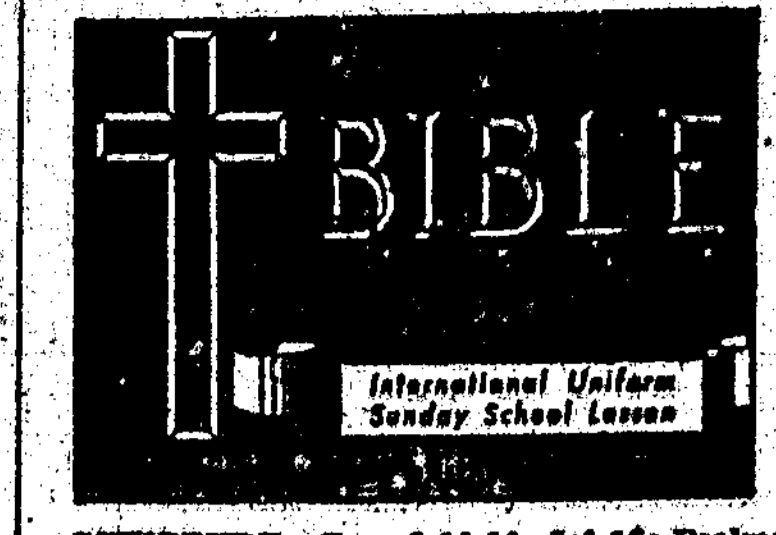
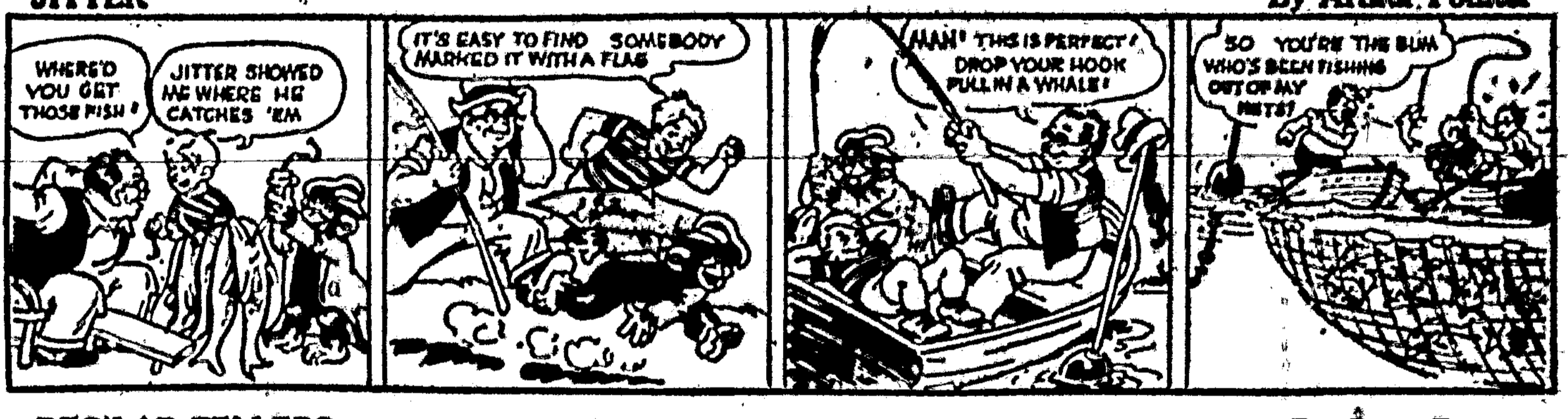

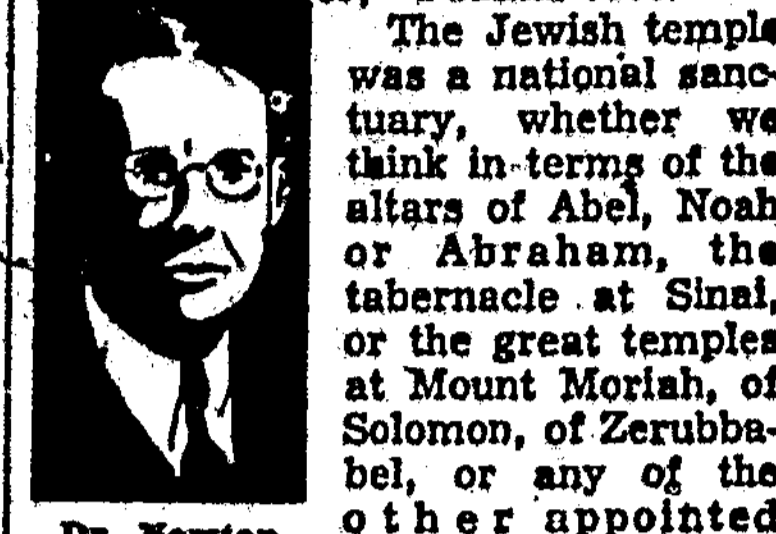

The Temple in the Nation's Life Lesson for May 23, 1948

OUR golden text is "O come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord our maker," Psalms 95:6.



The Jewish temple was a national sanctuary, whether we think in terms of the altars of Abel, Noah or Abraham, the tabernacle at Sinai, or the great temples at Mount Moriah, of Solomon, of Zerubbabel, or any of the other appointed places of meeting with God.

The welfare of mankind, in every age, requires the faithful and frequent worship of God. From the days when they sang the hymns of David, the Jews were prosperous to the degree that they were true to God in their worship and in their reverence for all things holy.

This lesson traces the story, leaving no doubt in any pupil's mind about the solemn truth of the golden text.

A HOUSE OF WORSHIP IN Ezra 3:10-13, we see the picture of priests leading the people to sing unto the Lord. "Because he is good, for his mercy endureth forever toward Israel."

Wherever you live, whether in the city or in some quiet rural community, remember this, the sanctuary measures the attitude of the people of such community toward God to a degree that no other gauge of public opinion can offer.

Boys and girls who regularly attend Sunday school and public worship will be watched by the men who are looking for trustworthy leaders tomorrow.

HONORING GOD'S HOUSE "SERVE the Lord with gladness, come before his presence with singing," Psalms 100:2.

We read how the people in the long ago brought their best gifts to make God's house beautiful. What are we doing with our best gifts? I think of boys and girls today who are helping with their small gifts to erect and equip beautiful houses of worship.

Tomorrow they will point with gratitude and thanksgiving to the part they had in making God's house the best house in the community. Thus do we honor God as we honor his house.

WHY WE GO TO CHURCH MR. WANNAMAKER, the merchant prince, was once asked why he went so regularly to church. He replied: "I go to church for two main reasons. First, because God commands it; second, because it enriches life."

The Jews teach us, in the long record of their faithfulness or unfaithfulness, that the people who go regularly to church are the most dependable people in any community. And we can bring it right down to our day and generation, and get the same answer.

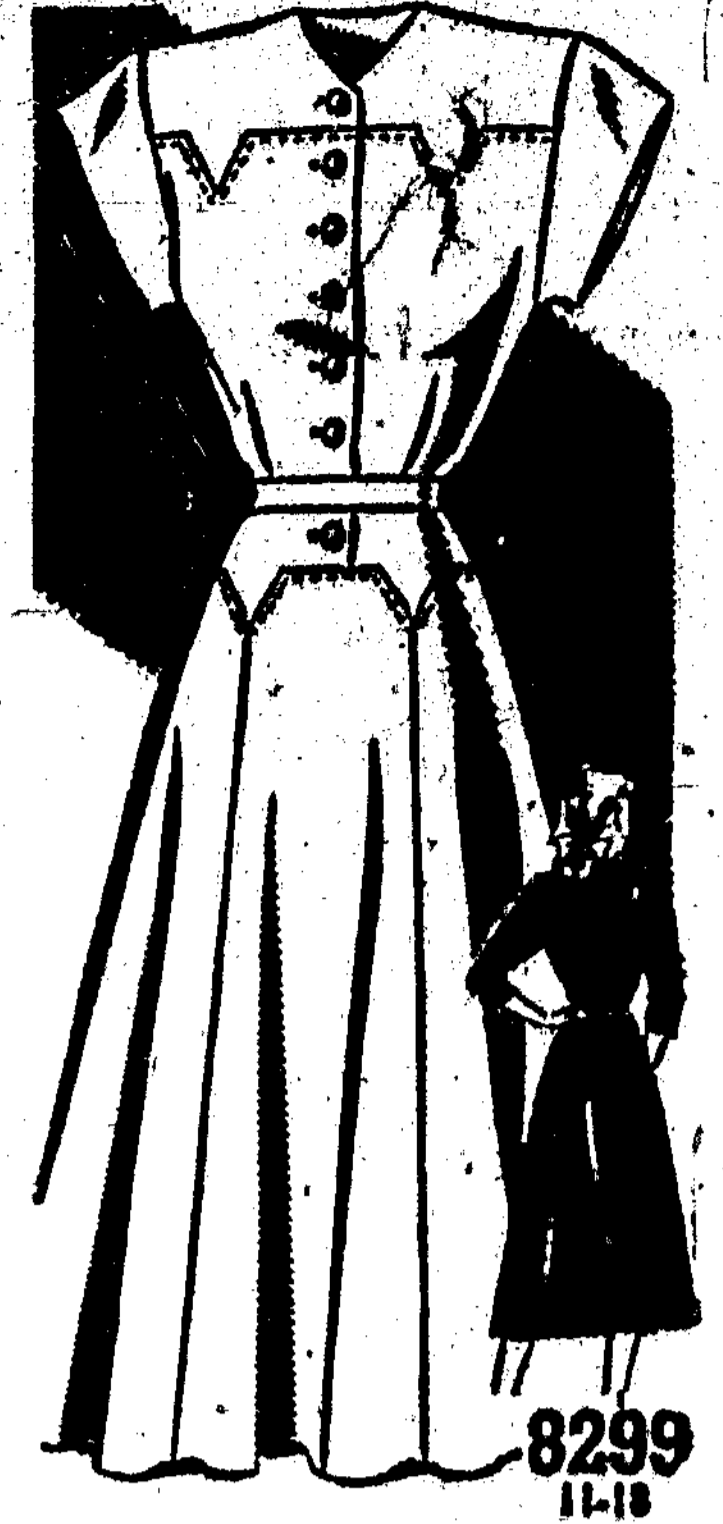
A business man told me recently that he had a check made of the several hundred young people in his employ, and he found that more than ninety per cent of the regular church-goers were advancing in their work with his company. He further discovered that almost without exception, the people who were giving trouble were the people who never entered a church.

OUR NEED OF PUBLIC WORSHIP OUR bodies require regular nourishment. And our souls are just as dependent upon regular nourishment. I would not say that it is absolutely necessary for one to attend public worship to grow spiritually, but the odds are entirely against those who claim that they can grow spiritually without attending public worship.

There is a place of worship within the reach of well-nigh every person in the United States. We are responsible before God if we neglect to claim the advantages and blessing of public worship. The place of the temple in the life of Israel is a symbol which teaches us today that we dare not forsake the assembling of ourselves on the Lord's Day in his house. The fellowship of worship is the sweetest fellowship on earth. It is our surest road to peace here and hereafter.

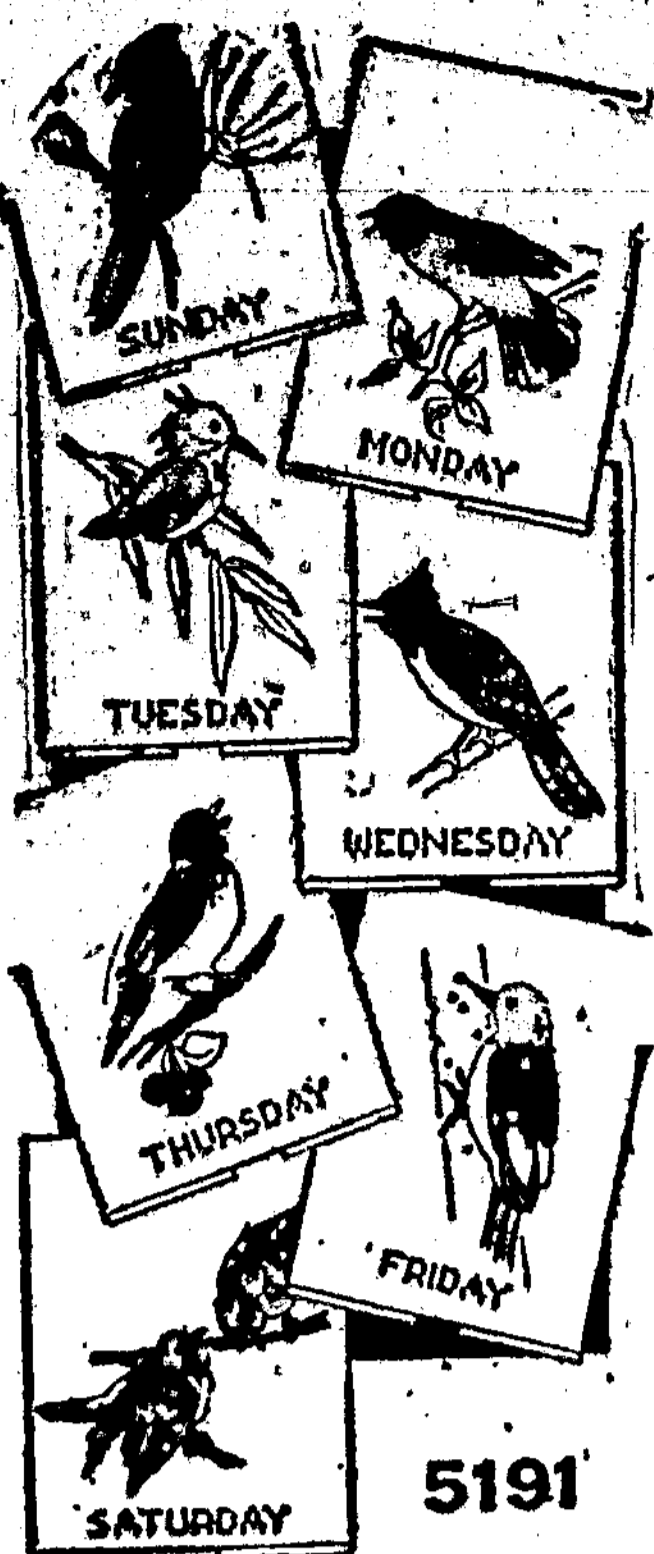

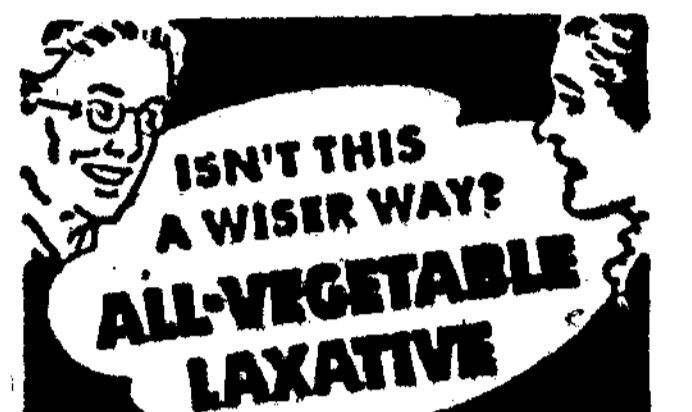

Let Foods Complement Each Other (See Recipes Below)

Balancing Meals
ONE OF THE QUESTIONS most frequently asked by homemakers is, "How can I plan balanced meals?" Fundamentals of balancing meals are really simple. Take your dinner, for example. Use a serving of potatoes or another starchy food to go with the meat course; add to this one or two vegetables that go nicely with your chosen meat cut. If you have not had a salad for lunch, this may be added to the dinner menu. If you have a heavy meal, use a fruit dessert; if the meal is light and the fruit requirement of the day has been satisfied, serve cake, pastry or cookies.

That is the dinner plan. However, it also is well to bear other points in mind, so that the meal will be pleasing.

First, select foods that have contrast in color, for these will make meals more interesting. We eat with our eyes first and a picture pretty plate certainly will whet the appetite.

Second, serve foods that have contrasting texture. You don't serve boiled potatoes, whitefish and cauliflower at a meal because they all have much the same texture. How much more interesting to serve asparagus with the broiled fish, with crisply fried potatoes.

Third, do have variety. Families have favorite dishes but they won't keep favored rating if they are served several times each week.

DOES YOUR FAMILY enjoy pork chops? Did you know that they could be served with a tomato sauce to add tang to their delicate flavor? Or perhaps you'd like to stuff them with a celery-bread combination, omit potatoes and serve creamed turnips. You always can put your vegetables in the salad and balance the meal that way. Doesn't this meal sound tempting and colorful?

Stuffed Pork Chops
Creamed Diced Turnips
Asparagus Salad

Orange Muffins Prune-Banana Whip
Here are the recipes for the main dishes in the menu, and you may be certain there won't be any leftovers:

Stuffed Pork Chops
Have the butcher cut a pocket in each of six thick pork chops. Make the dressing as follows: Use 1 cup of bread crumbs and mix with 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 1/2 teaspoon thyme and 1/2 cup celery, cut up and sautéed in 3 tablespoons of fat. Melt with 1 egg. Fill pork chops. Brown the chops in hot fat, seasoned with a sprinkling of salt and pepper, then cover and bake in a moderate (350 degree) oven for one hour.

The turnips are diced and cooked until tender in boiling salted water. Fresh cooked or canned, drained asparagus, well chilled, may be used for the salad. Use a tart dressing. Use your favorite plain muffin recipe to which grated orange rind has been added.

Here's the luscious dessert recipe:
Banana-Prune Whip (Serves 6)

1/4 cup prune puree
1/3 cup sugar
1 cup thinly sliced bananas
2 egg whites stiffly beaten
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Mix together prune pulp and sugar and cook until the latter is dissolved.

Plan Colorful Meals With These Hints

A broiled ham slice or ham loaf goes well with buttered rice, sweet potato croquettes, stuffed baked potatoes or broiled potato slices.

Fork roast, either the loin or the shoulder cut, may be prepared with potatoes in one of the following ways: Mashed, browned, buttered scalloped or baked. Baked squash also may be served in place of the potatoes.

solved, then cool. Add bananas mixed with lemon juice. Fold in beaten egg whites. Chill thoroughly. Serve in sherbet dishes garnished with more sliced bananas and cut marashino cherries.

NOW LET'S PLAN another menu around an entirely different meat course. This menu has the advantage of limiting cooking to an hour, and most of it can be done in the oven, so that you don't have to watch the proceedings:

- Tomato-Herb Soup
- Baked Potatoes
- Meat Loaf
- Yellow Waxed Beans or Zucchini Squash
- Beef Pickles or Tomato Salad
- Fresh Fruit Parfait or Apple Kasha Pie

If you choose the squash and pie, these can be baked at the same time as the meat loaf and potatoes. The soup is made simply by heating canned tomato juice with a few herbs for flavor.

- Easy Meat Loaf** (Serves 6)
2/3 cup dry bread crumbs
1 cup milk
1 1/2 pounds ground beef
2 slightly beaten eggs
1/4 cup grated onion
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon sage

Soak bread crumbs in milk; add other ingredients and mix well. Form into one loaf or individual loaves to be placed in muffin pans. Cover with piquant sauce and bake in a moderate oven 45 to 60 minutes.

Piquant Sauce: Combine 3 tablespoons brown sugar, 1/2 cup catsup, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg and 1 teaspoon dry mustard.

- Zucchini Squash** (Serves 6)
6 medium-sized zucchini squash
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1 small onion, grated
1 cup tomato quarters
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 egg, beaten
2 tablespoons bacon drippings

Wash squash; cut off ends but do not peel. Cook in boiling salted water for five minutes. Halve lengthwise. Remove pulp and combine all other ingredients with pulp and fill zucchini shells. Sprinkle with American or Parmesan cheese. Bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes.

- Fresh Fruit Parfait** (Serves 6 to 8)
28 marshmallows
Juice of 1 lemon
1 cup crushed fresh raspberries
1 cup heavy cream whipped

Melt marshmallows in top of double boiler; add lemon juice. Cool slightly, then add berries. Fold in whipped cream; freeze in tray of automatic refrigerator about two hours.

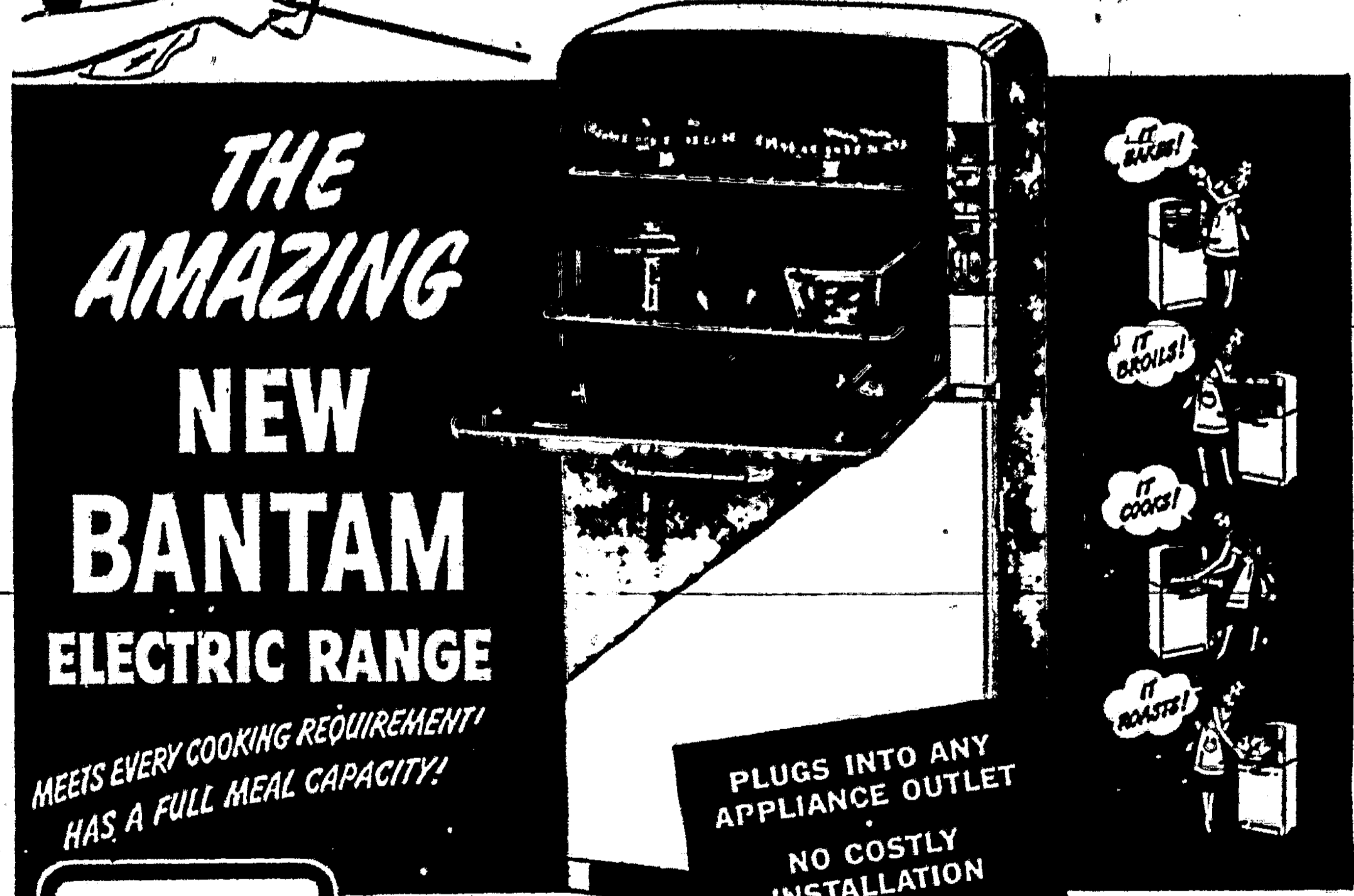

VETERANS' NEWS

One in every eight World War II veterans training under the GI Bill in New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming and Utah is learning some phase of agriculture, a VA survey revealed.

On May 1, the four-state area had 4,600 former servicemen enrolled in institutional on-farm training courses in schools and colleges. An additional 43 were engaged in agricultural studies under Public Law 16 for disabled veterans, and 124 were training on-the-job for occupations in farming.

The number of veterans receiving institutional on-farm training under the GI Bill by states follows: New Mexico, 1,310; Colorado, 1,589; Wyoming, 375; Utah, 1,373.

The number enrolled in on-the-job farm training on May 1 shows an increase of nearly 500 over December, 1947. Even with the increase in the enrollment of veterans in institutional on-the-job farm training the representation of veterans in this phase of the program is still less than one in five in the area who left farms to enter the service in World War II.

Studies include general farming and related subjects, farm management, animal husbandry, dairy husbandry, horticulture, agronomy and soil conservation, agricultural engineering, poultry husbandry and entomology.

Nationally, 222,023 veterans were enrolled in institutional on-farm training courses and in other agricultural studies at the end of 1947.

Veterans taking full-time institutional on-farm training are required to spend at least 200 hours a year in classrooms at accredited educational or training institutions.

A veteran operating his own farm must receive at least 100 hours additional hours of individual instruction each year, 50 of which must be on his farm. A veteran performing part of his training as an employee on another person's farm is required to take 50 hours of individual instruction.

VA warns veterans, builders and lenders against the consequences of making or accepting so-called "side payments" in the sale of home properties to veterans with the aid of GI loans.

VA said such side payments usually made for the purpose of evading the prohibition against sales to veterans in excess of appraised "reasonable value" are a direct violation of law and subject offenders to possible prosecution.

Many cases have been reported in which veterans have been induced to pay the builder or seller an amount over and above the sales price shown on the loan report submitted to VA and upon which the government loan guarantee is based.

Veterans who knowingly conspire to evade the law by making such side payments risk loss of their rights under all veterans laws VA warned. In addition, all parties involved are liable to prosecution under Federal law.

N. M. TO GAIN ACREAGE RESULT IN INVENTORY

The State of New Mexico stands to gain 50,000 acres from the Federal government, as the result of a land recovery inventory now in progress in the State Land Office.

Already half completed, this inventory has disclosed the government indebted to the State by a total of 28,000 acres, State Land Commissioner John E. Miles announced.

This amount has been verified by records in Washington, and the new land will become property of the State's public school system and the various state institutions, Miles said.

The records thus far checked cover past land transactions in the southeast and northwest portions of New Mexico, between the State and the Federal government.

"The current records inventory is the most thorough such survey ever conducted, according to the results already shown," said Miles. The original land allocations made by the national government to the State have never been entirely completed, but will be after the present inventory is finished, he stated.

"For example, the public schools were supposed to receive four sections of land in every 36-section township," Miles explained. However, due to prior homesteading and other previous allocations, the schools have never received quite their full quota of the federally owned land. This inventory will permit a complete settlement of the government's land debt to New Mexico."

FORD DEALERS PRE-VIEW 1949 FORDS AT SAN FRANCISCO

Ford dealers from five states—more than 200 of them, with two governors, Hunt of Wyoming and Knoug of Colorado, as their guests assembled at the Denver Union Station, where they attended a farewell banquet before boarding a 21-car special train for San Francisco, California, to pre-view the New 1949 Ford cars.
