WE HAVE been reading lately, from something like a dozen spring training camps, about the number of amazing rookies that

have come along. This happens every spring. It has been going on for some 50 years.



It is only natural that it should be this way, for the rookie is usually young, keen; ambitious and thinks only in terms of today, The veteran has to think in terms of next summer, as he nurses his waning arm and none too certain legs.

- Spring, is the rookie's happy hunting ground. It would be a wonderful thing for the game if they all could make good, but as one veteran manager told me lately-"All

I can ask for is one, or maybe two.

That would be a big average." So far the Dodgers and the Glants scem to have discovered the loading rookie phenoms. But if-either team can start the new season with two reckies who are good enough to win a job away from some regular, they will be two lucky ball clubs.

Now and then you hear about "another Cobb" or "another Ruth." Suppose we check back on these two famous names.

Cobb reported to Augusta in the Sally league in 1904, where he batted .237 in 37 games.

I was working in Atlanta that year and I heard no great uproar about Cobb being "another Wagner." Ty's best press agent was Ty.

Ty joined the Tigers in 1905 where he batted .240 in 41 games that season and there was no overwhelming chorus about coming greatness. He jumped to .320 in 1906—and from then on it was something else again-.377 in 1909, .385 in 1910, .420 in 1911 and .410 in 1912.

Ruth Known as Pitcher

In 1914, Babe Ruth's fame belonged to pitching. No one had anything to say about his hitting. In 45 games with Baltimore and Providence, that 1914 season, the Babe batted .231. My record book shows that he hit one home run that year. . In his first five years as a pitcher with the Red Sox, the Babe averaged slightly over .300 with no great home run record. That came later.

Frank Frisch was no terror when he broke into Client ranks, right out of Fordham in 1919. In 54 games that season with the Glante he his only .236. Not so hot for a rockie, even one just out of college. But McGraw still had full faith in him and the Fordham Flash moved up · is 200. A year later, in 1921, he was up to .311, winding up un one of the great second basemen of all time. Maybe not the greatest-but up among the best.

Hank Greenberg batted only .214 with Hartford in 1930. He moved up to .290 with Beaumont in 1932. Butche reached .301 with Detroit in 1033:

The greatest pitching rookie that I recall was Grover Cleveland Alexander. Reporting from Syracuse to the lowly Phillies in 1911, Alex won 28 games his first year. He was rookie you dream about.

"The second year is the big test," Frank Frisch tells me. That's the test for the hot rookie and the young fellow moving up. Good rookles often fold up after a good first year. They take too much for granted. Some slower starters can press them a mile in the second season. Smarter fellows with more hustle,"

This new season may be packed with exceptional rookies, facing G.I. veterans who were not too hot last year. It will be an interesting study to see how they come along.

There was certainly no Babe Ruin around last season. There was no Ty Cobb. There was no Jack Domenoy. There was no Jim Therpe, no Knate Rockne, no Bobby Jones and no Waker Hagen.

My vote for 1946 would go to Stan Musial, the best all-ground beseball player-Glenn Davis, the best all-around football player-Assault, the best horse, and Ben Regan, the best golfer.

It takes the high mark of competition to make a top performer and Musial, Davis, Assault and Hotook the lead

PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN **BROTHERHOOD**

LESSON TEXT—John 17:1-11. 28-23.

MEMORY SELECTION—And now I am no more in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to thee. Holy Father, keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given me, that they may be one, as we are,—John 17:11.

The voice of the Son of God lifted in audible prayer! What could be more sacred and more blessed? He who had by act and example taught his disciples loving service (John 13), and had spoken to them words of comfort and assurance (John 14-16), now prayed for himself, for them, and for us.

While he spoke most intimately with the Father as his only begotten Son, he prayed aloud that his disciples might hear his prayer and join with him in it.

This prayer is often called the high-priestly prayer of Christ, and rightly so, for here the "one mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus" (I. Tim. 2:5) spoke as "the High Priest of mankind who begins his sacrifice by offering himself to God with all his people" (Godet).

First we find that he prayed for himself as he spoke of

I. Salvation Finished—Then Glory with the Father (vv. 1-5).

He looked up and sald, "Father," that was all. No struggling, no pleading, just the recognition of his own divinity, his intimate and unique Sonship to God. Throughout this entire prayer the same close relationship is found. It was not as we would pray "Our Father," but "Fa-

Jesus was the Son of God. Yes, he was and is God. He and the Father are one in blessed eternal, infinite unity. But as he is in the Father, we who believe are in him. So the poet well says:

> "Near, so very near to God. Nearer I cannot be. For in the person of his Son I am as near as he."

This divine Redeemer, who laid down his glory when he came to earth (Phil. 2:7, 8) to be a Saviour, was now ready to take up that glory again. He spoke of the work of salvation as completed—for in his obedient soul the death on the cross accomplished.

Now he was ready for the Father to glorify him even as he had glorified the name of the Father. That prayer was answered, and Christ now gits at the right hand of the Father in heaven. What a glorious Saviour we have

His prayer was soon turned to those who had believed in him. They were precious to him, for they were given to him by the Father. II. Out of the World-Then Kept

by the Father (vv. 6-11). There is something powerfully assuring to the believer to read the words of Jesus which declare that these who had believed on him had been given to him by the Father. > Note that they were taken "out of the world"-that does not mean that they left this earth. They lived here as we live here, but they were delivered from that evil world power which opposes God.


> Some professed Christians who find their greatest delight in fellowship with the Christ-rejecting world had better read carefully here, for it appears that the one who is truly in Christ is not "of the world."

> These disciples had to remain in the world (though they were not of it!) and they needed to be kept. Now that the earthly ministry of Jesus was to be brought to a close, he tenderly placed them anew in the Father's mighty hand. Again we say, what could be more blessedly secure than that!

We must note that our Lord had a special interest and prayer for his own. Verse 9 obviously does not mean that he is not interested in all mankind. He died for them (John 3:16). But here his prayer was for his own, and in that prayer the world was left out. That makes us feel still more assured in him. He, the blessed Son of God and only Saviour, prayed for me, for your

The closing words of verse 11 reach out into the third petition of our Lord, as he prayed for their III. Unity in Christ-Thou Testi-

meny to the World (yv. 20-23). The verses between the foregoing division and this one (vv. 12-19) are important. Our Lord was concerned about the hatred of the world for these who had received the Word of the Father, and yet he would not have there taken out of the world. They were to be his witnesses even as we are to be in our day. They mast remain in the world; but below one in Christ and sendlined through the tripiti, they were to be kept for







HELPS ON HANDLING PUPPY IN NEW HOME

"Paper Breaking" During Winter Weather Urged by Dog Research Center

people, especially children, receive pupples as gifts. The following suggestions by the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, are intended to simplify and facilitate the establishment of a puppy in his new family circle.

Before planning a deg or puppy an a gift, the denor should assure himself that it is wanted; that it will have a good home; that it will receive proper care; that there is someone in the household willing to take full responsibility for the animal's wolfare.

The giver should also consider the type of dog most suitable for the recipient. For a lively child, a bumptlous, frisky dog is indicated, whereas a little girl might prefer a small, quiet dog. The environment in which the prespective pet is to live should also be considered. For city apartments amail or medium-sized dogs are best, but in a country home a large dog would not only have room for exercise but would also furnish welcome protection.

When a puppy is purchased from the breeder or original owner it is

where to ask for instructions which seed in detail how often the puppy should be fed, what type of food he is assessiomed to getting, and directions for preparing any formula he should have. Another useful thing which should come along with the puppy is an instructive book on the general care of dogs. This will be separally appreciated by the prospective owner who has had no previous experience with a dog.

A check-up should also be made with the breeder or raiser on whether the puppy has been wormed or not and if any further treatment will be necessary. If worming is in order, it is a job for the veterinarian. Medicine which is drastic enough to eliminate worms is of necessity a potent drug which may prove harmful to the puppy when administered by an inexperienced dog owner.

It is well for the recipient to remember that a young puppy is really

But we didn't get to go. The missus was tired after working in the yard, and we just didn't want to leave her.





Rising Tide of Divorce Alarms Nation's Leaders*

IS THE family unit in the Home Towns of America on the way

The answer to this question has economists, government and business leaders, and religious leaders here in a state of alarm, as well it might. For the family unit, bound together by ties of love, by religion, by patriotism and the pride of community and country, has been and still is the foundation and backbone upon which we have built this republic. And family units are breaking up at an alarming rate.

Look about you in your own community. You will find that, on the average, one out of four marriages are ending up in the divorce courts, and the trend is upward.

In 1946, for instance, there were more than 2,300,000 marriages and more than 600,000 divorces, or a ratio of 26.1 per cent. While the percentage of divorce to marriage generally has been on the upgrade steadily since 1887, government figures reveal today that the impact of the disruptive forces threatening the solidarity of American family life is greater in times of high income and consumer spending than in periods of low income.

In the depression years of 1921 and 1922 following World War I, diverces numbered 159,560 and 148,815 respectively. In the lush years of 1938 and 1939, diverces jumped to 195,930 and 201,468 per year. During the depression years of 1932 and 1883 the divorce rate dropped to 160,-238, for 1932 and 165,000 for 1933. Helrever, in the prosperous era starting in 1949, divorces skyrocketed to 264,000, and the number of diverges and ratio to marriages have been increasing each year to the record high in 1966.

Debte and Divorces

Economists point to the fact that consumer spending and a spurt in individual debt totaling some six billion dollars were factors in the increase of divorces last year. They also point out that the trend of personal deht is in marked contrast to the wartime pattern, which shows that in the three years following Pearl Harbon personal debts of the people were reduced by 5% billion dollars both by voluntary payments and as a result of credit restrictions. So the total individual debt declined from 39.4 billion dollars at the end of 1841 to 32.7 billions at the end of 1944. The reverse started in 1945 with a debt gain of one billion dollars for the year and picked up momentum during 1946 so that at the and of the year the debt increase totaled 6% billion, or equaling the reduction of the three war years.

In view of the apparent relation of divorce to economic depression and well being, and the apparent conclusion that money manusement in the home is one of the cause of divorce, leaders here profess to see in the constant striving for higher income, for easier and higher living standards, a cause for the breaking down of moral flore and the breeding ground for selfishiness, greed, intolerance and other indications of moral turpitude which eventually lead into the divorce courts. Church leaders, too, point out that in time of great prosperity there is a falling off in religious fervor and a rise in times of stress,

Loss of Confidence

Economists and psychologists point to a growing indifference and lack of reverence for our traditional institutions, even for government itself-a lack of confidence and security in our business, industrial, isbor and governmental leadership. and they declare that there is a vital need for a re-instillation of the ideals, the traditions and the handsmentals of our American democracy. a rehabilitation of the rainds and hearts of our people in the constitution, the bill of rights, the Declarasion of Independence.

They insist that there must be a routing out of the influence of Commusicula teachings both from the religious and seconsis atendesist and, at the same time, there must also be the pradication of the ponbestration of contrabation power and moneyoly, which is equally as avi Creat an escapanic standardat.

These are all factors which loadare here declary have a bearing. the the solderty of American

GREEK SITUATION SERIOUS WASHINGTON,-Impartial diplomats returning from the Near East report that the American dilemma

in Greece is even more serious than the long-faced story which General Marshall gave to congress. They report:

1. That the Greek countryside is now almost wholly in the hands of Grock guerrillas, a sitnation almost as bad as when the Germans held the towns and the Greek guerrillas ruled the countryside,

2. That half a million extra people have fled to Athens to escape guerrilla fighting.

3. As a result of the veritable civil war and the influx into the cities, the fields have not been cultivated nor crops collected.

4. If British troops were withdrawn, the government of King George II would fall almost overnight

Unquestionably Communist agents from Yugoslavia and Albania have been pouring men into Macedonia and to some extent into Greece proper; so that if the British army were withdrawn, the risk of a Communist government in Greece is consider-

fact that the overwhelming majority of the Greek people probably 70 per cent-are conservative, homeloving farmers who want to be left alone by both extremes. Essentially they are individualists and democrats-bitter enemies of Commu-

Furthermore one out of every eight Greeks has been in the United States or has relatives here. Their real ties are much more with the United States than with Russia or England.
