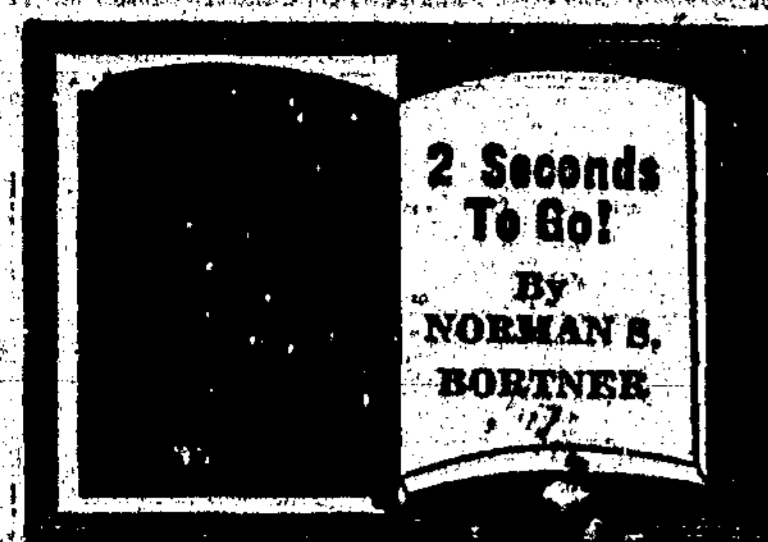

NOT ONLY SCENERY

Rain Forests, Cliff Cities Show Diversity of Parks

"National Parks" has become a synonymous phrase for superlative scenery, but there are also many other diverse interests represented in the national park system of the United States.

The Olympic mountains are known to thousands of veterans of World War II who returned to Puget sound ports from the Pacific theaters. From far out at sea these glittering snowy peaks were the first welcoming sight of home.

Mount Olympus, nearly 8,000 feet in height, and a score or more of other ice-capped mountains are included in the 1,325 square miles of Olympic National park.

Occupying the heart of a great peninsula, this park is surrounded on three sides by water, the Pacific ocean on the west, the Straits of Juan de Fuca to the north and Puget sound on the east.

There are many miles of foot and horseback trails in Olympic National park and a motor highway encircles the peninsula. From this main highway other roads radiate for short distances into the park.

IN THE CORNER of Colorado where the Rocky mountains meet the arid highlands of the Southwest there rises a high flat-topped table-shaped mountain.

PLATT NATIONAL park, containing bromide and sulphur springs, is located at the town of Sulphur, Okla. Small in area, this park is known chiefly by these for whom the waters are prescribed.

VIRGIN FOREST . . . Large spruce trees abound along Hek river in Olympic National park, one of the finest unspoiled wilderness areas in the country.

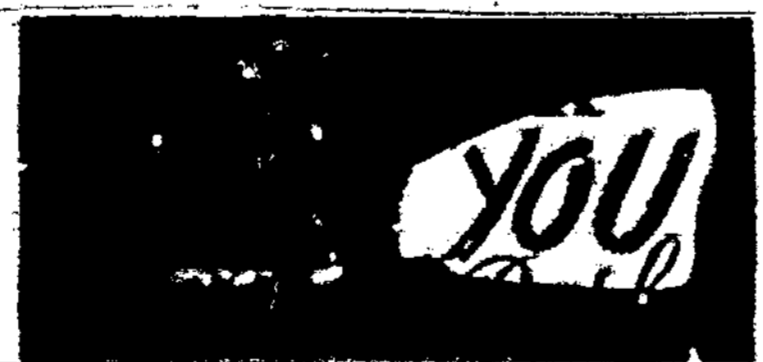

Cash Premiums Offered in Livestock Department at 1947 N. M. State Fair

Cash premiums offered in the livestock departments of the 1947 New Mexico State Fair total \$29,482.00, Leon H. Harms, fair manager, announced. This is an increase of about 30 percent over the total offered in these divisions for the 1946 fair. The livestock premium total is approximately three times the \$10,000 annual state appropriation for State Fair operation, Harms pointed out. Entries in the senior livestock classes are open to the world.

This year's premium budget for livestock places the New Mexico Fair in the class with the major national and regional livestock shows and larger state fairs whose appropriations for the

coming fall shows range from \$20,000 to \$60,000 with the Grand National exposition at San Francisco's Cow palace leading with \$77,000, including a large rodeo purse. The New Mexico Fair's livestock premium budget does not include a \$6,000 appropriation for its annual rodeo.

"Our largest premium increase in the several livestock divisions for this year has been in the dairy cattle classes," Harms said. "Total cash awards being posted for the dairy breeds exceed \$5,000.00 We have been able to make this increase through cooperation of all major national dairy breed associations which are adding from 15 to 20 per cent to our allotment from their treasury. We are receiving the usual added premium money
