Israel Registers Diplomatic Victory By Agreeing to 'Cease Fire' Order; Lewis Quits First Coal Conference

PALESTINE: Diplomacy

What the Jews of Israel lacked in armed strength to resist Arab attacks against their new state they had made up in shrewd diplomacy.

It was just possible that the decisive blow of the Palestine war was struck when Israel, foreseeing military defeat, agreed to order its army to cease fire on all Palestine fronts if the Arabs would do the

That development, which took place as the battle for Jerusalem entered its sixth day in an unholy atmosphere of rattling guns, bursting shell and violent death, made the most favorable impression possible in the United Nations.

Thus having the onus of prolonging the Palestine fighting shifted suddenly to their shoulders alone, the Arabs were put on the spot in the U. N. and in world public opin-

It was a clever diplomatic maneuver on the part of the Jews but, at least at the outset of this new line of circumstances, the Arabs were having none of it. They relierated their determination to wrest all Paleatine from control of the Jows.

Actually, all the Jews had done was to issue a surprise cease fire order in compliance with a U. N. security council request that the fighting be brought to a halt. Neither the recurity council nor anyone else had expected the request to be observed.

But that put it up to the Arabs who, faced with a deadline set by the U. N., were having trouble deciding whother or not to cease fire.

If they stopped fighting now they would have done so without attaining their prime objective - the revoking of Israel's claim to sovereign statehood. If they continued the wor beyond the deadline they would be laying themselves open to possible security council sanctions of the economic variety,

SECURITY: Desperate Plight

President Truman came up with another sound plank to reinforce his campaign platform when he demonded that congress overhaul and broaden the social security program.

To relieve the "desperate" plight of the aged and needy in this inflationary period he called for a 50 per cent increase in old age insurance benefits and asked that 20 million more persons be protected.

He offered a five point program and said he wanted quick action on it. For three years, the President pointed out with some irritation, similar requests on his part have been shunted aside. This time he was asking:

A 50 per cent increase "at least" in old age and survivors' insurance benefits; allowing pensioners to earn up to \$40 a menth instead of \$15 without losing benefits raising of the tax rate from 1 per cent to 114 per cent next January 1. 2 Extension of coverage to flarm

Le and domestic workers, the self-employed and others not now covered. Broadening of unemployment

3. insurance to cover employees of small firms (having fewer than eight workers), federal employees and others. Disability insurance to protect

werkers from loss of earnings caused by sickness and injuries. Increased federal benefits to

match state aid for dependent children, the needy, aged and blind, Whatever his motives in present-

ing the problem of inadequate social security benefits again at this time, Mr. Truman did have a good, even a neble, point, "Passis whose sole income is

Both President Truman and the aged and needy were hoping fervently that congress would be able to equeexe social security legislation into the crowded docket it had prepared for the month preceding adjournment.

NO CONFERENCE:

Lewis Again

It was all typically Lewisian. "I make the observation that there is now no conference," quoth John L., chief of the noft coal miners, as he walked grandly out on the first meeting to negotiate a new contract between the coal operators and the United Mine Workers.

UMW's present contract expires June 30,1

Lewis broke up the discussion on 1948 Wage agreements when he objected to seating Joseph E. Moody, president of the Southern Coal Produgers association, at the conference and was outvoted by the operators.

He was not against Moody perconally, Officially, his union's position was that the 14 regional orgenizations which comprise the Southern association must bargain in 14 separate groups, rather than delegate bargaining authority to the all-inclusive association.

According to Lewis' accepted pattern of operation, his balk at the Southern Coal Producers was the opening tactical stroke in his 1948 campaign for an improved miners' contract.

Following that, he could sit back and present the UMW ware demands in his own good time. Then, if the coal operators did not accede, he could call the annual

Lewis knew his position was good. The UMW's recent pension walkout had left the nation's coal reserves seriously depleted. By the time June 30 rolled around soft coal stocks would not yet have been built up to the point where industry could stand a long strike.

Barring unforeseen circumstances, it looked like this would develop into another injunction

The union still is under an 30 day court injunction prohibiting renewal of the pension strike: but the court might rule that another walkout would be a brand new strike. In that case a new injunction might have to be sought by the government under Talt-Hartley procedure.

HARVEST:

European

Europe may look forward to posibly its best year since the war if food production prospects conlinus to be as favorable as they are right now.

U. 5. agriculture department said that the centiment will preduce a larger part of its food needs this year than it did last year and that the crop outlook was good over most of Europe and the Soviet Union early in May.

Prospects indicate a considerably larger crop of breed grains --- wheat and rys-than last year's desperately small one. A severe wholes killed most of Europe's winter

wheat and rye last year, European production of bread grains may surpass 1.8 billion bushels, which was the size of the 1944 crop, largest since the war. Production last year dropped to about 1.8 billion bushels, compared with a 2.3 billion average before the

DAIRYING: To a Crisis

While the U.S. dairy industry was busy promoting its 12th annual June Dairy Month for the purpose of selling more milk, butter, cheese and ice cream it also was taking a long, critical look behind the scenes and not liking what it

Industry analysis had spotted what appeared to be a dangerous trend. In its simplest form the trend could be defined as an inexorable increase in the U. S. popu-

At the root of the problem was a stubbornly entrenched economic condition whose factors were the war, widespread hunger abroad and domestic inflation.

Continuing high prices for beef and veal have been instrumental in sending many dairy cows or potential dairy cows to the slaughter house. Too many American dairy farmers have discovered how they could reduce their herds drastically, put more land into moneymaking grain crops, realize a greater profit and still have more leisure time.

Adding those conditions to the fact that during the past few years the nation has experienced about a 45 per cent increase in its birth rate, the dairy industry came up with a grim conclusion: If these circumstances continue at the present rate, and there is every likelihood that they will, by 1952 the U. S. will be approaching the critical point at which it no longer will be able to produce enough milk to satisfy its own needs.

That, according to some prognosticators, might mean strict rationing in a land which hitherto had literally flowed with milk and



Healthy Plants Needed To Assure Good Crop Sturdy Growth Hinges On Well-Fertilized Soil

Healthy plants, like healthy humans, are better fitted to fight off insect and disease attacks than are undernourished ones. Enemies have a tougher time getting under the guard of well fed plants. Such plants have stronger root systems and hardier, better developed growth above ground. They can stand on their "feet" and defend themselves.


Whether your crops are well fed or undernourished depends on the condition of your soil. If your soil is loose, mellow, high in organic matter, of good tilth and carries plenty of plant food, it can give your crops a body-building diet. It your soil is worn down by overcropping and



failure to put back plant nutrients and organic matter, it cannot support healthy, sturdy crop growth.

Any farmer can build his soil's fertility and (crop producing ability by good management methods. He can get bigger crop yields per acre through use of fertilizer carrying nitrogen, phosphate and potash as needed. He can build soil structure by growing deep-rooted legumes such as alfalfa or sweet clover in the rotation. Roots of the legumes will open tight soil and let air and water in. Plowed under, the legumes will add to the soil's organic matter supply. Crops following in the rotation will have more "elbow room" to seek water and nutrients deep down in the soil. The organic matter supply can be further increased by returning manure and crop aftermath to the soil,



QUESTION: Is the periodic use of yeast helpful or detrimental to a septic tank? What effect will the use of drain cleaners have on a septic tank? Is there any specially designed product on the market to keep septic tanks in better working

ANSWER: Small 'quantities of a drain cleaner can be safely used, but large quantities will stop bacterial action. In such cases, a large volumn of water should be run into the tank to carry off the chemicals. Bacterial action can then be restarted by dissolving six cakes of yeast in lukewarm water in a washbasin and flushing it into the tank.

QUESTION: Is there any way to remove the discoloration on my new plasterwork caused by rain soaking through the sheathing and insula-

tion? ANSWER: Stains on the plaster from the rain have gone all the way through and cannot be removed. After the plaster has dried out you can paint the walls. The alternative is to cut out the stained part of the plaster and replaster.

QUESTION: There is a little crack directly over my sink where it forms a joint with the plaster wall. The white plaster used for filling the crack always comes out. What can be done?

ANSWER: Before the war it was possible to get a neat, flexible metal moulding that was made for a crack such as yours, or to cover the crack at the top of a bathtub. If you cannot find any of this, fill the crack with a light-colored caulking compound. This resembles putty, but never becomes hard or brittle. After forcing it into the crack, run your finger along the surface to smooth it, and after a few days, touch it up with enamel to match the wall.

Esther's Zeal For Her People Lesson for June 13, 1946

PEORGE MEREDITH has a line that runs like this, "God's rarest blessing is, after all, a good woman." In this study of Esther,

you may wish to think of her primarily as a courageous woman -most people do, I guess. But back of her courage was a solid goodness else she would never have been able to say, "And if I perish, I per-



One must read the Book of Esther, of course, to have any grasp of this great story. It requires but a few minutes, and every reader will be richly rewarded. I have a lawyer friend, a prodigious reader, who tells me that once each month, for the past 50 years, he has read the Book of Esther.

A QUEEN WHO WAS BRAVE

DANIEL, we agreed, was a brave person; but not more brave than Esther. There is a verce in Hebrews 13:6 that serves admirably to interpret this first stage of Esther's manifest courage, "The Lord is my helper,"

We go to the palace in Shushan, where reigned Ahasuerus. His kingdom stretched from India even unto Ethiopia, His queen, Vashti, refused to come before him when he had made a feast. As a result of this refusal, the king ordered young maldens brought before him that he might chose a new queen. There was in the court a Jew, Mordecai, who had been brought there from Jerusalem. He had in his care the daughter of his uncle, a beautiful molden, named Esther. Mordecai saw here a great opportunity and he brought her before the king. She was chosen. This brief sketch accounts for her position.

A QUEEN WHO HELPED HER PEOPLE

LIAMAN, who was next to the king II in authority, discovering that Mordecal was a Jew and was not worshipping as Haman had commanded, caused a decree to be issued which would put to death all the Jews in the kingdom. Mordecai, learning of this decree, sent word secretly to Eather, urging her to intercede on behalf of her people to the king.

Here is the heart of the story. Space does not permit a detailed recital. It is sufficient to say that Esther, though still in her early twenties, managed this delicate situation with such skill that the gallows which Haman had built for Mordecal turned out to be the instrument of death for Haman and his sons. Instead of the Jews being slaughtered, those who had planned the death of all the Jews lay dead.

ESTHER RISKED ALL AND

IF EVER there was a perfect illustration of staking one's all on one great moment, Esther provides such illustration. "Who knoweth whether thou art not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" said Mordecai as he bolstered her

It is such a challenge as young people may be facing today. Obviously, the moment now confronting us calls for great faith and great sacrifice if this world is to be saved from utter destruction. It may be that this situation calls for hitherto unknown tactics. And let us pray God there is somewhere an Esther.

THE MESSAGE OF ESTHER

TAT HICH leads me to suggest that racial hatred was never more bitter than at this moment. Unless the winds of God blow, unless some mighty manifestation of divine intervention is granted, the world will break up on the rocks of prejudice and selfishness and ambition and all the forms and fashions of sin.

"God moves in a mysterious way. his wonders to perform." Let us pray that we may early witness some mighty stroke of his mercy and deliverance, ere the night let down.





Customs Officers Use Mirrors for Smuggler Search

NEW YORK - Day and night, quads of armed men carrying flashlights and pocket mirrors swarm aboard ships entering New York harbor.

The alert, eagle eyed men of the United States customs Inforcement division don't carry the glassware from milady's handbag to use in combing their hair or prettying their features. Pocket mirrors are standard equipment in the grim, unrelenting war on narcotic smuggling.

Placed strategically, a mirror shows up what may be ingeniously hidden behind a lavatory washbowl, a seaman's bunk, or in the machinery of the ship's intricate engine room.

Vigilance of these customs officers has paid off handsomely. In the last year they've confiscated contraband drugs valued at several million dollars in the illicit market, said Harry M. Durning, United States customs collector for the New York port.

N. Y. A "Hot" Port

New York, in law enforcement parlance, is a "hot" port-about the hottest in the world.

International smugglers have renewed efforts to penetrate port surveillance with narcotics for American dope peddling rings. History, said veteran port officials, is repeating itself. A postwar resurgence of narcotic smuggling is comparable to one after World War I.

Collector Durning attributes the alarming increase to a breakdown of prewar safeguards abroad, worldwide unrest and unsettled economic conditions and the age old desire for quick, high profits.

In tightening their vigil against smuggling, customs officers pay particular attention to all ships coming from French and Mediterranean ports. That's where, they said, most shipments of illicit drugs originate.

Ships from Britain and Ireland the officers said, seldom figure in drug smuggling. Always suspect, however, said Herman Lipski, chief of the United States customs enforcement division, are vessels coming from Naples, Genoa, Marseille, Le Hayre and Antwerp.

Selze Big Catch

Lipski's men recently scored their biggest catch of the year when they discovered narcotics valued at one million dollars secreted about a ship from Le Havre.

One bundle of drugs was found in the ship's galley at the bottom of a full barrel of flour. Another batch, encased in a waterproof bag, reposed in a soup tureen full of water. Other packages were discovered inside the lining of the ship's oven and in a box of sea biscuits.

Another recent haul came when shore patrol officers under Durning raided the basement of a dingy water front tenement. They found 36 ounces of narcotics and complete equipment for testing, diluting and preparing drugs for illicit sale to

In a drainpipe in the basement they found \$18,000 in cash and a pistol. From a man caught fleeing the basement they confiscated four more ounces of drugs. Total value of the catch was placed at \$200,000.




