

From the days when they sang the hymns of David, the Jews were prosperous to the degree that they were true to God in their worship and in their reverence for all things holy. This lesson traces the story. leaving no doubt in any pupil's mind about the solemn truth of the golden text.

#### A HOUSE OF WORSHIP

TN Ezra 3:10-13, we see the ploture of priests leading the people to sing unto the Lord. "Because he is good, for his mercy endureth forever toward Israel."

Wherever you live, whether in the city or in some quiet rural community, remember this, the sanctuary measures the attitude of the people of such community toward God to a degree that no other gage of public opinion can offer. We have our various polls of public opinion. but none of them are so prophetic of a copie's ultimate hope as their attitude toward God's house.

Boys and girls who regularly attend Sunday school and public worship will be watched by the men who are looking for trustworthy leaders tomorrow.

ROY T. MOBLEY DELIVERS CLOUDCROFT HIGH SCHOOL COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS

The graduating exercises of the Senior Class of the Cloudcroft High School were held Thursday night, May 20 in the Cloudcroft High School Gymnasium

The principal address of the occasion was delivered by Hon, Roy T. Mobley, Attorney of Alamogordo who spoke on the importance of Character in every day life.

Mr. Mobley pointed out that in the days when education of the children was carried on solely by the parents the son-not only learned the trade of the father but became like the father to such an extent that we have an old saying "like father like con." and the same result occurred with the daughter. He stated that this idea became such a fixed one with each succeeding generation, that until recently we base our educational system upon the theory that bad children have bad parents and only good parents can give the community good children. We have only recently begun to experiment with methods of turning children from bad homes and bad parents into useful and law-abiding citizens.

Mr. Mobley further pointed out that in taking the education of the children out of the hand of the parents and placing it in the public schools, and in sending the father and the mother into factories and offices to earn a livelihood of the family, we have deprived the childten of the opportunity to become like their parents and have not been successful in devising some other method of giving the children understanding of and the habits of good character.

Mr. Mobley concluded by pointing out to the class that, in the long run, it is not those who are selfish, deceitful, dishonest or hostile toward others that survive and prosper, but those who are friendly, honest and cooperative and who love their fellow men. #### DRAFT BILL: On the Way

'Yielding to the pressure of the times, congress was putting its hand gingerly to the business of passing -a selective service act which would give the nation's armed forces a total manpower of slightly more than two million in two years.

The house armed services committee had approved the measure, after hearing Defense Secretary James Forrestal term it an "excellent" one, and passed it on to the floor of the house for debate.

Thus, for the first time since before the war, congress was facing squarely the momentous issue of a national draft. That this was hape pening during the hair-trigger days of an election year only served to underline the apparent urgency of the matter.

As approved by the armed services committee, the bill would:

Raise total authorized manpower • of the armed forces to 2,005,882 -army 837,000, air force 502,000, navy and marine corps 666,882.

Require registration of men from 18 through -30, with those from 19 through 25 liable for two years' service.

#### **OLEO TAX:** Fight Ahead

One of the most pressing problems members of congress have had to decide this year is whether their political bread is spread with butter or olcomorgarine.

It is further complicated by the fact that they might, in choosing one or the other, be letting the gravy get away from them.

For good or ill, however, the house of representatives made its decision. It passed by a vote of 260 to 106 a bill to repeal all federal eleomargarine taxes which have been on the books for 62 years.

Those taxes are itemized as follows: 10 cents a pound on colored oleo, 1/4 cent a pound on uncolored, \$500 a year on manufacturers, \$400 on wholesalers of colored oleo, \$200 COVENANTS: wholesalers of the uncolored product. \$48 on retailers of colored oleo and \$0 on retailers of uncolored.

#### **BIG PLANES:**

#### Russian

Russia put some big four-engined planes into the air over Moscow for the annual Soviet May Day parade and managed thereby to instill a modicum of uneasiness in the hearts of U.S. military experts.

At last reports they were awaiting more detailed reports of the planes from U. S. observers in order to gain, if possible, a new insight into Soviet airborne army equipment.

It is likely, the experts thought, that at least some of the planes were the Soviet TU-70, an aircraft bearing close resemblance to the American B-29. Assumption has been that the Russians copied many of the features of the five B-29s known to have been forced down in Soviet-controlled areas during the war.







FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE by Roger C. Whitman

QUESTION: I have a dark soft wood floor that I don't know what to do with. It is single flooring. If I were to lay linoleum squares, would the floor have to be smooth before cementing them down?

ANSWER: Linoleum must be laid on a smooth surface. If your floor is rough and uneven, it should be sanded smooth. The alternative would be to cover the flooring with plywood, which gives a good surface for covering with linoleum.








#### **Beetle Is Voracious Enemy of Potatoes Dusting or Spraying** Will Control Menace

Ranking as the most serious threat to the grower of potatoes and other vegetables is the Colorado potato beetle, which is prevalent throughout many areas of the country.

The beetle is yellowish in color, stout bodied, about two-fifths of an inch in length and with wing covers bearing 10 longitudinal stripes. The



attack the foliage and lay their orange-colored eggs on the under side of the leaves. The eggs hatch in a few days into voracious larvae which, after feed-

ing for about 10 days, leave the plants and enter the soil to complete their development. They emerge as adult beetles by the latter part of July. A second brood is produced in August and adults of this generation winter in the soil. Both the larvae and adults are severe defoliators of the plants.

To rid the potatoes, tomatoes, egg plants, peppers, ground cherries and cabbage plants of the Colorado potato beetle, dust or spray with paris green, calcium arsenate or cryolite. Hand picking of the beetles and crushing of the egg masses is effective if done often.

#### **Barn Cleaners**



Barn cleaners should have all mechanical paris, of simple design, yet sturdy and easy to control. It is possible to thoroughly clean the average dairy barn by use of mechanical barn cleaners. A clean barn is the first requisite for clean and healthy cows. Installation of a mechanical cleaner, such as illustrated above, will do away with much of the drudgery of this farm operation.

#### Insects Launch Early Attack on Vegetables

With the first reasonably warm days, insects will make their advent. These will be the green worm and lice on cabbage and the Colorado beetles and black fleabeetles on po-

The cabbage green worm comes shortly in the wake of the familiar white-and-yellow "butterflies" that go bobbing about, dropping eggs as they touch the leaves of the cabbage. This chewing insect is killed by poison; not one of the arsenates, however, but the safe insecticide, rotenone. The best way is dusting, with a strength of three-fourths of I per cent of rotenone, as most prepared dusts have. The first application should be made when the "butterflies" first come, then repeated once or twice ten days apart.

#### Sugar Beets Considered Good Crop for Dairymen

The sugar beet is an important cash crop, according to University of Wisconsin. Years of extensive production prove that the crop blends in well with dairy farming, makes good use of farm manure and leaves the soil loose and friable.

Beets seldom are damaged by elther late spring or early fall frosts. There are few crops that leave the soil in as good condition. The tops are very valuable feed for cattle and sheep. They may be pastured, partially cured and put into trench silos, or used as silage.

#### Evergreen Windbreak Protects Farmstead

When planning the layout for improving the farmstead include a good evergreen windbreak to provide protection from prevailing winds. Plant the windbreak back about 150 feet from the buildings that are to be protected. As for depth of the windbreak, one row isgood, two rows better and three rows will give still more protection. Space the trees about 18 feet apart.

The State of New Mexico stands to gain 50,000 acres from the Federal government, as the result of a land recovery inventory now in progress in the State Land Office.

Already half completed, this inventory has disclosed the government indebted to the State by a total of 28,000 acres, State Land Commissioner John E. Miles an-

This amount has been verified by records in Washington, and the new land will become property of the State's public school system and the various state institutions, Miles

"The current records inventory emeier recently bought some sheep is the most thorough such survey from Mr. Clarence Griffin who ever conducted, according to the results already shown," said Miles. The original land allocations made by the national government to the week visiting and shopping in El State have never been entirety completed, but will be after the present inventory is finished, he stated.

> "For example, the public schools were supposed to receive four sections of land in every 36-section township," 'Miles explained. However, due to prior nomesteading and other previous allocations, the schools have never received quite their full quota of the federally owned land. This inventory will permit a complete settlement of the government's land debt to New Mexico."
