



"He is breaking down the beerlers; He is casting up the way; He is calling for his angels To build up the gates of day;

But his angels here are human, Not the shining hosts above; And the drumbeats of his army
Are the heartheats of our love,"

BREAKFAST BY THE LAKE D EAD John 21:1-14 for the exquisite account of Jesus appearing to his disciples in the early morning at the sea of Tiberias. They had been toiling all

WHAT IS ETERNAL LIFE?

QUNDAY'S lesson leads us on to I the answer to the question, What, is eternal life? In Colossians 3:1-4 and 12-17, we have the declaration, "Your life is hid with Christ in God. . . " If we have believed on him - cast ourselves in implicit trust into his keeping - we have eternal life, which is his gift to every believing heart.

Paul goes on to admonish those who have "entered into life etermal," through faith in the riven, risem, reigning Saviour, to put on the garments of his presence and power and peace - kindness, humility, meekness, long-suffering, forbearance, forgiveness.

The evidence of eternal life is to be found in the fruits of the Spirit in our daily lives.

CERTAINTY OF ETERNAL LIFE WE READ in John 17:3 this word of further assurance, "This is eternal life, that they know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent." And in I John 5:11-12, we read,-"And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life."

In another passage John fells that we know that we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren.

Easter is the day of eternal hope. It lifts above the log of earthiness the glory of the blessed hope that fadeth not away. We have God's own testimony that we shall live with him forever, through Jesus Christ, our risen, reigning, returning Lord.

A committee of Conservative peers is considering a proposal to limit membership to about 300 lords with outstanding public service records.



M. Y. Court Decision Holds Test-Tube Baby Legitimate

NEW YORK: - A supreme court justice ruled that a child born as the result of artificial insemination is legitimate.

The ruling was made by Justice Henry Clay Greenberg in deciding that the estranged husband of Mrs. Julie Strnad, 31, had a right to visit her daughter, four-year-old Antoinette, who she said was a product of artificial insemination.

Mrs. Strnad claimed that her husband, Antôine, 42, was sterile since birth, an allegation he denied. She sought to prevent him from seeing the child on the ground Antoinette was not the offspring of her exmate. She had won a separation decree and principal custody of the child last October.

Atomic Danger Zone Posted For Tests on New Weapons

WASHINGTON.-The atomic energy commission has posted a "Danger-Keep Out" notice covering 39,000 square miles of the Pacific ocean surrounding Eniwetok atoll, site of forthcoming "tests of military weapons."

"Hazards will exist" in a rectangular area approximately 173 miles north and south and 226 miles cast and west, the commission said. The danger will continue throughout 1948.

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA. - An Australian flying boat, carrying 29 passengers and a crew of 6. landed here safely after flying 380 miles across the storm-tossed Tasman sea with one of its four engines dead. Among the passengers were Episcopal Bishop G. Ashton Oldham of Albany, N. Y., and his wife.

Farm Mechanization Boosts

Production to Record Level OMAHA, NEB. -- Americans are harvesting 20 million more acres today than they did in 1940, although there are three million fewer people

doing it, and on 200,000 fewer farms. Fast-growing mechanization of farms is largely responsible for this feat, Joseph A. Hoban, merchandise manager of B. F. Goodrich company, told members of Midwest Implement Dealers association. He cited the fact that the nation's trace tor "population" had doubled, from one million to two million, just since 1940, ----

Praising "the way America's farmers and other food producers had come through to ease tragie conditions in many lands." Hoban cited the following estimates on the nation's 1947 exports of foodstuffs: 392 million bushels of wheat, five times the amount exported in 1939; 88 million bushels of corn, compared to 32 million in 1939, and 328 million pounds of meat products. against 193 million in 1939,

The farm market offered "the biggest sales opportunity" for industry in 1947. Hoban said, adding that "there is no question that this market is going forward at as great or even greater pace in 1948."

Hoban said that all tractors now made are rubber-tired, and that changing all a farm's relling stock from steel to rubber tires produced an average saving of 24 working days and 675 gallons of gasoline per year, for each 150 acres worked.







Lincoln County Hospital Bond Election Near at Hand





Black held that under the facts shown the compulsory education system in Illinois "assists and is integrated with the program of religious instruction carried on by separate religious sects." He said pupils legally required to go to school for secular education are released from some of that legal duty on condition that they attend religious classes.

"This is beyond all question a utilization of the tax-established, and taxsupported public school system to aid religious groups to spread their faith." It was an issue that parents as well as all other U. S. citizens would do well to consider.

There were two facets which would bear reflection:

The supreme court's decision confirmed a long-standing and honorable theory in the U.S. that there should be no interference between church and state and no influence exerted by one extremes of a state-controlled church or a church-controlled state.

But at the same time, the broad language of the decision falled to recognize the historical importance of religion in creating civilizations and forming and molding nations. Western civilization grew out of the Christian church. Divorcement of the cause and effect now could be dangerous.

FINNISH:

Aid to Russia

It was with no clapping of hands that the government of Finland decided to accept the proposal of Prime Minister Josef Stalin of Russia to discups a treaty of mutual military aid,

Russia, which needs military help from Finland about as much as the U. S. needs a five-year plan, put the proposal of a discussion to Finland's President Jugo K. Paasikivi within a week after it had swept Czechoslovakia into the Soviet orbit.

Having no alternative, Passikivi accopted the "invitation" and appointed a negotiating delegation of seven members, including one military expert, government officials and parliament

Coviets say they want a binding treaty of mutual military assistance against future German aggression. Talks presumably were being held on that basis, but it was the task of the Finnish negotiators to do all they could to provent Finland from being chained to Russia in a military treaty,

There was little doubt in the minds of Finnish leaders that this was Russla's first step in a campaign to gain as complete control over that little northern nation as it now holds over the Balkans. And in the final analysis the Finns would capitulate by the stark interests of self-preservation.



Economical Buying Cuts Costs for Homemakers

WASHINGTON-According to a recent poll; the topic in which the people are most interested today is the high cost of living. This despite competition with communism; Taft, Dewey, the weather, and why who jumped out of a hotel window clad only in a filmy nightdress.

I managed to get myself into the middle of a controversy on that subject.

It all started when the wife of a machinist in York, Pa., wrote me of her difficulties in making ends meet on her husband's net salary of \$53.4? a week (incidentally, bureau of labor statistics. informs me that 50 per cent of the workers employed in manufacturing industry earn less than this York machinist.) .

Her family includes a boy of 15 and a girl of 6. She outlined her weekly budget as follows:

She pointed out that this total left very little for clothing, dentist and doctor bills, and nothing for the new stove, washer, vacuum cleaner, refrigerator and furniture they would like to have. And "Don't forget," she admonished, "There are a lot of people worse off than we are."

I used her story in a broadcast, and this is the reaction I recevied from other women correspondents:

An Oakland, Calif., housewife wrote: "When you mentioned that family who spent almost three-quarters of his salary for food, I just had to "sound off" or bust. Either this is an exaggeraation by the wife or she is guilty of woeful ignorance of proper dietary requirements. In these days of shortages, I'd like to ship folks like these over to England where we have relatives, who could (perhapsi) 'larn 'er' a thing or two about the wanton selfishness of such extravarance."

This woman goes on: "My husband and I manage nicely on \$10 # week for two. I enclose details to prove it. (She did)," And she addat "I can remember no evening in years when my husband failed to compliment me on his dinner."

She suggests that women who can't cook should attend classes to discover that the "chemistry" of food preparation can be "fascinating and, oh, so rewarding." She herself gained knowledge in public school hight cooking classes that enabled her to run a small tearoom in the lean years from 1930 to 1935, and which from 1941 to 1945, husband's salary.

Another woman writes concerning a Dearborn, Mich., homemaker who fed "and fed well" her family of six on \$75 a month last September, Now. since food prices went down, this woman planned to revise her budget down-The man of distinction, instead of ward. She spent \$71.82 for food in \$55.35 in January of this year.

As a sample of her meal planning: On a Saturday noon, (she writes) she may feed her three girls, aged 11, 4 and 2 years, egg sandwiches on bread spread with oleo (mixed with canned milk), a whopping big fruit salad made from pears, plums and peaches she canned last summer, and big glasses of milk. A supper mean might be macaroni and cheese, a vegetable salad, home-made chocolate cookies and fruit for desect.

A woman from Detroit, Mich, whose family is the same size as that of the York woman's, writes that is costs her only \$20 a week to feed her family. And that, she says: "Includes a carton of cigarets for my husband, all my soup supplies, polishes, cleaners and additions to my pantry shelf. We average one pound of butter a week, two dozen eggs, 10 to 14 quarts of milk, steaks and chops once a week My husband takes his lunch-two or three sandwickes, one or two pieces of fruit, lettuce, sometimes another raw vegetable, cakes and cookies. The children (aged 2 and 5) have a hot breakfast and lunch each day. "I think," she mays, "that we get well-balanced meals. At least we're all in good health and rarely have colds. It can be done easily if you apply yourself and figure ahead."

And this is accomplished, mind you, in Detriet, where according to labor statistics, is cost wawards of \$3,292 a year for a family of four to live medeatly.

She's been keeping track of monthly food bills for herself and her husband since September of last year. She spent \$31,28 in the month of September; \$31.54 in October, \$37.56 in November: \$53.36 in December (she had'a dinner party for 14 people, and another Christmas day dinner with turkey, et cetera for 7 people, and that upped the bills); \$45.39 in January, and \$29.69 in February. She says the February food bill dropped significantly because they took advantage of the price dip and bought cheaper butter, eggs, flour, et cetera.

Her food bills do not include their twice-a-month "eating out" which costs

Pack of Seed Nets Million Dollar Crop Plant Immigrant Has Typical Success Story

One package of seed sent home by a missionary less than 30 years ago has developed into a crop now valued at more than 200 million dollars a year. That is the success story of a plant immigrant - Korean lespedeza.

Only three decades ago Dr. Raiph Mills, a medical missionary, sent a package of lespedeza seed from Kores to the U.S. department of agriculture. Department specialists planted the seed at the experimental farm across the Potomac river from Washington. In a few years there was enough seed to plant lespedeza at several state experiment stations.

The imported crop fitted well on the poor, slightly acid soils unfit for such crops as alfalfa and soon was being grown widely in the East Central states as a seed and pasture crop. Now its use is becoming more widespread, particularly in areas of low fertility land.

The U.S. crop of Korean lespedeza, developed directly from the single package, now is valued at more than 200 million dollars a year. Value of the seed crop amounts to 20 million dollars. The hay crop makes up another 100 million dollars of value. Although value of the pasture crop is difficult to estimate, specialists contend that it amounts to at least 100 million dollars. These figures do not take into account the profitable use of millions of agres of low fertility land made possible by introduction of the new legume crop.


4 per cent of the total grain and cereal crop in the United States, figures_compiled_by_extension_service entomologists indicate. As if its destructive abilities were not enough. the rat is host to carriers or is itself a carrier of bubonic plague, typhus and other diseases which are deadly to man.

Few farms are entirely free of rats, although rat populations can be reduced quickly. Cleaning up the premises, rat proofing, cutting off food supply, poisoning and trapping are major points in an effective rat control program. But, once the control measures begin to show results, there can be no relaxing. Rat controi is a permanent, year-around program. A few days of poisoning will have only a temporary effect on the rat population.

Navy Plans to Build 80,000-Ten Air Carrier

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Secretary of the Navy John L. Sullivan revealed navy plans for a 60,000-to 80,000-ton aircraft carrier and eight other experimental ships and speedy. submarines.

The new construction plans include four submarines capable of extremely high speed under water. one "hunter-killer" ship for destroying such submarines and the giant 80,000-ton carrier which would be almost twice the size of the largest carrier the navy now has.

Secretary-Sullivan said the navy asked congress for 230 million dollars for the whole shipbuilding program which he estimated would

take up to five years to complete. Work on the navy's two guidedmissile ships, the Kentucky and the Hawali, was suspended indefinitely because the art of guided missiles has not progressed fast enough to warrant finishing the ships now.

Easter really heralds spring and we like to make the day as gay and lovely as possible. That means bringing out your delicate china, pastel ching, and sweeping the menu with a touch of spring, both in choice of foods and colors.

Many people like ham for Easter and it's a real economy to have it because you can

make so many interesting leftovers, have sliced ham for snacks and sandwiches. and still have a lovely meat for Crust: the table the first time you serve it.

Start off with chilled orange juice but add excitement to it by placing a small scoop of raspberry (or mint | Filling: or lime) sherbet on top. The dessert I've chosen is light but pretty and is balanced for the menu.

Your centerpiece can be made of traditional Easter eggs nestling in a basket or bowl. You'll find a package of inexpensive dyes with a handy egg dipper, a special pencil and decals of popular comic characters to help you decorate more successfully. If you use the decorated eggs for

place cards, set it on stiff paper. Of course many people like to spend Easter evening eating the eggo with salt and bread and butter candwiches, but if you have any left, use them for egg salad, creamed

eggo or eggs a la king. The ham is easy to prepare and always popular. For small groups, buy half a ham, but decorate it, too,

You may buy the ready-to-eat type or the cook-before-eating. Whichever one you select, however, keep it refrigerated. The ready-to-eat variety is baked, but only enough to heat it through. Give it 10 minutes to the pound.

Here's how to prepare the other type:

Place ham fat side up in an open roasting pan. Do not cover and do not add water. Bake in a moderately | C slow (325 degree) oven allowing 22 to 25 minutes per pound for cooking a before-eating ham.

How to Glaze.

Half an hour before the ham is done, cover with glaze and finish baking at the same low temperature. If ham is to be scored, do it at this time. Brush ham with 1/2 cup of honey, molasses or apricot jam, Baste frequently during rest of cooking time.

If you do not want to garnish the ham, simply fill peach halves with bright colored jelly and place around ham before serving.

Escalloped Broccoll. (Serves 6) 2 pounds breccoll

114 cups thin cream sauce 1/2 cup graied American cheese Cook broccoli in boiling, saited wa-

ter for 15 minutes. Place layers of broccoli and cream sauce with a little cheese in

casserole until all is used. Sprinkle cheese on top and heat through in moderate oven (about 15 minutes).

If you are particularly fond of asparagus, serve that in place of the broccoli. It's excellent just buttered; or, if you wish a sauce, here's a good way to do it.

Green lima beans may be creamed for variety, or served with crumbled bits of crisp bacon,

Cream sauce and asparagus with a few mushroom caps are delicious, too. Try a bit of nutmer for season.

Of course, you can combine lima bears or corn.

Asparagus, Lemon Sauce. (Serves 8) 34 cup butter

34 cup flour 2 cups milk 2 egg yolks, beaten 2 tablespoons femon juice I teaspoon salt

16 texspoon pepper

2 popuds asparagus, cooked Make white sauce with butter. flour and milk. Add egg yolks, lemon juice and seasoning. Arrange hot asparagus in serving dish and pour lemon sauce over it.

The molded carrot salad is easily prepared the day before. To serve six, simply shred carrots fine, using two cups, and add to lemon or orange flavored gelatin. You may add grapefruit wedges or green pepper or celery, if so desired.



The torte is a light dessert which is so splendid for this type of meal. This, too, may be made the day before as it requires thorough chilling.

*Pineapple Torte. (Server & te 8)

24 grabam crackers 34 cup butter 2 tablespooms sugar

3 cups milk % cup sugar 34 terspoon sait

3. tablespoons cornstarch 3 egg yolks 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup crushed pineapple 3 egg whites, stiffly beaten

& fablespoons sugar To make crust, crush finely the graham crackers and mix with butter and sugar: Press 34 of the crumbs against the sides and bot-

tom of a well-buttered tin. To make filling, bring milk to the scalding point in double boiler. Blend thoroughly the sugar, sait and cornstarch. Beat in egg yolks, add hot milk gradually. Return to double

boiler and stir until thick. Cool. Add vanilla and pour into crumblined-tin. Put drained pineapple on top of custard. Beat egg whites stiff, add gradually the six tablespoons of sugar, spread on pineapple, sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Bake in a moderate (350 degree) oven. Chill overnight before removing from

Here's a good use for leftover ham the following day:

Baked Ham Casserele. (Serves 6) 2 cups ground, baked haze

1 cup cooked peas 3 erre Z tablespoons green mineod

I cup mik Z tensprons herveradich 14 cup grated American cheese

Paprika

Place ham in greased eight-inch square pan. Top with peas, Beat together eggs, green pepper, milk and horseradish. Pour over peas. Top with cheese. Bake in a moderate (350 degree) oven for 40 minutes, Let set in warm place for 10 to 15 minutes. Cut into six inch squares. Serve with tomato sauce, if desired, Released by WNU Tentures.


Beets do very well with a dusting of ground cloves or a bit of horse radish.




