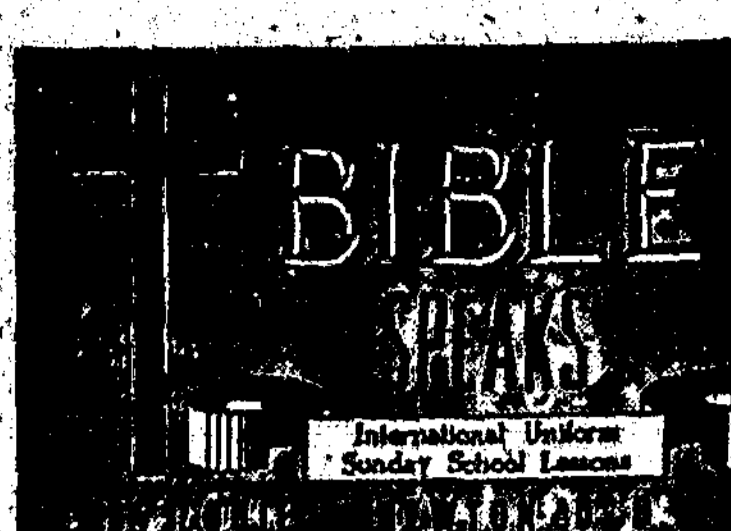

Men Who Dared To Stand For God

Lesson for June 6, 1948

A FIERY furnace, and a lion's den. These are the tests to which Sunday's lesson will put our hero about whom we studied last Sunday, this young man Daniel.

DANIEL IN THE DEN OF LIONS

THE sixth chapter must be read to have an adequate background for this study. Daniel had been chosen as the first of three presidents to rule over 120 princes who should govern the kingdom. The other two presidents and the princes could find no fault in this Hebrew, save that he believed and observed the law of his God. So, they conspired against him by persuading the king to issue a decree that no person in the kingdom was to make a petition to any God or man for 30 days, save to the king, on the penalty of being cast into the den of lions. This decree was issued by Darius, and Daniel's enemies reported to Darius that Daniel was opening his window three times a day, praying to his God. Darius was greatly troubled, but had to stand by his decree, and Daniel was cast into the den of lions. Darius spent a sleepless night, and hurried to the den at dawn to know about Daniel. Daniel replied, "O king, live for ever. My God hath sent his angel, and hath shut the lions' mouths, that they have not hurt me."

DARIUS REWARDS DANIEL

CONVINCED that Daniel's convictions had been miraculously rewarded by God, Darius ordered the other two presidents and the princes, together with their wives and children, thrown into the lions' dens. They were all destroyed by the lions. Then Darius issued a decree to all the nations and people of all languages that dwell in all the earth. Hear this decree: "Peace be multiplied unto you. I make a decree, that in every dominion of my kingdom men tremble and fear before the God of Daniel: for he is the living God, and steadfast forever, and his kingdom that which shall not be destroyed, and his dominion shall be even unto the end." So Daniel prospered in the reign of Darius and of Cyrus, the Persian.

COURAGE TO PUT GOD FIRST

LOOK now at the other test of faith—that of the three Hebrew children, Shadrack, Meshach and Abednego. Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, had made a golden image, 90 feet high and nine feet wide, and set it up in the plain of Dura. On a certain day, when he was going to establish his state religion, he ordered every subject to fall down and worship this image.

But Shadrack, Meshach and Abednego refused to worship the image. Nebuchadnezzar was furious when he heard of their refusal. He summoned them into his presence, and warned them of their fate if they further refused to worship his gods. They answered him frankly that they would not bow down to the image. He ordered them thrown into the fiery furnace. They decided that death was more honorable than apostasy. The men who cast them into the furnace fell dead!

UNSEARED AND UNSINGED!

BUT the three Hebrew children walked into the flames, unseared and unsinged! The king was astounded. The people were amazed. They had witnessed what the God of all the earth can and will do. Then went forth the decree, "There is no other God that can deliver after this sort." Thus we have the golden text for Sunday's lesson: "Be it known unto thee, O king, that we will not serve thy gods, nor worship the golden image which thou hast set up." And what happened in the long ago when men dared to stand up and trust in God will happen today and every day.

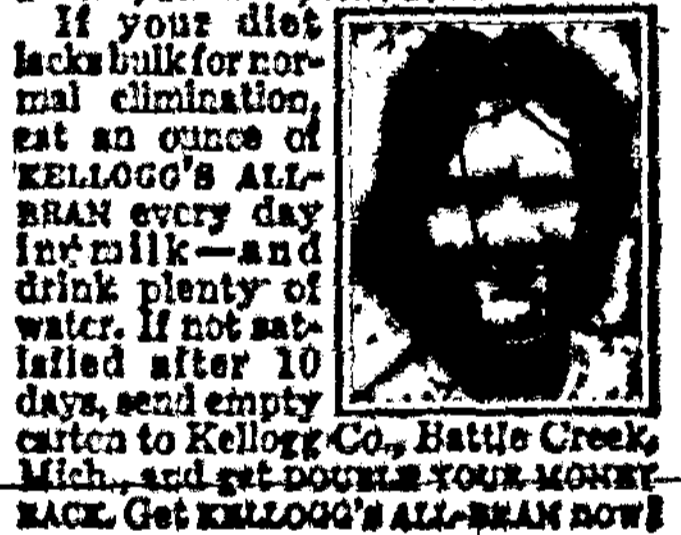
Super-Luxury Buses Being Built

Use Clever Wallpaper Tricks To Conceal Defects of Rooms

VERY FEW OF US live in architecturally perfect surroundings, but a reasonable facsimile of perfection can be achieved if we use decorator tricks to mask the defects which surround us.

Don't throw up your hands in discouragement over a long, narrow dining or living room, a dark bedroom or a cheerless kitchen. These are problems which professional decorators face every day in their careers and solve almost to perfection.

Color, lines, design and furnishings have much to do with getting good effects. Armed with a few basic principles, you can change the effect of many a room and make it closer to your ideal.

If you have the feeling that you want to push your walls out to give a feeling of space and light, here are some sure-fire tricks to give you that effect.

As every woman knows, light colors tend to make her figure larger while the dark shades appear to slenderize. So, to make the room look lighter and larger concentrate on lighter shades of wallpaper. A background of a small pattern or pale shades of wallpaper such as cool blues, greys, greens, cream, ivory and oyster white make rooms look large. The lighter the color of the room and its furnishings the more the walls seem to melt away and give the illusion of space. Use small trim pieces of furniture, avoiding those enormous overstuffed monstrosities you so fre-

height by using white or a pale shade of color than that used in the walls.

Pale ceilings improve the natural lighting of the room, while dark colors absorb light and also lower the apparent height of the room.

Horizontal stripes also will lower the ceiling while vertical stripes have just the opposite effect. Still another method used for making the over-all room better proportioned is to lower the molding. Molding may be lowered 12 to 18 inches from the ceiling or by constructing a deep valance or cornice covered with paper to match the rest of the wall.

Mold Room Together With These Tricks

No room ever completely satisfies its owner. There are either too many niches or jogs or too many unbroken areas. Wallpaper can be the means of tying these jogs into the main center or it can be equally useful in creating artificial divisions.

Dining alcoves can be turned into attractive nooks by paper which is a complete contrast from the rest of the room.

If your kitchen seems bleak and cheerless, cut its size by using a lovely plaid or trellis print paper on the top half, with tiling or plain paper on the lower half.

If you'd like a fireplace but can't have it, you can get the same sort of friendly cozy conversation place by grouping two or three chairs around a scenic wall in an otherwise muted room. Or you can make believe you're near a garden just by covering one of the walls with an ivy-type or garden flower paper.

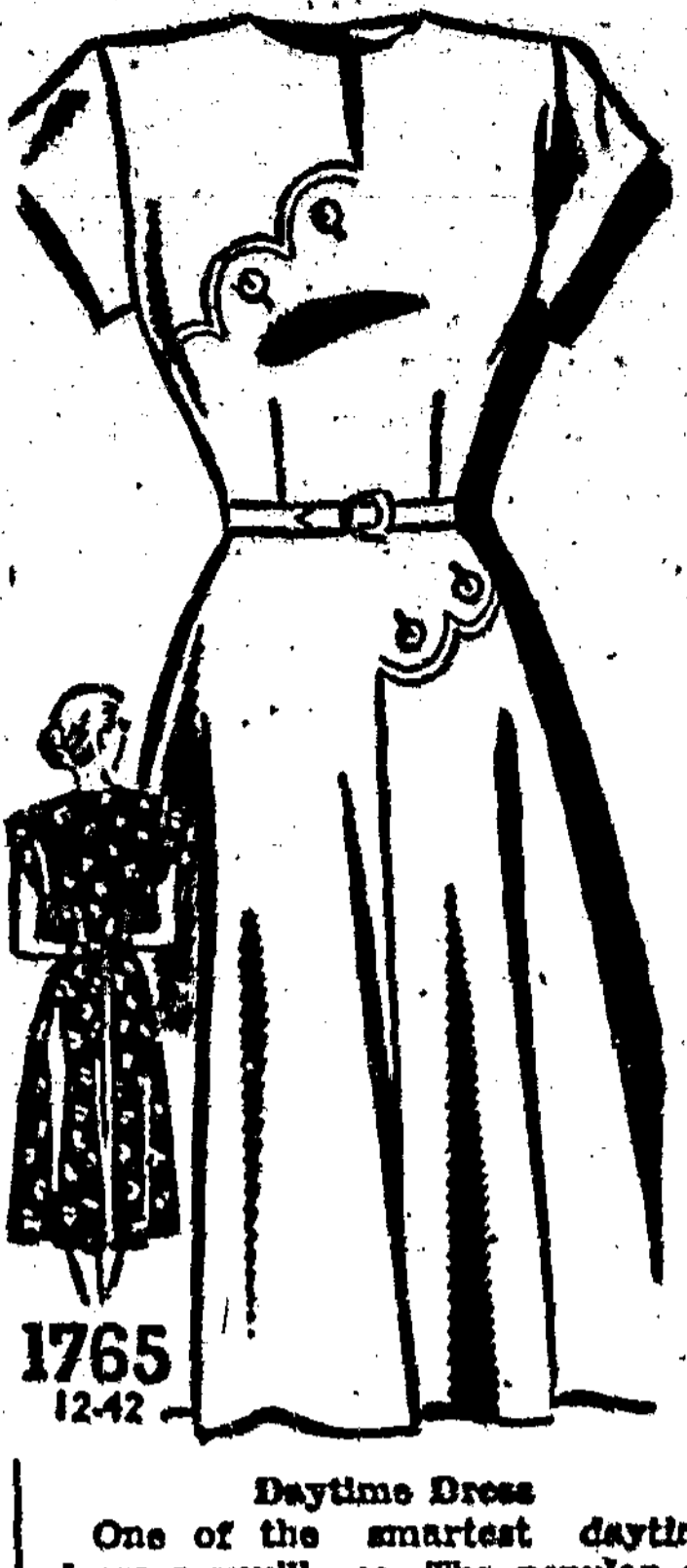
These are but a few suggestions by which you can reshape your home. Look over the situation, then let your imagination take full rein while wallpaper is the elastic which can stretch and shrink your walls to give you just the illusion you want.

Battle of Coral Sea Termed First Big Defeat for Japan

In the battle of that island-studded ocean known as the Coral sea, which is near the Solomon Islands and about 1,000 miles northeast of Australia, America's first real victory of the war with Japan was scored. The action occurred on May 4, 1942, and called for deeds of valor as thrilling as any in all American history.

The Coral sea battle was the first great naval defeat ever dealt the Imperial Japanese fleets. And yet this battle was fought entirely in the air, by the planes of opposing aircraft carriers.

The ships engaged in this battle never got sight of each other. They slugged it out without firing a single gun at another ship—the first engagement of its kind in history. In this first great victory for the U. S. in this global war the Japs lost more than 15 ships sunk and at least 20 others severely damaged. The action perhaps saved Australia from invasion.

However, America paid a high price for her victory in the sultry Coral sea. In this engagement the aircraft carrier, Lexington, famed ship that laid the foundation of our modern navy's aircraft carrier operations, went to the bottom. This happened on May 7.

HOUSEHOLD MEMOS



Let Children Have Many Happy Returns!

Happy Birthday
FEW EVENTS WILL MATCH the pleasure that a real birthday party can give to your youngster. The gaiety imparted by a few favors, crepe paper decorations, a house full of little friends and a cake—all his own, these are the things a child will remember so pleasantly for a long time.

Birthday party menus depend mainly upon the age of the children. Very simple food is the order of the day for children of three or four; and for children of five or six, the food is only slightly more elaborate. Children from 8 to 10 and older may have things such as lamb chops or hamburgers for the main dish, but it's still important to plan to serve only familiar foods for little guests.

Ice cream and cake are essentials at a birthday party no matter what the age group. For the younger children, however, serve only plain ice cream such as vanilla, and a very simple, not too rich cake, so there will be no digestive upsets.

THE MENU AND RECIPES I've planned will give you a clue as to the best way to plan these particular party foods.

Birthday Party Menu (For Youngsters 2 to 4)

- Cream of Tomato Soup
- Goldenrod Eggs
- Carrot Sticks or Carrots
- Peasant Butter-Jelly Sandwiches
- Vanilla Ice Cream Sponge Cake with Milk
- Orange Icing

Goldenrod eggs are a nutritious dish whether the party is for lunch or dinner time. Eggs prepared this way are just a bit more purified than creamed eggs.

Melt the butter, blend in flour, then add milk slowly and stir in seasonings. Cook until thickened. Cut whites of eggs into tiny slivers and add to the white sauce. Pour creamed mixture over toast wedges and top with hard-cooked yolks pressed through a sieve. Garnish with parsley.

The sandwiches may be omitted when the eggs are served, but if desired, they may be made into "fingers" and also served. If the soup is served, they may be placed on the plate along with it. A cake that will do the job nicely for the younger generation is this one made with hot milk, eggs and only a little shortening. It may be frosted prettily with a confectioner's icing, moistened with orange juice and flavored with grated orange rind. Flute it through a pastry rosette tube and don't forget to write happy birthday across it and use candles.

Hot Milk Sponge Cake
4 egg yolks
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup boiling milk or water
1 1/2 cups cake flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon lemon extract
4 stiffly beaten egg whites
Beat egg yolks until very thick; add sugar gradually and continue

beating. Add milk; mix well and add sifted dry ingredients. Mix until smooth and add extract. Fold in egg whites. Bake in an ungreased cake pan in a slow (325 degree) oven for one hour. Invert pan to cool, then frost.

Birthday Party Menu (For Children 5 to 8)

- Creamed Chicken in Toast Cups
- Green Peas
- Carrot Slices
- Ice Cream and Birthday Cake
- Beverage

You may use the recipe for creamed eggs, and use chicken. The green peas may be mixed with the chicken or served separately. The carrot slices may be raw or cooked and served with the peas. Use the same cake as suggested for the first menu.

Birthday Party Menu (For Children over 7)

- Lamb Chops on Toast or Hamburgers on Broiled Tomato Slices
- Potatoes Au Gratin
- Green Beans
- Ice Cream with Sauce or Crushed Fresh Berries
- Birthday Cake
- Milk

If you serve lamb chops, it's a good idea to have them boned when you give them to the younger children. They're more helpful, too, if they're broiled.

Here's a tasty recipe for hamburgers, if you decide on them for the party:

Broiled Hamburgers
(Serves 4)
1 pound ground round or chuck
2 tablespoons chili sauce
1 1/2 teaspoons prepared mustard
1 teaspoon minced onion
1/4 cup fine bread crumbs
1 1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
1/4 teaspoon pepper
3 slices bread
3 slices fresh tomato

Combine all ingredients except sliced bread and tomatoes. Spread on slices of bread. Broil for eight minutes at moderate heat, then top with tomatoes which have been broiled at the same time. Serve at once.

FOR YOUR BIRTHDAY CAKE, select a yellow, white or chocolate one depending upon the youngsters' preference. Then frost it with chocolate frosting, as given below. The cake may be put together with marshmallow cream, spread with the frosting. A procession of animal crackers around the sides will delight the children. If animal candle holders are available, use them on top.

Magic Chocolate Frosting
2 squares unsweetened chocolate
1 1/2 cups (1 can) unsweetened condensed milk
1 tablespoon water
Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add sweetened, condensed milk, then stir over boiling water five minutes until the mixture thickens. Add water. Cool. Spread on cold cake. This recipe makes enough frosting for the top and sides of two (nine-inch) layers.

Reduce Room Size With These Tips

On the other hand, if you have tremendously large rooms and you want to pull the walls closer about you, put the room on a sort of reducing-diet of dark colors. Warm shades, such as red, terra cotta, cocoa, rose and the like, rather creep up on you and make a room seem smaller.

If, however the room is on the dark side of the street and you don't ever get very much light, use moderate shades of the colors just mentioned. In this type of room the furniture may be scaled on larger proportions to take up space and pull the space together somewhat.

It's smart to have the woodwork the same color or a shade lighter than the basic shade of the wall.

paper if the room is small because dark-colored baseboards, doors, mantles, window and cornices all minimize the size of the room. If the room is very small, trim it a bit by pulling out some of these things such as a mantle to give more space.

Shape of Room Can Be Changed

If the shape of the room rather than the size is your problem, there's a solution to that, too. If the room is long and narrow try doing three walls with a plain colored or a small-patterned paper and then accentuating the fourth wall with a dark color or a bold pattern. This makes the room seem almost square. Another excellent way to increase the depth of one side of the room is by using scenic paper on that wall to contrast with plain or striped paper on the other three.

You may prefer to use contrasting colors to make a room longer or wider. To do this, choose two styles which harmonize yet present a strong contrast; cover both side walls with one pattern and both end walls with the other. Ceilings often are neglected when we do over a room, but treated properly they can be an important part of the decorative scheme. If the ceilings in your rooms are low, they can be increased in

Santa Fe—New Mexico will observe June 14, the 171st anniversary of the adoption of the American flag, as Flag Day. Governor Mabry has issued a proclamation designating the period from June 13 to 19 as National Flag Week and June 14th as Flag Day.

In his proclamation, Governor Mabry said that "the observance of Flag Day provides an excellent opportunity for the people of America and of New Mexico to consider present international conditions which require a renewal of allegiance to the Constitution of our country and to the flag."

The Governor urged that the flag be displayed from private and public buildings and that appropriate ceremonies be held in commemoration of the anniversary.

Santa Fe—In recognition of the importance of the dairy industry, Governor Mabry has proclaimed the month of June as Dairy month in New Mexico.

The Governor's proclamation pointed out that New Mexico has an important share in the production of milk and dairy products.

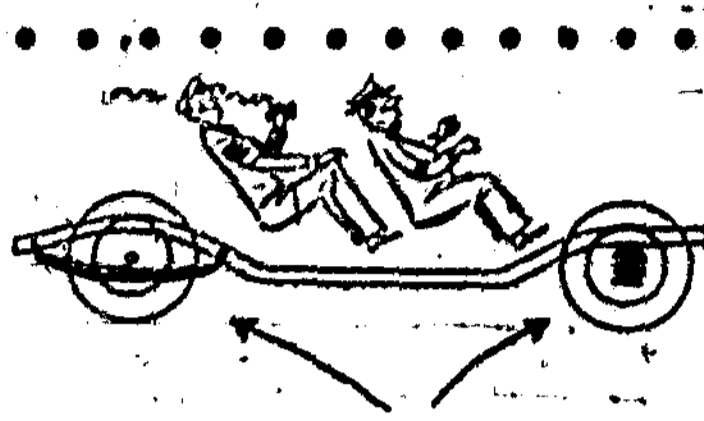
Governor Mabry was to leave

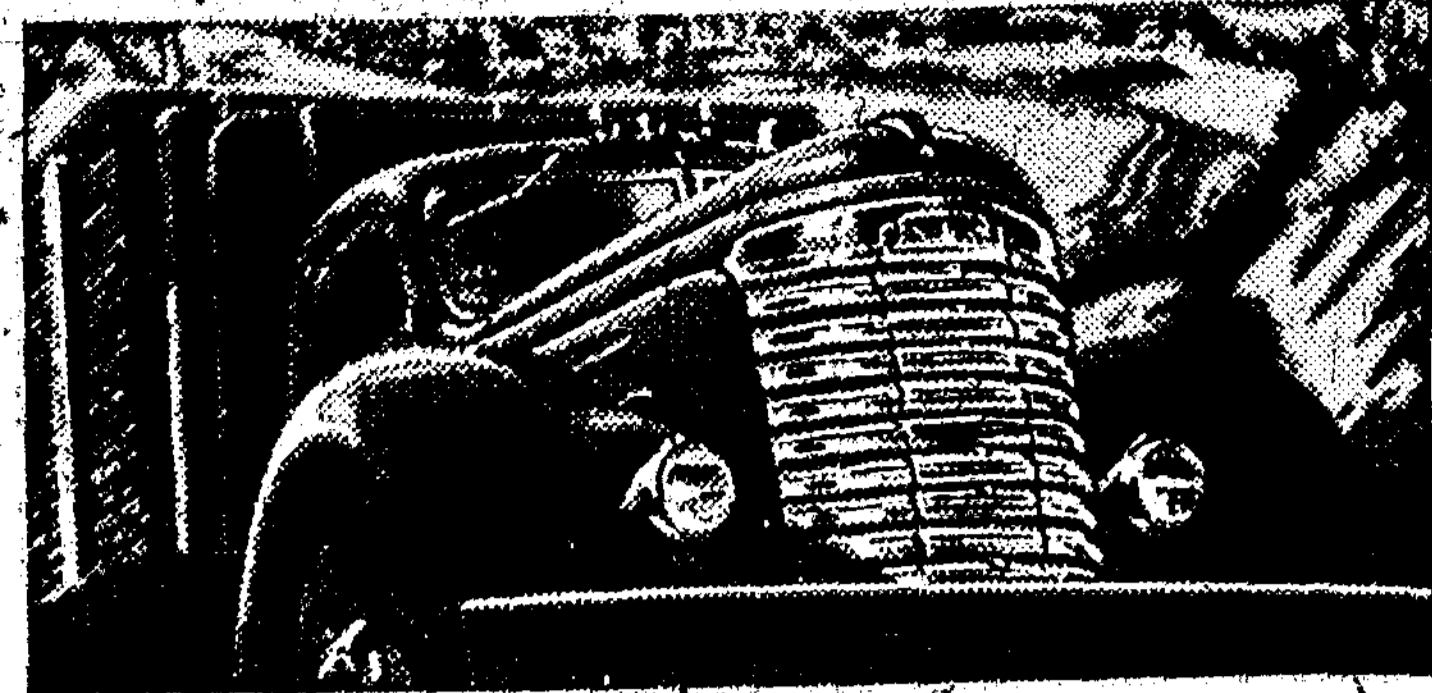

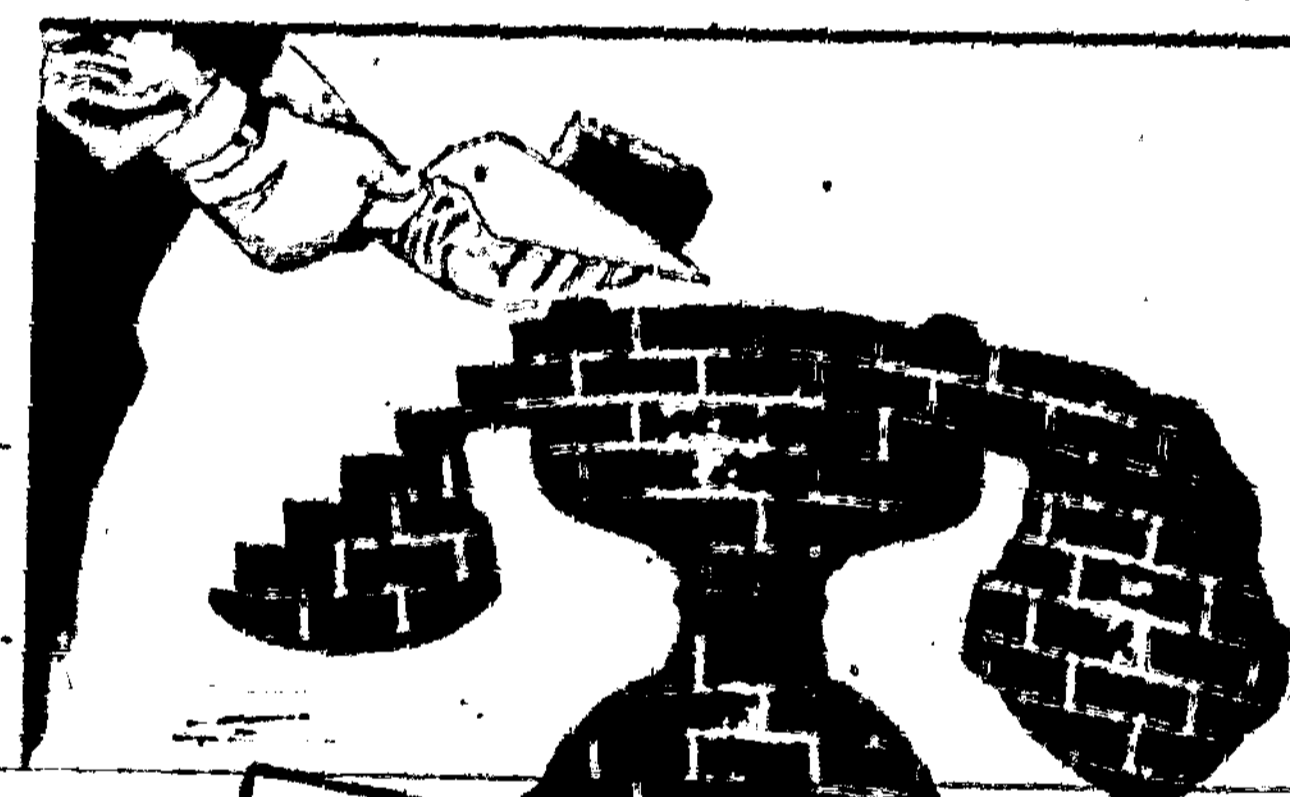

VETERANS' NEWS

Veterans Administration has re-
vised its appraisal procedure to
provide VA regional offices with a
firmer control over appraisals of
reasonable value on home proper-
ties sold to veterans through G-I
loans, VA has announced.

The revised procedure became ef-
fective June 1, includes a new fea-
ture whereby the veteran who con-
templated buying a home will be
advised by the appraiser of any
major deficiencies found to exist in
the property.

Applicable in the case of all
houses appraised as completed dwel-
lings, as distinguished from hous-
ing built under VA or FHA inspec-
tion, the plan calls for direct as-
signment of appraisers by VA. Up-
on completion of the assignment,
the appraiser will submit his report
to VA together with a letter ad-
dressed to the veteran concerned,
outlining such major deficiencies as
may have been observed by the ap-
praiser. VA will forward this letter
and a copy of the certificate of
reasonable value to the veteran af-
ter review and approval of the ap-
praisal report.

ter review and approval of the ap-

Veterans Administration, by ad-
ministrative action, has increased
the income limitations used in de-
termining dependency of veterans'
parents for compensation and pen-
sion purposes, VA has announced.

The monthly amounts are \$80 for
a mother or father not living to-
gether, \$135 for both parents living
together plus \$35 for each addition-
al member of the family group.
These amounts compare with the
previous limitations of \$60, \$100
and \$25, respectively.

VA stressed that these limita-
tions are not controlling in any case
but are used merely as prima facie
evidence of dependency. Each claim
for benefits is considered on its
individual merits, and all pertinent
factors are considered.

Exempt from consideration as in-
come are benefits under laws ad-
ministered by VA, including insur-
ance proceeds, mustering-out pay,
and 6 months death gratuity pay-
ments.

In order to speed the entry of
disabled veterans into training, VA
has modified the advisement and
guidance requirements for many
veterans eligible for training under
the Vocational Rehabilitation Act,
(Public Law 16). The revision ben-
efit most of the veterans who have
to change their training objectives
in order to begin or continue their
rehabilitation. The new policy eli-
minates the additional advisement
previously required before such
changes could be made. It allows
some of these veterans to select
several job goals, simultaneously
instead of limiting their choice to
one. It enables others to start pre-
liminary training in professional
fields before they choose their spe-
cific training objectives.

With these changes VA hopes to
eliminate many of the delays that
hold up the training of these vet-
erans and cause them to return to
VA for additional advisement.

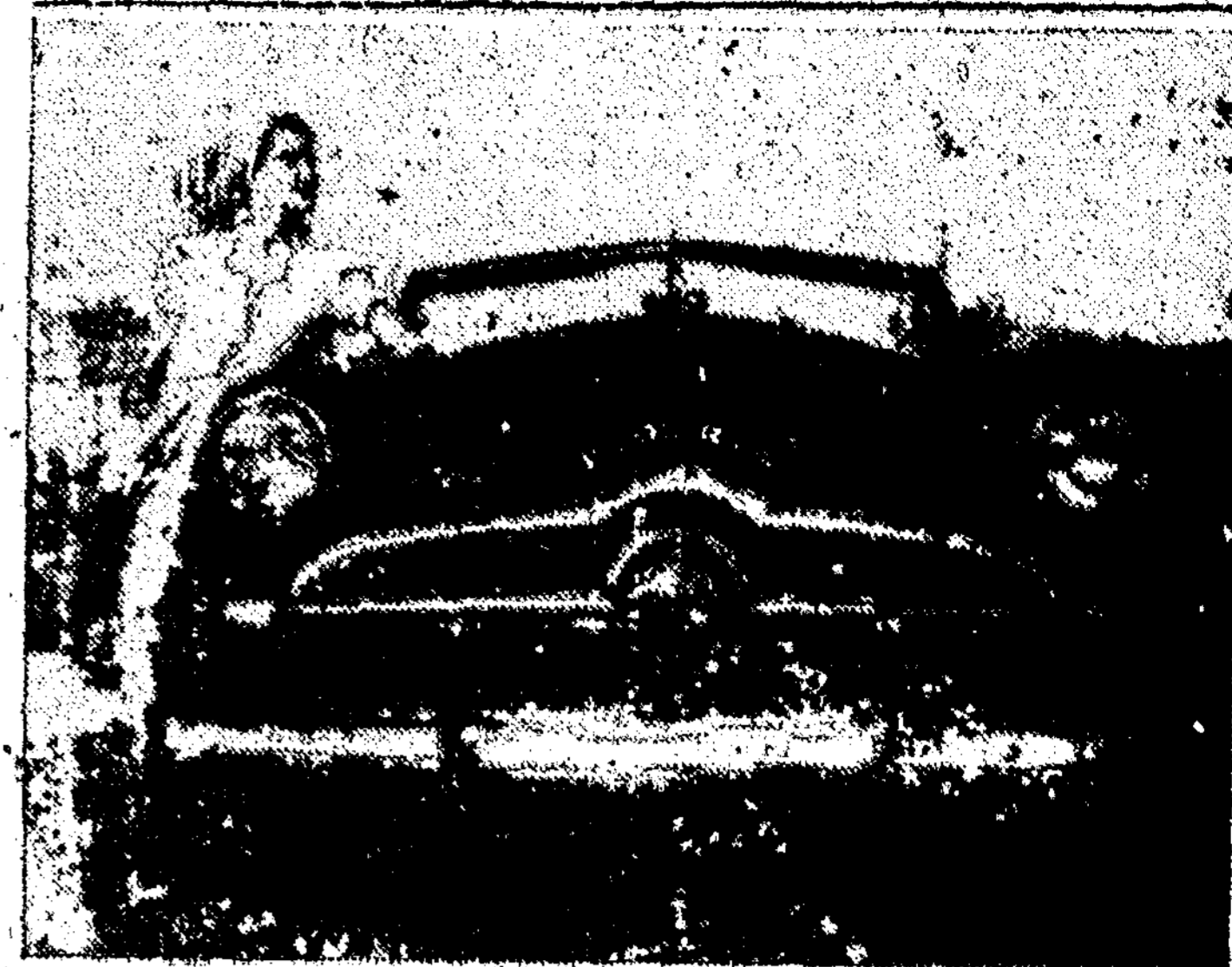

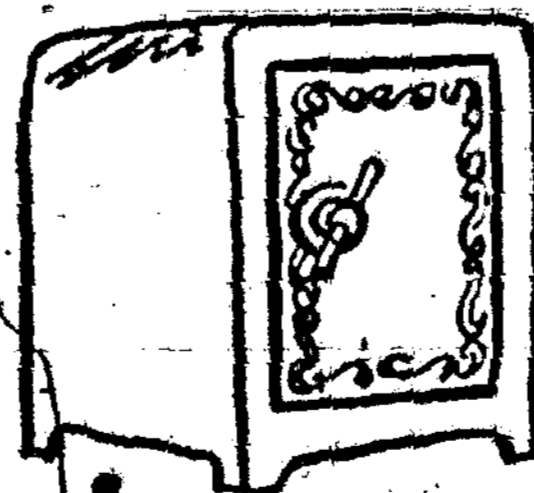

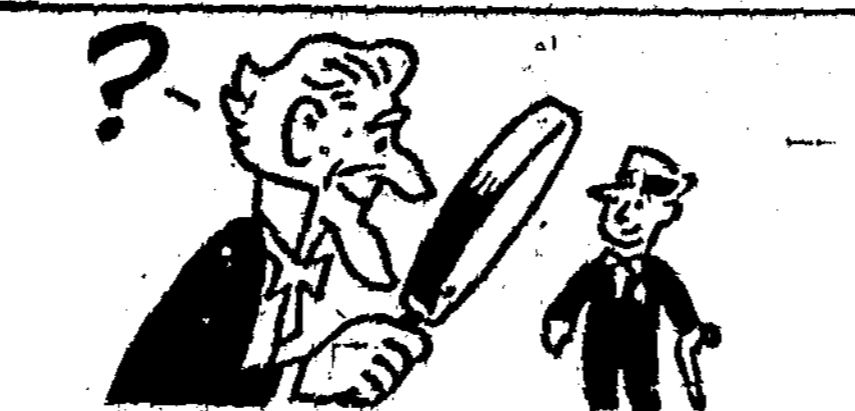

on PUBLIC LAW 16



Q. What is vocational advisement and why is it required under this program?
A. Designed to assist the disabled veteran to discover his capabilities, it enables the VA to help him to find the type of training and the particular job in which, taking his disability into account, he is most likely to be rehabilitated.

- EXTRA SUBSISTENCE
- TRAINING ASSISTANCE
- JOB PLACEMENT
- MEDICAL CARE



Q. Do disabled veterans receive special Federal rehabilitation assistance?
A. Yes. They are eligible for all benefits their non-disabled buddies are, plus additional subsistence allowances, training and job placement assistance, medical care, and other aids.



Q. What are the conditions for eligibility?
A. He must have a discharge other than dishonorable for wartime service, a compensable service-connected disability, and be determined to be in need of training to overcome the handicap of his disability.



Q. What happens if the disabled veteran, through no fault of his own, fails in the course first selected?
A. Generally, VA will take special steps to enter him in another course which he is more likely to complete successfully.



Q. What is the maximum length of training under this program?
A. Usually the maximum is 4 years.

New Mexico Gains Acreage
As a result of an inventory of land instituted by John E. Miles, State Land Commissioner, it is found that the Federal government is indebted to the State by a total of 20,000 acres. This amount has been verified by records in Washington and the new land will become property of the State's public school system and the State institutions. It is expected that the total acreage recovered will amount to the figure above stated.

Social Security
According to the Social Security Bulletin, published by the Federal Security Agency, Washington, D. C., there were in the month of February 1948 in New Mexico 8592 recipients of old age assistance, who received a total of \$307,026, an average of \$35.73 per person. Aid to the blind was furnished to 400 recipients, who received a total of \$15,935, or an average of \$39.20. To dependent children aid was given to 4552 families, who received a

State Treasury Payments
For the six months ending December 31, 1946, the total warrants from the State Treasury amounted to \$27,516,691.22, the balance as of

December 31, 1946 being \$7,571,110.32. For the corresponding period ended December 31, 1947, the total payments amounted to \$29,116,369.01, the balance as of December 31, 1947, being \$11,908,705.30.

SUMMER VACATION WORKERS NEED SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS

Boys and girls who are taking jobs in Carrizozo stores and cafes during the summer vacation need social security account number cards, and may obtain them by mail or personal application from the social security field office in Roswell, J. Haasler Strickland, manager, announces.

A vacation worker who does not have a social security card should apply for one as soon as he has a definite job in prospect, and when he receives the card he should show it to his employer promptly, Mr. Strickland said.

He reminded young workers who obtained account cards for summer jobs last year that these cards are as good today as when issued; in fact one social security account number is all that a person should ever have. Anyone who has lost his card should apply immediately for a duplicate so he will receive the same number and secure a correct account of his wages reported, which means full credit on his old-age and survivors insurance

account, Mr. Strickland added.

When a girl marries, she should have the name changed on her social security card. She will have the same number—only the name will be different. Strickland stated that a change-of-name application would be sent on request.

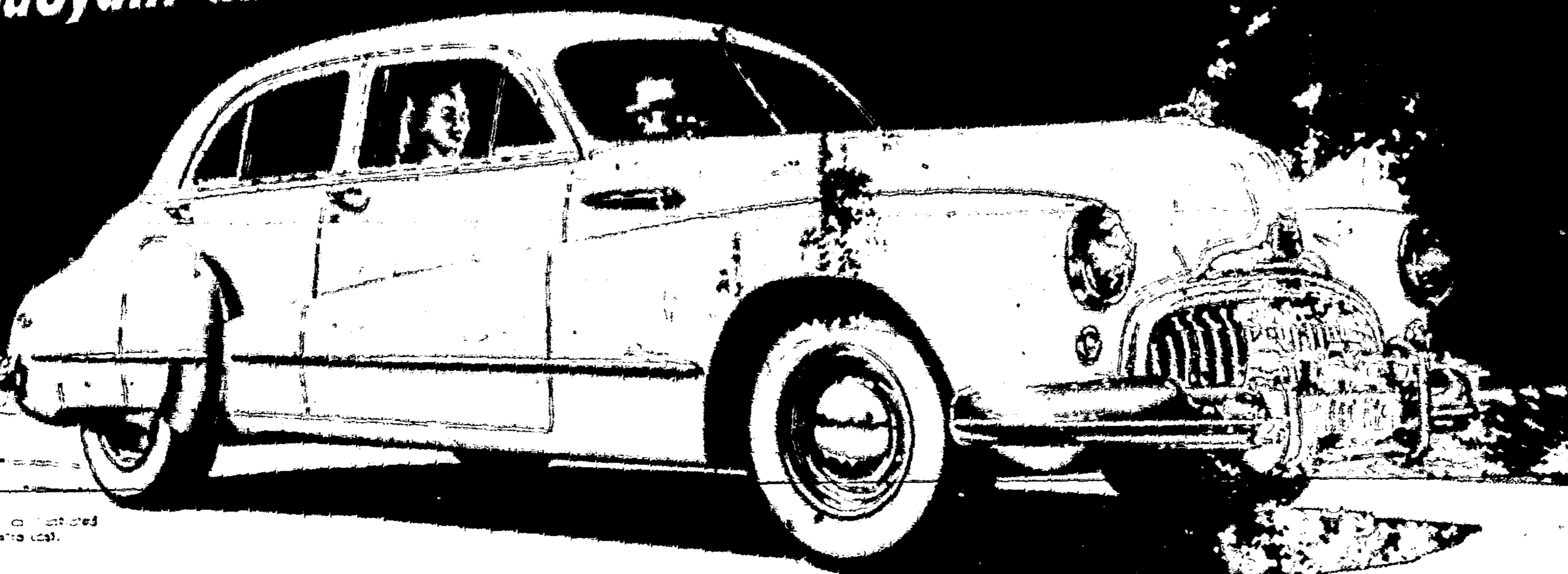

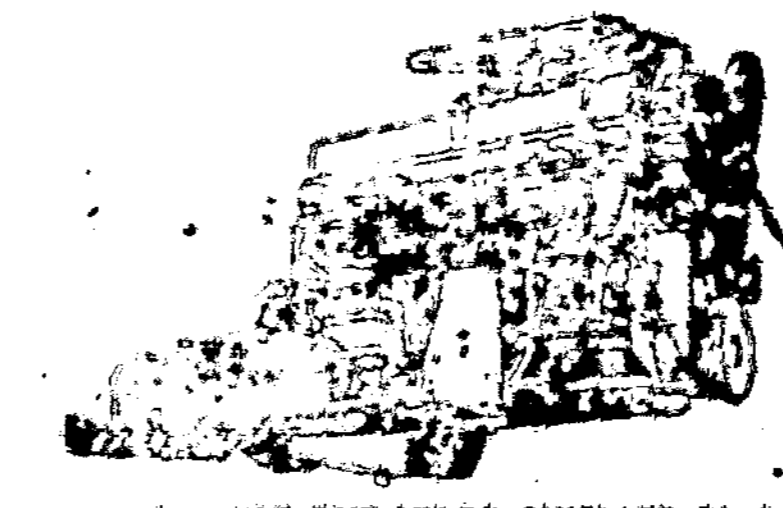

Impulse to Zion

Arnold Toynbee, British historian, types the Jews as a fossilized remnant of an extinct civilization. He meant that because of their single-minded, faultless devotion to the religion of Moses and their strict adherence to ancestral customs...

ISRAEL: In Palestine

JERUSALEM ... Jew or Arab?

Independent republic in Palestine which was to be called Israel. Before Israel was 30 minutes old it had received formal diplomatic recognition from the United States, first nation to extend such recognition.

And while Israel was yet only hours old it was already at war. The newborn state was invaded from the north by regular army forces of Lebanon and Syria and from the south by Egyptian troops. It was shelled from the east by Trans-Jordan's Arab Legion and bombed and machine-gunned from the air by Arab planes.

Haganah, the principal Jewish fighting force, rushed troops, seasoned by months of guerrilla warfare to all fronts and the fighting settled down to the pattern with which every adult in the world has become familiar.

During the initial furor, Israel's provisional council of state managed to find time to elect Dr. Chaim Weizmann, a scientist and elder statesman of Zionism, first president of the nation.

Most momentous news connected with establishment of Israel was the astonishingly prompt U. S. diplomatic recognition of the state.

CRISIS: Supersonic

There is a "crisis" developing in military aviation, says Cmdr. Lynn S. Beale, Jr., navy doctor, because it is not yet known how to keep human beings healthy when they fly faster than sound.

WINDFALL: Propaganda

In Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith's formal and completely routine statement to Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, the Russians thought they had a propaganda bonanza. It was cleverly done. Smith's otherwise tough statement, which simply repeated the basic U. S. foreign policy with regard to Russia, contained one sentence that Moscow took as a loophole: "As far as the United States is concerned, the door is always wide open for full discussion and the composing of our differences."

ISRAEL: In Palestine

Events moved with the swiftness of time itself in the Holy Land. Ritualizing the expiration of Great Britain's 30-year mandate rule over Palestine, Sir Alan Cunningham, British high commissioner, hauled down his personal flag in Jerusalem and flew to Haifa where he boarded a cruiser.

That was that. Britannia no longer ruled the Palestinians. Then the Jews, who had been denied a legally partitioned state, proclaimed the existence of a new, independent republic in Palestine which was to be called Israel.

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FARM PLAN: Truman's

To shore up his sinking political prestige in his campaign for re-nomination, President Truman proposed to congress a four-point farm program which he claimed is "essential" to a productive, prosperous agriculture in the U. S.

- 1. A permanent system of "flexible price supports for agricultural commodities."
2. Full support to the continuance and expansion of our program of soil conservation.
3. Legislation by congress to "continue and strengthen programs to assure adequate consumption of agricultural products."
4. Means for assisting farmers to meet their special problems.

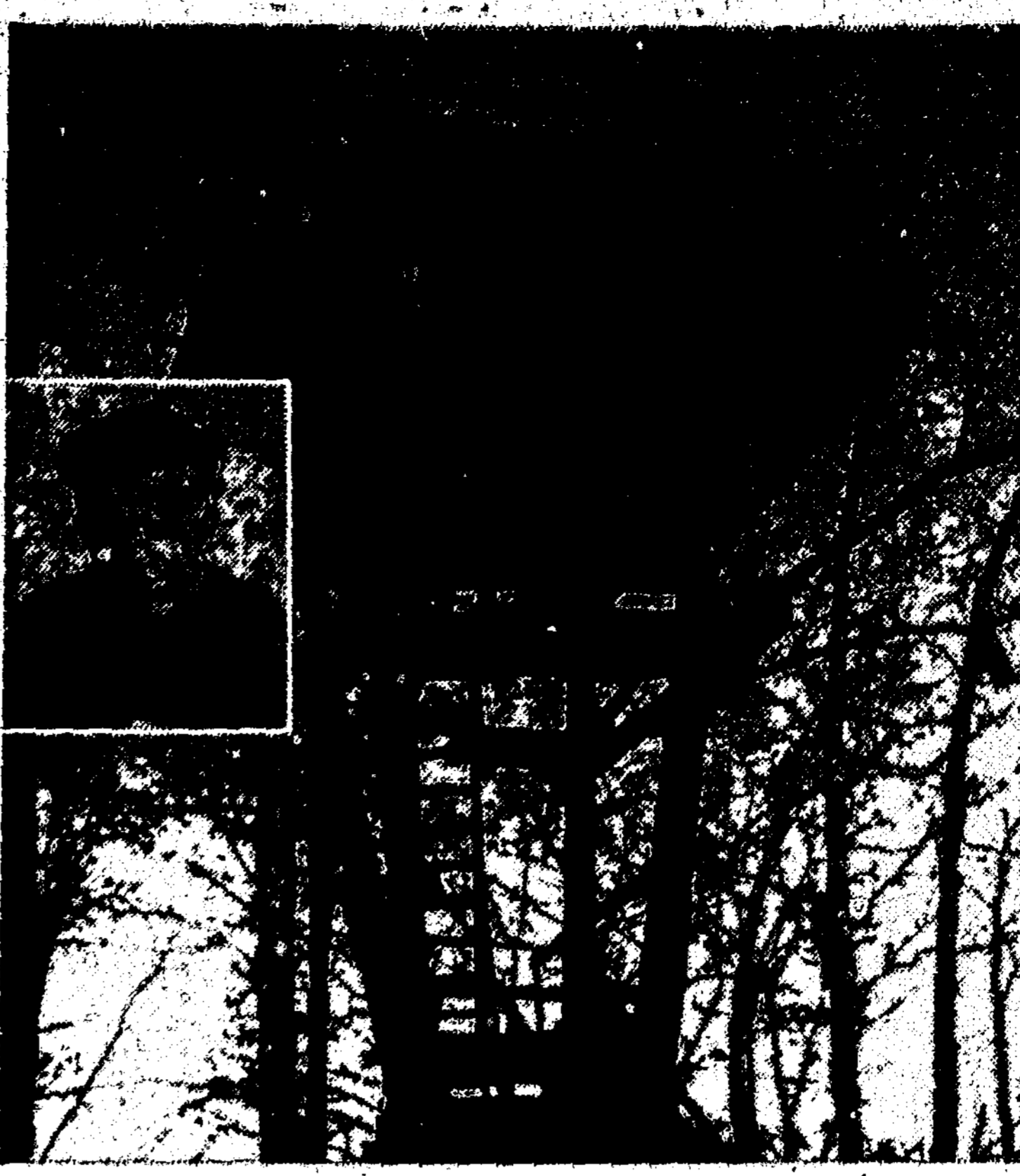
ITALY: Vox Pop

U.S. Forecasts Price Troubles For Housewives

WASHINGTON.—Complicated figures just released by the federal reserve board and the department of commerce carry storm warnings for housewives who are already having trouble making both ends meet.

The possible dynamic under prices lies in three new large sums about to go into circulation: (1) money "saved" because of lower income taxes, (2) increased installment payments, (3) increased defense appropriations.

Americans are expected to go on the cuff for at least 3.2 billion dollars worth of goods this year. They'll get them through installment buying and through charge accounts.

That kind of buying dropped off through the war because there were government controls on it, but congress let the controls go in November. Immediately there was an upsurge.

Funds for the Military War clouds have forced the government to talk of spending more for the army, navy and air force.

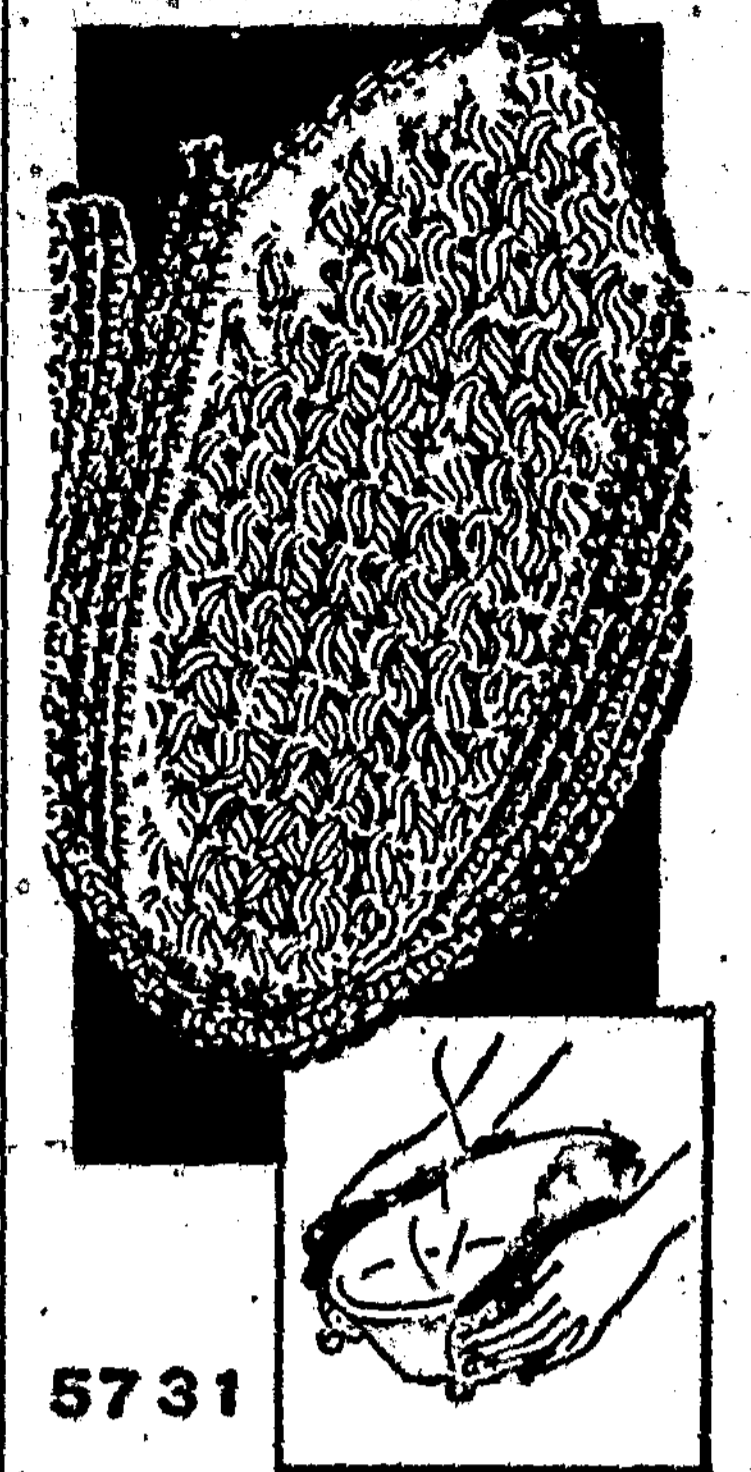

COVMEN TURN PROFESSORS

G. W. Evans, Magdalena and Albert K. Mitchell of Albert will turn educators when they appear before College summer sessions to lecture on the value of land development, practical conservation and the business approach to livestock production. Evans is president of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association and Mitchell is a past president of the State and National Livestock Associations.

Evans will deliver a two hour lecture at the State Teachers' College in Silver City on July 5 and Mitchell will lecture at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque; the Normal University in Las Vegas and the Eastern New Mexico College in Portales during the latter part of June and July.

"Know New Mexico" is the title of the soil conservation workshop courses which will give prospective teachers extra credits toward a degree. Courses will cover the history of development of the earth's crust; its use by man and animals; its condition in past and present and its economic value to the State. Evans and Mitchell will deal with Land management, resources, use and economic returns to the State.

S. P. TO PURCHASE 95 MORE FREIGHT ENGINES

One of the nation's largest railroad equipment-purchase projects, involving approximately \$25,000,000 for 95 new Diesel-electric freight locomotives of various types, was announced yesterday by President A. T. Mercier of the Southern Pacific.

Bids are being requested on 30 new 8,000 horsepower mainline freight locomotives, and 65 Diesel switch engines ranging in horsepower from 600 to 1,500. Mr. Mercier said. He pointed out that the purchase will include 15 "road switch engines" of 1,500 horsepower each, a new type locomotive so flexible that it may be used either for mainline or yard service. Delivery of the new locomotives is expected to begin early in the second quarter of next year.

Revelation of plans for the large new acquisition of freight motive power followed closely upon Southern Pacific's announcement of a \$15,000,000 passenger train improvement project to Dieselize and streamline the famous "Sunset Limited," and will raise the company's postwar investments in new cars and locomotives to a total of about \$209,000,000.

When all locomotives now on order, or authorized, have been delivered Southern Pacific and its wholly owned affiliates will have a total of 33 Diesels in service, plus three jointly owned and operated on the "City of San Francisco" streamliners, Mr. Mercier said.

LINCOLN COUNTY INVESTS \$747,580 IN U.S. SAVINGS BONDS

New Mexicans invested fewer dollars in U. S. Savings Bonds during May than in any month since the beginning of World War II. The exact amount so invested was \$747,580, which was approximately \$400,000 less than the average monthly investment for the previous twenty-eight months.

"This drop in investments indicates that the Security Bond Drive has not yet resulted in increased sales in New Mexico," said Edwin G. Hobbs, State Director of the Savings Bond Division. "Many of the chairman of county bond committees are planning a local drive during June," he added. "A great deal of hard work will have to be done this month to enable New Mexicans to reach their assigned goal of \$7,000,000 by June 30," he added. As of June 1, total sales for April and May were only \$1,916,105," he reported. "With two-thirds of the time gone, only 27.3 per cent of the quota has been attained."

"It is confidently expected that residents of every county will do their share in the Security Bond Drive as they have done in all the War and Victory Loan Drives," Hobbs concluded.

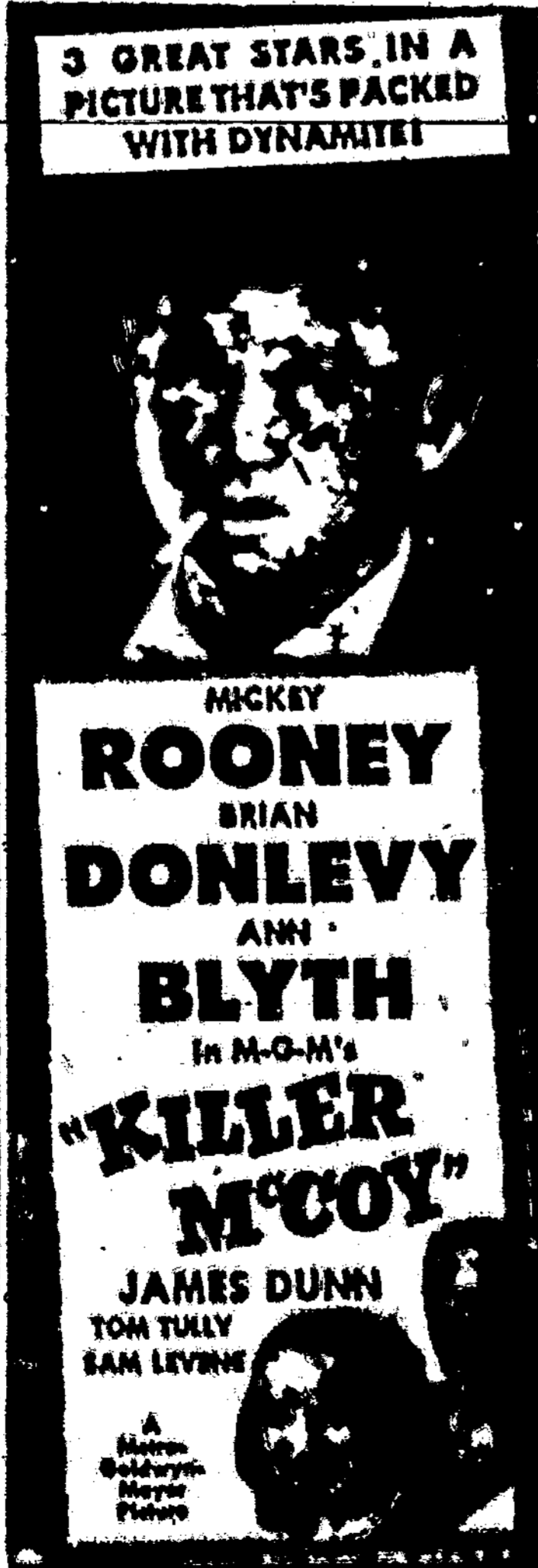
