

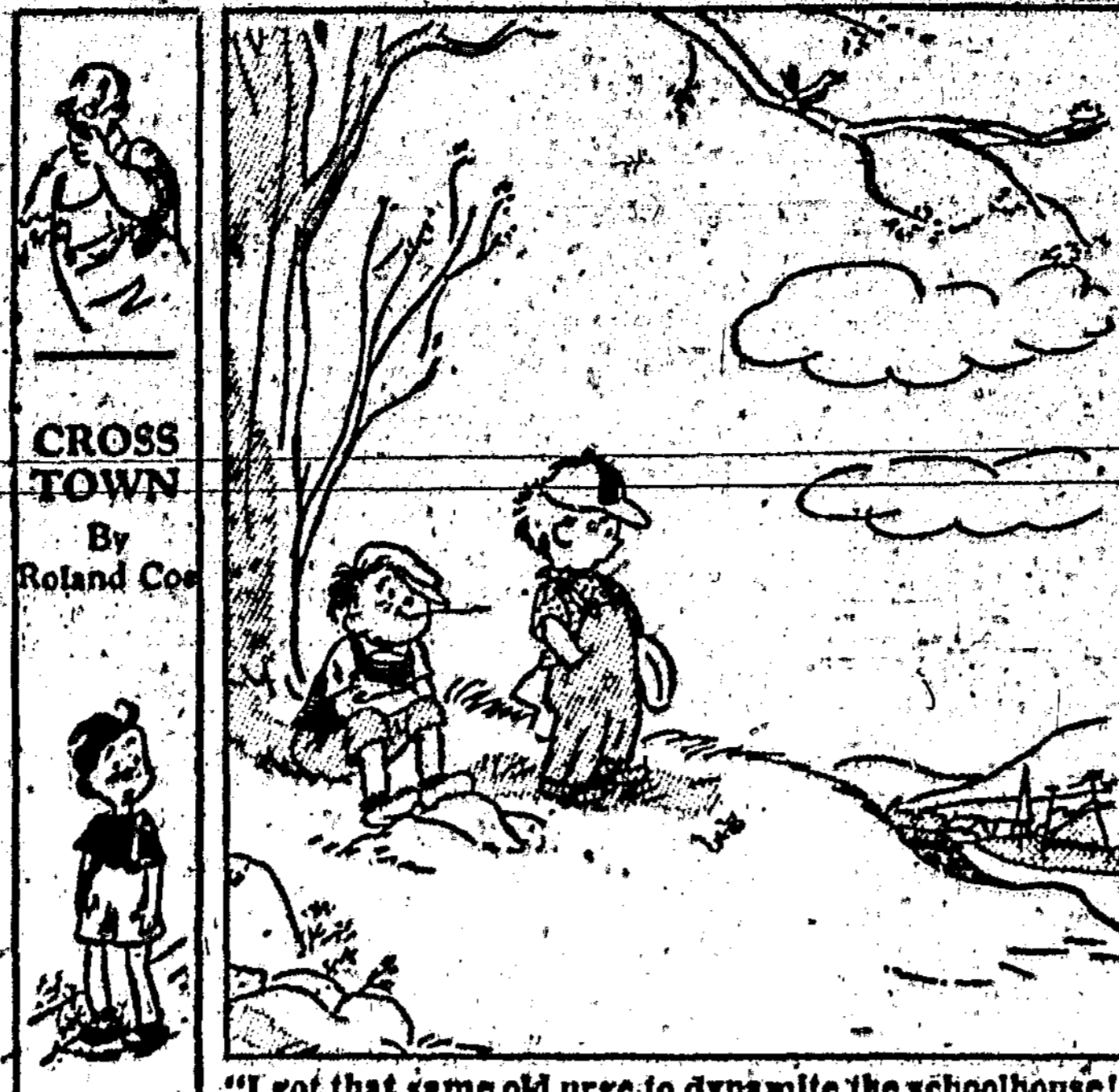

Cultivating Good Will

LESSON TEXT FOR SEPTEMBER 14-18: Proverbs 3:30, 31; 19:1, 19; 22:24, 25; 26:18, 21, 22; 26:20, 21; Matthew 5:9; James 3:17.

IT IS true that the Christian life gives offense on occasion. When a controversy exists between men and God, the Christian has no other course of action than to align himself on God's side.

The Bible nowhere commends a critical spirit or a perverse attitude. It rather emphasizes the necessity of firmness in the course of right, a firmness that loses nothing of its intensity through being tempered in the fires of love.

The Christian beyond all others should give himself to a life manifesting sympathy, kindness and charitableness. Thus he will open avenues of opportunity, of wisdom, and of service in which the Lord may be greatly magnified.

I. Contributing Factors to the Making of Good Will (Prov. 3:30, 31; 22:24, 25; 29:18; 26:20, 21).

VARIANCE and strife mar good will (Prov. 3:30, 31). Notice that this strife is uncondemned. When we strive with men to no purpose; when men have not harmed us, and with bitterness of spirit we turn upon them, we of course forfeit every opportunity to influence them for good.

The man of variance similarly should be passed by. We are not to emulate him; we are not to envy him; we are to choose none of his ways.

A wrathful spirit also mars good will (Prov. 22:24, 25). A man of anger is not to be followed by the child of God. This passage enjoins us to have no friendship with such that we shall learn their ways and their ways will then be a snare to our souls.

Another way in which we mar good will is to be the purveyors of untruth (Prov. 25:18). The false witness is characterized as a large hammer or a sword or a sharp arrow, for he wounds his neighbor, often grievously.

The man or the woman who in gossip has maliciously wounded another loses all opportunity to influence him for God. The cultivation of good will involves the speaking of truth.

Let us with all diligence, with the help of God, banish from our hearts and minds all of these attitudes which hurt and mar.

II. Contributing Factors to the Making of Good Will.

IN THE first place, the soft answer of the controlled spirit will establish good will (Prov. 15:1, 18). The soft answer does turn away wrath. The man who is slow to anger appeases strife.

Let us not confuse a soft answer with an unconvincing one; or with that mealy-mouthed procedure that we commonly call "double talk." Happy is that man who knows how to present the truth convincingly, who can make men, despite his opposing standards, understand that he has their good at heart. Of course, there is one absolute requisite to such a testimony, and that is a life wholly lived for God.

Another factor in making good will is the act of kindness (Prov. 25:21, 22). This passage, you will remember, is quoted in Romans 12. Here is the opportunity for us, in all matters of personal injury, to place our case in the hands of God rather than to seek revenge. By such acts of kindness, as we trust God, we shall be obeying the Lord; and who knows but that our enemies may thus be turned to him.

A third contributing factor in making good will is that of making peace (Matt. 5:9). So often this business of attempting to make peace is a thankless task, but that thanklessness is only from human sources. So far as God is concerned, he has placed his seal of approval upon every child of his who seeks to lead men into peace with God and to make peace between men.

God speaks of them as being "called" sons of God. It is one thing to be a son of God; it is another thing to be acknowledged as a son of God.

III. The Source of Good Will (James 3:17).

THAT wisdom will be characterized by purity, peaceableness, gentleness, approachableness, mercy, and will be without partiality and without hypocrisy. This wisdom which is from above is guaranteed to those who have been made up of wisdom (1 Cor. 1:30).

### University of New Mexico To Have Memento of Ship On It's Campus

A memento of a gallant ship, the U. S. S. New Mexico, will have a permanent place on the University of New Mexico campus in Albuquerque, Capt. Joel Newsom of the University NROTC unit, has announced.

The eight foot diameter wheel of the ship, which is now in the NROTC headquarters in the University stadium building, will be mounted and placed on the campus, probably near the stadium, Capt. Newsom said.

The New Mexico was decommissioned and scrapped at the Boston Navy Yard in May, 1946, after 28 years of service. She was commissioned on May 20, 1918, and was on her shakedown cruise in the Caribbean area when the first world war came to an end, and during the period between wars, she carried the flag of many Fleet and Force commanders.

The 35,000-ton New Mexico really showed her strength in the second world war, however. In 1941, after taking part in the neutrality patrol, she was recalled to base and refitted with anti-aircraft battery of 8 five-inch dual purpose guns as well as many 40 mm and 20 mm guns. She was also assigned three aircraft of the latest battleship type.

In her career in the second world war, the New Mexico saw action in the West Coast defense unit, fired her first offensive shot during the Attu operations, was in on the bombardment and occupation of Kwajalein-atoll, bombardment of Kavieng, New Ireland, bombardment and occupation of Tinian, bombardment and occupation of Guam, and the support of landing operations in Saipan.

Twice during her career, once while covering landing operations in Lingayen gulf, and once while covering operations ashore at Okinawa, the New Mexico was hit by kamikaze planes and severely damaged. Though badly crippled in the Okinawa action, she downed at least eight more planes after being hit.

She was back in the fighting trim within three months after her battering, however, and became part of the occupation force which entered Sagami bay on Aug. 27, 1945, after the Japanese surrender.

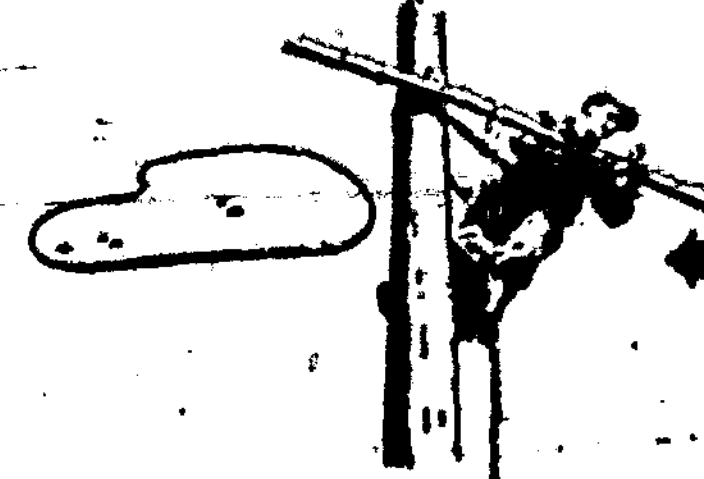

### Eligibility Rules for High School Athletics

To represent a school in this Association in any athletic contest a pupil must be eligible under the following rules:

Sec. 1. He shall be a regularly enrolled day school student of the eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, or twelfth grade who carries a regular program of school work. No student below the eighth grade shall be eligible.

Sec. 2. He shall be under (20) years of age at the time of any High School athletic contest including State and District Tournaments with the following exception allowed: If at the opening of a semester he is still nineteen, he shall be allowed to complete that semester of eligibility.

Sec. 3. He shall not compete for more than five seasons in any branch of athletics, no more than one of which shall be played while he is enrolled in the eighth grade nor more than four of which shall be played while he is enrolled in high school. A student shall become ineligible after eight semesters of attendance in high school (grades 9 to 12, inclusive), the last four semesters of which must be consecutive. Enrollment in and attendance in any part of the semester shall be regarded as a semester under this rule.

Sec. 4. He shall not have played on any college or university team. No student shall be permitted to participate in both high school and college athletics during the same school year though this is not to be construed to cover practice games or regularly scheduled games of any one of the higher institutions in this State.

Sec. 5. He shall not have been graduated from any four year high school course or its equivalent nor shall he have gone through the "motion" of graduating by appearing with his class in commencement exercises or otherwise appearing before the public as being graduated from a high school.

Sec. 6. He shall be doing passing work in at least 15 hours of his high school work per week; that is his grades shall be such that he would receive 3 units of credit, one of which must be academic, on the permanent records of the school if the time of issuances of the eligibility certificate was the time for the recording of credits. If he is an eighth grade student he shall be doing passing work in three-fourths of his work.

Sec. 7. He shall, unless he is entering upon secondary school work for the first time, have credits on the school records for 15 hours of school work for the previous semester; that is, the last semester during any part of which he is a member of any high school. In case his record for said semester is incomplete due to sickness or death in the immediate family or any legitimate cause he may petition the Board of Control, the Principal or Superintendent of the school which he attends. Such petition shall consist of a complete record of his attendance in high school, his grades by semester and by periods of said semester recommendations from the Superintendent, and an affirmed statement from and Principal and a per-

ent or guardian of the cause of the incomplete record. Such petition must be filed with the Secretary-Treasurer 14 days prior to the time said student wishes to participate in athletics and in no case shall he participate unless he has been granted permission by the Board of Control through the Secretary-Treasurer.

Sec. 8. He shall be an amateur, one who has used and is not now using his knowledge of athletic skill for gain which also includes that he shall not have received nor be receiving his expenses (room, board, books, clothing etc.) of attending school for his athletic skill.

Sec. 9. He shall always have contested under his own name.

Sec. 10. If a pupil changes school game on any other team than the team representing his own school without previous written consent of his Principal, he is ineligible from the date of such match game through a period equivalent to one whole semester. All of this shall be made up of time in which the pupil is in actual attendance in the high school.

Sec. 11. If a pupil changes school during the semester after having been enrolled in one school, he shall not be eligible until he has attended the new school of entry twenty days after his enrollment in that school; and not then unless a transcript of his credits and grades has been received by the new school and this new transcript shows that he was eligible in the old school before he was transferred; nor then unless transcript be accompanied by a statement from the Superintendent or Principle of the old school in which the writer states that this student didn't leave school because of trouble, and further that he is satisfied that this student was not induced to change schools by any official connected with the new school.

Sec. 12. Any pupil entering school for the first time that semester after the first day of the fourth week of school shall not be eligible to participate in an athletic contest on any team however designated shall meet all requirements of the eligibility rules of the Association.

Sec. 14. Any student entering a New Mexico High School from another state, shall be ineligible for high school athletics in New Mexico if he is permanently ineligible in the state from which he comes.

Sec. 15. No student shall be eligible to participate in high school athletic contests representing a school unless his parent, guardian or legal guardian or adopted parent shall have established bona fide residence in the district in which the school is located. When more than one school is located within a school district, a student transferring from one school system to another in that district shall be ineligible in the new school until he has been in attendance one year, and rules existing in our Constitution and By-Laws which are contrary to this rule are hereby repealed. Approved by vote of member schools 48-21.

Residence with a guardian, legal guardian, adopted parent, boarding school, or any person other than his natural parent shall be established for ONE calendar year before a student may become eligible in the district in which his guardian, legal guardian, adopted parent, boarding school, or person other than natural parent resides and then only after petitioning the Board of Control which will decide on the merits of the case; provided that the guardian, legal guardian, adopted parent or boarding school during the fifth grade shall be accepted in lieu of natural parents.

In the event residence is established with a person other than a natural parent and the student wishes to change to some other than his natural parents, residence must be established in the manner and case petitioned a second time.

Sec. 16. All petitions made to Board of Control for obtaining eligibility of a pupil must conform in full with the requirements of Section 7, and ten copies of the petition must be made out and filed to the Secretary-Treasurer, forwarded to the members of Board of Control for their consideration.

Medical and Dental Program Expanded By Veteran Administration

One of the Veterans Administration's most important services, is medical care for ill and disabled veterans. The National network of modern, well-equipped and properly staffed hospitals is moving gradually from the planning to the operational stage. There are 124 hospitals now operated by the VA, including a number of temporary buildings declared surplus by the Armed services. Ninety new hospitals are in the planning and early construction stages, when these are completed a more satisfactory distribution of VA hospital facilities will exist in the United States.

In addition to thousands of veterans treated in VA hospitals, the out-patient service has expanded during the past two years to permit home town treatment of service connected disability cases. More than 154,000 veterans receive treat-

ment each month under this program. Under a similar dental program 45,000 veterans are receiving dental work each month, included in the types of medical service offered veterans are: surgery, prosthetic service, TB care, clinical laboratories, dental service, and general medicine. Last year there were 1,250,000 veterans X-rayed for signs of TB. This insures early diagnosis and prompt treatment. Medical rehabilitation is offered disabled veterans, for those who wish to take advantage of it, a complete academic program has been organized. Veterans who wish to take advantage of this free medical aid are urged to contact Mr. Edward Kinsall in Room 200, City Hall, Roswell, Telephone 1661 in an emergency.

# HOUSEHOLD MEMOS

by Lynn Chambers



Serve Chicken for Economy's Sake  
(See recipes below.)

### Chicken Cookery

According to the Commodity Index, which records the rise and fall of wholesale prices, poultry today is selling at prices we were paying in 1929. Needless to say, this means that at a time when other foods have soared, poultry is at a low level.

With a favorable supply and price, you can plan to use a lot of poultry now, and give your family something of a treat with unusually prepared chicken dishes.

Chicken should be cooked to "fork tenderness." There is little excuse for underdone or overdone chicken if you follow the recipes given today, with particular care to temperatures and time for the cookery. A moderate temperature is best to use for chicken so as not to shrink it too much, make it dry or tough.

Most people who like chicken say there's no better way to cook it than to fry it. The generally accepted method is as follows:

1. Rub seasoned flour into pieces. For each pound of chicken, blend 1/4 cup flour, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and scant 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Save left-over flour for gravy.
2. Heat enough fat in a heavy skillet to give a depth of about 1/2 inch, using any desired fat. A drop of water should sizzle when temperature of fat is just hot enough.
3. Start meaty pieces first, slipping less-meaty pieces in between as chicken browns. Avoid crowding; use two skillets if necessary.
4. As soon as chicken begins to brown, about 10 minutes, reduce heat, and cook slowly until tender, 30 to 60 minutes, depending on size of pieces. Cover tightly as soon as it is a light, uniform tan.
5. Turn 2 or 3 times with 2 spoons or fork and spoon to brown and cook evenly. Avoid piercing with fork.
6. Add 1 or 2 tablespoons water before covering, especially recommended if pan cannot be covered tightly, or if bird is heavier than 3 pounds.
7. Uncover last 15 minutes to re-crisp skin if desired. The liver and precooked heart, gizzard, and neck may be floured and browned with chicken the last 15 minutes.
8. Lift fried chicken to hot platter. Prepare gravy in pan drippings.

### Huntington Chicken (Serves 6 to 8)

2 cups macaroni  
1/2 tablespoon butter  
1/2 tablespoon flour  
1/2 cup cream, scalded  
1 cup cream cheese  
2 tablespoons pimiento, finely cut  
1 cup hot chicken broth  
2 cups soaked chicken, diced  
Salt  
Pepper  
Cook macaroni. Make cream sauce of butter, flour, and cream. Add cheese, pimiento, and chicken broth; mix. Add chicken and macaroni, add seasonings. Pour into buttered casserole. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 to 45 minutes.

### LYNN SAYS: Know Cookery Terms For All Recipes

To bake means to cook in an oven at a required temperature. Use an oven regulator or an oven thermometer if you have no other control.

To blanch means to dip in boiling water, usually for the purpose of loosening the skins.

To brown means to fry in a small amount of fat and to serve with a sauce.

\*Chicken Chop Suey with Mushrooms (Serves 6)  
Cooked meat from 4 lb. fowl  
2 tablespoons fat  
1 cup sliced onion  
1 cup shredded carrot  
3 cups diced celery  
1 green pepper, shredded  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 scant cup chicken stock or water  
1/4 to 1/2 pound mushrooms  
1 cup sour cream  
4 tablespoons flour  
4 tablespoons water or stock  
2 tablespoons soy sauce  
3 cups boiled rice or fried noodles

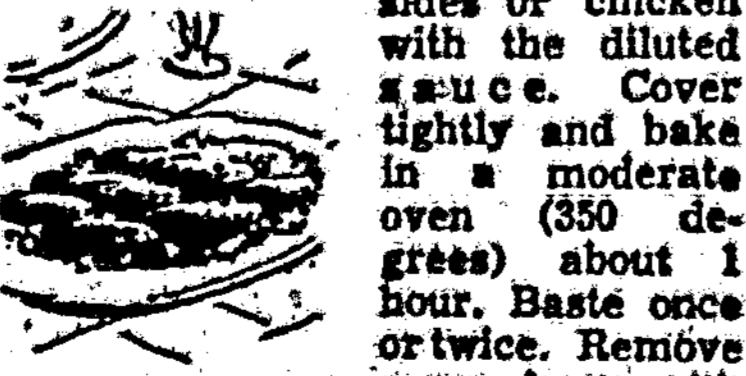
Cook onion in fat until light yellow. Add carrot, celery, green pepper, salt, and the 1 cup water. Cook until vegetables are barely tender and liquid is fairly well absorbed, about 15 minutes. Add mushrooms, sour cream and chicken pieces and bring to a boil. Blend flour and 2 tablespoons water and stir into mixture. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Season to taste. Add soy sauce or serve it at table. Serve "bubbly-hot" with hot rice or fried noodles.

**Barbecued Chicken (Serves 2 to 4)**  
1 young chicken, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pounds cut in half  
Giblets and neck  
**Barbecue Sauce**  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon garlic salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1 tablespoon paprika  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1 medium onion, finely chopped  
1 cup catsup  
1/2 cup fat  
1/2 cup giblet stock or water  
1/2 cup lemon juice or vinegar  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Clean and cook giblets by simmering in seasoned water for 1 to 2 hours or until tender. Prepare Barbecue Sauce by blending salt, pepper, paprika, and sugar in saucepan. Add onion, catsup, fat, and water. Heat to boiling. Remove from heat. Add lemon juice and Worcestershire sauce. For basting during cooking, blend 1/2 cup sauce and 1/2 cup giblet stock. Set aside remaining sauce for serving with cooked chicken.

Place neck and halves of chicken in skillet or Dutch oven. Baste both sides of chicken with the diluted sauce. Cover tightly and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) about 1 hour. Baste once or twice. Remove cover, baste with diluted sauce and continue cooking uncovered until chicken is tender and browned, about 1 hour.

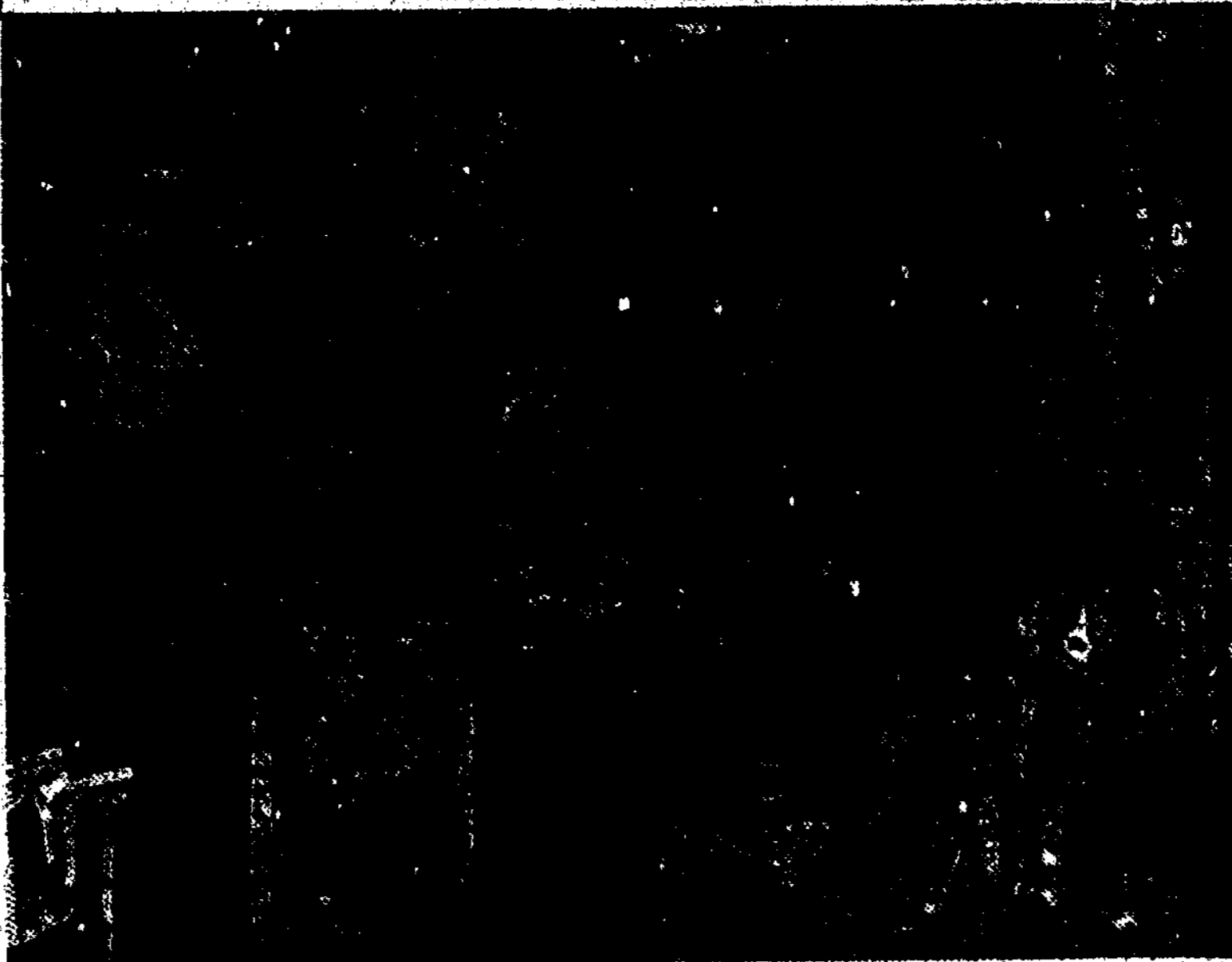

To pan fry is to cook in shallow fat in a skillet. This is sometimes called sauteeing.

To broil or grill is to cook over or under a clear fire or in a broiling oven. Do not pierce broiled foods with a fork or they will lose their juices.

Creaming means letting food stand at room temperature until it is softened and then working with a wooden spoon or an electric mixer until it is creamy. The phrase is often used of butter.

## Country Store Museum Is Replica of 1880 Emporium

WESTON, VT.—Walk into the Vermont Country Store here and immediately you are transported back into grandfather's day. For the Country Store, housed in an ancient building with hand-hewn rafters and with its shelves littered with an amazingly heterogeneous display of goods, is an exact replica of the 1880 Vermont emporium. In structure, fixtures and merchandise, this unique country store museum is typical of the general store which grandfather knew in his youth.

Although the present Vermont Country Store dates back only to June, 1946, its predecessor of the same name originally was founded at North Colais, Vt., in 1837 by Gardner L. Orton. This store later was moved to Weston, and it was in this same location that Vrest Orton, son of the founder, reopened the old-fashioned cross-roads general store in the summer of 1946.

Background of the store is authentic, most of the fixtures coming from the store of the original founder. Other fixtures were presented by nearby Vermont storekeepers interested in the project. While the building itself, constructed in 1823, and the fixtures are as old-fashioned as it is possible to make them, the country store museum is not a dead, lifeless affair. On the old shelves and counters Orton has stocked a varied display of goods as would have been found in his father's emporium a half century ago.

The place is redolent of mingled odors of spices, kerosene and cattle feed, while dim lights are a reminder of long bygone days. Revived also around the old, high, wood-burning stove under the hand-hewn rafters is the old country store forum where people gather to express their frank opinions on subjects ranging from local politics to the state of the nation.

The Vermont Country Store is more than a typical museum. Orton's experiment in a day when the stereotyped, chain-store, slot machine atmosphere prevails in grocery stores, may have far-reaching implications, for he is re-introducing the old-fashioned storekeeper's policy of knowing thoroughly the goods he was selling.

This type of store, Orton explains, makes it possible once again "for people to enjoy the experience of going into a store."

Nearly 30,000 people visited the novel store museum last summer and fall, and even larger attendance has been recorded during the present season.

### Rural School Pupils Pass Up Desserts To Aid War Victims

NEWTOWN, PA.—As a memorial to alumni who lost their lives in World War II, pupils of George rural school in Bucks county have launched a project to aid pupils of two German schools. Recipients of the aid are the Gertraudenschule, a girls' school in Berlin, and the Jacobi gymnasium, a school for boys at Dusseldorf.

Pupils are voluntarily sacrificing their mealtime luxuries to provide food, clothing and other necessities for the 800 German school children. Pennies saved by skipping ice cream and dessert are contributed to a special relief fund.

During the first six weeks of its operation, the relief chest amounted to \$1,319. Collections included regular contributions as well as money saved by giving up some item on the menu.

### Future Teachers Instructed in Makeup

NEW YORK.—Although it may not solve the teacher shortage, the City College of New York believes it has taken a step in the right direction by teaching students of education how to dress, fix their hair and make up their faces for the classroom.

A series of lecture-demonstrations was devoted to teaching the students how to look like, as well as be, up-to-date teachers. To conclude the series, students staged a style show, modeling classroom and other clothes for teachers.

these items are included in CARE's standard food package. Meats, sugar, milk, egg powder, chocolate and coffee are also included in this 22 pound package designed to help feed a family of four for a month.

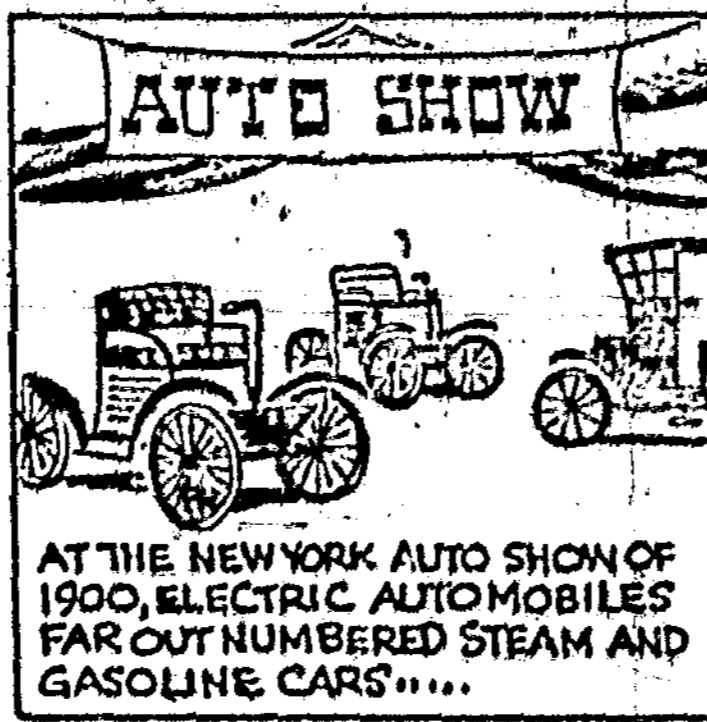

Tickets for the big game will go on sale for Sun Carnival members in El Paso County and for residents outside the county on Oct. 15. These purchasers will have their requests honored in order of their receipt starting immediately.

Tickets will be \$5, \$4 and \$3 each according to their proximity to the field. Checks or money orders should be mailed to Southwestern Sun Carnival Association, P. O. Box 95, El Paso, Texas.

Any member or out of county purchaser may take as many tickets as he or she wishes. Only stipulation in there will be no reservations for anyone. All orders for tickets must be accompanied by cash, check or money order. This special sale will be conducted for two weeks at the end of which period the sale will be thrown open to the public.

In the past all seats have been sold out almost immediately after the public sale begins.

The directors of the Carnival explained the preference extended to out-of-county residents on the basis that they represent many important supporters of the Carnival, who otherwise would be at a grave disadvantage in purchasing seats to the game in competition with El Paso county residents.

The Carnival now has approxi-

mately 350 paid up members at \$10 each within the county. Some 180 firms at \$25 each also have joined.

### APPLICATION FOR NAVAL ACADEMY APPOINTMENTS

Applications from enlisted Naval Reservists for appointment to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis will be received until November 1, 1947, the Navy has announced.

Appointment of 160 qualified Naval Academy is authorized annually. Enlisted men in the Naval Reserve and Marine Corps with the following qualifications are eligible to submit applications.

Requirements included: Applicant must not be less than 17 years of age or more than 21 years of age on April 1 of year appointed. Must be a citizen of the United States. (For personnel who have served honorably for one year during World War II, the age limit is raised to 23 years.)

Enlisted reservists must be attached to or associated with an or-

ganization of the Organized Reserve, having attended a minimum of 27 drills during the period of 1 July 1947 and 21 April 1948.

Physical requirements and regular Academy entrance examination are also required of the applicant.

Applications for the appointments must be made via Commanding Officer of the Bureau of Naval Personnel. Complete information concerning the appointments for enlisted Naval Reservists and Marine Corps Reservists may be obtained from the nearest Naval Reserve Armory or Naval Recruiting Office, officials said.

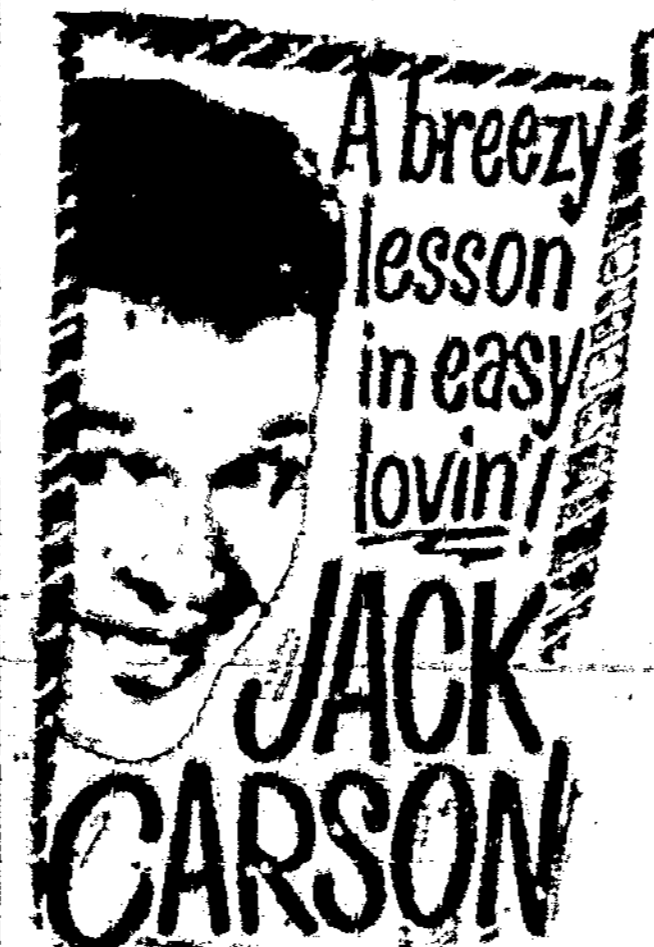

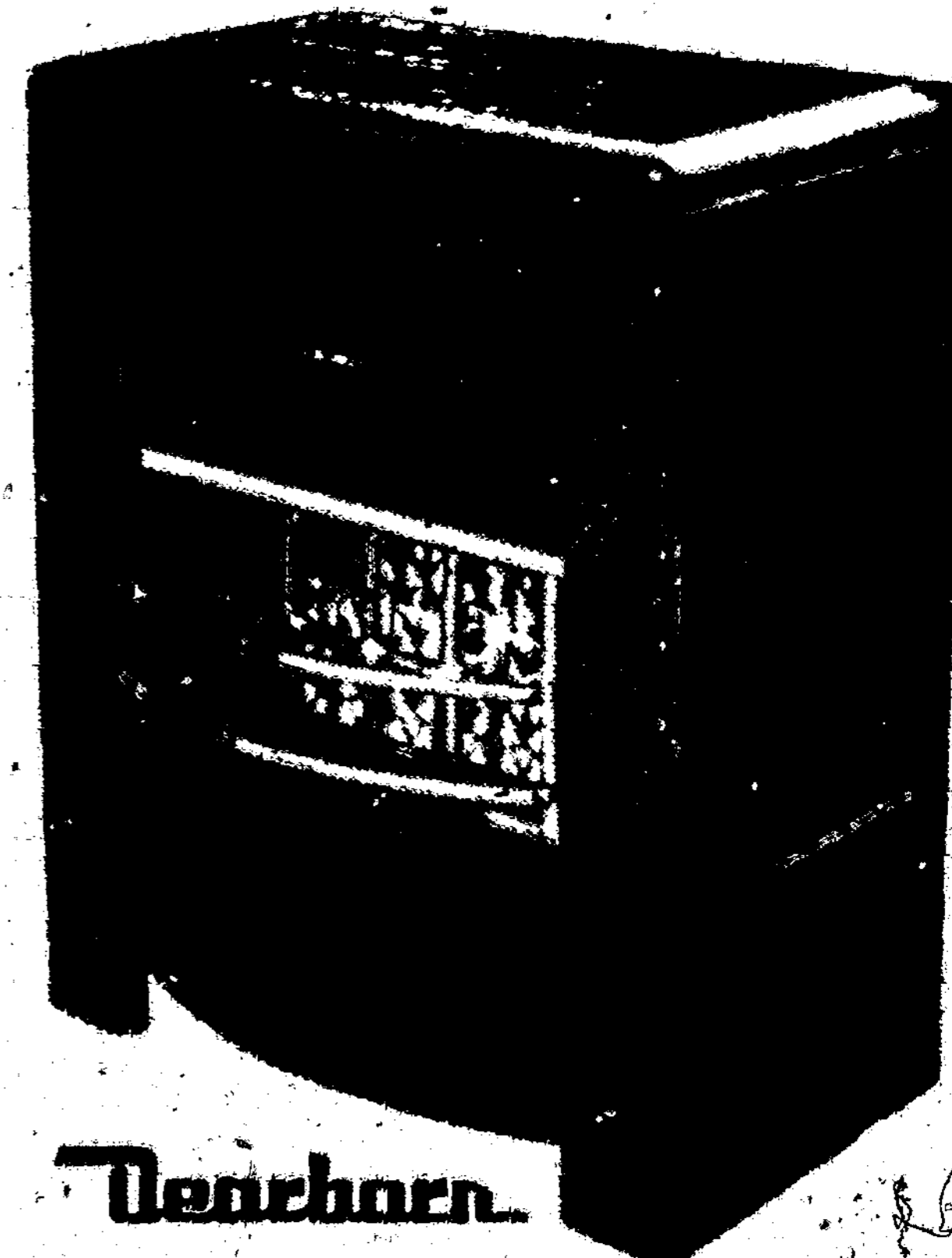
