordon has been too fine a ball player and too much of an athlete to be placed on the waning list. There is a good chance that he will have one of his best seasons. Strength through the shortstop-second base position can make a big difference to any club and this Cleveland combination may easily match the Red Sox pair or the Cardinal-Dodgers outfits.

Anyway, "Hope still springs eternal in the baseball breast," where Hope is still hopeful of big days ahead.

Apparently Crosby and Hope had to find some way to keep busy and kill time. All Bing does is to handle a big radio job, make motion pictures, do a world of recording and put on golf tournaments. All Bob Hope does is work on radio, make pictures and appear at practically every luncheon and banquet function along the west coast. Now they are in baseball. It might be remembered that only recently in tournament play, Bing shot a 75 at golf while Bob is around 78 or 80. If word gets out they are likely to spend most of their rounds signing autographs.

Both are red hot baseball fans and both hope to drop in on their respective teams when spring training starts. Bing's Pirates have a long way to move before crashing the first division. The Cardinals and Dodgers are the first two road blocks. The Cubs will be better, and probably luckier than they were last season. The Braves and Phillies will be stronger teams. So will the Giants. If Bing had a pitching arm, the Pirates could use that better than his golf swing.

Eagle vs. Lion

No matter how you may figure it all out, the two top international rivals in sport are the United States and Great Britain. They remain the two great sporting nations of what we call the world today.

In all fairness it must be admitted that England and Scotland are outnumbered by United States about 3 to 1, so the odds should belong our way. But without England and Scotland there would be no international competition. Not with Russia, not with France, Italy, China, Japan, Germany or Britain. It could be different with Sweden and Finland in distance races.

The point is that the British Isles provide the U. S. their only competition at this date. By that I mean that England and Scotland can supply their share of trouble in golf—including the Walker cup matches next May. They may even win this test if the winds come up and the rains arrive.

British Golfers

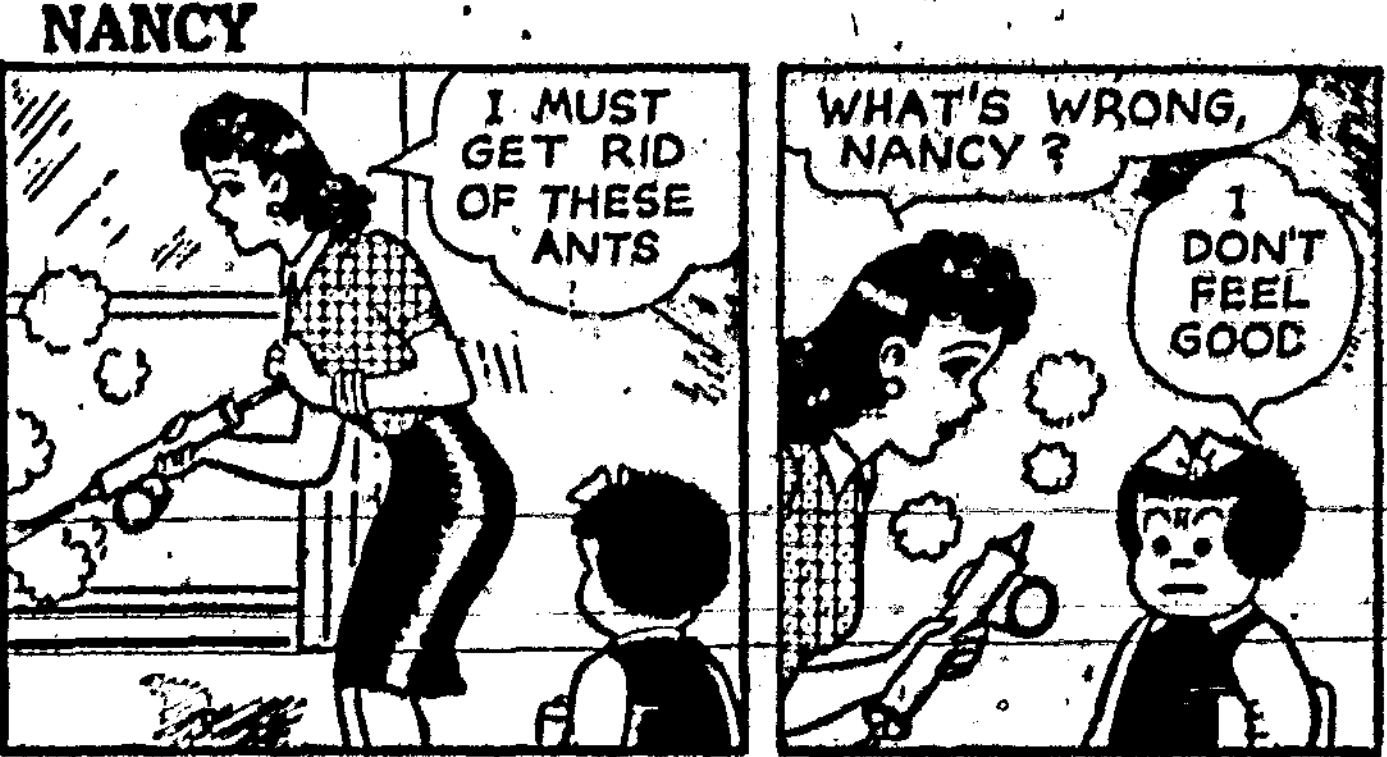

Woman's World
Colorful New Curtains Give Needed Tonic to Many Homes.

By Erta Haley

THIS is the time of year when many a homemaker gets the urge to do something "different" to her home. I've even heard of this feeling taking expression in such drastic steps as changing the whole layout of furniture, or in buying new things that put big dents in the budget.

Most of us can't afford this big dose of tonic, so I'm going to tell you of a simple way to add a new feeling to the home and to give yourself a lift at the same time. You'll find that simply adding new treatments to the windows will give you just the touch of freshness you're seeking.

First, here's a tip about selecting a color. Study the room carefully and try to pick up one of the colors in your furnishings or wallpaper which you've neglected. Then see if this can't be made up into the window treatment.

If, for example, you want to use sheer curtains in a creamy white or ecru shade, don't give up the idea of using color. For a treatment such as this, you might make a frame for the window out of wall board or plywood. Incidentally, this is a nice trick for making narrow windows look more luxurious. Paint the frame in an attractive design and run it down to the floor; if the window is short, run the frame across the bottom. Prepared trimmings which are self-pasting also may be used to decorate the frame, if you are not handy with a brush.

Treating Windows to Let Light Come Through

Most rooms could use a bit of good old sunlight, and window treatments can be made to encourage the sun peeping through them. In this case you must make use of sheer curtains which will permit light to come through, but drapery material that is heavy and patterned also may be used to enhance the treatment. If you want to let in a lot of light yet give the impression of the window being draped, hang sheer curtains from top to bottom. Then use an extra pair of sheer curtains and hang them in a drapery pattern

letting them overlap. Use interesting colored tiebacks or knobs for a dash of color.

If you have short windows, hang them with short, sheer curtains, but don't stop there! Have a cornice in an attractive color, and then pipe drapery material which has been set on the sides of the window with the same color you have in the cornice.

Or use a cornice made of a pleated or gathered drapery material and let the material of extra draperies go at the edges of the window.

Another treatment that is very smart employs sheer curtains, but a colorful chintz is added to the cornice, and a deep border of the same chintz is used to border the glass curtains. This gives a room a very finished appearance.

Tailored Curtains Best for Some Rooms

Perhaps you have a desire to convert your bedroom from a thing of frilly ruffles into something more

tailored, but still neat and feminine appearing. A smart, unique solution for this is to whip up full length curtains made of eyelet embroidered material. This may be tinted one of the attractive pastels. Put a strip of embroidery bordered with

the plain across the cornice and hang floor length panels of solid colored drapery material. Three panels make a nice looking treatment, a panel at each side and one down the middle.

If you have a room in the attic with small windows, you can have an inexpensive treatment for them by using feed, sugar or flour sacks dyed to match the color scheme of the room. Use short tailored curtains and run them across the windows. Place a cornice of ruffe at the top of the windows in a contrasting, darker shade than you have used for the curtains themselves.

Making stubby windows appear longer is a trick that some of us need at one time or another. A cornice is the easiest way to do this as it creates the illusion of height. If you use sheer curtains and draperies both at the window have enough of the drapery material so that you can cut the two complete patterns from the drapery and paste these on either side of the cornice.

Another simple way of making the window look longer is to use a cornice and have the top and sides piped or painted, with material picked up from the room, a dark, solid color is best. Then pipe the curtains with this same material where they come together and at the bottom.

Window Sewing Tips

When you are sewing tops and hems on sheer curtain material, place a tissue paper underneath the material while sewing on the machine to prevent it from puckering or pulling. Simply rip off the paper when you are finished.

Unlined draperies need four inches of material for the heading and five inches for the hem. Be sure to add these measurements to those for the length of the window.

You may save time basting window draperies and curtains by marking off the stitches with a single straight line drawn with chalk. Be sure to use a flat surface for this, however.

Make certain machine is adjusted properly for different thicknesses of sewing material by testing first on a scrap of the material you are using. Saves time and stitching.

To make tailored curtains, pleat sheer material and use a fringed cornice treatment for interesting effect.

Reinforce the heading of your draperies with a 3/4-inch width of crinoline. This will help draperies hang better and prevent heading from slipping forward and exposing the rods.

Eagle vs. Lion

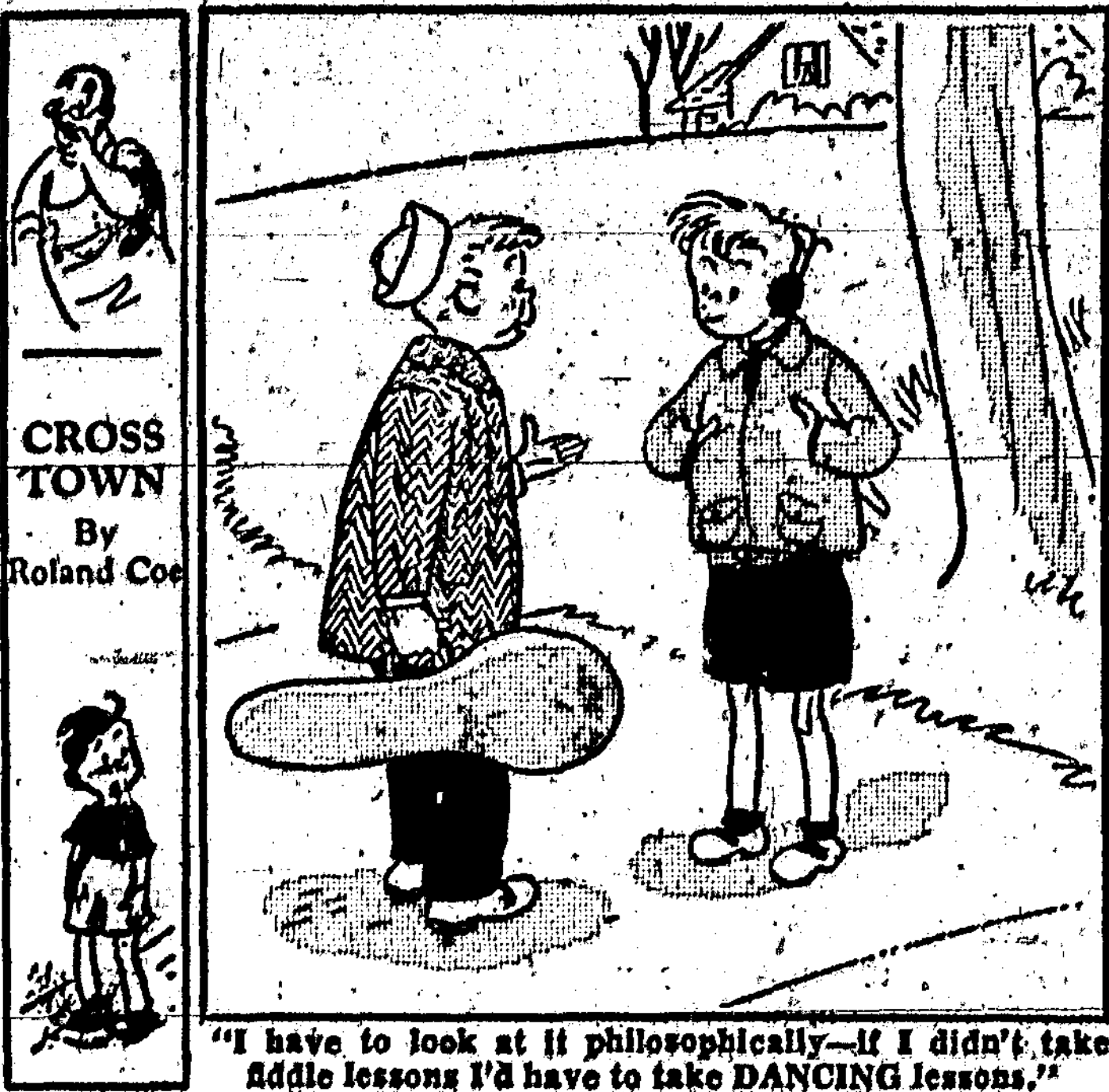
No matter how you may figure it all out, the two top international rivals in sport are the United States and Great Britain. They remain the two great sporting nations of what we call the world today.

British Golfers

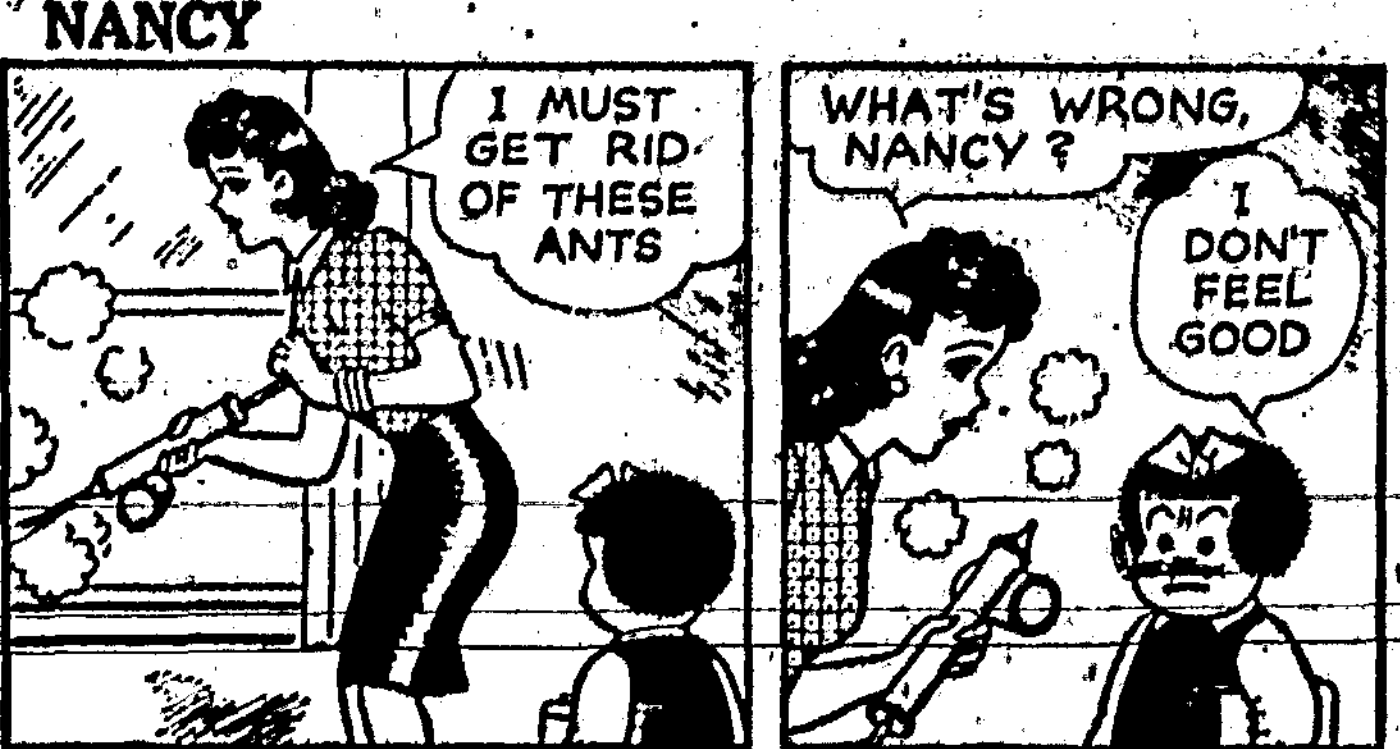

Good Farm Wiring Is Held Essential

Expensive to Pay for Preventive Power Loss

"Anything less than good wiring on the farmstead is not only a serious bottleneck to successful use of electricity, but usually causes dissat-



isfaction and needless expense in the use of electricity for anything beyond lighting and minimum power uses," William A. Ritt, Minneapolis, Minn., declared at the national farm electrification conference.

In planning the wiring for a farm, Ritt declared, the average farm must be considered as an industrial plant, a production and processing plant for products. The greater the degree of processing performed on any farm, the greater is the return in terms of farm income, he explained.

No matter what efficient equipment the farmer may employ to arrive at more complete and profitable electrification, its successful operation depends upon a good wiring installation.

Larger capacity service entrances, heavier conductors to farmstead buildings and also for serving the higher horsepower motors now being used, an increased number of circuits and more attention to balancing loads among the various circuits, are among the outstanding needs of farm wiring systems today, Ritt said.

Leaders in both parties are demanding economies in government; a simplification and condensation of government activities; a return to conditions under which the people are masters of government rather than government being masters of the people; a return to the conditions where what we pay is to provide the cost of the real functions of government. If we are not to be drowned in the flood waters of ever increasing government costs, we, the people who pay either directly or indirectly, should support that demand for such simplification as will lead us back to something like the 1913 model of government activities.

UNBIASED INFORMATION WANTED

WE HAVE had in the past, and probably will have in the future, cabinet officers who are more interested in promoting their personal conceptions of government than in carrying out the expressed instructions of congress, the direct representative of the people. Such men cannot be depended upon to give congress unbiased information. The legislative branch should have its own corps of experts to dig out the information it needs in enacting needed legislation. Authority for the creation of such a force is a part of the LaFollette-Moroney act, passed by the last congress. It was popular at the time of its enactment. It would prove an unpopular move should the present congress ignore, or repeal, that measure. The people do not want their representatives to depend upon prejudiced sources for information.

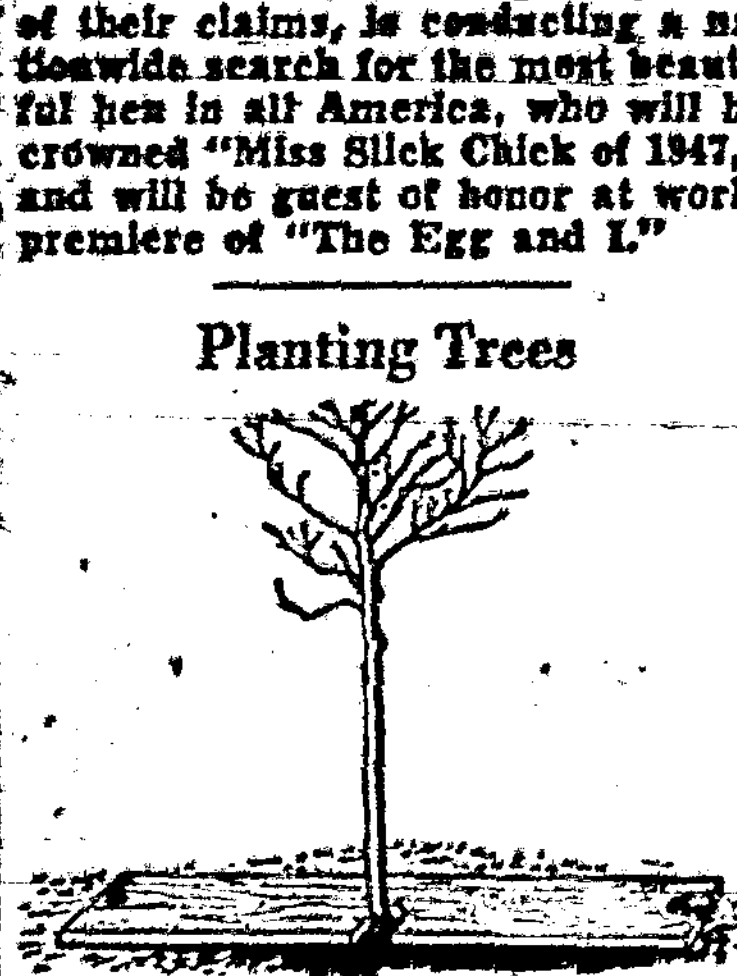

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT COSTS 25 TIMES AS MUCH AS IN 1913

AS LATE AS 1913, within the memory of a large portion of our present population, federal government expenditures were less than one billion dollars. To be exact they were only 692 millions.

To be sure, at that time we were not paying interest on a colossal national debt, nor were we maintaining an army of a million men or the world's largest navy. Neither did we have the intricate and complicated system of government we have today. We paid taxes for the support of government, but not to support ourselves as individuals. We were not financing social reforms for the benefit of those unwilling or unable to support themselves.

Those of us whose memories carry back to that 1913 period will recall that we had a satisfactory government. It provided all the essentials. It did not attempt to regulate each individual's activities. It did protect us against the depredations of the criminal element, and from being gipped by monopolies. It provided federal courts for settling our differences. It provided assistance for schools and for road building. It paid the pensions of many thousands of Civil War veterans, then alive. It policed our borders. It did everything that we believed necessary for the federal government to do.

When, a year or two later, the appropriations made by congress passed the one billion dollar total, what a howl was raised! The extravagance of congress was roundly condemned.

ONLY 34 YEARS AGO.

That 692-million-dollar year of 1913 was only 34 years ago. In that 24 years government profligacy has grown to where, in 1947, more than 37 billions is asked for the operation of government. Subtract from that sum the interest on the government debt, some 5 billion dollars; the upkeep of our present army and navy, some 8 billion, and we still have 24 billion as the proposed cost of operating the federal government for one year.

That 24 billion plus is more than 25 times the cost of that satisfactory government of 1913. That excess cost must come out of what we produce.

It takes from the farmer 25 times the amount of the produce that was taken in 1913; from the worker 25 times the amount from his pay, and on through the long list of those who do the paying for government, which is all of us.

Leaders in both parties are demanding economies in government; a simplification and condensation of government activities; a return to conditions under which the people are masters of government rather than government being masters of the people; a return to the conditions where what we pay is to provide the cost of the real functions of government. If we are not to be drowned in the flood waters of ever increasing government costs, we, the people who pay either directly or indirectly, should support that demand for such simplification as will lead us back to something like the 1913 model of government activities.

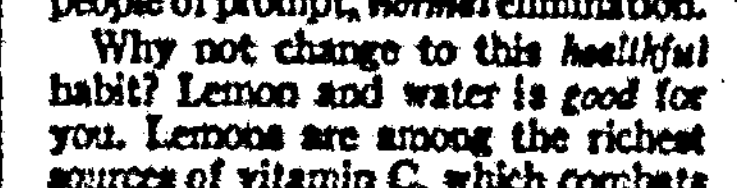
